Idyllwild Water District board stalemates

Cook opposes filling vacancies for six months

On Thursday evening, the first meeting of the remaining three directors of the Idyllwild Water District ended in chaos. The frustration of encountering an obstacle to quickly replacing the vacant board seats through appointment rather than waiting until a March election and repeating that again next August, drove directors Steve Kunkle and June Rockwell to adjourn the meeting and leave the building.

Acting President John Cook maintained that the legal opinion, which he sought from the water district's attorney, required unanimity for any board action. During a brief discussion on whether to follow this opinion or to adopt a policy of a majority of the three directors (two) could approve actions, Cook threatened to immediately resign and force the dis-

trict into the hands of the county Board of Supervisors.

When Kunkle recommended that the staff at least collect names of interested potential directors, Cook refused to permit that. Interestingly, he had requested, on his own, that staff collect names for possible interim and permanent general manager candidates.

Cook argued that the district was dangerously close to exhausting its water supply. He referred to it as "overdrafting." Other than reporting that Foster Lake was empty, former General Manager Tom Lynch never asserted that the district was on the edge of over-using its water supply.

In fact, Lynch never provided a comprehensive report on the district's water conditions despite requests from several present and former directors. Contributing to the lack of water in Foster Lake was

Lowman Hall formally dedicated with alumni classical concert

The William M. Lowman Concert Hall, an architectural and acoustical jewel gracing the Idyllwild Arts campus, was formally dedicated on Saturday, Sept. 24, with a gala alumni classical concert and reception.

Although an alumni jazz concert was the first held in Lowman, on March 5 of this year, the formal inauguration had always been scheduled for the September date. Past Music Director Ransom Wilson and the Summer Program Festival Orchestra's conductor Larry Livingston returned to conduct.

The program featured Mozart and Ravel with 2000 violinist alum Simeon Simeonov playing Ravel's "Tzigane" and 2006 pianist alum Michael Noble playing Ravel's Piano Concerto in G major. Wilson conducted both Ravel pieces. Livingston conducted Mozart's Symphony No. 41 in C major, the "Jupiter," and his overture to Don Giovanni.

The hall itself also was a featured star with its extraordinarily rich sound spectra for acoustic instruments. The 8,000-square-foot hall was designed by award-winning architect Whitney Sander of Venice, California, with acoustic engineering by ARUP North

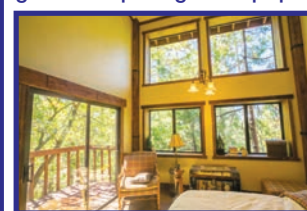

One fender bender and one DUI last week

Two non-injury vehicle crashes took place over the last week on Hill roads.

At 1:20 pm. Saturday, Sept. 24, two vehicles were westbound on Highway 74 just east of the intersection with Highway 371 when one vehicle attempted to pass the other.

Sean Stowe, 36, of La Quinta, was driving his 2017 black Cadillac sedan westbound on Highway 74. Behind him, Elbert Hill, 62, of Indio, was also driving westbound in a 2015 white Dodge Ram truck. Ahead of Stowe and Hill was an unidentified motorist driving slowly, estimated to be driving at around 50 mph.

According to California Highway Patrol Officer Mike Muraski's on-scene report, Hill attempted to legally pass Stowe just at the time Stowe pulled out to pass the slow-driving motorist in front of him.

This caused Stowe's Cadillac to sideswipe Hill's passing truck, causing damage to both vehicles — on the left side of Stowe's Cadillac and on the right of Hill's truck. The unidentified motorist proceeded onward without being involved.

According to Officer Darren Meyer, CHP public information officer, Stowe was responsible for both checking his rear and side view mirrors as well as what was ahead of him before attempting to pass. Because he failed to do so, it was Stowe who was responsible for executing an unsafe turning movement.

There were no injuries and no other vehicles were involved in the collision.

At 4:04 a.m. Monday, Sept. 26, Paul Garlock, 50, of Idyllwild, was driving his 2009 white Chevrolet Impala north on Highway 243 a half-mile north of Twin Pines Road, when he ran off the road and hit the mountainside. According to Meyer, Garlock's vehicle had major damage to the front and rear end, indicating that the

Stolen bears and Franklins disturb peace

On Sunday, Sept. 25, a man in a blue-plaid shirt, described as Hispanic in his early 50s, visited a number of Idyllwild businesses attempting to get change for \$100 bills. The bills were likely counterfeit although that has not yet been confirmed. At one shop, he did manage to get change resulting in a petty theft of \$100.

Reports of armed robberies proved unsubstantiated by facts. At Tarah Jade, a woman's clothing shop on North Circle, a customer said she thought she saw a gun in the man's waistband when he was in the shop. But a gun was never brandished or used when the man attempted to exchange his \$100 bill for smaller bills.

When the employee opened the cash drawer and took money out, the man grabbed the money and fled, according to owner Shawna Risnes. Consequently, there is no \$100 bill to determine its authenticity.

Deputies were on the Hill Tuesday to determine if any other businesses were hit and suffered any loss.

The incident is under investigation and as yet, the man has not been apprehended. The incident was reported just after 3 p.m. Sunday and Riverside County Sheriff's deputies arrived after 6 p.m. They had been on their way earlier, but a large explosion in Temecula diverted them.

unlawful taking for value under \$950. Typically, sheriff's deputies are not immediately dispatched unless a crime is underway and posing some level of danger. And under 2014 Proposition 47, thefts for value under \$950 are classified as misdemeanors and would not normally require immediate deputy dispatch.

In a separate incident, three large David Roy-carved bears valued at between \$12,000 and \$13,000 dollars were stolen from their location at a home at the top of Upper Pine Crest Avenue. The bears were large, one topping 10 feet, and heavy. They were stolen before or during the week of Sept. 19, from in front of a residence at 55320 Upper Pine Crest. They were brightly lit at night and Upper Pine Crest at that point is basically a very quiet dead-end street. Yet immediate neighbors did not notice or report any out-of-the-ordinary activity.

Jim Brannan, Cottage Caretakers, who services the home, noticed the smaller two bears had been removed when he checked the home on Monday, Sept. 19. He noticed the largest of the three had been removed when he again checked on Thursday, Sept. 23. The part-time owner of the property reported the thefts to the Riverside County Sheriff's Department.

Brannan said he had talked to people who walked regularly in the area and they had not noticed anything. The incident is under investigation. The carvings are iconic and unmistakable. Anyone with information on the theft should call the Riverside County Sheriff's Department, Hemet Station, 951-791-3412.

John Cook vs. Brown Act

I'm on vacation, so this week's column comes from Mr. Clark.

The acting president of the Idyllwild Water District board, John Cook, made a surprising move on Monday.

He sent an email to fellow board directors Steve Kunkle and June Rockwell suggesting that the three of them meet for what he called "a study session" in order "to create a 'to do' list of things that need to be done, studied or changed." He then suggested that they all three could meet with staff during the day and that the three directors could meet again in the evening to discuss IWD matters.

Such meetings, of course, would be in violation of that portion of the California Government Code known as the Brown Act.

Implementation of Cook's suggestion would violate the Brown Act by having quorum meetings outside of properly noticed, regular or special public board meetings. In fact, Cook's very email to his other two fellow board members was in itself a violation of the Brown Act on his part — a communication among a quorum of IWD directors about public business outside of the public view.

The special irony here is that at the last public IWD meeting, Cook was the sole board member holding out for a special election of interim directors in March, instead of allowing the remaining board members to appoint interim directors who would serve until August, which California law permits. Directors Kunkle and Rockwell urged the appointment by the board of interim directors as soon as possible. But Cook insisted that the public, not just the remaining three board members, should choose the two interim board members. Yet he's now suggesting that a quorum of the board meet to do the district's business outside of the public's view.

Maybe he feels he can suspend the Brown Act because of the dire situation IWD now finds itself in — that desperate times require desperate measures, including violating the law. But chaotic times are exactly when law is needed most.

the district's decision to stop diverting Strawberry Creek water to that reservoir.

Further, as reported regularly, the district water production has fluctuated monthly during the past several years, but the trend has been downward. Since 2013, IWD's annual water production has fallen more than 6 million gallons, representing an 8 percent decrease.

Besides the falling demand, Lynch and Cook proudly announced in August that the recent rehabilitation of two wells has increased the district's water supply from 6 to 33 percent. Lynch previously reported that last year's rehabilitation of the horizontal wells at Foster Lake allegedly added 10 percent to IWD's resources.

"He has amply demonstrated his success," Cook said of Lynch. "He cared about well production — significantly increasing our well production."

Cook would not explain how the decreasing demand and increasing supply were creating a dangerous "tipping point" due to overdrafting of water.

The district's conference room was packed with public attendees. Extra chairs were needed to seat all who were there. Public comments consumed the first 45 minutes of the meeting.

Cook said the district would waive the Brown Act limitation on comments that a special meeting must address only items on the agenda. "We want you to speak on any concern or issue or problem. We need to know. Citizens are unclear on the objection and what it's about."

Eight people took advantage of the opportunity to address the board and the large segment of the public in the room. The comments addressed multiple issues — questions about the "overdrafting" statement, a recommendation to delay hiring a general manager, to use time to consider consolidation of Hill water districts, questions about water rates, support for electing the replacement directors and for the opposite, urging the

board not to delay action and make appointments soon.

After acknowledging the three resignations, the current directors were able to agree to approve a proclamation — a plaque thanking the two former directors for their time and contribution to the district.

The next item of the seven on the agenda, was a discussion of the procedure to fill the board's vacant seats. California law allows the remaining directors to either appoint interim directors or hold a special election.

Cook stated that he would not support an appointment process and wanted the district to hold an election, which David Wysocki, the district's legal counsel, said would likely be in March 2017.

The replacement for Billman would have the seat, whether by appointment or election, until the district's regular August 2017 election. Freitas' four-year term expires in December 2017, so his replacement would have to stand for election in August, too. Cook must also, because next year is the end of his latest term, having won election in 2013.

While Kunkle urged the necessity to fill at least one vacancy so the district could conduct business, Cook was adamant that an election was the only option he would support because it would be beneficial for the district's voters.

"You were appointed to fill a vacancy, [and] we are in dire straits to fill the board," Kunkle pleaded. "If we don't have unanimous votes, one member can hold the board captive."

Rockwell supported Kunkle's proposal saying, "I want to fill the vacancies as soon as possible in order to move forward."

At this point, Cook professed that he could not understand the current opposition to the board and implied that it was malicious. "Everybody that I talked to are confused. Why is there such controversy ... I still can't get my arms around this issue, which is so significant that the district was brought to its knees."

Cook believes only an election will provide an ample opportunity for the district's voters to learn

IWD president pursues secret meetings

Acting Idyllwild Water board President John Cook has taken the initiative to solicit his colleagues' agreement to meetings violating the Brown Act, California's open government law.

After the Thursday, Sept. 22, aborted meeting, Cook wrote to directors Steve Kunkle and June Rockwell requesting the three directors attend "study sessions."

One of his objectives is to hire an interim general manager, since Tom

Lynch resigned unexpectedly two weeks ago. However, Cook has refused to explain how the names of potential candidates were collected since he publicly refused to allow staff to collect names of potential board members.

Rockwell and Kunkle have recommended that the district run an advertisement requesting candidates apply for the interim general manager position and possible board appointments.

Section 54952.2 clearly states that a majority of the board in the same place and same time to discuss or take action on item within their jurisdic-

tion is a meeting unless it meets specific criteria for being closed.

The act does allow closed meetings for the appointment or employment of an employee. But even closed meeting agendas must be posted and noticed publicly.

Cook told Kunkle and Rockwell their meetings should be limited to issues to which they all agree; thus, seeking votes outside a meeting. If they did not agree, he would not hold a public meeting until the November regular meeting.

about the issues, such as the condition of IWD's water, and the candidates' positions.

"My position is to call for an election," he stated adamantly.

In opposition, Rockwell repeated her position, "This is an emergency, and we should not wait."

When Cook refused to budge, the frustration of the other two board members manifested itself with a motion to adjourn. Cook opposed this action, but Kunkle and Rockwell voted "yea," collected their papers, stood up and left the building.

Left to himself, Cook then adjourned the meeting.

Government not the only solution, says Milne

Editor's note: The supervisor's seat for Riverside County's 3rd District will be on the ballot on Nov. 8. Incumbent Chuck Washington, who was appointed in March 2015 to complete the term of former Supervisor Jeff Stone, is seeking a full four-year term. Shellie Milne, Hemet City Council member, is challenging Washington.

Both candidates have agreed to come to Idyllwild for a Candidates' Forum, 6 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 6, at the Idyllwild Nature Center.

The Idyllwild Town Crier, which is sponsoring the event, interviewed both candidates prior to the forum. These interviews are in this week's paper and available on our website.

Shellie Milne was elected to the Hemet City Council in November 2012. She and her husband Kevin own a small business — dirt excavation. They have six children ranging in age from 9 years to 25 years.

What are your priorities for the county and the district?

While Milne believes government — national and local — has encroached and expanded into areas that individuals and the private sector can effectively manage, she still believes in the role of government.

However, that means she will strive to “re-prioritize where the tax dollars are spent. The scope and breadth [of government] has grown so large it has to be reigned in.”

She wants to raise the priority of public safety, especially law enforcement. “But it is not just the priorities, government is too big, it needs to shrink down.” In her opinion, budgets grow because officials believe that the solution to problems is “throwing money at them.”

The county is growing, how would you raise revenue?

Milne argues that the county budget is big enough to respond to the county's future growth. Re-assessing priorities is one step, but just as important is finding processes to improve the efficiency of the county's workforce.

“We must ensure that they have the tools they need and the money must be spent efficiently,” she said. “Unfortunately we continue to do things that we do not need.”

As an example of how the public can help, she related an incident on one of her company's job sites. A tractor was stolen. But rather than calling for a deputy and waiting for his appearance, Milne chose to go the station and report the crime.

“They couldn't fingerprint anything, so why take them off the street,” she said. “We need people to feel empowered, not victimized.”

What about jail capacity?

Her first reaction was to state, “If there are no consequences for crime, it will continue to escalate.” But her point was that many inmates belong in state prison or deported rather than filling county jail cells. Thus, some criminals spend less time behind bars. “If there are no consequences, crime increases.”

Do you see a conflict or competition between the county and the joint fire authority, which IFPD and San Jacinto City have created?

“There has to be a lot of community input,” she replied. When she was elected to the Hemet City Council, it was faced with a budget deficit and the choice to contract with the county. While not an identical issue, she urged the community to be involved in its evaluation.

Do you see a role for county assistance for Idyllwild recreation?

Milne said this project is an example where people need to look at the basic principles of government. “We have to prioritize funding, thus we'll never please all the people all the time,” she said.

A nonprofit organization is demonstration of people stepping to the plate to help the community. “Remember when you asked government to get involved, was that a good choice?” she said.

“Residents of Idyllwild take pride in their own involvement and our goal should be to empower them,” she added.

In closing, Milne said if she were the local supervisor she would review the business plan before deciding whether to direct money to them. “Our first job as supervisor is to remove the road blocks,” she said.

The latest voter registration data for District 3 show that about 43 percent of the voters are registered Republicans, 30 percent are registered Democrats and 24 percent have no party preference. The candidates were asked if that might affect their election strategy?

“People in the district will support people who share the same values and ideologies,” Milne stated. “I would not run in a very Democratic district. There is no doubt that we are the most conservative district.”

Her independent ideas are a positive, Milne believes and will attract voters who are “tired of the ruling political class ... they resonate with people whether they are Republicans, Democrats or Independents. I'm here to represent the taxpayer.”

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife reminds hunters to pay close attention to the occurrence of wildfires in their favorite hunting spots. Current information on forest closures may be found at www.wildlife.ca.gov/hunting/area-alerts.

In addition to monitoring forest closures, CDFW recommends hunters scout potential hunting areas prior to the day of the hunt. Deer can sometimes be difficult to locate, and pre-existing knowledge of deer feeding and bedding areas will provide valuable insight and help maximize chances of success.

Hunters are reminded that as of July 1, 2015, non-lead ammunition is required when hunting on state wildlife areas and ecological reserves.

Lead ammunition may still be used to hunt deer on Bureau of Land Management, national forest and private lands until July 1, 2019.

Washington running on experience and savvy

Editor's note: The supervisor's seat for Riverside County's 3rd District will be on the ballot on Nov. 8. Incumbent Chuck Washington, who was appointed in March 2015 to complete the term of former Supervisor Jeff Stone, is seeking a full four-year term. Shellie Milne, Hemet City Council member, is challenging Washington.

Both candidates have agreed to come to Idyllwild for a Candidates' Forum, 6 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 6, at the Idyllwild Nature Center.

The Idyllwild Town Crier, which is sponsoring the event, interviewed both candidates prior to the forum. These interviews are in this week's paper and available on our website.

Washington, 63, took his seat on the board in March 2015. He is the sole Democrat on the board. He was in his third term as a Temecula council member and served as mayor twice — 2007 and 2012. He has also served as mayor and council member for the city of Murrieta.

Washington is a former Delta Airlines pilot and was vice president of commercial relations at 1st Centennial Bank. He has also served in the U.S. Navy as an officer and pilot.

He is married and has an adult daughter.

What are your priorities for the county and the district?

"My priority is to develop better and strategic infrastructure," Supervisor Chuck Washington replied.

"Infrastructure" means more than roads and bridges to Washington. A safe environment is a critical component of an area's infrastructure. Law enforcement, fire protection and maintenance are key pieces too.

"I'm developing a strategic plan for economic development throughout the district," Washington promised. "Despite each community's differences, there is a common thread throughout the district.

Tourism is the commonality that binds Riverside County's Third District, Washington asserted. From the Temecula wine country, to the lakes — Skinner and Diamond Valley — and trails, camping and the Western Center Academy at the Western Science Center, the Third District has a variety of attractions for non-residents.

Even before joining the board of supervisors in 2015, Washington said his role on the Murrieta and Temecula city councils gave him insight about the role of tourism and who can help develop it.

Specific projects, which Washington hopes to see started and completed in the next few years, include a new library in French Valley, a community center building in Idyllwild and a smaller budget gap in San Jacinto.

What is your opinion of the current county budget situation?

Washington attributed major demands on the county budget to external sources. Two examples include jail expenses. Assembly Bill 109 (signed in 2011) reduced the State prison population, while increasing the local jail inmates. Secondly, the county in response to a lawsuit had to significantly improve health care for local inmates.

During the good economic times, the county took few actions to prepare for the lean times, in his opinion. A change in attitude was demonstrated this year when the board insisted that reserves remain at \$150 million or greater.

"We have to find more efficiencies," Washington stressed. "We have enough money and don't need to ask for more." He then referred to the two previous infrastructure projects.

"The library and community center are example of

goals we can achieve without asking the taxpayer for money," he said. "We have to change the ways we do business and the culture of budget."

Would you support increases in the Sheriff's budget to increase deputies for the unincorporated areas?

Washington wants to achieve this result. To do it, he expects the consultant working with the county executive officer to find sufficient savings in the Sheriff's budget to add staff in the unincorporated areas and to address the concerns of the contract cities as well.

"The 3rd District has the highest population besides the distances and the most challenging terrain to patrol," he noted.

What about jail capacity?

The East County Detention Center in Indio will be finished and that will add some capacity. But Washington was cautious about how quickly the ECDC will be fully staffed.

He compared it to adding lanes on a freeway, the traffic congestion is temporarily alleviated, and it is not a permanent solution.

He is more optimistic about the probation office's program to help paroled convicts receive services in one place on the same day.

"Helping these people get jobs is more beneficial. Society doesn't want to spend money on people who don't work or pay taxes," he said. "Reducing recidivism will save us money."

Do you see a conflict or competition between the county and the joint fire authority, which IFPD

and San Jacinto City have created?

"It's not competition for Riverside County Fire," Washington affirmed. "But I don't believe what they will establish will run at the same level as the RCFD can provide. I think Cal Fire does an outstanding job regarding fire protection service and can bring many different resources to the effort."

But Washington plans to stay out of this effort, "It's not for me to say what Idyllwild Fire and San Jacinto want to do."

Do you see a role for county assistance for Idyllwild recreation?

The first plan does not seem to meet the requirement; Washington is confident that county staff has an alternative plan. "Inside of three years, if we stick to the plan, there's a path to completion," he said.

The latest voter registration data show that about 43 percent of the voters are registered Republicans and 30 percent registered Democrats and 24 percent have no party preference. The candidates were asked if that might affect their election strategy?

"I am concerned about that, especially in the southwest portion of the district," he confessed. While the Republican registration exceeds Democrats in his home base of Murrieta and Temecula, Washington is confident that his experience on those city councils has proven "people will vote thinking about a [candidate's] qualification and track record, especially for a non-partisan position."

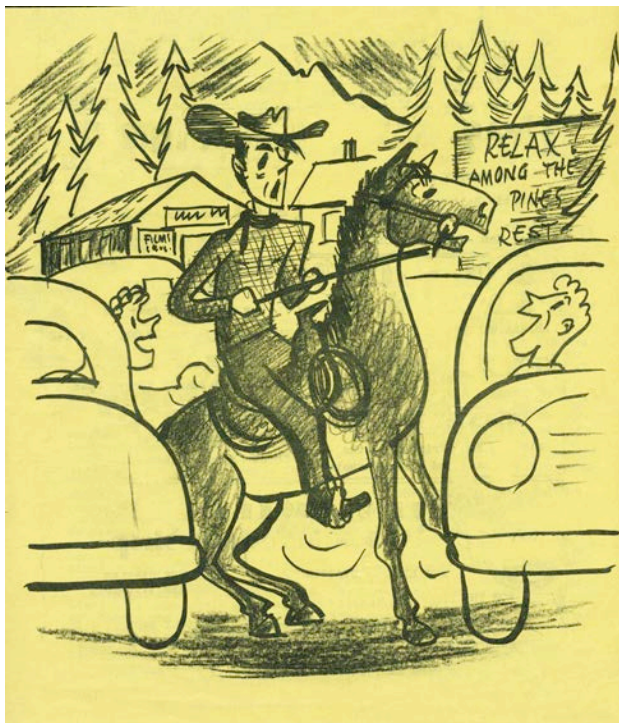

"I've talked to a couple of people. But they will be soon overwhelmed with their nonprofit group service," Layton reported on her recruitment efforts to attract two more members. And Gogerty said his efforts have met similar results. Potential members are fully committed to other groups or efforts.

Charles-Stigall suggested broadening the search to younger people, who might value the service for their résumés.

Besides a lack of a full committee, members also encountered the frustration of incomplete financial reports for the first two months of the fiscal year. Battalion Chief Mark LaMont thought financial consultant Rob Dennis had committed to complete reports by Oct. 1.

Contributing to the delayed financial information was implementing new accounting software. This project is nearly complete and will improve future reporting, according to Layton. "The new system is fully switched over, but the data posting is incomplete," added Chief Patrick Reitz.

One example of the incomplete reports was the lack of any revenue, such as for ambulance trips, for the first two months.

The committee did discuss the prospective flier and public meetings to discuss Measure W, which is the district's proposal to increase the parcel fee. Meetings have been scheduled for late morning and evening on Wednesdays, Sept. 28 and Oct. 5 at Idyllwild Pines Camp.

Bamboo for sustainable home building in Bali

Elora Hardy, CEO of Ibuku, a Bali (Indonesia) based company that builds sustainable, dreamlike structures almost entirely from bamboo, will speak in Idyllwild. She'll talk about reimagining and creating living and work spaces that are more in harmony with nature.

Hardy, formerly a fabric designer for Donna Karan and DKNY in New York, read a book that changed her career track and her life. The book, "Cradle to Cradle: Remaking the Way We Make Things," by William McDonough and Michael Braungart, is a manifesto for a radically different philosophy and practice of manufacture and environmentalism. The authors argue that existing "environmental manufacturing" is inadequate to protect the long term health of the planet and that what is needed is designing from the ground up for both eco-safety and cost efficiency.

"Reading the book made me radically want to change my life," said Hardy. "[McDonough and Braungart] are not just writing about recycling but also about making things that not only don't compromise the environment, they are good for it."

At the same time, Hardy's father John had returned to Bali to pursue his dream of creating an eco-conscious school, the Green School, which opened in 2008. The success of the school created a demand for environmentally friendly homes. Elora, who had grown up in Bali, returned to design bamboo homes and structures and to join her father's ecological crusade.

Treated bamboo, as Hardy will explain, is strong, beautiful and flexible as a building material. "With its four year growth cycle and carbon sequestration capacity, it is the most environmentally conscientious building material conceivable," notes Ibuku promotional material.

Hardy's designs and buildings are dreamlike and durable. In her talk, she will share her belief and working credo that nature can spark sustainable innovation. The

buildings her company has created have been described as sustainable, culturally connected and tradition-defying. Bamboo is a relative of grass but is, with salt based treatment, incredibly strong. Ibuku's philosophy is, "If we can build palaces from grass, then what else is possible?"

Hardy's talk takes place at the Idyllwild Library Community Room at 10 a.m. on Saturday, October 8. It is sponsored by Idyllwild Arts' "Art in Society" program, is free of charge and open to the public.

'Houdini' in performance

Following his debut at age 25, the young man continued his fascination with his adopted performing skill that led to the long line of iron chains, sealed water tanks and prison cells that he demonstrated as not "escape-proof" time after time. Furthermore, Houdini's reputation as the first and foremost debunker of ordinary practitioners of the conjuring art would seal his place in the history of stage magic — even if his best-known performances took place in much larger arenas.

Hudson is well qualified to represent the gentleman magician, through his extensive researches of the subject as well as his stage presence. One only has to remember Hudson's extraordinary personifications of most of the major characters in his adaptation of Dickens' "A Christmas Carol," as well as other solo efforts involving various authors.

The Friends certainly expect another straight-ahead performance at this event, where light refreshments will be provided and a genial and somewhat excited atmosphere certainly will prevail.

Mark Hudgens new State Park superintendent

Mark Hudgens is the new Mt. San Jacinto State Park superintendent. He took over his new position in August of this year.

Having spent the last 14 years in the Perris district, Hudgens inherits a far larger state park to supervise with his move to the Mt. San Jacinto District. "Perris was roughly 8,800 acres and Mt. San Jacinto is 14,000 acres, almost all of it wilderness with no roads," he noted. Mt. San Jacinto was constituted as a state park in 1927. The park encompasses a wide swath of the land within the Santa Rosa and San Jacinto Mountains National Monument. The summit of Mt. San Jacinto, at 10,834 feet is the second highest peak in Southern California.

"The issues here are so much different than at Perris. We have historic buildings and walls built by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the 1930s. Those historical considerations change so much of what we can and can't do. We have to follow specific guidelines regarding historical resources."

Hudgens also noted the many acres of wilderness, through which hikers regularly pass and often get in trouble, also pose different challenges to his rangers and staff. State Park rangers often assist in rescues. "As superintendent I'm basically responsible for everything within the park – trails, maintenance, tree inspections, dead tree removal and public safety," he said. "A lot of what we do falls in line with Forest Service responsibilities. With

He is an avid outdoorsman who hunts and fishes. "I do outdoor activities as much as I can," he said.

Hudgens was born in Brea, in Orange County. He attended Humboldt State University in Arcata in Northern California. He graduated with a B.S. in fisheries biology. "They had a great resource program." And it was at Humboldt State that Hudgens found his love for and devotion to the wilderness.

Prior to beginning work for the state park system in Perris, Hudgens worked for the city of Tracy in public works performing water testing.

"I'm very happy to be up here," said Hudgens. "I'm looking forward to getting to know the community of Idyllwild better."

Hudgens is happy to be in Idyllwild, although he commutes each day from his home in Yucaipa.

Short-term rentals in unincorporated areas face new restrictions

Post cards sent to neighbors within 100 feet of any short-term rental

Aimed at curbing nuisance and noise activity, Ordinance 927 adopted by the Riverside County Board of Supervisors requires owners of short-term rentals in the county's unincorporated areas to register their properties.

Short-term rental owners must pay an annual registration fee, be subject to a 10 percent annual transient occupancy tax, and comply with guidelines to restrict noise, trash and limit street parking. Registration fees are to be used to cover costs of enforcement of the ordinance. Similar ordinances are in effect in incorporated towns within the county and are designed to ensure quality of life and enjoyment of their homes for residents

who live near short-term rentals.

Recently, in compliance with Section 10 of the ordinance, postcards were mailed to residents within 100 feet of short-term rentals. The "County of Riverside Notification of Neighboring Short-term Rental" lists the rental's address and provides a "Short-term Rental Hotline Number" for complaints. The postcard notice advises calling the hotline for any non-emergency situation such as a noise complaint related to the property. It notes, "When reporting an incident, have the address of the property readily available for reference. It is important that you call during the disturbance so we can document and respond in a timely manner." The hotline number is listed as (888) 223-0068. The Sheriff's Department should only be called in case of an emergency.

A good neighbor brochure, published by the county, advises that the following rules will be strictly enforced: quiet hours from 10 p.m. until 7 a.m.; trash and refuse shall not be stored within public view; renters and guests must only park in the rental's garage, driveway or directly in front of the short-term rental property to avoid ticketing; and dogs must be on leashes whenever in unenclosed areas, and barking dogs must be regulated.

Short-term rentals are defined as any 30 days or fewer occupied for "not less than two days and one night." Rental owners must designate an authorized representative to be available 24/7 for the purpose of responding "within 60 minutes" to complaints related to the short-term rental and "taking remedial action to resolve such complaints." The ordinance describes typical complaints within the ordinance as those regarding the "condition, operation or guests' conduct" of the short-term rental. The authorized representative must provide a copy of the good neighbor brochure to short-term rental guests and acknowledge that he or she is "legally responsible for compliance by all guests of the short-term rental with all applicable laws, rules and regulations pertaining to the use and occupancy of the short-term rental."

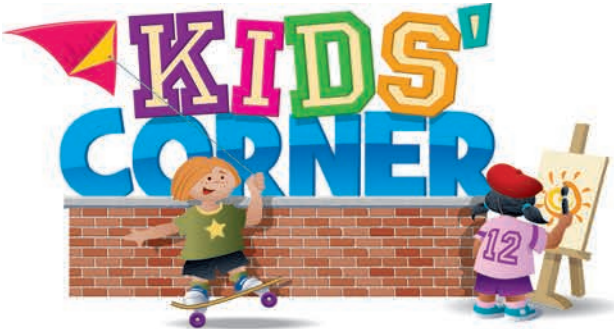

The 2015 Idyllwild Earth Fair was permanently canceled.

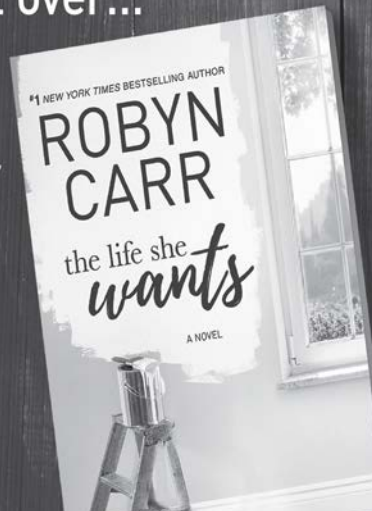

America, world-renowned for its design of the Sydney Opera House. The interior finish of the hall features hundreds of kiln-dried Douglas fir beams designed to approximate the densely wooded forests within which the campus nestles. First big storm drops 2 inches of rain

After months of little to no rain, the Hill received several inches of rain last week. Both Keenwild Ranger Station and Pine Cove recorded about 2 inches of rain. For this storm, the National Weather Service reported that Pine Cove (2.2 inches) and Keenwild (2.1 inches) received the second- and third-greatest rainfall throughout Southern California.

At the peak of Mt. San Jacinto, nearly 2 inches of rain fell. Of course, that much rain is insufficient to offset the effects of five years of drought as demonstrated by the fire agencies’ concern about the heat and Santa Ana winds this past weekend. “The rain helped alleviate the immediate fire danger,” Idyllwild Fire Chief Patrick Reitz said. While the rain was not sufficient to reverse the long-term drought effects, Reitz was pleased with the rain that did fall. “It was 2 inches of rain soaking into the ground. I feel grateful for the immediate help.”

Historically, for the first three months of the rain year (from July 1 through Sept. 30), the Hill received 2.4 inches. So through the end of September, this storm has brought the total close to or slightly above the average at Keenwild. In Pine Cove, which has received about 2.8 inches of rainfall since July 1, the total is about 15 percent more than the first quarter average. In the last month, the National Weather Service forecast of a normal fall and winter has increased. The NWS is now reporting a 55- to 60-percent chance of a “neutral” weather pattern this winter.
