

After graduation, he drew cartoons for the New Yorker and Esquire magazines. Starting in 1939, he gained newspaper experience writing and cartooning for Copley News Service and the Los Angeles Times.

When he and wife Betty bought a lot in Fern Valley in 1944 and began building a house in 1945, the die was cast. A new home and a love affair with the San Jacinto Mountains led to the birth of the Town Crier. The Maxwells continued to publish and edit for 26 years, with

Fatality crash at Thomas Mountain

A two-vehicle crash at 10:34 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 29, on Highway 74 at Thomas Mountain Village resulted in one fatality and three injuries, two of them moderate to serious.

According to California Highway Patrol Public Information Officer Darren Meyer, Walter Risch, 73, of Mountain Center, was driving a white 2004 Ford 150 truck westbound on Highway 74 just east of Courtesy Drive in Thomas Mountain Village when he began to turn left into the driveway of a private residence.

At the same time, Stanley Vandyke, 69, of Oceanside, was driving a 2016 red Ford Fiesta eastbound on Highway 74.

According to the CHP report, Risch said he did not see the Fiesta coming when he turned left and the two vehicles collided, causing major damage to the Fies-

Vandyke, the Fiesta driver, died at the scene. Also in the Fiesta, in the right front passenger seat, was Jane Vandyke, 67, of Desert Hot Springs and James Bees, 62, of Hemet, who was in the rear seat on the right side. Jane was transported by Mercy Air to Desert Regional

Medical Center complaining of neck and back lacerations and pain in the chest. Bees, after a cut and rescue, also was transported by Mercy Air to Desert Regional with broken bones, head trauma and multiple lacerations.

Diane Church, 74, also of Mountain Center, a

front-seat passenger in the Ford 150, was transported by American Medical Response to Riverside University Health Medical Center in Moreno Valley with minor injuries. Ford 150 driver Risch was not transport-

Fatal crash near Lake Fulmor

A body was recovered from a car crash near Lake Fulmor on Thursday, Oct. 27. The California Highway Patrol reported discovering the vehicle 50 feet over the side at 4:37 p.m. The vehicle appeared to have hit a tree before coming to rest.

According to CHP Officer Julie Patton, San Gorgonio Pass Station, the vehicle was a 2014 white Nissan Altima registered in Hemet. The cause of the crash appeared to have been the driver making an unsafe turning movement about 1.4 miles north of Hall Decker Road on Highway 243. Patton said the crash, still under investigation, appears to be a single-vehicle, single-occupant incident. The initial report did not indicate if driver impairment was a factor in the crash.

In an update on Tuesday, Nov. 1, CHP Public Information Officer Darren Meyer indicated an investigation was centering on whether the driver, Harlan Brooks, 70, of Hemet, had had a medical emergency that may have led to the vehicle leaving the roadway and plunging over the side.

County Coroner's office Sgt. Brent Seacrest indicated that the vehicle was not sufficiently damaged as to have necessarily caused Brooks' death. Also, although the CHP report had indicated Brooks had been missing since Sunday, Oct. 23, Seacrest's information did not show whether an official missing person report had been filed or if the information subsequently came from the victim's family. Seacrest also stressed that Oct. 27 was when the vehicle and Brooks were found. "The incident was not witnessed so that the crash could have occurred earlier," said Seacrest.

Ruiz and Stone debate before election

Health care and budget major topics

Sunday evening, Oct. 16, candidates for the California Congressional District 36 seat debated in Palm Desert. Rep. Dr. Raul Ruiz, the incumbent, and challenger State Sen. Jeff Stone faced off in a debates sponsored by the Desert Sun and local Palm Springs television station KESQ.

Many questions were asked during the debate. The following are highlights of the candidates' responses and comments.

Q. The national debt has sky rocketed how do you get control and would you ever vote for an increase in the debt ceiling?

Stone: No, I made a promise not to vote for debt ceiling increase, nor vote to approve a budget that doesn't have a long term plan to get debt reduced within a 10 year period because [of] bankrupting our children and grandchildren. Incessant spending is a national security issue. It's okay when interest rates are near zero.

Ruiz: Wow. American families are asked to pay their debt and government should pay what they owe. The idea that you would rather shut down the government and default on bills could create a harsh decay in our economy. We need to reduce deficit and reduce taxes.

Stone: That is the difference between us. I'm an entrepreneur and know a business can't spend more money than it takes in. We need to meet our obligation for senior citizens and make sure they get Social Security and Medicare.

Q. Is there one element in the budget that is most under funded?

Stone: Military hardware and infrastructure. We need to be strong and re-invent the military. U.S. can't police the world at expense of American people.

Ruiz: I have voted consistently for the military budget. Where I think we should focus more is expenditures for the veterans so they can see the doctors they need. The other thing is early childhood education, where we'll make a long-term impact.

Q. The Affordable Care Act may hang in the balance. Congressman Ruiz you talked about improving it. How exactly would you do that?

Ruiz: I've said consistently as a player and prior to being in Congress, the ACA is a step in the right direction, but it's imperfect. What we need to do with premiums going up because it's out of control health care costs, we need to reduce health care costs. People are not able to see a physician as soon as they want because we have a physician shortage... I propose we build more medical schools and training program for communities that are underserved.

Stone: Government can't do things better or cheaper than the private sector ... We need to start over with a national health care plan.

Each candidate had the opportunity to ask the other a question.

Ruiz asked Stone, "He states he's for civil unions, but why don't you approve of gay marriage and don't believe in marriage equality for LGBT community?"

Stone: On the floor of the State Senate, I stood up and supported sexual orientation to be a part of our Civil Rights Act of 1964. I did support Proposition 8. But it was basically on definition. The definition of marriage, I believe, is an institution between men and women. I support the same rights; call it marriage without calling it marriage, the same rights for same sex couples to love each other and be together and the same rights as a traditional married couple.

Ruiz: He doesn't give dignity to the LBGT member to marry or form a union in marriage. That's discriminatory."

Stone asked Ruiz, "He voted to give Iran \$150 billion ... what do you say to families of gay, lesbian and transgender people who die from this regime?"

Ruiz: We're going to go after Iran. They are not a friend of the U.S. Iran is not to be trusted. We'll come down harsh on any human rights violator.

Ruiz argued that the biggest threat is Iran getting a nuclear bomb. The President's proposal was the best option to eliminate Iran's capacity to get nuclear bomb in the short term.

Stone replied that the deal would still allow Iran to develop a nuclear bomb in $10\,\mathrm{years}$.

The Nov. 1, 1946, TC, declared it would be published semi-occasionally, and that Betty and Ernest Maxwell's policy "is flexible ..."

Peppered throughout with a few of Ernie's drawings — like a scribbled box with the words "Snow Scene" and nothing else drawn inside — the first issue was more of a newsletter about goings on in town.

But it did talk a bit about the stock market and also noted a prediction that experts were estimating that by 1952, 10 million people would live in Southern California. "Nobody seems to know just where they all will go," wrote the editors.

As of 2010, that number has more than doubled and, if we knew the population of Idyllwild in 1950, I'm sure the number of residents now is more than double.

The Maxwells also urged their readers to vote. "Don't forget that on Tuesday, November 5th, the polls are open for all voters. The Idyllwild Inn is the place to do your ballot stamping.

"Since our government is run by the persons whom we select, let's have a good turnout for the mountain area. If you vote, you have earned your right to participate - if you don't vote, be careful how you object to the way the government operates.'

And so, 70 years later, here we are — still with a stock market, a representative government and a local newspaper reporting on the goings-on in Idyllwild and sometimes larger areas when those affect us.

The possibility that the Town Crier would be outsourced to Beijing was a real threat back in 2013. It was that prospective buyer's method to keep the paper alive. Jack and I believed otherwise.

So, despite social media and a slow down in advertising, we're still here because people look to locals to report on local government, local happenings and local residents.

them in the future.



a two-year interruption in the late 1950s.

What was it like when the Crier first came to town? The inaugural edition had this message to readers from Ernie and Betty: "The TOWN CRIER is published semi-occasionally. Editors [are] Betty and Ernie Maxwell. Our policy is flexible but alert to those ideas and projects which forward the development of this community. We feel that the Mount San Jacinto area is one of the choicest spots in Southern California. We'd like to keep it that way. Maybe we can help by putting out the TOWN CRIER for our friends and neighbors on the mountain."

With that dedication to friends and neighbors, Ernie cartooned and covered Idyllwild as its population grew and it began to shed some of its small-town folksiness. The first edition was homespun, long on charm and definitely not written according to Associated Press style guidelines.

This advisory in the inaugural edition proffers a glimpse

of some of the whimsy that would color future pages: "Reports persist that there is a native maple tree in this area. Also that bears still linger in the San Jacinto Mts. The TOWN CRIER offers a fine bag of pine cones to anyone verifying these reports. Two maple leaves or bear skins will do."

The first edition came, just as this one does, before an election. A short note in the edition previewed Maxwell's commitment to civic responsibility—"If you vote you have earned your right to participate—if you don't vote, be careful how you object to the way the government operates."

From Nov. 1, 1946, until Oct. 11, 1957, the Maxwells were Town Crier owners, publishers and editors.

From Oct. 25, 1957, to Jan. 16, 1959, Mark Clevenger and I.G. Rosen published and edited. They introduced off-set printing, printed (not hand-drawn) headlines, black and white photographs, the Vari-Typer (a word processor of the pre-digital age that formatted pages), and added "Idyllwild" to the paper's name, rechristening it as the "Idyllwild Town Crier."

From Jan. 23, 1959, until Jan. 28, 1972, the Maxwells returned as publisher/editors and resumed hand-drawn headlines, preserving some of the original look and folksiness of the paper's first years.

On Feb. 4, 1972, new owners Luther and Marilyn Weare published their first edition and continued until May 11, 1978. Ernie Maxwell remained as a consultant. From May 18, 1978, until May 4, 1989, L.B. and Dorothy Hunsaker served as publishers/editors.

In May 1989, in a shift from individual and on-Hill ownership, the Chronicle Publishing Company, based in San Francisco, bought the paper. Carole Brennan served as editor/publisher from May 11, 1989, until April 30,

1992. Even though from Boston and a more corporate newspaper background, Brennan quickly adapted to small-town Idyllwild and a management style necessary to accommodate a large staff, most of whom were women with children.

"In order to keep these great women working, I had to accommodate families," she remembered. "At one point, I had a crib in my office for an infant that belonged to one of my staff. We converted our break room to a play room for the many young children of staff."

Brennan recounted an impromptu visit by Chronicle scion Peter Thieriot. "He was shocked by the playroom and said Chronicle HR would object. But by the end of the day, he understood what we needed to do and said to me, 'This will just be our little secret."

Ingrid Wolfe, who was assistant editor under Carole Brennan, remembers the largely female staff in the early 1990s. "We were like a family of sisters left holding the bag and making dinner together," said Wolfe. "We had to learn how to get along in order to get the work done. Carole was the driving force to make it into a real newspaper. She wanted it to be news that mattered. It was exhausting but it was one of the best times in my life."

Brennan was succeeded by Gary Hutner from May 7, 1992, until June 30, 1994.

In July of 1994, in an even bigger geographical shift, Tindle Newspapers, based in Farnham, England, acquired the Crier, commencing nearly 30 years of "across-the-pond" ownership. The Crier was the sole Yankee publication in Tindle's stable of over 220 U.K. newspapers. Gary Hutner continued as editor/publisher from

July 7, 1994 until Aug. 29, 1996.

Becky Clark took over as editor/publisher on Sept. 5, 1996, having been selected as the only local in a wide applicant pool from as far away as Memphis, Tenn., and Honolulu, Hawaii. Clark introduced full color in May 2002. She continued until Nov. 12, 2009.

Clark's association with the paper predates her time as editor and publisher. She started in 1984 as a night type-setter under the Hunsakers. In 1989, she became front-desk manager. When the Chronicle bought the paper, Clark became production manager. In another example of the family nature of the paper, while Clark was production manager, the truck that was delivering the Idyllwild Guide broke down and all staff had to go down the Hill in their cars to pick up the guides. Clark was left with her 5-year-old son Zac and 7-year-old daughter Halie to field calls and front-office callers while Becky worked on the edition.

And, as mentioned, in 1996, under Tindle Newspapers, Clark became editor/publisher.

Grace Reed succeeded Clark as editor/publisher from Nov. 19, 2009, until June 27, 2013.

In a return to local ownership, Becky and Jack Clark purchased the paper from Tindle in June 2013, ending 24 years of off-Hill control, and incorporated as Idyllwild House Publishing Company Ltd. Becky served as editor and publisher from July 4, 2013, until Jan. 8, 2015, and continues in those capacities with husband Jack joining as co-publisher in January 2015.

"We bought the paper to save it," Becky said. "We could not imagine Idyllwild without the Town Crier." Halie, who was answering phones at age 7, is now operations manager, again demonstrating the ongoing thread of family that has infused the paper's growth. Becky's grandkids, Halie and Zac's kids, come to the paper on a daily basis. It's ink in the blood.

Ernie, who continued to come into the paper for years after he no longer owned it, would recognize and be proud of that family thread.

Health care enrollment season began this week

Open enrollment for Covered California began on Nov. 1 and ends on Jan. 31, 2017. Existing Covered California clients were mailed renewal notices during the first week of October.

If an enrollee wants their health coverage to begin Jan.1, 2017, they must choose a plan and enroll by Dec.

Individuals with special qualifying life events can enroll at any time of the year, according to the covered California press release. Medi-Cal enrollment also is yearround. Medi-Cal and Covered California use the same application. After you enter your information, you will find out whether you qualify for Medi-Cal or Covered

Recently, the U.S. Census Bureau reported that the number of uninsured individuals in California has dropped continuously since the Affordable Care Act was implemented in 2014. The percentage of uninsured state residents has fallen from 17.2 percent in 2013 to 8.6 per-

cent in 2015. In California, the uninsured population has declined 50 percent.

Sylvia Mathews Burwell, secretary of the U.S. Health and Human Services, estimated that the average number of enrollees would be about 11.4 million individuals during 2017, about a 9-percent increase from 2016's average monthly enrollment.

This estimate is more optimistic than private-sector estimates, which predict that the reduced number of offerings in many areas and higher premiums will discourage more individuals than previous years.

This year, consumers can visit CoveredCA.com to explore their options for coverage in 2017," Peter V. Lee, executive director of Covered California, said in the release. "Most of those renewing with us get subsidies that mean they are paying only a portion of the premium. But even without considering the subsidy, nearly 80 percent of our consumers will either be able to pay less than they are paying now for health insurance, or see their rates go up by no more than 5 percent if they shop and switch to another plan.'

Almost all consumers (92.6 percent) will have at least three insurers to choose from in their region, and none will have fewer than two. Also, more than 93 percent of hospitals in California will be available through at least one health insurance company in 2017, and 74 percent will be available in three or more plans, according to Covered California's release.

The statewide weighted-average change will be 13.2 percent, up from 4 percent in 2016 and 4.2 percent in 2015. Inland Empire plans will increase an average of 10

percent compared to 1 percent last year.

However, most consumers will see a much smaller increase — or pay less next year — if they switch to another plan. In the Inland Empire, the growth of the lowest-priced bronze and silver plan is about half the statewide average.

This year, Covered California has improved its shopping tool. Current enrollees will be able to compare their current plan benefits and 2017 premiums side-byside with other plans for 2017.

Also, the new Shop-and-Compare tool's new-offers feature includes displaying health and dental plans separately, showing up to 12 product options on a page instead of three and offering more ways to filter plan choices for the consumer.

Covered California recommends that members who want to evaluate their plan and options visit Covered-CA.com and sign into their account. Consumers who take no action by Dec. 15, will be automatically renewed into their existing plan. Consumers can also contact their Certified Insurance Agent or Certified Enrollment Counselor, or call Covered California at 800-300-1506

for enrollment or renewal assistance, according to the release.

Charges for Pinyon murders stand against Pape and Smith

After nearly four days of preliminary hearings, Judge Bernard Schwartz of the Riverside County Superior Court, ruled that he found sufficient evidence to try Robert Lars Pape, 29, and Cristin Conrad Smith, 29, for the 2006 murders of Jon Hayward, Vicki Friedli and Vicki's daughter Becky.

An information arraignment has been scheduled for both defendants for Nov. 15, A trial could begin sometime within four months to a year, according to John Hall, the district attorney's public information officer.

During the preliminary hearing that began Oct. 24 and convened over four days until Monday, Oct. 31, Schwartz heard many witnesses and the DA's office offered many pieces of evidence, several never before presented in court. The DA's office only presented a portion of the evidence in this case at the preliminary hearing, according to a press release late Monday.

The murders occurred on Sept. 17, 2006, in Pinyon Pines. Becky's body was found burning in a wheelbarrow outside the house. The other bodies were found inside the burning home. An affidavit from the DA's office stated that Hayward died from a 12-gauge shotgun wound to the chest. Vicki's death was caused from a wound to the head, possibly from a Glock handgun. Pape was Becky's former boyfriend.

In March 2014, both Pape and Smith were arrested and charged with the murders. Family members of the victims were elated that action had finally occurred after more than seven years. Seven months later in September 2014, the DA's office dismissed the charges and both

men were released.

Then, in June 2016, the DA announced that both had been arrested again and charged with murders. Three counts of murder, with a special circumstance allegation of committing multiple murders, were filed. This action came after an extensive review of the case and new evidence, including testimony from a confidential informant.

After the arrests, District Attorney Michael Hestrin stated, "The lengthy investigation led to the finding of new evidence, some of which was not known at the time of the first investigation, as well as evidence that has now been processed using technological advances unavailable previously."

Some of the new evidence included retesting of DNA found at the scene, which matches Smith's, and better forensic analysis of cell-tower data places Smith and Pape closer to Pinyon Pines about when the murders where committed.

Confidential informant Jeremy Witt, who worked with Smith at Soak City Wave Pool in 2007, testified last week. He said Smith admitted to being involved in an arson when he said, "Something went wrong and we torched the whole f...ing place ..."

Schwartz also denied Smith's motion to dismiss the charges against him because they have already been dismissed twice.

More rain falls on Hill

Ahead of average, but still in drought

The Hill received more rain early last week and some this The Sunday. tal rainfall recorded at the U.S. Forest Service's Keenwild Guard Station was slightly more than three-quarters of an inch. In Pine Cove, nearly an inch of rain was recorded.

At Keenwild, the total rainfall since July 1 has been almost 2.9 inches whereas Pine Cove has recorded 3.74inches of rain.



After nearly an inch of rain on Oct. 23 and 24, Strawberry Creek was flowing very strongly.

On the Hill, the long-term historic average rainfall from July 1 through Oct. 31 has been 3.4 inches. While Keenwild's recorded total is below that average, Pine Cove, in the fifth year of the drought, has received about 10 percent more than the historic average.

This early in the rain year, it is too soon to predict the expected yearly rainfall. In 2015, by early October, both Keenwild and Pine Cove had received more than 5.25 inches of rain. By the end of June, the annual to-

tals were 21.25 inches in Keenwild and 25.16 inches in Pine Cove. The yearly average of Hill rain has been 25.67 inches.

The last year Keenwild exceeded the average annual rain was 2011, when 29.4 inches fell. That also is the only year in the past decade that rainfall exceeded the historic average. In the past 10 years, the average annual rainfall has been 19.8 inches at Keenwild.

Post 800 observes Veterans Day

At the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month of the year, the United States observes Veterans Day.

As it does each year, Idyllwild's American Legion Post 800 commemorates the day the "Great War," World War 1, ended at 11 a.m. Nov. 11, 1918.

The Legion officers and Honor Guard conduct a moving ceremony to honor all American war dead.

Post Commander Danny Richardson said there will be a speaker and a ceremonial folding of the flag by the Post Honor Guard, with each fold remembering a conflict in which U.S. service men and women gave their lives. A complimentary lunch follows and the entire community is welcome to attend.

Originally called Armistice Day, or Remembrance Day in other countries that fought in the war, the observance marks the formal end of hostilities of "The War to End All Wars." After the signing of an armistice by representatives of the Central Powers and the Western Allies in a rail car on a siding in Compiègne, France, soldiers throughout the war theater put down their weapons at the appointed time of 11 a.m.

In November 1919, U.S. President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed Nov. 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day. In 1938, an act of Congress made Nov. 11 each year a legal holiday. And in 1954, following WW II and the Korean conflict, Congress renamed the commemorative holiday Veterans Day to pay tribute to American war dead and to honor all who serve or have served their country as part of the U.S. military.

On Friday, Nov. 11, all federal and state government offices, including the post office, will be closed, as are banks, schools and county offices.

The American Legion Post 800 is located at 54360 Marian View Drive in Idyllwild. The event is free.

Riverside County Registrar of Voters Rebecca Spencer has announced that early voting for the Nov. 8 consolidated general election will be available leading up to election day from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. through this Friday, Nov. 4, and Monday, Nov. 7, at the Registrar of Voters office. Voting there also is available from

9 a.m. to 4 p.m., Saturday, Nov. 5, and on election day, Tuesday, Nov. 8, from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. The office is located at 2724 Gateway Drive in Riverside.

Registered voters may attend any of the early voting sites to either drop off a vote-by-mail ballot or vote on an accessible voting unit.

Early voting provides ac-

cess to voters who are unable to make it to the polls on election day and to those who would like their vote to be counted first on election night. Voters are encouraged to cast their ballots as soon as possible so they can be included in the first election night results, which are posted shortly after 8 p.m. on Nov. 8.

California law allows time off to vote on election day

To ensure all voters can vote on election day, Tuesday, Nov. 8, California law provides employees up to two hours off to vote if they do not have enough time to do so during non-work hours.

"Every citizen should have the ability to exercise their right to vote," Secretary of State Alex Padilla said in the press release. "In California, a voter cannot be denied their fundamental right to the bal-

lot box. Working Californians can take time off to vote without a loss of pay."

California Elections Code section 14000 allows workers up to two hours off, without a loss of pay, to vote if they do not have enough time to do so in their non-work hours. The law requires workers to give their employers two working days' notice before the election if they will need to take time off to vote.

Polling places will be open between 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. on election day

Every California employer is required to post, in a visible location, a notice informing employees of their rights at least 10 days before an election. The Secretary of State's office offers these free, print-ready notices in 10 languages at www.sos.ca.gov/elections/time-vote-notices/.

Family, friends honor Esperanza firefighters on 10th anniversary

It was a reunion of people from all over Southern California — parents, grandparents, children, sisters, brothers, nieces, nephews, girlfriends and widows. Yes, widows. And friends and co-workers. And TV crews.

In an unlikely place for one — a barren area that requires driving a long, rutted, rocky and unpaved road — this family reunion marked the 10th anniversary of the tragic deaths of five U.S. Forest Service firefighters on Oct. 26, 2006.

Each year on that day, families, friends and co-workers migrate toward that site, a property — an octagonal house with a garage on well-abated land. This is property the men were defending against the Esperanza Fire, the site of the burn-over that cost the firefighters their lives.

The annual gathering is held to pause at noon for a moment of silence. Afterward, they eat lunch and enjoy one another's company, as if it were a family reunion.

As former Cal Fire Public Information Officer Julie Hutchinson said, "We kind of all are family. When you go through these tough times together, we become family." She was one of those involved in answering media questions after the tragedy.

Capt. Mark Loutzenhiser and four of his Engine 57 crew members, stationed out of the Alandale Guard Station just a

few miles north of Pine Cove, lost their lives in the fire ignited by Raymond Lee Oyler, now serving on death row for the arson.

Then-Division Chief Norm Walker said, "As soon as it happened, I came up here Code 3 [hot response]." He arrived at the scene just 20 or 30 minutes after the burn-over. Despite the long and rugged drive, he doesn't remember it.

He said Loutzenhiser was still alive and being transported by air rescue to an area hospital. Pablo Cerda also was still alive and being transported by air rescue when he arrived. Daniel Hoover Najera's body was found down on a slope below the garage. Jess "Gus" McLean's body was found near the burned-out fire engine.

"We had to search for Jason McKay. We couldn't find him," Walker said. He was between a Volkswagen Beetle and an old tractor. "He was fairly unrecognizable."

He said they had to make some decisions about securing the site. And he called the San Bernardino National Forest dispatcher. "I told them the U.S. Forest Service would not be involved in the fire anymore." Cal Fire took over, and all Forest Service crews were taken off the fire and sent to the Vista Grande Guard Station.

"They were allowed one phone call," Walker said. They were allowed to tell what happened but not to whom. Then administrators spent two to three hours trying to get to the families before the media got wind of the tragedy. They succeeded.

Loutzenhiser died later that day. Cerda died five days later on Oct. 31.

The people at the 10th anniversary were jovial, hugging and posing for group photos. A few minutes before noon, they became more solemn and quiet. Battalion Chief Chris Fogle, with his right arm in a sling, asked the group to gather in a circle in front of a large monument built at the bottom of the site. Maria, Loutzenhiser's widow, asked everyone to hold hands.

Several Forest Service personnel in uniform readied their radios. Right at noon, dispatch made the announcement of the 10th anniversary of the five fire-

fighters' greatest sacrifice. People bowed their heads for several moments of silence, some wiping away tears. (At 7:57 a.m., the time of the burn-over, Riverside County's Perris Emergency Command Center also made an announcement.)

Fogle then came forward, gave a prayer and invited everyone up to the house, now a converted warehouse since the burnover, where they could enjoy a barbecue and look out over the rugged terrain from high on a hill.

Friends and family of Hoover Najera took their plates of barbecue down to the spot where he died.

McLean's mother, Ceil McLean, said she gets by

with the help of her family and friends. "Every year gets a little easier," she said.

Josh Whitney, a former U.S. Forest Service fire-fighter, said he tries to come to the reunion every year. "Mark and Jesse worked for me and Doug [Henninger] when we were partners ... maybe 30 years ago."

Seth Loutzenhiser said he and his twin, Kyle, don't remember much about their father. The 18-year-olds recently graduated from high school. They were 8 at the time and the youngest of Mark's children. "He taught us how to ride a bike and my brother hit the fence," Seth remembered.

Denise Koeller, spouse of property owner Greg Koeller, said when she learned of the death of the firefighters, she became physically ill. They were at their primary residence off the Hill when they heard. She

said she didn't care that their house and things were

Her husband allows fire management to train firefighters on the property now. Every time the Forest Service pays him, he reinvests the money into something dedicated to the Engine 57 crew. He recently added a display along the road outside his property for co-workers and family members to post their memories

"This was a life-changing event for all of us," said Hutchinson. "It was a reality check for all of us. This could have been any of us." She said firefighters are trained and believe the training protects them. They never think about this happening to them. "There are things that are outside of our control."

Idyllwild Fire claim: "Some of the funds will go toward maintaining a salary level that represents market wages..... We're 40 percent below scale." (Fire Chief Reitz in Idyllwild Town Crier Vol. 71, No. 40, page 24.)

FACT: Idyllwild Fire employees make more money per hour than comparable Cal Fire and Riverside County Fire staff, because those agencies work a 72-hour week, while Idyllwild Fire has only a 56-hour work week. The \$200,000 per year raised by Measure W would be completely used by giving just the three highest earners in Idyllwild Fire a 40% pay raise.

Idyllwild Fire claim: You can receive a savings of \$200-\$600 on your property insurance with an IFPD ISO rating of 2.*

FACT: All of the companies that insure properties on the Hill that were contacted did not recognize this rating and were not willing to offer such discounts. Good luck trying to find these savings.

Idyllwild Fire claim: "In 2011....firefighters agreed to take a 9% pay cut to keep the District solvent....They have not seen any pay increase....in these past five years."*

FACT: While it is true that some members of the Idyllwild Fire Department took this pay cut, they conveniently forget to mention that all staff received annual cost of living raises of up to 5% per year in the last five years.

60 years ago - 1956


Max and Bee Krone were featured in "The Instructor," a teacher's magazine. A section of their song arrangements appeared in several issues.

Town Hall lease looks promising

The County Service Area Advisory Committee conducted business at its monthly meeting on Thursday,

Key agenda items included review of the public survey regarding the future of Town Hall and what agency would manage CSA 36 recreation starting in 2017.

Mike Franklin, CSA project manager for the county's Economic Development Agency, facilitated the meeting. Discussion again centered on what role Town Hall would play in CSA 36 recreation in the coming year. Franklin and Opal Hellweg, 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington's legislative assistant, noted that Washington would be meeting on Monday, Oct. 31, with Town Hall owner Jay Johnson to determine if a mutually acceptable rental agreement could be reached for the coming year. In a telephone conversation Tuesday morning, Nov. 1, Johnson said a two-year lease looks very promising. Franklin clarified on Tuesday morning that Washington directed Vince Yzaguirre at the county's real estate division to contact Johnson to negotiate details of a possible lease.

Town Hall currently serves as the local headquarters for CSA 36 recreation, although CSA recreational activities are conducted at other sites, including Idyllwild School's top field. If Johnson and the county are unable to agree on a lease for the coming year, the county would be obliged to find alternate recreation sites if and until new recreation facilities at the Idyllwild Community Center could be available for CSA 36 use.

Franklin announced that the county is issuing a Request for Proposal to find a new contractor to provide recreation management for CSA 36. Currently, Riverside Counnext meeting at 5:30 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 17.

ty Regional Park and Open Space District is providing that service but that will terminate as soon as a new contractor is selected. Although it is assumed that ICC (San Jacinto Mountain Community Center) will submit a bid and that they had been previously invited by the county to do so, it is not a foregone conclusion that the organization will be selected, according to Franklin and Hellweg.

"Once the RFP is issued, it will be a month-long process for interested providers to submit bids," said Hellweg. Franklin stated the RFP announcement and responses will be public documents and that a panel from the county's real property department will evaluate the responses, and that the county will make the decision and designate the next CSA 36 recreation provider. In the meantime, the future status of both Town Hall as a CSA recreational facility and of management of the CSA 36 recreational program remains uncertain.

The Town Hall public survey yielded 150 responses, according to advisory committee member Kathy Wilson, all but four of which expressed support for keeping Town Hall as a community facility, with preference to have it become a performing arts center. Wilson noted that a year lease would be absolutely necessary to provide the community ample time to explore options for purchasing Town Hall.

A motion was made and approved by the advisory committee to advise Washington of the committee's support for securing a year lease from the Johnson family for the rental of Town Hall.

A review of the CSA revenue and expense fund showed beginning of fiscal year cash balance of \$231,106.14. Franklin indicated the budget report would be updated by next meeting.

On an approved motion, the committee scheduled the

Ruiz's campaign contributions dwarf Stone's

Following the June primary, which pitted state Sen. Jeff Stone (R) against incumbent Congressman Raul Ruiz (D), contributions did not pour into Stone's coffers.

At the end of September, Ruiz had more than 20 times the available cash for the final five weeks of the

campaign than Stone had. tributions to Ruiz from indi-During the three months from July through September, Ruiz received about \$480,000 in contributions compared to Stone's \$85,000. Consequently, Ruiz spent about eight times Stone's expenditures during the same period — \$875,000 to \$117,000.

As election day approaches, the pattern of conviduals and political action committees has remained consistent. In this quarter, Ruiz was the beneficiary of about \$165,000 from PACs with about half of the \$300,000 from individuals. However, both were about 20 percent of the previous totals from individuals and committees.

Most of the PAC money

comes from groups based in Washington, D.C., or around its beltway. Nearly half a million dollars (half his total) of Ruiz's committee contributions came from that area compared to \$106,000 from all of Califor-



voters pass Proposition W, the chief said.

Asked whether parcel owners within IFPD, in addition to their parcel fee, were paying that county fire tax like everyone else, the chief said they were not. He said parcel owners within IFPD do not pay the county tax for fire services that is hidden within the property tax bills of property owners outside IFPD.

But it turns out there's a lot more to it than that. And this should be of interest to renters, as well as to property owners because, of course, landlords pass on their property taxes to their renters in their rent charges.

The Town Crier has examined records from the Riverside County auditor-controller's office, records that are available to the public online.

Yes, Hill property owners outside IFPD do have a portion of their property tax payment — about 6 percent of it (averaging tax-rate areas outside IFPD) — distributed by the county to "County Structure Fire Protection." And no property owners inside IFPD have any of their property-tax payment going to that purpose.

But the chief did not mention that property owners inside IFPD have a portion of their property tax payment — about 13.7 percent of it (averaging all 20 tax-rate areas inside IFPD) — distributed by the county to "Idyllwild Fire Protection." And property owners outside IFPD have none of their property tax payment going to that purpose.

IFPD currently gets about \$1.2 million per year from the property taxes paid by property owners within the IFPD.

But the larger and even simpler fact is this:

By California law, everybody pays 1 percent of their assessed property value to the county in property taxes, wherever you live. Regardless of how the tax money is distributed by the county, we all pay that same 1 percent. So, you're going to pay 1 percent of your assessed property value in property tax, no matter where you live and no matter how that 1 percent gets distributed by the county.

The difference is this: For property owners outside IFPD — including Pine Cove, Mountain Center and Zone 3 — their basic fire protection and emergency services are included within their 1-percent property tax. But not for property owners inside IFPD. Property owners inside IFPD pay their 1-percent property tax plus an additional tax for their basic fire protection and emergency services — \$65 per year as a parcel-fee tax, which will double to \$130 per year if Measure W passes next week. (Vacant lot owners would see their IFPD parcel-fee tax quadrupled from \$32.50 to \$130.)

The simple bottom line: 1 percent plus IFPD's parcel fee is more than 1 percent.

Of course, wherever you live, you still pay additionally for ambulance transport to a local hospital — probably around \$3,000, depending upon the distance to the hospital to which you are taken. A portion of that may be covered by insurance, if you have it.

But for basic fire protection and emergency services, those with property in IFPD pay the parcel-fee tax in addition to the 1-percent property tax that every Hill property owner pays.

Attention Idyllwild Water District voters

The Town Crier will sponsor a candidate forum for possible Idyllwild Water District directors from 6 to 8 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 10, at Town Hall.

With two vacancies on the water board and no general manager, IWD is limping. Current Acting President John Cook wishes to hold two elections, a special one in March and the regular election in August, each with a cost of \$4,000 to \$7,000. Another option available is the Riverside County Board of Supervisors can intervene after 60 days and appoint directors who will fill the terms until the August election.

Either way, the community should know the thinking of possible candidates. All individuals who have indicated their intent to be a candidate to either the IWD office or Supervisor Chuck Washington's office will be invited to speak.

Fire department selects new EMS coordinator

In addition to routine fiscal matters, the Idyllwild Fire Protection District commission appointed Christy Slattery as its new Emergency Medical Services coordinator at last week's meeting.

The coordinator provides clinical oversight, training and representation of the department with the county Emergency Medical Services Agency. The contract pays the coordinator \$60 per hour, up to 25 hours of service each month

"We went on a hunt for a new coordinator and Christy was at the top of the list," Chief Patrick Reitz said when he recommended her appointment to the commission.

Slattery replaces Kent Mc-Curdy, IFPD's first EMS coordinator, appointed in 2013.

The financial consultant was able to provide some financial reports for the commission meeting, including a list of checks written during the first quarter of the new fiscal year and preliminary account totals. A balance sheet was not available for the meeting.

Although commissioners Nancy Layton and Jeannine Charles-Stigall had some questions about these preliminary totals, Reitz was satisfied to have a report for the first quarter and urged the commission "not to get hung up on minutia and look at the bottom line."

According to Rob Dennis' figures, expenses for the first quarter were \$480,000 and revenues totaled about \$400,000. Nearly 85 percent of revenues during the first quarter were derived from ambulance revenue and reimbursements from sending crews to fires throughout the state. Salaries and benefits were about 82 percent of all costs during the first quarter.

The advance of property-tax receipts from Riverside County helps the IFPD's cashflow struggles until the property-tax revenue is distributed in December and January. This year, IFPD requested a \$400,000 advance of tax revenue to help pay expenses until winter.

During the discussion of medical response efforts, which account for the vast majority of IFPD's time, Battalion Chief Mark LaMont pointed out that nearly 60 percent of the medical calls overlap. This means that without two crews available, the department could not respond to both incidents.

LaMont is developing some new reports to help manage the workload.

Layton, as a member of the finance committee, said she and committee Chair Calvin Gogerty were still recruiting two new public members for the committee.

Portion of Gilman Springs Road closing for a month

Gilman Springs Road will close for a month starting Monday, Nov. 7, between the intersection of Highway 79, Sanderson Avenue and Soboba Road, for safety improvements. Work will include wider-paved shoulders, guardrails, drainage improvements and centerline rumble strips. The project is part of Riverside County's ongoing effort to improve driving conditions and safety for vehicles using this critical corridor.

The closure is expected to last 30 days, depending on weather conditions. The road will be reconstructed to eliminate the most severe curve and smooth two other curves between Country Club Drive and Sublet Road. The work will add a traffic signal at the intersection of Gilman Springs and Soboba Road, and also includes edge-line rumble strips.

Preliminary work was scheduled for Monday, Oct. 31, to begin site preparation, tree removal and construction staging.

The board of supervisors awarded a \$1,622,671 construction contract to All American Asphalt of Corona, the low bidder, at its Sept. 13, meeting. The work is the third of five phases designed to make the road safer for residents and other motorists.

"I am pleased that we are moving forward with these improvements," said Patty Romo, the county's director of transportation. "The Gilman Springs Road Safety Improvement Corridor remains one of the county's highest priorities."

Fatality crash at Thomas Mountain

A two-vehicle crash at 10:34 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 29, on Highway 74 at Thomas Mountain Village resulted in one fatality and three injuries, two of them moderate to serious.

According to the CHP report, Risch said he did not see the Fiesta coming when he turned left and the two vehicles collided, causing major damage to the Fies-

Fatal crash near Lake Fulmor

A body was recovered from a car crash near Lake Fulmor on Thursday, Oct. 27. The California Highway Patrol reported discovering the vehicle 50 feet over the side at 4:37 p.m. The vehicle appeared to have hit a tree before coming to rest.

According to CHP Officer Julie Patton, San Gorgonio Pass Station, the vehicle was a 2014 white Nissan Altima registered in Hemet. The cause of the crash appeared to have been the driver making an unsafe turning movement about 1.4 miles north of Hall Decker Road on Highway 243. Patton said the crash, still under investigation, appears to be a single-vehicle, single-occupant incident. The initial report did not indicate if driver impairment was a factor in the crash.

In an update on Tuesday, Nov. 1, CHP Public Information Officer Darren Meyer indicated an investigation was centering on whether the driver, Harlan Brooks, 70, of Hemet, had had a medical emergency that may have led to the vehicle leaving the roadway and plunging over the side.

County Coroner's office Sgt. Brent Seacrest indicated that the vehicle was not sufficiently damaged as to have necessarily caused Brooks' death. Also, although the CHP report had indicated Brooks had been missing since Sunday, Oct. 23, Seacrest's information did not show whether an official missing person report had been filed or if the information subsequently came from the victim's family. Seacrest also stressed that Oct. 27 was when the vehicle and Brooks were found. "The incident was not witnessed so that the crash could have occurred earlier," said Seacrest.

Ruiz and Stone debate before election

Health care and budget major topics

Sunday evening, Oct. 16, candidates for the California Congressional District 36 seat debated in Palm Desert. Rep. Dr. Raul Ruiz, the incumbent, and challenger State Sen. Jeff Stone faced off in a debates sponsored by the Desert Sun and local Palm Springs television station KESO.

Many questions were asked during the debate. The following are highlights of the candidates' responses and comments.

Q. The national debt has sky rocketed how do you get control and would you ever vote for an increase in the debt ceiling?

Stone: No, I made a promise not to vote for debt ceiling increase, nor vote to approve a budget that doesn't have a long term plan to get debt reduced within a 10 year period because [of] bankrupting our children and grandchildren. Incessant spending is a national security issue. It's okay when interest rates are near zero.

Ruiz: Wow. American families are asked to pay their debt and government should pay what they owe. The idea that you would rather shut down the government and default on bills could create a harsh decay in our economy. We need to reduce deficit and reduce taxes.

Stone: That is the difference between us. I'm an entrepreneur and know a business can't spend more money than it takes in. We need to meet our obligation for senior citizens and make sure they get Social Security and Medicare.

Q. Is there one element in the budget that is most under funded?

Stone: Military hardware and infrastructure. We need to be strong and re-invent the military. U.S. can't police the world at expense of American people.

Ruiz: I have voted consistently for the military budget. Where I think we should focus more is expenditures for the veterans so they can see the doctors they need. The other thing is early childhood education, where we'll make a long-term impact.

Q. The Affordable Care Act may hang in the balance. Congressman Ruiz you talked about improving it. How exactly would you do that?

Ruiz: I've said consistently as a player and prior to being in Congress, the ACA is a step in the right direction, but it's imperfect. What we need to do with premiums going up because it's out of control health care costs, we need to reduce health care costs. People are not able to see a physician as soon as they want because we have a physician shortage... I propose we build more medical schools and training program for communities that are underserved.

Stone: Government can't do things better or cheaper than the private sector ... We need to start over with a national health care plan.

Each candidate had the opportunity to ask the other a question.

Ruiz asked Stone, "He states he's for civil unions, but why don't you approve of gay marriage and don't believe in marriage equality for LGBT community?"

Stone: On the floor of the State Senate, I stood up and supported sexual orientation to be a part of our Civil Rights Act of 1964. I did support Proposition 8. But it was basically on definition. The definition of marriage, I believe, is an institution between men and women. I support the same rights; call it marriage without calling it marriage, the same rights for same sex couples to love each other and be together and the same rights as a traditional married couple.

Ruiz: He doesn't give dignity to the LBGT member to marry or form a union in marriage. That's discriminatory."

Stone asked Ruiz, "He voted to give Iran \$150 billion ... what do you say to families of gay, lesbian and transgender people who die from this regime?"

Ruiz: We're going to go after Iran. They are not a friend of the U.S. Iran is not to be trusted. We'll come down harsh on any human rights violator.

Ruiz argued that the biggest threat is Iran getting a nuclear bomb. The President's proposal was the best option to eliminate Iran's capacity to get nuclear bomb in the short term.

Stone replied that the deal would still allow Iran to develop a nuclear bomb in $10\,\mathrm{years}$.

The Nov. 1, 1946, TC, declared it would be published semi-occasionally, and that Betty and Ernest Maxwell's policy "is flexible ..."

Peppered throughout with a few of Ernie's drawings — like a scribbled box with the words "Snow Scene" and nothing else drawn inside — the first issue was more of a newsletter about goings on in town.

But it did talk a bit about the stock market and also noted a prediction that experts were estimating that by 1952, 10 million people would live in Southern California. "Nobody seems to know just where they all will go," wrote the editors.

As of 2010, that number has more than doubled and, if we knew the population of Idyllwild in 1950, I'm sure the number of residents now is more than double.

The Maxwells also urged their readers to vote. "Don't forget that on Tuesday, November 5th, the polls are open for all voters. The Idyllwild Inn is the place to do your ballot stamping.

"Since our government is run by the persons whom we select, let's have a good turnout for the mountain area. If you vote, you have earned your right to participate - if you don't vote, be careful how you object to the way the government operates.'

And so, 70 years later, here we are — still with a stock market, a representative government and a local newspaper reporting on the goings-on in Idyllwild and sometimes larger areas when those affect us.

The possibility that the Town Crier would be outsourced to Beijing was a real threat back in 2013. It was that prospective buyer's method to keep the paper alive. Jack and I believed otherwise.

So, despite social media and a slow down in advertising, we're still here because people look to locals to report on local government, local happenings and local residents.

them in the future.



a two-year interruption in the late 1950s.

What was it like when the Crier first came to town? The inaugural edition had this message to readers from Ernie and Betty: "The TOWN CRIER is published semi-occasionally. Editors [are] Betty and Ernie Maxwell. Our policy is flexible but alert to those ideas and projects which forward the development of this community. We feel that the Mount San Jacinto area is one of the choicest spots in Southern California. We'd like to keep it that way. Maybe we can help by putting out the TOWN CRIER for our friends and neighbors on the mountain."

With that dedication to friends and neighbors, Ernie cartooned and covered Idyllwild as its population grew and it began to shed some of its small-town folksiness. The first edition was homespun, long on charm and definitely not written according to Associated Press style guidelines.

This advisory in the inaugural edition proffers a glimpse

of some of the whimsy that would color future pages: "Reports persist that there is a native maple tree in this area. Also that bears still linger in the San Jacinto Mts. The TOWN CRIER offers a fine bag of pine cones to anyone verifying these reports. Two maple leaves or bear skins will do."

The first edition came, just as this one does, before an election. A short note in the edition previewed Maxwell's commitment to civic responsibility—"If you vote you have earned your right to participate—if you don't vote, be careful how you object to the way the government operates."

From Nov. 1, 1946, until Oct. 11, 1957, the Maxwells were Town Crier owners, publishers and editors.

From Oct. 25, 1957, to Jan. 16, 1959, Mark Clevenger and I.G. Rosen published and edited. They introduced off-set printing, printed (not hand-drawn) headlines, black and white photographs, the Vari-Typer (a word processor of the pre-digital age that formatted pages), and added "Idyllwild" to the paper's name, rechristening it as the "Idyllwild Town Crier."

From Jan. 23, 1959, until Jan. 28, 1972, the Maxwells returned as publisher/editors and resumed hand-drawn headlines, preserving some of the original look and folksiness of the paper's first years.

On Feb. 4, 1972, new owners Luther and Marilyn Weare published their first edition and continued until May 11, 1978. Ernie Maxwell remained as a consultant. From May 18, 1978, until May 4, 1989, L.B. and Dorothy Hunsaker served as publishers/editors.

In May 1989, in a shift from individual and on-Hill ownership, the Chronicle Publishing Company, based in San Francisco, bought the paper. Carole Brennan served as editor/publisher from May 11, 1989, until April 30,

1992. Even though from Boston and a more corporate newspaper background, Brennan quickly adapted to small-town Idyllwild and a management style necessary to accommodate a large staff, most of whom were women with children.

"In order to keep these great women working, I had to accommodate families," she remembered. "At one point, I had a crib in my office for an infant that belonged to one of my staff. We converted our break room to a play room for the many young children of staff."

Brennan recounted an impromptu visit by Chronicle scion Peter Thieriot. "He was shocked by the playroom and said Chronicle HR would object. But by the end of the day, he understood what we needed to do and said to me, 'This will just be our little secret."

Ingrid Wolfe, who was assistant editor under Carole Brennan, remembers the largely female staff in the early 1990s. "We were like a family of sisters left holding the bag and making dinner together," said Wolfe. "We had to learn how to get along in order to get the work done. Carole was the driving force to make it into a real newspaper. She wanted it to be news that mattered. It was exhausting but it was one of the best times in my life."

Brennan was succeeded by Gary Hutner from May 7, 1992, until June 30, 1994.

In July of 1994, in an even bigger geographical shift, Tindle Newspapers, based in Farnham, England, acquired the Crier, commencing nearly 30 years of "across-the-pond" ownership. The Crier was the sole Yankee publication in Tindle's stable of over 220 U.K. newspapers. Gary Hutner continued as editor/publisher from

July 7, 1994 until Aug. 29, 1996.

Becky Clark took over as editor/publisher on Sept. 5, 1996, having been selected as the only local in a wide applicant pool from as far away as Memphis, Tenn., and Honolulu, Hawaii. Clark introduced full color in May 2002. She continued until Nov. 12, 2009.

Clark's association with the paper predates her time as editor and publisher. She started in 1984 as a night type-setter under the Hunsakers. In 1989, she became front-desk manager. When the Chronicle bought the paper, Clark became production manager. In another example of the family nature of the paper, while Clark was production manager, the truck that was delivering the Idyllwild Guide broke down and all staff had to go down the Hill in their cars to pick up the guides. Clark was left with her 5-year-old son Zac and 7-year-old daughter Halie to field calls and front-office callers while Becky worked on the edition.

And, as mentioned, in 1996, under Tindle Newspapers, Clark became editor/publisher.

Grace Reed succeeded Clark as editor/publisher from Nov. 19, 2009, until June 27, 2013.

In a return to local ownership, Becky and Jack Clark purchased the paper from Tindle in June 2013, ending 24 years of off-Hill control, and incorporated as Idyllwild House Publishing Company Ltd. Becky served as editor and publisher from July 4, 2013, until Jan. 8, 2015, and continues in those capacities with husband Jack joining as co-publisher in January 2015.


"We bought the paper to save it," Becky said. "We could not imagine Idyllwild without the Town Crier." Halie, who was answering phones at age 7, is now operations manager, again demonstrating the ongoing thread of family that has infused the paper's growth. Becky's grandkids, Halie and Zac's kids, come to the paper on a daily basis. It's ink in the blood.

Ernie, who continued to come into the paper for years after he no longer owned it, would recognize and be proud of that family thread.

Health care enrollment season began this week

Open enrollment for Covered California began on Nov. 1 and ends on Jan. 31, 2017. Existing Covered California clients were mailed renewal notices during the first week of October.

If an enrollee wants their health coverage to begin Jan.1, 2017, they must choose a plan and enroll by Dec.

Individuals with special qualifying life events can enroll at any time of the year, according to the covered California press release. Medi-Cal enrollment also is yearround. Medi-Cal and Covered California use the same application. After you enter your information, you will find out whether you qualify for Medi-Cal or Covered

Recently, the U.S. Census Bureau reported that the number of uninsured individuals in California has dropped continuously since the Affordable Care Act was implemented in 2014. The percentage of uninsured state residents has fallen from 17.2 percent in 2013 to 8.6 per-

cent in 2015. In California, the uninsured population has declined 50 percent.

Sylvia Mathews Burwell, secretary of the U.S. Health and Human Services, estimated that the average number of enrollees would be about 11.4 million individuals during 2017, about a 9-percent increase from 2016's average monthly enrollment.

This estimate is more optimistic than private-sector estimates, which predict that the reduced number of offerings in many areas and higher premiums will discourage more individuals than previous years.

This year, consumers can visit CoveredCA.com to explore their options for coverage in 2017," Peter V. Lee, executive director of Covered California, said in the release. "Most of those renewing with us get subsidies that mean they are paying only a portion of the premium. But even without considering the subsidy, nearly 80 percent of our consumers will either be able to pay less than they are paying now for health insurance, or see their rates go up by no more than 5 percent if they shop and switch to another plan.'

Almost all consumers (92.6 percent) will have at least three insurers to choose from in their region, and none will have fewer than two. Also, more than 93 percent of hospitals in California will be available through at least one health insurance company in 2017, and 74 percent will be available in three or more plans, according to Covered California's release.

The statewide weighted-average change will be 13.2 percent, up from 4 percent in 2016 and 4.2 percent in 2015. Inland Empire plans will increase an average of 10

percent compared to 1 percent last year.

However, most consumers will see a much smaller increase — or pay less next year — if they switch to another plan. In the Inland Empire, the growth of the lowest-priced bronze and silver plan is about half the statewide average.

This year, Covered California has improved its shopping tool. Current enrollees will be able to compare their current plan benefits and 2017 premiums side-byside with other plans for 2017.

Also, the new Shop-and-Compare tool's new-offers feature includes displaying health and dental plans separately, showing up to 12 product options on a page instead of three and offering more ways to filter plan choices for the consumer.

Covered California recommends that members who want to evaluate their plan and options visit Covered-CA.com and sign into their account. Consumers who take no action by Dec. 15, will be automatically renewed into their existing plan. Consumers can also contact their Certified Insurance Agent or Certified Enrollment Counselor, or call Covered California at 800-300-1506

for enrollment or renewal assistance, according to the release.

Charges for Pinyon murders stand against Pape and Smith

After nearly four days of preliminary hearings, Judge Bernard Schwartz of the Riverside County Superior Court, ruled that he found sufficient evidence to try Robert Lars Pape, 29, and Cristin Conrad Smith, 29, for the 2006 murders of Jon Hayward, Vicki Friedli and Vicki's daughter Becky.

An information arraignment has been scheduled for both defendants for Nov. 15, A trial could begin sometime within four months to a year, according to John Hall, the district attorney's public information officer.

During the preliminary hearing that began Oct. 24 and convened over four days until Monday, Oct. 31, Schwartz heard many witnesses and the DA's office offered many pieces of evidence, several never before presented in court. The DA's office only presented a portion of the evidence in this case at the preliminary hearing, according to a press release late Monday.

The murders occurred on Sept. 17, 2006, in Pinyon Pines. Becky's body was found burning in a wheelbarrow outside the house. The other bodies were found inside the burning home. An affidavit from the DA's office stated that Hayward died from a 12-gauge shotgun wound to the chest. Vicki's death was caused from a wound to the head, possibly from a Glock handgun. Pape was Becky's former boyfriend.

In March 2014, both Pape and Smith were arrested and charged with the murders. Family members of the victims were elated that action had finally occurred after more than seven years. Seven months later in September 2014, the DA's office dismissed the charges and both

men were released.

Then, in June 2016, the DA announced that both had been arrested again and charged with murders. Three counts of murder, with a special circumstance allegation of committing multiple murders, were filed. This action came after an extensive review of the case and new evidence, including testimony from a confidential informant.

After the arrests, District Attorney Michael Hestrin stated, "The lengthy investigation led to the finding of new evidence, some of which was not known at the time of the first investigation, as well as evidence that has now been processed using technological advances unavailable previously."

Some of the new evidence included retesting of DNA found at the scene, which matches Smith's, and better forensic analysis of cell-tower data places Smith and Pape closer to Pinyon Pines about when the murders where committed.

Confidential informant Jeremy Witt, who worked with Smith at Soak City Wave Pool in 2007, testified last week. He said Smith admitted to being involved in an arson when he said, "Something went wrong and we torched the whole f...ing place ..."

Schwartz also denied Smith's motion to dismiss the charges against him because they have already been dismissed twice.



More rain falls on Hill

Ahead of average, but still in drought

The Hill received more rain early last week and some this The Sunday. tal rainfall recorded at the U.S. Forest Service's Keenwild Guard Station was slightly more than three-quarters of an inch. In Pine Cove, nearly an inch of rain was recorded.

At Keenwild, the total rainfall since July 1 has been almost 2.9 inches whereas Pine Cove has recorded 3.74inches of rain.



After nearly an inch of rain on Oct. 23 and 24, Strawberry Creek was flowing very strongly.

On the Hill, the long-term historic average rainfall from July 1 through Oct. 31 has been 3.4 inches. While Keenwild's recorded total is below that average, Pine Cove, in the fifth year of the drought, has received about 10 percent more than the historic average.

This early in the rain year, it is too soon to predict the expected yearly rainfall. In 2015, by early October, both Keenwild and Pine Cove had received more than 5.25 inches of rain. By the end of June, the annual to-

tals were 21.25 inches in Keenwild and 25.16 inches in Pine Cove. The yearly average of Hill rain has been 25.67 inches.

The last year Keenwild exceeded the average annual rain was 2011, when 29.4 inches fell. That also is the only year in the past decade that rainfall exceeded the historic average. In the past 10 years, the average annual rainfall has been 19.8 inches at Keenwild.

Post 800 observes Veterans Day

At the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month of the year, the United States observes Veterans Day.

As it does each year, Idyllwild's American Legion Post 800 commemorates the day the "Great War," World War 1, ended at 11 a.m. Nov. 11, 1918.

The Legion officers and Honor Guard conduct a moving ceremony to honor all American war dead.

Post Commander Danny Richardson said there will be a speaker and a ceremonial folding of the flag by the Post Honor Guard, with each fold remembering a conflict in which U.S. service men and women gave their lives. A complimentary lunch follows and the entire community is welcome to attend.

Originally called Armistice Day, or Remembrance Day in other countries that fought in the war, the observance marks the formal end of hostilities of "The War to End All Wars." After the signing of an armistice by representatives of the Central Powers and the Western Allies in a rail car on a siding in Compiègne, France, soldiers throughout the war theater put down their weapons at the appointed time of 11 a.m.

In November 1919, U.S. President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed Nov. 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day. In 1938, an act of Congress made Nov. 11 each year a legal holiday. And in 1954, following WW II and the Korean conflict, Congress renamed the commemorative holiday Veterans Day to pay tribute to American war dead and to honor all who serve or have served their country as part of the U.S. military.

On Friday, Nov. 11, all federal and state government offices, including the post office, will be closed, as are banks, schools and county offices.

The American Legion Post 800 is located at 54360 Marian View Drive in Idyllwild. The event is free.

Early voting available at registrar's office

Riverside County Registrar of Voters Rebecca Spencer has announced that early voting for the Nov. 8 consolidated general election will be available leading up to election day from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. through this Friday, Nov. 4, and Monday, Nov. 7, at the Registrar of Voters office. Voting there also is available from

9 a.m. to 4 p.m., Saturday, Nov. 5, and on election day, Tuesday, Nov. 8, from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. The office is located at 2724 Gateway Drive in Riverside.

Registered voters may attend any of the early voting sites to either drop off a vote-by-mail ballot or vote on an accessible voting unit.

Early voting provides ac-

cess to voters who are unable to make it to the polls on election day and to those who would like their vote to be counted first on election night. Voters are encouraged to cast their ballots as soon as possible so they can be included in the first election night results, which are posted shortly after 8 p.m. on Nov. 8.

California law allows time off to vote on election day

To ensure all voters can vote on election day, Tuesday, Nov. 8, California law provides employees up to two hours off to vote if they do not have enough time to do so during non-work hours.

"Every citizen should have the ability to exercise their right to vote," Secretary of State Alex Padilla said in the press release. "In California, a voter cannot be denied their fundamental right to the bal-

lot box. Working Californians can take time off to vote without a loss of pay."

California Elections Code section 14000 allows workers up to two hours off, without a loss of pay, to vote if they do not have enough time to do so in their non-work hours. The law requires workers to give their employers two working days' notice before the election if they will need to take time off to vote.

Polling places will be open between 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. on election day

Every California employer is required to post, in a visible location, a notice informing employees of their rights at least 10 days before an election. The Secretary of State's office offers these free, print-ready notices in 10 languages at www.sos.ca.gov/elections/time-vote-notices/.



Family, friends honor Esperanza firefighters on 10th anniversary

It was a reunion of people from all over Southern California — parents, grandparents, children, sisters, brothers, nieces, nephews, girlfriends and widows. Yes, widows. And friends and co-workers. And TV crews.

In an unlikely place for one — a barren area that requires driving a long, rutted, rocky and unpaved road — this family reunion marked the 10th anniversary of the tragic deaths of five U.S. Forest Service firefighters on Oct. 26, 2006.

Each year on that day, families, friends and co-workers migrate toward that site, a property — an octagonal house with a garage on well-abated land. This is property the men were defending against the Esperanza Fire, the site of the burn-over that cost the firefighters their lives.

The annual gathering is held to pause at noon for a moment of silence. Afterward, they eat lunch and enjoy one another's company, as if it were a family reunion.

As former Cal Fire Public Information Officer Julie Hutchinson said, "We kind of all are family. When you go through these tough times together, we become family." She was one of those involved in answering media questions after the tragedy.

Capt. Mark Loutzenhiser and four of his Engine 57 crew members, stationed out of the Alandale Guard Station just a

few miles north of Pine Cove, lost their lives in the fire ignited by Raymond Lee Oyler, now serving on death row for the arson.

Then-Division Chief Norm Walker said, "As soon as it happened, I came up here Code 3 [hot response]." He arrived at the scene just 20 or 30 minutes after the burn-over. Despite the long and rugged drive, he doesn't remember it.

He said Loutzenhiser was still alive and being transported by air rescue to an area hospital. Pablo Cerda also was still alive and being transported by air rescue when he arrived. Daniel Hoover Najera's body was found down on a slope below the garage. Jess "Gus" McLean's body was found near the burned-out fire engine.

"We had to search for Jason McKay. We couldn't find him," Walker said. He was between a Volkswagen Beetle and an old tractor. "He was fairly unrecognizable."

He said they had to make some decisions about securing the site. And he called the San Bernardino National Forest dispatcher. "I told them the U.S. Forest Service would not be involved in the fire anymore." Cal Fire took over, and all Forest Service crews were taken off the fire and sent to the Vista Grande Guard Station.

"They were allowed one phone call," Walker said. They were allowed to tell what happened but not to whom. Then administrators spent two to three hours trying to get to the families before the media got wind of the tragedy. They succeeded.

Loutzenhiser died later that day. Cerda died five days later on Oct. 31.

The people at the 10th anniversary were jovial, hugging and posing for group photos. A few minutes before noon, they became more solemn and quiet. Battalion Chief Chris Fogle, with his right arm in a sling, asked the group to gather in a circle in front of a large monument built at the bottom of the site. Maria, Loutzenhiser's widow, asked everyone to hold hands.

Several Forest Service personnel in uniform readied their radios. Right at noon, dispatch made the announcement of the 10th anniversary of the five fire-

fighters' greatest sacrifice. People bowed their heads for several moments of silence, some wiping away tears. (At 7:57 a.m., the time of the burn-over, Riverside County's Perris Emergency Command Center also made an announcement.)

Fogle then came forward, gave a prayer and invited everyone up to the house, now a converted warehouse since the burnover, where they could enjoy a barbecue and look out over the rugged terrain from high on a hill.

Friends and family of Hoover Najera took their plates of barbecue down to the spot where he died.

McLean's mother, Ceil McLean, said she gets by

with the help of her family and friends. "Every year gets a little easier," she said.

Josh Whitney, a former U.S. Forest Service fire-fighter, said he tries to come to the reunion every year. "Mark and Jesse worked for me and Doug [Henninger] when we were partners ... maybe 30 years ago."

Seth Loutzenhiser said he and his twin, Kyle, don't remember much about their father. The 18-year-olds recently graduated from high school. They were 8 at the time and the youngest of Mark's children. "He taught us how to ride a bike and my brother hit the fence," Seth remembered.

Denise Koeller, spouse of property owner Greg Koeller, said when she learned of the death of the firefighters, she became physically ill. They were at their primary residence off the Hill when they heard. She

said she didn't care that their house and things were lost.

Her husband allows fire management to train fire-fighters on the property now. Every time the Forest Service pays him, he reinvests the money into something dedicated to the Engine 57 crew. He recently added a display along the road outside his property for co-workers and family members to post their memories

"This was a life-changing event for all of us," said Hutchinson. "It was a reality check for all of us. This could have been any of us." She said firefighters are trained and believe the training protects them. They never think about this happening to them. "There are things that are outside of our control."

FACT: All of the companies that insure properties on the Hill that were contacted did not recognize this rating and were not willing to offer such discounts. Good luck trying to find these savings.

Idyllwild Fire claim: "In 2011....firefighters agreed to take a 9% pay cut to keep the District solvent....They have not seen any pay increase....in these past five years."*

FACT: While it is true that some members of the Idyllwild Fire Department took this pay cut, they conveniently forget to mention that all staff received annual cost of living raises of up to 5% per year in the last five years.

Idyllwild Fire claim: "The Measure also has a built-in 'escalator'.....at 3% a year."*

FACT: With this 3% "cost of living adjustment," an amount which compounds year-on-year, the parcel tax will total nearly \$170 in 10 years time, and over \$200 in 16 years.

Idyllwild Fire claim: "Measure W asks the voters to approve an increase...bringing the total to \$130 per parcel per year."*


Max and Bee Krone were featured in "The Instructor," a teacher's magazine. A section of their song arrangements appeared in several issues.

Town Hall lease looks promising

The County Service Area Advisory Committee conducted business at its monthly meeting on Thursday,

Key agenda items included review of the public survey regarding the future of Town Hall and what agency would manage CSA 36 recreation starting in 2017.

Mike Franklin, CSA project manager for the county's Economic Development Agency, facilitated the meeting. Discussion again centered on what role Town Hall would play in CSA 36 recreation in the coming year. Franklin and Opal Hellweg, 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington's legislative assistant, noted that Washington would be meeting on Monday, Oct. 31, with Town Hall owner Jay Johnson to determine if a mutually acceptable rental agreement could be reached for the coming year. In a telephone conversation Tuesday morning, Nov. 1, Johnson said a two-year lease looks very promising. Franklin clarified on Tuesday morning that Washington directed Vince Yzaguirre at the county's real estate division to contact Johnson to negotiate details of a possible lease.

Town Hall currently serves as the local headquarters for CSA 36 recreation, although CSA recreational activities are conducted at other sites, including Idyllwild School's top field. If Johnson and the county are unable to agree on a lease for the coming year, the county would be obliged to find alternate recreation sites if and until new recreation facilities at the Idyllwild Community Center could be available for CSA 36 use.

Franklin announced that the county is issuing a Request for Proposal to find a new contractor to provide recreation management for CSA 36. Currently, Riverside Counnext meeting at 5:30 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 17.

ty Regional Park and Open Space District is providing that service but that will terminate as soon as a new contractor is selected. Although it is assumed that ICC (San Jacinto Mountain Community Center) will submit a bid and that they had been previously invited by the county to do so, it is not a foregone conclusion that the organization will be selected, according to Franklin and Hellweg.

"Once the RFP is issued, it will be a month-long process for interested providers to submit bids," said Hellweg. Franklin stated the RFP announcement and responses will be public documents and that a panel from the county's real property department will evaluate the responses, and that the county will make the decision and designate the next CSA 36 recreation provider. In the meantime, the future status of both Town Hall as a CSA recreational facility and of management of the CSA 36 recreational program remains uncertain.

The Town Hall public survey yielded 150 responses, according to advisory committee member Kathy Wilson, all but four of which expressed support for keeping Town Hall as a community facility, with preference to have it become a performing arts center. Wilson noted that a year lease would be absolutely necessary to provide the community ample time to explore options for purchasing Town Hall.

A motion was made and approved by the advisory committee to advise Washington of the committee's support for securing a year lease from the Johnson family for the rental of Town Hall.

A review of the CSA revenue and expense fund showed beginning of fiscal year cash balance of \$231,106.14. Franklin indicated the budget report would be updated by next meeting.

On an approved motion, the committee scheduled the

voters pass Proposition W, the chief said.

Asked whether parcel owners within IFPD, in addition to their parcel fee, were paying that county fire tax like everyone else, the chief said they were not. He said parcel owners within IFPD do not pay the county tax for fire services that is hidden within the property tax bills of property owners outside IFPD.

But it turns out there's a lot more to it than that. And this should be of interest to renters, as well as to property owners because, of course, landlords pass on their property taxes to their renters in their rent charges.

The Town Crier has examined records from the Riverside County auditor-controller's office, records that are available to the public online.

Yes, Hill property owners outside IFPD do have a portion of their property tax payment — about 6 percent of it (averaging tax-rate areas outside IFPD) — distributed by the county to "County Structure Fire Protection." And no property owners inside IFPD have any of their property-tax payment going to that purpose.

But the chief did not mention that property owners inside IFPD have a portion of their property tax payment — about 13.7 percent of it (averaging all 20 tax-rate areas inside IFPD) — distributed by the county to "Idyllwild Fire Protection." And property owners outside IFPD have none of their property tax payment going to that purpose.

IFPD currently gets about \$1.2 million per year from the property taxes paid by property owners within the IFPD.

But the larger and even simpler fact is this:

By California law, everybody pays 1 percent of their assessed property value to the county in property taxes, wherever you live. Regardless of how the tax money is distributed by the county, we all pay that same 1 percent. So, you're going to pay 1 percent of your assessed property value in property tax, no matter where you live and no matter how that 1 percent gets distributed by the county.

The difference is this: For property owners outside IFPD — including Pine Cove, Mountain Center and Zone 3 — their basic fire protection and emergency services are included within their 1-percent property tax. But not for property owners inside IFPD. Property owners inside IFPD pay their 1-percent property tax plus an additional tax for their basic fire protection and emergency services — \$65 per year as a parcel-fee tax, which will double to \$130 per year if Measure W passes next week. (Vacant lot owners would see their IFPD parcel-fee tax quadrupled from \$32.50 to \$130.)

The simple bottom line: 1 percent plus IFPD's parcel fee is more than 1 percent.

Of course, wherever you live, you still pay additionally for ambulance transport to a local hospital — probably around \$3,000, depending upon the distance to the hospital to which you are taken. A portion of that may be covered by insurance, if you have it.

But for basic fire protection and emergency services, those with property in IFPD pay the parcel-fee tax in addition to the 1-percent property tax that every Hill property owner pays.

Attention Idyllwild Water District voters

The Town Crier will sponsor a candidate forum for possible Idyllwild Water District directors from 6 to 8 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 10, at Town Hall.

With two vacancies on the water board and no general manager, IWD is limping. Current Acting President John Cook wishes to hold two elections, a special one in March and the regular election in August, each with a cost of \$4,000 to \$7,000. Another option available is the Riverside County Board of Supervisors can intervene after 60 days and appoint directors who will fill the terms until the August election.

Either way, the community should know the thinking of possible candidates. All individuals who have indicated their intent to be a candidate to either the IWD office or Supervisor Chuck Washington's office will be invited to speak.

Fire department selects new EMS coordinator

In addition to routine fiscal matters, the Idyllwild Fire Protection District commission appointed Christy Slattery as its new Emergency Medical Services coordinator at last week's meeting.

The coordinator provides clinical oversight, training and representation of the department with the county Emergency Medical Services Agency. The contract pays the coordinator \$60 per hour, up to 25 hours of service each

"We went on a hunt for a new coordinator and Christy was at the top of the list," Chief Patrick Reitz said when he recommended her appointment to the commission.

Slattery replaces Kent McCurdy, IFPD's first EMS coordinator, appointed in 2013.

The financial consultant was able to provide some financial reports for the commission meeting, including a list of checks written during the first quarter of the new fiscal year and preliminary account totals. A balance sheet was not available for the meeting.

Although commissioners Nancy Layton and Jeannine Charles-Stigall had some questions about these preliminary totals, Reitz was satisfied to have a report for the first quarter and urged the commission "not to get hung up on minutia and look at the bottom line."

According to Rob Dennis' figures, expenses for the first quarter were \$480,000 and revenues totaled about \$400,000. Nearly 85 percent of revenues during the first quarter were derived from ambulance revenue and reimbursements from sending crews to fires throughout the state. Salaries and benefits were about 82 percent of all costs during the first quarter.

The advance of property-tax receipts from Riverside County helps the IFPD's cashflow struggles until the property-tax revenue is distributed in December and January. This year, IFPD requested a \$400,000 advance of tax revenue to help pay expenses until winter.

During the discussion of medical response efforts, which account for the vast majority of IFPD's time, Battalion Chief Mark LaMont pointed out that nearly 60 percent of the medical calls overlap. This means that without two crews available, the department could not respond to both incidents.

LaMont is developing some new reports to help manage the workload.

Layton, as a member of the finance committee, said she and committee Chair Calvin Gogerty were still recruiting two new public members for the committee.

Portion of Gilman Springs Road closing for a month

Gilman Springs Road will close for a month starting Monday, Nov. 7, between the intersection of Highway 79, Sanderson Avenue and Soboba Road, for safety improvements. Work will include wider-paved shoulders, guardrails, drainage improvements and centerline rumble strips. The project is part of Riverside County's ongoing effort to improve driving conditions and safety for vehicles using this critical corridor.

The closure is expected to last 30 days, depending on weather conditions. The road will be reconstructed to eliminate the most severe curve and smooth two other curves between Country Club Drive and Sublet Road. The work will add a traffic signal at the intersection of Gilman Springs and Soboba Road, and also includes edge-line rumble strips.

Preliminary work was scheduled for Monday, Oct. 31, to begin site preparation, tree removal and construction staging.

The board of supervisors awarded a \$1,622,671 construction contract to All American Asphalt of Corona, the low bidder, at its Sept. 13, meeting. The work is the third of five phases designed to make the road safer for residents and other motorists.
