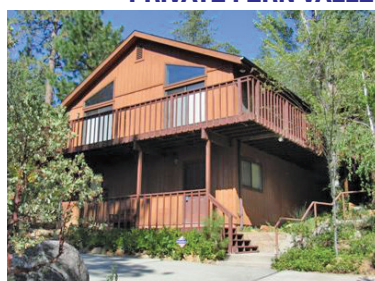

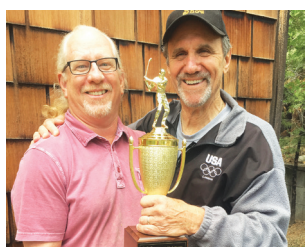

Traffic fatality in Mountain Center

A single-vehicle traffic fatality occurred on Wednesday, Oct. 12, in Mountain Center. According to California Highway Patrol Officer Mike Murawski, Kathi Vogley, 65 of Idyllwild, was driving westbound just before 2 p.m. on Highway 74, 1 mile west of McCall Park Road, when, for unknown reasons, she allowed her vehicle to drift to the right.

Vogley's vehicle, a 2006 Mazda Miata, entered a paved pullout and then went over the side of the mountain, crashing down 300 feet.

Vogley was killed in the crash and her body was recovered. California Highway Patrol was on the scene Thursday, Oct. 13, assisting with recovery of the vehicle.

A serious motorcycle and car collision the day before the fatality caused the motorcycle rider to be transported with "severe" injuries, according to the CHP report.

At about 4:45 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 11, Chad Basaker, 25, of Idyllwild, was riding his 2004 Suzuki dirt bike south on Highway 243 just south of mile marker 3, near Saunders Meadow Road, when he crossed the double-yellow lines and sideswiped a silver Toyota Prius that was proceeding northbound and driven by John Carratello, 65, also of Idyllwild.

With Carratello, in the right-front passenger seat, was Tony Carratello, 30, also of Idyllwild. Neither was injured in the collision.

The motorcycle and Prius had moderate damage. The motorcycle was retrieved privately and the Prius was towed to Idyllwild Garage.

Basaker was unlicensed and his bike was not licensed for street use. His injuries consisted of broken bones and abrasions, and he was transported by ground ambulance to Riverside University Health System Medical Center in Moreno Valley.

Vote-by-mail ballots for Nov. 8 election on the way

Starting Tuesday, Oct. 11, about 600,000 vote-by-mail ballots were mailed to voters for the November general election. Ballots should have arrived in mailboxes by the end of the week.

For the vote to be counted, completed ballots must be received at the Registrar of Voters office or any polling place within Riverside County no later than the close of polls on election day, Nov. 8, or be postmarked on or before election day and received no later than three days after election day.

Vote-by-mail ballots can be returned through the postal service or deposited in vote-by-mail drop-off boxes at participating city clerks' offices. City clerk drop-off locations and hours of operation can be found on the registrar's website at www.voteinfo.net.

A 24-hour drop box is available outside the registrar's office main entrance at 2724 Gateway Drive in Riverside. Vote-by-mail ballots also may be dropped off at any polling place within Riverside County before 8 p.m. on election day.

Voters have until Tuesday, Nov. 1, to request a vote-by-mail ballot by completing the request form on the back of their sample ballot, or by using the application form on the Registrar of Voters website at www.voteinfo.net. Request forms may be returned by mail or by facsimile to 951-486-7272.

Early voting at the Registrar of Voters office began Oct. 11 and continues Monday through Friday (excluding county holidays), from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The hours will be 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on the Saturdays of Oct. 29 and Nov. 5.

The registrar's office will be open to voters on election day from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Early voting also will be offered Friday to Sunday, Oct. 28 to 30, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Galleria at Tyler, 1299 Galleria at Tyler in Riverside; at Westfield Palm Desert, 72-840 Highway 111 in Palm Desert; and the Promenade in Temecula, 40820 Winchester Road.

If you have any questions about your eligibility to vote, call the registrar's office at 951-486-7200.

Poll workers are needed at voting locations throughout Riverside County for the upcoming Nov. 8 general election.

Poll workers may earn up to \$125 as precinct inspectors or \$90 as precinct officers.

No experience is required and the Registrar of Voters office will provide the necessary training. Poll workers must attend a training class to familiarize themselves with election day. Workers in both posts will receive another stipend for attending the training class.

The Registrar of Voters also is seeking individuals proficient in English and at least one of the following languages: Chinese, Korean, Spanish, Tagalog, Vietnamese or American Sign Language.

Next Wednesday, Oct. 26, marks the 10th anniversary of the start of the Esperanza Fire that took the lives of five of our U.S. Forest Service firefighters.

Living in the vicinity of the Alandale Guard Station where those five were stationed, I am reminded often of their suffering and sacrifices on that dreadful morning, and of the pain their families, friends and co-workers have endured since that day in 2006.

Out of respect for those people these five young men left behind, the San Bernardino National Forest administration has placed a limitation on media access to their local employees during this significant anniversary period.

I still remember the eerie call from Jack that early morning while he was traveling to work. How he could see a long string of fire stretching from the valley up the mountain.

How unbelievable that such a wildfire could happen so late in the year.

How within the next hour of that call, tragedy would strike an engine crew trying to protect a home from an extremely erratic inferno started by an arsonist known as Raymond Lee Oyler.

Because I lived closest to the fire, I had traveled toward the scene to cover it. JP learned first that a tragedy had occurred and that the fire was intense. He called me back. The fire did make its way to that area where I had parked my car to talk to District Ranger Laurie Rosenthal who was just learning of the tragedy.

EDITOR:

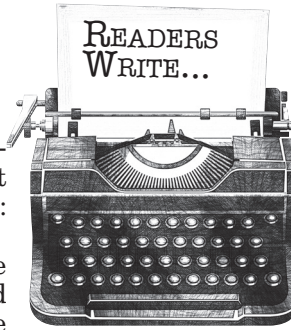
In reference to the letter from William R. Faurot in the Oct. 13, Town Crier: "How soon we forget."

He states, "... people have the right to defend themselves and a nation the right to defend itself. George Washington's Continental Army was supplemented by the various state militias composed of private citizens bearing their own arms."

After the Revolution, the supremacy of the federal government and Army was established during the putting down of the Whiskey Rebellion.

Mr. Faurot goes on to state that the Rudy Ridge shootings and the child abuser David Koresh and the Waco Branch Davidian Incident were "government provocations" that were responsible for the bombing of the Oklahoma City Federal Building.

Then Mr. Faurot states, "The current administration has made a series of end



runs in an effort to silence gun owners" ... and finally, "Yes, the federal government might attempt to take away all guns. They have not done so because the political and economic costs of confiscation would be enormous."

Nobody in the administration/federal government has suggested any such action.

The 2nd Amendment to the U.S. Constitution guarantees the right of U.S. citizens, "A well-regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed."

No administration or president can throw out the Constitution or change laws without action by Congress.

As a gun owner for over 30 years, I have no such concerns. I could care less what guns Mr. Faurot has, and I suspect the federal government has other things to do than to plot to take Mr. Faurot's guns from him.

Washington continues to lead Milne in campaign funding

As the race for Riverside County's 3rd District supervisor seat winds down, current incumbent Chuck Washington holds a significant cash advantage over challenger Shellie Milne, a member of the Hemet City Council.

At the end of September, Washington had more than three times the cash available for the final five weeks of the campaign as Milne did, and it was growing. His \$144,000 was nearly \$100,000 more than her total.

And real estate developers continue to be major supporters of county supervisor candidates.

Since Oct. 1, Washington has reported receiving another \$42,000 in contributions. The two largest were \$20,000 from the Riverside Sheriffs' Association's Public Education Fund and \$10,000 from the Committee to Elect Jeff Comerchero, a Temecula City Council member and president of the Rancon Group, a real estate development firm.

During the same period, Milne has reported receiving \$26,000. The largest single donation was \$5,000 from Gerald Chase, president of Hemet Enterprises. However, four other regional development companies supplied \$4,500 each for a total of \$18,000.

PCWD audit reflects good conditions

The first meeting in three months required more time than usual for the Pine Cove Water District board. However, a large portion of the time was devoted to receiving and approving the 2015-16 audit.

"An unqualified opinion is the highest form of assurance we can give," said Terry P. Shea, a certified public accountant and partner in the accounting firm of Rogers, Anderson, Malody & Scott LLP of San Bernardino, who conducted the audit.

As of June 30, the end of the 2015-16 fiscal year, PCWD's net assets were \$2.6 million, unchanged from the year before.

During fiscal year 2015-16, total revenue was \$797,000, including \$467,000 from water sales. Total expenses were \$793,000 resulting in a net \$4,100 gain. Transmission and distribution programs cost \$120,000, and overall employee retirement and benefits totaled \$149,000.

Long-term debt or liabilities is \$917,000, of which pension liability is the largest, about \$491,000. This has increased since last year, according to Shea. The post-employment benefits other than pensions have an unfunded liability of about \$10,000. The cash balance exceeds \$217,000.

"Overall, it is a great report; debt is manageable," Shea elaborated. "You've replaced much of your infra-

structure over the past few years."

General Manager Jerry Holldber distributed a draft of Ordinance 9, "Rules and regulations for water service," for the board to review and then discuss at the next meeting. Original Ordinance 4 describes the basic district policies, such as general manager duties, procedure for setting water rates, billing and infrastructure, including hydrants, hook-ups, connections and others.

"It hasn't been updated since the 1960s," Holldber said.

Multiple users of a single meter and backflow requirements are the principal changes from the older ordinance. The new ordinance also will update many other issues, such as how

to determine water production costs, and will remove the actual water rates from the ordinance, saying they will be established through board resolutions.

The board also approved extending the Rocky Point lease with Verizon. The lease yields \$21,000 to the district and grows 3.5 percent annually. Director Diana Luther, speaking for the board, advised Holldber not to sell the lease back to Verizon.

For the fifth-consecutive month, September's water usage in Pine Cove continued to exceed the prior year's usage. Last month, PCWD produced 3.1-million gallons, or 480,000 (18.5 percent) more than in September 2015.

Since the beginning of

2016, total production has been 24.6-million gallons, which is nearly 370,000 gallons more than the first nine months of 2015. The 2016 usage is still about 500,000 gallons (or 20 percent) less than the same period in 2013.

However, Holldber reported that the water loss has grown since summer and he is actively investigating the district's distribution system.

"They found four leaks so far and none were surfacing," he told the board. "They may be 5 gallons per minute, which could yield about 430,000 gallons over two months." One is in an area where he plans to replace pipeline next year.

Monitor well no. 10 has dropped 3 feet since July,

but a couple of well levels have risen during the period, he reported.

As a precaution in case the drought continues, Holldber said he has flushed several wells in the Dutch Flats area and is preparing them for production as an alternative water source next spring, if they are needed.

"We need to stay one step ahead," he added.

At the end of his report, Holldber announced that PCWD is planning to sponsor a class on the Brown Act and state ethics legislation in the next few months. PCWD's legal counsel, Brad Neufeld, will conduct the session.

Prop 58 aims to restore bilingual education options and local control

Proposition 58, titled "California Education for a Global Economy Initiative," seeks to provide California students bilingual education in English, and one or more other languages in order to equip them to function more productively in an increasingly multilingual and multilateral world economy.

The authors of the proposition posit that students for whom English is not their native language are more quickly equipped to navigate a broad curriculum of subjects when their English instruction is gained through teaching in a flexible and extended bilingual framework. English learners make up 22 percent of all public-school students in California. Schools statistics show that 2.7 million California public-school students in elementary and secondary grades speak a language other than English at home.

In 1998, California voters passed Prop 227 that required English learners be taught in English only, generally for one year of intensive English study, before transitioning these students into other subjects taught only in English, such as math and science. Prop 227 restricted the use of bilingual programs.

Prop 58 repeals key provisions of Prop 227 and adds a few new provisions regarding English-language instruction. Under the initiative, schools would no longer be required to teach English learners in English-only programs. Instead, schools could teach their English learners using various programs, including "dual-language immersion" programs in a variety of languages — not just Spanish. Schools can also adopt other language-instruction methods based on research and stakeholder

input. Also, parents of English learners would no longer need to sign waivers before their children could enroll in bilingual programs.

Prop 58 restores control over how to teach English learners to local school boards, allowing them, in consultation with parents of English-learning students, to choose educational options that best suit their children. The initiative also allows the state Legislature to adjust the program to improve its effectiveness, should research and results so recommend, by majority vote rather than the current two-thirds vote mandated under Prop 227.

Proponents note that Prop 58 was placed on the ballot by a bipartisan vote of the California Legislature and is broadly supported by school boards (California School Boards Association), teachers (California Federation of Teachers, California Teachers Association) and the California Language Teachers Association), and parents (California State PTA). Other supporters include the California Democratic and Peace and Freedom parties, California Chamber of Commerce, California Labor Federation and California Professional Firefighters.

Opponents argue that the initiative repeals the requirement that California children be taught in an English-only environment. They also object to a provision that would allow the state Legislature to adjust the program to improve its effectiveness by majority vote.

The measure has broad financial backing and is far ahead in the polls (mid-September field poll 69 percent to 14 percent with 17 percent undecided). Supporting political action committees have raised \$1.2 million. There are currently no PACs registered in opposition.

Proposition 59 advises overturn of Citizens United

Proposition 59, the "California Overturn of Citizens United Act Advisory Question," if passed, would support encouraging the state's elected officials to use their authority to overturn the Supreme Court decision, *Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission* 558 U.S. 310 (2010), potentially through a constitutional amendment or other means.

Furthermore, the initiative asks officials to "allow for the full regulation or limitation of campaign contributions and spending" and "make clear that corporations should not have the same constitutional rights as human beings."

As an advisory question, Prop 59 would not legally require officials to act or do anything, as the measure is purely advisory and has no force of law.

In the 2010 Supreme Court decision, the court ruled that laws placing certain limits on political spending by corporations and unions are unconstitutional violations of free speech, and the court extended free speech rights to corporations as "representatives" of individuals.

The measure is endorsed by the California Democratic Party, Green Party of California and California Peace and Freedom Party.

Opponents contend that with a glut of ballot initiatives on the November ballot, this non-binding initiative is a waste of time and taxpayer dollars.

Jeff Stone runs for Congressional District 36

National security and jobs are primary concerns

State Sen. Jeff Stone (R-28) is concerned about national security and homeland security threats facing our country. He believes these threats are imminent and that too little is being done to address them.

He also is frustrated that the current California tax structure prevents California from being a business-friendly state, and interferes with job creation and job growth.

Stone is running for election to the Congressional District 36 seat currently held by Democrat Dr. Raul Ruiz. Stone, a pharmacist by profession, previously served Idyllwild as Riverside County 3rd District supervisor. He is currently serving the 28th State Senate District that stretches from Southwest Riverside County (Temecula, Murrieta and Lake Elsinore) all the way to the Arizona border. Prior to his election as 3rd District supervisor in 2004, Stone served on the Temecula City Council and as mayor.

Stone said it was Democratic incumbent Ruiz's support for the Iran nuclear deal crafted by the Obama administration that propelled him into this race.

"Not since the Cuban Missile Crisis has our nation been so close to nuclear war, and that is largely a result of a failed foreign policy by the current administration," said Stone. He asserted that the Iran nuclear deal does little, if anything, to stop Iran from developing a nuclear bomb.

"Any inspections that are required require approval from the Iranian government well in advance of any scheduled visits. This will give Iranian scientists more than enough time to move their operations at existing facilities to ones that are not covered by the inspection request," he said. (The deal has complex procedures for compelling inspections that could involve lengthy periods before inspectors are granted access, according to multiple analyses.)

Stone also sees comparable risks with North Korea, whose nuclear weapons program is rapidly advancing in march-step with its ancillary program to develop long-range ballistic missiles capable of delivering warheads to the U.S. West Coast. "We have the capability with our satellites to monitor each time North Korea places a missile on a launch site," he said. "I propose that when those

missiles go vertical we take them out. We authorize our military to go in and remove the threat. If we do nothing, we put our children and grandchildren at risk."

Stone believes we must do more to invest in our military, and to develop the most modern weapon systems and delivery options. "We must also reinstitute our manned space program to protect our defense assets," said Stone. "We cannot allow Russia or China to be the only nations capable of sending men and women into orbit to fix our satellites."

With regard to terrorism, either foreign or home-grown, Stone suggests rebuilding our "human intelligence" network by giving the CIA resources necessary to keep our top officials informed of looming threats to national security.

On other issues, Stone believes our political system is corrupted by and beholden to special-interest money, both corporate and union. "There should be limits on them both — no more hiding behind names people can't recognize. We need transparency in campaign financing. I'd consider federal legislation for limits on campaign contributions — make those running for office work harder at the grass-roots level. Elections should not be bought, they should be earned."

He also believes the Internal Revenue Service needs to be streamlined. He recommends simplifying the current tax code and instituting a flat-tax rate of 20 percent, maintaining charitable giving and home-mortgage deductions. "Also, if a flat tax is not adopted, we should reduce the corporate income tax rate from 35 percent to 20 percent to be more in line with individual tax filers," said Stone.

Stone advocates reforming welfare rules to require "able-bodied" recipients to give back to their communi-

ties as a condition of receiving federal aid — a minimum of 20 hours per week of accredited public service, unless the recipients are in school.

As general financial revisions, he suggests making tuition at any college or university (public or private) deductible on state and federal returns with a cap of \$10,000 per year; allowing rent to be deductible just like mortgage interest; and doing away with private mortgage insurance.

On health care, an important consideration in this election, Stone said he supports national health care for anyone with pre-existing conditions and for the indigent, and catastrophic care for the middle class or below.

He suggests privatizing the Veterans Administration and letting public and private hospitals compete for the business.

He believes Zika is a major threat to this district and to the country, with the potential to become a pandemic. "We should not be playing politics with a health-and-safety issue," he stressed. "Just strip the bill [HR 4446] and pass it."

Asked what he would do if he loses this CD 36 election, Stone was philosophical. "I don't need to do this for a living," he reflected. "I've been very fortunate in my private-sector life. I have my compounding pharmacy and real-estate investments. I'll have to see where I am at that point in my life. I would have an important decision to make. As both a county supervisor and state senator, I feel like I have made a difference."

In both his time as 3rd District supervisor and as state senator, Stone can count significant achievements that have made a difference. Idyllwild might not have gotten its new library without Stone's commitment and support.

As state senator, he has reached across the aisle to co-sponsor bills that Gov. Jerry Brown has signed — including a "prescription drug take back" bill that provides specially designed storage receptacles in participating pharmacies for customers to dispose of unused or expired prescription drugs at no cost to customers.

Another bill allows terminally ill patients to use experimental drugs or procedures that have successfully completed phase one of a clinical trial approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, but have not yet been approved for general use.

And another bill will allow out-of-state licensed doctors to volunteer their time and skills while visiting in chronically underserved California communities and areas.

Stone has built his political career and reputation by being direct, staking out positions to which he maintains his commitment, and by keeping his word. "For me, the most important quality is telling the truth," he said.

Stone said if he is elected to Congress, he would dedicate his congressional salary (approximately \$174,000 annually) to charity.

Supervisor forum part 2: Washington and Milne

On Oct. 6, Supervisor Chuck Washington and Hemet Council member Shellie Mine, candidates for the Riverside County 3rd District supervisor's seat, were in Idyllwild to share their views and vision for the Hill and the county.

The members of the audience posed all of the questions to the candidates. The questions were Idyllwild-centric. The candidates were candid and prepared sound-bites were not the tone of the evening.

This is the second part of the questions and the candidates' responses. Questions about the Idyllwild Water District and Idyllwild's role in the county were in the first part, which appeared in the Oct. 13 issue.

Rather than repeat the questions in the order asked, they have been organized by subject so that the totality of the responses can be together rather than separated and disparate.

Town Hall's future

Q: What are your plans for keeping the Town Hall in the community's hands?

SM: There seem to be two different community centers, here — the proposed and the existing.

I know Supv. Washington is furnishing money to help and that former Supv. Stone offered to help.

But there are two principals. First, what is the return on the investment? And second, how can we help Idyllwild do what it wants and not force it on you?

CW: I see two issues. First, Town Hall does not belong to the community. It belongs to Jay Johnson and his family. Second, it is not a very wise investment of taxpayers' money to buy Town Hall.

We're much closer to the new community center than many think.

[Washington acknowledged that an initial idea to cre-

ate a loan, to be repaid from the County Service Area 36 ad valorem receipts, for constructing the Community Center would not work.]

But in 2010, the Board of Supervisors adopted a resolution allowing the use of Community Development Block Grant funds in Idyllwild. We're arranging to dedicate \$500,000 this year and next fiscal year another \$725,000 and forget the loan option.

You'll get your Community Center in the next two to two-and-a-half years and can use the CSA assessment to support what you want.

SM: These CDBG funds come with strings — Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing.

[U.S. Housing and Urban Development funding applies this 2015 rule, which clarifies and simplifies existing fair-housing obligations for HUD grantees to analyze their fair-housing landscape, and set locally determined fair housing priorities and goals. Since the actual grant allocation goes to Riverside County, that would be where the new rule applies. Idyllwild is where the county would use the funds.]

The AFFH rule nationally is climbing and lets the federal government come into communities and sets new zoning criteria because you accept their money.

This is the issue with CDBG funding. Be leery of taking their funds.

CW: That's inaccurate. There are no strings. The board has designated areas for business improvement. We would have lost these funds if we don't use them.

I would rather that you have your community center than have them go back to DC.

Q. How will you keep the Town Hall available for community recreation until the Community Center is complete in probably four years?

CW: It won't be four years. It's maybe three years; my hope is two years.

We have a month-to-month lease and will continue it. We have good relations with the Johnsons, so it doesn't make sense for the county to buy the facility.

SM: I see no change looking forward. Town Hall has served as a prominent community value.

Q. Can you talk about the availability of water for the Idyllwild Community Center?

SM: As we go through and look at the issue of water availability, you have to save.

I can assure you that people who have been paying have a right to water. And as you move forward with the Community Center, everybody who has been promised water should get it. You should get it if paying for it.

CW: You're raising the issue of a water shortage from the Community Center. I've done everything I can do so that businesses and the Community Center can move forward together.

You've got to get IWD to improve its supply sources. And I've had private conversations with another water district that is willing to step in. I'm confident we can move forward.

Q. Have any monies been spent on CSA 36?

[According to financial reports from the county's Economic Development Agency, about \$200,000 in revenue was collected during fiscal year 2015-16 for CSA 36. About 62 percent came from the \$35 per parcel fee. Expenses were about \$170,000. The cash balance at the end of June was slightly more than \$230,000.]

CW: CSA residents pay assessments into it.

[Milne did not know the details of the CSA 36 budget so passed on this question.]

Q. How will recreation be provided before the Community Center is completed if the Johnson family sells the Town Hall?

CW: We have a couple of plan Bs. Many activities are outside and can continue. Mr. Johnson will keep the lease.

Q. I am concerned the proposed Idyllwild Community Center is a business proposition masquerading as a community benefit. The proposed amphitheater appears to be an entertainment venue, which will exasperate the growing Idyllwild traffic and parking problems. What are the candidates' thoughts on this proposal?

CW: It is not a business, it's for the community. A non-profit will run it for the benefit of the community.

[Washington acknowledged that traffic can be a hindrance on the two-lane highways from below to Idyllwild,

especially when the Hill is the destination for a major event, such as the jazz festival, or to see and play in the snow.]

When it snows, we receive some complaints. Last year, I convened a meeting of representatives from Cal Trans, Riverside County Roads, the Sheriff's Department and others. The next weekend, Cal Trans got up "reader boards," warning that snow makes the road dangerous.

But believe me, I hear that the lodges and restaurants are very happy when people are coming.

SM: We hope it is a Community Center and doesn't turn into something else. The community here wanted it. When you build something beautiful, people come. You've heard why we came and there are lots like us.

CW: I have expressed at the 3rd District Summit that I see a common thread running through the district — from the southwest to Mt. San Jacinto. This is the most beautiful part of the county.

In 27 years, county tourism has grown to \$700 million annually and I expect the 3rd district to take advantage of that. In 10 years, it will approach \$1.5 billion.

Off the Leash

Believing does not need facts; governing and problem solving do ...

When I was growing up, it seemed that fathers fell into one of two camps — most dads were either Chevy guys or Ford guys. My dad was a Chevy guy. He often told me that the Chevy 350 was the greatest engine ever made. I believed him, mainly, because he was my dad, and dads knew everything.

This is an example of how belief systems are formed. My father was a DIY (do-it-yourself) man. He did routine maintenance on his cars; but he wasn't, by any means, a mechanic.

Yet I carried that belief about the Chevy 350 engine with me well into my 20s. I never challenged the claim and never saw any evidence to its validity. My dad believed it and that was enough.

Because these belief systems are formed in childhood, embedded deeply into our brains at a time when our brains are still developing, they are very resistant to change.

Belief systems are the foundation on which we build our view of the world. Any suggestion that they may not hold water is a threat to a person's entire value system and that of the people who gave it to them. It's so easy to settle a world that one can depend on, and so difficult to prod them out of their complacency.

During this year's presidential election, we have learned one thing — belief systems trump information. This is a very dangerous trend.

If you want to build a bridge that will stand up over time, find an engineer with knowledge on how to build a bridge, not a person of faith who believes they can build a bridge.

A sizeable portion of our population prefers the story over the facts. This story is devoid of verifiable information and is merely a fiction, or perhaps a myth, which indeed contains truth of another kind. But not the kind to use in solving complex problems that the government is supposed to do.

The government — at all levels — is tasked to solve problems. An important step to achieve problem solving is to gather as much evidence as you can so you can increase your odds of success.

I have had many conversations about the choices we have to make on Nov. 8, and my conclusion is that we are a country of beliefs. We have individually and collectively many beliefs — about economic systems, about our own history and about the role government should play in our lives. The latter, in particular, is the most contradictory belief system I have encountered.

We don't need beliefs and grandiose claims to solve our problems. We need thoughtful and informed plans to deal with this evermore changing world.

If you want to tell me that Chevy is better than Ford, bring me some information that backs up that statement, if you want to win me over to your side. I'm not a child anymore and my dad isn't always right.

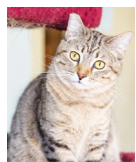

35 years ago - 1981

Hillfolk getting ready for Halloween probably shopped for sweet deals at the Cornet store, where 16-ounce bags of Baby Ruth or Butterfinger candy bars were sold for \$1.66 each and a bag of Tootsie Rolls were only 73 cents.

30 years ago - 1986

The proposed Pine Cove Zoning Study was approved by the Riverside County Planning Commission. In most instances, the proposal downgraded use of property and included only six lots designated for commercial use.

25 years ago - 1991

Astronomer and Town Crier "Sky Watch" columnist Joe Neu wrote that folk should watch for one of the most prominent constella-

tions in the fall night sky, Andromeda, named for a mythological princess.

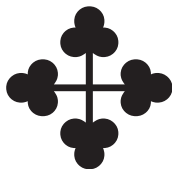

loans for the construction of the project, another part of the agency has not approved the transfer of recycled water to Foster Lake and is now questioning IWD's intent to pursue the project.

"We haven't received anything on Idyllwild's proposed recycled water-distribution system yet. The June 2016 report just had info on the proposed treatment plant and that Idyllwild wanted to use a tank at the [Idyllwild] Pines Campground to store recycled water in," wrote Erica Wolski, associate sanitary engineer with the Recycle Water unit of the SWRCB. "We haven't heard anything else since we gave them comments on the report in August. I'm not sure if they still plan to pursue the project now that management has changed."

In early August, Wolski provided comments to IWD's consultant on its latest report. Regarding the use of Foster lake to store recycled water, she wrote, "Above ground storage would be preferred to impoundments. Any impoundments proposed need to have an impermeable liner to avoid recycled water discharge to the aquifer."

Questions over the use of recycled water near local wells have been raised before. In 2005, the San Jacinto Mountain Area Water Study Agency, which was a joint powers agency composed of Fern Valley, Idyllwild and Pine Cove water districts, had a contractor — Albert A. Webb Associates — prepare a joint water management plan.

As part of the plan, the consultant assessed the possibility of a groundwater recycled reuse project. Webb and Associates contacted the state Department of Public Health and in March 2005, Steven Williams, the district engineer, replied to the questions about the "... the use of reclaimed secondary effluent from IWD wastewater treatment plan for ground water recharge."

Since the three districts obtain most of their water from "wells drilled into this fractured rock aquifer," the DPH was concerned about the lack of any studies or other proposed or operating groundwater recharge/reuse project in fractured-rock aquifer zones.

Consequently, any proposed project would have to undergo a thorough evaluation, according to Williams. "The project proponents must demonstrate, through modeling, tracer studies, or other means the ability to accurately predict and track the movement of any recharged recycled water once it leaves the recharge site."

Holldber told the board he requested studies of this nature in 2010 and has not received any reports — final or draft — discussing how the water travels beneath the surface.

"Recycled water recharge with secondary treated wastewater effluent is prohibited and the project proponents would need to upgrade the wastewater treatment plant to an approved disinfected tertiary treatment process," Williams concluded in his letter. IWD's proposed recycling plant is a tertiary treatment process.

If IWD is prohibited from moving water from the recycling plant to Foster Lake, its success will depend largely on how much of the recycled water is used for irrigation. But that has a negative consequence on the district's revenue, since recycled water cannot be sold for as much as potable water.

Earlier in December 2010, an internal IWD assessment deemed the project too costly for its limited purpose — reducing demand for potable water for irrigation use. But Webb and Associates had already opined that "the Idyllwild communities do not have a large number of heavily irrigated areas... and residential irrigation is seasonal."

In 2012, the IWD evaluation assumed Idyllwild Arts would use 450,000 gallons for irrigation, and residents and commercial customers would use about 185,000 gallons. Ordinance 61 requires mandatory recycled water use for landscape irrigation.

Former IWD financial officer Jim Ludy reviewed the consultant's report, which was sent to the state, and wrote, "This report is inaccurate and not in the best interest of the District or its customers." The former boards never discussed this difference of opinion publicly.

In June 2012, the district dismissed Ludy for malfeasance.

Get free help with your Medicare

When someone with Medicare finds his or her way to my office phone, it's often because of a complicated and snarly issue that's going to take time to fix.

However, it's sometimes a Medicare beneficiary who found my number somewhere and called for some basic help in understanding their coverage. I love those calls because I have a quick and easy answer for folks like that.

I refer them to the State Health Insurance Assistance Program, or SHIP. There's a SHIP in every state in the country. I have phone numbers for the ones in my Medicare region written on a card right next to my phone, and I refer to it often. The California SHIP phone number is 800-434-0222.

SHIPs are nonprofit organizations that help people with Medicare understand their benefits better. The counseling is personalized and it's absolutely free.

SHIPs aren't connected to any insurance company or health plan, so they're not trying to sell you any kind of product. If you're eligible for Medicare, you're eligible for assistance from your local SHIP. You can talk to a SHIP counselor over the phone, or go to your local SHIP office for face-to-face assistance.

The quality of the counseling is terrific. Many SHIP counselors have Medicare themselves and they're well-trained to answer your questions. They know all the ins and outs of the program, whether you have Original Medicare (where you choose the doctor or hospital you want and the government pays your providers directly) or Medicare Advantage (in which private insurers offer health-care services through a specific network of

doctors, hospitals and other providers). SHIPs also can help with Part D prescription drug insurance.

A SHIP counselor can help you with billing problems, complaints about your medical care or treatment, how to shop for a Medicare Advantage health plan or Part D prescription drug plan that meets your needs; how to appeal if you disagree with coverage or payment decisions by Medicare or your Medicare plan and many more.

Of course, there are other ways besides SHIP to get information about Medicare. One excellent resource is the "Medicare & You" handbook, which is mailed to Medicare beneficiaries every fall. You can find the latest edition of "Medicare & You" online at: www.medicare.gov/Pubs/pdf/10050.pdf

Help also is available through the Medicare customer service center, at 800-MEDICARE (800-633-4227; TTY users can call 877-486-2048). The call center is open 24 hours a day, including weekends.

Another helpful resource is the official Medicare website, at www.Medicare.gov.

sance. Ludy then sued the district. He contended his dismissal was because of his comments and review of the recycled water project. Less than two years later, IWD settled the suit.

In November 2015, after receiving funding approval from the SWRCB in the spring of 2015, IWD contracted with Separation Processes Inc. to develop specifications for the plant, called the preliminary design report. While these were expected within months, the final report has yet to go to the board. This may increase construction estimates.



Traffic fatality in Mountain Center

A single-vehicle traffic fatality occurred on Wednesday, Oct. 12, in Mountain Center. According to California Highway Patrol Officer Mike Murawski, Kathi Vogley, 65 of Idyllwild, was driving westbound just before 2 p.m. on Highway 74, 1 mile west of McCall Park Road, when, for unknown reasons, she allowed her vehicle to drift to the right.

Vogley's vehicle, a 2006 Mazda Miata, entered a paved pullout and then went over the side of the mountain, crashing down 300 feet.

Vogley was killed in the crash and her body was recovered. California Highway Patrol was on the scene Thursday, Oct. 13, assisting with recovery of the vehicle.

A serious motorcycle and car collision the day before the fatality caused the motorcycle rider to be transported with "severe" injuries, according to the CHP report.

At about 4:45 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 11, Chad Basaker, 25, of Idyllwild, was riding his 2004 Suzuki dirt bike south on Highway 243 just south of mile marker 3, near Saunders Meadow Road, when he crossed the double-yellow lines and sideswiped a silver Toyota Prius that was proceeding northbound and driven by John Carratello, 65, also of Idyllwild.

With Carratello, in the right-front passenger seat, was Tony Carratello, 30, also of Idyllwild. Neither was injured in the collision.

The motorcycle and Prius had moderate damage. The motorcycle was retrieved privately and the Prius was towed to Idyllwild Garage.

Basaker was unlicensed and his bike was not licensed for street use. His injuries consisted of broken bones and abrasions, and he was transported by ground ambulance to Riverside University Health System Medical Center in Moreno Valley.

Vote-by-mail ballots for Nov. 8 election on the way

Starting Tuesday, Oct. 11, about 600,000 vote-by-mail ballots were mailed to voters for the November general election. Ballots should have arrived in mailboxes by the end of the week.

For the vote to be counted, completed ballots must be received at the Registrar of Voters office or any polling place within Riverside County no later than the close of polls on election day, Nov. 8, or be postmarked on or before election day and received no later than three days after election day.

Vote-by-mail ballots can be returned through the postal service or deposited in vote-by-mail drop-off boxes at participating city clerks' offices. City clerk drop-off locations and hours of operation can be found on the registrar's website at www.voteinfo.net.

A 24-hour drop box is available outside the registrar's office main entrance at 2724 Gateway Drive in Riverside. Vote-by-mail ballots also may be dropped off at any polling place within Riverside County before 8 p.m. on election day.

Voters have until Tuesday, Nov. 1, to request a vote-by-mail ballot by completing the request form on the back of their sample ballot, or by using the application form on the Registrar of Voters website at www.voteinfo.net. Request forms may be returned by mail or by facsimile to 951-486-7272.

Early voting at the Registrar of Voters office began Oct. 11 and continues Monday through Friday (excluding county holidays), from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The hours will be 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on the Saturdays of Oct. 29 and Nov. 5.

The registrar's office will be open to voters on election day from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Early voting also will be offered Friday to Sunday, Oct. 28 to 30, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Galleria at Tyler, 1299 Galleria at Tyler in Riverside; at Westfield Palm Desert, 72-840 Highway 111 in Palm Desert; and the Promenade in Temecula, 40820 Winchester Road.

If you have any questions about your eligibility to vote, call the registrar's office at 951-486-7200.

Next Wednesday, Oct. 26, marks the 10th anniversary of the start of the Esperanza Fire that took the lives of five of our U.S. Forest Service firefighters.

Living in the vicinity of the Alandale Guard Station where those five were stationed, I am reminded often of their suffering and sacrifices on that dreadful morning, and of the pain their families, friends and co-workers have endured since that day in 2006.

Out of respect for those people these five young men left behind, the San Bernardino National Forest administration has placed a limitation on media access to their local employees during this significant anniversary period.

I still remember the eerie call from Jack that early morning while he was traveling to work. How he could see a long string of fire stretching from the valley up the mountain.

How unbelievable that such a wildfire could happen so late in the year.

How within the next hour of that call, tragedy would strike an engine crew trying to protect a home from an extremely erratic inferno started by an arsonist known as Raymond Lee Oyler.

Because I lived closest to the fire, I had traveled toward the scene to cover it. JP learned first that a tragedy had occurred and that the fire was intense. He called me back. The fire did make its way to that area where I had parked my car to talk to District Ranger Laurie Rosenthal who was just learning of the tragedy.

Washington continues to lead Milne in campaign funding

As the race for Riverside County's 3rd District supervisor seat winds down, current incumbent Chuck Washington holds a significant cash advantage over challenger Shellie Milne, a member of the Hemet City Council.

At the end of September, Washington had more than three times the cash available for the final five weeks of the campaign as Milne did, and it was growing. His \$144,000 was nearly \$100,000 more than her total.

And real estate developers continue to be major supporters of county supervisor candidates.

Since Oct. 1, Washington has reported receiving another \$42,000 in contributions. The two largest were \$20,000 from the Riverside Sheriffs' Association's Public Education Fund and \$10,000 from the Committee to Elect Jeff Comerchero, a Temecula City Council member and president of the Rancon Group, a real estate development firm.

During the same period, Milne has reported receiving \$26,000. The largest single donation was \$5,000 from Gerald Chase, president of Hemet Enterprises. However, four other regional development companies supplied \$4,500 each for a total of \$18,000.

PCWD audit reflects good conditions

The first meeting in three months required more time than usual for the Pine Cove Water District board. However, a large portion of the time was devoted to receiving and approving the 2015-16 audit.

"An unqualified opinion is the highest form of assurance we can give," said Terry P. Shea, a certified public accountant and partner in the accounting firm of Rogers, Anderson, Malody & Scott LLP of San Bernardino, who conducted the audit.

As of June 30, the end of the 2015-16 fiscal year, PCWD's net assets were \$2.6 million, unchanged from the year before.

During fiscal year 2015-16, total revenue was \$797,000, including \$467,000 from water sales. Total expenses were \$793,000 resulting in a net \$4,100 gain. Transmission and distribution programs cost \$120,000, and overall employee retirement and benefits totaled \$149,000.

Long-term debt or liabilities is \$917,000, of which pension liability is the largest, about \$491,000. This has increased since last year, according to Shea. The post-employment benefits other than pensions have an unfunded liability of about \$10,000. The cash balance exceeds \$217,000.

"Overall, it is a great report; debt is manageable," Shea elaborated. "You've replaced much of your infra-

structure over the past few years."

General Manager Jerry Holldber distributed a draft of Ordinance 9, "Rules and regulations for water service," for the board to review and then discuss at the next meeting. Original Ordinance 4 describes the basic district policies, such as general manager duties, procedure for setting water rates, billing and infrastructure, including hydrants, hook-ups, connections and others.

"It hasn't been updated since the 1960s," Holldber said.

Multiple users of a single meter and backflow requirements are the principal changes from the older ordinance. The new ordinance also will update many other issues, such as how

to determine water production costs, and will remove the actual water rates from the ordinance, saying they will be established through board resolutions.

The board also approved extending the Rocky Point lease with Verizon. The lease yields \$21,000 to the district and grows 3.5 percent annually. Director Diana Luther, speaking for the board, advised Holldber not to sell the lease back to Verizon.

For the fifth-consecutive month, September's water usage in Pine Cove continued to exceed the prior year's usage. Last month, PCWD produced 3.1-million gallons, or 480,000 (18.5 percent) more than in September 2015.

Since the beginning of

2016, total production has been 24.6-million gallons, which is nearly 370,000 gallons more than the first nine months of 2015. The 2016 usage is still about 500,000 gallons (or 20 percent) less than the same period in 2013.

However, Holldber reported that the water loss has grown since summer and he is actively investigating the district's distribution system.

"They found four leaks so far and none were surfacing," he told the board. "They may be 5 gallons per minute, which could yield about 430,000 gallons over two months." One is in an area where he plans to replace pipeline next year.

Monitor well no. 10 has dropped 3 feet since July,

but a couple of well levels have risen during the period, he reported.

As a precaution in case the drought continues, Holldber said he has flushed several wells in the Dutch Flats area and is preparing them for production as an alternative water source next spring, if they are needed.

"We need to stay one step ahead," he added.

At the end of his report, Holldber announced that PCWD is planning to sponsor a class on the Brown Act and state ethics legislation in the next few months. PCWD's legal counsel, Brad Neufeld, will conduct the session.

Prop 58 aims to restore bilingual education options and local control

Proposition 58, titled "California Education for a Global Economy Initiative," seeks to provide California students bilingual education in English, and one or more other languages in order to equip them to function more productively in an increasingly multilingual and multilateral world economy.

The authors of the proposition posit that students for whom English is not their native language are more quickly equipped to navigate a broad curriculum of subjects when their English instruction is gained through teaching in a flexible and extended bilingual framework. English learners make up 22 percent of all public-school students in California. Schools statistics show that 2.7 million California public-school students in elementary and secondary grades speak a language other than English at home.

In 1998, California voters passed Prop 227 that required English learners be taught in English only, generally for one year of intensive English study, before transitioning these students into other subjects taught only in English, such as math and science. Prop 227 restricted the use of bilingual programs.

Prop 58 repeals key provisions of Prop 227 and adds a few new provisions regarding English-language instruction. Under the initiative, schools would no longer be required to teach English learners in English-only programs. Instead, schools could teach their English learners using various programs, including "dual-language immersion" programs in a variety of languages — not just Spanish. Schools can also adopt other language-instruction methods based on research and stakeholder

input. Also, parents of English learners would no longer need to sign waivers before their children could enroll in bilingual programs.

Prop 58 restores control over how to teach English learners to local school boards, allowing them, in consultation with parents of English-learning students, to choose educational options that best suit their children. The initiative also allows the state Legislature to adjust the program to improve its effectiveness, should research and results so recommend, by majority vote rather than the current two-thirds vote mandated under Prop 227.

Proponents note that Prop 58 was placed on the ballot by a bipartisan vote of the California Legislature and is broadly supported by school boards (California School Boards Association), teachers (California Federation of Teachers, California Teachers Association) and the California Language Teachers Association), and parents (California State PTA). Other supporters include the California Democratic and Peace and Freedom parties, California Chamber of Commerce, California Labor Federation and California Professional Firefighters.

Opponents argue that the initiative repeals the requirement that California children be taught in an English-only environment. They also object to a provision that would allow the state Legislature to adjust the program to improve its effectiveness by majority vote.

The measure has broad financial backing and is far ahead in the polls (mid-September field poll 69 percent to 14 percent with 17 percent undecided). Supporting political action committees have raised \$1.2 million. There are currently no PACs registered in opposition.

Proposition 59 advises overturn of Citizens United

Proposition 59, the "California Overturn of Citizens United Act Advisory Question," if passed, would support encouraging the state's elected officials to use their authority to overturn the Supreme Court decision, *Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission* 558 U.S. 310 (2010), potentially through a constitutional amendment or other means.

Furthermore, the initiative asks officials to "allow for the full regulation or limitation of campaign contributions and spending" and "make clear that corporations should not have the same constitutional rights as human beings."

As an advisory question, Prop 59 would not legally require officials to act or do anything, as the measure is purely advisory and has no force of law.

In the 2010 Supreme Court decision, the court ruled that laws placing certain limits on political spending by corporations and unions are unconstitutional violations of free speech, and the court extended free speech rights to corporations as "representatives" of individuals.

The measure is endorsed by the California Democratic Party, Green Party of California and California Peace and Freedom Party.

Opponents contend that with a glut of ballot initiatives on the November ballot, this non-binding initiative is a waste of time and taxpayer dollars.

ElectionInfo.org has created a helpful tool for voters — a spreadsheet chart that lists the 17 statewide propositions that will be on the Nov. 8, ballot, cross-referenced with 19 major nonprofit organizations' recommendations as to how to vote on them.

The organizations run from the Democratic Par-

ty, Peace and Freedom Party, California Labor Federation to the Republican Party, Chamber of Commerce and the California Tea Party.

The group tried to include all the major nonprofits in the state but some did not respond. The chart may be found at Electioninfo.org.

Jeff Stone runs for Congressional District 36

National security and jobs are primary concerns

State Sen. Jeff Stone (R-28) is concerned about national security and homeland security threats facing our country. He believes these threats are imminent and that too little is being done to address them.

He also is frustrated that the current California tax structure prevents California from being a business-friendly state, and interferes with job creation and job growth.

Stone is running for election to the Congressional District 36 seat currently held by Democrat Dr. Raul Ruiz. Stone, a pharmacist by profession, previously served Idyllwild as Riverside County 3rd District supervisor. He is currently serving the 28th State Senate District that stretches from Southwest Riverside County (Temecula, Murrieta and Lake Elsinore) all the way to the Arizona border. Prior to his election as 3rd District supervisor in 2004, Stone served on the Temecula City Council and as mayor.

Stone said it was Democratic incumbent Ruiz's support for the Iran nuclear deal crafted by the Obama administration that propelled him into this race.

"Not since the Cuban Missile Crisis has our nation been so close to nuclear war, and that is largely a result of a failed foreign policy by the current administration," said Stone. He asserted that the Iran nuclear deal does little, if anything, to stop Iran from developing a nuclear bomb.

"Any inspections that are required require approval from the Iranian government well in advance of any scheduled visits. This will give Iranian scientists more than enough time to move their operations at existing facilities to ones that are not covered by the inspection request," he said. (The deal has complex procedures for compelling inspections that could involve lengthy periods before inspectors are granted access, according to multiple analyses.)

Stone also sees comparable risks with North Korea, whose nuclear weapons program is rapidly advancing in march-step with its ancillary program to develop long-range ballistic missiles capable of delivering warheads to the U.S. West Coast. "We have the capability with our satellites to monitor each time North Korea places a missile on a launch site," he said. "I propose that when those

missiles go vertical we take them out. We authorize our military to go in and remove the threat. If we do nothing, we put our children and grandchildren at risk."

Stone believes we must do more to invest in our military, and to develop the most modern weapon systems and delivery options. "We must also reinstitute our manned space program to protect our defense assets," said Stone. "We cannot allow Russia or China to be the only nations capable of sending men and women into orbit to fix our satellites."

With regard to terrorism, either foreign or home-grown, Stone suggests rebuilding our "human intelligence" network by giving the CIA resources necessary to keep our top officials informed of looming threats to national security.

On other issues, Stone believes our political system is corrupted by and beholden to special-interest money, both corporate and union. "There should be limits on them both — no more hiding behind names people can't recognize. We need transparency in campaign financing. I'd consider federal legislation for limits on campaign contributions — make those running for office work harder at the grass-roots level. Elections should not be bought, they should be earned."

He also believes the Internal Revenue Service needs to be streamlined. He recommends simplifying the current tax code and instituting a flat-tax rate of 20 percent, maintaining charitable giving and home-mortgage deductions. "Also, if a flat tax is not adopted, we should reduce the corporate income tax rate from 35 percent to 20 percent to be more in line with individual tax filers," said Stone.

Stone advocates reforming welfare rules to require "able-bodied" recipients to give back to their communi-

ties as a condition of receiving federal aid — a minimum of 20 hours per week of accredited public service, unless the recipients are in school.

As general financial revisions, he suggests making tuition at any college or university (public or private) deductible on state and federal returns with a cap of \$10,000 per year; allowing rent to be deductible just like mortgage interest; and doing away with private mortgage insurance.

On health care, an important consideration in this election, Stone said he supports national health care for anyone with pre-existing conditions and for the indigent, and catastrophic care for the middle class or below.

He suggests privatizing the Veterans Administration and letting public and private hospitals compete for the business.

He believes Zika is a major threat to this district and to the country, with the potential to become a pandemic. "We should not be playing politics with a health-and-safety issue," he stressed. "Just strip the bill [HR 4446] and pass it."

Asked what he would do if he loses this CD 36 election, Stone was philosophical. "I don't need to do this for a living," he reflected. "I've been very fortunate in my private-sector life. I have my compounding pharmacy and real-estate investments. I'll have to see where I am at that point in my life. I would have an important decision to make. As both a county supervisor and state senator, I feel like I have made a difference."

In both his time as 3rd District supervisor and as state senator, Stone can count significant achievements that have made a difference. Idyllwild might not have gotten its new library without Stone's commitment and support.

As state senator, he has reached across the aisle to co-sponsor bills that Gov. Jerry Brown has signed — including a "prescription drug take back" bill that provides specially designed storage receptacles in participating pharmacies for customers to dispose of unused or expired prescription drugs at no cost to customers.

Another bill allows terminally ill patients to use experimental drugs or procedures that have successfully completed phase one of a clinical trial approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, but have not yet been approved for general use.

And another bill will allow out-of-state licensed doctors to volunteer their time and skills while visiting in chronically underserved California communities and areas.

Stone has built his political career and reputation by being direct, staking out positions to which he maintains his commitment, and by keeping his word. "For me, the most important quality is telling the truth," he said.

Stone said if he is elected to Congress, he would dedicate his congressional salary (approximately \$174,000 annually) to charity.

Supervisor forum part 2: Washington and Milne

On Oct. 6, Supervisor Chuck Washington and Hemet Council member Shellie Mine, candidates for the Riverside County 3rd District supervisor's seat, were in Idyllwild to share their views and vision for the Hill and the county.

The members of the audience posed all of the questions to the candidates. The questions were Idyllwild-centric. The candidates were candid and prepared sound-bites were not the tone of the evening.

This is the second part of the questions and the candidates' responses. Questions about the Idyllwild Water District and Idyllwild's role in the county were in the first part, which appeared in the Oct. 13 issue.

Rather than repeat the questions in the order asked, they have been organized by subject so that the totality of the responses can be together rather than separated and disparate.

Town Hall's future

Q: What are your plans for keeping the Town Hall in the community's hands?

SM: There seem to be two different community centers, here — the proposed and the existing.

I know Supv. Washington is furnishing money to help and that former Supv. Stone offered to help.

But there are two principals. First, what is the return on the investment? And second, how can we help Idyllwild do what it wants and not force it on you?

CW: I see two issues. First, Town Hall does not belong to the community. It belongs to Jay Johnson and his family. Second, it is not a very wise investment of taxpayers' money to buy Town Hall.

We're much closer to the new community center than many think.

[Washington acknowledged that an initial idea to cre-

ate a loan, to be repaid from the County Service Area 36 ad valorem receipts, for constructing the Community Center would not work.]

But in 2010, the Board of Supervisors adopted a resolution allowing the use of Community Development Block Grant funds in Idyllwild. We're arranging to dedicate \$500,000 this year and next fiscal year another \$725,000 and forget the loan option.

You'll get your Community Center in the next two to two-and-a-half years and can use the CSA assessment to support what you want.

SM: These CDBG funds come with strings — Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing.

[U.S. Housing and Urban Development funding applies this 2015 rule, which clarifies and simplifies existing fair-housing obligations for HUD grantees to analyze their fair-housing landscape, and set locally determined fair housing priorities and goals. Since the actual grant allocation goes to Riverside County, that would be where the new rule applies. Idyllwild is where the county would use the funds.]

The AFFH rule nationally is climbing and lets the federal government come into communities and sets new zoning criteria because you accept their money.

This is the issue with CDBG funding. Be leery of taking their funds.

CW: That's inaccurate. There are no strings. The board has designated areas for business improvement. We would have lost these funds if we don't use them.

I would rather that you have your community center than have them go back to DC.

Q. How will you keep the Town Hall available for community recreation until the Community Center is complete in probably four years?

CW: It won't be four years. It's maybe three years; my hope is two years.

We have a month-to-month lease and will continue it. We have good relations with the Johnsons, so it doesn't make sense for the county to buy the facility.

SM: I see no change looking forward. Town Hall has served as a prominent community value.

Q. Can you talk about the availability of water for the Idyllwild Community Center?

SM: As we go through and look at the issue of water availability, you have to save.

I can assure you that people who have been paying have a right to water. And as you move forward with the Community Center, everybody who has been promised water should get it. You should get it if paying for it.

CW: You're raising the issue of a water shortage from the Community Center. I've done everything I can do so that businesses and the Community Center can move forward together.

You've got to get IWD to improve its supply sources. And I've had private conversations with another water district that is willing to step in. I'm confident we can move forward.

Q. Have any monies been spent on CSA 36?

[According to financial reports from the county's Economic Development Agency, about \$200,000 in revenue was collected during fiscal year 2015-16 for CSA 36. About 62 percent came from the \$35 per parcel fee. Expenses were about \$170,000. The cash balance at the end of June was slightly more than \$230,000.]

CW: CSA residents pay assessments into it.

[Milne did not know the details of the CSA 36 budget so passed on this question.]

Q. How will recreation be provided before the Community Center is completed if the Johnson family sells the Town Hall?

CW: We have a couple of plan Bs. Many activities are outside and can continue. Mr. Johnson will keep the lease.

Q. I am concerned the proposed Idyllwild Community Center is a business proposition masquerading as a community benefit. The proposed amphitheater appears to be an entertainment venue, which will exasperate the growing Idyllwild traffic and parking problems. What are the candidates' thoughts on this proposal?

CW: It is not a business, it's for the community. A non-profit will run it for the benefit of the community.

[Washington acknowledged that traffic can be a hindrance on the two-lane highways from below to Idyllwild,

especially when the Hill is the destination for a major event, such as the jazz festival, or to see and play in the snow.]

When it snows, we receive some complaints. Last year, I convened a meeting of representatives from Cal Trans, Riverside County Roads, the Sheriff's Department and others. The next weekend, Cal Trans got up "reader boards," warning that snow makes the road dangerous.

But believe me, I hear that the lodges and restaurants are very happy when people are coming.

SM: We hope it is a Community Center and doesn't turn into something else. The community here wanted it. When you build something beautiful, people come. You've heard why we came and there are lots like us.

CW: I have expressed at the 3rd District Summit that I see a common thread running through the district — from the southwest to Mt. San Jacinto. This is the most beautiful part of the county.

In 27 years, county tourism has grown to \$700 million annually and I expect the 3rd district to take advantage of that. In 10 years, it will approach \$1.5 billion.

Red Cross seeks blood donations

Off the Leash

Believing does not need facts; governing and problem solving do ...

When I was growing up, it seemed that fathers fell into one of two camps — most dads were either Chevy guys or Ford guys. My dad was a Chevy guy. He often told me that the Chevy 350 was the greatest engine ever made. I believed him, mainly, because he was my dad, and dads knew everything.

This is an example of how belief systems are formed. My father was a DIY (do-it-yourself) man. He did routine maintenance on his cars; but he wasn't, by any means, a mechanic.

Yet I carried that belief about the Chevy 350 engine with me well into my 20s. I never challenged the claim and never saw any evidence to its validity. My dad believed it and that was enough.

Because these belief systems are formed in childhood, embedded deeply into our brains at a time when our brains are still developing, they are very resistant to change.

Belief systems are the foundation on which we build our view of the world. Any suggestion that they may not hold water is a threat to a person's entire value system and that of the people who gave it to them. It's so easy to settle a world that one can depend on, and so difficult to prod them out of their complacency.

During this year's presidential election, we have learned one thing — belief systems trump information. This is a very dangerous trend.

If you want to build a bridge that will stand up over time, find an engineer with knowledge on how to build a bridge, not a person of faith who believes they can build a bridge.

A sizeable portion of our population prefers the story over the facts. This story is devoid of verifiable information and is merely a fiction, or perhaps a myth, which indeed contains truth of another kind. But not the kind to use in solving complex problems that the government is supposed to do.

The government — at all levels — is tasked to solve problems. An important step to achieve problem solving is to gather as much evidence as you can so you can increase your odds of success.

I have had many conversations about the choices we have to make on Nov. 8, and my conclusion is that we are a country of beliefs. We have individually and collectively many beliefs — about economic systems, about our own history and about the role government should play in our lives. The latter, in particular, is the most contradictory belief system I have encountered.

We don't need beliefs and grandiose claims to solve our problems. We need thoughtful and informed plans to deal with this evermore changing world.

If you want to tell me that Chevy is better than Ford, bring me some information that backs up that statement, if you want to win me over to your side. I'm not a child anymore and my dad isn't always right.

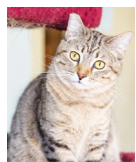

35 years ago - 1981

Hillfolk getting ready for Halloween probably shopped for sweet deals at the Cornet store, where 16-ounce bags of Baby Ruth or Butterfinger candy bars were sold for \$1.66 each and a bag of Tootsie Rolls were only 73 cents.

30 years ago - 1986

The proposed Pine Cove Zoning Study was approved by the Riverside County Planning Commission. In most instances, the proposal downgraded use of property and included only six lots designated for commercial use.

25 years ago - 1991

Astronomer and Town Crier "Sky Watch" columnist Joe Neu wrote that folk should watch for one of the most prominent constella-

tions in the fall night sky, Andromeda, named for a mythological princess.

20 years ago - 1996

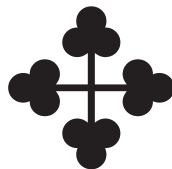

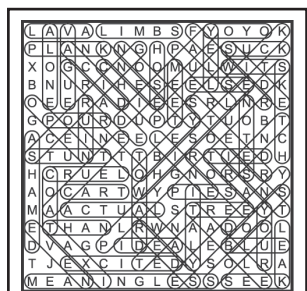

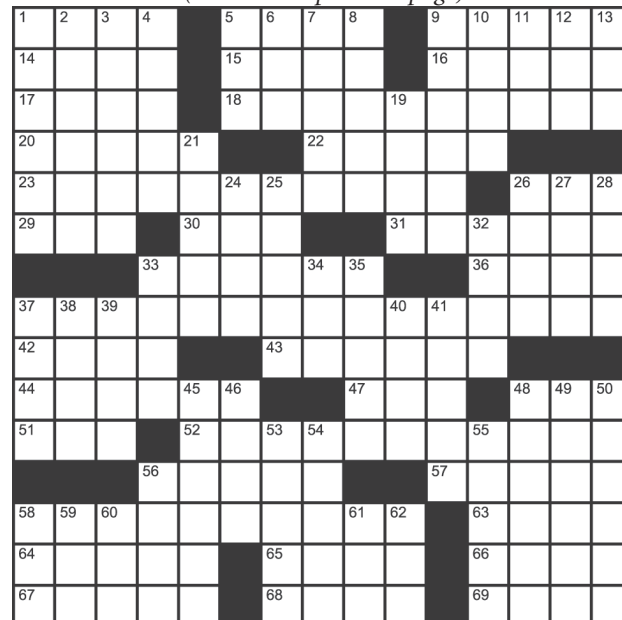

As the Responsible Official, District Ranger Arturo Delgado prepared a draft Decision Notice and Finding of No Significant Impact (DN/ FONSI) for the May Valley Non-motorized Trails Project Environmental Assessment (EA). The selected alternative for this project (Alternative 2, with some modifications) would adopt into the transportation system approximately 22 miles of existing trails and roads, construct approximately 2.5 miles of new trail, rehabilitate approximately 10.5 miles of unauthorized routes, reroute some segments of existing trails, improve trail crossings at streams, and construct 2 new trailheads, within the approximately 5,500 acre project area (total project footprint of adopted and new construction trails and trailheads, is under 14 acres). loans for the construction of the project, another part of the agency has not approved the transfer of recycled water to Foster Lake and is now questioning IWD's intent to pursue the project.

"We haven't received anything on Idyllwild's proposed recycled water-distribution system yet. The June 2016 report just had info on the proposed treatment plant and that Idyllwild wanted to use a tank at the [Idyllwild] Pines Campground to store recycled water in," wrote Erica Wolski, associate sanitary engineer with the Recycle Water unit of the SWRCB. "We haven't heard anything else since we gave them comments on the report in August. I'm not sure if they still plan to pursue the project now that management has changed."

In early August, Wolski provided comments to IWD's consultant on its latest report. Regarding the use of Foster lake to store recycled water, she wrote, "Above ground storage would be preferred to impoundments. Any impoundments proposed need to have an impermeable liner to avoid recycled water discharge to the aquifer."

Questions over the use of recycled water near local wells have been raised before. In 2005, the San Jacinto Mountain Area Water Study Agency, which was a joint powers agency composed of Fern Valley, Idyllwild and Pine Cove water districts, had a contractor — Albert A. Webb Associates — prepare a joint water management plan.

As part of the plan, the consultant assessed the possibility of a groundwater recycled reuse project. Webb and Associates contacted the state Department of Public Health and in March 2005, Steven Williams, the district engineer, replied to the questions about the "... the use of reclaimed secondary effluent from IWD wastewater treatment plan for ground water recharge."

Since the three districts obtain most of their water from "wells drilled into this fractured rock aquifer," the DPH was concerned about the lack of any studies or other proposed or operating groundwater recharge/reuse project in fractured-rock aquifer zones.

Consequently, any proposed project would have to undergo a thorough evaluation, according to Williams. "The project proponents must demonstrate, through modeling, tracer studies, or other means the ability to accurately predict and track the movement of any recharged recycled water once it leaves the recharge site."

Holldber told the board he requested studies of this nature in 2010 and has not received any reports — final or draft — discussing how the water travels beneath the surface.

"Recycled water recharge with secondary treated wastewater effluent is prohibited and the project proponents would need to upgrade the wastewater treatment plant to an approved disinfected tertiary treatment process," Williams concluded in his letter. IWD's proposed recycling plant is a tertiary treatment process.

If IWD is prohibited from moving water from the recycling plant to Foster Lake, its success will depend largely on how much of the recycled water is used for irrigation. But that has a negative consequence on the district's revenue, since recycled water cannot be sold for as much as potable water.

Earlier in December 2010, an internal IWD assessment deemed the project too costly for its limited purpose — reducing demand for potable water for irrigation use. But Webb and Associates had already opined that "the Idyllwild communities do not have a large number of heavily irrigated areas... and residential irrigation is seasonal."

In 2012, the IWD evaluation assumed Idyllwild Arts would use 450,000 gallons for irrigation, and residents and commercial customers would use about 185,000 gallons. Ordinance 61 requires mandatory recycled water use for landscape irrigation.

Former IWD financial officer Jim Ludy reviewed the consultant's report, which was sent to the state, and wrote, "This report is inaccurate and not in the best interest of the District or its customers." The former boards never discussed this difference of opinion publicly.

In June 2012, the district dismissed Ludy for malfeasance.

Get free help with your Medicare

When someone with Medicare finds his or her way to my office phone, it's often because of a complicated and snarly issue that's going to take time to fix.

However, it's sometimes a Medicare beneficiary who found my number somewhere and called for some basic help in understanding their coverage. I love those calls because I have a quick and easy answer for folks like that.

I refer them to the State Health Insurance Assistance Program, or SHIP. There's a SHIP in every state in the country. I have phone numbers for the ones in my Medicare region written on a card right next to my phone, and I refer to it often. The California SHIP phone number is 800-434-0222.

SHIPs are nonprofit organizations that help people with Medicare understand their benefits better. The counseling is personalized and it's absolutely free.

SHIPs aren't connected to any insurance company or health plan, so they're not trying to sell you any kind of product. If you're eligible for Medicare, you're eligible for assistance from your local SHIP. You can talk to a SHIP counselor over the phone, or go to your local SHIP office for face-to-face assistance.

The quality of the counseling is terrific. Many SHIP counselors have Medicare themselves and they're well-trained to answer your questions. They know all the ins and outs of the program, whether you have Original Medicare (where you choose the doctor or hospital you want and the government pays your providers directly) or Medicare Advantage (in which private insurers offer health-care services through a specific network of

doctors, hospitals and other providers). SHIPs also can help with Part D prescription drug insurance.

A SHIP counselor can help you with billing problems, complaints about your medical care or treatment, how to shop for a Medicare Advantage health plan or Part D prescription drug plan that meets your needs; how to appeal if you disagree with coverage or payment decisions by Medicare or your Medicare plan and many more.

Of course, there are other ways besides SHIP to get information about Medicare. One excellent resource is the "Medicare & You" handbook, which is mailed to Medicare beneficiaries every fall. You can find the latest edition of "Medicare & You" online at: www.medicare.gov/Pubs/pdf/10050.pdf

Help also is available through the Medicare customer service center, at 800-MEDICARE (800-633-4227; TTY users can call 877-486-2048). The call center is open 24 hours a day, including weekends.

Another helpful resource is the official Medicare website, at www.Medicare.gov.

sance. Ludy then sued the district. He contended his dismissal was because of his comments and review of the recycled water project. Less than two years later, IWD settled the suit.

In November 2015, after receiving funding approval from the SWRCB in the spring of 2015, IWD contracted with Separation Processes Inc. to develop specifications for the plant, called the preliminary design report. While these were expected within months, the final report has yet to go to the board. This may increase construction estimates.


