Idyllwild CinemaFest launches year four

The Idyllwild CinemaFest returns invigorated for its fourth year, with new features designed to seal its steady progress toward becoming a major U.S. showcase for independent filmmakers.

New venues, more films and film categories, expanded filmmaker submission processes, an upgraded

website featuring online audience film previews and voting (Viewers Choice) in addition to links to view past "Alumni" festival selections, and a bargain price all-festival pass for locals are some of the new and important additions for ICF 2013. The festival returns to a five-day format, Wednesday, Jan. 9 through Sunday, Jan. 13. And as an extra bonus, although the film is not in competition, ICF Director

Steve Savage brings his new film, "Vertical" for festival screening.

Savage credits ICF Chairman Phil Calderone with being the force responsible for enhancing the festival's prospects and helping it to achieve such a firm footing as it enters its fourth year. "Phil's stamp is firmly branded into the fiber of our festival," Savage said, "I never doubted that, with his

Infested oak taken down

Public needed to prevent oak borer spread

CALFIRE crews removed a 140-year-old California black oak (*Quercus kelloggii*), the first local casualty of the Goldspotted oak borer that has killed over 80,000 trees in San Diego County. The removal process, which closed Highway 243 in both directions just after 10 a.m. on Wednesday, Nov. 14, took about 45 minutes.

Prior to discovery of the tree, just across Highway 243 from the Italian restaurant La Bella Montagna, the northernmost reach of the highly destructive oak borer was thought to be northern San Diego County near Warner Springs, about 40 miles south of Idyllwild. Authorities believe the beetles, which share the same genetic characteristics as

those in San Diego, were transported in firewood. CALFIRE Division Chief Gregg Bratcher, new San Jacinto Mountains forester, and Dr. Tom Scott, natural resource specialist from the

Idyllwild Water moving to Stage 1

Voluntary reductions urged

Idyllwild Water District directors have determined it is time to declare a Water Conservation Stage 1. At its Nov. 14 meeting, the IWD board held a public hearing to discuss replacing the current "Water Shortage Emergency Plan" (ordinance 60) with a new ordinance and concurrently

to discuss the district's water supply situation.

Following the hearing, at which no one attended, the board unanimously adopted a new ordinance (No. 62), which essentially limits the board's decision to the water situation within the district rather than using data from Pine Cove Water District, which was part of Ordinance 60, adopted in

In circumstances similar to other recent commercial burglaries, including time of night and means of gaining entry, burglars hit two Idyllwild businesses in the early morning hours of Wednesday, Nov. 14.

A previous attempt by four hooded individuals took place at the Fairway Market in Strawberry Plaza around 4 a.m. Tuesday, Nov. 6.

This time, whether the same or different perpetrators, burglars used tools to break the glass of the market's front door, succeeding in gaining entry. Surveillance videos showed

they attempted to remove the store ATM. They were unsuccessful. They then grabbed T-shirts and other small items before hurriedly leaving the store.

Near the same time, burglars gained entry to Village Hardware through a back entry and took the store safe, tools and a large generator. Some of the tools taken may have been used at the Fairway Market break in, according to Village Hardware personnel.

Village Hardware manager Larry Donahoo later recovered his empty safe at the county grinding facility. Sheriff's deputies, who had taken an initial report, returned to alert Donahoo of the possible location of

his safe. With a lapse in residential burglaries, there has come an upswing in commercial burglaries. Riverside County Sheriff's Department Hemet Station is currently investigating surveillance videos and other leads. *Marshall Smith can be reached at marshall@towncrier.com.*

OUTSIDE IDYLLWILD

By the numbers ...

January 2013 will mark the beginning of my 37th year of living in Idyllwild.

The middle of the same month will also mark the beginning of my eighth year of writing the "Outside Idyllwild" column.

In that time I have seen and written about many things. I have written about 350 columns (two weeks off a year for good behavior) and churned out almost 200,000 words. I have written columns on trails, rock climbing, gear, birds, wildflowers, mammals, trees and all other manner of flora and fauna.

Around 2001, I got my first digital camera, a Hewlett-Packard 3.3 megapixel. With that equipment, I began trying to capture all the beautiful panoramas and small wonders that make up our mountain home.

A few years later, I purchased an 8 megapixel Canon point and shoot. Most of the pictures that have appeared in the Town Crier were taken with this camera. For the last year, I have been using two 12 megapixel DSLRs. Both were loaners and I learned a lot using them.

My two benefactors were Les Walker and Barry Zander. Their generosity allowed me to progress and to learn more about my hobby. I have now reached a milestone; I've taken 10,000 photographs.

In a conversation with a former photography student, she told me that her instructor said that it is only after you take your first 10,000 photos that you can begin to call yourself a photographer. With 10,000 shots behind me and a my new camera on the way, this is just the beginning of my "career" in photography.

Some of my more knowledgeable friends have warned me that landscape photography is one of the hardest and least financially rewarding genres; but I don't really care about those things. All I know is that I want to be outside

with a camera in hand, or in the case of my new camera on tripod, to catch the sunset on the lake or the clouds over it. And I want to do it every day.

So Tuesday, Nov. 20, marks the arrival of my new Canon EOS M 18 megapixels camera. This is Canon's first mirrorless camera. It is almost as small as a point and shoot but has interchangeable lenses. I look forward to sharing the results with my readers.

Bad News

Well so much for the good news. The bad news is finding the oak tree on Highway 243 infested with the goldspotted oak borer. I wrote a column about this pest last year and I was really hoping that we would be spared seeing this nightmare insect on the hill.

In my time on the Hill I have seen fires and evacuations, felt the earth tremble during the Lander's and Big Bear quakes and watched as the thousands of pine trees slowly

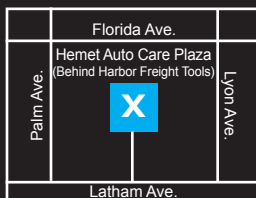

November 1999. This policy required a joint determination.

The new ordinance is effective in 10 days and gives General Manager Terry Lyons authority to implement the appropriate water conservation stage for IWD. During the public hearing, Lyons recommended a stage 1 declaration.

"For several months Foster Lake has been dropping between two and three feet," he told the board. "It's currently at 7.5 feet and I anticipate if the Lake level continues to

decline, with no rainfall or snow, the lake will be near empty by early February." On Monday, Nov. 19, Lyons said the lake's level declined further since the board meeting five days earlier.

The new ordinance has three criteria for assessing the need for a water emergency. One is whether the prior winter's rainfall was less than 20 inches. From September through April, Idyllwild reported 19.5 inches of rain. The second criterion is whether Foster Lake's surface level was below 18 feet level. While it was in May, Lyons reminded the board of its current level and that it's worsening. Finally, rather

than use PCWD's monitoring well, Lyons recommended use of Well no. 10, which is at Foster Lake.

"Its production is down 40 percent and it's one of our better wells there," he said.

Water Stage 1 imposes no mandatory compliance requirements. The district will ask customers to voluntarily reduce consumption.

In April 2011, IWD withdrew its previous water emergency state. For the previous four years, the district had been in either Stage 1 or 2.

IWD's customers used 7.6 million gallons of water in October, the greatest October

consumption in three years and the first increase this year since May. In the first ten months of 2012, total water consumption is 2.4 million gallons less than the same period in 2011 and 4.8 million gallons less than in 2010.

In conjunction with the water shortage emergency plan, the board also discussed how it would estimate water usage for new construction. Currently district fees are based on the number of water fixtures, e.g., sinks, faucets, and toilets. But Lyons recommended

Hemet High girls win CIF south

State volleyball tourney began Tuesday

The Hemet High School Girls Volleyball team is returning to the CIF tournament for the third consecutive year. This time they will face Cathedral Catholic High School from San Diego in a Division III first round match at 7 p.m., Tuesday, Nov. 20, at Cathedral Catholic.

The CIF Southern Section championship was secured Saturday, in a tight back and forth match in which the Lady Bulldogs came from behind and finally prevailed in the fifth and final game. They defeated Saddleback Valley Christian High School from San Juan Capistrano for the Division 4AA championship.

After winning the first game, Hemet lost the next two games, which were nerve-racking according to Hemet Principal Dr. Emily Shaw. The players recovered their dominating

style and won the match 3-2 (25-20, 15-25, 23-25, 25-22 and 15-10).

After the third game, Savannah Loutzenhiser, senior from Idyllwild, who had sat out the tournament until this game, said. "We knew we had to kick something into gear."

Savannah did not play in the team's three matches before the finals, although she did dress for the semi-finals against Loara High School, which Hemet won in three straight. In the Saddleback game, she played in games three and four.

"I just passed," she noted. On Tuesday night, Savannah plans to dress and be prepared for the first round of the state tournament. Then Wednesday, she has knee surgery scheduled.

Teammate Danika Hitchcock, a fellow Idyllwild resident and senior, said she was thinking, "We just had to fight pretty hard."

Once Hemet tied the games at two apiece, Hitchcock said the players were

confident heading into the final game. "Once we had won the fourth, we had energy to come out strong," she said.

This is Hemet's first 4AA championship. In 2010 and 2011, Hemet was the SS Division 4A champion.

In the CIF state championship round, 16 teams compete for the state championship — eight from the north and eight from the

south. In the Southern California bracket, Cathedral Catholic is seeded number one and Hemet is the eighth seed.

Nearly a year ago, Hemet's state tournament trip ended there. Cathedral Catholic swept Hemet 3-0. The game scores were 25-9, 25-18 and 25-14.

SPEAKING FOR THE ANIMALS

Animal Rescue History – Part II ...

In last month's column, Janice Fast brought us through the beginning of our community's animal rescue history up to the late 1980s. Some of us fondly like to imagine that the next chapter started when a flame-haired, leather-clad woman roared into town on her Harley-Davidson, her saddlebags stuffed with cats and dogs. But, according to Jane Stonehill, the woman on the motorcycle and also founder of Animal Rescue Friends, that's not exactly how it happened.

From Jane's first visit to the Hill in 1986, she knew this was where she wanted to live. But, it wasn't until 1990, after her husband passed away, that she moved from La Jolla to Idyllwild. Jane didn't know anyone here, so it was only her concern for animal welfare that nudged her out of a reclusive lifestyle.

She learned about a group of stray cats being fed at Elliot Pope Prep School (now Astrocamp). Using live traps to catch them, she had them altered, vaccinated and brought them back to the school.

Similar projects, as well as other like-minded folks, seemed to find their way to Jane. By November 1994, she was part of a loosely organized group of people who came together in the effort to rescue a lost Scottie that belonged to visitors, Patricia and David Lane. Spearheaded by volunteers Valerie and Art Canfil and George and Nancy Appel, the search involved two weeks of tracking the little dog, who had run away from his owners' car accident on Dead Man's Curve.

He was finally coaxed into a live trap and returned to his frantic humans. Jane identifies this event as the birth (or beginning) of ARF as an organization.

Understandably grateful, the Lanes gave a generous donation for another live trap to help in future rescue attempts. With this gift, the group became known first as the Animal Rescue Fund and then the Animal Rescue Foundation. However, since they thought of themselves as just a group of friends helping animals, they finally decided on Idyllwild Animal Rescue Friends.

By this time, Jane was receiving unsolicited donations to help her with animal care expenses that she was paying out of her own pocket. She opened her first bookstore, Stonehill, next to what is now Café Aroma, and had rescues available there for adoption. Residents and even visitors knew they could call on her for anything related to the well-being of animals.

In 1997, one such visitor, Tawny Crist, who later became a key ARF volunteer, met Jane for the first time at the bookstore. It was snowing as Tawny drove into town and spotted two dogs running along the highway. The bookstore seemed to be the only shop open, and when Tawny entered and asked for help, Jane didn't hesitate to say, "Let's go!" They found and rescued one of the dogs; Amazing Grace lived in Jane's care for the rest of her life. Only in Idyllwild!

Finally, in 2004, Andy Jacobson and Kent Steele waded through the massive 501(c)(3) documentation

SCIENCE & REALITY TODAY

How truly free are we? A scientific point of view ...

Before we start, let's play a quick game. Let's play "Think of someone you have met." Ready?

OK. Please close your eyes and think of anyone you have ever met.

Do you have someone in mind? Was it my elementary school friend, Raul? Probably not, but it was for me.

Even if it wasn't Raul, why did you focus on the person whom you thought of? None of us can truly account for the reason we chose the person who came to mind and why it wasn't someone else.

That, in a nutshell, is the conundrum with what we consider to be free will. We think that we are born with the conscious ability to choose something whether it be choosing to move one hand instead of the other, taking a shower in the morning instead of at night, or thinking of a person you have met.

This is not a mere matter of opinion, advanced fMRI studies [functional Magnetic Resonance Imaging dominate brain mapping research] conducted at some of the most prestigious medical schools in the country help put the free will debate to rest.

Imagine my shock when I volunteered for one of these studies at the University of California, San Diego Medical Center. After I was done, the grad student asked me, "Hector, how do you think you did on the test?"

I answered, "I think I did OK, I did not answer all of them, but I think I got most correct."

Then he proceeds to explain to me how he could tell seconds before I gave my answer which answer I was going to give. He even knew which ones I would not answer seconds before I "decided" not to answer.

I was like "No way! Who are you, Nostradamus?" All I got in response was a smile (so for all I know he could be Nostradamus).

As author and neuroscientist Sam Harris points out in his book "Free Will," "We believe we are the authors in every moment of our inner lives and what we do in the world, but now we know we are simply downstream of causes of which we are not conscious."

This deterministic notion of our existence, which rules a mere cause and effect process which started 13.7 billion years ago, seems depressing. Even Sigmund Freud, who gave a large role to the subconscious in managing our lives, left a little room for conscious decision-making.

So if Harris is correct, then should we still lock away criminals for their actions since they were never free to "choose" their actions?

Of course we should, as Harris points out. Society should still seek to protect itself from anything or anyone that does it harm, whether it be a hungry lion who escaped from local zoo or an ax-murderer.

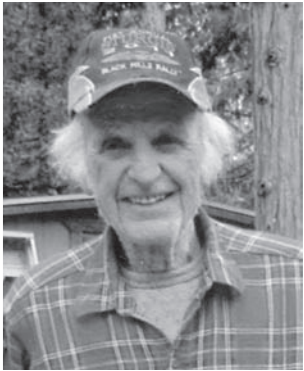

Obituary

Francis 'Frank' Gorzny

Francis Theodore "Frank" Gorzny passed away on Friday, Nov. 9, 2012, at Riverside County Regional Medical Center in Moreno Valley. Idyllwild Fire Department paramedics were called to his home when he stopped breathing. They revived him and he was air lifted to the hospital where he later had cardiac arrest. He was 93.



Born May 18, 1919, in Morrison, Ill., Frank was the fifth of Joseph and Rozena Gorzny's six children. He attended Morrison High School, but quit after 9th grade to help on his family's farm. For a few years circa 1940, he built munitions and heavy artillery at the ordnance depot in Savana, Ill. He enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps in 1943 and went through basic training and 18 months as a rifle range instructor at Camp Pendleton. He was sent overseas to fight in Word War II, training in Hawaii and fighting in Japan, then honorably discharged as a corporal in 1946. In the meantime, he had met and married Dorothea Farrar, a college student and waitress from Greenville, Calif. Their first daughter, Rose Charlotte, was born in 1945, followed by son Ted in 1949, and daughters Kathy in 1951 and Krysti in 1952.

Frank was a crane operator at Camp Pendleton, and in June 1953 he moved his family from Oceanside to a home on Tahquitz Drive. He commuted for about 2 years, then was hired by the U.S. Forest Service as a heavy equipment operator. He fought forest fires, built fuel breaks and patrolled the woods. At retirement in 1986 he was Area 3 Road Foreman, working out of Cranston Station in Valle Vista. The "Gorzny Work Center" there was named for him. He then went back to running a crane in Oceanside.

Frank was always busy. He began restoring antique Harley-Davidsons in the 1970s, winning awards in bike shows throughout the state. Over the years he could be seen on one of his bikes in town or in the 4th of July Parade. In his younger days he was an award-winning archer, often going deer hunting with bow and arrows. During his

military service he was also a Golden Gloves boxer. Frank and Dorothea planted a vegetable garden every summer, as well as several fruit trees. An expert tree-trimmer and faller, he would don his climbing gear, hauling a saw high into the branches to top or trim for local property owners. He became known as the "cat rescuer" as he scaled many a tree to save a stranded cat. He was chosen to erect the rock walls around the Tree Monument and he volunteered his time, enjoying every minute.

Anyone who had ever met Frank Gorzny would tell you he was quite a storyteller, and an equally good listener. He thrived on life's adventures and the entertaining diversity of the human race. He was often seen in town, sitting on the rock wall in front of the Red Kettle or Jo'An's, chatting with anyone and everyone. At home, he spent much of the day tossing peanuts and dog food to the squirrels and ravens.

Frank is survived by four children, Rose Geske of Puerto Rico, Ted and Kathryn Gorzny of Idyllwild, and Kristine Gorzny of Eugene, Ore.; five grandchildren, David Trimmell and Angela Kellner of Eugene; Suri Weinmunson of Vermont; Trinity Kellner of Idyllwild; and Joseph Good of Portland, Ore.; and five great-grandchildren, Michael, Melissa, Mira, Sadie and Alexander. His wife Dorothea passed away in 2003.

Inland Memorial in Hemet is handling the funeral services, including burial at Riverside National Cemetery. There will also be a celebration of Mr. Gorzny's life from 1 to 4 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 24 at the American Legion Post 800 on Marian View Drive in Idyllwild.

University of California, Riverside, were on hand for the felling of the tree by CALFIRE crews. Scott has been one of the lead scientists in tracking the Goldspotted oak borers' spread and destructive path.

As to whether this is an isolated instance, a single infected tree, Scott was doubtful. "It would be hope beyond hope that it's the only tree. It's possible that this tree was already weakened from other pathogens, and an easy target for the beetle," said Scott, "making it a sentinel tree."

By that he meant the first to die because of its weakened state, but with the likelihood that more Goldspotted beetles were already in other healthier local oaks that might not show signs of dying for some time.

Scott theorized that the removed oak was probably infected well over a year ago, possibly longer, and died within a year because it was already weak. "There may be other trees that have the beetle that won't die for nine or ten years. We know very little about their

dispersal patterns and how they move from one tree to another." The Goldspotted oak borer targets California black oak, coast live oak and canyon live oak.

For now, Scott said the community's help is needed. "We want to find out who [in the community] we can work with. On Tuesday, Nov. 20, Scott, Bratcher and UCR coordinator Kevin Turner met for a preliminary training session with members of the Idyllwild Garden Club, Master Gardeners and Nature Center staff and volunteer base. CALFIRE and UCR want "boots on the ground," individuals with some arboriculture knowledge or experience, who can become local spotters, interact with the wider Idyllwild populace, field and answer questions and work to get oaks on private properties inspected.

CALFIRE Division Chief Kathleen Edwards first noticed the roadside oak because its leaves had shriveled prematurely and had browned early in an atypical pattern. Scott said that there were several things locals could be on the lookout for in other Idyllwild oaks — premature early leaf browning, a thinning tree canopy and the "D" shaped beetle exit holes in the oak bark.

"I also want to get ahold of people who bought wood or brought wood from the San Diego area beginning a year and a half ago," said Scott. "We need to try to identify where specifically it came from and how it got here." For now Scott said Turner's office number will be the initial clearing house for firewood transportation information, (951) 827-2973. "There'd be no penalty for those who call in," Scott said. "We just need the information."

The Goldspotted oak

borer is not native to California. The beetle's native habitat is in southeastern Arizona. Because it is not native to California, there are no natural predators here to check its spread. Nor are there, at this time, any effective topical pesticides that could arrest its advance.

The issue becomes, as Bratcher acknowledged, the coordination of a multi-agency response to identify additional infected Hill trees and creation of an effective public education campaign regarding cutting and transportation of firewood, and ways to curtail further

spread of the predator in the Idyllwild area.

The tree cross-sections Scott examined after the tree

came down will be taken to labs in quarantined areas of San Diego County. "By forensically examining it [tree

cross sections] we can assign times when the top died and figure out whether the tree was first in trouble [from other pathogens] or whether the beetle [alone] killed it," Scott said. He observed that people in the mountains still need to use firewood, but the problem becomes how to stop movement of diseased wood in a reasonable way.

Bratcher estimated that a survey of trees in the area of the infected oak would begin soon.

IDYLLWILD WATER DISTRICT NOVEMBER 2012 NEWSLETTER

IWD Mission Statement -

To provide reliable water & sewer service in a safe, cost-effective & environmentally sound manner in accordance with the community needs.

IWD TO IMPLEMENT STAGE 1 – At the November 14th District Board meeting the agenda included a Public Hearing regarding declaring a water shortage emergency. The Board received a report from the General Manager on the findings regarding our groundwater supplies. Based on the following criteria:

- Monitoring the Foster Lake water level, which is full at 18 feet. For the past several months, the Lake has been declining an average of 2.5 feet per month. The Lake water level is currently 6.5 feet.
- Monitoring the amount of local precipitation for total rainfall and snowmelt of not less than 20 inches for September 1- April 30th. The total precipitation for September 1 – April 30 was 19.5 inches.
- Monitoring that the IWD Well #10 pumping level is not more than 50 feet. This well has exceeded the 50 foot depth.

Based on these findings, the General Manager recommended the District not wait any longer and declared that a water shortage emergency is anticipated. This board decision was approved, authorizing the General Manager to implement a Water Conservation Stage 1. This is a voluntary compliance, which specifies that users of the District voluntarily limit the amount of water used to that amount necessary for domestic and business purposes. Will Serve letters shall be limited to a total of 10 EDU's during a Water Conservation Stage 1. IWD will closely monitor our groundwater supplies for any further action.

DON'T FORGET TO PREPARE FOR THE FREEZING TEMPERATURES – Each year we receive calls from water customers that their water service lines on their property are frozen and they have no water. After the water lines thaw, the customer finds a water leak. Don't get caught in the cold; check your wrapped water lines to see if they should be rewrapped. Make sure your pipes and faucets in unheated areas are insulated. If you aren't a full time resident and are not sure how to winterize your house, please call your plumber. He can give you information about your specific residence and how to drain your lines and place biodegradable antifreeze in the water traps. Remember, all water that passes through the meter is the homeowner's responsibility, even water lost due to frozen or broken pipes.

With the arrival of the Goldspotted Oak Borer in firewood, Stone stressed that any firewood purchaser should only buy from sources that can prove oak came from uninfected areas. Now much of San Diego County is infected.

To report roadside wood sellers in Idyllwild, call either Stone's office at (951) 698-7326 or Code Enforcement at (951) 696-1606. Third District Code Enforcement Supervisor Brian Black is aware of the Idyllwild GSOB problem and knows that calls will be coming in.

Idyllwild Arts finds two interim heads better than one

Doug Ashcraft and Steve Fraider are jointly leading Idyllwild Arts. Of course as respective Dean of the Academy and Director of the Summer Program, they were involved in the Academy's navigation for years.

The majority of their new responsibilities do not overlap and they are enjoying the time collaborating and helping the school through this period until a new president of the school is selected.

Although former President Brian Cohen left in July, the board of governors is waiting to initiate the replacement process. One of the steps, according to Board Chair Faith Raiguel, is to evaluate the school's current leadership structure and how that enables the board to better interact and function.

On Thursday, Nov. 8, both Ashcraft and Fraider discussed their interim reign and the school's status.

"We're doing pretty well," Fraider said. "We have separate capabilities and different parts of the school."

"As long as Doug and I talk to each other about the key issues, such as the Master plan, it works well," he added.

Both confirmed that their day-to-day responsibilities, running the academy for Ashcraft and the summer program for Fraider, have changed little in many years.

Both men were conscious of and grateful for the role of all the school's main actors. The staff and faculty have been instrumental in the school's ability to operate without losing a step in the

absence of an official head. And the board has been more engaged.

"Everybody is more open and more interested in working together," Fraider observed. "They're talking seriously about the future more than anytime before."

The seven "Arts" chairs still report to Ashcraft, who has plenty of staff meetings. For major decisions, to ensure a consensus, he devotes much time to discussing and listening to all the views.

"I want to make sure everybody is on board," he stressed. "We have an enormous amount of talent and wisdom at all levels. People feel they can voice an opinion about issues and be heard and respected."

"People are comfortable with Doug," colleague Fraider acknowledged. "Everybody is quite empowered now."

Although Ashcraft heads the academy, with 298 full-time students this year, Fraider's summer program is vital for the school. Its history began in 1950, 36 years before the academy began operation.

Nearly 1,700 participants flow through a normal summer program, which is often a student's or even board member's initial connection with the institution.

"The summer program is critical and helps establish the name value [for the entire institution]," Fraider said.

Faith Raiguel loves Idyllwild Arts

"It's a wonderful community here — the administrators, staff, teachers, students alumni and governors and trustees," began Faith Raiguel, chair of the Board of Governors for the Idyllwild Arts Academy. "Some live in the community and some off the Hill."

The board is meeting more frequently in the absence of a school head. They are working closely with the the interim heads — Dr. Douglas Ashcraft, interim head of school, and dean of arts for the Idyllwild Arts Academy, and Steve Fraider, interim executive director, Idyllwild Arts Foundation and director of the Summer Program.

The school community is uniting and morale is improving, Raiguel observed. These changes may even be an accidental byproduct of the changes at the leadership level in the past several years, according to her.

This attention to detail comes easily for Raiguel. While most of her career has been associated with the

arts, currently the Los Angeles Opera, she is a certified public accountant and not a professional artist.

Her accounting career has taken her from the Washington political arena to the Kennedy Center, the Lincoln Center, the Autry Center and even Walt Disney. Currently she serves as the chief financial officer for the Los Angeles Opera.

Growing up in Claremont, she first came to Idyllwild and the school's summer program in the late 1960s. She was one of four Claremont students with music scholarships.

Singing in the choir is how she first met former Idyllwild Arts President Bill Lowman, current board colleague and Idyllwild resident Dwight "Buzz" Holmes and the director of the children's programs Bruce McMennamin.

"After three summers it gets in your blood," she said. Her kinship with Idyllwild Arts was passed on to her children, who both spent summers there. Her daughter even declared her intention to attend the academy for her senior year of high school.

As an adult, Raiguel returned to the summer program for watercolor and drawing classes. Besides her personal addiction to the school's programs, she affirms her love for the institution's mission, which is not merely training pre-professional artists.

"There are four legs to the school and arts is only one," she emphasized. "Academics, physical activities and personal character are the others. We need to nurture each one."

Having seen the school's community come together this fall and the greater board involvement, she said the governance leaders intend to evaluate the school's structure and leadership

needs before initiating recruitment for a new president.

That step may not occur before late winter or spring, but the board wants to be sure what skills, talents and qualities it needs to move forward.

"We'll evaluate what we've learned from Bill's [Lowman] time and his strengths. Maybe we'll consider changes or a new structure," she said. The board will conduct its assessment this fall and winter.

But she also stressed, that this would be a short-term strategic plan. "It would not be helpful to complete a long-term plan without involving the new president, who would want to do that — a fait accompli — not much room for their input," she said.

The school's current enrollment is nearly 300 students — town and residential. Whether the school expands beyond that level will be addressed in a long-term plan.

When her term as board chair expires, Raiguel expects to stay involved on the governing board or as a trustee. "It's in my blood," she acknowledged.

Stable finances and water usage in Pine Cove

No major issues occupied the directors of the Pine Cove Water District last week. General Manger Jerry Holldber discussed the district's finances and current water status.

PCWD's total cash assets are about \$270,000 and have been growing for the past several months, Holldber reported.

The district has already begun to use the funds from a recently approved U.S. Department of Agriculture grant and loan. Negotiations for purchasing a pickup truck are completed and Holldber expects the vehicle to arrive within the next two months.

Holldber has also requested some financial assistance from Jeff Stone, Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor, to purchase narrow band radios, whose use the Federal Communication Commission is requiring all public agencies to adopt.

This deadline to implement the new radio spectrum is Jan. 1, 2013. The FCC began almost two decades ago to ensure more efficient use of the radio spectrum and greater spectrum access for public safety and nonpublic safety users. Use of the 12.5 kHz technology (referred to as narrow banding) will allow additional channel capacity within the same radio spectrum, and support more users.

With the new radios and use of the new frequency, water districts, fire districts and other public safety agencies will be able to communicate directly in case an emergency or disaster occurred on the Hill.

"Interoperability used to happen only in the trench," said Director Robert Hewitt. "But since 2001, [public safety] agencies became aware of the need to talk directly and share reports."

October's water usage increased, the most since July and was the greatest October consumption in six years. "Use was up this year, but it looks to be working good," Holldber said. Although the monitoring well's groundwater level had declined, its level was still high for fall, he noted.

Holldber also told the board about IWD's plan to consider going to a Stage 1 Water emergency (see story page 1), but he assured the directors that PCWD did not need to take similar action.

"No, we're not going to Stage 1," he emphasized. "Groundwater levels are up very well, even though the winters were light on precipitation." He also reminded the board that water sales have generally been declining, despite October's increase.

"We sell less water and it's not because of the conservation program, rebates, but simply less people are living here now," Holldber stated. "The facts do not support a Stage 1 for us."

PCWD has still not received any response from the Stonewood community to the district's offer to provide water service to the neighborhood. Holldber suggested that the board invite the Stonewood community to the January regular meeting.

"At that time we could explain why we're confident we can handle their water need," he said.

CSA 38 still fuming about ambulance contract

County confirms mapping error

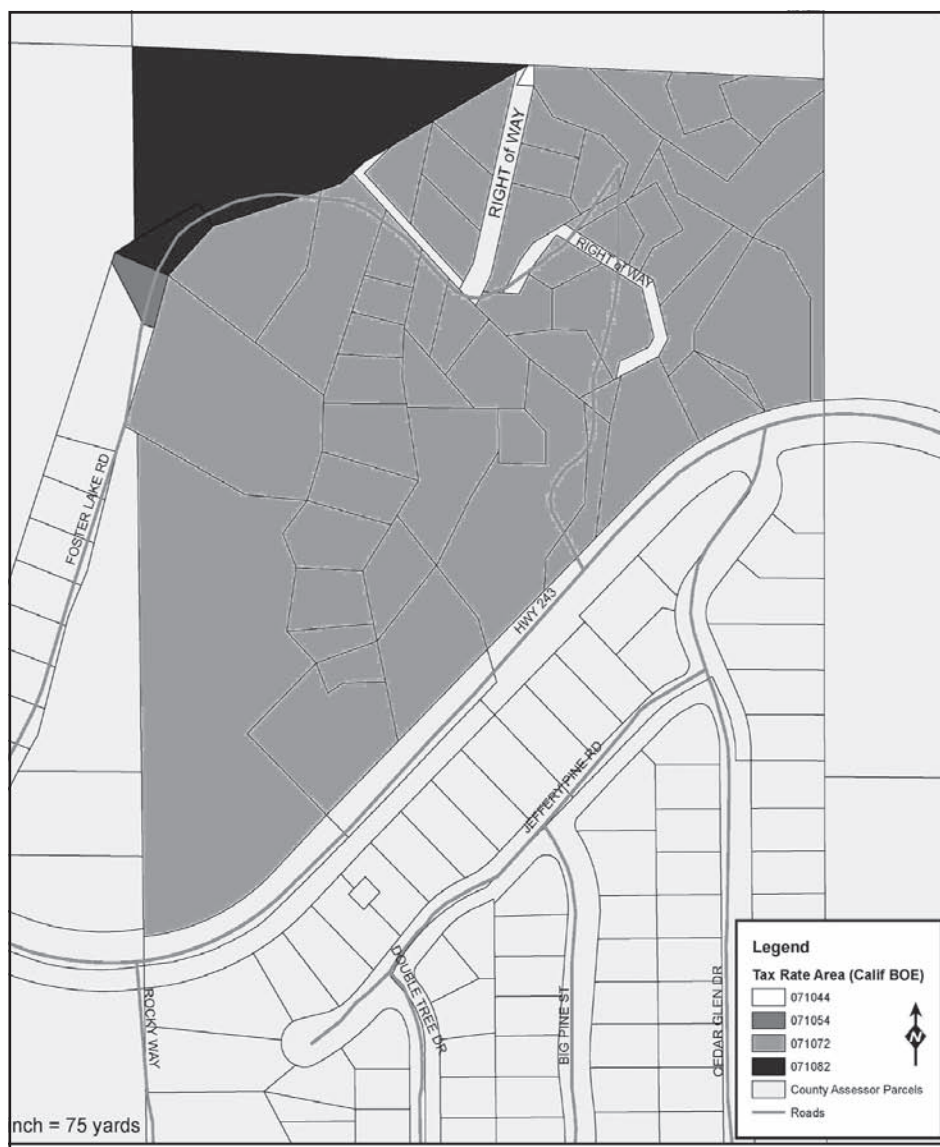

Although the ambulance contract between Riverside County Office of Emergency Services and the Idyllwild Fire Protection District was renewed in June, the subject still surfaces at the County Service Area 38 (Pine Cove) Advisory Committee meetings.

During the Nov. 14 session, committee members continued to express frustration over their lack of involvement in the spring negotiations and the negotiations' results. In particular, member Marge Muir expressed regret that IFPD's ambulance charge for transporting Pine Cove residents is nearly \$300 more than for Idyllwild residents.

Although Idyllwild residents pay a special \$65 per parcel fee to the fire district, CSA 38 residents pay a \$55 per parcel fee for the ambulance service. This provides the \$120,000 that CSA 38 pays for IFPD ambulance service. Nevertheless, irrespective of the parcel fee CSA 38 residents pay, they are treated as nonresidents, just as Mountain Center residents and residents north of Pine Cove are, although these parcels do not pay for ambulance service.

"It doesn't make sense," said Muir. "Humber Park is farther than Cedar Glen. And they only bring an ambulance to Pine Cove. For [incidents in] their district, they send a truck and ambulance. It should cost less coming here." Despite the disappointment, all the committee could do was request that the county provide the quarterly ambulance reports as specified in the contract.

In other financial business, Michael Franklin, CSA project manager for the county's Economic Development Agency, confirmed that parcels near Foster Lake, which are legally part of CSA 38, had been omitted from the county's maps of administrative unit boundaries.

Although he said the county was collecting property taxes from those parcels and allocating the proper portion to CSA 38, they were not contributing to the ambulance fee collections.

"They were not in-

cluded in the first special assessment vote [August 2004] so they can't be taxed without the opportunity to vote and we won't be able to collect a back tax if they do vote for the assessment," Franklin wrote.

Franklin also confirmed in his email that EDA had "budgeted for a new [fire] engine, so once given that direction from Supervisor Stone's office, we are able

to move forward with a purchase."

Riverside County Mountain Battalion Chief Sean Dakin was at the meeting and confirmed he had discussion with Bill Brown, the county's CSA operations manager, about the prospective engine purchase, a type 3 with 4-wheel drive.

Community Fund funds new program

The Idyllwild Community Fund, a division of the Community Foundation that serves Riverside and San Bernardino counties, approved a new program that gives grant-funding ability to Idyllwild Middle School students.

The Youth Grantmakers Program, already in place for off-Hill high school students, will be offered to middle school students for the first time, according to ICF board member Trish Tuley. The program is designed to give students experience in evaluating grant applications from nonprofits whose missions and objectives benefit young people.

"We plan to launch the program in January 2013," said Tuley. "We're working with Lenore Sazer [Idyllwild Middle School teacher]. The kids who will fund the grants have not yet been chosen. They'll be looking at requests from nonprofits in the Idyllwild area that

target their age group and they'll recommend who gets the money."

Tuley mentioned that ICF already has \$2,000 for the program, which will be matched by the Community Foundation in Riverside, giving local students \$4,000 to award.

Last year Riverside and San Bernardino Youth Grantmakers gave out \$25,000 to eleven nonprofits. The Community Foundation had reviewed and approved their choices, as the ICF board will do locally for the \$4,000 of local Youth Grantmakers next year.

"We are so behind this program for Idyllwild School," said Tuley, who noted that ICF board members are being trained to be trainers of the students. "The kids will be trained in all aspects of philanthropy." Tuley said that the board has not asked for grant requests from local nonprofits.

Fern Valley directors reaffirm precedent decision

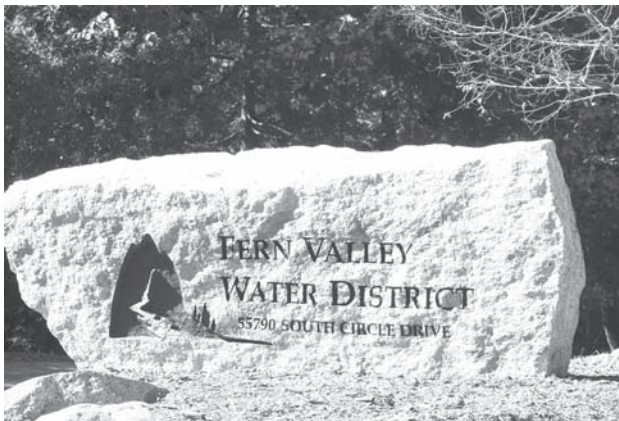
Not all Hill water districts grant one catastrophic water loss settlement. Having previously granted one to David and Suzanne Horowitz, the Fern Valley Water District board of directors reaffirmed their previous decision to stick to policy and precedent and not grant another.

The Horowitzes had offered, in an Oct. 29 letter, to pay \$9 per unit (cost of production) for a total payment of \$8,925, rather than the full bill of \$13,695. At its Nov. 16 meeting, the board unanimously reaffirmed their October decision to deny any adjustment. However, the board agreed to let the Horowitzes pay the charge in regular monthly

installments over a two-year period.

In other business, the board applauded General Manager Steve Erler's results in getting a new sign for the district office, this one made of granite and recently mounted at the district office location. Erler reported that San Diego company Martian Laser completed the onsite cutting, shipping, sandblasting and painting of the district logo, name and address on the granite slab. Staff poured a concrete foundation to hold the large boulder in place.

Erler also reported that some water odor complaints are still being received from a few district customers below Tank 11 that had been previously recoated and sealed. Director Robert Krieger suggested putting

more vents in the top of the tank. Erler noted that water levels would be brought down in the winter and water turned over more frequently.

Erler reported that groundwater levels for all district measuring wells

show decreases, the largest being in Well no. 13 that decreased 2 feet over the last month. Well levels are 1 to 7 feet lower than the same time last year.

business savvy, organization brilliance and great love of film, he was the right man for the job."

Calderone is clearly proud of what's new this year, although with his quiet demeanor, he doesn't gush. Instead he exudes confidence that what's new for ICF 2013 season will make a difference with festival filmmakers and audiences.

First, two new venues add nearly 200 seats for festival screenings — the 100-seat Astrocamp Galaxy Theater and the 80 to 100-seat Idyllwild Town Hall provide large and good quality houses for festival screenings.

The iconic Rustic Theatre in the village center remains the festival's primary venue, now upgraded with the highest quality digital projection and sound. Owner Shane Stewart said he made the \$90,000 investment in April to guarantee a qual-

ity movie house would remain on the Hill and to enhance and perpetuate the Idyllwild CinemaFest. Caine Learning Center will now serve as the festival seminar site, rather than the Rustic. "This gives us more screening time at the Rustic and a more intimate setting for the seminars," said Calderone of the change.

A new filmmaker submission process through Withoutabox.com, a paperless submission platform used by film festi-

vals around the world, has expanded and simplified ICF's ability to review and accept festival films.

"For over a month I've had enough films to go forward," said Calderone, who was still accepting submissions though Thursday, Nov. 22. "It's given us the ability to be more selective. Last year we had 67 festival films. This year I'm aiming for 80 and we might go higher. I'm not sure how much second plays we'll have for the same films. We'll need to find that balance so that locals who miss a film will have another opportunity to see it."

New screening categories are Foreign and Amateur, which Calderone said he's excited about adding to the festival format. Foreign films from non-English speaking countries, such as Egypt and Iran, will be screened with subtitles. Regarding the amateur category, Calderone said, "Now, everybody has the ability to make a film, not just dedicated filmmak-

ers. We'll have to determine, after submission, if it is in fact amateur, and select based on whether collectively there is something about it that makes it worthwhile and deserving to be seen. We may accept no projects in this category or we may accept a dozen. It depends on the quality."

Also new is Viewers' Choice, that lets ICF website visitors and prospective festival attendees watch trailers of films under consideration and rate them. Calderone said that viewer ratings would not be determinative of what films make the festival but will be a factor he consid-

ers. "It's also a benefit for the filmmaker [the viewer ratings and feedback] beyond what is usually offered at festivals," said Calderone. And that also is one of Calderone's prime objectives — to offer attending filmmakers more benefits, acknowledgements and more personal treatment

As part of their menu for expanding membership and demonstrating broader appeal and outreach to the community, the adult group Forest Folk is hosting Thursday evening meeting, potluck and movie nights at Town Hall. MDP has a new president and board

Mountain Disaster Preparedness, the Idyllwild area's volunteer emergency preparedness group, has a new board and new president. Incoming President Mike Feydar said he would focus on community outreach and getting the preparedness message out.

Feydar, who served as vice president under outgoing President Veronica Alt, brings previous disaster preparation board experience acquired in the South Bay to his new position. Careful to stress that his vision for expanded community outreach depends on board agreement, Feydar hopes to implement a "Map Your Neighborhood" plan that he helped put in place in the harbor area of the Palos Verdes peninsula where he lived previously.

"Being conscious of privacy issues, it's a way to know who is in each neighborhood — elderly, infirm, kids alone — and what resources are available within that neighborhood that could be useful after a disaster," Feydar noted that it improves disaster preparedness volunteers to work with and help inform professional responders in the wake of an emergency.

He takes over an organization that has a membership of over 400 and 90 Community Emergency

Response Team trained volunteers. He acknowledged the efforts of Alt, Nancy Layton, Rick Foster and Dr. Dick Goldberg to build the organization. He said he believes MDP has a strong and willing partner in new Idyllwild Fire Chief Patrick Reitz and looks forward to working to strengthen that relationship and to better network with other co-interested groups to from an expanded community disaster readiness team.

Feydar also hopes to bring speakers, such as Cal Tech earthquake expert Lucy Jones, to the Hill to address the community and expand awareness about the need for preparation now. Feydar noted the worst-case scenario facing the Hill would be an earthquake and major fire at the same time, coupled with the likely isolation that road closure would bring. "It's a numbers game," he said. "Resources [county, state and federal] will first go where there is the most need." And that

He noted volunteers could potentially be used with the Riverside County Unit, Disaster Healthcare Volunteers of California, a statewide program, or even with the federal Medical Reserve Corps. He noted online courses that could help prepare volunteers for serving with any one of the three groups.

Primarily though, Baxter explained how licensed health care professionals could register as volunteers and continue to update their information and availability on the California site, www.healthcarevolunteers.ca.gov. All units are part of the president's USA Freedom Corps, which promotes volunteerism and service nationwide.

Typically, during an emergency, medical volunteers could augment medical and support-staff shortages at medical or emergency facilities; dispense pharmaceuticals; assist staging area staff, both medical and non-medical; and assist with immunization clinics, education, and infectious disease outbreak

support.

Inactive or retired licensed health care professionals in good standing as well as students currently studying in those professions are being sought. Applicants without any medical training can also apply.

"All volunteers are welcomed as there are many support functions in medical services," states the county site www.rivcophepr.org. "Applicants are required to be in good health, at least 18 years of age and have a valid driver's license with access to an insured vehicle. They also agree to provide access to employment and professional credential information."

"We can use anybody really," Baxter said. "And you may wind up being used in areas other than your home area."

County raises service fees

The Riverside County Assessor's office has announced that many fees for county services will increase effective Dec. 7.

For example, the fee for a marriage license will be \$90. Its current cost is \$68, a 32 percent increase. A confidential marriage license will go from \$76 to \$100.

If the county performs the ceremony during the work-week, it will cost another \$75, a \$10 increase from what it would cost today. Saturday ceremonies will increase \$23, to \$113 from \$90.

The cost for Fictitious Business Name Statements and their abandonment will go up too. These will be \$58 and \$24 respectively. The

original statement is now \$35, but abandonment will decrease \$3.

Other fees that are increasing include legal document registrations, Notary Public filing fees and surety fees.

To see a complete list of Riverside County's new fee schedule go online to idyllwildtowncrier.com and look for the story.

The Assessor's Office also announced that the cost for birth and death certificates will increase by \$2 on Jan. 1, 2013. The current fee is \$21 for a birth certificate and \$14 for a death certificate.

The state legislature raised the fees for these certificates.

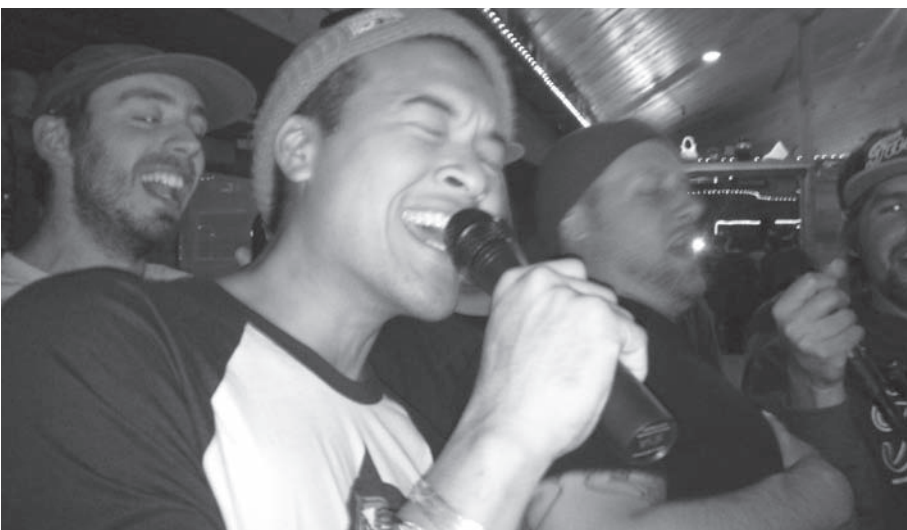

Thanksgiving leftovers ...

Everyone has Thanksgiving leftovers unless you are Henry VIII.

It starts out on Thanksgiving Day with a wonderful feast giving appreciation for a year of bounty.

After dinner, time is spent lounging around, letting the tryptophan kick in and watching football.

The day after Thanksgiving is nice, no meals to prepare, a nice turkey sandwich should do the trick along with leftover wine, although there is never leftover wine at my cabin.

By the Saturday after Thanksgiving, the whole food thing is getting old. Not to mention, so is standing on the scale and watching the dial go around twice.

I have always tried to use all the leftovers as taught by my mom. Don't waste anything. Mom usually made turkey soup with all the leftovers.

The following recipe is for leftover turkey, enjoy.

Southwestern turkey soup

Makes eight servings

(From allrecipes.com)

- 1-1/2 cups shredded cooked turkey
- 4 cups vegetable broth
- 1 (28 ounce) can whole peeled tomatoes
- 1 (4 ounce) can chopped green chile peppers
- 2 roma (plum) tomatoes chopped
- 1 onion chopped
- 2 cloves garlic crushed
- 1 tbs lime juice
- 1/2 tsp cayenne pepper
- 1/2 tsp ground cumin
- 1 avocado peeled, pitted and diced
- 1/2 tsp dried cilantro
- 1 cup shredded Monterey jack cheese
- salt and pepper to taste

In a large pot over medium heat, combine the turkey, broth, canned tomatoes, green chiles, fresh tomatoes, onion, garlic, lime juice. Season with cayenne, cumin, salt and pepper. Bring ingredients to a boil, then reduce heat, and simmer for 15 to 20 minutes.

Stir in the avocado and cilantro, then simmer for another 15 to 20 minutes, until slightly thickened. Spoon into serving bowls, and top with shredded cheese.

I use mild chiles for the sensitive stomachs. Also, I prefer fresh cilantro, but not too much, it can be overpowering.

To get the full flavor of the avocado, dice and add over the shredded cheese instead of in the soup. Top with sliced black olives for added flavor. Serve with hot flour tortillas, small salad, and a nice dry white wine. voilà, a good dinner.

I love the website allrecipes.com — you can edit the serving size to add more or less servings. The recipe's ingredients are automatically calculated.

PUBLIC NOTICE ORDINANCE NO. 62
AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE IDYLLWILD WATER DISTRICT FINDING THE NECESSITY OF, AND PROVIDING FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF A WATER SHORTAGE EMERGENCY PLAN TO MITIGATE THE EFFECTS OF DROUGHT AND RESCINDING ORDINANCE NO. 60 AND ALL AMENDMENTS THERETO
RECITALS
WHEREAS, the total water supply available to the Idyllwild Water District ("DISTRICT") is dependent upon local rainfall and snowmelt from the higher elevations of the San Jacinto Mountains; and
WHEREAS, there is no source of imported water available to the DISTRICT to supplement its local water supplies; and
WHEREAS, the DISTRICT periodically experiences years in which the amount of precipitation is insufficient to fully replenish the DISTRICT's water supplies. When such "dry" periods extend into subsequent years, the DISTRICT's ability to meet the minimum water supply requirements necessary to protect the public's health, safety and general welfare is severely compromised; and
WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the DISTRICT has been informed and advised that to ensure sufficient water supplies to meet basic needs

of human consumption, sanitation and fire protection, the DISTRICT must implement and enforce water conservation measures in order to mitigate the effects of drought on the community; and
WHEREAS, it is the purpose of this Ordinance to establish a multi-staged water shortage emergency plan and to provide for its implementation and enforcement.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Directors of the Idyllwild Water District does hereby ordain as follows:

Section 1. Purpose and Scope
The purpose of this Ordinance is to establish a multi-staged water shortage emergency plan to minimize the effect of a drought on the customers of the DISTRICT and thereby:
(i) Protect the health, safety and welfare of the residents and customers of the DISTRICT; and
(ii) Assure the maximum beneficial use of the water supplies of the DISTRICT; and
(iii) Ensure sufficient water supplies to meet the basic needs of human consumption, sanitation and fire protection.

Section 2. Authority
The DISTRICT has the power and authority to enact this Ordinance pursuant to the following state laws:

a. Water Code Section 31026, which authorizes the DISTRICT to (i) restrict the use of DISTRICT water during any emergency caused by drought or other threatened or existing water shortage, (ii) to prohibit the waste of DISTRICT water or the use of DISTRICT water during such periods, and (iii) to prohibit the use of such water during such periods for specific uses which the DISTRICT may from time to time find to be nonessential; and
b. Water Code Section 375, which authorizes the DISTRICT to adopt and enforce a water conservation program to reduce the quantity of water used by the inhabitants of the DISTRICT for the purpose of conserving the water supplies of the DISTRICT; and
c. Water Code Section 350, which gives the Board of Directors the authority to declare a water shortage emergency condition whenever the Board finds and determines that the ordinary demands and requirements of water consumers cannot be satisfied without depleting the water supply of the DISTRICT to the extent that there would be insufficient water for human consumption, sanitation and fire protection.

Section 3. Adoption of Three-Stage Water Shortage Emergency Plan
There is hereby enacted a DISTRICT-wide Water Shortage Emergency Plan consisting of three stages (hereafter, "the Plan"), as follows:

Water Conservation Stage I- Voluntary Compliance, which specifies that users of DISTRICT water voluntarily limit the amount of water used to that amount necessary for domestic and business purposes. Will serve letters shall be limited to a total of 10 EDU's during a Water Conservation Stage 1.
Water Conservation Stage 2- Mandatory Compliance, which requires each user to take specific actions to reduce water consumption, and which provides for an increased water rate. Will serve letters shall be limited to a total of 5 EDU's during a Water Conservation Stage 2.

Water Conservation Stage 3 - Mandatory Emergency Restrictions, which requires each user of DISTRICT water to take specific actions to further reduce the consumption of DISTRICT water, and which provides for a further increase in the water rate. There will be NO issuance of will serve letters during a Stage iii Water Conservation Stage.

Details of the Plan are provided in Section 5 below. Enforcement measures, which include notices of violation, disincentive surcharges and the installation of flow-restricting devices and termination of water service, are provided in Sections 6 and 7 below. A development agreement with a user of DISTRICT water may provide for issuance of will serve letters as provided in the agreement.

Section 4. Procedure for Declaring Water Shortage Emergency

The Plan shall be implemented as follows:
a. Utilizing precipitation records and water level data for Foster Lake and local wells, and after consultation with the manager of the neighboring retail water suppliers, the General Manager shall determine whether a water shortage exists or is anticipated.

b. As soon as it is reasonably practicable to do so, the General Manager shall report the findings and conclusions to the Board of Directors and make such recommendations as may be appropriate including, without limitation, a recommendation that the Board of Directors conduct a public hearing for the purpose of announcing a joint declaration that a water shortage is anticipated or exists and authorizing the General Manager to implement the appropriate Water Conservation Stage. Notice of the time and place of hearing shall be published in the Idyllwild TOWN CRIER or the Riverside PRESS ENTERPRISE at least 7 days prior to the date of the hearing.

c. After implementation, the General Manager shall periodically report to the Board of Directors, with information and data concerning the effectiveness of the Plan, enforcement activities and, if appropriate, recommendations for further action.

Section 5. Water Conservation Stages
a. Implementation by General Manager. In the event the Board of Directors declares the existence of a water shortage and authorizes the implementation of the DISTRICT's Water Shortage Emergency Plan, the General Manager shall thereupon be authorized to implement and enforce the following Water Conservation Stages. The determination of which Stage to implement shall be made by the General Manager and shall be based upon the best available information regarding present and

predicted precipitation, the availability of water in storage and the rate of consumption by DISTRICT users. It shall not be necessary to implement a Stage I (or II) alert prior to implementing a Stage II (or III) alert; the Stages may be implemented in any reasonable order.

b. Public Notice Procedure for Implementation. The General Manager, after consultation with, and the concurrence of, the Board of Directors, may declare a Water Conservation Stage to be effective on the sixth day following the publication of the declaration at least once in the Idyllwild TOWN CRIER, and posted in at least three public places within the DISTRICT.

The General Manager shall also provide mailed notice of the declaration to each customer of the DISTRICT; provided, however, the failure to receive mailed notice prior to the effective date of the declaration shall not invalidate the declaration, nor shall it prevent enforcement of this Ordinance.

c. Three Stages.
Water Conservation Stage 1 - Voluntary Compliance

In the event the General Manager determines to implement Water Conservation Stage 1, users of DISTRICT water shall voluntarily reduce the amount of water used to that amount minimally necessary for household use (drinking, cooking and bathing) and for business necessity.

Such reductions will include, but are not limited to, immediately repairing leaks, preventing irrigation water runoff, refraining from washing sidewalks, driveways and parking areas, and refraining from sprinkling unplanted areas for dust control.

Water Conservation Stage 2 - Mandatory Compliance

In the event the General Manager determines to implement Water Conservation Stage 2, users of DISTRICT water shall be required to:

(1) Limit irrigation of outdoor plants and gardens to the period between 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. daily, and stop all water runoff; and
(2) Cease filling or refilling swimming pools, except that a small amount of water may be used to replace evaporation losses in a filled pool; and
(3) Wash motor vehicles and equipment only from a bucket using a hose with a shutoff nozzle; and
(4) Make immediate repairs to any and all leaking water lines and faucets in household plumbing and yard piping; and
(5) Cease irrigating native vegetation and unplanted areas for dust control. In addition, restaurants shall only provide drinking water to patrons upon request therefor.

Water Conservation Stage 3 - Mandatory Emergency Restrictions

In the event the General Manager determines to implement Water Conservation Stage III, the following prohibitions and restrictions shall apply:

a. No water shall be used for irrigating outdoor plants, trees or other landscaping of any kind, in any amount, at any time; and
b. No water shall be added to swimming pools, hot tubs or spas to replace evaporative losses or for any other purpose; and
c. No water shall be taken from fire hydrants for any reason except for fire emergencies or for the maintenance of system water quality; and
d. Water use for construction purposes shall be minimized; and
e. No water shall be used for dust control, or for washing any structure, sidewalk, driveway or parking area, or for washing motor vehicles and equipment except from a bucket using a hose with a shutoff nozzle.

In addition, water users shall make immediate repairs to any leaking line or faucet in household plumbing or yard piping.

Section 6. Water Shortage Emergency Plan Water Rate Structure

In the event the Board of Directors declares a water shortage and orders the implementation of the Water Shortage Emergency Plan, water rates shall be established by Resolution, including identification of a Water Conservation tier.

a. During the term of any Water Conservation Stage 2, the DISTRICT's water conservation tier specified in the DISTRICT's then current Water Rate Resolution shall be temporarily increased by 100%. Construction water shall be sold at the third tier rate.

b. During the term of any Water Conservation Stage 3, the tier below the water conservation tier shall be temporarily increased 150%.

Section 7. Failure to Comply; Penalties
a. Violations. Violations of the water user restrictions and prohibitions of Water Conservation Stages II and III shall be penalized as follows:

First Violation - Notice of Violation. The General Manager is authorized and directed to issue, or cause the issuance of a written warning notice of violation to any water user who fails or refuses to comply with the water user restrictions and prohibitions set forth herein. The notice shall specify a reasonable period of time in which compliance shall be achieved.

Each notice of violation shall be addressed to the customer of record for the premises where the violation was observed; delivery may be by regular mail or by personal delivery.

Second Violation - Disincentive Surcharge. If, within the same 12-month period, a water user commits a second violation, an excessive water use disincentive surcharge shall be imposed. The surcharge shall be in the amount of two times the amount of the total water billing for the period in which the violation occurred, and shall be added to the next water bill to the premises.

Third Violation - Disincentive Surcharge and/or Water Service Restriction. If, within the same

12-month period, a water user commits a third violation, an excessive water use disincentive surcharge of three times the total water billing for the period in which the violation occurred shall be added to the next water bill, and the General Manager shall cause the installation of a water flow restricting device on the customer's water meter.

Fourth Violation - Termination of Water Service and Referral to District Attorney. If, within the same 12-month period, a water user commits a fourth violation, the General Manager shall terminate water service to the premises in accordance with the DISTRICT's Rules and Regulations. In addition, the General Manager shall refer the matter to the Riverside County District Attorney's office for misdemeanor prosecution as authorized by Water Code, Section 377.

b. Failure to Pay. Failure to pay any water bill, including all or any portion of an excessive water use disincentive surcharge, shall be subject to the delinquency provisions of the DISTRICT's Rules and Regulations which provide, in relevant part, that water service may be terminated for failure to pay.

Section 8. Hearing and Appeal

a. Hearings. A customer may promptly file a request for relief from any provision of this Ordinance, which request shall be submitted in writing to the General Manager and shall include all available information. The General Manager shall conduct an informal hearing on the request, and may grant such relief as may be reasonably appropriate and prudent, consistent with the DISTRICT's obligation to protect the public health, safety and general welfare.

b. Appeals. The customer has the right to promptly appeal the General Manager's decision to the Board of Directors of the DISTRICT. The appeal shall be submitted in writing and received by the DISTRICT within 10 days after the General Manager's decision. The appeal shall be considered by the Board of Directors as soon as practicable. The Board may, in its discretion, affirm, reverse or modify the General Manager's decision and impose such conditions, as it deems proper. The decision of the Board of Directors shall be final and conclusive for all purposes.

Section 9. Cooperation With All Water Service Providers

In implementing the provisions of this Ordinance, the Board of Directors hereby authorizes and directs the General Manager to cooperate to the maximum extent possible with the managers of the neighboring water service providers. Such cooperation shall include, but is not limited to, the sharing of water production, storage and consumption data.

Section 10. CEQA

The specific actions authorized herein are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act, State Guidelines, Section 15269 (c) for the reason that such actions are necessary to prevent or mitigate an emergency.

Section 11. Rescission; Incompatible Provisions

DISTRICT Ordinance No. 60 and all amendments thereto, are hereby rescinded in their entirety.

In addition, to the extent any provision of this Ordinance is incompatible or at variance with any prior-adopted ordinance or resolution, the provisions of this Ordinance shall take precedence and all prior ordinances and resolutions shall be interpreted to harmonize with and not change the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 12. Judicial Review

Any judicial action or proceeding to attack, review, set aside, void or annul this Ordinance or any determination made pursuant thereto shall be commenced within 90 days after the date of adoption of this Ordinance or the date of any determination made pursuant thereto. California Code of Civil Procedure, Section 1094.6 is hereby adopted and made applicable to any judicial review of any decision made by the Board of Directors, the General Manager, or agents, representatives or employees of the District.

Section 13. Severability

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by decision of any Court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions. The Board of Directors hereby declares that it would have passed those sections, subsections, clauses and phrases irrespective that one or more may be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 14. Publication; Effective Date

This Ordinance shall be published in its entirety at least once in the Idyllwild Town Crier or the Riverside Press Enterprise within 10 days after its adoption, shall be posted in three public places and shall become effective 30 days after it is adopted.

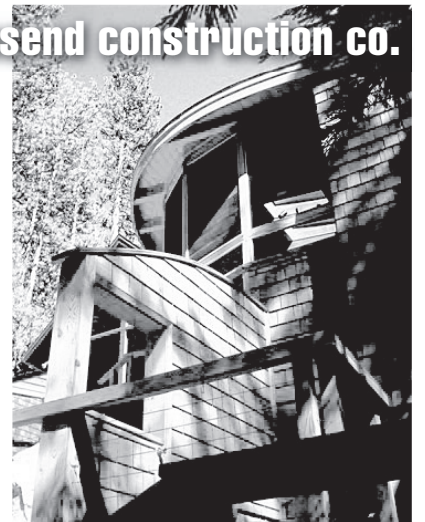
