### Local arrested on robbery charge

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department would not release the identity of the victim or target of the terrorist threats. The arrest was made at the corner of Ridgeview and Village drives Center early Monday afternoon, April 7.

He was booked into the Larry D. Smith Correctional Facility in Banning.

## Highway 74 temporarily closed Monday

Highway 74 was temporarily closed in both directions Monday morning, April 7. A landslide was detected in the area where Caltrans has been working for the past several weeks just east of the Cranston Forest Service Station near Valle Vista.

As of Monday afternoon, no further closures of the highway were planned, said Chief Terri Kasinga, Caltrans District 8 Public and Legislative Affairs. The abutments constructed in recent weeks at the site "held up most of the slide," she said.

Caltrans was able to clean the portion of the slide on the roadway and reopen it to traffic. Emergency work will continue and a Caltrans geologist will assess the slope, Kasinga reported.

Traffic was disrupted for several hours Monday morning, with many people stopped and turned around finding a different route to Hemet or to Idyllwild. Idyllwild School Principal Matt Kraemer was the first Idyllwild-bound Hemet driver stopped and had to detour through Bautista to get to school.

Only one Hemet Unified School District bus was affected, according to Mike Fogerty, director of transportation. "The special-needs bus got down the Hill then had to turn around and go through to Anza," he said. "The driver did stop at the Anza school to give the kids a rest. We were lucky it was only one bus."

The slope was damaged during the Cottonwood Fire last year," said Kasinga.

An Adventure Pass normally is required to park only on certain lands within these four forests.

### I-10 offramp closed in Banning

The Riverside County Transportation Department is doing work in Banning, closing the I-10 on- and off-ramps at Sunset Avenue until 8 p.m. Sunday, April 27.

The work involves relocating utilities, grading and repaving. The detours are: I-10 eastbound may exit at Sunset Avenue south to Lincoln and Westward; I-10 eastbound exit 22nd Street to Ramsey Street or Lincoln Street; and I-10 westbound exit 22nd Street to Ramsey Street or Lincoln Street.

### Arsonist undergoes medical exam

A Riverside County Superior Court judge has ordered a battery of medical assessments for Steven Taylor Rutherford, 48, of Banning. The doctor's report is expected back for a May 1

In February, Rutherford was charged with 13 felony counts of arson with enhancements, includ-

ing use of a delayed ignition device and having a prior arson conviction. The arson counts include the Mill Fire of June 2013 and one along Highway 243 near Mt. Edna Road.

He was previously convicted of arson in 1989. Former Idyllwild resident Jennifer Adamson said her stepfather, Neil Ellis Nickel, who was with the Cal Fire and Riverside County Fire Department, initially arrested Rutherford in 1989.

The Whitewater State Roadside Rest Area on Interstate 10 is open and ready to once again serve the public.

A \$90,000, four-month project to replace an outdated pump system is complete. Also, more than 1,000 feet of new electrical lines and conduit were installed. Maintenance general repairs to the two facilities and a fresh coat of paint was applied.



#### Fire muster April 26, climate changing daily ...

On Saturday, April 26, the public is invited to a festive and informative gathering in Idyllwild of people connected to fire prevention and firefighting. At no admission charge, we hope everyone will come and enjoy the activities.

The Fire Safety Muster is from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Idyllwild Community Center site in the center of town. There will be representatives and booths from all the agencies and related groups, along with demonstrations and lots of equipment. This event is designed as family friendly with lots of ways to interest and engage kids.

The last muster was two years ago. They are not easy to put together since they require so many different people and agencies and because spring is a time for firefighters to begin their training prior to fire season. But this year worked, and we will have what I am sure will be a great gathering.

If you attended the last one, you might remember that the U.S. Forest Service's K9 demonstration stole the show (a dog immobilizing the "bad" guy). That will be back. Given that Idyllwild is a town with a canine mayor, I am sure the dogs will be as popular as they were last time.

Another popular event is Idyllwild Fire extricating an "injured" person from a damaged vehicle.

Cal Fire and the Bureau of Land Management exhibits will be there, and the Forest Service will not only bring the K9 unit and Smokey Bear, but its many clever ways to engage kids with water and hoses.

The event's goal is to get everyone's attention regarding fire prevention. Residents and people who know the area are quite aware of the threat of wild-fire and what we need to do, but people new to the Hill are usually not, and some of us forget. More information about this event will be released as the time approaches.

Moving on to another topic, climate change is not going to make our fire prevention and suppression efforts any easier. A recent report from the California Natural Resources Agency entitled "Safeguarding California," an update on climate adaptation plans, states the widely held position that warmer temperatures bring more frequent large fires.

Climate changes currently affecting forests are "longer, hotter summers, changing water availability, the spread of invasive species, and more tree mortality due to the spread of pests that were previously kept in check by colder, longer winters."

Climate change for our mountains is very likely to produce higher-average temperatures, less snow and moisture in general, and more extreme weather events, which can be anything from exceptionally hot days to powerful thunderstorms.

Our recent winter, with a virtual absence of snow at the height of the season, fits this pattern. We have also seen two pests spread in our local forests this past decade. The Goldspotted oak borer is the invasive pest, while the Pine bark beetle is the native that has flourished in the warmer, drier seasons. We can expect dead trees to add to the dry fuel in the forest, increasing the severity of fire.

As we consider our own plans for fire safety, it seems prudent to expect the overall climate to increase risk, rather than diminish it.





Last Wednesday, Idyllwild residents awoke to a light blanket of snow. A few inches of white precipitation covered the multitude of local wildlife art stationed in the center of town. Through April 3, Idyllwild has received a total of 12.5 inches of rain, only 55 percent of the long-term average through March.

### Kindergarten registration soon

Hemet Unified School District kindergarten/ transitional kindergarten registration begins Tuesday, April 15, and continues through the spring and summer at the Centralized Registration Office, 2085 W. Acacia Avenue, between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday to Friday. Children must be 5 years old on or before Dec. 2, 2014, to register.

Bring evidence of birth date, two forms of verification of address (utility bill, lease agreement/mortgage documents), immunization records, dental screening/oral health assessment, physical examination report and

verification of parent/guardian identity.

If the child's immunizations are incomplete, make an appointment with a doctor or county health department immunization clinic and take existing records. HUSD Health Services also provide free immunizations during regular clinic hours, 8 to 11 a.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday, when school is in session.

### Wild cubs killed near sanctuary

A bobcat cub was killed on Highway 74 recently at the entrance to Living Free Animal Sanctuary, apparently struck by a car. Just a few days later at almost the same location, a mountain lion cub was discovered, also apparently struck by a car.

Rudolph Nuñez, senior groundskeeper at the sanctuary, was heartbroken at the discovery. "For animal lovers, this is really sad," Nuñez said, shaking his head. "We just want to get the message out to folks to slow down and be observant of animals coming across the highway."

According to Nuñez, this is the time of year for new babies. "This is a sanctuary and this is where the animals feel safe. It's a no-kill zone and all of the animals know it is a safe haven here," he said. "There are many people who have been up here for years and they have never seen a bobcat or mountain lion, but this is the season for Bambis and all the other little critters.

Nuñez hopes people will be more careful when traveling near the sanctuary. "Slow it down, take in the beauty and watch out for the critters," he said. Jay Pentrack can be reached at jay@towncrier.com.

### Garcia seeks state Senate seat

California State Senate District 28 is currently vacant and Idvllwild voters will see five names on the June 3 primary ballot. Democratic candidates are Philip Drucker of La Quinta and Anna Nevenic of Palm Springs.

On the other side are three Republicans — Bonnie Garcia of Cathedral City, Glenn Miller of Indio and Jeff Stone of Temecula — vying for their party's

During the weeks leading up to the election, the Town Crier will introduce each candidate to the community and conclude with a story illuminating their priorities and policy differences.

Garcia is the former Assembly member from District 80 in the Coachella Valley. She served in former Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger's administration and has worked for former state Sen. and Assemblyman Jim Battin.

Since leaving the Assembly in 2008, she has "... missed [that] the high-level policy discussions of what we're doing have effects over the entire state, not just impacts in Palm Desert, but impacts in Eureka, too."

Since leaving her administrative post, Garcia has been teaching public policy at Chapman University. "This is an opportunity to work with adults who go back to school like I did," she said.

Consequently, she is anxious to get back into public service. She has plans to focus on economic development and education.

"Jobs drive the economy. People can't be retrained or grow without the right type of job. And our economy can't be competitive unless the workforce is educated," she professed.

Her experiences with individuals seeking a better education worry her about the future. "I've seen too many people surviving on two or three part-time jobs," she lamented. "That takes a toll on them and their families.'

She stressed that her previous experience in the Assembly as a member of the minority party taught her to work with all members. "You have to check your ego at the door," she advised, "or victories are only in your eyes. I'm part of a team that wants to

move policy."

She enumerated several bills, which she initiated. but were passed under the name of a member of the opposition party. "Your minority doesn't mean you can't work successfully," she stressed.

While there are three Republicans and two Democrats seeking their parties' nomination for the state Senate seat, the state's "top two" law only advances the two candidates receiving the most votes (regardless of party) to the November general

"I think the 'top two' is good. It creates a threshold where only two candidates can spar over policy reasons," Garcia said.

### Tiramisu Parfait from Chef Gino

Former Disney Chef Gino Campagna created this snack recipe for kids to make. Serves 1.

Ingredients:

- 2 tbsps. plus 1/2 cup of low-fat milk
- 4 squares graham crackers
- 2 tbsps. vanilla Greek yogurt
- 2 tsps. plus 1 tsp. cocoa powder

Directions:

Mix Greek yogurt with 2 tsps. of cocoa powder and 2 tbsps. of milk, mixing until smooth and creamy. In a small bowl begin by spreading a layer of the yogurt mixture. Next, pour 1/2 cup of milk in a wide bowl and dip one graham cracker in the milk for a few seconds until moist, but not soggy. Lay the cracker over the yogurt and spread another layer of yogurt on top. Repeat with the remaining graham crackers ending with a layer of yogurt. Lastly, dust the additional teaspoon of cocoa powder on the top of the parfait and refrigerate for one hour or eat right away.

# Artist Millie Shaw finds peace in Garner Valley

Artist Millie Shaw and husband Larry live in a beautiful, ranchstyle home in Garner Valley and have spent 25 years making it their perfect slice of heaven.

The couple's warm welcome and Millie's easy Southern drawl typifies the kind of hospitality found deep in the South; it's like a big, warm hug. The view from virtually every window is breathtaking as is the Western art collection the couple continues to grow.

"We lived in Los Angeles in the early '80s and we started going to art shows like the San Dimas Art Show. Some famous artists used to participate in that show, people like Joe Biehler and Neil Boyle, so we started collecting art and it's like a snowball; it's very addictive," said Millie last week. "This weekend we're going to Scottsdale to a big auction. It's so much fun and it seems like the people in the art world are so nice, so down to earth. You rarely meet anybody who is even slightly pretentious. They are just ordinary folks."

In addition to the extensive art collection

the couple has amassed, Millie has quite a body of work herself, having spent a large part of her life painting. Her love of art was born early, inspired and encouraged by her mother, who "She painted in oils. was a big influence in my life because by the time I was 13 or 14 I got really interested in painting and although money was scarce she was always willing to buy paint brushes, canvases," Millie said. "She loved music, she loved travel, she loved art and she loved to read. Even though she grew up on a farm in North Georgia, she loved Hemingway and all of these great writers. She lived to be 92. Naturally, I hope that I can do the same," Millie said with a smile.

"With art, you may have the desire to do it but it takes so much concentration. Working in the legal field, you've got to be precise; you're not allowed to make too many mistakes. In some ways it's similar to painting animals. When you paint an animal you've got to get the anatomy right."


'So we started looking in the desert and bought a house there."

With some encouragement from an artist friend, Millie ventured out of her comfort zone and submitted her art to prestigious Phippen Museum Western Art Show and Sale which takes place in Prescott, Ariz., over Memorial Day Weekend. "I said, 'I'm just setting myself up for rejection, I'm not going to do that.' Anyway, [the friend] got the application and I filled it out," Millie laughed. "It took about three months and then one day I got this letter, [that said] 'Congratulations.' I said. 'You've got to be kidding,' because they have really good artists. I was so taken aback. I couldn't believe I was going to get in that show because a lot of very famous artists got their start there."

The show, in its 40th year, is held outside at the Prescott courthouse square situated in the middle of town. The show features 30 to 40 artists that must be juried in each year. "We had to go buy an EZ-UP tent and you should have seen us trying to put it together. My arm is still

hurting from pulling that thing apart. We had the instructions and all of these pieces and parts all over the place," she said laughing. "It's not easy-up." Millie plans to take 25 to 30 paintings with her to display. "I'll have to see how many we can get in the truck with the tent and our luggage."



# Guidelines for local food distribution

Over time, the Idyllwild Food distribution program has evolved. Here is a current description of the program.

Idyllwild monthly food distribution serves low-income and senior households. Currently, more than 200 Idyllwild households receive a box of food each month, and more than 25 volunteers prepare the food for distribution.

Food distribution is the first Tuesday of each month in the parking lot of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints on Tollgate Road near its intersection with Highway 243.

Cars may line up on the south side of Tollgate Road (facing Highway 243) as coming from the direction of Idyllwild Arts campus. Distribution starts before 11 a.m., depending on when the truck arrives, and the gate closes at noon. If Monday is a holiday or it rains or snows, delivery is usually moved to the following Friday.

The two programs, USDA Commodities and Senior Food Share, are household-based. One household receives one box of food. Both are administered at the county level by the Second Harvest Food Bank serving Riverside and San Bernardino counties.

The USDA Commodities program (also now called the Emergency Food Assistance Program) is for households that fall within its income guidelines, posted at the Idyllwild distribution site. They are currently set at 150 percent of the federal poverty line depending on household size. For a single

household, the threshold is \$17,505.

No verification of income is required. It is strictly a self-certify program. No donations are solicited or collected for this program.

Senior Food Share is for households with at least one member aged 60 or older. No income criteria are applied for this program. Seniors fill out an application available at the Idyllwild distribution site and are requested to donate a minimum of \$6 per year to defray the cost of gas for the delivery truck.

Many seniors are eligible for both programs and will now sign paperwork for both.

Recipients may have their food picked up by someone else if proper paperwork is filled out. The recipient must fill out an Alternate Pick-up Request form (EFA 15) to be turned in each month. On this form, the recipient self-certifies they meet the income guidelines for the program. This form is online at www.cdss.ca.gov/cdssweb/entres/forms/ English/EFA15.pdf.

No one may pick up more than four orders, including their own.

While the Idyllwild distribution is at a church, the program is not faith-based and strictly prohibits discrimination of any kind.

State governmental agencies involved in making this food distribution possible include the California Department of Social Services and California Department of Aging. At the federal level, it is part of The Emergency Food Assistance Program administered by the US Department of Agriculture.

### Ghost Town needs townspeople

fter 10 years and lots of scary nights, Idyllwild's Halloween Ghost Town may truly become a ghost town. Without more help, founder and organizer Kathy Wilson may have to shut the doors to the October weekend adventure.

The Ghost Town has grown, and the core group of people who actually build from start to finish has dwindled to about four of us," Wilson said in an email. "The core group ... who provide the majority of the physical labor, and those few who help with makeup and tech for the Ghost Town, called it quits last year. We just cannot continue as we are.

The October weekend event has grown beyond the bounds of a handful of volunteers, and some of the stalwarts have grown up and left the Hill.

Ghost Town's continuation may depend upon the willingness of others to help produce the event. Proceeds from the annual Halloween scare go to Idyllwild School.

"If the community and parents do not jump in to help, the Ghost Town will become a thing of the past," Wilson lamented. Several dozen were willing to give time for the First Zombie Run last November, but Wilson hopes just as many will volunteer time to keep the event available for future scare seekers.

### **Idyllwild Scholarship** Fund application deadline

Local high school seniors need to submit applications for the Idyllwild Scholarship Fund to the Idyllwild School office by the end of the school day Tuesday, April 15.

The criteria are: 1) parent or legal guardian and student have lived in the attendance area served by Idyllwild School for three or more years of their kindergarten to eighth-grade years; 2) parent or legal guardian and student have lived in the attendance area served by Idyllwild School two of the four high school years; and 3) applicant has attained a 3.0 or better grade point average during the 10th through 12th grades or had a combined SAT score of 1600 (or ACT of 20).

Verification of residency throughout the student's kindergarten through 12 years may be required.
