

lear skies, warm days and good music were the right medication to help the Hill recover from the recent fire siege - Mountain, Strong and Silver fires.

Many attendees from previous jazz fests returned for the 2013 20th-annual Jazz in the Pines. Caltrans opened Highway 243 and visitors had little difficulty

getting to Idyllwild for the two days of virtually nonstop music.

Cornelius Reffegee and his wife, Patrica, were first in line on both Saturday and Sunday. This year was their fourth trip to the Hill to hear jazz in the open.

"A lot of jazz festivals are having fewer and fewer jazz performers," Reffegee said. "R&B and rock performers are being billed as jazz. This festival is true jazz."

Fundraiser set for **Mountain Fire victims**

t 3:30 p.m. Saturday, Aug 24, the Earthwill host a fundraiser at the Rainbow Inn, 54420 S. Circle Dr., to benefit victims of the Mountain Center Fire. Tickets are \$15 at the door.

Comedian Cary Odes will perform. Musical guests include the Greg Jones Band, Carlos Reynosa and Friends, Pentagrams and Daisies, and the Pete and Sue Band. It includes a silent auction and hors d'oeuvres.

Most of the proceeds from the fundraiser will go directly to the fire victims who lost seven homes in the Mountain Center fire. Sponsors for the event are Čafé Aroma, Idyllwild Pizza Company, Internal Balance Body Care and Sky Island

Christina Nordella of the foundation said, "My friend, Ginger Dagnall, was trying to raise some money for Witness Foundation her friend and I said 'let's go bigger than that. We can probably do it through my foundation." Nordella went back to her board for approval and secured a unanimous vote.

> Silver Fire victims who lost homes will receive 20 percent of the proceeds. Nordella explained, "It was originally for the Mountain Fire victims. While we were in the process of planning the fundraiser, the Silver Fire happened so we decided, 'Let's just do this for everybody and we'll give a percentage directly to the HELP Center for the Silver Fire victims'. They all get a gift of money, which they

make contact with three of By J.P. Crumrine the seven families who lost News Editor their homes in the Mountain Fire. "I am personally going to track them [the remaining families] down. Because I know; I can relate. I'll track them down as best I can from a place of understanding. If not, we'll hold the funds for a certain period of time.

"I'm hoping the families from both fires might come together and be a support group for each other. It would be really healing. I would hope that they get counseling, which is a part of the services offered through the HELP Center. I cannot say enough good things about the HELP Center.

Nordella has a very personal understanding of what these families are going

After the fires, what next?

eaction to the longterm consequences of the recent Mountain and Silver fires has varied. While all were uniformly glad that no lives were lost and the property damage limited, how the burnt areas will affect future fire threats and how those threats can be lessened is still being debated.

The Mountain Fire was substantially larger than the Silver Fire, but the latter destroyed more property. While the Silver Fire did come close to the San Jacinto Wilderness area, it mostly burned at elevations lower than the Mountain Fire, which consumed trees and vegetation at 8,000 feet and

"The Silver Fire rep-

resents a new trend," said Richard Minnich, a professor in the Earth Science Department at the University of California, Riverside. Invasive grasses are taking over the San Jacinto foothills iust south of Banning. This fire burned flash fuels and could every year as opposed to a shrub fire, which burns less frequently, he explained. The land was covered with the European grasses and the fire was accelerated with the western winds.

"Most people thought the fire in 2006 would mean there wasn't much danger in that area for years," said Richard Halsey, director of the California Chaparral Institute in Escondido. "But the problem repeated."

And it was the winds carrying burning embers onto rooftops that caused much

through having lost her Idyllwild home to a fire in October of 2011. "A lot of people don't realize that you have this experience and they think it's over in 30 days. 'OK, it's done, we've gotten vou some immediate help.' The truth of the matter is it takes about a yearand-a-half to come out of something as devastating as losing everything you own.

"It's not only the very deep uprooting of your physical environment but mentally you're uprooted because you start every day in your home; it is your point of reference, so your mind is really uprooted as well. People don't really get that. The victims just don't even know how to come forward; it's really hard to receive. It's really hard to say I'm going to need some help."

Nordella credits her recovery to the Idyllwild community. "I was holding it together; my kids were watching me. In all honesty I could not have rebuilt or been as emotionally stable as I was had I not had the Idyllwild community. My friends, this community, they supported me and more importantly, they supported my children and this type of stuff doesn't happen in larger cities. It just doesn't

happen. You'd be forgotten for the future, and about the about. I can't express enough my gratitude to how the community helped me and now it's my turn to help other people. It's what life is all about, really.

Fire chief discusses station fundraising campaign

As a volunteer during the recent Mountain Fire, Sheila Zacker staffed the phones at the Idyllwild Fire Station. During her stint she observed that the facility was in need of repair. She acted on her observations by beginning a fundraising

"I put this together because people in our community wanted to say thank you to our firefighters," Zacker said. "So I saw a need and people are really rallying around it and it's a beautiful thing that people want to say thank you to our heroes."

The effort is aimed at upgrading the living facilities at the IFPD. Zacker's letter (delivered via email to many residents and business owners) states: "The facility where the firefighters spend their days and nights have not been updated in years. The carpet is probably forty years old, the other floors are peeling. The beds they sleep in are from the thrift store and the TV extremely outdated."

Idyllwild Fire Chief Patrick Reitz offers, "Folks were calling and asking what they could do to help."

Zacker is correct. The facilities are in need of repair. And while there is little doubt that Idyllwild Fire Protection District deserves both gratitude and appreciation, some have questioned whether the donation of money for this cause is really benefiting those with the most urgent need.

"What is being done for the fire victims?" asked Mary Gavney, a 25-year resident of Idyllwild. Eddie Bearden, an Idyllwild resident suggests," In a perfect world, I think the money should go to the families, and the community should help the fire department by donating labor and supplies. It's a matter of pride in our fire station."

IFPD also distributes a flier entitled "How We can Thank our Firefighters" which is available on the IFPD counter. The IFPD flier incorporates much of the content of the Zacker

And while all of this appears to be well-intentioned, its wording has raised a plethora of questions from Town Crier readers as to the accuracy of statements made in both Zacker's letter and the IFPD flier. Chief Reitz acknowledges the confusion and attempts to address the concerns:

TC: Confusion over two payees. Zacker's letter asks that checks be made out to "IVFC 621 (Idyllwild Volunteer Fire Co 621)." The IFPD flier states: "To contribute to our Idyllwild Fire Protection District makeover, please make checks payable to: 1. IFPD or Idyllwild Fire Protection District with a note in the memo stating 'Fire Dept. Remodel or 'The Mountain

CR: "That was a mistake that has since been corrected. Checks should be made payable to the IFPD."

TC: Are the donations deductible?

CR: "According to tax codes, donations to a government entity are tax deductible."

TC: Will the IFPD provide an accounting of the monies collected?

CR: "We are required to do so." [Note: At the Aug. 13 meeting, the commission authorized a separate bank account for donations and gifts.]

TC: Given the language in Zacker's letter and the IFPD flier — the Zacker letter states that "the county does not have the money to make these much-needed upgrades ... while the IFPD flier further states that the "county and district does [sic] not have the funds to make these much needed upgrades ..." — this gave some of our readers the impression that the county should pay for the repairs.


CR: "Some people are saying that the county should be paying [for the repairs]. A couple of folks didn't understand that we are not funded by the county. They have given us money for MDCs [mobile data computers] and other things.

have mandated we have or emergency items.

"We don't receive county tax dollars. We receive our own tax dollars that the county collects for us. Any monies we receive beyond that are in the form of grants or gifts.

"Sheila is new to us, but it was a misunderstanding on her part. There really shouldn't be any money available [from the county]. We are not under county administration. That has been corrected in the letter." [As of Tuesday, the IFPD flier distributed at the station had not been revised to reflect this change.]

TC: Do the firefighters perform minor station repairs?

CR: "Firefighters do as much of the repairs as they can. In some cases they have donated items themselves. Beds and kitchen items are some of the goods that have been donated to us' some have been donated by the firefighters themselves."

TC: Isn't there a budget for station repairs and mainte-

CR: "It's not that much. Seventy to seventy-five percent are salaries which are below the national average of 80 percent for salaries and benefits. Because our district is small, the improvement money is easily spent. If the A/C goes out it is all part of the station repairs and maintenance budget, or we have to find the money in the budget somewhere else and move it there."

TC: What has been the response from the community? CR: "The response has been good; actually overwhelming.

We have received monetary and goods, and services donations as well as folks and organizations that want to do a work day at the station."

TC: Is there an end date for the fundraising or is it ongoing?

CR: "I would say it is ongoing. We haven't talked about an end date."

Donations so far have included \$500 from Rotary Anns; \$5,000 for a thermal imaging camera; and a flat-screen TV. Jay Pentrack can be reached at jay@towncrier.com.

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Low-interest loans for businesses affected by Mountain Fire

The U.S. Small Business Administration is offering low-interest working capital federal disaster loans to small businesses economically impacted by the Mountain Fire that occurred July 15 to July 30, SBA Administrator Karen G. Mills said Monday, Aug. 19. SBA acted under its own authority to declare a disaster in response to a request SBA received from Gov. Edmund G. Brown's designated representative, Mark Ghilarducci, director of the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services, on Aug. 14.

The disaster declaration makes SBA assistance available in Riverside County, the neighboring California counties of Imperial, Orange, San Bernardino and San Diego, and the neighboring Arizona county of La Paz.

"The U.S. Small Business Administration is strongly committed to providing the most effective and customer-focused response possible to assist California's small businesses with federal disaster loans. We will be swift in our efforts to help these small businesses recover from the financial impacts of this disaster," said Mills.

"Small, nonfarm businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private, nonprofit organizations of any size may qualify for Economic Injury Disaster Loans of up to \$2 million to help meet financial obligations and operating expenses that could have been met had the disaster not occurred," said SBA's Santa Ana Acting District Director Rachel Baranick.

"These loans may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable and other bills that can't be paid because of the disaster's impact. Disaster loans can provide vital economic assistance to small businesses to help overcome the temporary loss of revenue they are experiencing," Baranick added.

Eligibility is based on the financial impact of the disaster only and not on any actual property damage. These loans have an interest rate of 4 percent for small businesses and 2.875 percent for private, nonprofit organizations, with terms up to 30 years, and are restricted to small businesses without the financial ability to offset the adverse impact without hardship.

Applicants may apply online using SBA's secure website at https://disasterloan.sba.gov/ela.

The Inland Empire Small Business Development Center is offering free, personalized counseling to help affected business owners in their recovery. Business owners may contact the SBDC in Riverside from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, by calling 951-781-2345 or by visiting the Inland Empire SBDC Riverside Service Center at 3780 Market St., Riverside.

For owners of these impacted small businesses, disaster loan information and application forms are also available from SBA's Customer Service Center by calling toll-free 1-800-659-2955 or e-mailing disastercustomerservice@sba. gov. Individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing may call 1-800-877-8339. For more information about SBA's disaster assistance programs, visit www.sba.gov/disaster.

of the property damage, according to Minnich and many fire officials. The threat of embers being transported beyond fire breaks and enabling a fire to spread without moving from tree crown to crown was an important observation that Halsey also shared.

Tomorrow, as today and the past, the crux of the issue is how much fire prevention can be accomplished, how effective it will be and who is responsible for its cost.

Wildland fires are considered natural disasters, so Haley asks, "If there are no homes on earthquake faults, people should also know where fire corridors are."

"As a taxpayer, I resent paying 10 to 100 times the cost to protect structures in danger," Minnich admitted.

The results and behavior of the Mountain Fire did create some protection, according to Minnich. The fire occurred during good weather, meaning light winds, but it was shepherded and largely avoided tremendous damage and consumed a great amount of fuel. Some of these areas hadn't burned since the 1880s, he said.

However, Minnich wishes it had burned more fuel, particularly closer to the town. He thinks that the forest between Saddle Junction and Humber Park could be burned or thinned and this would reduce the threat of fire to Idyllwild.

The forest is two to three times as dense as it was a century ago, according to historical photographs and biographical accounts, Minnich said. Contributing to this is the policy of immediately stopping and putting fires out early.

"There is no way to protect structures in all that forest," he said.

But suppression is how fire agencies reduce or eliminate threats to lives and property. Terrain and weather make controlling fires unpredictable, according to many fire officials. Without mile-wide fuelbreaks, which both Minnich and Halsey laughed at, nothing can guarantee that a fire will behave exactly as the models predict. Fire managers try to reduce the risk of worst-case outcomes, even if models suggest the value of greater burning, but fuelbreaks and fuel removal are costly, especially in wilderness areas.

Consequently, the one step everyone agrees will generate more value for the cost is "hardening" homes. Individuals and property owners need to be sure they have done as much as possible to reduce fire threats. Even then, flying embers can slip through the protection.

"The energy should be on the home owners to retro-fit against hazards, such as flying embers," Halsey said. "The

easiest approach is to retrofit vents and ensure defensible space."

At least two homes in Twin Pines might have burned after the Silver Fire passed by because of embers landing on a porch and slipping through an eave vent, according to Fire Safe Council Executive Director Edwina Scott. In both cases, the potential fire was discovered before the house was in flames and lost. But they indicate that homeowner defensiveness is critical.

"Clearance and hardening of homes is critical," said Riverside County Fire Chief John Hawkins. "Fuelbreaks are important if they are well designed and maintained."

The Forest Service received a surge of funding following the 2003 fire siege in Southern California. More than \$30 million was directed to the San Bernardino National Forest for hazardous fuel reduction. Westridge, Southridge and Pine Cove fuelbreaks were all re-established and improved.

But funds for regular maintenance have not been allocated in the five to seven years since that work occurred. Minnich thinks the San Jacinto forest is too dense and needs substantial clearing. Some, such as Halsey, question the confidence placed in fuelbreaks when he says the Station Fire in 2009 jumped every fulebreak while burning in just dry vegetation.

Without financial support, Minnich's recommendation for a permanent saw mill in Garner Valley would unlikely be sustainable. Which is why homeowners and residents must be more cognizant of their own responsibility to reduce the threat of fire damaging their domiciles.

California Public Resources Code 4291 requires defensible space out 100 feet from homes and structures. Halsey says 300 feet is better. He also thinks local governments need to employ zoning ordinances more effectively to avoid development in fire-prone areas or to only permit cluster housing rather than single homes randomly spread out. "In some places, it is not reasonable to put houses there, especially the big tract type," Halsey emphasized. "If it's fuelbreaks or vents, I'd go with vents."

"There's a difference between the wildland urban interface, like Idyllwild, and the inter-mixing areas such as Poppet Flats," said Hawkins.

Idyllwild Fire Chief Patrick Reitz says he will be looking for more maintenance or abatement throughout the year.

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

Fire, conflict and loving the Hill

Last Friday morning I hiked the Ernie Maxwell trail. Near Humber Park I came across a 6-inch wide ember crater. There were many more black embers easily visible for several hundred yards along that part of the trail.

There's no doubt Idyllwild was saved from catastrophe during the Mountain Fire, and I'm relieved and grate-

The recent "paid political" advertisements in this paper are a painful reminder of another long-burning fire on the Hill, and of a conflict that we all must do a more skillful job to resolve. I spoke to Chief Reitz and two commissioners to resolve my own questions and I hope you will do the same. Conflict seems necessary for change, but responding to either without honest, factual discourse isn't skillful.

I encourage everyone who feels gratitude for the first responders on the Hill to become even better informed, write a supporting letter to this paper and/or to our elected officials, take the risk of learning the details of the opposing points of view and, if you are comfortable, engage in the discussion of how to best resolve our conflict over Idvllwild Fire Protection District.

The individuals we have elected to serve are willing to take the risk of making tough decisions on our behalf. Some of us may disagree with those choices. Based on 10 years observation of Hill conflict — and participation in it in some cases -— it is my opinion that, as a community, we can no longer afford conflict resolution by public flogging. We are better than that.

Bludgeoning scapegoats might sell papers, but is it worth the cost of ruined reputations and businesses and, by extension, the safety and economy of the Hill? The IFPD conflict means more than whether this paper stays in business in its current tabloid format.

Chief Reitz shared a story with me from his personal experience of a small-town paper in central Oregon that doesn't do controversy and has a waiting list for paid advertising.

Could the Town Crier more effectively serve both itself and the Hill by resisting the urge to fan a wildfire of necessary conflict and instead promoting the heat and light of honest, factual discourse?

Historic voter records available

Historians, researchers, and people exploring genealogy will have an new window to the past thanks to a new law Secretary of State Debra Bowen sponsored and the governor approved last Friday.

California voter rolls will be available to the public after 100 years. Personal identifiers, such as Social Security and drivers license numbers, were not used in voter registration until 1994, and waiting 100 years to open these records ensures that no living individual's information will be vulnerable to identity theft.

"No matter how old voter registration records are, state law really limits who can look at these historical treasures," said Bowen. "Most often, people want access to old voter rolls to study their family history, so this bill makes that possible while protecting the privacy of current voters."

Each county Registar of Voters office maintains voter registration records containing historical information such as the date of birth, address, occupation, and in some cases the country of origin, and physical characteristics of each voter such as height, hair color and distinguishing

A primer in the new national healthcare act

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act was signed into law by President Obama in March 2010. The law provides for sweeping changes in the way consumers purchase healthcare coverage and the way insurance companies provide coverage. Some provisions of the act have already taken effect, with more provisions taking effect over the next several years. Most of the changes are set to take effect on Jan. 1, 2014.

Given the complexity of the act and its broad application, it may help to visit the sites included for reference. Several websites do a good job in detailing the changes for a broader explanation.

California was the first state to enact legislation creating a health benefit exchange under the act. Individuals and small business owners may find the Covered California website (www.coveredca.com) helpful in comparing plans and purchasing health insurance.

Below are some scenarios and the effect the implementation of the Jan. 1, 2014, act provisions will have.

1. No health insurance (male or female/under \$24,000 income/59 or younger/one-person household):

- May be eligible for health coverage through Medicaid. It pays for services such as preventive healthcare, doctor and hospital visits, and some medicine.
- · California has expanded Medicaid coverage. Visit www.dhcs.ca.gov for qualification information.
- 2. No health insurance (male or female/income \$33,000-\$62,000/59 or younger/two-person household):
- · More healthcare options are available through the Health Insurance Marketplace. Shop online, compare plans, and explore available financial help.
- More payment options through Covered California (www.coveredca.com) in the form of tax credits and subsidies.
- Expanded coverage for a variety of healthcare services (including, but not limited to, doctor visits, emergency room care and laboratory services) and expanded preventative care (health screenings and tests for breast or cervical cancer, diabetes).
- · Cannot be denied coverage for a pre-existing condition.
- Cannot be dropped from a plan due to illness.
- · No annual or lifetime dollar limits.
- Children can remain on the plan until they reach age 26 even if they don't live at home, even if they are married and even if they attend school.
 - · Limits on co-pays, co-insurance and deductibles.

3. Employer-provided health insurance.

- · No annual or lifetime dollar limits on what the insurance company will pay for most medical bills.
- · Cannot be denied coverage because of pre-existing conditions.
- Children can remain on the plan until they reach age 26 even if they don't live at home, even if they are married and even if they attend school.
 - · Limits on co-pays, co-insurance and deductibles.
- More preventative care including, but not limited to, health screenings and tests for colon cancer, diabetes and heart disease.

4. Medicare-insured (male/female, 65 or older/\$24,000 to \$46,000/one-person household):

- Keep the current coverage.
- · Bonuses to primary care doctors and nurses for providing quality care.
 - Medicare Advantage Consumer Protections.
- More preventive care at no additional cost, including, but not limited to, annual wellness exams, bone mass measurements, flu shots and mammograms.
 - · May save money on prescription drugs.

coverage. They do not need to buy additional coverage through the Health Insurance Marketplace.

Visit www.healthlawanswers.aarp.org/?cmp=RDRCT-HLA_JUN13_013 to see how the healthcare law will apply based on each circumstance.

Individuals

For individuals, penalties apply for not securing healthcare coverage. Starting in 2014, the penalty is 1 percent of your annual income or \$95, whichever is greater; by 2016, the penalty is 2.5 percent of your annual income or \$695, whichever is greater. This applies to most people over age 18 not covered under their parents' plan.

Businesses with more than 50 employees receive a one-year extension to Jan. 1, 2015. The delay is designed to simplify the new reporting requirements. It also gives businesses time to adapt to the new health coverages and reporting systems.

For employers with 50 employees or fewer, significant changes take effect Jan. 1, 2014. As a small business owner in California, use the Covered California website (www. coveredca.com) to apply for coverage, compare plans and enroll. Apply as early as Oct. 1, 2013 for health coverage to take effect Jan. 1, 2014.

Covered California gives access to more plans by creating a small business insurance pool. This gives businesses the ability to shop qualified insurance plans and compare and contrast coverages and premium rates.

The act groups health plans into four categories: bronze, silver, gold and platinum. Gold and platinum plans cover the highest percentage of healthcare expenses.

The employer selects the category and how much they will contribute. This can be a fixed amount or percentage of the total cost to the employee. Employees then select the plan that best meets their needs. Employer costs depend on the category selected, the employer's contribution to the premium, and whether or not the employer elects to contribute to family or dependent care.

Self-employed with no employees are not eligible for the small business program, but would be eligible for

The good news is that small business owners may qualify for a tax credit to offset their employees' premium payment. There are two phases of tax credits. Starting in 2010 and lasting through tax year 2013, there is a tax credit for businesses with fewer than 25 full-time equivalent employees paid an average annual salary of less than \$50,000. During this first phase, qualifying employers can receive a tax credit of up to 35 percent of premium expenses (25 percent for nonprofits).

Starting in 2014, the maximum tax credit increases to up to 50 percent (35 percent for nonprofits) and is available for a total of two consecutive years. Generally, businesses with 10 or fewer full-time equivalent employees and wages averaging less than \$25,000 a year will qualify for the highest credits. To qualify for any tax credit, employers must pay at least 50 percent of employee premium

• Important: Those with Medicare should not drop their costs, according to coveredca.com. For more information and instructions on claiming a credit, visit www.irs.gov/ uac/Small-Business-Health-Care-Tax-Credit-for-Small-

> Employers already providing coverage to their employees may have a "grandfathered" plan if their plan was in existence on March 23, 2010. Check plan documents or speak with the health plan administrator to determine if the existing plan qualifies. Grandfathered plans must end lifetime limits on coverage, end arbitrary cancellations, and cover adult children to age 26.

> Employers should provide employees with a Summary of Benefits and Coverage and hold the insurance company accountable to spend premiums on healthcare, not administrative costs and salaries. Insurance companies not meeting the 80/20 rule requiring them to spend at least 80 percent of premiums on healthcare and failing to justify rate increases over 10 percent, may give employers entitlement to a rebate.

> Some employers are considering reducing employee hours to avoid exposure under the Act. According to Gary Kushner, a Portage, Mich.-based benefits expert, "I would not recommend reducing your employees' hours [to avoid the ACA mandate] without getting a signed letter from your benefits attorney first."

> Further, James Napoli, a benefits attorney at New York-based Proskauer and leader of the firm's Healthcare Reform Task Force, advises, "If you plan to reduce the hours of an employee who regularly works 40 hours a week to 29 hours or less per week, then you have to ask yourself whether these employees had a right to healthcare benefits under the previous arrangement.

> "If the employee can prove you did this to avoid the ACA requirements and penalties, it could be a section 510 violation." Section 510 refers to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act (ERISA). Steele ties for 11th at Greensboro

Brendan Steele scored his second consecutive top-15 on the PGA Tour last week in the Wyndham Championship in Greensboro, N.C. The Idyllwild native posted a 9-under-par 71-67-66-67—271, earning a tie for 11th place, 63 FedEx Cup points and \$116,600 in official prize money.

He scored 20 birdies against nine bogeys and one double last week, the unfortunate double bogey coming on his 72nd hole. Those two extra shots cost him a top-5 finish, about 40 FedEx Cup points, and around \$70,000 in prize

Entrance into the third and fourth tournaments of the series will depend upon his performance in the first two.

Steele will tee it up Thursday in the \$8 million The Barclays on the Liberty National Golf Club course in Jersey City, N.J. The winner's share of the prize money will be more than \$1.4 million.

- 2. Cease filling or refilling swimming pools, except that a small amount of water may be used to replace evaporation losses in a filled pool; and

IFPD actively involved in recent fires

The spate of recent fires dominated the discussion at the recent Idyllwild Fire Protection District commission meeting. IFPD was very busy during each of them, Chief Patrick Reitz reported. Often the department was receiving more than two calls per minute with questions about the fires' status.

While IFPD was a cooperating agency during the Mountain Fire, two employees were assigned to the Incident Management Team as trainees.

"Everything operated seamlessly," Reitz emphasized. "Everyone was part of the team. You didn't know where one uniform stopped and another began."

The department hosted six strike teams (30 engines) and several hand crews, according to Reitz. Volunteer Company 621 served more than 1,400 personnel during the fire.

IFPD was the initial attack on the Strong Fire, which was held to less than 2 acres. Reitz highlighted the help that Fern Valley Water District and Riverside County Transportation provided during this incident. However, the number of bystanders congregating to watch the fire created a safety issue, he told the commission.

During the Silver Fire, IFPD crews, including volunteers, helped support the nearby county fire stations in Garner Valley and Pine Cove.

commission President Jeannine Charles-Stigall. "I saw a great appreciation for all fire agencies."

In financial matters, Reitz reported that the 2012-13 year-end report was not available and he hoped to have the results for the next commission meeting on Aug. 27.

The Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved the district's request for a \$400,000 advance of its December property tax receipts. In addition, the supervisors approved a request from Third District Supervisor Jeff Stone to provide \$6,000 to IFPD to help match a grant request for protective clothing for the volunteer

According to Reitz, an agreement has been reached to lease a tower site at the fire station. The amount

was not announced, but the transaction is in escrow. Previously, Reitz indicated IFPD was asking for at least

Commissioner Jerry Buchanan reported that he is developing the proposal for a Budget and Financial Committee, which was previously authorized. Tentatively, he foresees it composed of two commission members, the fire chief and a couple of public members and hopes it can be available for the next commission meeting.

Another career employee has agreed to repayment of excess health benefits, Reitz reported. He has obtained agreements from eight of the nine employees.

The new financial services consultant, Robert Dennis, a Rancho Cucamonga certified public accountant, has begun working with the department, he told the commission. "I expect a full transition completed over the next couple of weeks," Reitz said.

During the discussion of possible future agenda items, such as board policies and a memorandum of agreement with the Mile High Radio Club regarding operation of WNKI, the chief recommended that the agenda for the Sept. 10 meeting be devoted exclusively to the 2013-14 budget and its adoption before Oct. 1.

"I'll expand my presentation to take this time to address questions and concerns in a very clear fashion," he told the commission. "I'd like to focus solely on the budget at that meeting." The commission agreed.

In future years, Reitz said, "My personal goal is to "I'm very proud of the community," commented adopt the budget before July 1. I'm hopeful and optimistic in the future we can make that happen."

PC water use declines in July

Total 2013 water production for the Pine Cove Water District is 2.7 percent more than the comparable seven-month 2012 period.

"Production for July was 3.5 million gallons, a little bit less than the past two years," General Manager Jerry Holldber told the board. "In the past, you could always count on 4.5 to 5 million gallons used in July. Between conservation and fewer people, there's less water consumption."

The July production was about 90,000 gallons less than June and 230,000 less than July 2012.

PCWD's monitoring well level fell 1 foot in July compared to a 4-foot drop in June, he reported.

In addition, the pipeline installation along Ponderosa Road has been completed, despite needing extra time because of the discovery of several huge rocks below the surface, according to Holldber. The work on Gail Road is progressing and the Highway 243 portion will begin after Labor Day.

During the winter months, depending upon the weather, Holldber hopes to extend the pipeline along Pine Cove Road and the Oakleaf extension.


Board President Michael Esnard told his colleagues that Riverside County Third District Supervisor Jeff Stone has not made a decision about PCWD's request for fire hydrant funds from County Service Area 38.

In a letter last month, Esnard recommended that the supervisor authorize the use of \$28,000 from the CSA 38 balance to acquire 10 new fire hydrants and PCWD would install them. This would complement the installation of the new pipelines.

"We think this an appropriate use of these funds, since CSA 38 money has been used to buy district fire hydrants in the past, and CSA 38 began in the effort to supply the fire protection for this district," Esnard wrote in his letter. "... All hydrants are located in CSA 38."

For the first half of 2013, the district's production was 8 percent greater than the same period in 2012. Firefighters' need for water during the Mountain Fire contributed to an increase in July, General Manager Steve Erler told the board.

"It was reassuring that water was available," Director Robert Krieger noted.

Well levels fell slightly in August; the largest was a 1.2-foot decrease for well no. 8, he reported. Compared to summer 2012, well levels throughout the district are about 1 to 5 feet lower.

Another portion of the re-In July 2012, well water cent production increases have 5 percent.

Tank no. 11, which is now 64 percent full, Erler said. The tank's capacity is 3 million gallons. He also reported that as the tank has returned to the distribution system, the office has received no complaints about the water taste.

In financial business, the board also reviewed its 2012-13 budget results, which ended on June 30. The final income totals were 6 percent more than projected, a net increase of about \$65,000. Tax revenue was \$40,000 more than the expected total and water sales revenue was up

District expenses were 86 percent of the projected budget, or about \$115,000 less. Both employee benefits and general engineering were nearly \$25,000 under budget.

In other business, Erler said he anticipates that the pipeline project on Fern Valley Road will be completed before September. Most of the pipeline installation is finished and water samples are being tested before the new construction is connected to the distribution system. Road resurfacing should begin soon, he added.

County approves tank site for IWD

At Tuesday's meeting, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved a lease agreement between the Idyllwild Water District and the county Regional Park and Open-space District.

The agreement allows IWD to construct a 300,000-gallon storage tank on a 150-foot square pad, which will be on park property in Idyllwild west of Delano Road. The tank will not be seen from the campgrounds.

IWD will provide the Park and Open-space District with additional fire hydrants and new service capabilities.

"IWD will proceed with completing the CEQA [California Environmental Quality Act] at the public hearing meeting on Aug. 21 and request approval for the tank and pipeline proposals," wrote IWD General Manager Terry Lyons. "This tank will

provide the Tollgate customers the additional water storage for improved water supply and increased fire protection."

The new storage facility will enable IWD to improve its service in its Tollgate zone and assure adequate water to the Idyllwild Arts Academy, who provided new service fees in advance to assist in the cost of tank construction.

IWD will be responsible for all studies, permits and inspections needed to build and operate the storage structure. The lease is for 25 years and can be extended.

At its July meeting, the IWD board approved a contract with Lilburn Corporation of San Bernardino to conduct the CEQA evaluation of the site. An initial draft report should be available at the public hearing and the final documentation should be available within three months.


What about feeding wild animals? Where do we draw the line? Is it OK to feed birds, squirrels and raccoons but not covotes?

DFW says feeding birds isn't really in their best interest. They get a better diet if they forage for food varieties found in their natural environment. Having said that, DFW also offers suggestions for making it a safer experience for the birds since we get so many positive benefits from watching those who visit our feeders. It's important to carefully consider the location of feeders so the birds don't slam into windows or provide game for neighborhood cats.

Many mountain residents have learned the hard way about feeding raccoons. They can be demanding in their expectations once you've started giving them food and downright destructive to property if their meal isn't provided when they want it.

I'm leading up to something that has a much greater impact on the safety of our own pets, our small children and other wildlife. A friend told me about a neighbor who

Speaking of the fire, we might see more wildlife coming into our area in its aftermath. The California Department of Fish and Wildlife and others knowledgeable of animal behavior warn that we should not feed wild animals as they try to establish their new territories.

University of California, Davis, Wildlife Health Center Co-director William Boyce says the best thing for all the animals in burned areas is to leave them alone: "There still are areas that provide food, water and cover, and the wild animals can and will find them."






Wednesday that week, we decided to send Glenn home to Idyllwild to evacuate our house so that Phyllis could enjoy time with us alone on the road.

The Reffegees have been to many other jazz festivals, such as Long Beach, Jazz West and Pasadena. They tend to be more commercial, "... not so much selling here." At Idyllwild they find the venues more comfortable and different with friendlier crowds and no need to worry about "good" seats, he stressed.

On Sunday, Reffegee, again at the head of the line, said, "We enjoyed [Saturday's entertainment] tremendously." Harvey Mason's Chameleon Project and Diane Schuur were two of their favorites.

This well-received attitude was again revealed at the gate. Jazz Chair Marsha Lytle said two weeks ago that the advance sell of tickets was the best in several years and the sale of tickets at the gate re-enforced the festival's popularity this year.

"It was very good," Lytle said with anticipation. "The final analysis will be after the bills are paid. But I think it is good compared to last year."

Popular vendors such as Big Dev's and Sacher's Foods returned again, but the Associates of Idyllwild Arts added a major new offering — ice cream. Coldstone Creamery was located near the entrance to the French Quarter, and they were very happy with the patronage.

The warm temperatures not only encouraged ice cream consumption, but the mimosa and margaritas were again very popular ways to cool off.

Diane Kurr made sure she had plenty of mix and was able to provide dozens of consumers on both days.

Not only were the vendors satisfied with their success this year, but the performers were overwhelmed with the receptions they received.

"It so wonderful, I want to stay for three weeks," John Daversa told the Holmes Amphitheatre crowd. Many, including local Casey Abrams, said they were already anticipating the 21st festival in 2014.
