County fire faces
significant budget
increases

Executive wants agency to
absorb new costs

Another local fire department is encountering a lack of sufficient revenue to fund its full costs and now faces the undesirable option of trimming its workforce.

"This calls for a discussion by the board of fire resources and how we provide fire service. These costs simply need to be absorbed," said Riverside County Executive Officer Jay Orr at the Tuesday, Feb. 28 Board of Supervisors meeting.

The Riverside County Fire Department will face a combined \$14.4-million deficit over the next 18 months. Cal Fire Association 2881 negotiated a new contract in December. The four-year proposal authorizes raises for from firefighters to battalion chiefs in the range of 11 to 18 percent.

For the Cal Fire administration, the new contract addresses two concerns — salary compaction and turnover. Entry-level firefighters earn the minimum wage, now \$10.50 per hour, on the way to \$15. Also, vacancy rates for firefighters have ranged from 23 to 40 percent in recent years.

Fire Chief John Hawkins, at the request of Orr, presented some options to mitigate the new costs for the county at the March 7 meeting.

Before offering his recommendations, Hawkins wrote in his report to the board, "Staffing is expensive but what the public really pays for is firefighter availability for immediate emergency response." His message is that fires are unpredictable. Therefore, to have fire protection available 24/7 requires paying the cost for that insurance.

Hawkins' recommendations are projected to save the

Idyllwild Property Owners Association now inactive

No propane discounts

The Idyllwild Property Owners association is currently inactive and will cease to exist after March 15 unless someone steps forward to manage it.

In 2006, Trish Seaward took over the reins of IPOA so that members could get propane discounts from local propane suppliers. At that time, with propane prices high, suppliers were giving per-gallon discounts to member associations. "I volunteered so people could get a break on their

propane," said Seaward.

Members did receive propane discounts from most suppliers. Seaward gave local suppliers annual lists of IPOA dues-paying members. IPOA dues were \$15, and with significant discounts per gallon, the \$15 annual fee was a bargain. Said 10-year IPOA member Mike Brooks, "With the discount per gallon and the small membership fee, the discount was worth it."

But with propane prices at historically low levels for the last several years, and with increased price competition among local suppliers driving prices down, member-association discounts became fewer, and from the suppliers' standpoint, unnecessary.

According to Nancy Borchers of the Pine Cove Property Owners Association, when propane prices were higher, pushing \$4 per gallon with some suppliers, PCPOA membership (at \$10 per year) resulted in discounts of up to \$2 a gallon, making association membership a great bargain. "But at this point, I don't think there are discounts for association members," she said.

Seaward said unless someone steps up to take over IPOA responsibility by March 15, the last remaining dollars in the association account will be donated to the Idyllwild Community Center. "Right now, the money is in a CD in the bank with the Community Center as the beneficiary," said

Seaward.

Seaward said all association-membership funds, since she took over in 2006, have been donated. "Funds went to local nonprofits, people with emergencies such as a house fires and other people who have just fallen through the cracks." Seaward said the only record or receipts from individuals or groups who received IPOA donations are occasional thank-you notes.

Seaward estimated that IPOA membership rolls varied from highs of 600 to more recent levels of 300.

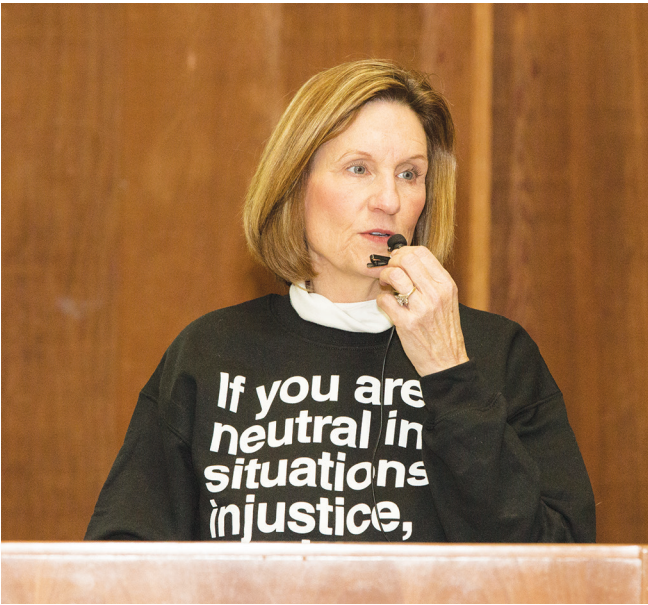

Sunshine Week is March 12 to 18 this year. The American Society of Newspaper Editors started it in 2005. It even has its own website at sunshineweek.rcfp.org.

Across the nation, organizations participating in Sunshine Week hold panel discussions, workshops, etc. relating to freedom of information, government transparency and civic engagement.

In this age of false news, alternative facts and the threat to the 1st Amendment, this week is particularly critical to our Democracy.

We have a group in town, Idyllwild Indivisibles, practicing their full Democratic rights by meeting in the open and allowing those opposed to their concerns to attend, too. I haven't seen this much activism in our community in a long time.

I don't attend the meetings because we have a standing engagement every Monday evening, but we have a reporter there. Next week's paper will have JP's story of this past Monday evening's meeting.

The past two weeks' letters to the editor absolutely reflect the happenings in the rest of the country following November's election — lines drawn in the sand. Public discourse. Perfectly and fundamentally important to a Democracy.

Please read the front page editorial by Brian Hunhoff in this week's paper, too. I've published one of his editorials before. He is a great champion of 1st Amendment issues and freely offers his columns to newspapers worldwide. He papers his walls with the pages from newspapers that run his columns.

"Finally, it is also an important right in a free society to be freely allowed to contribute to society's well-being," wrote Peter Forsskål in 1759 in a pamphlet called "Thoughts on Civil Liberty."

"However, if that is to occur, it must be possible for society's state of affairs to become known to everyone, and it must be possible for everyone to speak his mind freely about it. Where this is lacking, liberty is not worth its name. Matters of war and some foreign negotiations need to be concealed for some time and not become known by many, but not on account of proper citizens however, but because of the enemies.

"Much less should peacetime matters and that which concerns domestic wellbeing be withheld from inhabitants' eyes. Otherwise, it might easily happen that only foreigners who wish harm find out all secrets through envoys and money, but the people of the country itself, who ideally would give useful advice, are ignorant of most things.

"On the other hand, when the whole country is known, at least the observant do see what benefits or harms, and disclose it to everybody, where there is freedom of the written word. Only then, can public deliberations be steered by truth and love for the fatherland, on whose commonweal each and everyone depends."

"Secrecy, being an instrument of conspiracy, ought never to be the system of regular government," wrote Jeremy Bentham, "On Publicity" from "The Works of Jeremy Bentham" in 1839.

Drop & Shop reuse stores open

The Riverside County Department of Waste Resources will make good, reusable household products available for free to residents and businesses through the new Drop & Shop stores at the Lamb Canyon Landfill in Beaumont and Badlands Landfill in Moreno Valley.

Many products collected through the Household Hazardous Waste Collection program are in good or unused condition and can be reused instead of processed for disposal. The Drop & Shop program is open from 6 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturdays at both landfills.

Shoppers may take home used household, yard- and car-care products for free. Availability varies but may include: paint, cleaners, pool-, spa-, lawn-care and automotive products.

Residents also may drop off common wastes like antifreeze, batteries, paint and used motor oil, and shop for free products at the same location. The program is funded by a grant from the Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery.

Stone seeking nominations

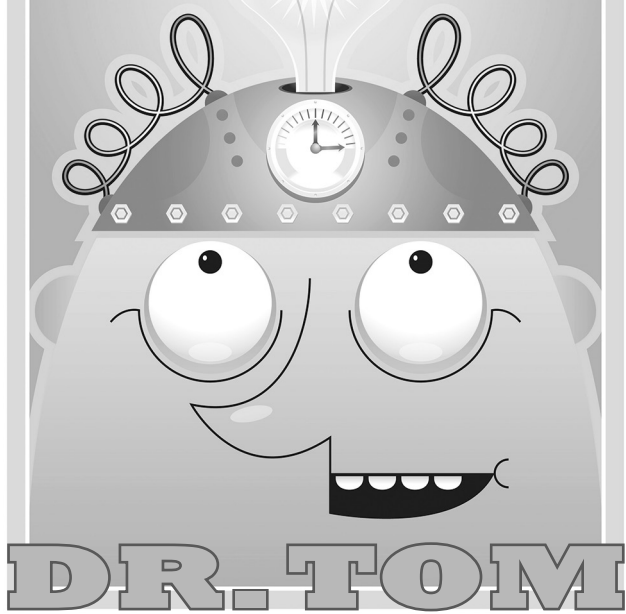

Stirring it up ...

The results continue to pour in, with no fewer than three people telling me so far that they liked my column in last week’s Town Crier.

My wife, Kathy, and I did leave town shortly after the paper hit the streets, undoubtedly missing many other accolades, and I am certain the people with torches and pitchforks who followed us out were paid protesters.

I also am pretty sure that we now all have the same question on our minds: Why on earth am I writing another column? Here’s why.

Like many of you, I am concerned about the problems facing our country. Although I am old enough to become an official curmudgeon if I dwelled on that fact, I hope not to just spout off but rather offer a framework for rational, civil discourse that is so lacking in our country now. Indeed, this may be the single biggest problem we face.

We seem to be incapable of merely disagreeing with someone — instead, they are “full of baloney” (one of many euphemisms to come, hereafter abbreviated “FN!” since this is a family newspaper).

Whenever I write anything, I will, therefore, make every effort to stick to the facts as a basis for further discussion, presenting them in a civil manner. When you respond, which I hope you will, please do the same.

Which brings up another problem: a general lack of scientific literacy. Science is not magic or mystical, just the only method of inquiry proven to yield reliable results. Nobody wants a dull column about statistics and such, but addressing some issues related to data, evidence and logical fallacies will, I hope, spark some interest.

Finally, on my short list of broad topics worth considering, is health care. Misinformation abounds and if I can’t set everything straight then I aspire to at least stir the pot enough to get you thinking and asking questions.

In fact, that is my overall goal for all columns. I intend to present controversial topics and hope that you will react by doing your own research and responding to me with evidence rather than “you are a jerk” (FN!)

Having lived permanently in Idyllwild for a little over a year, I wonder why it took me 67 years to get here. What a great place, full of wonderful people, unsurpassed scenery, fantastic restaurants, unbelievable artists and musicians (many of whom are still in high school) and a community treasure: the Idyllwild Town Crier.

I am proud to contribute photographs and, now, this column that I hope will somehow, in some small way, enhance discourse among our citizens.

So, to whet your appetite for next week, here is a question: Should everyone in the United States be entitled to health care?

Mental health urgent care center

A mental health urgent care center opened its doors in October to provide around-the-clock assessment, psychiatric support, medication management and customized services to adults voluntarily seeking assistance in crisis situations.

Desert Crisis Walk-In Center is located in a remodeled storefront at 2500 North Palm Canyon Drive, Suite A4, Palm Springs. The center will remain open 24 hours a day throughout the year. RI International, a private provider of behavioral health programs, is operating the center under a contract with Riverside University Health System.

Guests also may be referred to the walk-in center by mobile crisis teams or law enforcement. All visits and stays are voluntary. Length of stays cannot exceed 23 hours.

During that time, guests will participate in the development of individualized care plans that include recovery education, peer-to-peer support, mental health services, nutritional counseling, coordination and referral to community-based services.

Steve Steinberg, the director of RUHS Behavioral Health, said the center will help relieve pressure on local emergency departments that get overwhelmed by individuals brought in by law enforcement on involuntary psychiatric admissions known as a 5150.

Cooper rejects offer for special consideration

Hearing set for middle of month

Three weeks after his attorney's request of the court, defendant Neil Cooper, 41, of Idyllwild declined to have his case transferred to the mental health court.

At the Feb. 28 hearing, Judge Kelly L. Hansen returned Cooper's case to the referring court and scheduled a felony settlement conference for March 15.

Cooper was arrested on Jan. 6, and subsequently charged with burglary and criminal threats, both felonies. He was arrested in Murrieta.

He has pleaded not guilty to all the charges, including a misdemeanor for battery on spouse or person with whom the defendant is living, and has been released on bail.

The recommendation was "... the defendant be admonished and reminded of the importance to adhere to the orders of the court."

Judge Mark Mandio issued a bench warrant for McKinney and set bail at \$60,000.

Two traffic crashes on Hill roads over last week

Meyer's report noted that Solorio, for unexplained reasons, crossed the double-yellow line into the opposing lane of traffic and sideswiped Hallen's vehicle, causing major damage to both vehicles.

Both Solorio and Hallen complained of injuries, but Solorio did not request transport. Hallen did, complaining of neck and back pain, and was transported to Hemet Valley Medical Center.

Two copters rescue nine hikers

At 11:44 a.m. Saturday, March 4, 2017, Riverside County Sheriff's Department Cabazon Station deputies responded to the Palm Springs Tram regarding nine hikers stranded in the Mt. San Jacinto Wilderness area.

Sgt. Joel D. Wilson identified the nine hikers as Tat-evik Shilgeworkyan, 29, and Justin Sowell, 38, of Phoenix, Arizona; Evan Kantor, 37, of Winnetka; Michael Meyers, 37, of Desert Hot Springs; Chad Wing, 38, Ryan Clancy, 35, Lukas Kayyem, 38, and Craig Liguori, 39, of Scottsdale, Arizona; and Bryan Dougherty, 36, of San Diego.

They called California State Parks reporting they reached the top of the peak but were unable to descend the mountain due to the inclement weather and terrain.

The Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit, California State Parks, Sheriff's Emergency Response Team, Riverside County Sheriff's Aviation Unit and California

Highway Patrol Aviation Unit were summoned to assist. Due to the treacherous terrain where the hikers were located, both Riverside County Sheriff's Aviation Unit, along with CHP's Aviation Unit, were used to hoist the hikers off the mountain to safety. The hikers did not suffer any injuries and did not require medical attention.

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department would like to remind hiking enthusiasts to carry proper equipment for any outdoor excursion. Proper preparation includes a well-thought-out travel plan shared with friends and family, as well as familiarity with common hiking equipment, such as GPS, maps and compasses. can expose a canyon between a politician's words and actions.

Some local boards develop a bad habit of gathering as quorums outside their chambers. City commissioners in my town headed for a main street saloon after adjourning. Those sessions lasted longer than their actual meetings.

Our county board had a similar routine. On meeting day, commissioners took a lunch break together. It would be naïve to believe county business did not come up at the café, or city business was not rehearsed in the downtown bar.

Local officials are often criticized when caught breaking laws against secret meetings. Meanwhile, elected officials at the state level roam free to do the same thing.

In bright red South Dakota, Republicans make up 85 percent of the State Legislature. GOP lawmakers meet privately in committee quorums, scripting a "kill or pass" strategy for bills before public testimony is even heard. Legal? Yes. Right? No.

Consider the citizens who drive across the state to testify at those committee hearings. Their time and words are wasted when votes are mere "rubber stamps" of pre-negotiated deals. It is a less than transparent system.

After the committee "hearings," South Dakota's Republican legislators hold large closed caucus meetings before the after-

noon floor session is gavelled to order. As with the earlier pre-meeting meetings, these top-secret gatherings amount to giant executive sessions on the state level because the super-majority caucus has a clear quorum.

Some say it's harmless for a quorum of Republicans lawmakers to caucus secretly. We say it's a case of too many elephants in the room.

The closed caucus is a place to get those elephants in a row away from public view. It's a place where decisions are made about teacher pay and taxing food and Medicaid expansion. It's a place where Democrats and Independents are excluded from meaningful dialogue about issues important to people of all political labels. It's a place where citizens cannot monitor public policy debates and those who seek to influence them.

Shouldn't people buying the sausage get to see it made? They have a right to watch the Legislature's machinery grinding in all its rust and dust and glory. Let them observe the logic, reasoning, horse-trading and arm-twisting that propels all those ayes and nays on the House and Senate floors. Open caucus doors to media and the public!

Those who say private meetings are more productive and efficient do not give citizens enough credit. Officials should have faith that people smart enough to elect them are also wise enough to judge their deliberations.

Meanwhile, legislators

pass state laws requiring local boards to conduct the public's business in public. Hypocrisy anyone?

Wheels of change turn slowly in local government, but some progress has been made. More city and county officials strive to follow open meeting rules. Commissioners in our town no longer meet after meetings for cold beer or hot beef sandwiches. Slow open government beats no open government.

Meetings at the state-house level are a different story. The addiction to secrecy grows stronger as a majority grows larger. The party in power assumes election success is a license for top-secret business as usual.

Democrats are just as prone to secrecy. One party rule — by either party — is not conducive to open government. It eliminates checks and balances. Genuine transparency is poisoned.

In most states, there are no laws against a state-house majority's secret meetings. But there could be and should be. State lawmakers tell local officials, "Do as we say, not as we do." They should be saying, "Do as we say and we will, too."

Because democracy dies behind closed doors.

county nearly \$12.2 million. A total of 42 positions would be eliminated, including 12 to shift a three-person unit to a two-person medic unit.

These units will have about 250 gallons of water, a small pump and paramedic equipment. They will be capable of providing paramedic service and light, first-in, fire suppression.

Hawkins stressed this was not an optimal response. "The alternate station staffing model of a medic patrol will be a reduction of service in the areas where it will be deployed and to the system overall," he wrote.

The areas where this type of unit may be employed are rural or outlying areas, such as the Hill, Hawkins said. "But a type one engine has to be close or nearby."

Station 63 in Poppet Flats would be closed, saving \$1.8 million and reducing eight positions.

Some of the other major reductions include the elimination of the Hazardous Material Response team, and staffing ad-

justments at Station 41, North Shore.

Any staff reductions will require a 120-day notice, according to the Executive's Office.

"We are trying to fill the budget hole as much as we can internally," Hawkins said in an interview. "It's a challenge."

Also, to the staffing changes and reductions, Hawkins recommended that the county implement a program to recover its costs for emergency medical responses. He estimated that could generate another \$3.6 million in revenues.

In his report, Hawkins included the documentation from 2012 when the supervisors adopted the three-person crew policy and the U.S. Department of Labor's recommended policy of at least four firefighters on scene before entering a burning structure.

The Riverside unit of 2881 recommended that firefighters attend the meeting to urge the supervisors to maintain the current county policy of three-person engines and consider a shift to four-person units.

IAA Visual Arts Chair David Reid-Marr next in Idyllwild Spotlight series

‘Truth and integrity are important in the creation of art’

Idyllwild Arts Academy Visual Arts Chair David Reid-Marr is the next speaker at the Spotlight on Leadership series at the academy.

The series, part of the academy’s outreach to the community, and its desire to build bridges of understanding and communication between campus and community, is sponsored by the Associates of the Idyllwild Arts Foundation. The series focuses on IAA educators, programs and calendars of performance and presentation.

Reid-Marr has taught at the academy for 18 years. Native of Kent, England, he received a Master of Fine Arts degree from the Royal College of Art in London and came to the U.S. to study Zen Buddhism with Zen Master Maezumi Roshi, who founded centers in Los Angeles and in Mountain Center.

Reid-Marr said he’d talk about the Visual Arts Department, its students and the way in which art is taught at the academy. “We, both faculty and students, come from all kinds of backgrounds and from all over the world,” said Reid-Marr. “That diversity informs and creates the way in which we teach. This is a dynamic environment that is very responsive to social change and cultural shifts. One of the strengths of the Visual Arts Department is how eclectic and diverse the faculty is, which allows the cultural diversity and sensibilities of our students to emerge through their work.”

Reid-Marr said that as department chairman, he is encouraging students to be more experimental with

their work and to integrate more social awareness. “We, as faculty, need to model what it is to be collaborative with the goal of creating more citizen artists who are involved with and making contributions to society,” he stressed.

“Something here at the academy that is so refreshing is the current social climate. Truth and integrity are important in the creation of art, especially now in a world where we don’t know what the truth is.”

Reid-Marr noted that creating art is hard work. “Yes, there is inspiration, but for the most part it involves very hard work,” he said. “I stress to students that the studio is sacred space where transformation happens. My strategy with them is to create an environment of mutual support. I tell them, ‘You are creating objects that have never been made before. Do you realize how special that is?’

“We do these all-night ‘paintathons,’ outside of regular classes. Students volunteer and sign up to work together in this more relaxed social environment and learn how to collaborate.”

Reid-Marr said the challenge and joy in teaching students from so many different backgrounds is to break down emotional, cultural, personal and formal barriers so students can grow and find their own way as young artists. “They’re allowed to make mistakes, as am I,” said Reid-Marr. That’s where the energy is. It’s so important to have the freedom to do so.

“From an early age, we have this notion that we must stick to one thing. But so much of art is about the things that unfold, with implications you might not intend. With art, it is natural to follow the lead that comes from the work itself — not your thinking about the work.”

Reid-Marr said the most challenging and rewarding part of the year is when seniors have to defend their shows. “That dialogue, presenting themselves to the world in front of the department, is so important, especially now in a time of [political and social] proclama-

tions with no opportunity for rebuttal, engagement or robust conversation,” he said.

Idyllwild has voted. The results were totaled, no recounts requested nor investigations initiated. The winners of the Animal Rescue Friends of Idyllwild photo contest were announced March 1.

Maximus was the most popular dog, Wolfie led the cat contingent and Turbo, an Australian rat, was a landslide winner in the “other” animal category.

The contest raised almost \$6,400 for ARF. Some of that money will be used for pet owners who cannot afford health care for their animals. ARF had received a grant for this purpose and nearly half the funds have been used, according to Janice Murasko, ARF director.

Maximus, a rescue from Living Free Animal Sanctuary, narrowly defeated Stoli O’Rocks. Maximus outpooled Stoli by 40 votes, with both receiving more than 1,100 votes. The third-place finisher, Orca, garnered 662 votes. The canine category attracted 14 participants.

The feline contest also had 14 contestants. But Wolfie, with 361 votes, easily outpaced the second-place finisher Sunny, who received 250 votes.

The other category (neither dog nor cat) had five participants and Turbo dominated the voting. In a landslide, Turbo had 130 votes compared to 20 for the second most popular “other” animal — Roxi du bar, an equine, with 20 votes. Murasko expressed some surprise that there were not more contestants in this group.

Grateful to the winners, their human guardians will enjoy a case of Baily Wine, donated by Baily Winery, Temecula. Each bottle’s label will feature a photo of the winning pet.

The Uptown Bar at Café Aroma will create a specialty cocktail named for each winner and offer it on its menu. A set of etched wine glasses featuring the contest title and pet’s name will be donated by Idyllwild Decal and Design.

Of course, the winning pets and their guardians will be invited to ride on the ARF float in the annual Fourth of July parade.

Pat Eastman nominated and cares for Maximus, Wolfie’s human caretaker is Bonnie Keefer and Joanne Selby is responsible for Turbo.

The second- and third-place contestants will be able to benefit their owners, too. Portraits, jewelry from Paw-someness and a complimentary tasting and tour at Powell Mountain Cellars in Paso Robles are the rewards for finishing second. The third-place winners will receive a gift basket filled with donations from local merchants.

Noted poet conducts IAA spring poetry retreat

The Idyllwild Arts Academy Adult Arts Center presents a spring poetry workshop/retreat featuring noted poet Suzanne Lummis.

She discussed why some poems make a more forcible impression than others. "Sometimes it's the element of strangeness, the unexpected, a certain wildness that sets it apart, qualities that include craft but also transcend it," she noted.

Dentist is next speaker at Chronic Health Symposium

Carol Ann Berg, D.D.S., local dentist at Oakwood Dentistry, is the next speaker at the Chronic Health Symposium jointly presented by the Fern Creek Medical Center and the Idyllwild Library.

Dr. Berg is the sole presenter at the Tuesday, March 21, event. She will discuss oral health: What are the signs and symptoms of an unhealthy mouth and how unhealthy gums can lead to other serious health issues. The presentation also will focus on how to prevent gum

disease and current treatment options.

"A lot of people don't realize how bacteria from the mouth can enter the bloodstream from weakened capillaries and affect other organs," said Berg. She noted how the mouth is a major source of bacteria and how important it is to maintain oral health.

Berg maintains practices in Idyllwild and Palm Desert, employing innovative equipment including an intraoral camera that improves diagnoses and provides the ability to view the entire mouth from different angles, as well as digital X-rays that use nearly 80-percent less radiation than a standard X-ray. "We have

the same equipment here as in our Palm Desert office," said Berg.

Subsequent chronic health presentations include ones on high blood sugar and conditions of diabetes and obesity on May 16; one on high blood pressure on Sept. 19; and a final presentation on chronic fatigue and its relation to a thyroid-hormone connection.

Chronic health conditions are the leading cause of disability and premature death in the United States. These conditions can, if left untreated, progress to serious levels despite the sole use of traditional medical therapies. Series presenters will weave traditional and integrative

medical approaches to educate attendees about health care options.

Deborah Wondoloski, nurse practitioner at Fern Creek Medical Center, coordinates the series. She noted that "The Idyllwild Community Health Survey," available at the Idyllwild Pharmacy and Fern Creek Medical Center, will help series presenters assess community interests and medical needs.

Berg's oral-health presentation is from 6 to 7:15 p.m. Tuesday, March 21, at the Idyllwild Library Community Room. The series is free to the public.

Program was started by Idyllwild deputy Jim Ciccone in an effort to, as he phrased it, "stop crime before it happens."

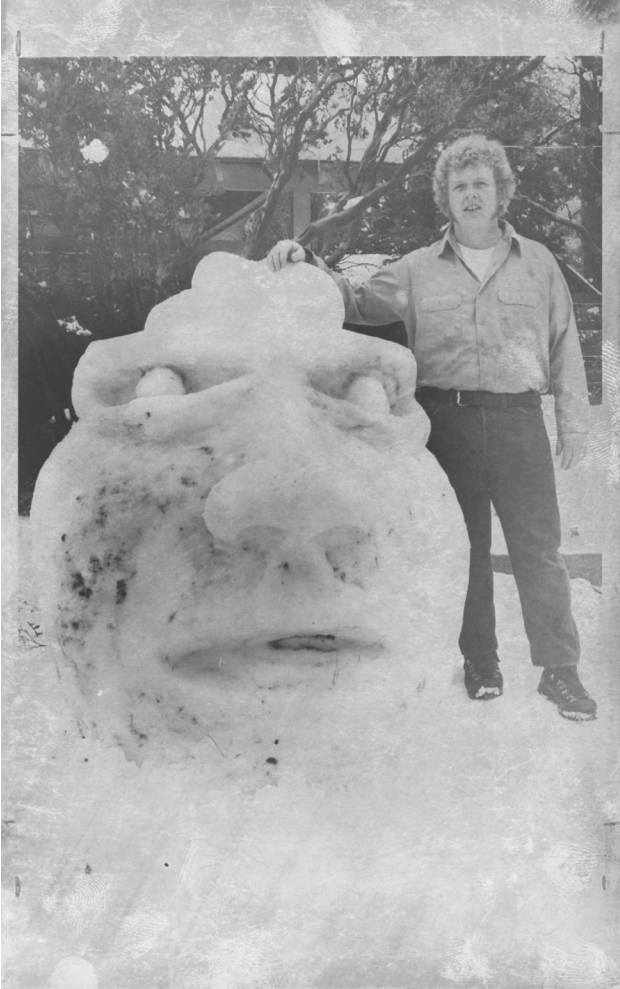
30 years ago - 1987
