Stone assembles top officials for public safety meeting

Few attend; crime surge continues

In response to recent crime escalation in Idyllwild, 3rd District Supervisor Jeff Stone assembled top public safety agency officials to talk to Idyllwild residents about issues of crime and public safety on the Hill.

Looking out over the small crowd, Stone began by saying, "I have assembled a lot of people to talk to you about their areas of expertise in regard to public safety. We did not bring first line staff. We thought it important to have the actual decision makers that work with the Board of Supervisors to talk with you.

"I know that you're very concerned about events that have been happening up here on the Hill and you have every

right to be concerned. Unfortunately, our economy has not been turning around as quickly as we would like and as a result there has been an uptick in local

crime," he said.

Stone discussed how the economic downturn has forced the county to make difficult

Permit OK'd

Pine Cove Market
now sells beer and wine

The Riverside County Board of Supervisors voted to approve a Planning Commission recommendation for a conditional use permit for the "Market Place at Pine Cove," owned and operated by Shane Stewart. With the approval, the market is now authorized to sell beer and wine. Stewart noted the permit process began in July. "Now all permitting with the county [for the Pine Cove facility] is completed," he said.

On March 13, the board approved a nearly 3,300-square-foot commercial center (the market), of which a convenience store with the sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption comprises about one-third of the area. About a quarter will be an operator's residence. Also approved were a gasoline service station with office space, a video arcade and hobby shop with storage area, a laundry facility, two 500-gallon, above-ground propane tanks and a recycling collection facility for aluminum cans, glass and bottles. Ten parking spaces were permitted as part of the approved conditional use.

Six years in jail, trial may begin this week

In March 2006, Chris Duve, 31, formerly of Lake Elsinore and Angela Shaver, 46, of Meadowbrook were arrested on suspicion of the murder of Paul Cline, then 60 and a resident of Old Cary Road in Anza.

Jury selection, for separate trials for both suspects, is likely to begin this week.

Meanwhile, Judge Kelly L. Hansen is considering Duve's defense attorney Stephen Sweigart's pre-trial motions regarding Duve's initial Miranda rights and suppression of statements made between Duve and Shaver.

Investigators from the Riverside County Sheriff's Hemet Station responded to reports of a theft at the Cline residence. They served a search warrant at the residence on evening of March 21, 2006.

During a search, evidence supported the search warrant for theft and indicated that Cline had been the victim of a murder. Cline's body was found during a nightlong homicide team investigation of his home and a nearby hillside north of Bautista Road in Anza.

According to the Central Homicide Unit, Duve and Shaver were "friends or acquaintances" of Cline.

Chamber signs Town Hall Lease

On Monday, April 9, according to Idyllwild Chamber of Commerce Director Lanny Hardy, chamber directors signed a lease with the Riverside County Economic Development Agency for use of Town Hall. The rental terms are similar to those under which ICRC had previously operated County Service Area 36 recreation, with the addition of insurance and liability provisions requested by Riverside County counsel.

"There were several items that needed to be worked out, including some questions about insurance coverages — who was responsible for what and how the premiums would be handled, etc.," said Hardy explaining the Chamber's delay in signing a lease. "Plus, there were a couple of new directors, myself included, that hadn't had the opportunity to meet and talk with Bill [Brown, CSA operations manager]. We've done that now and I think it went very well and we're looking forward to a productive working relationship with improved communication." Since taking

over the Idyllwild recreation contract on Aug. 1, 2011, the Economic Development Agency has been operating the recreation program without a signed Town Hall lease.

With the lease signed, according to Brown, the county can now make capital investments in the Town Hall property it had not been able to do without a signed lease.

Although Brown noted he had not yet received the signed lease, he is prepared to work with local staff on improving the site. "I have assigned GeGe Beagle [Idyllwild recreation manager] to work with the chamber and Rotary to get approval before the county removes the existing playground from Town Hall. [County inspectors had closed the playground for reasons of cited safety and code violations.] A new playground will not be built with county funds until the lease is signed and we have worked out other aspects of how building improvements are valued."

The video arcade is a possible future component, according to Stewart. There are no current plans to open a video arcade, although the potential use is already permitted. "All entitlements are there," he said.

The coin-operated laundry facility, in the existing A-frame structure, will open at the end of the month, Stewart said.

According to County Planner Christian Hinojosa, county-required modifications included reducing the number of trash enclosure bins from two to one and

approving a roof-mounted sign for 10 rather than two years. The county attached an additional condition prohibiting a pay phone on the property, to discourage loitering and additional noise at the site, said Hinojosa. Approved hours of operation are from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. Sunday through Thursday, and from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. on Friday and Saturday.

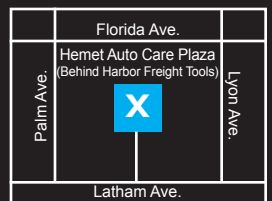
"We've definitely seen an increase in sales [since approval of the permit and authorization to sell beer and wine]," said market Manager Michael Berryman.

While we watch the "Voice", silence continues ...



About 45 citizens or residents attended Supervisor Stone's Public Safety Summit last night.

In my opinion, it wasn't a great turnout. He and his staff put a lot of effort into developing the agenda and getting county officials to come to Idyllwild.

You can read Marshall's story, beginning on page 1, for details on who represented each agency. On page 11, the names and phone numbers to contact them are provided in a convenient clip-out box.

Since there were significantly less people than at the March 24 session with Capt. Scot Collins of the Riverside County Sheriff's Department, I initially thought this confirmed the long standing problem of getting locals to attend weekday evening meetings, such as the water districts or fire district.

But Grace quickly pointed out that Collins' Saturday meeting was a conflict for the town's businesses. They were open and busy that day. But most businesses, except for the restaurants and grocery stores, were

closed Monday evening.

But I again extend my thanks to the many Pine Cove residents who did take the trouble to drive all the way here. At least one-third of the audience was composed of "Cove" residents.

If my disappointment annoys you, I suggest you flip back to page 2 and read the most recent "News of record."

Collins, who returned for Stone's summit, said, the "crime surge is continuing here. It went to about five reports every month, now about four every two weeks."

He quickly stressed that these were property crimes, not crimes of violence.

He also stressed that in a community this small, he believes someone must have some ideas about who the perpetrators are.

Stone and Collins are committed to keeping Idyllwild safe; what are you doing to help your neighbors?

County Fire Chief John Hawkins said that the county's number one fear is an earthquake. Therefore, you might want to attend Mountain Disaster Preparedness's earthquake drill Saturday morning. For more information see page 11.

Further thoughts on IFPD's contract

EDITOR:

Janis Van Zanten's letter fascinated me. I appreciate when the authors of letters to the editor do their research and can comment intelligently. I am amazed by the ones that act like gophers and pop up on the rare occasion with no information to back up their fabrications.

As a former member of the County Service Area 38 [Advisory Committee], she should know better. After she resigned, I never saw her at another meeting or an IFPD meeting. She has the popular misunderstanding that the \$94,000 Pine Cove CSA 38 contract with IFPD is for ambulance and EMT service.

It is and it isn't.

It's for transportation with fast response time. CAL FIRE provides the EMT.

With the unilateral dropping of the ambulance service contract, IFPD is throwing away the much needed \$94,000 enhanced response time money from Pine Cove. With mutual aid, this may mean that either IFPD or AMR will respond, charging the standard transportation fees they charge everyone but not the \$94,000.

Pine Cove residents voted in a tax to pay for enhanced response, much like the tax Idyllwild residents chose to defeat the last election. Who supports the ambulance service of IFPD more? Those who choose to tax themselves to provide finances or those who don't?

Since another ambulance company will have to serve Zones 2 and 3, why would we need IFPD at all?

Each month CAL FIRE has to bail them out with paramedic service as well as fire assistance. We need a well-organized, Hill-wide ambulance service not this higglety-pigglety plan that is at the whim of folks who want something for nothing and others who can't realize that throwing away money won't balance the budget.

The complaining that Ms. Van Zanten mentions has been residents pointing out to IFPD that if you don't provide the staff, only one ambulance can be used, and the contract calls for two fully staffed ambulances on duty. This falls on deaf ears.

Pine Cove residents who attend IFPD meetings keep trying to get them to understand that both sides need to honor contracts. Pine Cove comes up with money but IFPD doesn't come up with the staff.

I also wonder at her statement, "Get over yourselves and get back to negotiations." I take this to mean, "I want this, so YOU do it." If a person wants something to happen that individual needs to get involved.

She used to be involved and it would be nice for her to return to public service.

RENATE'S THOUGHTS

Are schools a part of an educational culture of compliance or empowerment? ...

A friend recently lamented about what is happening in her district. Despite some exciting work we had done with them during the summer, almost all of the enthusiasm had faded as teachers were once again caught up in what she called a "culture of compliance."

Most of our work with schools is focused on encouraging teachers to think through their decisions and actions. This inevitably means that they have to work together in what we call Process Learning Circles where teachers and administrators explore the multiple ways that students learn.

Within the circles, teachers are encouraged to reflect on their own beliefs and actions; thus they engage in some powerful thinking and questioning using top quality research. They are then asked to reflect on how well their current teaching expresses the research and their own beliefs and what they plan to do differently upon returning to their students.

We ask them to make a commitment to doing something differently, document their actions and student results and sharing some artifacts when they meet again in two weeks.

Learning circles tries to create a culture where each individual, including students, are empowered to think and act in ways that enhance learning. Initiative is part of the motivation.

A culture of compliance is fueled with direction from outside.

Answers to these questions will reveal the extent of a culture of compliance. Ask teachers how much of what they teach comes from a source other than their own investigation and professional decision making. How much "top down" supervision is controlling what they do? Do they need a teacher's guide in order to feel prepared?

Over the past 11 years, we have been supporting a program in South Australia that began with a \$3 million grant. Schools could join the program voluntarily if they were willing to heed some self-organizing principles (work together and learn).

Many schools qualified to join this program called "Learning to Learn" because they could demonstrate the ability to work together in an effort to empower themselves and their students. It turned out to be a successful program that was ultimately picked up by more than 200 schools and ended up influencing the curriculum guide for the State Department of Education of South Australia.

We soon discovered that the teachers in South Australia had much more freedom and responsibility for how their schools are organized and what it meant to teach. They do not have the culture of compliance that now so clearly describes the majority of public schools and districts in the U.S. In an effort to raise test scores, the approach to education is much more "top down" and controlled.

In Australia, for example, we found teachers who insisted on a high level of respect for their professional

SITTING BY THE FIRE

Prepare and be prepared ...

It is never too early to prepare. Even though we are just now seeing the end of winter, it is time to start thinking about preparations for potential wildland fires and other disasters.

Prior to this winter, we have had three years with either normal or above normal moisture. The winter of 2010-11 was well-above normal. Those normal or wet years have given most people a sense of false security because of the subsequent relatively inactive fire seasons.

Now it is time to come back down to earth. This year the lack of winter snowfall and overall moisture levels will set the mountains up for another potentially devastating fire season.

Along with the return of extreme fire behavior, many of the government agencies charged with protecting the mountains from wildfire are facing severe budget cuts. The federal government (USFS); state agencies (CAL FIRE); county (RCFD); and local agencies are seeing funds that support firefighting efforts reduced. If there ever was a year to encourage individuals to step up and prepare, it appears this would be the year.

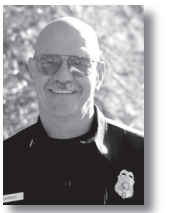
In the March "Homes and Land" publication, we talked about "Look up, Look down, Look all around." It is a simple way to make sure you are doing the responsible thing for yourselves and the community by making your property fire safe before fire season. In the last "Sitting by the fire," I discussed the status of the Idyllwild Fire Protection District. Now it's time to talk about your personal preparedness.

There are two major areas of personal preparedness. First, are you prepared to evacuate if there is a large wildland fire threatening our communities?

If you have never been evacuated in front of a large wildfire, you have really missed an experience, not necessarily a good one. Being prepared makes the experience a lot more pleasant.

In 2007, I responded to the Grass Valley Fire in the San Bernardino Mountains about 6 a.m. By noon I called my wife and said, "Get the dog and get out!" Eight days

Fern Valley Water changes retiree benefits

In a special meeting last week, a quorum of three Fern Valley Water District directors unanimously voted to change retiree health benefit policy.

At the March 28 special meeting, directors adopted a new vesting requirement. Resolution 525 requires employees have 10 total years of paying into the California Public Employee

Retirement System, CalPERS, before they are eligible to receive health benefits after retirement from district employment. Five years of service, and associated CalPERS payments, must have been completed while employed entirely with the district. The policy becomes effective on May 1.

Prior to adoption of this policy, the district was exposed to situations in which it became responsible for paying the employer con-

tribution amount, even if an employee only worked briefly for the district and otherwise met retirement eligibility criteria (at least 50 years of age, five years of CalPERS retirement service credit, and had retired within 120 days from separation of employment).

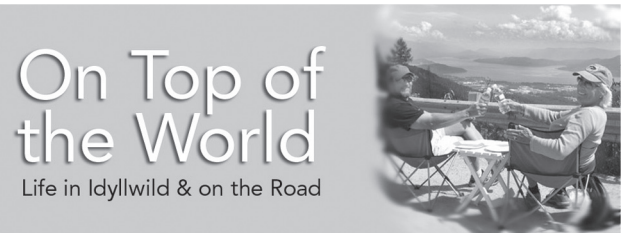
With adoption, the district is only responsible if the retiree has worked five years for the district, logging the five years of CalPERS payments, and has

another eligible five years of payments from a previous employer.

By adopting this resolution, the district complies with applicable California Government Code. Voting in favor of the resolution were Directors Charlie Wix, Trischa Clark and James Rees. Directors Robert Krieger and Diana Johnson were absent.

County honors Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit

The all-volunteer Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit received the Riverside County Sheriff's Department "Volunteer of the Year" award last week. At a Wednesday, April 4, ceremony in Riverside with about 500 people attending, Riverside County Sheriff Stan Sniff presented RMRU with the honor. Sniff presented awards in 17 categories to department personnel, volunteers and ordinary citizens for courageous and exemplary service to the sheriff's department, the county and its residents.

RMRU is one of the longest serving volunteer search and rescue units in the country, organized in 1961. It is also one of the most nationally recognized and honored. Membership is from throughout the county, but Hill residents have been important cornerstone participants for most of RMRU's existence.

Attending the April 4

ceremony, and just off a very challenging April 1 mountain rescue, was one of RMRU's newest members, Idyllwild local and six-month RMRU member Helene Lohr. At the same table was Pete Carlson, the longest continuously serving RMRU veteran, active for the last 42 years. Past president and 17-year RMRU veteran Lee Arnson sat nearby. Arnson was also on the difficult April 1 rescue of a young hiker stranded on Tahquitz, with Lohr and Pete Carlson's son Will.

For each honoree, ceremony moderators read a summation of the actions and service for which the award was presented. As individual stories of heroism and exemplary conduct were being read, the recipients, singly or in teams, came to the dais. There Sheriff Sniff congratulated them while fellow deputies, elected officials, and family members and friends gave the honorees well-earned applause.

New RMRU volunteer Lohr said of receiving the

honor, "It's amazing. Being up on stage [receiving the award] with so many team members, you're basically standing next to legends." Lohr has already completed six missions with RMRU. "I've not met before such a group of people I trust and know that they'll always have my back."

Of receiving the award Arnson said, "It's an honor. There are many volunteers out there doing the best they

Jones has money for November

Republican Assemblyman Brian Jones, Santee resident, currently represents California’s 77th Assembly District. He is one of three candidates running for the new 71st Assembly District, which includes Idyllwild and its surrounding communities.

Patrick Hurley and John McLaughlin are the other two candidates.

Jones is the only one of the three to have already filed financial reports with the California Secretary of State’s office yet. Since January, he has received slightly more than \$22,000 in contributions. These have

come from individuals, businesses and associations.

Since January 2011, Jones has banked nearly \$135,000 in contributions. Indian tribes have provided \$23,500 or nearly 20 percent of his funding. Political action committees, most from Sacramento, have provided \$39,500, or 35 percent.

He has also received \$17,000 from outside California.

Since January, Jones has expended \$30,600 and has \$53,000 in cash, which includes the \$20,000 in contributions since the middle of March.

McLaughlin has filed a financial report with the Riverside County Registrar

Fire commission works on policies

Operating procedures and policies were the topic of last week’s fire commission special meeting and workshop. Commissioner Jerry Buchanan and Interim Fire Chief Mike Sherman presented draft policies, which Buchanan had received from the California Special District Association.

“Purchasing Policy” was the first policy, which the commission reviewed. In all,

the commission went over 16 policies during the two and half-hour session. Sherman planned to make the amendments that came out of the workshop session and bring the revised policies to the commission for approval at its April 10 meeting.

“I’m not aware of any purchasing policy, who approves and when and how it’s approved,” Buchanan said. “It must be authorized within the budget.”

An approved purchasing policy would have likely

avoided the situation the district encountered over the eventual purchase of the Zoll heart monitors in 2010, according to Buchanan.

Examples of other policies reviewed during the workshop include responsibilities for the commission’s officers — president, vice president and secretary — commission ethics, standing committees and expense reimbursements.

A new policy establishes five standing committees — finance, ordinances, per-

sonnel, planning and public relations. However the discussion at the workshop lead to agreement that citizens could be members of the committees. To which Buchanan said, “That’s democracy.”

Chief Mike Sherman shared that in his experiences at other departments he has known many individuals willing to volunteer some time, such as serving on a committee, but who were unable to contribute the amount of time that a commissioner serves.

At its Jan. 24 meeting, the commission had approved purchase of generic policies from the California Special District Association. For each policy they have reviewed, Buchanan and Chief Sherman revised the generic version to apply it specifically to IFPD and the commission.

After IFPD finishes adopting all the policies which the commission deems necessary, Buchanan encouraged his colleagues or future colleagues to review the policies every few years because of changes to state or federal laws or in case a policy is not working properly.

cuts that have affected sheriff patrols and response times in the unincorporated areas, including the Hill. He noted that before the downturn the county had \$800 million annually in discretionary funds to use to enhance public safety. "We have \$525 million today and the assessor [Riverside County Assessor Larry Ward] has told us that we are looking at another 1.5 percent decline in assessed [property] values this year."

First to speak after Stone's introductions was Riverside County Sheriff's Department Hemet Station Commander Capt. Scot Collins.

Collins noted that the surge in property crime in the Idyllwild area has not abated.

"We're still in that surge," he said. Collins said he would mount operations to let the likely local criminals know that the Sheriff's Department is a continuing presence and that it will arrest law-breakers.

"You will see some presence on the Hill. We'll have some different ways for the bad guys to know that we know where they are and that we will put our foot on their necks," he said.

Both Collins and Stone said that if more volunteers sign up for the Mountain Community Patrol that they would secure more cars. "We depend on the number of volunteers," Collins said. "We still have some crooks in town and we need to police our own."

"I'll work with the sheriff to get more cars and radios if we get more volunteers," Stone said. An MCP volun-

teer said that they would soon begin daytime residential patrols.

Riverside County Fire Chief John Hawkins assured residents that his department is well positioned to respond to emergencies and that regardless of the disposition of the Idyllwild Fire Department contract for Pine Cove ambulance service, there would be no interruption of service to that community. Both Hawkins and American Medical Response General Manager Tom McEntee assured attending Pine Cove residents that contingency plans are in place and there would be no interruption of ambulance service anywhere on the Hill.

Other speakers included interim Idyllwild Fire Protection District Chief Mike Sherman who discussed budget and policy revisions that have put his department on a sounder footing; California Highway Patrol Captain Gregory Peck who assured attendees that his department would again mount unannounced motorcycle stings; and Riverside County Code Enforcement Director Glen

Baude who talked about how to report violations and who to talk to in his department.

Riverside County Probation Department Chief Alan Crogan spoke about how inmate realignment from state prisons to county jail is affecting the county. He explained how it has resulted in more inmates being held for longer periods in local

jails and how the inmate overcrowding problem has been moved from state to county, as have the expenses for increased maintenance and parole supervision. He also talked about programs that are in place to reduce recidivism.

Attendee Anna Marie Padula commented that meager attendance — fewer than 50 — at the forum

was "embarrassing." "This was an important meeting," she said.

Nevertheless attendees such as Reba Coulter, Idyllwild, thought the information was very helpful. "It wasn't just phone numbers, but names of people. I'm glad I came," she said.

According to former Chamber of Commerce President Mimi Lamp, it took her husband Don only a day after receiving an inheritance to decide he wanted to go around the world. Highlights of the first half of their journey include Don's seven-day climb of Africa's Mt. Kilimanjaro, northern Greece and its islands; the welcoming attitudes of the locals and Don's interviewing "all taxi drivers," everywhere they went about local political, social and economic conditions.

The photographic image of the man standing in bright orange robes with a shoulder tattoo, sandals and shaved head holding a cigarette is not your average monk.

This photo is among many photographs taken by photographer Anne Kresl and her daughter Alexandra Keller of colorful monks in orange hues, children in school uniforms, a pink-swaddled baby cradled lovingly, animals and breathtaking landscapes of sunsets set against timeless temples displayed at Café Aroma this past Sunday.

"We wanted to become involved because we loved the country of Cambodia so much," said Keller, who is a junior at Idyllwild Arts Academy. "We stopped for

a few days and fell in love."

The dozens of images captured by the mother and daughter team were celebrated during the opening reception for the April and May fundraiser and exhibition. All of the money collected for the photos (ranging in price from \$50 to \$175) and donations will go directly to the Cambodian Children's Fund, Kresl said.

The Harkness family of Idyllwild purchased a photo of an elephant for their daughter Heather, who is a sophomore at Idyllwild Arts Academy.

"My daughter fell in love with it and wanted it," her mother Sharon said. "The color is gorgeous."

Art Connor, of Idyllwild said he adored one of Kresl's nature photos. "The green with the rainbow is synchronicous," Connor said. "I think I'll be coming back

for that one."

Young Zora Schoner, 13, who is home-schooled in Idyllwild, said she was taken by the photo of the baby in the woman's arms.

"The children have really broad expressions. I find them beautiful. I really love the one of the baby," Schoner said.

The CCF is a nonprofit organization that provides education, nourishment and healthcare to children from Cambodia's poorest communities.

"They are not orphans," Kresl said. "They are the poorest of the poor families."

This project started six years ago, when Kresl and her daughter Keller took a trip a world away visiting China and stopping for few days in Cambodia. The gorgeous landscapes, smiling

decision-making. Students were encouraged to formulate their own questions and do their own investigations as independent learners.

We often find that teachers in the U.S. will use similar words or descriptors such as “encourage students to be independent learners” but except for some Gifted And Talented E programs, the reality is very different when they are observed in action.

In the words of one of the schools we describe in our most recent book, Natural Learning for a Connected World: Education, Technology, and the Human Brain:

“Students are working on their personal learning. At

the end of the term there is to be an Open Night and Exhibition. Guided by clear and negotiated criteria for success, students know what they are doing, are clear about expectations, and have made clear choices around the learning that they are engaged in.”

Another school we refer to is a group of charter schools in Southern California called “High Tech High” (not to be confused with packaged programs that have copied the name). The most important thing about these schools is that compliance is not a word they would ever use. The culture that supports their work is one of creativity and empowerment.

later when my wife, daughter and granddaughter returned, they related the experience to me.

At that time we did not have any pre-positioned materials and supplies. Since then, we pre-position medicines, water, dog food, legal documents that we might need, clothes, phone lists, and money. I am now a proud owner of a fire safe for very important stuff that I wouldn't want to lose but can't take on short notice.

We have put some thought into whom we would call, where we would go if we couldn't make a call, and what to do if we were separated at the time. Finally, we carry a minimum

amount of supplies and clothes in our car just in case we are caught off the hill when an evacuation occurs.

The second area of personal preparedness is survival “in place” without any services in case of a major disaster such as an earthquake. It used to be the norm to have everyone prepared to live without help for 72 hours during a major disaster. Most professionals now have increased that number to 120 hours (5 days).

The mountains are special in how easily we can become isolated from others for long periods of time. When I was the Fire Chief in Crestline, we started talking about being prepared to be on our own for up to two weeks. More on that next time.

Until next time, its time to put out the dog and douse the fire.

people and rich ancient history with temples and the dramatic needs of the poor families fascinated professional photographer Kresl and her daughter who was then about 10 years old.

“The spirit and humbleness of the people ... and the opportunity to take my daughter to see people who have beautiful spirits even though they have so little,” Kresl said.

Kresl and Keller, who moved to Idyllwild two years ago from Los Angeles, have returned to Cambodia a total of five times and have both become huge supporters and advocates for the cause of helping the CCF.

Kresl and her daughter sponsor a child in the program and they kept in touch with the two Cambodian girls for the past five years. The name of the young girl Keller sponsors is Reaksmei, who is also 17 years old. Her mother sponsors Srey Nuch, a 13-year-old, Keller said.

“It's a personal connection. We know these girls personally and we email and correspond,” Keller said.

The two became passionately involved with the country. It is a small country of about 14 million people located in the southern portion of the Indochina Peninsula in Southeast Asia. Cambodia is bordered by Thailand to the northwest, Laos to the northeast and Vietnam to the east.

Thousands of young children survive on less than a

dollar a day as they pick through the trash heaps from sunrise to sunset to find trinkets to sell so they can eat, Kresl said.

“Your money goes a long ways in Cambodia. You can make a big difference with

\$100,” she said. “You can change someone's life.”

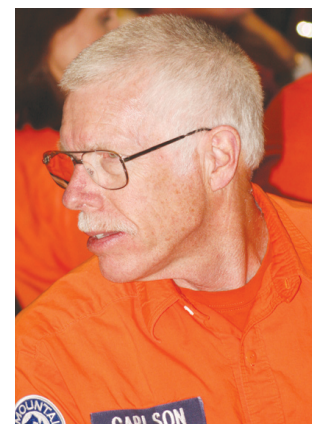
In closing remarks, Sniff acknowledged the outstanding contributions volun-

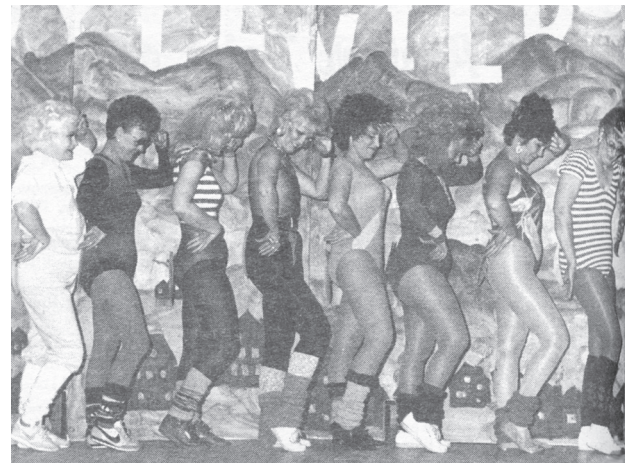

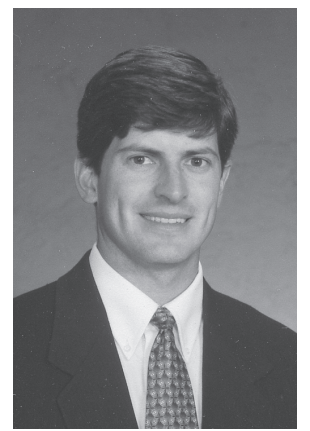

of Voters declaring \$1,900 in contributions through March 17. Steve Dohrman, who gave \$1,000, is his largest contributor. McLaughlin and his family have provided another \$800.

More than 86 percent has already been expended on his filing fee and candidate statement.

As of last month, McLaughlin had about \$250 available for the primary campaign.

Hurley, the third candidate has not reported any financial data yet.

Following the 2010 census, the state's redistricting created Assembly District 71, whose northern apex is Poppet Flats. Its shape is triangular and runs south to the Mexican border.

The primary election is June 5 and the two candidates receiving the most votes will be on the November General Election ballot, regardless of party affiliation.
