Feds sue regarding 2013 Mountain Fire

Suit filed with one day to spare

Two years and 365 days after the July 15, 2013, start of the Mountain Fire that destroyed several Hill homes and structures, and evacuated thousands of residents, the federal government has sued Tarek M. Al-Shawaf, and James and Donna Nowlin of Mountain Center for in excess of \$24 million in damages. The suit was filed in the United States District Court for the Central District of California on Thursday, July 14, with one day to spare before the three-year statute of limitations period would have run out.

The complaint filed by the U.S. Attorney's office in Los Angeles brings five claims for relief labeled negligence, violation of California Pubic Resources Code section 44345, violation of several California Health and Safety Code and Civil Code sections, trespass by fire, and interest and penalties. It also seeks double and triple damages under California Civil Code section 3346, which provides "[f]or wrongful injuries to timber, trees, or underwood upon the land of another, or removal thereof, the measure of damages is three times such sum as would compensate for the actual detriment ..."

The federal government alleges fire suppression costs exceeding \$15 million and natural resource damages exceeding \$9 million, along with emergency rehabilitation costs in excess of \$300,000. The complaint specifies that the natural resource damages include "the costs of rehabilitation, restoration, and reforestation of the burned areas, wrongful injury to the United States' trees, loss of timber and vegetation, loss of habitat, environmental damages, soil damages, loss of use, loss of scenic views, and loss of aesthetic values."

As to the cause of the fire, the complaint alleges that

Pine Cove Water takes issue with IWD positions

At their latest Pine Cove Water District board meeting, the directors covered a variety of topics from the budget to water quality and water use.

After reviewing the budget results, the board discussed several water issues, two of which involved the Idyllwild Water District.

The board endorsed General Manager Jerry Holldber's request for more information regarding the plans and intentions for the proposed recycled wastewater treatment facility at the IWD.

"What is the plan?" is the question, Holldber told the board, about which he is seeking information. Nearly a decade ago, the management plan prepared for the former San Jacinto Mountain Area Water Study Agency expressed some concern and caution about storing recycled water in this type of geographical area.

"We can't support what we don't know," Holldber stated.

In 2010, IWD had shared its original plan-

ning information with PCWD, who is concerned about maintaining the quality of the groundwater in the vicinity of Foster Lake if IWD were to pump the water output from the treatment facility to the lake.

Since then, IWD has received grant and loan funds from the state to proceed with construction of the facility. IWD is completing its engineering specifications to be available with its request for construction bids in the next year.

On the advice of the district's legal counsel, Brad Neufeld of Graham, Savage, Nolan and Tilde, Holldber requested information such as reports, engineering or consultant studies and other data about the project from IWD, who has said it is collecting the information.

"Basically we have no information from IWD. So I asked for it from the time of the request to Terry Lyons [former IWD general manager]," Holldber told the board. "I have a lot of questions and no answers. Brad said to ask for everything."

Board President Rob-

ert Hewitt, speaking for his colleagues, supported the request for more information. Also Jeff Smith, Pine Cove resident, said, "You need to make certain there is no harm to Pine Cove resources. You have an obligation to ensure groundwater quality."

Providing water to the Idyllwild Community Center to be constructed at the Butterfield Commons at Strawberry Creek was the other topic involving IWD. Since that district is not issuing any new "will-serve" letters, the center's construction might be delayed until IWD can extract itself from a Stage 2 water emergency.

However, PCWD has no prohibition on new customers; therefore, Holldber has contacted Janice Lyle, president of the San Jacinto Mountain Community Center board, about supplying water to the center. He added that Fern Valley Water District may also explore its options to help. The PCWD board also was supportive of this action.

Pine Cove resident Marge Muir, also a member of the SJMCC board, said, "We'll use it and

Three traffic collisions on Hill roads recently

At 10:40 a.m. Saturday, July 16, Ryan Lasan Smith, 24, of Oceanside, was riding his black 2006 Yamaha motorcycle eastbound on Highway 74, 3.7 miles west of McCall Park Road, when he lost control while rounding a curve. He laid the bike down and suffered moderate injuries — visible abrasions to elbow and pain in the shoulder. He was transported by ambulance to Riverside University Health System in Moreno Valley.

At 2:25 p.m. Sunday, July 17, Jacob Sanchez, 22, of San Antonio, Texas, was riding his black 2008 Harley-Davidson motorcycle north on Highway 243 just south of Marian View Drive when he crossed over the double-yellow line and sideswiped a black 1998 Saturn sedan. The sedan was being driven south on 243 by Savannah O'Bryan, 20, of Anza, at the time of the collision.

O'Bryan was not injured but Sanchez suffered a broken left ankle and required transportation to Desert Regional Medical Center in Palm Springs.

Also on Sunday, Patrick Hansel, 41, of Palm Desert, was driving his white 2014 Kia Sorento east on Highway 74 behind a silver 2015 Chevy Silverado truck driven by David Galvin, 61, of San Diego. Hansel attempted to pass Galvin's truck near Pinyon Drive in Pinyon. For reasons unstated in the California Highway Patrol report, when Galvin crossed into the opposing lane he lost control, causing his vehicle to overturn.

Neither driver was hurt in the incident and no other vehicles were involved.

there are no boundaries on water. I appreciate you taking the opportunity to study this."

Improved fire engine for Pine Cove area

Despite deciding not to extend its parcel fee for this year, the Community Service Area 38 (Pine Cove) Advisory Committee is moving forward on several projects to improve and enhance the Hill's fire defense.

The purchase of a Type 6 quick-attack vehicle is the most prominent. The committee has been urging Riverside County to purchase another engine for Station 23 (Pine Cove) for several years. The committee even included money in its budget last year and this year for the purchase. The CSA 38 cash balance was slightly more than \$720,000 at the end of May, according to the financial report.

However, Cal Fire and Riverside County Fire Department Division Chief Bill Weiser reported to the committee that the county thinks the smaller Type 6 vehicle would actually be better and more efficient for use in Pine Cove than a larger engine.

"The big plus is this engine is better in the bad weather on the Hill," he said. "It will give more versatility to the crews at Station 23, and is better in the ice and snow."

The Type 6 engine will cost about \$250,000 or slightly more, which is less than the Type 3 engine already at the station. It will have water-pumping capability, has room for emergency medical equipment and will hold the same size crew, according to Weiser. The county is purchasing Type 6 vehicles for several stations in the valley.

"On-duty personnel will have the discretion to use what equipment is required," he added.

The fiscal year 2016-17 CSA 38 budget also includes funding for a wood chipper and masticator. These have not been purchased while RCFD evaluates which models might be most effective on the Hill, as well as considers several other related issues, such as what kind of vehicle would move the equipment.

Several committee members were concerned that this equipment would be used more often in other locations than Pine Cove. Weiser assured them that the committee controls the equipment's use. Michael Franklin,

from the county's Economic Development Agency's CSA management team, also emphasized that if the equipment were needed for another project, EDA would assist the committee to prepare a contract and agreement for its use.

Weiser emphasized the value of these pieces to the construction of fuelbreaks. He has discussed the maintenance and extension of fuelbreaks in Pine Cove with U.S. Forest Service local staff.

While several issues remain, Weiser discussed four different fuelbreaks being considered for immediate work. One of the issues will be preparing a plan that meets the California Environmental Quality Act criteria. He said RCFD may need some help from the CSA committee to hire a licensed forester to prepare the plan.

"We will try to protect the whole community," he emphasized.

The committee also discussed purchasing more fire hydrants in the community. Vice Chair Marge Muir expressed some caution about using CSA funds for this purpose since the parcel fee will go away. But other members stressed the hydrants were for fire protection of the whole community and were not just the Pine Cove Water District's responsibility to purchase.

Last on the committee's agenda was creating a committee to investigate the use and future of Squad 23 at the station. When the quick-attack vehicle arrives and has EMS capability, the squad's usefulness will decline. The committee — composed of CSA committee members Robert Hewitt and Muir, American Medical Response Manager Jack Hansen and Weiser or an appointee from RCFD — will gather information about what alternatives the committee may have for the squad's future.

Ahead of the subcommittee's work, Weiser offered to have a mechanic inspect the squad to assess its operational condition.

Before the meeting ended, Hansen reported that in the first year of AMR's operation on the Hill, it received 220 medical calls, of which more than half (118) became transports to medical facilities. These calls served Pine Cove, Mountain Center and the Lake Hemet area.

structural maintenance, engineering, transportation and travel, and board fees were down.

During June, PCWD customers used about 3.6 million gallons of water, Holldber reported. The June usage is 1.3 million gallons more than May and 40,000 gallons more than June 2015.

For the first six months of 2016, total

production has been 14.2 million gallons, which is 1.1 million gallons, or 7.6 percent, less than the first half of 2015. This year's first six months' consumption is the lowest in the past decade.

"All the wells are doing alright. Some are lower [groundwater level] and some are up," Holldber told the board. Well no. 10, the monitoring well, remained the same as May.

Reply to 'Open letter to Idyllwild Christians'

Frank and Harriet Thompson wrote a letter published in the July 7 TC ex-



pressing their dislike of the "Separation of Church and State" enshrined in the 1st Amendment. I disagree, but respect their right to voice their opinion.

But during their polemic, they cited "non-gender bathrooms" as an "attack on Christian beliefs." This is a shameful misrepresentation of Jesus' teachings.

Jesus had only two directives concerning morality:

1) Treat the other as you would wish to be treated. (Mt 7:12 and Lk 6:31)

2) Exclude no group from this treatment, even those very different from yourself, even your "enemies." (Mt 5:41-48)

During Jesus' time, the law dictated that if a Roman soldier (the "enemy" to Jews at that time) asked a Jew to carry his pack, the Jew must do so, for 1 mile. Jesus told his disciples that if such an enemy soldier asked you to carry his pack for a mile, you should volunteer to carry it for 2. (Mt 5:41)

If you perceive transgender individuals to be different from yourself in a significant way, then it's exactly that group that will be the measure of your empathy; Jesus' challenge is to stretch your sphere of empathy. Fern Valley Water District board considers capital expenditures

The Fern Valley Water District Board of Directors met last Friday and discussed future capital expenditures and the approval of a candidate for the California Special Districts Association Board of Directors.

Under consideration is construction to expand the board meeting room and the replacing of district field trucks. Director Robert Krieger led the discussion regarding replacing older vehicles and office construction, noting that board-room construction would require modifying the current budget. "We will have to make budget adjustments," he said. The current budget does include replacing existing field trucks.

The board directed General Manager Victor Jimenez to commence the search for two trucks. Purchase of a third truck (the district currently fields three) would be deferred until later. Krieger noted a preference for diesel, given fuel economy and engine durability and purchase within Riverside County, so that taxes would go to the county. Jimenez noted that reducing current purchase to two trucks is well within the budget.

President Jim Rees said he would begin investiga-

tion of the project to expand the board meeting room, which would include adding central air as part of the project. In answer to a question from Director Charlie Wix regarding construction timeline, Rees estimated the project, including plan check with the county, could be completed within six months. "The actual job would only take about 60 days," said Rees. Both discussion items — the truck purchases and building construction — would be action items for the August board agenda.

Krieger queried, as part of the general manager's report, water loss of 11 percent in 2016 compared to 14.7 percent in 2015 for the May/June period. Jimenez reported that last month the loss was only 5 percent. Jimenez complimented the field staff for the excellent job they have been doing.

The board voted to authorize Rees to sign a ballot, in the California Special Districts Association 2016 board election, to re-elect current CSDA President Bill Nelson, given his service, experience and background.

The board confirmed the next meeting will be at 9 a.m. Friday, Aug. 19.

Immunotherapy progress ...

On Aug. 11, 2015, the news came out that former U.S. President Jimmy Carter was diagnosed with cancer that had spread to his liver and his brain. Despite giving an upbeat and cheerful press conference, Carter, now 91, seemed almost peacefully resigned to his prognosis which, as you can imagine, was not good.

However, his doctors just recently gave an update and announced that his cancer was no longer detectable. How did this happen?

Did Carter get some extra points for being a devout evangelical and born-again Southern Baptist? Did karma finally kick in for his tremendous work to help the poor and less fortunate? Don't wanna burst your bubble but there is a simpler and more scientific explanation: immunotherapy.

First, we must remember that there are so many different types of cancer (about 200 are currently known). And people respond differently to a particular treatment

based largely on their immune-system response — even to treatment. That's why doctors will often combine treatments for cancers depending on the type, stage, location and patient's overall health.

Immunotherapy helps the immune system recognize cancer cells and fight back more efficiently through the addition of man-made proteins. Although not a new treatment, immunotherapy has gained momentum in the medical community in the last couple of years.

In September 2014, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration granted accelerated approval to a new drug for patients in life-threatening stages from certain types of cancer who had exhausted other treatment options (which included Jimmy Carter who had advanced melanoma). The drug pembrolizumab (aka keytruda), now an FDA-approved drug, blocks melanoma's pathway to reproduction. And it helps the immune system better recognize and attack cancer cells.

While the drug did not help all of the cancer patients during the initial trial, it did help some, including Carter. Thus, researchers are cautiously optimistic about the results and hope to keep developing and expanding immunotherapy to treat even more types of cancers. Clinical studies dealing with lymphomas, breast cancer and bladder cancer already are underway.

Despite being in remission, Carter will still have to get regular health checks because, as we all know too well, cancer never gives up without a fight.

Oh, and note to ex-Texas governor and Republican presidential candidate Rick Perry: It's not OK to compare people to cancer no matter how much of a ridiculous carnival act they are (especially if you're gonna just endorse them later).

Idyllwild Actors Theatre presents 'On Golden Pond'

Idyllwild Actors Theatre presents Ernest Thompson's "On Golden Pond," the 1979 play made into an Academy Award-winning 1981 film starring Henry Fonda and Katherine Hepburn. The IAT, one of the Hill's longest-running theatrical companies, presents its main-stage production at the end of this month, from Friday, July 29, through Sunday, July 31, outdoors on the garden stage behind Rainbow Inn.

Thompson has a close professional relationship with IAT founder and "On Golden Pond" director Suzanne Avalon. Thompson, an actor before becoming a playwright and screenwriter, directed and starred in his play "The Elixir" for IAT in 2008. In addition to Thompson, the IAT cast included Avalon, Jeri Greene, Christopher Pennock and Frank Siebke. Thompson also wrote "Political Suicide," which Avalon directed for IAT in 2012.

The "On Golden Pond" story, familiar to many because of the success of the film, is a rare one. It centers on intertwined love relationships with an older couple at the core. Cantankerous 79-year-old retired University of Pennsylvania professor Norman Thayer Jr. and his wife Ethel visit their cabin on Golden Pond in Maine. The normally placid summer is interrupted by a visit from their daughter Chelsea, estranged from her father, who has not visited for more than eight years.

Old wounds open, anger flares, tears come and eventually, there is an end of summer, and perhaps a final summer, resolution.

In the play, Norman leaves Golden Pond at

the end of the summer in which he celebrated his 80th birthday, uncertain if he will ever return. In a life-mirrors-fiction coincidence, Henry Fonda, who played Norman in the film, died in August 1982, the summer after the film was released. Fonda had received his only Best Actor Academy Award in March 1982.

The play has been translated into 30 languages, most recently into Arabic, and performed in 45 countries on six continents, largely because of the familiarity of the family dynamics that propel the play — the complex emotional interweavings of a wife living with and loving an often hard-to-love husband, a daughter who was not the "son" or success her father might have preferred, her fiancé and his young son she brings for a visit, uncertain how her new relationship would play out with her disapproving and judgmental father.

Dressed in sentiment, bristled with impatience and caustic exchanges, and ultimately touching and life-affirming, "On Golden Pond" stars Kathleen Walker, Marshall Smith, Jeri Greene, Jacob Teel, Chris Doshier and Kolten Darling.

"On Golden Pond" plays at 8 p.m. in the garden behind Rainbow Inn Friday, July 29, through Sunday, July 31. It is a fully staged production with lights, sets and costumes. Tickets are \$18 and are available at the door or online at www.idyllwildactorstheatre.com. There is a reception each night before the performance at 7:30 p.m. "Enjoy theater under the stars," urged Avalon.

Dete Meserve returns to Idyllwild Author Series

With 'Perfectly Good Crime'

Los Angeles author Dete Meserve returns to the Idyllwild Author Series with "Perfectly Good Crime" (Melrose Hill Publishing, 2016), a follow up to her successful first outing "Good Sam."

"Stories about senseless murders, tragic accidents, massive fraud and the dark side of the American Dream dominate the headlines," notes Meserve. "I was inspired to write 'Good Sam' because I wondered: instead of yet another story about a serial killer, what if there was an anonymous person secretly doing extraordinary good?"

She continues that exploration of altruism, albeit with an ethical twist, in her new novel "Perfectly Good Crime." It's a fast-paced mystery with a curious conundrum at its core. Its thesis and propelling question is "can you bring about powerful and uplifting change by committing a perfectly good crime?"

The publication of "Perfectly Good Crime" comes at a time of growing national confusion, angst and violence. "It's one piece of bad news after another," Meserve noted, "with people saying, 'It's not going to get better.' How do you deal with that sense of despair?"

Her answer, as posited in both her novels, is to act in ways that create positive change. "You can help your neighbors and your friends, with small and meaningful gestures that can lift us up," she said. "When you help

someone else you get back so much more than you give."

"Perfectly Good Crime" imagines a series of high-tech heists of the estates of the 100 wealthiest Americans. Nothing is damaged and the goods stolen — cash and super-expensive luxury goods — are, to the average Joe, the objectionable and undeserved booty of the uber rich. As her central character television reporter Kate Bradley investigates the heists, leading TV crews into the unimaginably extravagant villas of the victims, viewers see luxuries and lifestyles that are jaw-dropping.

Early in the novel, Bradley discovers viewers are finding satisfaction in the robbing of the rich. The twitter-sphere becomes electric with tweets such as, "A 60,000-square-foot house? These rich people deserve to be robbed."

And that is where the novel begins to take off. What is the purpose of these immaculately executed robber-

ies and to what end will the \$20 million in stolen cash and luxury items be used?

Meserve writes with an authority that comes from working within the broadcast media she writes about. As a principal of Wind Dancer Films, she develops and funds feature films and television series. As a result, she also understands the tastes and appetites of her audiences, including the attraction to and media focus on what is dark and disastrous.

"I'm truly convinced that there is far more good going on in this world than the news media have time or commercial inclination to tell us," she said. And it is from this conviction that her stories unfold. "How do we get people to pay attention to the homeless and veterans when it's not 'dramatic?'" she asked. "One thing would be to commit a crime. That would be a way into the story."

Hi-Lo alternative school celebrates its 40th reunion

An alternative school, known at various times as Hi-Lo Alternative and at others as LIFE (learn in freedom education), celebrates a 40th class reunion at noon Saturday, July 23. The reunion will be held at Hurkey Creek campground, according to organizer Kathie Beale.

The school started in 1973 with 41 students from Idyllwild (high elevation) and Anza (lower elevation), hence the name Hi-Lo. It called the Idyllwild School of Music and the Arts (ISOMATA) campus, now Idyllwild Arts, its home during the academic years from 1973 until 1975. For its final academic year, 1975-76, the school moved to Idyllwild Pines Camp. Students from Anza and Idyllwild attended 8th through twelfth grades at Hi-Lo during its years of operation. By the time the school closed its doors in 1976, 150 students had passed through its doors, according to Beale.

Alum Steven Kunkle remembers a weeklong field trip to Fort Ross up the California coast and a movie the stu-

dents made, "Never the Twain Shall Meet," that placed in the Palm Springs Film Festival. "Dave Sandlin [current Idyllwild resident] was the star," said Kunkle.

Hi-Lo was one of a number of start-up high schools that existed on the Hill and later ceased operation. It was headed by Mary Glavin and included teachers Bob Davis and Ellen O'Tool. The most enduring of them, Desert Sun School (later the Elliott Pope Academy), operated for 65 years before closing its doors in December 1990.

The Idyllwild Arts Academy, which began in 1986 as a boarding high school for the arts, with an academic year running from September through May, is still in operation. The Idyllwild Arts Foundation, of which the Academy is a part, is celebrating its 70th anniversary this year, having begun in 1946 as a summer program of workshops and classes in the arts, initially for adults.

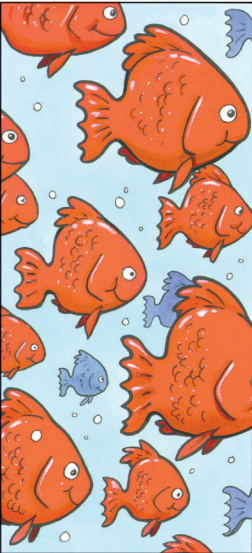
Topics of discussion will include preparing audition and portfolio material, comparing types of programs and institutions, balancing arts with academic interests, and understanding the complex world of college applications.

Hill residents Lon and Susan Paul, Martin Prevosto, Alisia Fisher, Doug McKellar and MTS&L Inc. aka McKellar Tree Service and Landscaping Inc. also filed a separate lawsuit for damages they sustained in the same blaze.

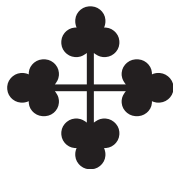

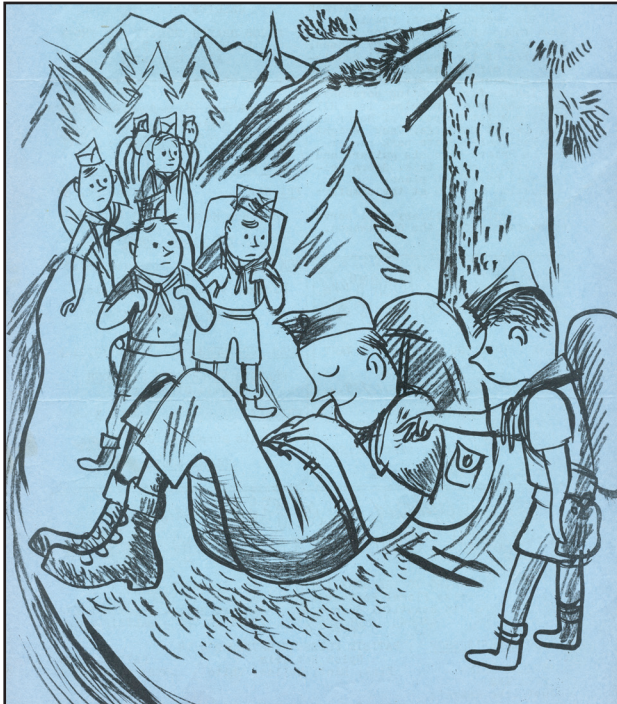
Idyllwild Art Fair back on Aug. 6

“[i]nvestigators determined that the Mountain Fire ignited in a plastic electrical junction box on the Gibraltar West property. The junction box housed electrical wires running from the electrical panel of the main house on the property to a water well on the property ... The junction box’s lid was warped, not properly secured, and ajar. As a result, an electrical discharge inside the box shot sparks and hot material out of the box and onto dry ground vegetation below.”

The complaint further alleged that, under California law, the defendants owed “non-delegable and statutory duties to properly inspect and maintain their electrical equipment, electrical wires, and electrical junction boxes to ensure that they were safe, properly secured, and clear from dangerous conditions.”

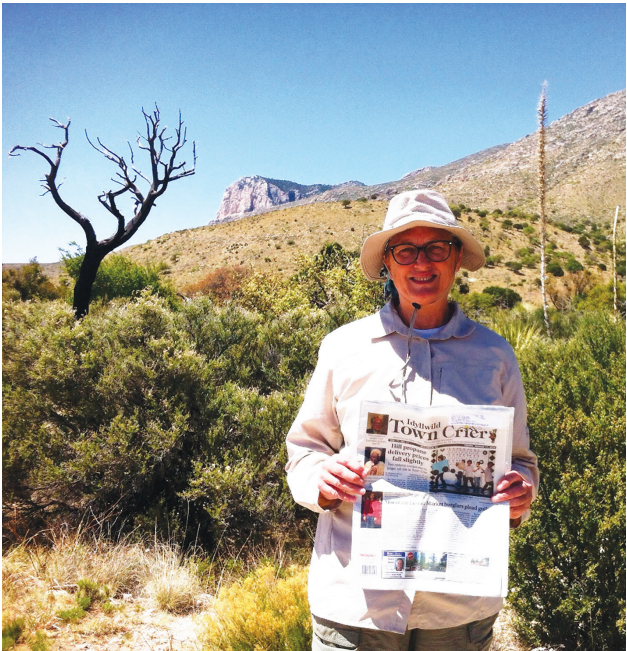
Gibraltar West is the name of Al-Shawaf’s property in Mountain Center. Al-Shawaf admitted in response to Cal Fire’s lawsuit filed a year ago that the Nowlins were his employees on the property.

The complaint alleges that on Feb. 17, 2016, the United States demanded that the defendants pay the costs and damages incurred but the defendants “have not paid any part of the sum demanded by the United States.”
