# County seeks Idyllwild, FV applicants for local recreation

The Town Hall recreation program, run by the county, has recently been loudly criticized by residents of County Service Area 36 (Idyllwild and Fern Valley) for not being responsive to resident interests and for not disclosing how CSA 36 tax dollars are specifically being used to fund recreation.

In response to complaints, 3rd District Supv. Chuck Washington agreed to reconstitute the CSA 36 Advisory Council, giving residents a chance to have regular public meetings with a locally constituted council to review finances and policies governing local recreation.

In the past, when the council met regularly, representatives were required to give residents regular financial and informational reports about tax-funded local recreation programs and street lamps. Residents

also could request changes in programs and formats.

Even though the decision to reconstitute the council was posted on Thursday, Nov. 5, in the Town Crier and elsewhere, only one application has been received to date. The council has five vacancies.

Should no more applications be received by end of day Wednesday, Dec. 30, CSA 36 residents will have lost their opportunity for review and comment on community recreation.

Interested CSA residents or business owners within the CSA 36 boundaries should contact Opal Hellweg at 951-955-1030 or download applications at http://rivcodistrict3.org.

Said Hellweg, "The Idyllwild CSA 36 council members will advise the supervisor's office and make recommendations concerning recreationand street lights."

# Some rain and little snow for Thanksgiving festivities

A smattering of rain and snow fell on the Hill last week. Rainfall totaled between 0.25 and 0.34 inches from Mountain Center to Pine Cove.

While the snowfall in Garner Valley and further south was more than an inch and Pine Cove recorded half an inch, Idyllwild barely saw a light covering, insufficient to declare the Town Crier's Snow Guessing Contest over.

Freezing temperatures did descend on the Hill the past several nights, but the local water districts have not had any pipes break nor had any reports of customers suffering from busted pipes. Stone Creek Water Company, however, did have a pipe break on Camp Alandale property that affected its 15 or so customers early Monday morning, according to Town Crier co-publishers Jack and Becky Clark, residents of the area.

Through November, the total Hill rainfall has exceeded the long-term average (since the 1940s) for rain in Idyllwild of 5.8 inches. Since July 1, the beginning of the rain year, the U.S. Forest Service's

# Three rescues over **Thanksgiving** holiday

California Department of Parks and Recreation rescued six people in three separate incidents over the four-day holiday.

On Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 26, State Parks completed two separate rescues. The first began about 12:30 p.m. when State Parks received a report of three hikers in distress without water on the Skyline Route leading from the valley floor in Palm Springs to Long Valley near the Palm Springs Tramway's mountain station at the 7,400-foot level.

Rangers made contact with the hikers about two hours later. The distressed hikers were given water and were then able to hike out on their own, under the guidance of the rangers. The three male subjects ranged in age from their mid-20s to mid-50s and all were from Desert Hot Springs.

The second Thanksgiving rescue started about 3:30 p.m. after State Parks received a report of a lost hiker near San Jacinto Peak.

The male hiker in his 50s from Los Angeles got separated from his wife and child as he descended from the peak. Rangers found him about three hours later uninjured and escorted him back to safety in the

On Friday, Nov. 27, about 9:45 p.m., State Parks received another call of lost hikers near Wellman Ciene-

Three rangers and a volunteer were called out for the rescue. A man and woman in their early 20s from Irvine were found at 2 a.m. Saturday near the Pacific Crest Trail and Strawberry Junction trails.

The temperature in their location with the wind chill was below zero and they were suffering from extreme hypothermia. Without the proper clothing in these temperatures, hikers, such as this couple, are putting their lives in jeopardy.

After being found, they were given dry clothing and warmed up in the field before making their decent to Humber Park with the assistance of the rangers. All parties involved arrived safely at Humber Park about 5:15 a.m. and were driven back to Palm Springs.

# Future county budgets face serious deficits

## Current year not a problem

On Nov. 17, Riverside County Executive Officer Jay Orr presented to the Board of Supervisors the condition of the county's budget for fiscal 2015-16 after the first quarter ended Sept. 30.

While he said this year's budget was on target for both expenses and revenue, the future is treacherous. Projected increases, some known and some new, will stretch the county's capability.

'If we remain on our current projectory, we will have increasing difficulty achieving balanced budgets and delivering appropriate mandated services," Orr announced as he began his summary for the board.

Later, new Fiscal Director Paul McDonald made the point more dramatically. "The challenge is next year and

from the discretionary budget would not be sufficient to about \$40 million. meet these increased funding needs.'

In his report to the board, Orr said "... public safety costs will outpace available revenue if they continue unabated." To the board, he added, "We need to look at all services, whether headed by appointed or elected departments, and determine the correct appropriation for the services rendered."

Since the recession of 2008, some county agencies have incurred budget cuts of 45 percent or more, accord-

Exacerbating the county's ability to fund future services are several large but unfunded projects or programs. For example, fully staffing the new East County Detention Center beginning in 2017 will require \$50 million over two years, according to McDonald.

beyond ...," he said. "Cutting all the general government the inmates. Orr and county staff estimate this will cost

These incremental costs will exceed \$100 million, which is more than the county's general government

Orr did acknowledge that several studies of the county's public-safety programs and costs should be completed and available for review early in 2016 and may provide recommendations to help with future funding de-

Relying on these reports, Orr recommended that all stakeholders recognize "that public-safety expenditures and other assumption have to be moderated." For example, he will recommend a phased implementation of staffing for the ECDC.

The board unanimously accepted the first quarter report and asked Orr to provide more specific recommendations during the mid-year review next year.

# Registration of drones may start this month

## Federal task force issues registration proposal

The Federal Aviation Administration Task Force has recommended a registration process for drones, unmanned aviation systems. The proposal may go into effect later this month and apply to drones weighing more than 250 grams, about half a pound.

Owners of drones will have to register. Each drone will have to be identified and identification placed on the drone.

The next step is a set rules released from the FAA. The Task Force did not address how to enforce the registration process, a future step for the FAA.

The Task Force approached its discussions of the registration process with two goals in mind, according to the report it released last week. The first objective was to ensure accountability by creating a traceable link between aircraft and owner. The second was to encourage the maximum levels of regulatory compliance by making the registration process as simple as possi-

The Task Force's intent was to create a simple registration process that would be easy to comply with. The process will be electronic and accessible through either a website or through an application and should be completed before flying the drone.

After submitting their

name and street address concerned that a registra-(email addresses or phone numbers would be optional), the owner will receive an electronic certificate of registration and a personal universal registration number to use on the drone.

The single registration number is intended for use on every aircraft they own. However, where applicable, registrants may be able to use the manufacturer's permanently affixed serial number to satisfy the marking requirement.

The Task Force also recommended that the registration be free.

In his blog earlier in November, FAA Administrator Michael Huerta wrote, "We will consider recommendations their and the public comments as we develop an interim final rule on registration, which will likely be released next month and go into effect shortly thereafter. This step will be followed by another opportunity for the public to comment as we move toward issuing a final rule on registration."

The danger of drones flying in inappropriate airspace was a major issue this summer. 

## ${f F}$ IRE PREVENTION IS YEAR ROUND ...

As we roll into December, many of us have just enjoyed a Thanksgiving with friends or family, gone to see the annual town tree lighting, awakened to discover a dusting of snow on the ground or trees or noticed the smell of wood stoves in the air

Everything about the start of the winter season this year makes it feel different from the last. They say that in Southern California, fire season is year round, and our continuing drought conditions have made this a very real statement.

Maybe the projected wetter-than-normal winter will allow us to relax a little from this threat in the coming months. Could it be that we dodged the bullet again this year?

The bullet I'm speaking of is a large or catastrophic wildfire in our area. Yes, we have been lucky since the Mountain and Silver fires occurred in the summer of 2013.

But I have always said, there's nothing like a major fire to get everyone's attention. When it comes to reinforcing the need for everyone to do their part, to prepare for and fire abate their property, we all need to be vigilant and continue this practice.

With the onset of the cold weather and more use of heating appliances, be sure you have a working smoke detector and carbon monoxide detector in or near each sleeping area of your home. These devices really do save lives. If using any kind of electric space heater, be sure it is plugged directly to a wall outlet. Never use an extension cord to these or any high wattage appliances because the risk of failure is too great.

Forced-air furnaces should have the filters changed before each heating season and even a regular service from a heating technician is a good idea, too. Just ask anyone who has found a critter or rodent nest packed into their furnace.

Fireplaces and wood stoves are another high-hazard item this time of year. Be sure to keep screens and glass doors in place or closed, especially when going to bed for the night. And always keep anything combustible or flammable away from these in all directions.

An inspection or cleaning of the chimney or flue pipe also is a wise investment if it has not been done in a while.

We who live on this mountain must always deal with the threat of fire in our lives. With common sense and proactive actions beforehand, we can all reduce our exposure to this threat.

Open enrollment for Covered California health insurance began Nov. 1 and continues through Jan. 31, 2016.

To be eligible for coverage to begin on Jan. 1, you must apply by Dec. 15. If you apply later, your coverage will begin later, but as long as you meet the Jan. 31 enrollment deadline, you will avoid owing a tax penalty for being uninsured. Others with special qualifying life events may enroll at any time of the year.

The vast majority of CC consumers have access to insurance plans from at least three different companies. Each plan offers products in multiple metal tiers or levels, which vary whether you want to pay more for your monthly premium and less when you use care, or pay less for your premium and more when you use care.

Medi-Cal enrollment is year-round. Medi-Cal and CC use the same application. After entering your information, you will find out whether you qualify for Medi-Cal or CC.

Because of the large number of Medi-Cal applications received, processing could take longer than expected, and proof of certain information is required for each application. Anyone needing help with the application may contact the Riverside County Department of Public Social Services at 1-800-274-2050 or http://dpss.co.riverside.ca.us/.

CC health insurance plans come with children's dental coverage embedded in them. Also, CC offers optional family dental plans for adults.

Visit the CC website (www.coveredca.com) to learn how enrollment works. To learn more about who is eligible to enroll, visit the individuals and families section.

The website is available in English, French, Spanish, German, Italian, Japanese, Portuguese and Chinese.

Apps also are available in the Windows, Apple and Google Play stores, so parents and children can countdown the days until Santa's launch on their smart phones and tablets. racking opportunities also are offered on Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, and Google+. Type "@noradsanta" into each search engine to get started.

Also new this year, the website features the NORAD Headquarters in the North Pole Village and highlights of the program over the past 60 years.

Starting at 11:01 a.m. on Dec. 24, website visitors can view Santa make preparations for his flight. NORAD's "Santa Cams" will stream videos on the website as Santa makes his way over various locations. Then, at 3 a.m., trackers worldwide can speak with a live phone operator to inquire as to Santa's whereabouts at the toll-free 1-877-446-6723 or by sending an email to noradtrackssanta@outlook.com. Any time on Dec. 24, Windows Phone users can ask Cortana for Santa's location and OnStar subscribers can press the OnStar button in their vehicles to locate Santa.

During the winter, Southern California bald eagles are typically found at many of the lakes, including Big Bear Lake, Baldwin Lake, Silverwood Lake, Lake Arrowhead, Green Valley Lake, Grass Valley Lake in the San Bernardino Mountains and Prado Dam, Lake Perris, Lake Hemet, Lake Skinner, Diamond Valley Lake, Lake Matthews and the Salton Sea to the south.

The Forest Service stresses that no experience is necessary. Signing up ahead of time is not required either. Volunteers can just show up at the designated time and location, dress warmly, bring binoculars and a watch.

This is an opportunity to catch a glimpse of our national symbol. Brief orientations prior to the count teach volunteers where to go and what to do.

Two bald eagles reside on the shores of Lake Hemet. In 2014, they produced two eaglets.

The local count will be at Lake Hemet. Volunteers meet at the Lake Hemet Grocery Store at 8:30 a.m. on the above dates for orientation. Contact Ann Bowers (annbowers@fs.fed.us or 909-382-2935) for more information.

Other counts that day within the San Bernardino National Forest will be at Big Bear Lake, Lake Arrowhead, Lake Gregory, Silverwood Lake State Recreation Area and Lake Perris State Recreation Area.

# **Idyllwild Fire Department to review** financial services contracts

## Joint meeting with Finance Committee in the future

The Finance Committee work dominated the last Idyllwild Fire Protection District's commission meeting. Besides reviewing financial reports and appointing a new citizen alternate to the committee, the commission plans to schedule a joint meeting or workshop with the committee before mid-January.

Finance Committee Chair and Commissioner Nancy Layton requested the joint meeting because "the committee members want to be sure that the work they are doing is in accordance with what the board agrees it wants the committee doing. We do not want to be seen as going off on our own, heading in directions the board does not approve.

Layton asked that the joint meeting be open to the public and Commission President Jerry Buchanan agreed to set a date before the committee's January meeting. (The Ralph M. Brown Act requires such a meet-

ing to be open to the public.)

At the committee's Nov. 18 meeting, Fire Chief Patrick Reitz shared that he wanted the committee to review and recommend two contract proposals — both financial issues — to the commission.

The first would be a possible revision of the contract for accounting services. The first contract was issued in July 2013 to Rob Dennis, a certified public accountant from Rancho Cucamonga. It will expire in June 2016.

The committee has expressed disappointment with the accuracy and timeliness of the financial reports for several months. It also leans toward letting the chief's administrative assistant perform some of this work rather than contracting for it.

Reitz recommended the committee review the proposed request for financial services and submit a revised proposal to the commission for its January meeting.

He also recommended the committee review the current contract for audit services. The 2014-15 audit is still not completed, although Reitz said he had seen a draft. The current contract with Fedak and Brown was approved in May 2014 and still has a year remaining.

"Based on what we have experienced this year, the board should issue a new contract ahead of the end of

this one" Reitz stated.

Layton also expressed concerns about the relationship with the auditor. "There were a series of things affecting our relationship with Fedak last year. This year another series of issues — administrative issues on their part," she added. "We are willing to look at breaking the contract for this year and go with a new contract request.'

The commission unanimously, 3-0, approved the Finance Committee's assignment to review, revise and recommend new proposals for finance services and audits. Commissioners Rhonda Andrewson and Larry Donahoo

The commission asked Reitz to evaluate whether IFPD might want to apply for grant funds from the State Responsibility Area Fire Prevention Fund. At its November 2012 meeting, the Commission approved a resolution opposing imposition of the \$150 fee (only \$115 if the property is within a local fire district such as Idyllwild). Buchanan wanted the commission to discuss whether IFPD should be involved in the program

"Should we apply and take a chance of getting an award? Should we apply for something we opposed?" he

Members concluded that the grant categories covered work that would benefit the community and they ought to request some funding. Reitz indicated he would review the grant categories and prepare an application for the January submission date.

'I'll set up a meeting with Cal Fire, the U.S. Forest Service and the district because I think maintenance of fuelbreaks might be an area to consider," he replied. He also said consideration would be given to expanding the availability of the grinding station for local residents.

Reitz also announced that Sherry Edwards has resigned as administrative assistant. He has offered the position to Sherry Ann Warren who he said has ably een acting in the position for several months.

Mark Lonsbury, who has attended several Finance Committee meetings, was the sole applicant for the vacant alternate position for the Finance Committee. He is a computer database consultant and worked extensively in the Midwest.

## Volunteers needed to survey county homeless population

In just two months, communities nationwide will be- Point-in-Time coordinator. gin conducting their annual Point-in-Time Homeless Count and survey. Five hundred volunteers are needed to survey Riverside County to help determine the region's needs for homeless services and to guide decisions about how to use resources.

The PIT Homeless Count is a one-day, street-based and service-based unduplicated count and subpopulation survey of sheltered and unsheltered individuals to identify how many people in Riverside County are homeless and their subpopulation characteristics on a given day.

The Riverside County Department of Public Social Services will partner with the Riverside County Continuum of Care to survey on Friday, Jan. 26. Volunteers are needed from throughout the county to help organize and implement the count in their communities.

The count is mandated by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The county's count will be divided into two areas: a street-based survey from 5:30 to 9:30 a.m., and a service-based survey from 7 a.m.

This count is primarily for cities, however, the county Department of Mental Health has an outreach team, which does survey unincorporated areas, including the Hill, according to Donyielle Holley, Riverside County

Last year, 533 volunteers were deployed across the region to successfully count and survey the unsheltered homeless population. Volunteer recruitment is encouraged among neighborhood and nonprofit organizations, college students, faith-based institutions, community service clubs and social service providers. Important data will be collected on the general homeless population and subpopulations of homeless veterans, families, youth and chronically homeless individuals.

HUD, the largest source of homeless program funding, requires that continuum-of-care communities that receive HUD CoC funding (such as Riverside County) perform a "one-day, point-in-time" unduplicated count and subpopulation survey of sheltered (every year) and unsheltered (every other year) homeless individuals during the last week of January.

The 2015 count identified 1,587 unsheltered and 883 sheltered homeless people in Riverside County. Unsheltered homeless people include those living in places unfit for human habitation, such as on the street or in a park.





# Don Raridon discovers doors and pathways

Don Raridon solves problems. With a keen analytic and intuitive nature, he notices small openings that lead into larger clearings. Once through the opening and into the clearing he assesses and appreciates what is there. It is in the noticing that his particular gift for analysis, structure and composition produces elegant results.

As is characteristic of many Idyllwild artists, Raridon is multifaceted. Trained in computer science, he is a skilled nature

photographer who uses time in nature for inspiration and centering.

From an early age, Raridon was fascinated by how devices were constructed and how they functioned. "Before computers, my father used to bring home broken things for me to fix — stereos, clocks, watches," he said. "He did it to please me. I loved taking something apart, trying to figure out why it was broken and then how to fix it." With that focus, it was a natural progression for Raridon to move into computers as the field was expanding.

Born in Van Nuys and raised in the Reseda and Northridge area, Raridon described his growing up and coming of age as a normal "valley guy" kind of thing enriched by an early discovery of nature. "From the age of 10, I had this certain drive for nature," he remembered. "I hiked with friends and by myself enjoying the solitude and freedom." He noticed the systems and structures in natural balance in the canyons north of his home. "At home, I used to build these huge and elaborate ant farms, watching how ants worked together, solving problems and creating."

His patient observation of nature's processes, meth-

er career in computers and photography. By noticing the mosaic of compositional details in his surroundings, he developed a wide-angled holistic approach to computers and art. Raridon stayed in the moment, moved

carefully and unhurriedly. And he noticed.

With computer issues and problems, Raridon finds his way in patiently. He is effective in finding solutions other tech support personnel often miss. As in nature, each path is different. Noticing how they are different creates understanding. Understanding leads to creative problem solving and artistic composition. Raridon has built a successful local career in web design, computer analysis and systems repair, mostly by word of mouth. But it is in his 15 years of outdoor exploration and photography that he finds his joy.

"Outdoor photography is my passion," said Raridon. "A big part of my intention is to share what I see with others so that their souls may be enchanted by nature

ods, balances and structures proved valuable in his latitude and the importance of connecting to it."

His photographs evoke feelings. He captures in a frame what seems to be a perfectly arranged composition, with magical overtones. About his process, he said, "It's a combination of waiting and being in the right place. Spending time and being present is so important. A lot of doing this work is becoming aware. I know I need to be present and allow the universe to do its job taking care of the direction I need to go in order to grow.

"The course or pathway in life is just to grow as a being and be open to what comes your way."

Of hiking with his camera, Raridon said, "Sometimes I get these cues when I'm out on a hike, to stop. Sometimes there's a clue there. The stopping is just to wait to see what's coming."

And by stopping, he seems to arrive at otherworldly places, just in time to capture extraordinary moments. "I See Raridon, pae 16



on his finger, for a moment. But it was there, with Raridon, on his finger. Then it flew back to its perch in the tree. As Raridon and his friend began hiking down the mountain, the owl flew from tree to tree following them.

# Feinstein proposes three new national monuments in desert

U.S. Sen. Dianne Feinstein, with support from fellow Democrat Sen. Barbara Boxer, last February introduced the California Desert Conservation and Recreation Act of 2015, a bill that amends and updates the historic California Desert Protection Act of 1994. The bill would expand protection for more of the California desert.

Besides additional wilderness acreage, wild and scenic river designations, expansion of Death Valley National Park, Joshua Tree National Park and the Mojave National Preserve, the proposal would establish two new national monuments. The Mojave Trails National Monument would encompass 965,000 acres of land, including former Catellus-owned lands donated to the U.S. government with the intention of preservation.

The other proposed monument is the Sand to Snow National Monument, which would encompass 135,000 acres of land from the desert floor in Coachella Valley to the peak of Mount San Gorgonio.

After little substantive progress on the legislation, in an August letter to President Barack Obama, Feinstein asked him to use his "authority under

the Antiquities Act of 1906 to designate three national monuments in the California desert: the


Mojave Trails National Monument, the Sand to Snow National Monument and Castle Mountains National Monu-

She wrote, "As an addition to the Mojave National Preserve in the legislation, [the Castle Mountains] area northeast of the current preserve boundary was left out of the 1994 California Desert Protection Act due to an active gold mine, which ceased operations in 2001."

In October, Feinstein hosted a public meeting on the proposed designations. Hundreds attended, including many administration officials and local elected representatives, including Congressman Dr. Raul Ruiz.

After the session, in a press release, Ruiz said, "It was an honor to join Sen. Feinstein and the other elected officials to hear the public's points of view on the proposed Sand to Snow, Mojave Trails and Castle Mountain national monument designations. The Desert Conservation and Recreation Act gives our communities an opportunity to enjoy for generations to come what could be our nation's most environmentally diverse national monument, and marry conservation, rec-

reation, tourism and job creation. I support the bill

and its passage through Congress."

In November, the Vet Voice Foundation released a poll commissioned to understand Californians' perspectives on proposed desert national monuments. The survey reveals overwhelming support among California voters statewide and in the desert region for President Obama to designate the Mojave Trails, Sand to Snow and Castle Mountains national monuments.

"Voters want the president to protect these lands as important habitat for wildlife, and so that families and children

have places to get outdoors and explore nature," said Lori Weigel, partner in Public Opinion Strategies, who conducted the survey. "This support is broad-based and cuts across many demographics."

According to the poll's findings, 75 percent of California voters support the president designating three national monuments in the California desert, with 70 percent support among residents in the desert region itself.


Keenwild Ranger Station has recorded 6.7 inches and 8.1 inches have fallen in Pine Cove.

The long-awaited El Niño storms are still forecast to arrive by middle to late December and drench the area from January through March. The latest National Weather Service forecast expects the El Niño conditions to continue into late spring or early summer.

Long-range precipitation forecasts project above-average rainfall in Southern California through early spring and above-average temperatures.

The National Weather Service's most recent precipitation forecast for the months of December through February says the chance of above-average rainfall in Southern California is greater than 60 percent.

# Caltrans District 8 holds El Niño preparation event

On Tuesday, Nov. 24, Caltrans District 8 partnered with multiple public agencies to hold an El Niño preparation event in the Cajon Pass. Attending were Alex Tardy from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration in San Diego and first responder representatives, including the California Highway Patrol, the U.S. Forest Service, Cal Fire, and the San Bernardino County Fire Department, Sheriff and Public Works Department.

Terri Kasinga, Caltrans District 8 public information officer, served as mistress of ceremonies.

The message from all was to prepare, be aware and be ready. Said Tardy, "It is not a matter of whether the El Niño is coming, it is when. The ocean temperatures in the Pacific are unusually warm, at levels we've never seen before. The jet stream will be driven south, meaning there will be a lot of precipitation. It should start

anytime and run from December through March. This will be an extended winter. Preparation is very import-causes more deaths than from any other severe weathers.

Caltrans District 8 Director John Bulinski noted, "Caltrans is taking the El Niño forecast seriously. Crews are committed to preparing and responding to incidents that adversely affect our roadways. Ultimately, we cannot predict how our environment will respond to the magnitude of the storms that are forecast, however, we are ready to respond." Bulinski stated Caltrans is refreshing road striping, performing erosion control, increasing staffing and repositioning equipment in order to deal with major flooding and snowfalls. Bulinski urged drivers to plan ahead and check weather and road conditions before setting out on a trip. "Always carry chains in mountain areas," he said. "While careful planning and evaluation are taking place across the region, the weather impact on the drought-stricken terrain cannot be predicted.

San Bernardino County Fire Assistant Chief Don

Trapp warned area residents that flooding each year causes more deaths than from any other severe weather hazard and that this year the levels of flooding and mudslides may be historic. He cautioned that many deaths result from drivers underestimating the force and strength of flowing water. "Heed signs that say turnaround," said Trapp. "Heavy rainfall can cause normally dry washes and riverbeds to become raging torrents in a very short amount of time. Never cross a road that you can't see due to it being covered by water." He noted that 12 inches of rapidly moving water can move a small vehicle downstream and 18 to 24 inches can move a much larger vehicle.

Said Kasinga, "Check traffic conditions before you go and if you go to the mountains, go safely. And stay off private property if you want to play in the snow."
