Fire department seeking more money

Tax measure and real estate inspections two sources

The Finance Committee of the Idyllwild Fire Protection District is planning to recommend details for a new tax measure to the district's commissioners in November.

While specifics on the amount to be requested were not available, the committee is preparing to justify and promote the idea.

Committee Chair and Commissioner The HELP Center also Nancy Layton said, "We have no details See HELP, page 24 yet, ... The goal for [the committee] and for any friends of Idyllwild Fire is to assist with promoting the measure. We'll inform the public why it's needed, who we are and present issues in a way the people understand what they're voting on."

At the September commission meeting, President Jerry Buchanan raised the question of forming an ad hoc committee to develop a strategic plan for the district. He asked Commissioner Rhonda Andrewson, who volunteered to serve on the committee, to draft a proposal, which would be discussed at the October meeting. This item is on the agenda for the



Sen. Stone urges Californians to buy flood insurance

With heavy rains forecast, the time to prepare is now

With an El Niño predicted for the coming months, Senator Jeff Stone, along with the Federal Emergency Management Agency, is urging Californians to purchase flood insurance now, even if they live in areas that have not flooded previously.

Four years of drought have left California with dry, hard-packed soil that is unable to absorb large amounts of rain. The runoff from heavy rains can and will cause

We have already seen the kind of devastation an El Niño can cause when heavy rain led to cars being covered with mud and closing Interstate 5 earlier this month," said Senator Stone. "This summer one heavy shower destroyed a bridge on Interstate 10 in Desert Center.'

To find out more and obtain information about purchasing flood insurance, FEMA has established the website: www.FloodSmart.gov.

'Now is the time to prepare your home or business for heavy winter rains," Senator Stone said. "And, if you don't already own it, the time to buy flood insurance is

Here are a few "Flood Facts" from FEMA:

- Just a few inches of water from a flood can cause tens of thousands of dollars in damage.
- A car can easily be carried away by just 2 feet of rushing water.
- New land development can increase flood risk, especially if the construction changes natural runoff pat-
- Most standard homeowners insurance does not cover flooding.
- In most cases, it takes 30 days after purchase for a policy to take effect, so it's important to buy insurance before the storm approaches and floodwaters start to rise.

Two collisions on Hill roads

Six children transported in one incident

Two traffic collision incidents occurred on Hill roads recently, according to California Highway Patrol Public Information Officer Darren Meyer.

Both resulted in injuries. In one incident, six children had to be transported for medical treatment. On Sunday, Oct. 25, Wilkena Jackson, 31, of Moreno Valley, was driving a blue 2004 Ford Expedition on Highway 243 at 12:05 a.m. when, for reasons she could not explain, she lost control of her vehicle and collided with the mountainside, just south of Mt. Edna Road. No other vehicles were involved.

Six minor children, all under age 12 required transport to the Riverside County Regional Medical Center with neck and back pain. Jackson was uninjured. Seat belts and car seats were in use at the time of the collision.

A second injury collision involved two vehicles and a trailer. William Parsons, 67, of Nuevo, was driving a white Dodge truck on Highway 74 around 11:25 a.m. Friday, Oct. 23, pulling a trailer. Michelle Wallace, 27, of Hemet, was driving a silver 2000 Toyota 4 Runner. Parsons pulled into a turnout to allow faster-moving traffic to pass him. In re-entering the highway, he pulled directly into the path of the Toyota driven by Wallace. The vehicles collided and the Toyota overturned. Parsons was uninjured. Wallace was transported to Riverside County Regional Medical Center with moderate injuries.

Years ago in Idyllwild

Activities were different, people were still a community

In 2015, Hill residents are wondering whether the fabled El Niño will deposit any snow or just rain. Fifty years ago, locals jumped off buildings into snow piles, enjoyed a small ski run, and could sled ride from Humber Park to Idyllwild School and continue from the Blue Bird Motel to Mountain Center

These were a few of the stories that four long-time residents shared at Saturday's panel discussion, which the Idyllwild Area Historic Society sponsored.

Pat Boss's family arrived in Idyllwild in 1945 and ran the local hardware store where Village Hardware is today. He talked about living in the upstairs apartment. During the winter, he and his brother would jump from the balcony into 5-foot-deep snow piles below.

Boss and Marge Muir described the ski run, on Marion View Drive, which had a tow rope to pull skiers up the small hill so they could ski back down.

After snowstorms, plowing roads was much less efficient than today. Traffic was much less frequent, too. So kids would coax a ride to the Encino Road, which was at the end of Fern Valley Road (before Humber Park existed), attach a flashlight to their sleds and with a push, glide all the way to Idyllwild School.

But the real excitement and fun began with a short walk up to the Blue Bird Motel. There, they began another sled ride all the way to Mountain Center. Of course, a few parents followed this sled caravan in trucks so everyone could return home for hot chocolate (or schnapps), according to Boss.

But late afternoon sled rides and ski tows are not the only differences from 21st century Idyllwild. Becky Atilano, who moved here with her husband and twin daughters in 1964, Muir and Boss also described the entertainment center in town.

Before The Fort, a bowling alley, a swimming pool, a miniature golf course and a popular restaurant with a soda bar were located on that site.

"Luaus were held all the time there," Boss said.

The Carriage Inn, a restaurant, was very popular, said Atilano, whose husband was the chef. Regular staffing included 23 waiters and waitresses. "It employed a lot of locals," she said proudly.

The restaurant had a soda fountain for the kids. Across

the street where Jo'An's is now was Eleanor Park, where Atilano's twins spent many afternoons after school playing.

In 1957, Muir, now a Pine Cove realtor, and her family moved here. They lived in a small cabin while building their house. When she went to the phone company to install a phone, the answer was, "Maybe in two years." Eventually, they got that phone after much planning, such as moving into the uncompleted house.

Muir also discussed how she got the school district to provide bus service for Pine Cove students. "They said, 'We have a bus if you'll drive it," which is want she did, even in the snow

After one snow fall, she and a friend encountered a visitor in the local grocery store. While discussing the hazards of driving in the snow, the visitor said, "I can only drive in Southern California." Muir replied, "You're in Southern California."

Other local entertainment included fishing in Strawberry Creek, which was very popular with the kids, Muir said.

"There was always something for kids on Halloween, too," she added.

For adults, apparently there were slot machines at the lodge in the KwikSet camp, according to Boss and Muir.

Bob Smith, an IAHS director, discussed his summers at his grandfather's cabin in Pinewood. While he and his wife Adele moved here in 2001, he has been visiting the Hill since 1939. Since 1925, his family has had a cabin, which dates to 1878 and the lumber camp at Fuller Mill. Originally

bought in the early 20th century for development, it became a family retreat for decades. They swam in a stream, slept in tents and spent evenings talking and playing board games around the campfire.

Despite the growth and new technology, all the reminiscences were of good friends and neighbors.

"The little things in a small town make it special," Atilano said.

When Strawberry Plaza was being built, many locals protested the new development. A plan was formed to boycott the businesses in the plaza, according to Muir. But one of the first facilities to open was the Post Office, "and everybody had to go there," she added.

As a realtor, Muir says many visitors and homebuyers tell her that they feel in love with the community, and she replies, "You really missed it. People are so wonderful."

And Boss said, "The town really banded together, like it still does."

Does the Hill really need a newspaper?

A newspaper is "a community watchdog that reports the bad with the good, warns of danger, advises of opportunity, challenges authority, praises accomplishment, investigates irregularity, marvels at art, exposes abuse, celebrates life and publishes its readers' letters. Indeed, if a publication does not do all those things it may be something else, but it's not a newspaper." That was my view when I wrote it in 2009, and it still is.

Why does our Hill need a newspaper? Well. to do all those things I just mentioned, to be sure but why, particularly?

Some of you may be surprised to learn that we can count 13 separate local governmental bodies that affect our Hill, i.e., tax-funded bodies of county size or smaller with elected officials who recommend or determine how to spend our tax dollars and how much to charge us in fees. And nine of these governmental bodies — four water districts, two CSAs, a commission and a committee from IFPD, and the Idyllwild Historic Preservation District are reported on by no media but the Town Crier.

These public meetings generally are not well attended. Much of the time our reporter is the only member of the public present. If we do not have a newspaper reporting on the Hill, there is no community watchdog monitoring these agencies.

The Town Crier is not a public entity; it is privately funded and gets no government support. Of course, we strive to have as many subscribers as possible, but the subscription price barely pays for the postage. To survive, a newspaper must rely on advertising from businesses and nonprofit organizations.

Perhaps you have a business or nonprofit that "doesn't need to advertise"? It may surprise you to learn that there are a number of local business people who feel that way but who advertise anyway. Why do they do that? Because they live here. and their families and friends live here — or they have employees who have families and friends here.

These business people advertise to keep the newspaper coming for all the reasons above, some of which affect their businesses only indirectly and they promote their businesses in the bar-

That's why we ask our readers to please take notice of our regular advertisers and support them with your business. Their advertising keeps your local newspaper coming for all of us and our families.

Ruiz campaign stockpiles cash

Rep. Dr. Raul Ruiz, less than halfway through his second term, continues to receive substantial campaign contributions. Through the end of September, Ruiz had nearly \$1.3 million in cash this year. During the period from July 1 to Sept. 30, he raised \$415,000.

At this point two years

ago, Ruiz had raised \$1.1 million for his first re-election campaign. He went on to raise a total of \$3.4 million for his race.

Although two challengers, including Indio Mayor Lupe Ramos Watson and Kirk Thompson have announced intentions to challenge Ruiz in 2016, neither had filed any campaign financing reports as of Sept. 30.

During this quarter,

Ruiz's campaign has expended almost \$130,000 and he has more than \$1.3 million cash available, including carry over funds from the last campaign.

As of the end of September 2015, contributions were about even from individuals and organizations, such as political action committees.



Jerry Holldber appointed to county emergency medical care committee


Jerry Holldber Pine Cove was appointed to represent Riverside County Supervisorial District 3 on the county's **Emergency Medical Care** Committee. Third District Supervisor Chuck Washington submitted Holldber's nomination to the county Board of Supervisors at its Tuesday, Oct. 27, meeting.

"My interest goes back nearly 40 years when I became a volunteer EMT firefighter at Pine Cove," said Holldber, who is general manager of Pine Cove Water District and chair of County Service Area 38 (Pine Cove). "I've been concerned with our EMS system on the mountain and the cost and future of ambulance coverage for years."

The EMCC is responsible for reviewing ambulance service within the county, emergency medical care offered, including training programs for cardiopulmonary resuscitation and lifesaving first aid, and first aid practices within the county, according to Brian MacGavin, assistant director of the county's Emergency Medical Services Agency.

"They advise our agency and the board of supervisors," MacGavin said. "And are responsible for an annual report."

The state Health and Safety Code authorizes the establishment of EMCCs. The Riverside County group, which was established in 1984, meets quarterly and covers several emergency medical service issues. EMCC is a 17-member committee, including one representative from each supervisorial district. Other members represent various stakeholder groups such the county health officer and fire department, American Medical Response, law enforcement, physicians,

hospitals, the local ambulance association and air ambulance providers.

Most recently, the group has overseen the preparation of the county EMS strategy plan, which was adopted in During recent meetings, the committee has begun to work with MacGavin and EMSA Director Bruce Barton on implementation of the strategic plan and developing a reporting matrix to track the implementation progress.

Attending the public meetings during the development of the strategic plan raised Holldber's interest in being more involved in the county emergency medical care services. He expressed his interest to both Barton and MacGavin, who inquired about his joining the EMCC earlier this year.

"I think he will be a great addition to the EMCC," MacGavin said. "He has been involved with EMSA and is very passionate about the issues and he'll carefully weigh all sides."

"It's an honor to rep-

resent Supervisor Washington on the EMCC," Holldber said. progress has been made on the county's strategic

plan already.' Holldber's term will end June 30, 2017.

Idyllwild Water revises water emergency ordinance

Audit says budget and reserves in good shape

At its Oct. 21 meeting, the Idyllwild Water District board approved two major policy documents. First, the board approved a revised ordinance for water conservation measures. Later in the meeting, it approved a set of new policies for board action.

In financial matters, the board also accepted its 2014-15 audit from Rogers, Anderson, Malody & Scott of San Bernardi-

Ordinance 64, which replaces the November 2014 Ordinance 62, addresses the water conservation stages and their associated restrictions and implementation. The board held a public hearing on the ordinance and unanimously adopted

However, Director-elect Steve Kunkle did ask that it be deferred until he and Director-elect June Rockwell, took their seats in December. In response, President Jim Billman denied the request and said if the ordinance needed changes it could be amended by a future

One of the changes is clarifying that once IWD enters emergency water Stage 1, only 10 new equivalent dwelling units will be served during the extent of the water emergency, regardless of the conservation stage. This means the 10 EDUs, which may represent 10 or fewer will-serve letters, are cumulative from stages 1 through 3. Stage 2 reduces new EDUs to five if five or fewer had been issued during the prior Stage 1. Once it has approved five new EDUs, the district will not serve anymore will-serve letters until the water emergency has ended.

The ordinance lists the water restrictions associated with each conservation

The ordinance also includes a section defining the types of violations during stages 2 or 3 and their associated penalty, such as fines or shut off. The first violation results in a notice. A second violation within a year can result in a "disincentive surcharge," which amounts to a doubling of the water billing during the violation

A third violation within that year can result in a "disincentive surcharge" of three times the water billing during the violation period. In addition, the IWD general manager will install a water-flow restriction device on the customer's water

A fourth violation within the year will cause termination of water service at this premise and referral of the violation to the Riverside County District Attorney's

The board also adopted a policy resolution establishing guidelines for the appropriate behavior and decorum expected of board members during meetings, creating committees and compensating them for reimbursable expenses, such as

IWD also received its audit for fiscal year 2014-15, which ended on June 30. Scott Manno of the accounting firm told the board the audit of IWD's financial condition earned the firm's "highest level of assurance."

"You had a good year this year. Management did a good job," he stated. "The first year without a loss in, I think, five years." According to the audit, IWD ended the year with more than \$2.9 million in cash or certificates and another \$500,000 in restricted cash and investments. The district's net position increased more than \$600,000 in 2014-15.

Net revenue increased slightly more than \$400,000, but water sales and wastewater fees were up \$450,000. In addition, expenses declined \$230,000 during 2014-15. Billman attributed some of these savings to previous changes in the employee benefit packages.

"Changes for new employees after January 2014 reduced cost from 21 percent to 10 percent," he said.

Manno also recommended a capital development plan for the future, to which Director John Cook replied that it was being developed in the Finance Committee.

The district is still in water conservation Stage 2, according to Lynch, and still very close to Stage 3.

In September, IWD consumed 6.3 million gallons of water, which is about 1.1 million less than August and 2.6 million less than September 2013. During the first nine months of 2015, total production has been 57 million gallons, which is 8.8 million or 13.4 percent less than the same period in 2014.

The board did approve a grant request of \$200,000 from Riverside County's Community Development Block Grant funding. If approved, IWD will have to provide \$400,000 in matching funds. The money will begin the replacement of 15,000 feet of water pipeline "that is deteriorated, at least 60 years old and has been prone to several water leaks," according to Lynch. The whole project will take several years.



Michael Wangler follows passion for food from professor to producer

Sky Island Natural Foods and Sky Island Organics owner Michael Wangler was on a fast track to a Ph.D. and a college presidency when his passion for food inter-

As artist of the week, Wangler shares with other artists a common bond — a passion for creating something of beauty that affects and touches others. As with several artists interviewed for this series, Wangler followed his passion and made a mid-career course correction. He moved from the stability and prestige of a likely college presidency to a less certain path of organic food producer, purveyor and packager. The choice is paying dividends in both success and satisfaction.

"Fast track" describes Wangler both figuratively and literally. In high school and college, the San Diego native was a track and field long distance runner, winning accolades in his sport. He later coached at his old high school, taking his track and field team to a league championship for the first time in school history. He moved quickly through bachelor's and master's science-degree programs at UCLA and UC Riverside. He got part way through a Ph.D. program at UCR, taking many earth science and paleontology courses. He became fascinated with how competing theories can both have value and that there are always multiple ways to a solution.

He studied fire ecology and how plants respond to disturbances in their ecosystems. He spoke about how his field, geography, gave him the opportunity to see the world holistically. In field trips he experienced how geography brings together all elements of the natural world. "I learned to pick out the pieces from both sides [of an academic theory or approach] that made sense," said Wangler.

He left the Ph.D. program to teach and further investigate holistic integration in the natural sciences rather than become a focused specialist. For eight years Wangler taught in the Grossmont/Cuyamaca Community College District and then moved into administration and college governance for the next nine years — as Curriculum Committee chair, vice president, then president of the Academic Senate and College Accreditation Committee chair.

Then food, a fascination since childhood, presented an opportunity and a choice. "While at college, I was always involved in food," Wangler related. "As a child I spent summers at my uncle's farm in North Dakota. There was always this farming connection. Driving trips with my parents to North Dakota, to national parks, my fascination with geography — all contributed to my deci-

sion to change careers.

"In 2005, we bought a house in Idyllwild. In 2006-07, I met Doug [Yagaloff] and Scott [Douglas], owners of Mountain Harvest Market. I started making sauerkraut in my home kitchen to sell in their market. That's how Sky Island started."

In conversation, Wangler is charismatic, articulate and dynamic when describing his career arc. His eyes and voice are alive with intelligence and energy. He described running an organic farm in 2007 close to where he had taught. "It was the best six weeks of my life. I grazed on the land and tasted the beauty of raw food. I tasted my first organic strawberry. Those six weeks solidified my connection to food and farming."

When Yagaloff and Douglas were going to close Idyllwild's only organic market, Wangler made his decision. "At the time, I was back and forth between San Diego and Idyllwild," he remembered. "I was being recruited for president of the college. It was the moment when the store fell into my lap. I decided that if I were going to do this, I had to do it right."

With his decision to buy Mountain Harvest, Wangler utilized his teaching and research background to redo the store format. "I got rid of textured vegetable protein and GMO [genetically modified organism] products," he noted. "With antibiotics in the food chain, we're becoming less alive. This is a big part of the artisan food movement — getting live bacteria back into our system by eating fermented and live-cultured foods. I wanted to bring good food to people, beginning with local organics and focus on the unique local stuff.

As is characteristic of Wangler, the long-distance runner and holistic scientist, he is fast-tracking to expand his mission of bringing people together by introducing them to healthful food. His commercial production of living food outgrew Idyllwild and now requires a large production facility in Palm Springs, Sky Island Organics. He currently sells his raw and sprouted food products in natural food stores throughout Southern California. He recently formed a distribution company with partner Randy Olsen, "SOL Distributors — Sustainable, Organic, Local Foods and Products." "We're just getting ready to go big time," he said. "We have a broker and soon a refrigerated truck. We want to be a regional distributor, but not too big. Once you're too big, you lose that artisan focus. The main focus of our expansion will be Orange, Los Angeles and San Diego counties."

From professor to artisan food producer, artist and scientist Michael Wangler has never looked back. "My passion is to create and market this high-quality food to help the food renaissance in this country. People are beginning to recognize that our conventional agriculture practices are damaging the planet — the land, the air, the water and themselves. Quality organic food is a way to bring people together."

In 2013, Sky Island Organics was incorporated as a California benefit corporation committed by charter to making a positive impact on society, community and the environment.

So You Think National Monument celebrates 15 years You Know the Hill? By JP Crumrine News Editor

On Oct. 24, 2000, the Santa Rosa and San Jacinto Mountains National Monument was established.

At 10 a.m. Friday, Nov. 6, its 15th anniversary will be celebrated at the monument's Visitors Center on Highway 74 in Palm Desert.

On that day in 2000, then-President Bill Clinton signed the legislation, a bipartisan effort led by former Rep. Mary Bono and Sen. Dianne Feinstein, establishing the 272,000-acre monument.

Five weeks later on Dec. 1, dignitaries, including Bono, Cahuilla Tribal Chairman Richard Milanovich and Assistant Secretary of the Interior Sylvia Baca, held a ceremony on a ridge overlooking the monument.



New world-class concert hall will host Idyllwild Arts anniversary celebrations

The Idyllwild Arts Foundation celebrates 70 years of campus history in 2016 that began in 1946 with the founding of the Summer Program. As Idyllwild Arts begins a year of anniversary commemorations, the William M. Lowman Concert Hall, currently under construction, is poised to play a

prominent part in hosting 2016 celebratory events.

IAF President Pamela Jordan believes the new concert venue, given its state of the art architectural design and acoustical engineering, will become a regional concert destination known for its innovative architecture, the brilliance of its acoustics and world class jazz and classical music programming. A series of anniversary concerts will formally open the hall once it is completed.

Named after IAA's first headmaster, the William M. Lowman Concert Hall is designed by award winning architect Whitney Sander. Sander Architects, headquartered in Venice, California, have won many awards including two Dedalo Minosse International Prizes and numerous American Institute of Architects accolades. Sander building designs are often featured in Dwell, a prestigious industry magazine.

Lowman Hall is acoustically engineered by ARUP North America, the firm responsible for the designs of the world famous Sydney (Australia) Opera House, the Centre Pompidou in Paris and the Tate Modern in London.

ARUP specializes in designs for art and culture venues. ARUP calls its key concern as a firm, designing "spaces that perform as well as the artists themselves." "The hall will be different from anything else on our campus, blending both traditional and modern design elements," said John Newman, IAA Director of Business Operations. "It is specifically designed to showcase music. The hall's acoustical properties have been inspired by the most renowned halls in the world. The landscape plan and elements will be as much of an artistic experience as coming to the hall itself." Landscape elements feature indigenous, drought-resistant native plantings, an oak grove and solar-powered illuminated walkways leading to outdoor areas that will serve as a central campus quad and gathering space for the school communi-

ty. Newman also said the landscape plan includes circular depressions in the ground, seating areas that are designed to resemble Cahuilla mortar grinding stones. Idyllwild Arts has a long Native American teaching tradition and heritage dating back to the earliest days of the campus.

Newman noted the concert hall's silhouette and shape evoke Idyllwild's iconic Tahquitz Rock, which it faces to the east. "The hall will be sheathed in 67 thousand pounds of rusted Cor-ten steel panels that blend with the cedar siding of surrounding campus build-

ings," said Newman. The rusted panels will weather and change their patina over time, adding to the artistic allure of the building's exterior.

"The interior finish will include hundreds of kiln-dried Douglas fir beams that are designed to approximate the densely wooded forests of the San Jacinto Mountains. Eighty wooden 'ribs' are hung vertically along each side of the hall and connect across the ceiling in a saw-tooth pattern, each beam placed at specific and varying angles that are not only aesthetically captivating but contribute to the finest acoustic effect," said Newman.

Lowman Concert Hall will seat 298 in a raked audience area. The performance stage is 60 percent larger than the current IAF stage in the Bowman Arts Center (1,820 sq. feet compared to the current 1,100 sq. feet.) As a result of the increase, the Lowman Hall stage will be able to accommodate a full symphony orchestra and chorus. Backstage will include an artists' entrance and a green room with a floor to ceiling window facing out to the campus and wooded areas. The new concert hall will also host jazz concerts and chamber music performances.

Sander Architects' design calls for an adjacent theatre to complete the performing arts complex once it is financed and built.



RECITALS

WHEREAS, the total water supply available to the Idyllwild Water District ("DISTRICT") is dependent upon local rainfall and snowmelt from the higher elevations of the San Jacinto intains; and
WHEREAS, there is no source of imported

vater available to the District to supplement its local water supplies; and

WHEREAS, the DISTRICT periodically experiences years in which the amount of precipitation is insufficient to fully replenish "dry" periods extend into subsequent years, the DISTRICT's water supplies. When such "dry" periods extend into subsequent years, the DISTRICT's ability to meet the minimum water supply requirements necessary to protect the public's health, safety and general welfare is ely compromised; and

water supplies of the DISTRICT; and

(iii) Ensure sufficient water supplies to get the basic needs of human consumption, sanitation and fire protection.

Section 2. Authority

The DISTRICT has the power and authority to enact this Ordinance pursuant to the following state laws:

a. Water Code Section 31026, which authorizes the DISTRICT to (i) restrict the use of DISTRICT water during any emergency caused by drought or other threatened or existing water by drought or other threatened or existing water shortage, (ii) to prohibit the waste of DISTRICT water or the use of DISTRICT water during such periods, and (iii) to prohibit the use of such water during such periods for specific uses which the DISTRICT may from time to time find to be ential: and

b. Water Code Section 375, which authorizes the DISTRICT to adopt and enforce a water conservation program to reduce the quantity of water used by the inhabitants of the DISTRICT for the purpose of conserving the water supplies of the DISTRICT; and

c. Water Code Section 350, which gives the Board of Directors the authority to declare a water shortage emergency condition whenever the Board finds and determines that the ordinary demands and requirements of water consumers cannot be satisfied without depleting the water supply of the DISTRICT to the extent that there would be insufficient water for human const tion, sanitation and fire protection.

Section 3. Adoption of Three-Stages Water Shortage Emergency Plan

There is hereby enacted a DISTRICT-wide water conservation measures consisting of three stages (hereafter, "the Plan"), as follows:

Water Conservation Stage I-Volu pliance, which specifies that users of DISTRICT water voluntarily limit the amount of water used to that amount necessary for domestic and busi-ness purposes. Will serve letters shall be limited to a total of up to 10 EDU's at the discretion of the Board during a Water Conservation Stage 1. The limit of 10 EDU's applies from the initial declaration of conservation stages, until the end of conservation stages.

Water Conservation Stage 2 – Mandatory Compliance, which requires each user to take specific actions to reduce water consumption, and which provides for an increased water rate. Will serve letters for new water meters shall be issued only if available within the 10 EDU's allowed within Stage 1 until the return to Stage I or 0. Increases to customer meter size for additions requiring that fire sprinklers be installed are allowed with General Manager approval.

Water Conservation Stage 3 - Mandatory Emergency Restrictions, which requires each user of DISTRICT water to take specific actions to further reduce the consumption of DISTRICT water, and which provides for a further increase in the water rate. There will be NO issuance of will serve letters for new water meters during a Stage 3 Water Conservation Stage, nor may un-used EDUs be issued.

The General Manager may declare NO STAGE if: Foster Lake is full; Foster Lake Well: are above 50': Downtown wells are above 15' average rainfall/precipitation exceeds 26" and storage tanks recharge to 95% tank capacity.

Details of the water conserving measure are provided in Section 5 below. Enforcement measures, which include notices of violation, disincentive surcharges and the installation of flow-restricting devices and termination of water service, are provided in Sections 6, 7 and 12 below. A development agreement with a user of DISTRICT water may provide for issuance of will serve letters as provided in the agreement. The restrictions on water used to meet the medical needs of the customer. Section 4. Procedure for Declaring Water Shortage Emergency

The Plan shall be implemented as follow

a. Utilizing precipitation records and water level data for Foster Lake and local wells or other water shortage emergency conditions, the General Manager shall determine whether a water shortage exists or is anticipated.

b. As soon as it is reasonably practicable to do so, the General Manager shall report the findings and conclusions to the Board of Direc tors and make such recommendations as may be appropriate including, without limitation mendation that the Board of Directors conduct a public hearing for the purpose of announcing that a water shortage is anticipated or exists and authorizing the General Manager to implement the appropriate Water Conservation Stage. Notice of the time and place of hearing shall be published in an adjudicated publication at least 7 days prior to the date of the hearing.

 After implementation, the General Man-ager shall periodically report to the Board of Directors, with information and data concerning the effectiveness of water conservation measures enforcement activities and, if appropriate, recommendations for further acti

Section 5. Water Conservation Stages

a. Implementation by General Manager. In the event the Board of Directors declares the existence of a water shortage and authorizes the implementation of the DISTRICT's water conservation measures, the General Manager shall thereupon be authorized to implement and shall thereupon be authorized to implement and enforce the following Water Conservation Stages. The determination of which Stage to implement shall be made by the General Manager and shall be based upon the best available information regarding present and predicted precipitation, the availability of water in storage and the rate of consumption by DISTRICT users. It shall not be necessary to implement a Stage I (or II) alert prior to implementing a Stage II (or III) alert; the Stages may be implemented in any reasonable order.

b. Public Notice Procedure for Imple-

mentation of an initial water shortage General Manager, after consultation with, and the concurrence of, the Board of Directors, may declare a Water Conservation Stage to be effective on the sixth day following the publication of the declaration at least once in an adjudicated publication, and posted in at least three public places within the DISTRICT.

The General Manager shall also provide mailed notice of the declaration of the initial stage to each customer of the DISTRICT; provided wever, the failure to receive mailed notice prior to the effective date of the declaration shall not invalidate the declaration, nor shall it prevent enforcement of this Ordinance, Following the initial declaration of a water conservation mea-sures, notice of the declaration of stage will be placed once in an adjudicated publication and a notice will be placed on billing cards.

Water Conservation Stage 1 - Voluntary

In the event the General Manager determines to implement Water Conservation Stage 1, users of DISTRICT water shall voluntarily reduce the amount of water used to that amount minimally necessary for household use (drinking, cooking and bathing) and for business necessity. The necessity for implementation will be determined by following the current IWD Resolution defin ng the ability to meet minim

requirements. Such reductions will include, but are not limited to, immediately repairing leaks, preventing irrigation water runoff, (such that water flows onto adjacent property, non-irrigated areas, private and public walkways, roadways, parking lots, or structures) refraining from vashing sidewalks, driveways and parking areas washing sidewanks, driveways and parking an and refraining from sprinkling unplanted a with potable water for dust control. In addi to these restrictions, the following steps will be implemented in Stage 2 and Stage 3.

Water Conservation Stage 2 - Mandatory

In the event the General Manager determines to implement Water Conservation Stage 2, users of DISTRICT water shall be required to:

(a) Limit irrigation of outdoor plants and gardens to the period between 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. two days a week, hand watering with an automatic shut-off nozzle is permitted; however, all runoff water shall be contained; and

(b) Cease filling or refilling swimming pools ept that a small amount of water may be used

- replace evaporation losses in a filled pool; and (c) Wash motor vehicles and equipment only from a bucket using a hose with an automatic shutoff nozzle; and
- (d) Not use potable water in a fountain or other decorative water feature, except where the water is part of a recirculating system; and (e) Make immediate repairs to any and all
- leaking water lines and faucets in hos plumbing and yard piping; and ng and yard piping; and
 Not use outdoor irrigating 48 hours

before anticipated measurable precipitation or 48 hours thereafter; and

(g) Restaurants shall only provide drinking

water to patrons upon request; and
(h) Not use potable water for filling of irrigation storage tanks. (Filling of irrigation storage tanks with potable water during any conservation stage is discouraged.)

Water Conservation Stage 3 - Mandatory Emergency Restrictions

In the event the General Manager determines to implement Water Conservation Stage III, the following prohibitions and restrictions shall apply:

a. No potable water shall be used for irrigating outdoor plants, trees or other landscaping of any kind, in any amount, at any time; and

b. No water shall be added to uncovered swimming pools, hot tubs or spas to replace evaporative losses or for any other purpose; and c. No water shall be taken from fire hydrants

for any reason except for fire emergencies or for

the maintenance of system water quality; and d. Potable water use for construction pur-poses shall be minimized; and e. No potable water shall be used for dust

control, or for washing any structure, sidewalk driveway or parking area, or for washing motor whicles and equipment except from a bucket using a hose with a shutoff nozzle. f. Water users shall make repairs within 48

hours to any leaking line or faucet in household

plumbing or yard piping.
g. Irrigation water lines shall be turned off
to eliminate accidental loss of potable water.

Section 6. Water Conservation Measures

In the event the Board of Directors declares a water shortage and orders the action of water a water shortage and officers the action of water conservation measures, water rates shall be es-tablished by Resolution, including identification of a Water Conservation tier.

Section 7. CEOA

The specific actions authorized herein are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act, State Guidelines, Section 15269 (c) for the reason that such actions are necessary to prevent or mitigate an emergency.

Section 8. Rescission; Incompatible Pro-

DISTRICT Ordinance No. 62 and all amendments thereto, are hereby rescinded in

their entirety. In addition, to the extent any provision of this Ordinance is incompatible or at variance with any prior-adopted ordinance or resolution, the provisions of this Ordinance shall take precedence and all prior ordinances and resoluti ıs shall be interpreted to harmonize with and not change the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 9. Judicial Review

Any judicial action or proceeding to attack, review, set aside, void or annul this Ordinance or any determination made pursuant thereto shall be commenced within 90 days after the date of adoption of this Ordinance or the date of any determination made pursuant thereto. California Code of Civil Procedure, Section 1094.6 is hereby adopted and made applicable to any judicial review of any decision made by the Board of Directors, the General Manager, or agents, representatives or employees of the District.

Section 10. Severability

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by decision of any Court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions. The Board of Directors hereby declares that it would have passed those sections, subsections, clauses and phrases irrespective that one or more may be declared invalid or unconstitutional

Section 11. Publication; Effective Date

This Ordinance shall be published in its entirety at least once in adjudicated publication within 10 days after its adoption, shall be posted in three public places and shall become effective 30 days after it is adopted.

Section 12. Fines and Penalties:

A) Violations: Violations of the water use restrictions and prohibitions of Water Conserva-tion Stages II and III shall be penalized as follows:

First Violations- Notice of Violation: The General Manager is authorized and directed to issue, or cause the issuance of a written warning notice of violation to any water user who fails or refuses to comply with the water use restrictions and prohibitions set forth herein. The notice shall specify a reasonable period of time in which compliance shall be achieved. Each notice of violation shall be addressed to the customer on record for the premises where the violation was observed; delivery may be by regular mail or by personal delivery.


Obituary **Ted Cummings** 1937-2015

Second Violation - Disincentive Surcharge: If, within the same 12-month period, a water user commits a second violation, an excessive water use disincentive surcharge shall be imposed. The surcharge shall be in the amount of two times the amount of the total water billing for the period in which the violation occurred, and shall be added to the next water bill to the premises.

Third Violation- Disincentive Surcharge and/or Water Service Restriction: If, within the same 12-month period, a water user commits a third violation, an excessive water use disincentive surcharge of three times the total water billing for the period in which the violation occurred shall be added to the next water bill and the General Manger shall cause the installation of a water flow restricting device on the customer's water

Fourth- Termination of Water Service and Referral to District Attorney: If, within the same 12-month period, a water user commits a fourth violation, the General Manager shall terminate violation, the General Manager shall terminate water service to the premises in accordance with the DISTRICT's Rules and Regulations. In addition, the General Manger shall refer the matter to the Riverside County District Attorney's office for the misdemeanor prosecution as authorized by Water Code, Section 377.

B) Failure to Pay: Failure to pay any water bill, including all or any portion of an excessive water use disincentive surcharge, shall be subject



Oct. 27 meeting.

When asked how the tax measure can be drafted before completing a strategic plan, Layton replied, "They're linked but not entirely. The Strategic Plan will include the tax measure."

Committee member Sue Weisbart added that she did not want any sunset provision attached to the measure and recommended developing an annual inflation formula for future years.

Besides its share of property tax receipts, IFPD imposes an annual unit fee of \$65 per structure on district property owners. In 2011, voters rejected doubling the

Earlier in the meeting, Sherry Ann Wayne, the temporary administrative assistant, made a presentation on the revenue from special abatement inspections. Layton and Weisbart felt the district was not receiving payment for completed inspections and not being notified to conduct inspections whenever a property entered escrow.

Wayne reported that 32 property closings occurred in August, according to the local realtors association, but IFPD only performed inspections on and received payment for seven of them. "Realtors are not requesting the inspections," she stated.

Peckham to report on the issue at the November commission meeting. One issue left unresolved was whether the district has enacted its own ordinance for abatement inspections or is relying on the Riverside County ordinance.

The overall financial status was not discussed at the meeting since the committee did not have the current fiscal year financial reports to review.
