

Emergency service group discusses road repairs

t the March 13
Mountain Emergency Service Committee meeting, Caltrans
Maintenance Supervisor
Jody Mueller alerted the
group to the work being
done on Highway 74, east
of the Cranston Ranger
Station. The eastbound lane
has formed a noticeable
bump since last summer's
repaving.

A recent survey of the nearby terrain found an alarming movement in the soil. Consequently, a Caltrans geologist has been overseeing the work, which will include the construction of a French drain to divert water from the area.



On Saturday, Skanska, of Los Angeles, a Caltrans contractor, was working on repairing Highway 74 just east of the Cranston Ranger Station. The work also includes stabilization of the slope along the highway.

These repairs began Friday and will continue this week between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. Reversible, one-way traffic control will be in effect during the work hours.

The \$750,000 emergency project is needed to stabilize the slope that was undermined during the recent rain event. The

Two arrested for Pinyon triple homicide

n Tuesday, March 11, investigators from the Riverside County Sheriff's Department Central Homicde Unit arrested both Cristin Smith and Robert Pape. The following day, both men were charged with the 2006 triple murder of Jon Hayward, 55, Vicki Friedli, 53, and Vicki's daughter, Becky Friedli, 18, in Pinyon Pines.

"I'm elated. Very, very happy, finally after seven-and-ahalf years," said Ron Friedli, Becky's father and Vicki's former husband. On Tuesday afternoon, Ron received a telephone call telling him about the arrests. He just had finished testifying before a criminal grand jury convened to investigate the case.

The death penalty may be invoked for one of the suspects if eventually found guilty.

Pape is Becky's former boyfriend. Ron speculated that Pape's motive was Becky's breaking off of their relationship. "They had dated about a year earlier and he broke it off for another girl," said Ron. In the spring of 2006, he wanted to resume the relationship.

While dating, the other girl re-entered the picture, according to Ron. Escaping the situation, Becky went to live with her half-sister, but eventually returned to her mother's home in Pinyon.

"If I can't have her, no one can," is how Ron described his interpretation of Pape's motive.

Office stated that Haywood died from a 12-gauge shot-gun wound to the chest. Vicki's death was caused from a wound to the head, possibly from a Glock handgun.

In October 2007, both a 12-gauge shotgun and a Glock handgun were found during a search of one of the suspect's homes.

Hayward's and Vicki's bodies were found inside the burning house. Becky's burning body was found in a wheelbarrow outside.

Measles outbreak growing

The statewide outbreak of measles has worsened in the past month, enough so that Riverside County has issued a Measles Health Advisory.

As of March 14, 32 measles cases have been reported in California. Of these, five cases have been reported in Riverside

In 2013, at this time, only three cases had been reported throughout the

state and no cases were by a cough, runny nose, reported in the county.

Cases have been reported in neighboring counties of Los Angeles, Orange and San Diego.

Health professionals recommend that unvaccinated residents traveling to countries where measles is circulating should receive the mumps/measles/rubella vaccine before they go.

Any individual with County since February a fever and rash should consider measles as a possibility. Symptoms begin with a fever that lasts for a couple of days, followed com.

We didn't know where she was," Arnson said.

But the helicopter found a trail below the divide south of the mountaintop Tram Station. She was at about side Mountain Rescue Unit the 8,500-foot elevation, according to the sheriff's press release.

Once they got to her, the rescuers knew she couldn't walk out, especially since night was approaching. After calling for the aviation unit to return, they did walk her to a flat, open area. There, they reconfigured the equipment and all three individuals were hoisted into the helicopter in "one swoop," Arnson related.

The helicopter flew her to the tram's Palm Spring parking lot where her husband was awaiting for her.

"She refused the hospital 70-year-old female on the trip," Arnson said. The next day, Thursday, she called to thank him and confirmed that she had declined the hospital visit.



We hope to make the move within the next two months.



TAX TIPS

Charitable contributions ...

Americans are the most charitable people in the world, as evidenced by records of our annual charitable giving. Congress has been very generous in the passage of laws regulating deductions for charitable giving. Consult IRS



Publication 526 for regulations governing the many aspects of charitable giving and the required documentation.

In order to be deductible, a donation must be made to a tax-qualified IRC Section 501(c)(3) charity. Donations to individuals, political groups, social and sports clubs, unions, lobby groups, homeowners associations and most foreign organizations are not deductible. "Donations" to your children are similarly not deductible.

Out-of-pocket expenses while volunteering for a

qualified organization are deductible, as is mileage at 14 cents per mile. Your time is not an expense and is not deductible.

No deduction is allowed unless the taxpayer has either bank records of the contribution or a written acknowledgement of the gift from the charity. Those giving cash will need an acknowledgement. Contributions of \$250 or more in one day to one organization require written substantiation from the charity. A canceled check is not sufficient.

For non-cash contributions (stuff) of \$250 to \$500, a written acknowledgement from the charity is required. The form must contain the name and address of the organization, date and location of the contribution, and description of the donation.

Annual contributions greater than \$500 require that Form 8283 be filled out with the above information. Plus, for individual contributions of more than \$500, you must list date and method of acquisition and your cost basis.

Congress members always write down the purchase date and amount paid on everything they buy so they expect you to do, too.

Contributions of more than \$5,000 require a qualified written appraisal unless it is of publicly traded securities. It is better to donate appreciated securities to a charitable organization directly versus selling the securities, paying tax and donating the difference. That way the charity receives the full benefit of the securities and you get a bigger deduction

Capital-gain property donated to a qualified organization generates a deduction equal to its fair market value at the time of donation whereas ordinary income property is limited to adjusted basis in the property.

The donation of a car has its own special regulations that restrict the deduction to the amount the charity receives when the car is sold at auction. You must receive written confirmation of this value on Form 1098-C. Cars the charity uses for its stated purpose may receive higher deductions.

I have just scratched the surface of the numerous rules governing charitable donations. You will want to discuss these rules with your tax professional and consult Publication 526 before proceeding.

Don't be scammed

A troubled economy and high unemployment have taken their toll. The average American, drowning in debt and worrying every time the telephone rings, is ripe for scammers who have found a clever way to exploit this angst.

On March 13, the Federal Trade Commission initiated action against third-party debt collection company Federal Check Processing and its related companies. Representatives of the company contacted consumers with claims of check fraud or other criminal acts, and threatened legal action, including prison and bank account seizure; even claiming to be federal or state officers. Even when the consumer did not owe the money, the collectors were not deterred from their intimidation tactics.

Under the Fair Debt Collection Practices Act, consumers have rights. If the debt is legitimate, verify that the collector is legitimate by contacting the creditor to establish if the debt was assigned to the company initiating the contact.

The federal government will not attempt to collect unpaid loans. A legitimate collection agency will not ask that money be wired or loaded on a rechargeable money card either. In every instance, ascertain the name of the company calling and verify its validity.

Idyllwild Fire to develop strategic plan

During its March 11 meeting, the Idyllwild Fire Commission discussed the prospects of conducting a strategic planning exercise in the future.

Several commissioners, Fire Chief Patrick Reitz, his assistant Sherry Edwards and Ruth Wick, head of Volunteer Company 621, attended a 5-day strategic planning class the previous

Commissioner Rhonda Andrewson thought the class

was phenomenal and urged Commission President Jerry Buchanan, who also attended, to appoint a strategic planning committee by the April or May meetings. He also indicated that the process would yield benefits for the District.

"I'd like us to begin to move ahead," he agreed. "The first step is planning the plan with the Chief or a committee."

This action will be discussed further at the April meeting, but Commissioners Nancy Layton, who was the third attendee at the class,

and Andrewson indicated he said. "And we might be they would volunteer to lead the effort. However, it may be several months before it actually begins.

Before the Fire Department initiates the planning effort, Chief Reitz said he hoped to bring the instructor to Idyllwild for the benefit of other Hill agencies and nonprofit organizations. He thought late summer or fall was a likely time to begin the exercise.

"Before we jump into a District strategic plan, I'd like to see training for additional folks in this organization and others," he recommended to the Commission. "I'd love to have the Finance Committee volunteers bring him here sooner rather than later and make him available to other agencies on the Hill."

In addition, Reitz encouraged the Commission to find a community member, outside of the Department, who could lead the planning process. "I think this would add validity. They would look at it from a different angle than one of us would," perceived as steering the process as opposed to facilitating process.

"We could start a strategic planning process as soon as we get done with training," Reitz affirmed. "I'm thinking August or September."

In other action, the Board amended its public complaint process to emphasize that "At no time is a Board member to become involved in the investigation or further gathering information about the complaint, especially if it involves personnel." And the Commission completed its self-evalua-

Layton, who is also the Treasurer, announced that the District had about \$355,000 in bank accounts. This amount includes the \$218,000 from the sale of the cell tower lease.

Chief Reitz had no further comment on the personnel investigation, although he hoped to have a draft of the report this week.

On June 1, the Town Crier will move to the former Ponderosa building located at the corner of North Circle Drive and Cedar Street, two buildings away from its current location at 54425 North Circle Dr. The move to a larger space will give the newspaper and Visitors Center additional room for its operations. Pine Cove declares water emergency effective April 1

Pine Cove Water District directors unanimously approved the declaration of a water shortage emergency plan. Immediately, General Manager Jerry Holldber proclaimed a Water Conservation Stage 1, which requires voluntary compliance, effective April 1.

Concern over lack of water was not Holldber's reason for recommending the Water emergency action.

"We're not running out of water and we have not sold a water meter in the last four or five years," Holldber said. "The State is making a recommendation to cutback 20 percent, but I'm not saying cutback. But be aware and use wisely."

Holldber stressed that this action would not penalize retirees or single parents. In stages 2 and 3, users of more than 18,000 gallons would begin to see higher rates.

Speaking at the public hearing, Norm Cassen, Pine Cove resident and district customer, urged the board to reject the declaration.

"I thought there was plenty of water. What about the new wells?" he asked. "There's so little usage." Cassen recommended better communication between the District and its customers. "More than just a newsletter every two months along with the bill," he said. "Real conservation takes more than rationing."

He also urged the District to apply for grants being funding from the State's recent drought emergency legislation.

The directors did not hesitate and said their action was the prudent step.

"The first step is educational," stressed Director Robert Hewitt. "While I'm hearing at meetings we're ok, I'm getting nervous. To not do this would be negligent and incompetent. We don't have a crystal ball."

During the first two months of 2014, PCWD produced 4.1 million gallons of water compared to 4.9 million in 2013. While total production last year increased 2.3 percent more than 2012 and much of that occurred in January and February, the 2014 production for these two months was nearly 900,000 gallons (17.5 percent) less.

The District's static well no. 10 dropped 5 feet since the beginning of the year. In normal years, the well may drop during the fall and early winter, but it recovers in spring, which is unlikely this year due to the lack of rain or snow, Holldber predicted.

Later in the week, Lee Arnson of Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit confirmed the unlikelihood of well replenishment this spring. During a recent flight over the Hill, he saw only patches of snow near Saddle Junction. While the peak was covered, it was not deep, he noted.

To disperse the demand on the District's well sources, Holldber indicated he planned to restart the District's plant at Dutch Flats in order to use the water from those wells.

The possibility of adding the Stonewood community to PCWD's customer base will still be pursued. A letter inviting those residents to a meeting to discuss and then explain the costs associated with a possible annexation

What Pine Cove Water customers should know about Stage 1

Stage 1 is **voluntary compliance**. Customers are asked to conserve, when possible, the amount of water used to that amount necessary for domestic and business purposes. Fix leaky plumbing, prevent irrigation runoff, refrain from washing down sidewalks, driveways and parking areas and avoid sprinkling unplanted areas for dust control. Customers are encouraged to utilize wood chips and mulch around all plants and trees to minimize outside watering.

was mailed Monday, March 17.

In response to a Director's question, Holldber assured the board that if the annexation occurred it would have no effect on the District's water supply.

"They have their own well and tank?" asked Director Dee Eskew. "So we're not giving up any Pine Cove water?"

Holldber agreed with Eskew on both points. "It's a negative impact if they join us," he emphasized.







Cate overcomes early struggles to make art her life

Cate. Not Cate plus a last name, not Cate plus a symbol. It's simply, legally, Cate.

Art did not come easy to the local resident. Talent was not the issue; her parents were. At an early age, Cate impressed her teachers with her natural ability. "My first experience at doing art was looking through a microscope. My assignment was to produce this work, make a drawing of what you see. It was precise; every single cell was in place. It was amazing," said Cate. And while she wowed her instructors, her father, a CHP officer, was less than impressed, "My Dad said, 'You will make a great scientist someday."

And so it went for Cate. The joy of discovering her talent was tempered by the lack of acceptance from her parents. And despite winning art contests and the support of her teachers, her father was adamant. "My father said, 'No more art classes. You need to be taking college preparatory classes.' My art teacher talked to [my parents] and my Dad said, 'It's foolish and she can't make a living as an artist,' and [my teacher] said, 'Oh yes she can. She can do this. Even if it's graphic arts or fine arts, she can make a living at this."

Discouraged but not defeated, Cate's art teacher had a plan, "My art teacher said, 'You know your parents won't let you take any more of my classes, so I want you in my art club.' From that point on he took me under his wing and he showed me everything that he knew. I was able to participate as a club member."

This next period of her life Cate calls her medieval or dark ages, a period when art was absent from her life. Attending Pepperdine in 1965, Cate majored in psychology and had planned to be a teacher; she says she managed to tolerate the conservative rhetoric and blatant misogyny prevalent at the university at that time. Instead, she married, had two daughters and moved to Portland, Ore., but after 12 years, the couple split

two daughters.

Her renaissance period came when she met Jim Tidwell, whom she would later marry. "[Jim] asked me after we got married, What do you really want to with your life?' At the time I was the manager of a bank. I had come up through the banking world and I was corporate." Tidwell adds, "Never was the fit so poor. Although Cate was good at numbers and finance — high-finance and she's a very good manager ... operations and the routine machinery of banking were a terrible fit."

When Tidwell asked Cate again what she wanted

leaving Cate to raise her to do with her life, the response was immediate. "I so want to be an artist," she answered. Tidwell, an architect with a prestigious Portland firm responsible for designing Pioneer Square, gave Cate her first assignment. While the couple were visiting California, [Jim] said, 'My firm would love to see some pictures

it and at that time it was relatively new, so I took some architectural pictures and they were kind of not conventional," Cate said. "I did a presentation for about 20 architects and they just loved it."

Southern California where Cate went back to school, attending art classes at California State University, Fullerton and Long Beach, where she earned her degree. "At the time, I was taking seven studio classes and getting straight A's. I was so saturated and so in love with what I was doing," she said, smiling.

After graduation, she did some wedding photography and graphic arts, which she hated. Cate, always eager to explore many forms of art, became a tailor for a time. She also did a stint in film working for Viacom, doing set design and staging for LL Cool J's first rock video. And, she made a cult film in 1991 starring Mark Hamill and Apollonia Kotero, called Black Magic Woman, but Hollywood wasn't a good fit for her either. I couldn't cope with the Hollywood thing: 'In five minutes, make it happen," she explained.

Entering her enlightenment period, Cate has one regret: "One of the things that I really regret is not having established myself earlier ...

"Photography was always there; I like doing that sort of thing. I'm a of the Crystal Cathedral' painter. I love oils, [I'm]

fast. I can't mess with it. I can draw," she said.

With her renaissance period ending, Cate is more focused than ever on her art. She joined the Art Alliance of Idyllwild The couple relocated to three or four years ago. "This year is kind of cool because [AAI is] doing a lot more to get the artists together, which is really intimidating and at the same time kind of exciting," Cate said. "[R.A. Ross-Clunis] has been very helpful in getting me started in the art community here because I would have just pretended that we didn't exist [laughs]. I think most artists are kind of like that." Cate's photograph, entered in the juried Eye of the Artist event on March 8, won third place.

Student truancy is Attorney General Harris' target

About five months after issuing a report on the consequences — economic and personal — of truancy, California Attorney General Kamala D. Harris and State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson and four state legislators have proposed a package of legislation to encourage the reduction of elementary school truancy throughout the state.

Not only is a child's future success diminished because of truancy, but Harris' September report found state school district lost about \$1.4 billion in 2010-2011 from student absences. Riverside County school districts lost about \$111.9 million.

According to the report, elementary school truancy is at the root of the state's chronic criminal justice problems, and missing large amounts of school is one of the strongest predictors of dropping-out, even more so than suspensions or test scores. Annually, dropouts cost California taxpayers an estimated \$46.4 billion in incarceration, lost productivity and lost taxes.

For these reasons, Attorney General Harris said "The California Constitution guarantees every child the right to an education, yet we are failing our youngest children, as early as kindergarten. These are children as young as five years old who are out of school, falling behind, and too many of them never catch up. This crisis is not only crippling for our economy, it is a basic threat to achievement of their core amounts of school is one of public safety."

Consequently, Harris and Torlakson, State Senator Bill Monning and Assemblymembers Raul Bocanegra, Rob Bonta, Joan Buchanan, Isadore Hall and Chris Holden announced their sponsorship of five bills that will help schools, parents and government effectively intervene when children are chronically absent, and improve local school districts' and counties' abilities to track attendance patterns.

The legislation will assist schools and counties as they work with parents to address the core reasons behind truancy and chronic absence. For example, one bill will require that when a parent or student is referred to district attorney's office or any other agency engaged in prosecution enforcing state school attendance laws, the prosecuting agency must provide a report on the outcome of the referral. This will help school officials determine which outcomes are effective and guarantees baseline information sharing between referring agencies and prosecutors.

Local school districts and counties will be provided tools to comply with attendance tracking requirements in the Local Control Funding Formula, state truancy mandates and state and federal reporting requirements. Another of the bills will require that every county create a School Attendance Review Board to provide training, guidance and oversight to school district SARBs within a county to ensure consistency and

mission— improved attendance.

Both state and local systems for tracking and preventing truancy and chronic absence will be substantially improved. California is one of only four states in the country that does not currently collect student attendance data. This will allow local school districts to monitor and analyze attendance patterns,

the strongest predictors of falling behind academically and dropping out, even in early grades.

Students who don't read proficiently by the third grade are four times more likely not to receive a high school diploma than proficient readers, which puts them at risk of becoming a victim or perpetrator of crime. An increase of graduation rates by just 10 percent would result in a 20 percent drop in violent crime, and prevent 500 murders and more than 20,000 aggravated assaults per year in California.





Javier Garcia, a friend of Becky's, has said that she told him on the night of the murders that she was waiting for Pape and Smith. The three were going to take a hike.

Pape and Smith have claimed they decided not to hike that night. While they claimed their cell phones were off that night, "their cellular phone activity places them roughly in the proximity of the Friedli home before and after the time the victims were killed and the house set on fire, not near the locations they claimed to be at," according to the affidavit

The DA's release also adds, "a

business card was found [at the crime scene] on which investigators located DNA that matches Smith, who claims to have never been to the Friedli home. The chance that such a DNA match could happen at random is one in 320,000."

In December 2013, the Sheriff's Central Homicide Unit presented its case to the DA for a potential filing decision. After its review, the DA's office decided to constitute a criminal grand jury to review the case. The grand jury proceedings remain confidential until the indictments are unsealed, according to John Hall, senior public information specialist for the DA.

The murder counts for Hayward's and Vicki's deaths have enhancements of personal use of a firearm. A special circumstance allegation for both defendants also alleges multiple murders. That allegation makes Pape eligible for the death penalty, according to the DA's Office. DA Paul Zellerbach will make that decision later.

Smith was a 17-year-old juvenile at the time of the murder and therefore is not eligible for the death penalty, according to the DA's press release.

While Ron acknowledged that the fire probably destroyed significant evidence, which prolonged the investigation, he credited the work of private investigator Luis A. Bolaños, who has been investigating the case for more than two years, with helping to arrive at this step.

Bolaños said he used more

than 70 volunteers, and keeping the story in the forefront made a difference. Yet no one could explain why it took this many years to bring a charge.

"I knew this information right from the beginning — within two years," Bolaños said. "I received phone calls and some witnesses were never interviewed. I have no answer, but I'm glad with today's results."

Smith was arrested at the Palm Springs Airport and Pape arrested in Salton City. Both subjects were booked for homicide at the Robert Presley Detention Center in Riverside, according to Deputy Albert Martinez, public information officer for the Riverside County Sheriff's Department.






