## Humans, not nature, start most wildfires

A recently released study of 20 years of wildfires found humans caused the vast majority of wildfires.

While climate change has contributed to the lengthening of fire season and vulnerability of forested land, the ultimate cause of wildfires is most often a human being — both intentionally (arson) and carelessly.

The study, recently published in the "Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences," found that human activity or behavior was the cause of nearly 84 percent of 1.5 million fires between 1992 and 2012. Lightning caused 15 percent of wildfires during this period.

Further, human ignitions also lengthened the fire season in the spring and fall. The fire

season for human-caused fires was about 154 days compared to 46 days for fires caused by lightning.

Slightly more than three-quarters of lightning-caused fires occurred in the summer, between June and August, and 12 percent occurred between September and November.

In contrast, human-caused fires were more evenly distributed over the year. Only 24 percent were started in the summer. In the spring, 38 percent of human-caused fires were started.

Examining the days when fires occurred, University of Colorado researchers easily identified the Fourth of July as the most common fire day. More than 7,750 fires were started on Independence Day.

Lightning most likely ignited fires on July

## Summer concerts likely to continue

'At this point, I believe they're on'

The popular Idyllwild Summer Concert Series looks as if it will take place this summer, beginning on Thursday, July 6, and running for the customary eight weeks.

Ken Dahleen's longstanding summer entertainment staple looked doubtful for this summer, inasmuch as its many-season home, the Idyllwild Community Center site, would be closed for construction throughout the summer of 2017.

Dahleen had been reassured by the board of the San Jacinto Mountain Community Center (ICC governance) that ISCS summer entertainment would resume at the new ICC Amphitheater in July 2018.

But now, with an agreement in principle with the Johnson brothers, Jay and Steve, with interest and likely support from Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington's office and staff, and plans for Southern California Edison to install sufficient power to run the series, Dahleen said it seems as if the series is a "go."

The location will be the Johnson property directly across from the ICC site. The stage will be located on the south side of the property facing north toward the audience.

"There are still roadblocks that

## Ban or regulate local marijuana commerce?

Supervisors confront environment, crime and revenue issues

In response to state voters' approval of Proposition 64, the Adult Use of Marijuana Act, in November and the state Legislature's passage of the Medical Marijuana Regulation and Safety Act in 2015, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors held a workshop last week to discuss possible county actions, such as banning or regulating medical or recreational

commercial marijuana activities.

In November, California voters easily approved the AUMA. The statewide vote was 57 percent for approval and Riverside County voters cast 52.5 percent in favor of Prop 64, which regulates recreational marijuana.

The board will evaluate options, including a prohibition on marijuana activities, subject to the state laws, or regulate and permit medical and nonmedi-

cal marijuana activities in the unincorporated areas. If some regulation is permitted, the board will have to address issues such as cultivation, taxation, dispensaries, manufacturing and transportation.

At the conclusion of the workshop, which lasted nearly two hours, President John Tavaglione established an Ad Hoc Committee to pursue further study. The committee comprises supervisors Kevin Jeffries (District 1) and Chuck Washington (District 3).

"I did not support Proposition 64, but the voters of

California and voters of Riverside County did," Jeffries said. "We cannot prohibit what they did not. We have an obligation to attempt to make the best of the situation and learn from the mistakes of other states."

Both Tavaglione and Jeffries noted that the county's unincorporated area and population, over which the board has authority, are a small part of the county's total size and population.

Part of the presentations to the board included whether the AUMA or MMRSA affect the oper-

ations of county agencies and, if so, what concerns the agency heads have.

Fifteen county agencies, such as the Agricultural Commission, Building and Safety, Code Enforcement, Fire and Public Health, believe one or both will have some affect on their workload. "The district attorney and sheriff were concerned about increases in crime [if the county approved any marijuana activities]," wrote Ray Smith, county public affairs officer.

# Getting educated on local recreation

The County Service Area 36 Advisory Committee learned more about the pickleball courts, the Idyllwild Community Center board's recreation contract with the county and street lights at last Thursday's meeting. Also, two new members, Ten Janka and Mark Garrett (both are profiled separately in this edition), were seated.

Washington's new Chief of Staff Jeff Comerchero instructed the new members on important tenets of the Ralph M. Brown Act that guarantee the public's right to attend and participate in meetings of local governmental bodies. "The public's business must be in view of the public in a noticed meeting," said Comerchero. "Violation of the Brown Act is a criminal act."

Barry Wallace, who sits on the ICC board, reported that the project to have local pickleball courts is moving forward. "We're really close to getting it done and should know within a week," said Wallace. ICC President Janice Lyle stressed that this project is separately funded and not part of CSA 36 recreation's budget and funding.

Lyle also reported ICC's contract to manage CSA 36 recreation will be on the supervisor's agenda on Tuesday, April 11, at which point the three-and-a-half-year agreement would be approved and go into effect. ICC has been acting as recreation manager for a 90-day interim period that began Jan. 3. Also, to be finalized on April 11, is an agreement to lease Town Hall for two years at \$1 a year with mutu-

al 90-day escape clauses from the Johnson family.

Lyle requested that ICC be on the advisory committee's regular agenda for ICC to report about expanded programming and to answer community questions. "We've been using this time [since Jan. 3] to analyze the breadth of programming and demographics served by CSA 36 recreation," she said. "We intend to provide more for older groups. And by attending these [CSA 36 Advisory Committee] meetings, we will be able to hear what people are saying to you."

At the recommendation of Mike Franklin, CSA project manager, the committee voted to have ICC business discussions on all future CSA 36 Advisory Committee meetings. Franklin also explained the budget-reporting process to the new members and provided a statement of revenue and expense showing a projected budget of \$210,082 comprising special assessments and collected ad-valorem tax.

Committee member Dave Hunt asked Lyle if the Butterfields [key funders of the ICC building project] would be willing to come to an advisory committee meeting since many in the committee and community don't know them. Lyle said she'd ask but cautioned that the Butterfields might not be comfortable being the center of attention.

Chairman John Metroka announced he had set up an email account for district residents to email questions that could be taken up by the committee in public meeting (chairmanCSA36@gmail.com).

The committee also reviewed docu-

mentation about street lights within the district, subject matter also under its purview. To the surprise of many, there are 18 within district boundaries. Said Franklin, "We want to get an updated and accurate map [from Southern California Edison]." Metroka said the committee would go through the provided list and see if there are locations, because of lack of light and potential traffic danger, that need more lights.

Original appointee and longtime community recreation volunteer Wendy Read sat in her final session as a committee member. Read had submitted her resignation before the meeting (see separate article) but it had not taken effect, accord-

ing to Opal Hellweg, Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington's legislative assistant.

Hellweg reported the vacancy occasioned by Read's resignation had already been posted by the clerk of the board (of supervisors). She noted the vacancy could be filled by one of the already-interviewed previous applicants as early as April 11, the next Board of Supervisors meeting, at which time the appointment could be made.

The next CSA 36 meeting is tentatively set for 5:30 p.m. Thursday, April 20, at Town Hall.

Garrett is pastor of the Idyllwild Assembly of God congregation. Born in Kirkwood, Missouri, Garrett grew up in Hemet. He attended Hemet High and until 2010, worked in the construction trade. Then in 2010, after hearing a call to the ministry, Garrett became involved in pastoral service.

"I had led a pretty dysfunctional life and had become estranged from my family," he confided. With help from a program in San Diego, and heavily influenced by the true story of a pastor's intervention and success in ministering to gang youth — "The Cross and the Switchblade" by David Wilkerson — Garrett found his calling. "I gave myself over to the ministry and a mission of Christian discipleship to help people with problems," he related.

Critical in how he saw his future was a quote from Matthew 5:19, "Go home to your own people and tell them how much the Lord has done for you,

and how he has had mercy on you."

Garrett recounted that since moving to Idyllwild, he has organized outreach programs held on the Idyllwild Community Center site with games for kids and music to help raise awareness about his congregation and to better connect to the community. He also has organized skateboarding demonstrations for the last two years at the Idyllwild Skate Park to involve local youth.

"I saw in the Town Crier that the CSA Advisory Committee had two vacancies and since they needed volunteers, I volunteered," said Garrett.

Of his prospective service on the advisory committee, Garrett said, "It would be great if we could get some input from our seniors about what they want for recreation. They deserve to be treated with respect. Children are our future, and there needs to be a balance in offerings to all we serve."

Also relatively new to the Hill is Ted Janka. A native of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Janka worked in banking and communication before attending interior design school in Denver. From Colorado, Janka moved to San Diego, again working in communication, this time working with Pac Bell.

Read, a longtime Hill resident with extensive knowledge of community recreation needs, noted that Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington and staff knew of her service on the ICC board when she was interviewed and appointed. "They did not feel it was a conflict of interest at the time," said Read.

Read will continue to attend CSA 36 Advisory Committee meetings as an ICC subcommittee member overseeing the transition of CSA 36 recreation management from the county to

Results of Inland Empire Transgender Health and Wellness Profile to be released

We had a wet winter, but a dry March

*Editor's note: This is from a press release Jose Arballo Jr., senior public information specialist, Riverside University Health System-Public Health, provided last week.*

Thomi Clinton is not surprised when she hears that three-quarters of those who responded to a survey of transgender individuals in the Inland Empire have seriously considered suicide.

"The pressure on those within the transgender community, both externally and internally, can be overwhelming," said Clinton, who heads the Transgender Community Coalition. "There can be feelings of isolation, a lack of understanding and belief that others outside the transgender community don't care about you."

Part of the problem, health officials and others say, is the lack of information about those within the transgender community. Officials hope the release of the first Inland Empire Transgender Health and Wellness Profile will be a start in the right direction.

The first-of-its-kind report comes three years after Riverside County health officials published a health and wellness assessment of the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender community, which sparked productive discussion on how the health and welfare of these underserved populations can be improved.

One of the findings of the 2014 report was that little information was available about the region's transgender community and gathering data about this population was critical.

"We viewed the earlier report as a stepping stone that showed the need for more information," said Sarah Mack, director of Riverside University Health System-Public Health, which gathered the data for the transgender report. "Using the information in this report will help focus on areas of need, but it is the first step in a long process."

The needs-assessment report used information gathered from 90 individuals from throughout the Inland Empire who identified themselves as transgender. The data was

collected and analyzed by Public Health's Epidemiology and Program Evaluation division, which sought out input from various community partners during the editing process.

Among the findings:

- Current studies estimate the transgender population of the Inland Empire at nearly 27,000 people.
- Respondents to the survey had higher education levels but lower income levels than the general population.
- More than half (56.7 percent) of respondents have been physically and/or emotionally abused by a partner or someone close to them.
- A quarter of respondents reported experiencing verbal harassment at work, and nearly three quarters of respondents reported being bullied or harassed by other students at school.

More than half of respondents said they were very or somewhat uncomfortable seeking help from the police.

- Nearly 20 percent of respondents reported being kicked out of their family home.

While it has been a very wet winter with precipitation exceeding the long-term historical averages, the March rain production was considerably below normal — less than an inch.

The U.S. Forest Service's Keenwild Ranger Station recorded just 0.4 inches of rainfall during March and Pine Cove received 0.5 inches in the past four weeks. The long-term average rainfall on the Hill for March is 4.14 inches, nearly eight times the actual March 2017 rain.

This recent dry spell is only a divergence from the past winter when total rainfall since July 1, 2016, has easily exceeded the long-term average. In Pine Cove, nearly 37 inches of rain has fallen, almost 50 percent more than normal. Keenwild has received 26 inches of rain, equal to the average for the year and 3.2 inches more than the average through the end of March.

The National Weather Service is not forecasting above-average rain through spring, but the chances of an El Niño returning in the fall are growing, according to the NWS.

Idyllwild Post Office to host Passport Fair

The U.S. Postal Service will hold passport fairs at the Idyllwild Post Office from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday, April 8. The fair is for first-time passport applicants.

No appointments are necessary. Customers have the option of applying for a passport book (good for all international travel) or the passport card (good only for land and sea travel between the U.S. and Canada, Mexico, the Caribbean and Bermuda).

The above fees must be paid with a personal check or money order. (No exceptions.) In addition to the above costs, there is also a \$25 processing/acceptance fee plus a \$15 fee for photos, which can be paid for by cash, personal check, debit and credit cards, or money order. Passport photo services will be available.

Travelers are encouraged to apply for a passport several months before they are scheduled to travel overseas. The average time for passport applications and renewals is six weeks. However, for an added fee, the State Department will expedite the application and process it within three weeks.

To apply for a passport, travelers need to complete Passport Application Form DS-11 (unsigned) and provide one of the following: a U.S. birth certificate from the Department of Vital Statistics (not a certificate of birth) or naturalization papers. Applicants must also must show either a valid driver's license, a previous or current U.S. passport book or card, Certificate of Naturalization, Certificate of Citizenship, military ID, or a federal, state or municipal government employee ID card.

Applicants ages 15 or under must be present with both parents unless consent is given. For those who are ages 16 or 17, only one parent needs to be present.

The Passport Fair will be at the Palm Desert Post Office on Sunday, April 2, and the Murrieta Carrier Annex on Sunday, April 9.

In special circumstances, some may still enroll in Covered Cal

Covered California's annual open-enrollment period may be over, but a special enrollment period will continue until Oct. 31, for some individuals. These individuals must sign up for coverage within 60 days of the qualifying life event.

The following circumstances are among the more common reasons individuals become eligible for special

enrollment:

- Losing health coverage, for example, because of losing or changing jobs.
- Marriage or entering a domestic partnership.
- Having or adopting a child or placing a child for adoption or in foster care.
- Turning 26 years old.
- Moving to California or a new region within California

Chevron underground tank site gets state funding

State funding is to clean up the site

The state has recently agreed to provide funding for the Idyllwild Chevron underground storage-tank project.

"Great news! The Idyllwild Chevron UST cleanup was accepted into the Expedited Claim Account Program (ECAP) and now has State funding to expedite the clean-up," wrote Sharon Boltinghouse, Public Health professional geologist for Riverside County's Department of Environmental Health. The amount of funding will await approval of the work plan, which RM Environmental of Calimesa will submit.

Phone calls between the county, the state and the site consultant, RM Environmental, resulted in the agreement. The work plan should be submitted shortly, according to Boltinghouse.

In December, the State Water Resources Control Board rejected Riverside County's request to close the underground storage tank clean-up project at the Idyllwild Chevron.

The SWRCB report stated that its case-closure policy permits this type of action, but the Idyllwild case does not meet all of the "required criteria."

The state recommended that extent of possible groundwater-contamination down gradient from the site be better defined and a feasibility study for corrective action be developed.

The basic SWRCB objection, according to its report, was, "According to groundwater data, water quality objectives have not been achieved," although the state agrees that no public-water supply wells are within 1,000 feet of the projected plume.

This work will be done as part of RM Environmental's proposal. The work will include several hydropunches to locate and to help define the benzene plume down gradient of the site to the west and southwest. Results of the groundwater samples collected from these hydropunch borings will be used to select locations for two more groundwater monitoring wells.

The Idyllwild case met seven of eight policy criteria. However, SWRCB reviewers felt the groundwater quality was still unknown because the extent of the contaminant plume has not been defined. Further, past sampling has shown that both benzene and methyl tert-butyl ether have been found moving down gradient from the site.

The state board conducted its review after the Regional Water Board expressed its opposition to the closing case. While the state agreed that the plume has not been ad-

equately defined, it disagreed with the regional board regarding the removal of a secondary source of contamination.

The state report found, "Soil analytical data from the areas of the former UST system indicate that the secondary source has been removed to the extent practicable." The benzene concentrations in several wells are stable or decreasing, the state emphasized.

While the groundwater samples were taken in October, no December tests were taken because the wells are on a semi-annual sampling basis.

RM Environmental will likely propose chemical oxidation as the best remedial method for the site. No decision has been made yet, but county officials were very pleased with the recent agreement and expectation of future progress.

The funding source, the ECAP, was established in 2014 to reduce the overall cost for site cleanup and the time to reach closure by increasing coordination with the regulators, claimants and their consultants, and the UST Cleanup Fund.

In January of this year, Kathy Sacher Wilson and Ginger Dagnall resigned from the County Service Area 36 Advisory Committee.

Now, Wendy Read has resigned in March. That leaves John Mertroka Jr. and Dave Hunt as the only two of the original five members sworn in in July of last year.

While Wendy was attending her final meeting, Mark Garrett and Ted Janka attended their first last week.

For many years, this committee lay dormant until revived interest in local recreation caused Supervisor Chuck Washington to rebirth the committee.

But the musical chairs in less than a year raise concerns that the committee will not be able to fulfill its advisory capacity to the community. I certainly don't want to see it go dormant again.

From the little I know in under a year, I think Mertroka displays good, strong leadership and understands the role of the committee in our town.

The committee faces challenges so it needs to stay strong. Ahead are questions involving the use of Town Hall once the Idyllwild Community Center is built and the role ICC's board plays in relationship to the committee.

If you're having trouble wrapping your mind around that latter concept, here's how it works:

- Recreation Director Bob Lewis works directly for the ICC board.
- The ICC board contracts with the county to run recreation. It does not receive compensation for this task.
- Finally, the ICC board reports to the CSA 36 Advisory Committee, who passes along these reports, as well as community concerns regarding recreation and street lights, to Washington.

For the committee members now seated — all volunteers — stay strong and keep at it.

- Becoming a citizen — a U.S. national or a lawfully present individual.

Other special-enrollment situations and qualifying events can be found at [www.coveredca.com/individuals-and-families/getting-covered/special-enrollment/qualifying-life-events/](http://www.coveredca.com/individuals-and-families/getting-covered/special-enrollment/qualifying-life-events/).

Missing the 60-day period to enroll means these individuals must wait for the next open enrollment period. Financial assistance is available to individuals or families who meet one of these special circumstances.

Covered California estimates that households receive an average of \$5,300 per year in tax credits to help pay for the cost of health coverage in 2016. Also, 12 percent of Covered California households receive more than \$10,000 per year, and 16 percent of individuals receive more than \$6,000 per year to help bring health coverage within reach.

About half of Covered California members are enrolled in "Enhanced Silver" plans, which give them the added benefit of cost-sharing reductions that reduce their out-of-pocket expenses by an average of \$1,500 per year.

A new survey from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found that California's uninsured rate has fallen to a record low of 7.1 percent, which is significantly lower than the 17 percent uninsured in 2013.

could present problems — the cost of installing power on the property, as well as time and cost of county permitting processes — but I’m proceeding forward at this time,” said Dahleen. Assuming all infrastructure preparation and permits are affordable and can be executed in time, the series would begin at 6:15 p.m. Thursday, July 6, and run for eight weeks. Those interested in becoming series sponsors or providing financial support should contact Dahleen at 951-659-2229 and/or mail checks directly to the Idyllwild Summer Concert Series at P.O. Box 1542, Idyllwild, CA 92549.

Each year, Dahleen and his board begin the series by contracting with headliners and supporting acts even before they have sufficient capital to fund the series. 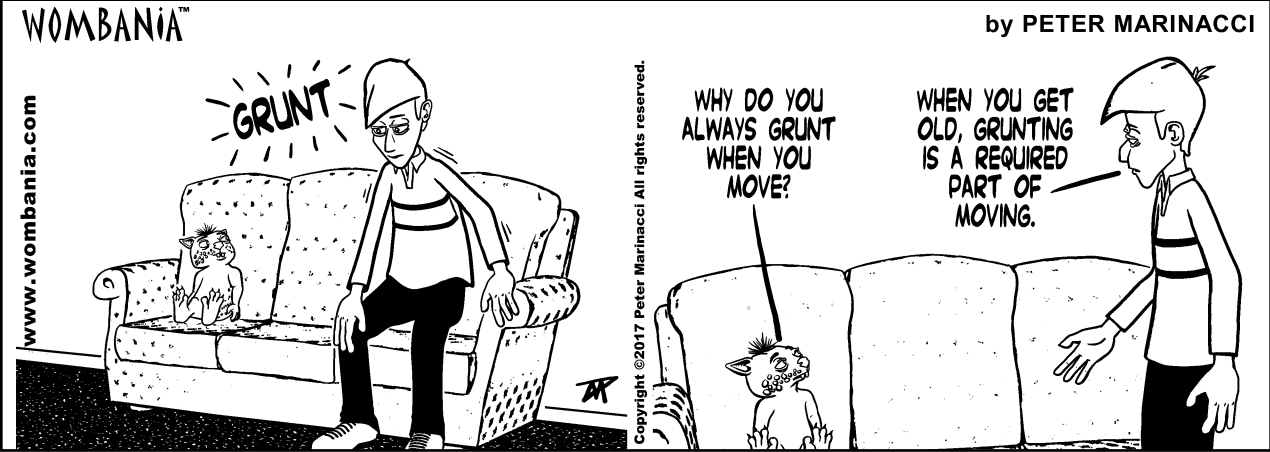
which the board will have to address, include stream contamination, water diversion, chemical dumping and restricted pesticides, the District Attorney’s Office mentioned. Board members themselves were concerned about the cost of policing marijuana activities, especially if any contract cities take a different direction than the county. Currently, Riverside County Ordinance 348 bans dispensaries, deliveries and cultivation with a limited cultivation exception for small amounts of cultivation for medical purposes in specified circumstances. The MMRSA permits local jurisdictions to regulate medical-marijuana commerce, including a complete ban. Further, to obtain a state license, a local license or permit is required. The new California Bureau of Medical Cannabis Regulation has announced that proposed regulations may be announced later this spring. As of Nov. 9, 2016, California adults over the age of 21 may use, possess, transport or give away up to 28.5 grams (1 ounce) of marijuana and cultivate up to six marijuana plants, pursuant to the AUMA. However, there are limitations and local jurisdictions may enact “reasonable” restrictions, but cannot completely ban cultivation of the six plants,

according to Chief Deputy County Counsel Tiffany North. Banning and Indian Wells already have enacted some local controls. State regulation again requires a state license, which can be nullified if the local jurisdiction bans marijuana commerce. The local license is not a requirement for the state, but an explicit ban will prevent issuance of a state license. Besides the state-established taxes on marijuana cultivation and sales, a local jurisdiction may impose its own revenue devices. Estimates of the revenue were very broad (ranging from \$5 million to \$17 million or more annually) because the specifics of what would be legal are unknown now. These are the choices and ultimately the decision the Riverside County supervisors will face in the coming months. Currently, five county cities — Cathedral City, Coachella, Desert Hot Springs, Palm Springs and Perris — permit and regulate some form of commercial marijuana activities. Several others have begun the process, but the majority, such as Banning, Hemet and Temecula, currently prohibit medical and recreational marijuana commerce. Despite these recent state actions, marijuana remains a controlled substance at the federal level, and federal law trumps California law, North advised the supervisors. results in charges that many, even those with insurance, cannot hope to pay. Recall that insurance companies make money by “not” providing you with health care, that the majority of bankruptcies are due to medical bills and that the majority of those declaring bankruptcy have insurance. A basic tenant of modern health care, then, is this: Healthy people, who don’t require much care, need to pay for the unhealthy who do. What is the most efficient, least expensive way to do this? Everybody contributes. That is so obvious that it was included as part of the “three-legged stool” on which the Massachusetts health-care bill known as Romney-care was based. Effective health care for everyone required pre-existing conditions to be ignored, a mandate for everyone to be covered, and subsidies for those unable to pay. The simplest way to do this nationally would be to give every-



Small fire put out in wilderness

Fire crews were dispatched up Devil’s Slide Trail at about 2:50 p.m. Monday to extinguish a small vegetation fire. “The fire was located north of Devil’s Slide Trail in Humber Park,” said Gerrelaine Alcordo, assistant public affairs officer for the San Bernardino National Forest. A Cal Fire helicopter used Lake Fulmor as a water resource to help extinguish the blaze.

According to SBNF Public Affairs Officer John Miller, the fire was a 100-foot-by-20-foot “spot in rocky terrain with low growth potential.” He added that the cause is under investigation. The fire was contained at 5:50 p.m., Alcordo said. Along with U.S. Forest Service personnel, Cal Fire Engine 23 (Pine Cove) and Idyllwild Fire Department also were dispatched. 22, they said. While humans were the greatest cause of fires throughout the country, the fires were not evenly distributed throughout the regions. The study’s authors found that human-caused fires compared to lightning fires were increasing in the eastern U.S., and Central and Southern California. Human-started wildfires were caused by a variety of sources: equipment use, smoking, campfire, railroad, arson, debris burning, children, fireworks, power line, structures and miscellaneous fires. About 20 percent of wildfires, including in California, start from arson, according to the U.S. Fire Administration. In 2015, Cal Fire reported that arson was the cause of 8 percent of wildfires. Other human behavior creating fires were campfires, debris burning, electrical equipment and playing with fire. Lightning was the cause of 11 percent of the 2015 wildfires. U.S. Forest Service invites public comment on trail maintenance

Editor’s note: This is a press release from the U.S. Forest Service.

The U.S. Forest Service’s Pacific Southwest Region (Region 5) is inviting the public to help identify trails that will be part of an effort — with partners and volunteers — to increase the pace of trail maintenance. Nationwide, the Forest Service will select nine to 15 priority areas among its nine regions where a backlog in trail maintenance contributed to reduced access, potential harm to natural resources or trail users, and/or has the potential for increased future deferred maintenance costs. Region 5 manages more than 16,000 miles of trails enjoyed by 16,100,000 users annually. In Region 5, volunteers and partner groups contributed more than 178,000 hours in maintenance and repair of nearly 2,984 miles of trails last year. “We are counting on our fellow Californians to help us identify where maintenance is needed,” said Randy Moore, PSR regional forester. “The forest visitors who enjoy these trails year-round are the best source of information for what’s needed on the ground, and we’re counting on their expertise and willingness to help.” Region 5 has until April 15 to submit at least three regional proposals to its national headquarters. Those proposals will be compared to proposals from other Forest Service regions. Therefore, public comments should be submitted before April 7. Comments may be sent to Regional Trail Program Manager Garrett Villanueva at gvillanueva@fs.fed.us or the San Jacinto Ranger Station for John Ladley: Either call 909-382-2934 or email jladley@fs.fed.us. By the end of 2021, the Forest Service hopes for a 100-percent increase in the portion of maintenance volunteers and partners conduct. The selected sites will be part of the initial focus that will include a mosaic of areas with known trail-maintenance needs that include areas near urban and remote areas, such as wildernesses, are of

varying sizes and trail lengths, are motorized and non-motorized, and incorporate a varied combination of partner and volunteer approaches and solutions. The Forest Service receives widespread support from tens of thousands of volunteers and partners each year. In 2015, volunteers contributed nearly 1.4 million hours — a value of about \$31.6 million — in maintenance and repair of nearly 30,000 miles of trails. However, limited funding, compounded by the rising cost of wildfire operations, has resulted in fewer than 25 percent of Forest Service trails meeting all of the agency’s standards for safety, quality recreation, and economic and environmental sustainability. The remaining trails meet standards to varying degrees. Ideas and suggestions on potential priority areas and approaches for incorporating increased trail maintenance assistance from partners and volunteers should be transmitted to the individuals above.

## Some county cities raise sales tax

## Idyllwild Master Chorale presents an evening of nocturnes

By definition, nocturnes are pensive, dreamy and appropriate to the night or evening. The Idyllwild Master Chorale presents a gently evocative evening graced with a little night music for its April 1 Spring Concert.

Set to the music of Morten Lauridsen and David Dickau, the haunting and touching texts of the featured nocturnes are penned by American poets James Agee, California's current Poet Laureate Dana Gioia and e.e. cummings.

Lofted by Lauridsen's ethereal notes, Agee's text captures the essential essence of the evening: "Sure on this shining night of Starlight shadows round, Kindness must watch for me this side the ground ... Sure on this shining night, I weep for wonder wand'ring far alone, of shadows in the stars."

For its spring concert, IMC Music Director and Conductor Dwight "Buzz" Holmes has programmed music that ascends, and uplifts the spirit and the soul.

The program opens with Franz Joseph Haydn's "Missa Brevis Sancti Joannis de Deo," accompanied by Todor Pelev on violin I, Christy Haitian Liu on violin II, Julianna Buffum Holmes on cello and Edwin Hansen on organ.

Haydn, the elder member of what is called the "First Viennese School" of classical music, strongly influenced the other two seminal members — Mozart and Beethoven. Haydn, in fact, taught Beethoven. He is remembered as the first great symphonist and the composer who essentially invented the string quartet. His "Missa Brevis" is one of Haydn's earliest authenticated works. In a way, it bookends his compositional career, since, at the end of his life he spent

time trying to augment its orchestration.

The second half of the concert showcases the nocturnes — David Dickau's "I Carry Your Heart With Me" and "If Music Be the Food of Love." Then Morten Lauridsen's "Sure on This Shining Night" (text by James Agee) and "Prayer" (text by Dana Gioia) provide emotional shimmer, sweetness and soul.

As a bracing finale to what will be an uplifting and dreamy musical experience, Holmes concludes the evening with a bit of a jolt and a bit of a bounce, with Manhattan Transfer's "Java Jive."

Tickets, \$25 for adults and \$10 for students, are available online and at the door. The performance is at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, April 1, in the William M. Lowman Concert Hall on the Idyllwild Arts Academy campus.

# The world inside a frame

‘It’s all light,’ says photographer Jenny Kirchner

Photographer Jenny Kirchner sees the world through two different lenses — one that frames and captures a moment of beauty and another that frames and captures a moment that tells a story, sometimes a difficult and emotionally wrenching story.

But whether it is in art photography or photojournalism, Kirchner stressed that one has to be sensitive to how quickly time passes. It’s important to be sensitized to the subtleties of the moment — to be fully present and to notice in order to get the shot. “It’s all light,” she said. The light changes and the shot does not wait.

She was 13, it was summer, and she and her father were on vacation in Colorado. “Let’s buy you a camera,” her father said. “It was a Canon Rebel X,” recalled Kirchner. “I started taking photos immediately. That’s how we bonded — taking photos.”

At 15, Kirchner accepted a scholarship from the North American Nature Photography Association. The scholarship funded a weeklong residential seminar taught by top professional nature photographers. At the end of the seminar photo shoot, each of the 10 students chose their best shots to show before an audience of 1,000 editors, publishers and professional photographers. “I was the youngest of the 10 chosen from nationwide applicants and the only one from the West Coast,” said Kirchner. “It was probably one of the best experiences in my life.” At 18, Kirchner received her first of many awards, an honorable mention in the San Diego County Fair for wildlife photography.

Growing up in Idyllwild and often being outdoors shaped how Kirchner looked at the world around her. “I loved animals, being in the woods, playing in the creek, noticing what was around me,” said Kirchner.

“I began to see things in patterns — how light cast patterns on objects and how patterns existed in nature and in structures.” Patterns caught her attention — the lines of benches on a porch and how light cast patterns through the porch railings onto the floor — jagged lightning patterns against a night sky contrasting with the softer outlines of a hill — sunlight backlighting a leaf and how light sculpted parts of the leaf.

While being interviewed at the Town Crier, Kirchner began noticing through the window sunlight on plants along a porch railing. Because we had been talking about patterns, and how they caught her attention, she illustrated by going out to take a photo of what she was seeing. The photo, taken with her iPhone, showed a stream of light highlighting the top of a curved branch. There was also a light pattern of a perfect cross in the bottom right of the photo.

Kirchner’s demonstration was a revealing moment showing the importance of noticing the light, how it plays on and through objects, and how critical it is to know how transitory specific light patterns can be — that as the light changes, so does the moment and the shot.

It is the same with photojournalism, said Kirchner. She stressed the need to be fully and unobtrusively present to capture a story unfolding without distracting those in the photo, because if the subjects become aware of the photographer, then the story changes.

“People ask me how I deal with taking photos of difficult situations,” Kirchner recalled. “There is a distance with a camera — the camera creates a barrier between me and what is happening. It’s as if you’re watching a movie. Of course, it affects me emotionally, but usually after, not during the moment of taking the photo. What is going on affects me emotionally and mentally but not enough, at the time, to stop me from taking the photos. I try to take in the moment and the emotions of the moment, but from a distance, through the lens, being as discreet and as sensitive as I can. I tend to stay as far out of their face as I can.”

In her early 20s, Kirchner took courses and became certified in crimes and investigations with the thought of pursuing a career in crime-scene investigation photography. “It’s a darker side of life, that is real, and that people want to see. And that rush of running out to an event fed that little part of me that was interested in CSI.”

Kirchner described how, probably more than in most careers, one is always noticing, being present for the potential of a shot. “I’ll stop whatever I’m doing if I see a shot,” she said.

“I never wanted photography to be my career because I love it so much. I did not want it to become work but every time I would try to step away, I would get pulled back in. I would see something.”





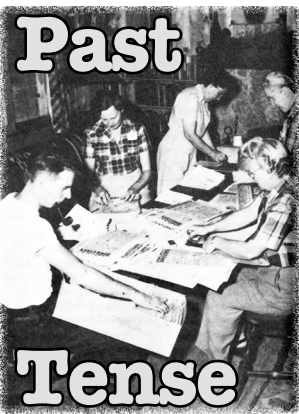

**55 years ago - 1962**  
Logging operations started in May Valley to recover more than a million board-feet of timber in an area badly infected by bark beetles. The Big Bear Timber Company received the contract to clear the forest of infected and susceptible trees.

**50 years ago - 1967**  
The Idyllwild dump was closed on Sundays, and there were lots of objections around town.

**45 years ago - 1972**  
As the Idyllwild Water District declared a water emergency and passed an ordinance limiting consumption, Ernie Haucke donned his American Indi-

an suit and performed a rain dance.

**40 years ago - 1977**  
Just four days after the official arrival of spring, Idyllwild received its biggest snow of the season. At the County Park, the T.C.'s weatherman, Rich Dulaney, measured 17 inches of snow.

**35 years ago - 1982**  
A six-day storm during the last official days of winter left about 2 feet of snow and added 5.06 inches of moisture in Idyllwild. About 2,000 Hill residents were without power for various amounts of time during the storm.

**30 years ago - 1987**  
Four Idyllwild parents attended a Hemet Unified School District meeting to find a solution to the dangerous nature of dropping off and picking up students at Idyllwild Elementary School. They felt the school needed adult crossing guards and more adequate parking areas for parents and school staff.

**25 years ago - 1992**  
Several residents were protesting the proposed removal of three trees by Caltrans. The trees had to be removed in order to replace and widen the Highway 243 bridge over Strawberry Creek.


**20 years ago - 1997**  
"Bye Bye Birdie," Idyllwild School's spring musical, was a great success. The main characters were Nick Carratello, Natasha Macias, Anna Gioeli, Justin Holmes and Mandy Cole.

**15 years ago - 2002**  
The three Hill water districts voted to recommend that the San Jacinto Mountain Area Water Study Agency take on the task to create a water management plan in the face of worsening drought.

**10 years ago - 2007**  
The results of several community meetings were released in a document called "Community Visioning Meetings Report." In the document, the Idyllwild Community Center steering committee explained the process used to survey the community for suggestions for programs and facilities to be incorporated into the ICC.

**5 years ago - 2012**  
A sheriff's raid at a home on Highway 243 near Idyllwild School netted two drug-related arrests.

**1 year ago - 2016**  
State Sen. Jeff Stone's legislation was passed and renamed a portion of Highway 371 in Anza as "Special Deputy Frank Hamilton Memorial Highway."



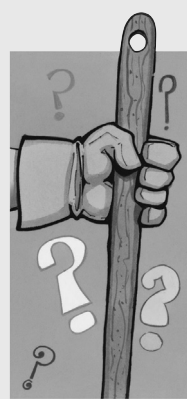
