Idyllwild incident leads to Aguanga shooting and death

At approximately 6:20 a.m., Friday, Oct. 9, deputies from the Riverside County Sheriff's Department, Hemet Station, responded to a domestic disturbance call within the

54000 block of Wildwood Drive in Idyllwild. The 911 caller advised that an adult female was in possession of a firearm and was threatening people at the residence.

Deputies responded to the location but the female fled the area prior to

their arrival. The deputies searched the area, but did not locate her and determined that no victims were injured during the incident.

At approximately 10 a.m., deputies continued their investigation and it led them to the 44000 block

Property tax bills contain significant error

County to reissue corrected bills

Riverside County Secured Property Tax Bills for fiscal year July 1, 2015, through June 30, 2016, recently mailed to Idyllwild property owners, contain a significant error.

Normally, residents within County Service Area 36, pay \$35 to fund street lights and "parks and recreation" within the CSA. Property tax bills historically carry a line item showing "CSA 36, lighting and parks and recreation."

But in the recently mailed bills, that line

item is missing, replaced with one that reads "CSA 27 lighting." CSA 27 is in Cherry Valley. The effect of the mistake, of which county officials were unaware until contacted by the Town Crier and several residents, is that tax revenues could have been directed to the wrong CSA and not used to fund CSA 36 street lights and recreation, since that is what the tax bill directed.

Just before deadline on Tuesday morning, Oct. 13, John Christiansen, Riverside County assistant tax collector called to say that his office had been made

aware of the mistake and would reissue new tax bills as soon as possible. "We'll have the auditor send out an explanatory letter and our office will be reprinting corrected tax bills to send out," said Christiansen.

On the office of Auditor/Controller's Fixed Charge Benefit Assessment Directory, CSA 27 (Cherry Valley), district 681729 is listed just above CSA 36, (Idyllwild), district 681739. When made aware of the mistake, Leni Zarate, vice president and director of special district financing said,

One injury collision on Hill

From Wednesday, Oct. 7 through Tuesday, Oct. 13, there was only one traffic collision on the Hill. At 12:20 a.m. on Saturday, Oct. 10, Maurice Copeland, 77, of Rancho Mirage was driving his 2013 white Acura sedan

south on Highway 243 just south of Baldy Road when he made an unsafe turning movement, according to Officer Darren Meyer, California Highway patrol public information officer. His Acura collided with an embankment causing injury to both Copeland and his passenger Richard Dorrisse, 77, also of Rancho Mi-

“On a preliminary basis, this looks like a printing error at the tax collector’s office.” Zarate’s office administers the allocation of tax dollars to special districts in the county. “We’re working on it,” said Zarate on Friday, Oct. 9. “Remedies could include issuing new tax bills with the correction or payment extensions, but that is not certain yet.”

Opal Hellwig, Riverside County Third District Supervisor Chuck Washington’s legislative assistant concurred with Zarate, although like Zarate she had only been recently made aware of the apparent mistake. “Preliminary research shows a printing and typo error from the tax collector office,” said Hellwig. “The records match with the auditor controller and the amount

is the same, \$35.” First payment of property tax bills is currently due on or before Dec. 10, 2015. Calls have also been made to the Riverside County Executive Office, to Riverside County EDA and to Supervisor Washington. In the last edition we reported that Riverside County Regional Parks and Open Space, manager of Idyllwild’s Town Hall Recreation Program, failed to deliver supplies in a timely manner for the first youth soccer game of the season. That raised questions among Town Hall recreation participants about how CSA tax dollars that fund the recreation program are being used. There are no longer CSA 36 local advisory committee monthly public meetings at which reports

were issued that detailed amounts in the recreation and street lighting fund and how those dollars were being spent. The omission of a line item to fund recreation on the latest tax bills once again focuses attention on these questions. Just before deadline, Verne Lauritzen, chief

of staff for Third District Supervisor Chuck Washington, called to discuss how communication could be improved between Town Hall recreation users and county management. Lauritzen said the supervisor’s office will take a look at reconstituting a CSA 36 Advisory Board, perhaps with

quarterly meetings to start, so that residents of the district could receive reports and raise questions about the recreation and streetlight fund, and receive and give input on how their tax dollars are being used. Marshall Smith can be reached at marshall@towncrier.com.

of Jacob Court in the unincorporated community of Aguanga. Upon their arrival, the deputies contacted the female suspect, Margaret Wagner, 62 years, who was still in possession of a handgun.

The deputies ordered the suspect to drop the handgun; however, she refused and pointed the handgun at deputies and

an officer-involved shooting occurred. The suspect retreated into the residence and refused to exit the home.

The Riverside County Sheriff's SWAT team was called to the scene to assist the deputies. The SWAT team attempted to peacefully resolve the situation by calling the suspect out of the residence. After several attempts to communicate with Wagner elicited no response, the SWAT

team members entered the residence and found her deceased.

No deputies were injured during the incident. The deputy involved in the shooting was placed on administrative leave per department policy. The involved deputy's name will not be released at this time.

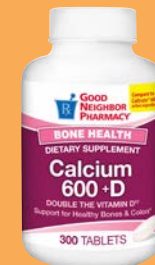

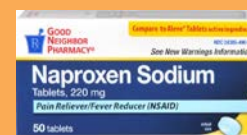

Firefighters Worth Their Salary

EDITOR:

While following the discussion on this page regarding compensation for our firefighters, I was reminded of the story of the "Pied Piper of Hamelin" where a town besieged by rats promises to pay a piper to rid the town of this plague. Once the piper successfully did his job, the town refused to pay him for his services. As a result, the piper proceeded to summon all the village children away and they were never seen again.

While not a perfect parallel, I think this story reflects some similarities to the debate about whether we pay our firefighters too much because there aren't many fires. Some recommend that they be paid as EMT's and quoted \$14 an hour as a typical EMT salary and adequate for their services.

I disagree with this position. I look at paying firefighters as an inexpensive insurance policy against the disaster of fire that continually threatens our town. I see these men and women as highly trained, courageous and willing to face challenges at a moment's notice to save both lives and property.

Checking my property tax bill, I saw that less than \$11.00/month goes to Idyllwild fire protection services or just about 4% of my total bill. This will vary depending on the value of your property, but it still seems like a worthwhile expense to me.

I think the best way to honor these dedicated professionals is to pay them in a manner that reflects their skill level and importance to the community. They may seem overpaid when there's no fire, but they are beyond value when they come to save your life and/or property.

In other words, let's not be "penny wise and pound foolish."

Off the Leash

Our wolves, which one is fed ...

There is an old Cherokee story I'd like to tell you. I'm sure many of you have heard it; but given the times, I think it is worth repeating.

An old Cherokee brave sits talking with his grandson. He tells the boy, "There are two wolves that live inside of you. One wolf is angry, full of hatred and resentment, his only desire is to devour you. The other wolf is peaceful, wanting to love and forgive, bringing you goodness and happiness. The two wolves are at war with each other, one will live and the other will die."

The grandson asks, "Which one wins." The grandfather replies, "The one that you feed."

This story illustrates a very simple lesson, some might even say that it is naïve and childlike, but I say that it is a story that illustrates a profound and universal principle that can guide us towards goodness and peace or doom

us to misery, shame and despair, both as individuals and as a collective. What you feed is what you become.

I believe that there is a gradient line of human behavior. On one end is the worst of humanity and on the other end of the spectrum, the best of humanity. For example, on one end you have Hitler and on the other end you have Mother Teresa.

I believe that every human being possesses the full reach of these differences, the potential for evil and the potential for good. Most of us, I believe, fall towards the goodness end of the graph and others may slide the other way.

Hitler wasn't born a monster, he was fully human, and a man that fed the resentments, disappointments and perceived betrayals that haunted him throughout his life. This is how a so-called "Monster" is created; he fed the beast inside of himself, which eventually drove him to madness.

It is easier for us to think of Hitler as being something "other" than what we are, I suggest that all of us harbored this potential toward malignancy. It is through an honest inventory of ourselves that we learn to tread softly, knowing how easily we can slide into darkness and surrender ourselves to bitterness and vengeance.

There has been a lot of posturing and loose words around the "Muslim problem" in the news recently, as the

presidential election process kicks into full swing. It's been suggested that the greatest threat to the American way of life comes from the Middle East and that we should neutralize that threat by any means possible.

To me, this amounts to fearmongering, reminiscent of Senator McCarthy and the "Red Scare" in the 1950s. As a country, I think we have to be careful about the story that we feed ourselves and others.

Scapegoating is the path that took Germany down the road of genocide and national disgrace. Don't think for a moment that we are incapable of making the same mistake. Only hubris leads us to believe that America stands above and beyond the lure of history. We are as vulnerable to falling into ruin as any country is.

We, as a nation, must remain vigilant to the values we espouse. It is during hard times that our commitment to our higher selves is tested, and we should never indulge our baser instincts simply because we are scared.

California tax tips as tax deadline nears

The Franchise Tax Board reminds taxpayers that Thursday, October 15, is the deadline for filing 2014 state personal income tax returns to avoid penalties.

Each year, Californians file more than 16 million personal income tax returns, with more than 1.5 million taking advantage of California's automatic six-month filing extension.

Taxpayers can file electronically free of charge

using FTB's CalFile program. CalFile and a list of other free or fee-based e-file services are available at FTB's website, ftb.ca.gov.

E-filing provides faster refunds, increased accuracy, and immediate confirmation that FTB received a return. For quick refunds, FTB encourages taxpayers to opt for direct deposit to their bank accounts.

Taxpayers also can use FTB's electronic payment

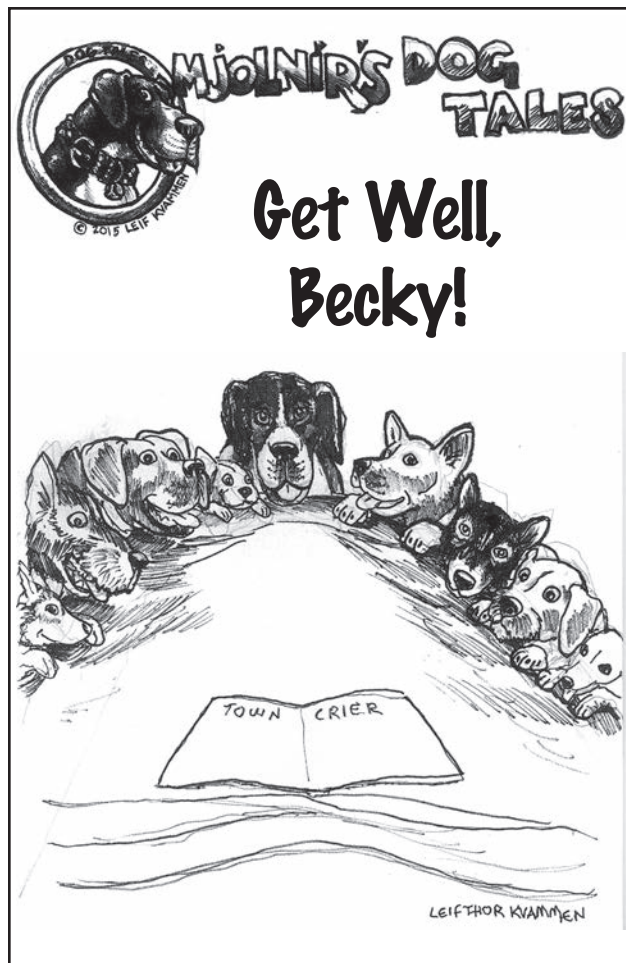
options. Web Pay allows taxpayers to authorize a payment from a bank account to cover return balances or estimated payments. For a fee, taxpayers can pay using major credit cards by calling 800-2PAY TAX or 800-272-9829 or visiting officialpayments.com.

Payments were due April 15, but installment plans are available on the FTB website for taxpayers facing financial hardship. Those who owe \$25,000 or

less and can repay within five years generally qualify.

At MyFTB Account, taxpayers can view wage and withholding information, estimated payments, FTB-issued 1099s, and current balance information.

As of Oct. 8, Californians filed more than 16.6 million personal income tax returns, 14.2 million of them electronically. The state has issued 10.7 million refunds totaling more than \$9.8 billion.

Free/reduced-price school lunches

Hemet Unified School District is distributing application forms to all households for free and reduced-price meals for enrolled children. Applications are also available at the principal's office in each school.

To apply for free or reduced-price meal benefits, complete an application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted at any time during the school year.

The information households provide on the application will be used to determine meal eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or program officials.

Requirements for free and reduced-price benefits are as follows: For households receiving Food Stamp, CalWORKs, Kin-GAP, or FDPIR benefits, applications need only include the enrolled child(ren)'s name, Food Stamp, CalWORKs, Kin-GAP or FDPIR case number, and the signature of an adult household member.

For households who do not list a Food Stamp, CalWORKs, Kin-GAP or FDPIR case number, the application must include the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the signature and corresponding Social Security number of an adult household member.

HUSD board meets in Idyllwild

Annual Health Fair next week

Honors Barbara Longbrook

The Hemet Unified School District Board of governors held its annual meeting in Idyllwild last week.

On the recommendation of board member Vic Scavarda, the board honored Idyllwild School teacher Barbara Longbrook as the October recipient of the Governing Board Recognition. The award and a \$500 certificate to be used toward the district program of her choice were bestowed on her at the meeting.

During the presentation, Scavarda told his board colleagues that Longbrook "... uses knowledge and skills to advance the students. She's a big part of the academic success at Idyllwild School."

At Idyllwild School, Longbrook teaches a multi-age kindergarten and first grade class. She began her career with HUSD in 1998 and has been at Idyllwild since 2005. She is a graduate of California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo.

Idyllwild Principal Matt Kraemer said, "Barbara has a background in special education and uses her knowledge and skill in addressing the needs of students who are below grade level standards ... Barbara has a true passion for teaching and continues to serve as an outstanding ambassador for our district."

Later in the meeting, the Board approved an agreement with the Riverside County Park and Open Space District for use of the Idyllwild School facilities. The agreement is for Oct. 7 through June 30, 2016.

While the parks district will pay the school district facilities rental rate, HUSD will credit them for any monetary donations or pre-approved in-kind services. This includes custodial fees and refinishing the gym floor.

There was no discussion of this agreement before its approval, but the board discussed and unanimously rejected a proposed contract with Skoollive, LLC.

SkoolLive provides media placement and management services to educational institutions primarily through a digital interactive kiosk system and licensed software

for the promotion of all regularly and specially scheduled school district's school events on their campuses, as well the promotion of age appropriate, non-objectionable products and services offered by select third party manufacturers and retailers. The third party promotional content displayed on the kiosk system generates revenue which is shared between SkoolLive and the school district.

Skoollive would provide HUSD with 20 percent of the revenue and there is no cost or expense to the district or its school sites.

Board member Jim Smith immediately objected and colleague Joe Wojcik agreed.

"I'm against this. I came from an area where they would put televisions in schools and run commercials," Smith stated. "I don't think schools are the place for this."

Wojcik added that his research uncovered that HUSD would receive 20 percent of the net revenue, which would be significantly less than gross revenue due to the many deductions including content, software, the kiosks and overhead. Further apparel sales would not contribute to the revenue collection.

Mile High Radio Club hosts Skywarn presentation

As part of a run up to what is predicted to be a strong El Niño, Mile High Radio Club hosted a presentation about Skywarn – a Department of Commerce, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, National Weather Service program.

Skywarn is a volunteer program with 290,000 trained weather spotters throughout the United States. Volunteers help keep their local communities safe by providing timely and accurate reports of severe weather to the National Weather Service.

At its Thursday, Oct. 8 meeting, Ed Sherman, Riverside County Skywarn Coordinator, talked about the program and how Idyllwild locals could become involved. Sherman, who has more than 40 years experience with public safety, also talked on disaster preparedness, including preparation of emergency plans and obtaining and stocking emergency kits.

Although Skywarn spotters provide information for all types of weather hazards, their main responsibility is to identify and report severe local storms, with particular attention to weather caused hazards, such as flooding, as well

as blocked and impassable roadways.

Sherman noted that weather tracking technology is advanced, with improved Doppler radar, satellite and other data. "With all the technology, the missing element is the human being in the field making observations of developing conditions," he said. "To be involved, you don't have to have any specific experience, just your interest and your senses."

Sherman directed those interested to visit the National Weather Service San Diego site to sign up and train by watching a slide presentation on the website and take an online quiz as part of the registration process. Reports of severe weather conditions can then be filed by spotters directly on the site. Skywarn

classes are also offered by NOAA's warning coordination meteorologists. For more information visit, <http://www.storm-ready.noaa.gov/contact.htm>.

Ham radio operators can participate in once-a-week practice sessions reporting both operator location and weather observed, said Sherman.

NWS encourages anyone with an interest in public service and access to communication to join Skywarn. Training covers understanding the basics of thunderstorm development, fundamentals of storm structure, identifying potential severe weather features, how to report information and

basic severe weather safety.

Sherman noted all volunteers begin as weather spotters, who basically observe and report. "It's more passive," he said. "You report from wherever, either on a toll-free number or online. A more active category is a Skywarn member. They may actively look for and determine hazards as weather patterns are developing."

Sherman stressed how most people underestimate the ability of fast-flowing water to move and transport heavy objects, including cars and trucks, and cautioned that drives should not attempt to cross fast-flowing water courses.

In an average year, there are 10,000 severe thunderstorms, 5,000 floods and more than 1,000 tornadoes across the U.S. that threaten lives and property. Skywarn volunteers help to prevent loss of life in weather emergencies.

Brown approves motor voter registration, more

Medical marijuana rules part of many new laws

Governor Jerry Brown has made his decisions on bills, passed by the legislature last month, that he will sign into law. Already signed or vetoed were bills on the assisted dying and drones flying near wildfires.

Last week, he signed the motor voter, medical marijuana, and a different drone bill.

Motor voter

Brown signed Assembly Bill 1461, which would register every eligible citizen who goes to a Department of Motor Vehicles office to get a driver's license or renew one. Assembly member Lorean Gonzalez (D – San Diego) sponsored the bill, with support from California's Secretary of State Alex Padilla.

Initial estimates believe the "motor voter" bill will potentially add millions of new registered voters to California's voter rolls. More than 6.6 million California citizens are eligible but unregistered to vote, according to the Secretary of State's office.

Under this new law, California citizens who are identi-

fied as eligible voters when visiting the DMV to apply for, renew, or change their address on a driver's license would be registered to vote by the Secretary of State's office.

"In a free society, the right to vote is fundamental. I ran for Secretary of State to expand access to the polls. Government should not impede a citizen's right to vote. The New Motor Voter Act will make our democracy stronger by removing a key barrier to voting for millions of California citizens," said Padilla.

"Citizens should not be required to opt-in to their fundamental right to vote," Padilla added. "We do not have to opt-in to other rights, such as free speech or due process. The right to vote should be no different."

California becomes the second state in the nation to adopt an automatic voter registration system. Oregon adopted a similar measure earlier this year.

All mail-in elections

AB 1504 would extend a pilot project to test all mail-in ballot elections. Current law authorizes the counties of San Mateo and Yolo to test this method. This bill, which Brown did sign, extends the authorization of the pilot test to the counties of Monterey and Sacramento.

Medical marijuana

On Friday, Gov. Brown signed three bills to regulate the medical use of marijuana. The key was defining medical marijuana as an agricultural product. Consequently, its cultivation must comply with state rules on water use, discharge and pesticides.

Since Brown's staff was involved in the development of these bills, his approval was not a surprise. The bills create statewide licensing and operating rules for the marijuana industry. This includes testing packaging, labeling and tracking marijuana products.

A new Bureau of Medical Marijuana Regulation was established, too. It will be part of the Consumer Affairs Department.

For all involved in the cultivation, distribution and marketing of the product, the legislation requires two licenses: from the state and a local city or county.

In 1996, California was the first state in the nation to allow for the medical use of marijuana with the passage of Proposition 215. Since then, 22 other states and the District of Columbia have adopted some form of this

legislation. However, California still lacks a comprehensive regulatory framework for the medical marijuana industry.

"These regulations will ensure patients have legal, safe, and consistent access to medical marijuana. New guidelines for testing and labeling products will ensure patients know what they are getting and that it meets appropriate standards for quality," Lauren Vazquez, Oakland-based deputy director of communications for the Marijuana Policy Project said in a press release after the signing was announced.

"We hope localities that have banned medical marijuana establishments will rethink their policies now that these establishments have clear and uniform rules to follow," she added. "Seriously ill patients in many of these areas are being forced to travel many miles to legally obtain medical marijuana."

Privacy

Brown signed two bills strengthening personal privacy. AB 856 expands the definition of invasion of privacy. Now entering the airspace about the land of another person without permission to capture any type of visual image or sound recording of a person in a private, personal or familial activity will be considered an invasion.

In contrast with the drone bills vetoed last week because they created new crimes, this bill expands the definition of an existing crime rather than creating a new one.

The Governor also signed Senate Bill 178, which requires police to get a court order before they can search a person's text messages, photos and other digital data stored on phones, laptops and in the Cloud.

The U.S. Supreme Court's recent ruling in *Riley v. California* held that the Fourth Amendment protects cellphones in a search incident to arrest. The court found that the search of a cellphone is akin to the search of a home, which requires a warrant.

By extending the court's reasoning to information held in the Cloud, this bill reinforces the idea that a person's data held by third parties should not be accessed without the person's knowledge, according to the California Newspaper Publishers Association.

Brown vetoed similar legislation two years ago. JP Crumrine can be reached at jp@towncrier.com.

Historic Society offers panel discussion of early 20th Century Idyllwild

From 200 residents to more than 3,000 in 60 years

In 1941, Idyllwild had about 200 buildings with electric meters. Since then, many more have been added. At one time, golfers had their choice of two Idyllwild courses. During WWII, General Patton allowed his tank corps, which was training in the desert for the invasion of North Africa, to spend weekends in Idyllwild because it was cooler.

In January 2000, two panels of long-time residents talked about their living in Idyllwild during the early 20th Century. The result of this effort was the creation and establishment of the Idyllwild Area Historical Society, the following October.

To commemorate the 15th Anniversary of the IAHS, another panel of long-time residents will discuss their lives and experiences here. The commemorative event will be from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m., Saturday, Oct. 24 at the Idyllwild Library.

Bob Smith, a member of the IAHS board of directors, is organizing the event.

"It [IAHS] all got started with a panel reminiscing about Idyllwild," he said. "Out of that people began to feel the need to organize to preserve our history."

Smith will be joined by three other panelists: Pat Boss, Becky Atilano and Marge Muir.

"They've asked to talk about their memorable experience growing up or living here in the early years," Smith said. "Pat grew up here and Marge was a young wife when she moved here."

The first hour will be devoted to the panelists describing their experiences and the town years ago. The second hour will be available for questions from the public.

Following the panel discussion, the Society will open its archive building for tours. This is the first time in five years that the public could tour the building. In 2010, the annual Archive Appreciation Award of the Society of California Archivists was bestowed on IAHS.

"It's almost full now," Smith said proudly.

The following year, the California Council for the Promotion of History in

Riverside presented IAHS with its 2011 Dave Byrd Award for Meritorious Performance.

This award is granted for an outstanding contribution to the promotion of history. CCPH recognized the IAHS for "its consolidation of historical resources, development of a public presence, and ever-growing promotion of the area's rich history."

The Society's major fundraiser each year is the annual home tour. In 2014, nearly 540 people took the tour, and IAHS members felt that it was the best ever. Then last month, the 2015 tour attracted nearly 650 participants.

"We have about 300 members and it's been very stable," Smith added. JP Crumrine can be reached at jp@towncrier.com.

Verizon mobile app screens IA 'Arts Academy'

A year in the life of 15 Idyllwild Arts seniors

"Arts Academy," a 10-episode television season follows 15 Idyllwild Arts Academy seniors in the year leading up to their 2015 graduation. You get to know these students well as they go through their challenging senior year. You experience their aspirations and angst as they go through arduous auditions and portfolio submissions for top schools, conservatories and dance companies. At the conclusion of the season, viewers, who, as in any reality show, have come to root for these young individuals, learn whether their favorite aspiring artists' dreams are dashed or delivered.

The mini-series (episodes run 11 to 12 minutes each) launched on Verizon's "Go90" mobile phone app on Oct.

1. The name of the media platform refers to the act of turning a cell phone 90 degrees to view video content in landscape mode.

The app is free to users, sponsored by ads, and is available for anyone to download and use, not just Verizon customers. The app will screen "curated" original content — content professionally developed and programmed for specific areas of interest including entertainment, sporting events and TV shows. Content is highly produced as opposed to homemade.

Verizon is betting millennials will flip their phones and begin viewing live and on-demand television — where they want, when they want in abbreviated segments that they desire. The app allows and encourag-

es viewers to become participants in featured programming by commenting on episodes, sharing them and joining fan groups of followers. The target audience is 18 to 34 years old. "Seventy percent of this group views on mobile first," said Marni Walden, president of product innovation and new business at Verizon. "That's an enormous opportunity."

John Newman, director of business operations at Idyllwild Arts Academy recounted that IA alumnus, Kamren Fuartado, class of 2014, who had gotten an internship with DreamWorks Animations' "Awesomeness TV," pitched the idea to his bosses about making the IA student series. DreamWorks signaled interest and encouraged Fuartado to approach IA administration. "After lengthy discussions and formal approval by the board of governors, Idyllwild Arts signed on to do the project for one season," said Newman. "As of this week, six episodes are available for viewing and 13,000 people are 'following' the show. You will see students deeply immersed in their artistic and interpersonal pursuits on our beautiful mountain top campus and beyond [in New York City, Chicago and Los Angeles]."

Newman pointed out that Awesomeness TV issued a formal casting call for the series, selecting featured IA seniors based on their personal stories and auditions.

"Consensus, based on comments, is that the series is worthwhile, exciting and fun," said Newman. "We're proud of the way students represented themselves and the school."

"In order to view 'Arts Academy,' simply download the Go90 app for Android or iOS devices," noted Newman. "You will be asked to set up a simple account, after which you can search for 'Arts Academy' to view the show."

The series shows the exacting schedules with which each of these seniors has to deal with each day. Students take academic classes from 8 in the morning until 12:30 p.m. Then, after a break for lunch, they take art and performance classes from 1 p.m. until 6 p.m. with rehearsals in the evening and on weekends. The series details how students' dreams are earned and fulfilled through hard work and commitment, even while dealing with personal doubts, fear and fatigue.



ART'S CORNER

As inspiring as this past weekend was for both the annual Art Walk and Wine Tasting and other outside activities, it was a great service for the Idyllwild Arts Academy Orchestra to perform both indoors and amidst natural surroundings on successive days. Unfortunately, this reviewer could only attend their first presentation and, despite reservations as to location, the program's offerings could only provide interest in the various modes of instrumental dealings, whether in Baroque, Classical, Romantic or Modern themes and/or motives. Indeed, from the very start of the program, the placement of the orchestra's members seemed to defy convention. If this was the general intentional thrust of the proceedings, conductor Timothy Verville's actions were fulfilled to the maximum.

In the choice of the opening number on the program, Biber's 8-part "Battalia" was an example of the development of a typical Baroque suite in an extraordinary manner, from the shortness of the individual component movements (which actually depicted a short battle, complete with preparatory marches, fife and drum effects and pizzicato musket fire) which only served to gratify the senses as to the overall effect, especially in the 2 included "airs" describing the soldiers' pre-battle prayers and the aftermath of the wounded. An additional effect (also fairly common in the period) was the use of several differing rhythms and keys to depict the drunken bout before the fray, where each soldier sings his own melody (in or out of tune) blending in quodlibet style, and presenting a somewhat modern orchestral sound. Mr. Verville kept his string players in line throughout, and harpsichordist Pin-Chieh Jewel Chen provided an understated but still audible basic accompaniment.

Things proceeded swiftly enough in the Haydn symphony, with efficacious string tone again being the mainstay; particularly effective here was the contrast in minor versus major modes, as well as the balance of both wind and brass instruments (this was most obvious in the execution of the slow movement). And in the symphony's final movement, where the composer calls for the exit of the major part of the orchestra, leaving only two violinists at the conclusion, Mr. Verville's directives were followed most

precisely, with each successive member's retiring from the stage proceedings as softly as possible so as not to interfere with the gradual lessening of orchestral volume.

Following the intermission, another differing setup was in place for Charles Ives' exercise in musical philosophy (or philosophical music, if you will) "The Unanswered Question"; strings (supposedly representing nature) were at the fore, the "questioner" (as represented by trumpeter Jon Hoehne) was placed at the gymnasiums' right rear corner, and the wind quartet (representing humankind) situated at the audience's left front. This antiphonal presentation allowed for a much-needed spread of sonic quality, given the nature of the performance space as well as the piece itself. Interesting as it might have been for this reviewer to have heard this work in a plein-air setting (as it was on the following afternoon), Saturday night's performance only reinforced the freshness of the natural string quality, as well as the conceptual importance of the composer's vision.

Balance of tonal quality was the watchword once again in Wagner's "Siegfried Idyll," with both the cham-

ber music structure of the piece (originally written for a small ensemble to celebrate Cosima Wagner's birthday as well as the birth of their son, as a sort of musical interlude from his operatic composing) and the complementary nature of accompanying woodwinds and brass (including Stefan Henning's horn part and a 12-measure part for Jon Hoehne's trumpet at a climactic moment) providing a challenge for Mr. Verville's conducting talents in the control of both sound production and timbre; a most gratifying overall combination of tempo (moderate) and volume (generally also moderate) was achieved.

All in all, a very satisfactory presentation by both conductor and all orchestral participants; which should make prospective audience members even more anticipatory of what should be in store for the remainder of the concert season, to begin in mid-November with a chamber concert in the newly finished Lowman Concert Hall, whose spacious interior gives the promise of greater and even more polished performance capabilities, and certainly both Mr. Verville and his musician band are up for that particular challenge.

Cross-country running at Idyllwild School only the beginning

In four years, the Idyllwild Middle School cross-country team has grown from 10 runners to 32, said coach Lee Arnson. He and Misty Hitchcock, both volunteer coaches, have built a thriving sport in Idyllwild that few other Hemet Unified middle schools have.

"Every year, the team is bigger and bigger. It makes it more fun," Arnson said. "Every kid is different and [we] try to figure out what they need. It's an introduction to the sport."

In the past few years, several of Hemet High School's best long distance runners began in Idyllwild. Recent graduates include Jayden Emerson, Chad Schelly and Tanner Torrez. But they all became interested without the help of organized training locally.

This year, two members of the first Middle School team — Micah Hitchcock at Hemet and Riley Arnson at Palm Desert — are among the region's elite. Members of this year's team have those visions, too.

This year's team captains, 8th graders Emily Norris and Kevin Posey, both love the sport. Kevin also plays basketball and volleyball, but expects to continue running when he attends Hemet High School. Although Emily enjoys the running and practices, her competitive running may end this year if she achieves her goal of going to Idyllwild Arts Academy.

Idyllwild School has budgeted funds for the bus to take the team to its meets. There are about five each year, but all are off the Hill, according to Arnson, who

was grateful for the school's assistance. The team also has practices three days each week.

"Our first meet was on a Monday and it was raining and cold, but all 32 kids showed up," Arnson said proudly. "Everyone huddled under an easy-up."

Runners have to understand their responsibility for completing homework and being prepared. During the course of the season, Arnson and Hitchcock try to instill three messages — responsibility, camaraderie and sportsmanship. "There's a lot more than just running," he added.

Several local people have contributed to the team's expenses. "We've been able to pay for all the jerseys," he said.

This year, several fifth-grade students have joined the team. At meets, they have to compete with the sixth-grade runners. But interest remains high.

"Most of our competition comes from the Temecula, Banning and Beaumont areas and a couple of Hemet schools," Arnson said.

Future teams will continue to attract runners. Sixth graders Grace McKimson and Mathilda Terry both say they love the sport and plan to continue running.

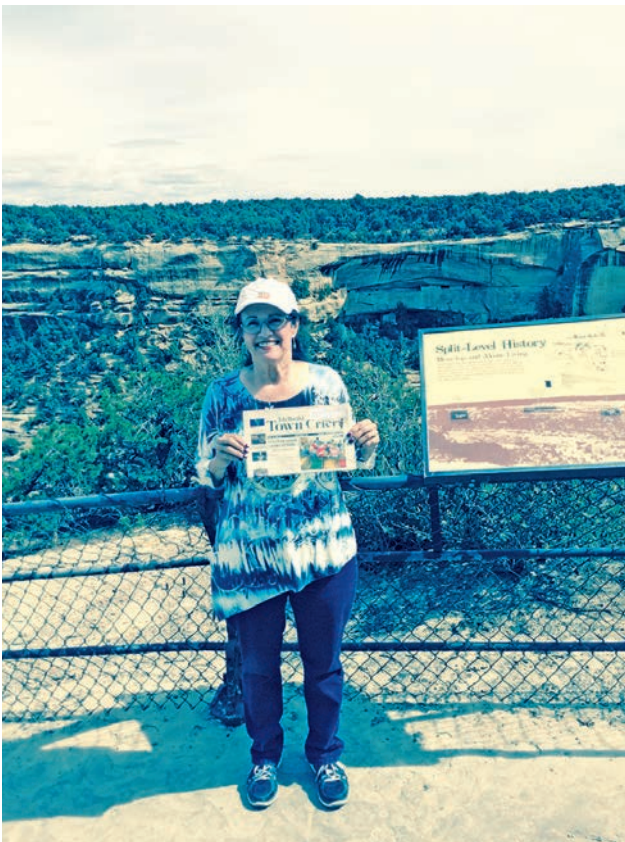

MSJC gets federal grant

Dr. Raul Ruiz (D-Palm Desert) announced on Sept. 29 that Mt. San Jacinto College received a \$2.6 million grant designed to provide students with access to more programs that will help them stay in college, succeed and improve graduation and transfer rates.

"I am excited to announce the Department of Education has recognized the commitment of the faculty and staff of Mt. San Jacinto College to improve the quality and academic success of students in our region. I commend the staff and administration of Mt. San Jacinto College for their hard work in securing this grant, and I look forward to the expanded programs and services to achieve academic excellence," said Congressman Ruiz (CA-36).

The grant from the U.S. Department of Education - Developing Hispanic Institutions Grant Program will begin on Oct. 1, 2015, and will be distributed over a five-year period. MSJC received one of the 90 grants the department awards annually. The grant will benefit all students at MSJC.

MSJC was able to produce the need for the grant through a variety of data, including low college-going rates, socioeconomic challenges and low academic success rates, among other factors.

More than \$2.3 million of the grant is designated specifically toward programs, not for administrative costs.

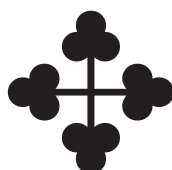

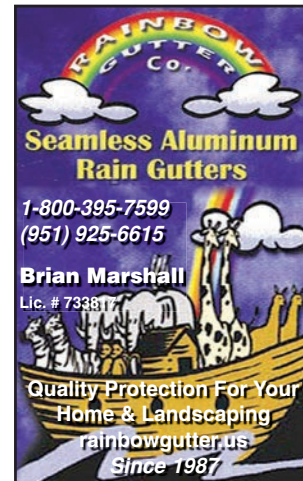
