Friends celebrate library GROUNDBREAKING

n a day that had been long anticipated, Third ■ District Supervisor Jeff Stone helped the Friends of the Idyllwild Library celebrate a groundbreaking for the new Idyllwild Library in Strawberry Plaza on Friday, Jan. 27. Scheduled for a 180-day construction period, the library should open, barring weather delays, by Labor Day of this year.

"I am still up on cloud nine to think that we are finally going to get that library," said longtime Friends advocate Adele Voell. "I am pinching myself every now and then to make sure that I'm not dreaming and that this is actually happening."

It was a day of satisfaction for the Friends as member Bob Ferguson

recounted the long history of getting to this point — the stops, the starts and the reverses that after more than 10 years culminated in the county's Economic Development Agency (EDA) securing federal community block development grants (CDBG) to finance the \$2 million addition to the Idyllwild community.

"We're getting exactly what we wanted with this library," Voell said. "All I want to say is 'thank you' to Natalia Brown, library project manager for EDA] and to EDA."

Stone, who demonstrated a continued commitment to getting this project green-lighted and built, said that for

IFPD's future cash flow still low

Summer, fall advance may be needed

After listening to several residents oppose, object and question the departure of former Fire Chief Norm Walker, the Idyllwild Fire Protection District (IFPD) commission began the tedious and long process of investigating many options which might contribute to fiscal solvency.

Interim Chief Mike Sherman several times referred

to actions that would "stop the bleeding." The commission is trying to apply triage and stabilize the organization before attempting any major surgery or miracle remedy.

The highlight of the meeting was Sherman's summary of the financial issues, which he has begun to research and evaluate.

First he announced the good news. Riverside County has just sent another tax See IFPD, page 19

Brown budgets fire fee use

lthough not \$1 of the controversial Fire Prevention fee has been collected, Gov. Jerry Brown has plans for spending \$50 million from that fee this fiscal year and \$84 million in fiscal 2012-13.

This year, \$50 million of funds will supplement the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection's (CAL FIRE) regular budget. Collections are estimated to be \$84.4 million. The additional \$34.4 million will be kept in the fund and available for use in future

Neither the current year nor next year's (2012-13) requests include funding

for fire prevention grants for local jurisdictions and community groups such as fire-safe councils. While the legislation establishing the fee authorizes the grant program and specifies the uses, no regulations have been developed for its implementation according to Janet Upton, CAL FIRE's deputy director for communications. In absence of approved regulations for the grant process, the state is not planning any funding for this purpose.

Staff for the Board of Forestry and Fire Protection is drafting permanent fee regulations, including a grant program, according to George Gentry, the board's executive officer.

RMRU completes 24-hour rescue

Unprepared hikers lost on Skyline Trail

Last week, Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit (RMRU) volunteers rescued two hikers lost at the 6,200foot level east of the Palm Springs Aerial Tramway. The hikers from the Vancouver, Canada area, both in their 40s, had set out from the desert floor on the Skyline Trail. Even with snow visible on the mountain's upper reaches, the two were lightly dressed and unprepared for the cold temperatures and snow they encountered at higher elevations.

According to a Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RCSD) press release, the two became disoriented and left the trail as nightfall set in on Tuesday, Jan. 24.

RCSD first activated dep-

uties and an aviation unit around 5:45 p.m. according to an RCSD press release then dispatched RMRU around 7 p.m., according to RMRU volunteer Lee Arnson.

The RCSD helicopter unit spotted the couple around 9:50 p.m. but could neither land nor deploy a rescue crew because of the steep terrain and strong winds. The helicopter crew directed the RMRU ground team to the couple. The ground team reached the hikers at midnight, according to Arnson.

He noted the hikers were clothed in shorts and Tshirts, and had only a small daypack with them. RMRU provided the hikers food, water and warm clothing and began hiking them

Outside Idyllwild

The Aguanga-Butterfield Overland Mail Station and other stories ...

On the last Sunday of January, in the 5:20 a.m. darkness, I drove down to my friend Christine's place in Aguanga.

Christine Fogg Horton is both a life-long

artist and photographer extraordinaire. I have been seeing many of her beautiful landscapes on Facebook for the last year or so and I could not wait for the opportunity to go shooting with her.

We originally planned to head out to Vail Lake but as Marion, Jean and San Jacinto peaks in the background. we approached the lake we saw a sign that said "Welcome Spartans." We didn't even want to know who the Spartans were or if there were 300 of them, so we turned around and headed toward the rising sun.

With the sun coming over the ridge, it made shooting difficult; but we had spotted a very old-looking building on the way to the lake. Christine informed me this was the old stagecoach station (circa 1861).

We couldn't help but notice that the front gate to the property was open and we could no longer see the "No Trespassing" sign at such an acute angle (at least that was the excuse we would use if we were caught).

The dirt road, which we followed to the station, was in magnificent disrepair. I don't know what attracts photographers to dilapidated buildings; but as long as they remain standing, someone with a camera will make the pilgrimage to take their picture.

We stayed as long as we felt we could without being run off and got some good shots. On the way out, I noticed a plaque and took a photo of it to read later. It turned out that the station was in use from Oct. 8, 1858 until 1861.

Christine did her best to school me on cameras and shooting techniques. But I am both blissfully ignorant and stubborn (a bad combination, I know). So I ignored her advice and said I would look into it later. I was too busy taking pictures to stop and learn what I was doing.

For the rest of the morning we drove up and down the highway and made forays onto dirt roads when we saw something interesting. Drive, stop and shoot photos then drive to the next promising spot.

We finally came to an open grassland with cattle surrounded by foothills and behind them the San Jacinto Mountains in the distance.

This was simply a vista that I could not resist and we took many photos. Across the street was the casino on a small bluff, this afforded an even better view of our local mountains. From that particular angle, you could see the local 10,000 foot peaks — Marion, Jean and San Jacinto all lined up in a row.

After three hours of shooting, we returned to Christine's and viewed some of the online photography sites about which she had told me.

But one more surprise awaited me. When we arrived at the hacienda, another visitor greeted us on the patio, a grand peacock. What's a fellow to do when he comes upon one of the most colorful and beautiful of all god's creatures?

down to the 2,500-foot level, Arnson said, where they bedded down awaiting helicopter pickup.

By 10:30 a.m., according to RCSD, both hikers were safely airlifted off the mountain. They refused medical treatment.

Les Walker and Helene Lohr, Idyllwild locals, participated in the rescue along with Arnson.

In a separate, but similar, incident in which RMRU assisted, a man and his 9-year-old stepson got disoriented and then lost on the Guadalupe Trail, south of the La Quinta Cove, as night was falling on Sunday, Jan. 30. They also were wearing light clothing and were not equipped for an overnight hike or cold weather conditions. A heli-

copter unit spotted the two and were returned to their at 11:57 p.m. at the 4,200foot level near the trail. The helicopter was unable to be prepared for weather to land, so rescuers had to be lowered to the hikers to assist in loading them into the helicopter. They were subsequently airlifted out, can be reached at

Five new businesses brighten winter forecast

In what is typically a slow time for Idyllwild merchants, five new businesses are opening their doors in a vote of confidence in the Hill's economic recovery.

First, and of particular interest to fitness buffs, Mile-High Fitness (MHF) has been sold to professional boxer, martial arts practitioner and longtime gym owner Willy Latzo. In addition to competing in professional sports, Latzo has owned gyms for more than 20 years. He and wife of cardiovascular work-

Lazlo will call the new expanded gym the Idyllwild Fitness Center (IFC). A fixed price monthly membership will include all classes and personal training. Two of the classes he plans to offer are the Brazilian workout craze Zumba as well as his own trademarked workout program called Funfight. On his website, Lazto describes Funfight as a "symbiosis

Latzo is buying all-new workout machines to replace the MHF machines, which will be used until the new equipment arrives in about four months.

Latzo is a four-time world champion in Heavyweight Kyokushinkai Full Contact Karate, a European champion in Muay

boxing champion, Wife Ramona Aygen, partner in the gym, also trained as a bodybuilder, beginning at age 16. A graduate of the Academy of Health and Nutrition in Hamburg, Germany, Aygen is certified in nutritional counseling and therapeutic massage. She will provide these services at IFC as well as personal training, Reiki, and weight loss counseling. "We want to create a family area gym and center," said Latzo.

Latzo and Aygen plan to open by March 1.

Response: On an hourly basis, Sherman is probably making more than Walker did. But Walker received an effective \$7,000 raise last year, when the commission agreed to pay his full CALPERS retirement.

In the contract, which he signed in August 2010, IFPD was paying two percent of his share of retirement.

Besides salary and retirement benefits, Chief Walker also earned vacation and sick leave: perhaps other benefits, such as health insurance, which Sherman doesn't.

Walker's departure was not intended to produce a budget savings and therefore balance the books.

• Posted Jan. 18, 6:17 p.m.: "The truth of Crest Forest Fire Department is not 'just the opposite'. JP needs to do a bit more digging. ... They are about to be taken over by CAL FIRE or San Bernardino County.

Response: It's not the Idyllwild Town Crier's responsibility to cover the Crest Forest Fire Department (CFFD). According to articles in the Mountain News, the CFFD board will ask their community to vote for a paramedic tax as part of the solution to their financial problems. If



In addition, on their own initiative or in response to questions posed by the public, a member of a legislative body or its

staff may ask a question for clarification, make a brief announcement, or make a brief report on his or her own activities. Furthermore, a member of a legislative body, or the body itself, subject to rules or procedures of the legislative body, may provide a reference to staff or other resources for factual information, request staff to report back to the body at a subsequent meeting concerning any matter, or take action to direct staff to place a matter of business on a future agenda.'

No matter how worthwhile the questions commission's action or discussion to any item may be, someone else might want to hear the answers, too.

> One solution is to ask the commission to put the subject on a future agenda. Then everyone who is interested can decide to attend or to skip the meeting.

Homes evolve, too ...

One of the charms of living here on the Hill is the welcome absence of typical Southern California tract housing. As soon as I settled here and began walking about the neighborhoods, I was struck by the endless variety of our residences. Just try to find any two exactly alike!



That shouldn't be surprising, given the challenge of fitting a house to a site in our valley's extraordinarily variable terrain. But I also quickly noticed how often new owners remodel their acquisitions. Repeated overhauls have given many local homes and cabins fascinating histories. I'll describe two examples with which I'm most familiar.

It took nearly 15 years for me to unravel the evolution of the cabin in the forest ten miles from Idyllwild. Yet it had served my family for 75 years before its demolition at age 122.

Originally an unplumbed one-room cube with a stove chimney, built in 1878 to house a sawmill foreman, it grew at the hands of successive homesteaders and vacationers to three rooms, plus kitchen with hot and cold water, pantry, bathroom, and — my favorite feature — a sleeping deck under the trees.

Adele and I got the "build-your-dream-house" urge out of our systems early in our marriage, and for the past 30 years we've instead appropriated 25- to 70-year-old homes, modifying them to suit our needs and taste.

The Idyllwild land, where we now live, has seen such owners as a "black sheep" of the Bissell carpet sweeper family and a chairman of U.S. Steel.

Our house, originally a mansard-roofed, dark chocolate-brown box trimmed with adobe brick, contained a roomy two-bedroom apartment atop a couple of garages, built in 1972 as servants' quarters for a maid and chauffeur. A trail of railroad-tie steps still leads over a rise and down a steep hill to the mansion house next door, where a footbridge passes directly to its second-story master bedroom. This was designed to facilitate delivery of the owner's breakfast in bed.

As time passed, our house accommodated caretakers of the 3.5-acre estate, who converted the garages to a spacious family room and tiny master bedroom and bath. A two-story remodel added an airy dining space to the kitchen upstairs.

In 1994, the estate was subdivided and the servants' quarters sold to a couple who brought artistic, musical, and woodworking skills to its further evolution. Downstairs, the large family room became an artist's studio; the bedroom was split into a laundry room and a rehearsal studio carpeted to the ceiling; and a woodshop was added in the rear. A deck outside the kitchen became a screen porch. Accents of local manzanita and pine appeared throughout the house.

We at the council are looking for a fire safe future that endures. In more popular terms, we seek a sustainable future, one that involves successful community action that can easily continue for generations, providing both fire safety and a healthy forest. We think this is possible.



funding is driven by fires. When we go years without a big fire in Southern California, fire falls off most people's radar. Consequently, elected officials consider it a low funding priority.

Perhaps our biggest problem is how fire prevention

Besides, regular fuel reduction and regular exercise share two similarities — both are very effective and very boring.

Without fuels work, vegetation builds and is followed eventually by drought, and followed inevitably by catastrophic fire. Everyone is alarmed, money is allocated, fuels work is done, and the memories fade and the cycle repeats.

How do we get out of this cycle? Public education is one way — the more people in high fire areas know about fire and what they can do to prevent it, the better. I hope that someday everyone in the mountains will know as much about fire as they do about the dangers of smoking. We also need good memories. We must not forget past fires, nor what caused them.

An aware and active public is essential, no matter what other policies we are likely to develop. But an additional way we can go is to set up a self-financing system that continually reduces the fire threat and is outside the government funding cycle.

Part of our success at the council has been our ability to get large grants to help homeowners abate their properties. As you would expect in these times, funds are shrinking. This year we will receive a third of what we received last year in our main grant.

It's nothing personal to us, it's just the way things are going for the federal budget as a whole. Forest Service fuels funds are also dramatically reduced. What if the community here could self-fund all the work that is needed to stay fire safe?

A solution may lie in using what we now consider forest waste to produce valuable energy. This is sometimes referred to as cogeneration, but is more aptly called biomass utilization. All our excess biomass — needles, leaves, dead shrubs and trees — has potential energy content.

Over the years people have talked about using it locally but the economics and technology just didn't work. Now we think they might. The economics improve every time there is an increase in the price of oil, driving up the cost of electricity and transportation. On the technology side, See Fire, page 22



Court order stops health care worker strike

On Monday, Jan. 30, a Riverside County Superior Court judge issued a temporary restraining order (TRO) prohibiting 248 nurses and other essential health care workers, members of Service Employees International Union (SEIU) Local 721, from joining a scheduled one-day strike on Tuesday, Jan. 31. A spokesperson at the union office in Riverside said on Monday only these workers are enjoined from striking, not 911 dispatchers or other SEIU county employees. The union representative said the health care workers had been served with the

called the one-day strike to protest the board of supervisor's action imposing mandatory contract terms and conditions, including a requirement that union members pay three percent of their pension costs this fiscal year, an additional three next year and two percent more in fiscal 2013-14. The county determined that talks with the union had reached an impasse following a November union vote to authorize actions including a strike.

Jeff Stone, in Idyllwild on Friday, said that the county SEIU represents 5,800 had filed a complaint with county workers. The union the California Public Employment Relations Board seeking a TRO to prohibit 274 workers from joining the strike because they were essential to maintaining the safety and welfare of the public. Included in the 274 were registered nurses, lab scientists and surgical scrub technicians employed at Riverside County Regional Medical Center and other county facilities. The judge, in his order, enjoined 248, allowing some scrub techs and others to join the strike if they wished. Other em-



> Stone said he found it "puzzling" that nurses, who had recently been given step raises to bring them to pay parity, would seek to strike. He acknowledged that county nurses had previously been paid "under market" but that the county had made a decision and investment to correct that. Stone said the side contract with the nurses would bring them to full parity within two years. "They were thrilled," he said of the negotiations conducted last year.

"There's a \$20 million hole in the budget and for the first time the county will have to face making significant layoffs," Stone said, expressing frustration with SEIU's failure to negotiate further given current emergent financial conditions facing the county. "The unions know that in good very generous," he said.

Spokespersons for SEIU stated that this one-day strike of county employees, the first in over 20 years, may not be the last action the union takes and that more work stoppages are possible unless the county returns to negotiation

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Fuel plant may be in the Hill's future

On the Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council's list of 2012 goals and objectives is the construction of a biomass fuel facility that would enable the Hill to use its waste wood for energy.

While the completion of this project is overly ambitious in the next 12 months, Michael Esnard, FSC President, believes its investigation and research is a very important component of the council's mission to protect the Hill from catastrophic fire.

"I've seen some small scale stuff," Esnard said. "A feasibility study this year is the first step. Good numbers will tell whether it's feasible or if the economics don't work."

One of the FSC's first steps was to visit the Colmac Energy plant in Mecca, Calif., just south of Indio. Six directors and Executive Director Edwina Scott toured the facility on Jan. 18. Several directors are researching the issue and options for a biomass plant appropriately sized for the Hill and the process for selling the electricity.

Biomass energy is the use of forest products — trees, brush and slash — and waste wood products — pallets and construction waste — burned to produce steam to turn turbines to produce electricity. If the wood waste

were not burned, it would likely be shipped to landfills or burned in the open, such as on farms.

The Colmac Energy facility produces about 47 megawatts of electricity annually. All of its electricity is sold to Southern California Edison for distribution. About 12 percent of total electrical production is retained to operate the plant.

"I would be happy producing enough energy for [Idyllwild School] instead of shipping the wood off the Hill," Scott said. "Let's use it."

The plant in Mecca has been operating since 1992 and burns about 325,000 tons to generate that much energy. Last year, Greenleaf Power of Sacramento purchased the facility from its original owners. Greenleaf has two other California biomass-fueled plants, a 30-megawatt plant in Wendel and a 28-megawatt plant in Scotia.

While this plant cost \$150 million to build, the potential Idyllwild facility would be much smaller. Esnard and Scott have identified several state and federal sources of grant money to encourage biomass utilization.

Idyllwild, Big Bear and Lake Arrowhead provide biomass for only about 15 percent of the plant's fuel. The rest is construction waste from other Southern

California localities, according to Danny Skelton, the plant's senior shift supervisor.

Colmac has its own truck fleet to fetch and bring wood to the plant. Skelton said they can use whole logs or chips. Nearly 95 percent of the wood is converted to energy. The remainder is wood ash, collected and disposed, and used even for road construction.

"These plants are extremely expensive to oper-


ate and very labor intensive," Skelton told the FSC team. "Fuel is actually the largest operating expense. It's waste. They [the waste owners] would have to pay to get rid of it but we'd have to buy it."

Skelton proudly shared that Colmac Energy has yet to receive an air quality violation in its 20 years of operation.

Although Hawkins said the implementation schedule was flexible, he told the board that 15 of the county's 39 fire stations do not have this staffing profile.


Voting with Stone were Board President John Tavaglione and Supervisor Marion Ashley, who provided the necessary majority for the policy's approval.

Speaking against the idea was Barry Talbot, Canyon Lake City Council member. He requested that the board defer its decision until a comprehensive study of the structure of the fire department could be completed.

"Fire protection seems to be outdated. It's the system, not the people," Talbot argued. "Arbitrary requirements should not be established. They cannot be justified in terms of service and safety to firefighters."

"Promulgation of the permanent regulations is still three to four months in the future," Gentry said. The public can still provide the board with comments on how the grant program should be implemented.

For example, Gentry said he has heard arguments for funding good plans and also for funding projects on the ground

for fuel reduction. Comments may be submitted via email to board.public. comments@fire.ca.gov.

In fiscal year 2012-13 the governor proposes to use fee collections for a variety of fire prevention and suppression purposes. For example, nearly \$6.6 million is allocated to the Board of Equalization to collect the fees. The two largest allocations — more than \$28 million each — are for fire prevention and emergency fire suppression. In total, nearly \$76.3 million is allocated to CAL FIRE's 2012-13 budget.

"Fire protection work includes both suppression and prevention," said Upinterwoven."

CAL FIRE engine crews devote time to teaching fire prevention, fire dangers and protection to school children. The use of the crew and engine is assigned to fires," she stated. a "Fire Control" account, Upton explained. Fuel and brush reduction are other activities that qualify as fire prevention, she added. "The resource management [account] is for fuel reduction and qualifies as prevention."

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

receipt check for \$119,000. IFPD still owes the county \$38,000 from the fall revenue advance, but Sherman believes the current balance (about \$380,000) augmented with ambulance and mutual aid revenue will cover the District's expenses through July.

'We should make it easily to July 1, which is when the longest period of no revenue begins," Sherman said. "We should have enough cash flow to July, but not a lot past July." He warned the board that another advance immediately after the new fiscal year begins may be necessary until the whole budget and finance situation can be fixed.

He did identify several

projects that could eventually improve IFPD's cash flow over the next few months. But getting a completed 2010-11 audit is a necessary first step. Commissioner Jerry Buchanan has been working with Rogers, Anderson, Malody and Scott, the San Bernardino accounting firm, to get the audit finished as quickly as possible.

Meanwhile Sherman has contacted several organizations, such as Kansas State Bank, which has the loan on the two engines, and the Department of Agriculture about the possibility of refinancing three loans into one. He is thinking of combing the vehicle loans with the medical equipment

"Its possible we could reduce the annual loan payments from \$84,000 to \$45,000," he told the com-

mission. Depending upon the new interest rate, total costs may also be less or not significantly more, he added. The photocopier contract, the emergency medical services contract for Pine Cove and the dispatch contract with Riverside County are all being reviewed. If potential savings exist, Sherman and the commission will try to renegotiate these contracts, although the ambulance contract with the county expires this June.

Sherman also said he would be reducing the hours of Administrative Assistant Rhonda Andrewson to contribute to the overall savings and demonstrate that everybody is part of the solution.

He and Buchanan are working hard to find a replacement for current bookkeeper, Leigh Humphrey,

who began as a volunteer, and wants to leave. Sherman is hoping to find the help to create a single set of financial records, "Currently I have three different books and am trying to squeeze the right numbers out of them," he lamented. Buchanan said that Humphrey now receives about \$3,000 monthly.

In the near future, the Commission's ad hoc negotiation subcommittee will begin meeting with the Idyllwild Career Firefighters' Association. Sherman reported that the committee had just sent the Association a letter requesting the meet-

The commissioners agreed to acquire a set of general special district policies to review for application and implementation to the Idyllwild District.

"I've looked at the exist-

ing policies and many are 14 to 16 years old," said Commissioner Jerry Buchanan. "Some have new resolutions, but the policy remains unchanged. Our policies don't have the new legal requirements, such as posting the agenda on our website.

The policy package will cost about \$325 and has already been reviewed by legal experts, Buchanan added.

The public comment period ended about 7 p.m., an hour after the meeting started. Several speakers expressed their desire to engage the commission com.

in a question and answer forum, or as one said "give and take." But State law, the Brown Act, which is California's Open government legislation, limits board responses to public questions.

Some of the public comments questioned the commission's real commitment to saving the district. For example, rejecting former Chief Norm Walker's recommendation to eliminate paid call firefighters was a potential savings the commission ignored.

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

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Ice rink being dismantled

The Idyllwild Community Recreation Council (ICRC) stated in an undated announcement (see ICRC ad on page 3) that there would be no Idyllwild ice rink this season. While the rink operators seem to be in the process of dismantling the rink infrastructure, the site is unsecured with some potential hazards left unpro-

Gary Steven, a private operator whom ICRC had approved to open a rink on the Idyllwild Community Center property, began dismantling his never-opened rink during the week of Jan. 23. By Monday afternoon Jan. 30, work was left still undone and the site remained unsecured.

Not fenced and open to anyone were two sealed drums of red dved diesel fuel #2 marked on the drum lids as "moderate" fire hazards. ICRC director Emily White said they would be removed Wednesday. On Monday,

Steven operated a rink, Ice Gardens, in La Quinta prior to 2009. He relocated for the 2009-2010 season to Steven, who could not Big Bear Lake. Both opera-

McKernan, director of marketing and public relations for the Big Bear Lake Resort Association, reported to the Town Crier that Steven's season at Big Bear was not completely successful. His hours of operation were "more off than on for the winter," McKernan said. He also said Steven had difficulty keeping the ice frozen at the rink site and had to close his operation several months early.

ICRC was contacted by phone by Steven, saying he wanted to open a rink in Idyllwild, according to ICRC Vice President Dawn Sonnier.

Sonnier reported that ICRC is currently owed substantially more than the \$150 that was reported at their last board meeting for water and electricity used by Steven's operation. Since that meeting, ICRC has received its January utility bills. White reported that Steven had agreed to pay the bill within the next several weeks.

Idyllwild with its very educated population, this library would be a "very essential piece of infrastructure."

Project Manager Brown said she does not anticipate anything that would significantly delay the projected Labor Day opening.


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
