Idyllwild arrestee charged on five felony counts

On Tuesday, March 15, deputies from the Riverside County Sheriff's Office arrested Nasir David Powell, 18, on felony charges involving sex offenses. The arrest was made in Idyllwild on Temecula Drive, which is entirely within the campus of Idyllwild Arts Academy. Indications are that Powell

was a student at IAA at the time of the arrest.

On March 18, the Riverside County District Attorney's Office filed a felony complaint against Powell alleging five felony counts: two involving oral copulation with a female minor, two involving sexual penetration of a female minor with a foreign object, and one count of sexual intercourse with a female

minor more than three years younger than Powell.

Riverside County Superior Court's criminal case report indicates that Powell was charged in Case No. SWF1600468 and pleaded not guilty to all five counts. He is represented by private attorney Miles Clark of Riverside. Powell currently is being held in custody on \$500,000 bail.

Investigator Steven Grassel's declaration in support of increased bail indicates that a female victim, age 14, complained of unwanted sex with Powell in February, and another female victim, age 17, complained of forcible rape by Powell in January, when she was still 16.

Grassel's declaration further relates that Powell admitted having had sexual relations with the 14-year-old and the 17-year-old, but stated that it was all consensual. The declaration further relates that Powell admitted engaging in sexual acts with five other students since November of last year, four of whom ranged in age from 14 to 17. Additional investigation is continuing.

Grassel asked a judge to increase Powell's bail from \$5,000 to \$500,000 because he "strongly believe[d]" that

Poppet Flats resident incarcerated again

Crystal Lynn St. Marie, 38, of Poppet Flats, was arrested in Palm Desert on March 17, and arraigned on Monday, March 21, charged with one count of felony identity theft. She is currently incarcerated in Indio Jail with bail set at \$50,000, according to Riverside County District Attorney Information Specialist John Hall.

She had previously been jailed at the Indio facility for the same violation and released on probation on Federal Release in October 2014. St. Marie, who has numerous aliases, including Crystal Lynn Federico, also was arraigned on Monday for violation of probation. Her next court appearance is Wednesday, March 30.

Powell posed a threat to the victims and would "possibly dispose of any evidence or effect (sic) the statements of witnesses we have not interviewed." Grassel also declared there was a strong possibility that Powell would flee before his court date since his family resides out of state and his mother, a foreign service of-

ficer, is stationed out of the country. Based on Grassel's declaration, the judge increased Powell's bail to \$500,000, as requested. A felony settlement conference in Powell's case currently is set for 8:30 a.m. Tuesday, March 29, in Department S204, Murrieta.

Unrestrained dog in car causes crash with tree

Dog is truly man's best friend, especially when trained or restrained in a moving automobile. When the dog is not car savvy and is unrestrained, however, consequences can be serious.

Such was the case at 7:10 p.m. Sunday, March 20, when Efrain Huerta, 37, of Palm Desert, and wife Iris, 36, were traveling eastbound on Highway 74, a half-mile west of Morris Ranch Road in Garner Valley. In the car with them was their dog, unnamed in the report.

According to Darren Meyer, California Highway Patrol public information officer, the Huertas were driving on a straight stretch of Highway 74 with no weather issues when Iris tried to place their dog on the floor. The dog then jumped into the lap of Efrain who was driving the car. The sudden action of the dog caused Efrain to make an unsafe turning movement, veering right onto the shoulder and into a tree. The car sustained major damage and air bags were deployed.

Neither of the Huertas was injured or required transportation. The report did not mention any injury to the dog. No other vehicles were involved in the collision. Marshall Smith can be reached at marshall@towncrier.com.

Raising a director's compensation from \$50 to \$100 a meeting (including committee meetings) in 2013 hit a nerve.

By voting out two Idyllwild Water District incumbents last November, the community obviously wasn't thrilled with some of the past board's actions. Because doubling sewer fees (and water revenues are going up while consumption is going down, thanks to conservation) weren't as welcoming to the community as that decision was to the board.

With such high rates now, some customers are questioning why directors get paid at all. So, why not revisit that issue? One of the new directors simply wanted to do that. He asked GM Tom Lynch to put it on the next agenda. Lynch had an inane reason to keep that off the agenda, unless the board itself voted it onto the agenda.

Last November, IWD customers voted in two challengers in place of two incumbents. Those two new directors spoke openly against the directors being compensated for attending meetings. One of the new directors won't even accept the compensation.

Both challengers felt a seat on the board was a service to the community. Why, then, wouldn't the GM simply place the issue on the agenda and let the board vote, instead of conjuring up an unnecessary rule (see story on facing page)?

I often think the motivation for non-transparent actions of governmental representatives or staff is either fear or hostility or both.

In this case, I think it's both. But whatever the motivating factor, it isn't rational and gives the impression that some of the people in charge of the local water and sewer district are operating with a self-serving vs. a community service mode of thinking.

Let's get back to representing IWD customers.

He complains of the price of IFPD, although at this time, every city in Riverside County faces the same problems and most have rejected Cal Fire to give up local control to a giant government bureaucracy.

"Cal Fire and AMR crews are lovable, too"? My 17-year-old son suffered from severe abdominal pain two weeks ago. 911 was called. The Cal Fire crew was competent and professional. However, after AMR transported him to San Geronimo Memorial Hospital, the crew found crowded conditions so they removed him from their equipment and told him to walk (barefoot) through the ER to the ER waiting room to sign in with the triage nurse. They neither assisted him, got him socks or a wheelchair; just packed their equipment and left him.

He (and his mother) were forced to sit in chairs in severe pain for almost three hours due to crowding. I have been transported by IFPD crews six times in the last 25 years who have never left until I was safely on a hospital gurney in nurses' care.

We really made a great leap forward changing to AMR? They are lovable, too? Mr. Smith's constant complaints against IFPD, IWD and now his venom-laced agi-prop toward ICC.

Agi-prop was used during WWII and defined as one-third truth, one-third mixed truth and lies, and one-third pure lies. If you repeat it enough, people will begin to believe it.

Don't believe everything you read in the paper or online. For years, Idyllwild folk have been begging for another public swimming facility, and check out the volume of people at the summer concerts in our park. Also consider that the senior center on Franklin Drive was closed and given to the county for an office facility.

Children, teens and adults of all ages have a chance to enjoy these facilities Mr. Smith tries to undermine with agi-prop. Generous benefactors and countless hours of fundraising by local Idyllwild folk and free labor have been given to build our beautiful park. Idyllwild Water and Idyllwild Brewpub agree on sewerage treatment

Board approves memorandum of understanding with local pub

Idyllwild Water District directors last week approved a proposed memorandum of understanding with the Idyllwild Brewpub — a big step toward the eventual opening of a local craft brewery.

Describing the MOU to the board, General Manager Tom Lynch said, "In many respects, the pre-treated material that will be released will be beneficial to the wastewater treatment process at the plant."

The MOU will regulate the Brewpub's discharge of effluent into IWD's wastewater collection system. The MOU specifies several key points, including that the Brewpub's discharge will be retreated.

The Brewpub also agreed to certain chemical limitations, such as keeping the pH within the range of 6 to 9.5. Also, any discharge will occur between Monday and Friday, excluding weekends, which are already IWD's peak wastewater surge periods.

The weekly total is limited to 2,000 gallons and no more than 400 gallons in one day without prior permission. The discharge is expected to occur after 8 p.m.

The MOU was a product of negotiations between the Brewpub, the district and IWD's wastewater consultant, Wyatt Troxel, whose report a year ago verified how the Brewpub's discharge would help the waste treatment system.

"The Brewpub will be using water from their

private well," Lynch reported to the board. "The use of Idyllwild Water District-treated water would not be suitable for brewing purposes."

The MOU was approved 4-0-1. Director June Rockwell abstained. "I won't vote for something unless I have enough information about it first," she stated.

During Lynch's Work in Progress Report, he told the board that wastewater supervisor Nick Iliev had resigned for a job in Fallbrook, as well as another sewer employee. However, the California Rural Water Association has helped IWD find a temporary operator until permanent staff can be hired.

In response to a question about the reasons for the departures, Lynch said the employees left for higher salaries elsewhere. Directors Steve Kunkle and Rockwell were concerned about the turnover in recent years; so President Jim Billman asked Lynch to prepare a report on employee turnover for a future meeting.

In water business, Lynch reported that IWD was still in Stage 2 Water Conservation. "I looked at Foster Lake yesterday and saw two puddles," he added. "The water does percolate into the ground and there is some benefit to our wells."

Revenues for the water program were \$114,900 in February and exceeded expenses by \$33,100, according to Hosny Shouman, IWD's chief financial officer.

Water production last month was 5.1 million gallons, which was

1.1 million gallons less than February 2015 and nearly 2 million gallons less than last month. Yet, water revenues were \$113,100, up slightly compared to \$112,500 in 2015, despite less water sold.

At the beginning of the meeting, Pine Cove resident Jeff Smith advised the board that, in response to his public records request for all correspondence with the Insurance Service Organization (who sets fire protection classes), he had received just one page from the district.

"I was told this was all the information they had," Smith said. Yet, the information which he said he received from Fern Valley Water District was much more extensive.

In response, Billman asked when the original request had been submitted and then added, "I appreciate what you said and we'll get the information you requested."

Another Pine Cove resident and local realtor Marge Muir asked the board to review the policy that seems to prohibit moving a water meter, which has been paid for, from one vacant parcel to another.

Idyllwild Water GM refuses to let board member put item on agenda

Says board majority must approve discussion first

Idyllwild Water District General Manager Tom Lynch says an individual director has no right to request an item be placed on the agenda.

This was in response to Director Steve Kunkle's request to place the director's compensation on the IWD agenda for last week.

"A board member has no power to set the future agenda for a meeting by himself and needs the consent of a majority of the board to add an item to a future agenda," he wrote in response to a question regarding the process for setting the agency's agenda.

"That's interpreting the law in a self-serving way," said Nikki Moore, legal counsel for the California Newspaper Publishers Association. "It's not necessary to require consensus of the board."

According to Lynch, he can set the agenda or a director can ask his colleagues during a meeting to concur with placing the item on a future agenda.

However, at the March meeting, Kunkle's board colleagues agreed to discuss the compensation at their April meeting.

Lynch adamantly insists a single director does not have authority to place an item on the agenda without concurrence of the majority of the board and says all public agencies interpret the law this way.

Yet, the Hemet Unified School District policy states, "Any board member or member of the public may request that a matter within the jurisdiction of the board be placed on the agenda of a

regular meeting.

"The request shall be in writing and be submitted to the superintendent or designee with supporting documents and information, if any, at least one week before the scheduled meeting date."

Robert Krieger, a Fern Valley Water District director and former board president, confirmed FVWD's policy is similar to HUSD's.

Even the Riverside County Board of Supervisors permits an individual board member to place an item on the agenda, according to Ray Smith, Riverside County public information officer.

The Brown Act states, that following public comment "a member of a legislative body ... subject to rules or procedures of the legislative body, may ... request staff to report back to the body at a subsequent meeting concerning any matter, or take action to direct staff to place a matter of business on a future agenda."

Lynch interprets this section as allowing an individual board member to make a suggestion for future agenda items, but approval of the board majority is necessary to confirm its addition to the next agenda.

However, Lynch has not provided a copy of the district policy or bylaws that explain IWD's procedure.

In September 2013, when the directors last raised their compensation, there was no action in the prior meeting to add it to the next agenda.

Former General Manager Terry Lyons simply placed it on the board's agenda.

Ruiz fire bill passes House, now with Senate

Former 3rd District Supervisor Jim Venable dies at 79

At the end of February, Rep. Dr. Raul Ruiz's wildfire bill was passed in the House of Representatives.

H.R. 1009 targets disaster-relief funds to victims of wildfire and their communities. He wanted to ensure they have access to the same resources as victims of other natural disasters. The funds will be available whether or not the president declares the fire a major disaster."

"The problem currently is that states are able to receive Fire Management Assistance Grants in order to help fight the most severe wildfires and prevent them from escalating to become a major disaster," wrote Hernán Quintas, Ruiz's press secretary.

retary. "These grants are largely successful and helped put out the Mountain and Silver fires from a few years ago. Unfortunately, when the fire is extinguished, states cannot access Hazard Mitigation Grant Program funds to help with post-fire mitigation because the fire was never declared a major disaster.

Ruiz introduced the bill after the Mountain Fire in 2013 and again last spring. In March 2014, he visited the burned area and spent time with local fire officials and the Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council to get more ideas about the proposal.

Co-sponsoring the bill with Ruiz was Rep. Jared Polis (D) of Colorado.

Their bill language was incorporated into the FEMA Disaster Assistance Reform Act of 2015 which is H.R. 1471. The bill passed the House on Feb. 29 and is now in the Senate before the Homeland Security and Government Affairs Committee.

The House report on the bill acknowledged that small and rural communities tend not to receive disaster assistance in "fair and equitable manner" compared to larger communities.

The report also states that the legislative change is intended to allow communities to use the FMAG funds for mitigation and recovery efforts, as well as immediate responses to wildfires. "The committee urges FEMA to encourage states receiving increased hazard mitigation assistance, because it received a FMAG to allocate this assistance to help communities that were affected by the wildfires that were covered by the grant," according to the report.

The report estimates that the additional cost of mitigating wildfire damage will be about \$6 million annually. In addition to wildfires, H.R. 1471 also changes language for funding for earthquake disasters. The new language states "activities to help reduce the risk of future damage, hardship, loss or suffering in an area affected by earthquake hazards are eligible for hazard mitigation grant program assistance from FEMA."

Former Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Jim Venable died of cancer on Thursday, March 17. He was 79.

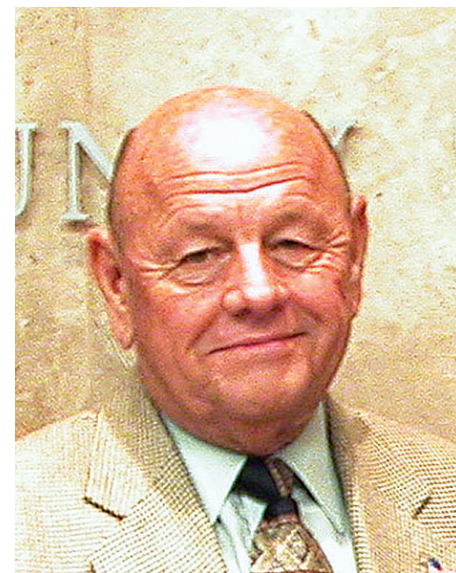
Venable served as county supervisor, representing the 3rd district that includes Idyllwild, from 1996 to 2004. Prior to his election, Venable served as a Hemet City councilman. A pilot, Venable had long operated his family's business, the Hemet Valley Flying Service, founded by his father.

Venable was defeated for re-election by current State Sen. Jeff Stone. Venable's 3rd District had been redrawn in 2001, adding Murrieta and Temecula and removing older communities Banning, Beaumont, Nuevo and Juniper Flats more familiar with incumbent Venable. Stone remembered Venable fondly. "I could always count on Jim — and often did — for advice, especially when it came to issues involving the communities of his beloved San Jacinto Valley," said Stone. "His service to all the people of Riverside County was invaluable during a time of unprecedented growth, and his many positive contributions helped improve the quality of life for the people who call it home."

Mary Moreland served as Venable's senior legislative assistant for his first four years as supervisor, then as his chief of staff for the last four. "I was with him the whole time," said Moreland. "He was a larger-than-life personality. He really cared about his constituents — as a change agent to make their lives better. He performed public service for all the right reasons. He was always about just getting it done."

"He was such an important part of my life. I had dinner with the whole Venable clan a little over a month ago. I'm heartbroken at his passing."

Kenny Graff also served as staff when Venable was supervisor. "Before that, I worked for him as a pilot at his flying service," said Graff. "I had known him since I was 12. He took a lot of kids under his wings. He was like that. I used to ride my bike



out to the airport. He gave me a job cleaning the hangers and washing the planes. He raised a number of us up to be pilots."

Rick Hoffman also worked for Venable at Hemet Valley Flying Service. He then served during Venable's first term as his chief of staff. "Mary [Moreland] and I started together," said Hoffman. "After the first term, when I went to Transportation, she took over as chief. The supervisor was a wonderful guy to work for. He cared a lot for his people. He deserves all the recognition he is receiving."

In memory of former Supervisor Venable, the American flag, California flag and the POW/MIA flag will be flown at half-staff at all county-owned and leased facilities until March 25.

Services will be held at 11 a.m. Thursday, March 24, in the amphitheater at the Ramona Bowl, 27400 Ramona Bowl Road in Hemet. A reception will follow at the bowl. Members of the public are invited to attend.

H.R. 1471 funding purposes

Recipients of hazard mitigation assistance provided under this section and section 203 may use the assistance to conduct the following activities to help reduce the risk of future damage, hardship, loss or suffering in any area affected by a wildfire, including:

- 1) reseeding ground cover with quick-growing or native species;
- 2) mulching with straw or chipped wood;
- 3) constructing straw, rock, or log dams in small tributaries to prevent flooding;
- 4) placing logs and other erosion barriers to catch sediment on hill slopes;
- 5) installing debris traps to modify road and trail drainage mechanisms;
- 6) modifying or removing culverts to allow drainage to flow freely;
- 7) adding drainage dips and constructing emergency spillways to keep roads and bridges from washing out during floods;
- 8) planting grass to prevent the spread of noxious weeds;
- 9) installing warning signs;
- 10) establishing defensible space measures; and
- 11) reducing hazardous fuels.

Idyllwild Fire committee aims for tax recommendation in April

The finance committee of the Idyllwild Fire Protection District is still grappling with how big a tax measure should be and the source of the new funding.

At its meeting last week, the committee discussed two separate revenue sources and committee alternate member Mark Lonsbury and Fire Capt. Mark LaMont discussed the cost and needed revenues to finance three initiatives.

In their example, firefighters would receive a 9-percent raise, another \$60,000 would be available to fund another unspecified new position, and the capital improvement program (whose total cost is \$852,000) would be funded over a period of several years.

The estimated cost would be about \$330,000, which Lonsbury said is about 150 percent of the current parcel fee revenue of \$212,000 annually. If the parcel fee were the source of the added revenue, it would more than double the current rate of \$65 per unit to about \$162.50 per unit, according to LaMont.

However, he said another funding option was the "fire structure tax" which comes from the county's property tax assessment. This source would grow or shrink as the county's assessments change, he stressed. But unlike the parcel fee, which is a fixed amount, it would increase during good times.

However, committee members identified several other issues they believed should be included in the funding package. Sue Weisbart called their attention to the district's unfunded liabilities for both retirement and other post-employment benefits.

The retirement unfunded liability, according to the auditor, is nearly \$2 million. In a report last Feb-

ruary, the consultant advised the commission that the unfunded liability for the post-employment benefits is about \$650,000.

Fire Chief Patrick Reitz responded that the unfunded liabilities were long-term debt. The annual payment to CalPers is already included in future budgets. However, he agreed that paying it down sooner would reduce the interest.

He also stated that CalPers has been changing the amounts regularly and the district does not have a specific figure yet.

"Well, it would be irresponsible of the committee not to take it into account," Weisbart opined.

Deferred maintenance was another issue that both committee member Calvin Gogerty and Weisbart want addressed going forward. A specific example is the concrete apron in front of the bay, which is eroding.

The committee decided to hold another special meeting Thursday, March 31, to further discuss and refine the measure. Its goal is to provide a recommendation to the fire commission for its April meeting.

In other action, the committee approved the proposed policy defining its responsibilities and procedures. This will be presented to the commission at its March 22 meeting.

Weisbart also expressed dismay that the budget reports are not consistent with the budget approved last summer. "The finance committee doesn't know if its questions and recommendations are being done or fixed," she stated. Then she urged for some sort of feedback from the financial consultant when these are sent to him.

Committee Chair Nancy Layton responded that the chief would provide that information to the committee in the future.

Fire Commission rejects administrative law judge draft opinion

The Idyllwild Fire Protection District held a special meeting Friday, March 18. The subject was "employee discipline, dismissal or release." No individual was identified.

After the meeting opened, the commission entered closed session for several hours to discuss the subject.

California's Government Code section 11517 outlines the process for an agency adjudicative proceeding. When the commission returned to open session and adjourned the meeting, Fire Chief Patrick Reitz reported the actions, which the commission took pursuant to Government Code section 11517(c)(2)(E). This subsection defines the process when an administrative law judge hears a case and the agency rejects the proposed decision.

Reitz reported the following actions:

1. Reject the proposed decision of the ALJ in order to review transcripts
2. Order transcripts to be produced to the parties
3. Written argument submitted by the parties w/in 30 days of the receipt of the transcripts
4. Final Order by board within 70 days of the receipt of the transcripts.

The commission's agenda for its March 22 meeting includes a closed session to discuss "Pursuant to Government Code [section] 54956.9: Conference with Legal Counsel — Existing Litigation: James Reyes vs. Idyllwild Fire Protection District."

Reyes is a former IFPD captain who was terminated on July 19, 2014. Besides going before an ALJ, Reyes filed a wrongful termination of employment suit in the Riverside County Superior Court in February 2015.

Burros for adoption

Riverside County is now offering wild burros for adoption. The adoption fee is \$50.

The burros were recently impounded from a pocket of land near a new Metrolink project area in the Highgrove area just north of Riverside. Animal Control officers with Riverside County Animal Services rounded up 19 burros. More burros are expected to be impounded in what is described as an ongoing operation.

"We're trying to round up roughly 40 burros from a sub herd of the much larger herds famous in the Reche Canyon area," Animal Services Director Robert Miller said. "This herd is the only known grouping in this particular pocket of Riverside County. Our intent is to preserve this sub herd by removing it from what will be a dangerous situation."

A new Metrolink project, scheduled to start running in early 2016, will result in new train runs through the area where the burros have often wandered to and near. The burros, although described as wild or undomesticated, have exhibited very docile behavior tendencies. The burros' mellow demeanors are attributed to a long-standing tradition of passersby feeding the burros carrots and apples, drawing them closer and closer to an industrial park and residential communities in the Highgrove area.

ART'S CORNER

After much anticipation and hard work on the part of both staff and patrons of Idyllwild Arts, the new concert venue was finally opened to the public at the beginning of March, much to the delight of both alumni and current students, with what might be called a jazz reunion.

It, nevertheless, remained for a time to return to the regular-appointed classical concert schedule in the space where chamber, choral and orchestral works deservedly belong, and since the new Lowman Concert Hall remained vacant for that period, the sustained anticipatory mode prevailed along with the requisite fencing around the building.

As soon as it became possible to enter the grounds, as well as the actual structure, this reviewer was put at ease as to its sonic potential, as well as its aesthetic wonder; however, since this person is neither an architect nor an acoustic expert, he would best be suited to keep to his usual critical arena; and so, on to the music.

This past Friday's orchestral event was a proving ground for a notable guest conductor as well as for the hall itself, and both passed the aural potentials quite admirably. The credentials of Conductor Gregory Robbins with various East Coast ensembles, in addition to his academic background, were well on display from the first work on the somewhat short program.

Arthur Honegger's "Pastorale D'Ete" proved to be a working-out of simple themes in a natural setting, bolstered by wind-section interjections (particularly well-executed by principal horn player Stefan Henning) over a serene string accompaniment.

Following that, Felix Mendelssohn's "Hebrides Overture" was a welcome Romantic excursion in contrasting orchestral colorations and contours, which, as a demonstration of hall acoustics as well as a conductorial tour de force for Maestro Robbins, exceeded on both counts.

And with the playing of Franz Joseph Haydn's "Symphony No. 99 in E-Flat Major," a further account of both orchestra's and conductor's prowess was eventuated — from timpanist Nick Stone's deftly accomplished punctuations, through contrasting wind and string sections (especially in the work's final movement) — and this with only one week of rehearsal time available.

In a short interview with the conductor following the concert, Mr. Robbins expressed an interest in a return

engagement as a follow-up to his first visit to Idyllwild and the school, and it is this reviewer's hope that this wish will be fulfilled.

On the following Saturday evening in the same Lowman Concert Hall, the Idyllwild Master Chorale presented its combined vocal talents in a no-less spectacular display. Under the more-than-able direction of Dwight Holmes, the chorale gave forth an admirable performance of Morten Lauridsen's "Lux Aeterna," as well as a somewhat abbreviated song presentation following a short intermission.

While one could possibly fault the choice of the program's featured work — essentially a setting of the Latin text of the Mass for the Dead — if truth be told, it served as a requiem for the preceding generations of faculty and students, and brought forth the potential for growth and strength in the succeeding generations. Particularly in the work's contrapuntal sections (the "O nata lux" comes to mind, as a immediate example), artistic director/conductor Holmes' well-trained forces shook the hall's well-reinforced

wooden rafters with a demonstration of superior, if necessarily solemn and subdued, sonorous vocal qualities.

Equally subdued and solemn accompaniments were provided by organist Edwin Hansen and pianist Nelms McKelvain, supplying a more than suitable background for the chorus. Two settings of poems of Robert Frost by composer Randall Thompson, and a three-verse arrangement of the American folk song "Shenandoah" by Brad Printz completed the program (with piano accompaniment by Mr. Hansen), all equally well executed, and Mr. Holmes then delivered what amounted to a benediction on the new concert hall, with the wishes that such excellent events should continue to provide both audience and performers with similar pleasures, an ambition heartily concurred with and approved by this reviewer.

And so, with further anticipation (though no longer than it would seem necessary), the next series of classical musical events as provided throughout the spring season and beyond is most welcome in a most worthy new IA campus location.

Fisticuffs or political fighting ...

With the recent outbursts of violence during certain presidential campaign rallies (I think we all know whose campaign I'm talking about), it seems like some members of our species have managed to do something that seemed impossible — de-evolve.

OK, I'm being facetious; but according to some researchers, it seems that many of our ancestors underwent two very important evolutionary changes many anthropologists think are related.

It was between four or five million years ago that Australopithecus, the common ancestor of Homo sapiens, Homo erectus and our extinct relatives, the Neanderthals, developed hands that could form fists, along with faces that could take a punch.

According to a 2012 report published in the Journal of Experimental Biology, these two developments were not by chance. University of Utah biology professor David Carrier and his colleague, Michael Morgan, proposed that the flat facial features so distinctive of humans and our nearest relatives serve to "buttress against punches."

The most popular and agreed-upon conclusion among scientists to this day is that our faces have evolved the way they did to develop jaw power and to chew on hard foods like nuts, but recent dental evidence suggests our closest ancestors ate mostly fruit.

Carrier and Morgan found that the bones more often fractured in fights were the same ones that became thicker and stronger over time — especially the bones which form the jaws, cheeks and orbits of the eyes. They point out that these changes became more pronounced in males since they did more of the fighting than females.

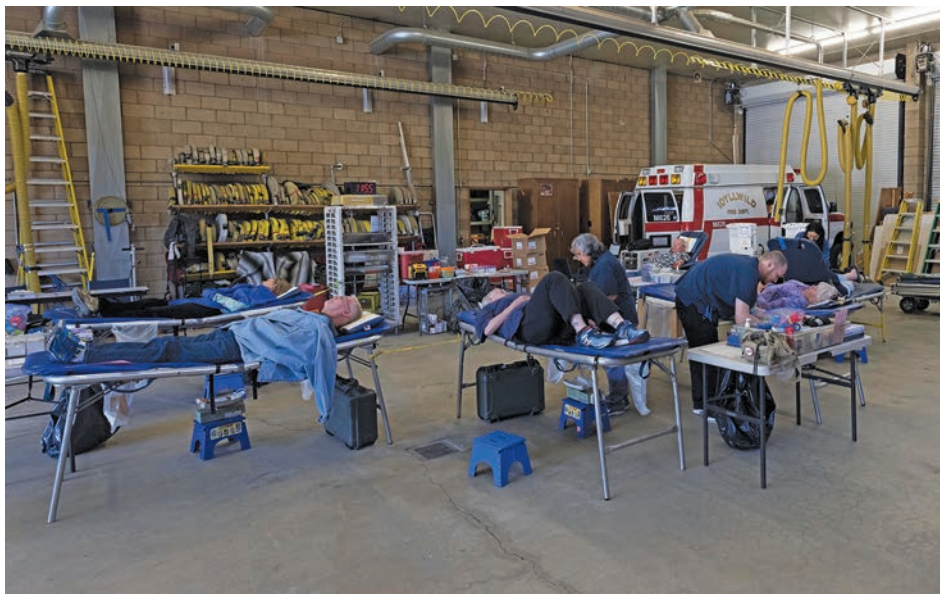
The researchers conducted a series of experiments as part of their study. First, they analyzed what happened when men ages 22 to 50 hit a punching bag as hard as they could. They found that the peak stress level delivered to the bag was between 1.7 to 3 times greater with a fist-strike as compared with a slap.

They then proceeded with experiments two and three, demonstrating that the buttressing provided by the human fist increases the stiffness of the knuckle joint fourfold. It also doubles the ability of the finger to transmit punching force, mainly due to the force transferred from the fingers to the thumb when the fist is clenched.

They also noticed that in terms of the size and shape of hand anatomy, humans could have evolved manual dexterity with longer thumbs but without the fingers and palms getting shorter, similar to their ancestors.

While that study has received much attention since published, more research is being conducted and the jury is still out.

In other words, don't go around punching people when attending a Donald Trump rally and hoping he actually pays for your legal fees as he promised. Remember, this is coming from a guy who has filed bankruptcy four times so I wouldn't hold my breath that he will come bail you out of the slammer.

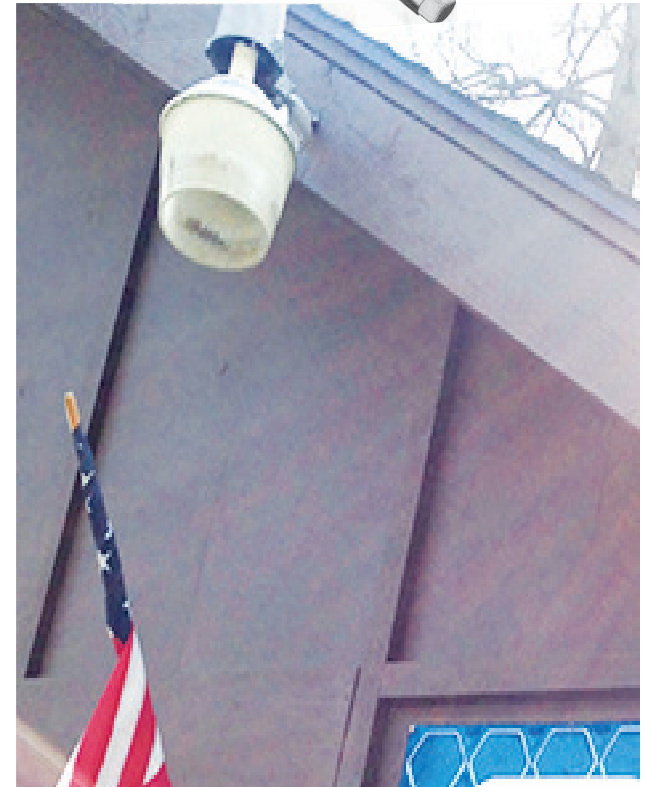

The Riverside County Department of Waste Resources has scheduled a free household hazardous-waste collection event from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, March 26, at the Anza Transfer Station, 40329 Terwilliger Road. The collection is open to all Riverside County residents.

The event will accept residentially generated household hazardous wastes from Riv-

erside County residents only. Waste from business or nonprofits will not be accepted. Typical wastes include used motor oil, paint, antifreeze, household and automotive batteries, pesticides, cleaning products, sharps (needles/syringes or lancets), unused medication (except controlled substances), fluorescent lamps, and electronic wastes such as televisions, computers, VCRs and telephones.

Limit the amount of waste transported to no more than 15 gallons, or 125 pounds maximum per vehicle. Individual containers should be no larger than five gallons nor weigh more than 50 pounds.

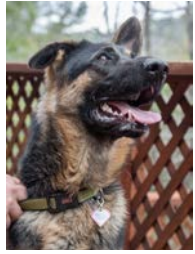

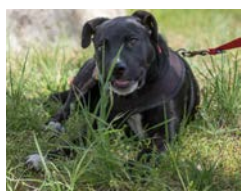

Plants and wildflowers walk

David Bramlet and Patrick Temple, botanists and rare plants of the San Jacinto Wildlife Area specialists, will introduce you to the main plants of the coastal sage scrub, grasslands, riparian and wetland habitats of the SJWA.

Plants along the walk may include the San Jacinto Crownscale, Spreading Navarretia and Threadleaved Brodiaea, all rare plants hard to find outside of the SJWA.

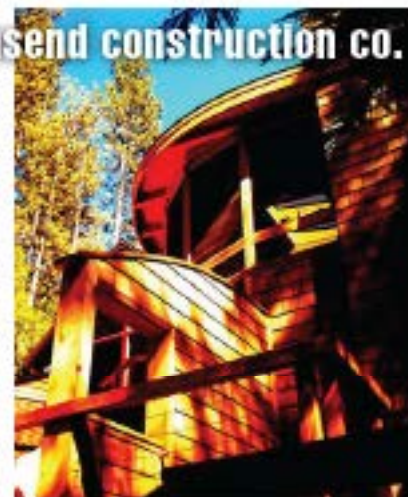

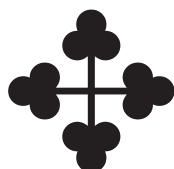



Attorney General Kamala D. Harris has issued a consumer alert warning California businesses to be aware of phishing scams that target the workplace and can lead to data breaches and loss of funds. The scam is commonly called "brand spoofing" or "phishing" because the spam mail sent uses familiar or legitimate-sounding names of companies to trick consumers into disclosing confidential personal information. In the last few weeks, the California Department of Justice has received notifications of data breaches from California companies who have fallen victim to this type of scam.

Complaints and reports describe cybercriminals sending fake emails to businesses in an attempt to trick employees into handing over critical data and, in some instances, money. Based on recent attacks, these phishing emails will falsely appear to be coming from an executive within the business and will be sent to employees who have access to sensitive data and finances. For example, an email that looks like it is being sent from an executive may direct an employee in the finance department to transfer money to an account outside the country or an email sent to an HR manager may ask for all employee W2 forms to be sent to a fake CEO email address.

When employees respond to such emails, they may be facilitating a data breach that puts their co-workers or others at risk of identity theft and subjects their company to significant monetary and reputational costs.

The FBI has issued a public service announcement warning about business email compromise, and the Identity Theft Resources Center and security experts also have warned about this type of scam.

There are measures businesses can take to reduce the risk of falling victim to such scams. In the latest California Data Breach Report, issued last month, the Attorney General's office discussed minimum reasonable security controls businesses should implement, including some that address phishing.

Educate employees on phishing, focusing on the types of data likely to be targeted in individual job roles.

Control access to sensitive data and systems with a "need-to-know" and "least privilege" policy.

Recreation management to shift to new provider

Concurrent with the first public meetings of the new County Service Area 36 Advisory Council, management of CSA 36 recreation also will shift beginning July 1, 2016. The Economic Development Agency will have overall responsibility for all matters within the CSA 36 purview.

But current recreation managers, the Riverside County Regional Park and Open Space District, will no longer be responsible for providing CSA 36 recreation. EDA will contract with a new recreation provider, yet to be selected. The new provider will take over recreation management in Idyllwild on July 1. Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Chuck

Washington's Chief of Staff Vern Lauritzen thought the council would begin public meetings after the July 1 recreation management shift, likely on a monthly basis at first. Both EDA and recreation managers would attend to report to the council and the community. *Marshall Smith can be reached at marshall@towncrier.com.*

Town Hall recreation director will be out on leave

Jacqueline "Jackie" Rodriguez, Town Hall recreation director, will begin maternity leave sometime in the near future. Rodriguez took over as recreation director for the county-managed program in May 2015. Kyla Brown, recreation bureau chief for Riverside County Regional Park and Open Space District, current manager of

Idyllwild's recreation program, said they are in the process of hiring someone to replace Rodriguez. "We're looking for a permanent replacement and will be moving Jackie to another location at the end of her leave period," said Brown.

Prior to assuming her present position, Rodriguez worked in a similar capacity for the City of Riverside Parks and Recreation Department, supervising programs that served young persons from ages 4 to 17.

Hurkey Creek Bridge replacement project complete next month

The multi-year project to replace the Hurkey Creek Bridge on Highway 74 in Garner Valley is nearing completion. Caltrans estimates the new bridge will reopen to two-lane traffic in mid to late April, said Joy Schneider, Caltrans public information officer. Planning to replace the 1930s-era bridge, the narrowest point on Highway 74, began in 2012. Caltrans moved to replace the bridge because it was deemed too narrow for present day use by larger and higher-speed vehicles, according to Shelli Lom-

bardo, Caltrans PIO. The existing 23-foot wide bridge roadway, from side railing to railing, was widened to 43.5 feet and the bridge was lengthened from 34.1 to 50 feet. Cost for the bridge replacement, retaining walls and landscaping was initially budgeted at \$2,237,000. The bridge was constructed one lane at a time. One-lane traffic through the construction site opposite Lake Hemet Campgrounds began in November 2015. Traffic control was facilitated by a 24/7 traffic light. On average, traffic delays were in the 5- to 10-minute range. Schneider noted the

project's resident engineer said final elements are in the process of being completed. The last phase of the project, which does not affect the roadway, will involve a year-long monitoring of new landscaping on both sides of the bridge, to ensure healthy establishment of new plantings. Schneider also noted there will be no pedestrian walkways on the bridge. Lake Hemet campers are advised to transit the affected area within the park, not on the highway or the bridge. *Marshall Smith can be reached at marshall@towncrier.com.*

Trischa Clark and Robert Krieger, reviewed all of the applications. They then interviewed four of the applicants and finally recommended Jimenez for the position.

In December, General Manager Steve Erler announced his intention to retire at the end of June. Jimenez's start allows an overlap in time for him to work with Erler and to learn about the district's operations before Erler leaves.

After his selection, Clark said, "I'm glad we put this together and can move forward now."

As chair of the search committee, Krieger moved to hire Jimenez. The starting salary will be \$80,000 with a potential for an increase to \$95,000 annually by January, depending upon his performance.

In water business, FVWD customers consumed 3.9 million gallons of water during the January and February billing period, which is about 310,000 gallons less than a year ago. It also is the lowest water usage in the last decade.

However, the water sales revenue for this period was about \$2,600 less than a year ago. Total water revenue of \$67,400, which includes service charges, also was

down about \$2,500.

The percentage of unaccounted-for water declined this period and in response to a question for President James Rees, Erler said the recently installed new pipelines have helped reduce water loss.

Erler also reported that the winter's rainfall is helping to raise the groundwater level of the wells. One has increased 10 feet in the past month.

"Well levels are coming up and the Strawberry Creek flow is looking good," he said. The district did divert some stream flow and this was the first significant diversion since March 2013, Erler added.

March 17, at the Idyllwild Library to acquaint them with their roles and responsibilities.

The CSA 36 Advisory Council has been inactive for the last several years. But Washington felt the community needed a forum to ask questions and review recreation programs and financials. In the past, the council held public meetings at which recreation managers and Employment Development Agency representatives were tasked to report.

Recreation in Idyllwild is funded in part by parcel tax levies on property owners within the CSA 36 district boundaries. Over the last few years, in the

absence of regular council public meetings, some community members have complained they have had no opportunity to review how their tax dollars were being spent, and no chance to review current programs or suggest new ones.

By reconstituting the council, Washington hopes to increase involvement of recreation users with CSA 36 recreation management.

The council has no policy-making role. It acts as the supervisor's "eyes and ears" regarding recreation and street lights within the CSA district, reporting back to him on questions and/or issues raised in public meetings by attendees.
