

# May Valley trails have Forest Service future

ncreased sediment flow identified in the old roadbeds locally called Coyote Run, Herkey Creek Climb, and Upper and Lower Exfoliator has prompted Forest Service officials to issue a temporary closure to these areas and the surrounding areas (200 feet from either side of centerline) to public use.

The closure is effective May 7 and will not prevent the 2012 Spring Challenge, a local bike race, from being held this year. However, race organizers did have to modify several race routes

# 2nd-annual Firefighter's Muster

The second-annual Firefighter's Muster, presented by the Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council, is a larger event this year, with more participants, events and information than last year. # Food assistance demand grows

ary Busher, local coordinator for the Second Harvest Food Bank distribution, said he is doing the best he can to cope with a decrease in food and an increase in commodity applicants. "Where once we got 8 to 10 pallets, now we're getting 4,"

he said. "And the problem is that more and more people have less and less."

Busher said that in the month of September 2009 his volunteers distributed 175 food boxes or enough to feed about 350 people. Last month, his group distributed 300 boxes to more than 500 recipients. "We can't take any more applicants,"

# House burns on Tollgate

Another structure fire occurred in Idyllwild Sunday afternoon. Around 5:30 p.m. April 21, a fire was reported in a house in the 53300 block of Tollgate Road. Before 6 p.m., the Toll Fire was under control, but the 1,200 square-foot structure and its contents were totally destroved.

The single story, singlefamily dwelling unit was fully involved when firefighters arrived. The fire's noise alerted the couple visiting in the home for the weekend. They both got out without injury, although the loss to the home and contents was estimated at \$100,000.

Idyllwild Fire Capt. Alan Lott, the incident commander, said no injuries were observed and the fire was contained and extinguished in less than hour. The size of the house made the fire easier to extinguish. Lott said some support vehicles were canceled before arrival because of the rapidity in extinguishing the blaze.

About 40 firefighters were on the scene including the Idyllwild ladder truck and brush engine and volunteer company.

Engines from County Fire stations 23 and 53 were also on scene.

Right below one of the campsites was a perfect view of Lake Hemet with Marion Mountain directly behind.


Right then and there it was decided that we would return Although the drive was nice and offered great views, for an over-nighter when Sue comes back to Idyllwild in early June.

# IFPD, county meet over ambulance service

Following a March 20 letter telling Riverside County that it wanted to terminate its contract to provide ambulance service to Zones 2 (Pine Cove) and 3 (areas north of Pine Cove and south of Idyllwild), areas outside of the IFPD district, Idyllwild Fire officials met with representatives of the county's Emergency Medical Services Agency last week.

Another meeting will take place this week, according to Brian MacGavin, assistant director for Riverside County's

There will be further discussion concerning Idyllwild's finances. Although Idyllwild has raised its transportation and medical service costs in each of the past two years, MacGavin thought that Idyllwild still might be lower than some comparable departments.

Idyllwild Fire officials responded with the following statement from Interim Fire Chief Mike Sherman, "On April 18, 2012 REMSA and

a County Counsel representative met with the IFPD Interim Fire Chief, the IFPD Board's Ad Hoc committee members [President Jeannine Charles-Stigall and vice president Dr. Charles "Chip" Schelly], and the IFPD legal counsel over the Zone II and III contract extension amendment as presented to IFPD by REMSA. The meeting was very positive and IFPD and REMSA agreed to continue to meet and negotiate a mutually agreeable amendment to extend the Zone II and III contract for ambulance transport ser-

According to County Service Area 38 Advisory Chair Jerry Holldber, no one from its negotiating subcommittee was invited, although CSA 38 pays nearly \$95,000 for Idyllwild's service.

"It is time for other mountain communities, not just Pine Cove, to move on and research and study the available options," Holldber said when asked about the meeting. He reaffirmed the committee's letter to the Board of Supervisor (see page 7).

# Appeals court rejects new trial for jury tampering

A panel of state court appellate judges overturned a Riverside Superior Court decision to grant a new trial to Christopher V. Hillman, who was convicted of seven counts of attempting to influence the jury during the Raymond Oyler arson murder trial the previous year.

Hillman is Oyler's brother-in-law.

Within a month of Hillman's conviction in July 2010, trial Judge Larrie Brainard had concerns about the adequacy of Hillman's defense.

On Wednesday, a threejudge panel overturned Judge Brainard's decision to grant Hillman a new trial. No new sentencing hearing has been scheduled yet, in case Hillman appeals this decision.

"[Hillman] did not carry his burden of proving incompetency of retained counsel that prejudiced him such that reversal of his conviction was appropriate," the panel reluctantly concluded.

In response to the appellate decision, John Hall, senior public information specialist for the Riverside County District Attorney's Office, said, "A jury found defendant Hillman guilty beyond a reasonable doubt was not a sufficient basis

for the court to grant a new trial and the state court of appeals agrees with our office about that."

Throughout their opinion, the panel discussed several points or opportunities where Hillman's counsel might have performed better, but ultimately they recognized that it was his decision not to testify at his trial and afterward he never complained about his retained attorney's performance.

Further, the panel's opinion noted that Hillman's appointed attorney for the appeal never relied on Judge Brainard' basis for concluding that the original attorney did not adequately represent him.

At the August 2010 sentencing hearing following Hillman's conviction, Judge Brainard stated Hillman should have a new counsel to investigate whether a new trial motion should be brought. The judge questioned Hillman's defense during the trial and stated that a new trial may be in his best interest.

During the fall of 2010, several sentencing hearings were postponed. Then at a Dec. 6 hearing, Judge Brainard decided the defendant was not appropriately represented and was not sure if justice was done on this case.

# Judge dismisses jury in Shaver trial

The trials of Chris D. Duve and Angela May Shaver for the murder of Paul Cline took significantly different paths last week. Shaver's jury was dismissed because of misconduct.

Both trials, with separate juries, began Thursday, April 19. After a recess following the opening statements, the two trials quickly assumed separate identities.

Judge Kelly Hansen announced the court had received an anonymous phone call alleging misconduct. Hansen separately interviewed five of the Shaver jurors. After a defense motion for mistrial, Hansen decided to declare a mistrial on his own motion.

there is no way to salvage this jury."

In 2006, investigators from the Riverside County Sheriff's Hemet Station responded to reports of a theft at the Cline residence. They served a search warrant at the residence on evening of March 21, 2006.

Selection of a new jury for Shaver's trial resumed Tuesday, April 24. Duve's jury was told to return to court Monday, April 30, so that the simultaneous trials might resume.

During a search, evidence supported the search warrant for theft and indicated that Cline had been the victim of murder. Cline's body was found during a nightlong Homicide Team investigation of his home and a nearby hillside north of Bautista Road in Anza.

# **CPUC** approves SCE smart meter opt-out

As expected, on Thursday, April 19, the California Public Utilities Commission approved a smart meter opt-out provision for customers of both Southern California Edison, which services Idvllwild, as well as for customers of the San Diego Gas & Electric Company. The approval mirrors one given earlier to Pacific Gas & Electric and provides an avenue for customers desiring to have an existing smart meter removed and have it replaced by an analog meter.

SCE, at CPUC's request, had considered opt-out alternatives for its customers who currently have smart meters as well as ones that have not yet received them. But in its March 2012 filing with the CPUC, SCE sug-

gested only one alternative was economically feasible for the company — to utilize a "noncommunicating radio-off meter option" for customers who already have SCE-installed smart meters, by turning off the radio wave transmission feature and mandating a monthly meter read at the site by an employee of SCE. This proposal by SCE would have provided no option for those who either wanted to retain their existing analog meters or to have smart meters removed and an analog meter reinstalled. SCE had justified its one-approachonly proposal using CPUC wording that any opt-out proposal submitted should be "technically feasible, offered at reasonable cost to customers, and not impede the state's goals to deploy a Smart Grid."

#### **Community** garden democracy

EDITOR:

On the Hill, there are already several community gardens. In small portions of Idyllwild, residents having banded together with common purpose to grow "organic" food for the benefit of those who plant and nurture these gardens.

A "government" garden, paid for by community tax money, must make itself available to the wishes of the informed community. An effort to inform the community is ongoing.

Keep your eyes peeled and locate one of the already going organic group gardens. Start learning, contribute your energy to healthy, wholesome produce, not prepoisoned, technologically inferior, quick spoiling produce.

Issues such as genetically modified seeds from Monsanto (monsatan), pesticides and chemical fertilizers are not wanted nor needed in the gardens already tended and growing.

The serious gardeners all have raised seedlings indoors that they are now planting outside to begin the season, all without any deleterious chemicals, pesticides or fertilizers. Only healthy chicken, horse, llama poop, etc.

I speak for all organic gardeners, we want nothing to do with gene modified seeds or plants, chemicals, pesticides, etc., that the government garden might consider using. We want any such chemical compound far away from our organic garden efforts.

It might take a meeting

or two at Town Hall to get our priorities straight.

Organic gardening gives rise to strong healthy insect resistant produce. Chemically fortified gardens are dependent on input of seeds modified with "round up" herbicide inside them. If a person knows what companies like Cargill and Monsanto are doing, they will choose not to eat this type of prepoisoned food.

I think the plans for the government garden include 11 separate "plots" within the same compound. If each grower is independent, with some using genetically modified seeds, some using chemicals and some not, it will turn into a kind of well-meaning bureaucratic mess.

Benign bees do not distinguish between genetically modified and normal pollan. So proximity to nonorganic gardens can pollute our organic gardens.

#### **Re: Further** fabrications

I really don't have that good of an imagination to fabricate all the stuff I wrote about. I got it from the president of County Service Area 38, a CSA 38 board member, and the CSA 38 secretary, the information disseminated at CSA 38 meetings and IFPD meetings, and a member of the CSA-IFPD negotiation

"Unilateral" was indeed the word used. Since the author of the April 18 letter doesn't attend the CSA 38 meetings, he can't be responsible for the information provided there.

After the Town Crier came out, I spoke with the CSA 38 contract negotiator and we both had a good laugh. The "Fabrications" were all his.

Nowhere in the CSA 38 contract with IFPD was 1 percent" mentioned; therefore, all subsequent numbers are wrong.

The point raised in his letter: "IFPD cannot give away free service to Zone III when they are charging for services in Zone II" missed

the mark.

No one gets "free service." IFPD always charges fees for transport. Zone III has never paid a cent for standby service. This has been a point of contention since this very confusing service plan came into being in 1996.

I've heard it brought up at every CSA 38 meeting since I started going in 2002. Zone II chose to tax themselves to provide "enhanced service" in 2003.

A recent example of CAL FIRE helping out occurred April 17. CAL FIRE Firefighters from Station 23 in Pine Cove were checking the pressure to the fire hydrants on Fern Valley Road, following the terrible fire on Howland, to which they also responded on April 11. (No fabrication )

We have Mutual Aid agreements between all emergency services but checking another Fire Protection District's fire plugs seems a bit beyond. What else does CAL FIRE need to do?

Ambulance service has been at best confusing and disjointed since 1996 when the current and soon to be gone plan was devised.

I hope that with the help from CAL FIRE and the County of Riverside, the problems faced by the Mountain Communities can be addressed. The "band aids" we have been applying have proved inadequate given IFPD's financial prob-

The greater community needs a better organized provider to bring in quality services. We are rather isolated here in the Mountain Communities and cooperation needs to be one of our greatest efforts.

I hope that in the future, cooperation, rather than contention, will prevail.

# State approves Idyllwild Water's recycled water plan

In a March 22 letter to the Idyllwild Water District, the California Water Resource Control Board granted its approval of the 'Idyllwild Recycled Water Project Facilities Report." This is the first step in the district's quest for funding for a recycled water facil-

The letter also included suggestions for additional information, which IWD should submit with its funding request. These would include a list of existing and future recycled water users and a draft mandatory use ordinance or agreements for use of recycled water.

Eventually, the district will have to grapple with the question of whether future new water users might be required to use recycled water for irrigation or toilets.

This approval does authorize the district to begin receiving reimbursement for a previously-approved \$75,000 planning grant.

Other portions of the project are also moving forwarding, according to General Manager Terry Lyons. Tom Dodson and As-

sociates, hired in March to complete the environmental analyses, is working quickly and should have completed analyses within two months.

In other district business, the board approved negotiating a new propane contract with Ballard Gas. Lyons will complete the negotiations this month.

The board is reviewing employee health benefit packages. They are comparing current costs with alternative sources. But the review is more comprehensive than just health benefits. District holidays will also be addressed in the process.

Lyons told the board that there is no clear historical record that supports approval for the current 17 district holidays. The board, at President Allan Morphett's initiative, recommended tabling this specific issue and incorporating it into the overall benefit review.

We looking at all aspects of benefits packages, but aren't in a position for a definite decision now," Morphett said. "We want to be as transparent as possible."

Director John Cook readily agreed with Morphett. See IWD, next page

# Water pressure problematic in fire response

At the Fern Valley Water District board meeting, General Manager Steve Erler noted that decreased water pressure cited by some firefighters responding to the Howland fire may have been the result of an older 4-inch line feeding Howland.

"Firefighters took water from the hydrants at the dead end at the top of Howland and from the hydrant in front of the Stewart home," said Erler. Erler noted there was a newer 8-inch line at Cougar nearer Fern Valley Road that could also have also been used to supplement fire suppression. "All our water is gravity fed," said Erler, noting that he did not know if firefighters also used the Cougar hydrant.

Director Robert Krieger observed that a 4-inch line has about 1/4 the capacity of an 8-inch line. Erler said the district would make certain Idyllwild Fire Protection District has an updated map of lines and hydrants but also noted that the district does not color code hydrants for pressure. "We're looking into that," he said. Erler also noted that about 150,000 to 175,000 gallons of water were used to suppress the Howland fire.

In other business, the district granted an easement between the district and contiguous landowners Gary and Susan Weber. The easement for a sewer line requires the Webers and future owners to maintain the easement and restricts their ability to construct any structure that would interfere with that easement.

The board also heard from Wally Franz, vice president of Albert A Webb and Associates, about its proposal for a Fern Valley Road Pipeline Improvement Project including the provision of environmental consulting services in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act. The project, which would replace existing lines, extends from Rim Rock Road to the south side of Tahquitz Creek with extensions up Howland and Encino Roads in an anticipated first segment and continues across Tahquitz Creek up to the tank farm in a second segment. Once approved by the board, possibly at its next meeting, the environmental study could begin this year and the full project could be completed by 2014.

The board also voted to nominate Jo Mackenzie, a member of the Vista Irriga-

tion District, for election to the California Special District Association.

The board heard from Office Manager Jessica Priefer that because of CalPERS rules and the board's recent vote to change employee contributions, a new hire to

replace a retiring employee might have to be delayed from May until July 1. Board member Trischa Clark recommended hiring someone on a training or temporary basis in the interim. Erler said he would begin to See FVWD, next page

The CPUC did not buy SCE's argument and instead directed it, as it had previously directed PG&E, to provide both options. Under the initial program approved by the commission, SCE customers who want to be rid of their smart meters will pay a fee of \$75 for the removal, and a monthly surcharge of \$10. Lower income customers will pay \$10 to have the meters removed and a monthly surcharge of \$5. Customers must qualify and be registered as part of the California Alternate Rates for Energy (CARE) program. CPUC stated that this initial directive would be reviewed once actual costs of compliance (removing smart meters and reinstalling analog meters) are submitted by the two affected utilities.

Ken Devore, director of SCE's SmartConnect program, stated that when actual compliance costs are submitted by SCE and reviewed by the CPUC, that those costs would likely be incorporated into customer bills. Devore said that the projected cost to install the grid, not considering the opt-out compliance costs, is an estimated \$1.6 billion that is already showing up as a 1.6 percent increase in customer electrical rates, but is not indicated as a

separate line item on customers bills. # Steele sizzles in San Antonio

Brendan Steele made a positive breakthrough last week, finishing in a tie for fourth in the Valero Texas Open in San Antonio. He carded a five-under-par 73-74-69-67 for a total score of 283.

TPC San Antonio must fit his game well since his two highest finishes in official PGA Tour events have come on that course. Last year's win there earned him

more than \$1.1 million and this year's tie for fourth was worth a \$244,125, in official prize money.

The native Idyllwilder's performance last week broke what was for him an unprecedented three straight tournaments in which he missed cuts. After Sunday's round, Steele said, "It was nice to have a good week. It had been a while."

Both Steele's driving distance and driving accuracy were excellent during last week's tournament; he placed tied for 13th and 10th in those categories among all competitors.


On Sunday, he combined good driving with fine iron play. His approach shots landed within 28 feet, on average, from the pin — better than the only three players who finished above him in the tournament.

On the par-4 15th hole Sunday, Steele's drive found the large fairway bunker on the right. But he launched a long approach shot from the sand

that finished three feet from the pin. He sank the put for a birdie three.

Steele turned his putting around this week, posting a positive strokesgained-putting statistic.

Steele has now earned more than \$570,000 in this his sophomore season on the PGA Tour, placing him 61st on this year's official money list. He currently stands 78th in FedEx Cup points this season. He will sit this week out in preparation for the remainder of the PGA Tour season.



Not only his accomplishments with local tribes, but also his personality have impressed his colleagues and friends throughout southern California. Holly Owens knows McCarthy from their mutual work at the Malki Museum on the Morongo Reservation in Banning.

"I don't remember the first time I met Daniel Mc-Carthy, but it was when I had first moved up here full-time and we discussed and visited pictographs," she said. "I was struck then, as I am still today, by his incredible wealth of knowledge, but his humility and tirelessly to earn the trust of many tribal elders and community members and his research and writings have helped revitalize traditions such as harvesting agave and other native plant uses and his knowledge of rock art is extensive."

But McCarthy's archaeology did not focus exclusively on the tedious excavation of sites. He wanted to learn from the living and look back. So he eventually became acquainted with local tribal elders and learned about plants — both food and medicinal uses.

Last week, McCarthy, also a member of the Malki Museum board, led the 17th annual agave harvest and roast. He taught people how to gather the plant and then roast it in a pit.

His first agave harvest was in 1974 and he become much more efficient and a much better cook. "It's not as easy as you might think," he warned. "The traditional recipe is very general, such as cook over fire." Details such as temperature and length, which are common in modern cookbooks, are left to the practitioner. "You have to adjust," he said. "I had a lot of trial and error."

McCarthy is also the vice president of Nex'wetem, the Southern California Indian Basketweavers.



he said. Distribution occurs on the first Tuesday of every month at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints on Tollgate Road. "Cars lined up on Tollgate now stretch all the way back to Idyllwild Arts," Busher said.

Non-seniors must sign up for the United States Department of Agriculture Commodities program and meet income qualifications, Busher said. Seniors do not have to demonstrate income qualification.

The decline in available food is also apparent at the Friday food distribution conducted by Chapel in the Pines in Mountain Center, coordinator Larry Kribs

said.

Second Harvest also partly supplies the Chapel program. All other donations come from local food retailers.

'We're seeing quantity and variety being reduced, with a lot more bakery goods and less produce and protein," Kribs said. "We're at the mercy of the stores [grocery retailers that donate food products to food banks]."

The poor economy is the reason for the decline in supplies, according to Second Harvest Riverside Executive Director Darryl Brock. "The supply of food available through the USDA Commodities Program has dropped off nationwide," he explained. "Where once we received 16 truckloads per month [to be distributed throughout western

www.lovethehill.com

Riverside and San Bernardino counties], we are now down to five." He said the economic downturn has increased demand nationwide at the same time the federal government has had to adjust its budgets and its price support for farmers. The price support system for commodity distribution has been lessened.

"Also, the commodities program additionally subsidizes hospitals, school lunches and prisons as well as average citizens in need," Brock said. "There is just not enough now."

He said that decline in federal assistance is coupled with a decline in what food retailers normally donate. "Food retailers are only stocking what they think they can sell and as a result they have much less to donate to food banks," Brock said. "The volume and variety are not as available as they once were and I don't know what the future holds."

Brock stressed that neither Second Harvest nor its Idyllwild distribution centers can provide more food if pipeline sources begin to dry. "If it's not donated, we don't have it available for distribution. We don't purchase food. Everything we distribute is donated from food retailers or through the now declining federal program.

"This decline in supplies

and greater demand are caused by many factors. It's particularly apparent in the Inland Empire with its very high unemployment rate and between 700 and 800 thousand people living at or below the poverty line," Brock said.

As a result, both Idyllwild

food distribution programs face challenges, although their volunteers remain committed. "I'm doing the best I can to make sure everyone has something," Busher

boundary with the Herkey Creek campground.

Rosenthal promised during the future analyses, the Forest Service plans public meetings with local stakeholders, Rosenthal promised. "I'm optimistic about the future," she said in reference of the possibility of creating partnerships with local groups for volunteer help. "This is one of the highest priorities for the [San Bernardino National] Forest," she added, although the forest has had the nonmotorized trail evaluation on its schedule of planned action for years.

"The first step is to bring some of the trails into the system," Rosenthal said. "The Forest's comprehensive management plan is a high prior-

Wagner was skeptical of the charge that excessive sediment was flowing out of the lake.

He agreed that Lake Hemet more likely functions as a sediment pond. The District's recent analysis of Lake Hemet's current volume lost nearly 5 percent compared to its original capacity, according to Wagner.

The enormity of the erosion was discovered a year ago, Taylor said. For the 2011 Spring Challenge, the Forest Service permit required some course modification to include more temporary bridge crossings and avoidance of active water areas.

This brings the problem General Manager Thomas under the authority of the

federal Clean Water Act. Taylor explained that the Forest Service has water management protocols and best management practices to address and repair the situation.

The Forest Service, with the aid of a small, \$5,000, transportation grant, will begin repair and restoration of the Herkey Creek Climb in September.

Other trails sections which are under study include Coyote Run and the Upper and Lower Exfoliator. The closure extends 200 feet from either indicates that the lake has side of the trail centerline. A total of 2.7 miles is affected, Rosenthal said, who confirmed that the agency would still patrol the areas to ensure use has stopped until they are reopened.

Based on the new en-

vironmental analyses, the trails, which meet Forest Service standards, will be officially added to the district's trail inventory. Some, which do not qualify, will be restored to natural conditions and abandoned.

The May Valley area contains a number of old, unclassified roadbeds established by ranchers prior to the Forest Service's acquisition. The recreation use on these old road beds contributes to the sedimentation of Herkey Creek by loosening the surface soil. Herkey Creek is an intermittent stream and tributary in the watershed contributing to Lake Hemet, Canvon Lake and Lake Elsinore.

# On the road: A San Diego getaway

When an opportunity for a weekend getaway presented itself, my daughter Dakota and I put together our wish list. She wanted to spend time in a city, away from life in her small college town. I, inspired by reports of impending snow coming toward our mountain village, voted for something outdoorsy, with a slightly tropical feel.

New York and Honolulu were not in the budget but, as soon as we opened a map, we realized we could have it all. We packed our bags and headed for the multifaceted city of San Diego.

#### Where to stay:

For our dose of civilization, we opted to stay downtown. We chose the Westin, with its "Heavenly Beds" (www.westin-hotelsathome. com/faq-bed.aspx) and bigcity feel but San Diego has lots of other good options:

- For a more intimate hotel experience, try the Sofia. It has a cozy, European ambiance and a convenient, downtown location.
- For a touch of the tropics, try Humphreys Half Moon Inn and Suites. This resort-style hotel is located

on Shelter Island, which some call San Diego's Hawaiian isle. Located on the water's edge, with lush gardens and a private marina, this hotel provides the perfect perch to watch the city light up each night.

• If you're in the mood for luxury, check out the Paradise Point Resort and Spa on Mission Bay. This resort is actually its

own private island, with Balinese, bungalow-style rooms veiled in gardens of lush tropical foliage and winding lagoons.

#### Downtown fun:

On Friday night, San Diego's Gaslamp Quarter looks like a scaled down version of Mardi Gras. Loud music and the sounds of happy people spill from what seems like every type of club — from salsa bar to rooftop lounge. If the club scene isn't for you, check out the Ghirardelli Soda Fountain and Chocolate Shop, where Dakota and I shared a huge chocolate malt and chatted with other tourists.

By day, the Gaslamp transforms into a prime shopping



location with more than 70 retail stores that offer everything from bikes and travel supplies to clothing and jewelry. A few blocks away, Seaport Village offers a more relaxed shopping and dining experience. Browse through ocean-themed art at

the Wyland Galleries, enjoy dinner overlooking the San Diego Bay or grab coffee and dessert at the Upstart Crow Coffeehouse and Bookstore.

In San Diego, there is no shortage of things to do and it's easy to try to cram too much into each day. For our **Dakota** at the Butterfly Jungle during the day at the San Diego Zoo Safari

#### Travel Tip:


Start your day at the zoo with a bus tour and see more than two-thirds of the zoo in a fraction of the time. Then, set out on foot to explore on your own.

please most everyone. Bring good walking shoes because most of the main attractions should be enjoyed on foot. You can walk "through" a glass-walled shark habitat, watch Beluga whales from above water and below, and pet dolphins in their pool.

#### Travel tip:

Choice seats at the stadium shows, like Shamu's "One Ocean" and "Sea Lions Live," fill up early, so allow extra time between attractions.

#### Highlight:

One-on-one encounters with the animals, such as feeding times, can be unforgettable but beware of that large dolphin you're standing close to when it appears to be waving at you with its tail. These guys are trained to send

an inch-thick sheet of water over the nearest expensive camera. It's enough to send you running for the park's pricey walk-in, full-body dryers. (Lesson learned.)

#### San Diego Zoo Safari Park:

It's off the trodden path, in the San Pasqual Valley, about 30 miles north of San Diego. But the San Diego Zoo Safari Park (formerly Wild Animal Park) was one of the highlights of our trip. It's run by San Diego Zoo Global, an organization that specializes in breeding, conservation and reintroduction of the world's endangered species, operates the park. In the past 95 years, this group has reintroduced 33 species back into the wild.

Included with the price of



admission is the park's Africa Tram Safari, which showcases the animals in a natural environment. From the tram, you can see giraffes, gazelles, antelope and two of only six remaining northern white rhinoceri in the world.

For an additional charge, the park offers a variety of special "Safaris," including a Cart Safari in a small vehicle, a Rolling Safari on Segways and the Flightline Safari, which is the nation's longest zipline. To satisfy my craving for an outdoor experience, we decision but that's when I making its way around "Af-

chose the Flightline Safari.

To prepare you for the 2/3-mile trip, the park staff gives you an orientation and a short, fledgling run, which shows you what to expect and,

more importantly, how to land. Then, carrying your cable trolley and harness, you're transported by truck to the top of a mountain, where you climb out onto a launching deck with holes that allow you to peer down to the ground below. (Piece of advice, don't.)

Standing on the ledge, watching the guide toss our metal trolleys over the cable and fasten the metal buttons on our harnesses, was not the best time to rethink my

realized that I had not even asked Dakota if this was something she wanted to do. I had simply bought the tickets and signed up for a time slot, assuming it would be a fun experience.

#### What goes around comes around

**EDITOR:** 

In the Town Crier's April 19 edition, an article titled 'May Valley Closure" caught my eye. It described "old road beds" which were used for hiking, horseback and mountain biking as being now closed.

It said these "old unclassified trails" in the May Valley area are now being closed to all, due to erosion because of "excessive recreational use." The Forest Services' Laurie Rosenthal [Idyllwild District Ranger], disclosed some of the names of closed areas to include Coyote Run, Hurkey Creek Climb and Upper and Lower Exfoliator.

If you look on a U.S. Geological Survey map these names are not present, rather they were named by thousands of mountain bikers whose overuse has resulted in the closure of this area. That means

it's also closed to hikers and horses. In the article, the Town Crier appears to dodge the issue at hand, never mentioning the word "bicycle."

These and other bike trails, the Forest Service acquiesced to, have proven that overuse is abuse. Be it foot traffic, horse or cattle overgrazing.

On March 18, 2010, I wrote of my concerns of over use of the bicycles in the May Valley area with trails becoming flumes of erosion by bicycle use. All over May Valley, old trails are being pruned or flat out created with whose authorization?

In the 2010 Town Crier edition, an avid bike enthusiast commented, "Bicvcles have little impact on the trails." The Forest Service took its time to realize the contrary.

Erosion is rampant in the whole area. Now, after the big race in May, the Herkey Creek area, due to erosion, will be closed to all trail users hikers, bicyclists and horses. Also, keep in mind, the Forest Service proclaimed that those, whether hikers, birdwatchers, horse people or cyclists, that go into these closed areas, can be subject to citation and possible fine. Great.

This is not an "us" versus 'them" issue. It's a matter of proper care of our National Forest, This includes precious watersheds and overuse protection, regardless of community economic gains from the thousands who come to mountain bike. Yet the big May race is being allowed once again with a "conditional use permit."

I have nothing against bikers. But as the Forest Service has now mandated, I think staying on designated mountain roads and trails, i.e., South Ridge Road, May Valley Road, Thomas Mountain Road, and

Since September 2011, we estimate approximately 15,000 disposable water bottles have been elminated. Knowing how important it is for our students and staff to stay well hydrated, we provided eco-friendly Idyllwild Arts Academy canteens to every student and faculty member at the start of the year, in preparation for our an annual all-school hike.

Duing this year, we have been extraordinarily fortunate to have had a chance to work with Evan Mills, an expert in energy conservation. Mills was a member of the Nobel Prizewinning team of scientists who advised Al Gore in the wide range of administrative climate change initiatives featured in the acclaimed documentary, "An Inconvenient Truth." Mills has helped us identify areas of our operation where we can make significant conservation improvements, in part by providing analysis of past utility consumption data we have gathered for future planning.

Our water conservation plan has a goal of reducing consumption 10 percent over the next five years. Our first year goal of 2 percent has been achieved, owing partly to the installation of low-flow shower heads and air-assisted flush technology for toilets, and a 50 percent reduction in irrigation. We have also made a concerted effort to raise awareness of water conservation, knowing it will take effort from the entire school community to effect real change.

We have established six sustainability subcommittees, each one focused on a different facet of our overall goal. The subcommittees are Buildings and Campus; Fuel and Energy; Curriculum and Education; Food; Recycling; and Marketing.

We have instituted a policy for all new public buildings on campus to seek LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certification. LEED certification process is underway in our design work for a new campus health center and concert hall. New faculty housing units slated for construction this summer will be Energy Star certified homes, and we will aim for a NetZero carbon footprint with the proposed new president's residence on campus.

These policy commitments to conserve energy and resources have resulted in several specific actions, besides the plastic bottle ban, at the school. Many of these will be discussed in the second part of this column next week.


