

Easter Sunday comes early this year, on April 16. For those attending the sunrise service at Inspiration Point, it could be chilly. The service, from 6:30 to 7:30 a.m., is jointly sponsored by the Community Presbyterian Church, Cross Road 243 and the Idyllwild Bible Church. It is held each year at one of the most beautiful places in Idyllwild — Inspiration Point at the end of Double View Drive. Everyone, regardless of denomination, is wel-

On Friday, April 14, local churches observe Good Friday, remembering Christ's crucifixion, passion and death, followed by Easter services celebrating Jesus' resurrection.

At 10 a.m. Saturday, April 15, Idyllwild's traditional Easter Egg Hunt will be held at the Idyllwild Community Center site. Hunts will be held for age categories toddler to 3 years old; 4 to 6 years old; 7 to 9 years old; 10 years and up; and anyone brave enough to admit to being "over the Hill." State lifts drought emergency restrictions

State prepares long-term water conservation plan

On Friday, April 7, Gov. Jerry Brown rescinded the state of emergency caused by the statewide drought, which he declared in January 2014. The emergency conditions were lifted for all but four counties — Fresno, Kings, Tulare and Tuolumne.

In his press release, Brown said, "This drought emergency is over, but the next drought could be

must remain a way of life."

The Executive Order B-40-17 maintains water reporting requirements and prohibitions on wasteful practices, such as watering during or right after rainfall.

The State Water Resources Control Board will maintain urban water use reporting requirements and prohibitions on wasteful practices such as watering during or after rainfall, hosing off sidewalks and irrigating ornamental turf on public street medians, according to the release.

Also, the order maintains that the state will continue its work to develop a statewide response to the

stressed forests that has killed millions of trees across California.

Brown's action had been anticipated after one of the wettest winters on record. Already, Pine Cove has received 37 inches of rain, nearly 50 percent more than the long-term annual average.

Besides the winter precipitation, Californians statewide have made significant water reduction. Last week, the SWRCB also reported that statewide water conservation was 25 percent in February, more than double the February 2016 savings.

Hemet now has a cardiac lab

Coronary operations expected to follow by end of year

On Wednesday, April 5, the Hemet Valley Medical Center dedicated its new cardiac catheterization lab. The cath lab is a room to examine how well your heart is functioning. With the new equipment, the hospital's doctors will be able to perform angioplasty, balloon septostomy electrophysiology studies and several other heart procedures.

"By the end of 2017, we will have a cardiac vascular operating room operating," said Dan McLaughlin, the hospital chief executive officer.

Procedures such as implanting a pacemaker or stenotic heart valves can now be done at the HVMC. Once the operation room is available, open heart surgeries can be done at the hospital, according to Mc-Laughlin.

The cath lab cost \$8.6 million and has been open for several weeks. Once the cardiac-vascular operation room is available, McLaughlin anticipates that HVMC will become a STEMI clinic capable of receiving serious heart attack victims.

"Residents will no longer travel out of town for any type of heart attack," McLaughlin told the crowd at the dedication ceremo-

Dr. Anil K. Rastogi, medical director of the Cardiac Catheterization Laboratory, reinforced McLaughlin's promise. "I'm happy to See Cardiac, page A2

announce the brand new cath lab. We will perform all heart procedures here in Hemet."

One of the final speakers was Dr. Kali Chaudhuri, chairman and chief executive officer of the Physicians for Healthy Hospitals, which acquired both HVMC and the Menifee Hospital in 2010.

Describing his goal during the effort to acquire the hospitals, Chaudhuri said, "What I decided to do was not complain about what's wrong in the community. I said, 'Let's do something."

While the cardiac center is the newest addition to the hospital, HVMC has been growing for several years. Chaudhuri is proud of the investment and the changes underway at HVMC. The new Day Surgery facility, radiation oncology, reopening of a Skilled Nursing Facility, and improvement to the laparoscopic and CT scanning equipment are all relatively new additions to the hospital's services

A medical residency and post-graduate resident program was initiated two years ago. McLaughlin said he expects the establishment of a medical school associated with the hospital is a few years in the future.

Other new planned capabilities include a Level 3 trauma center, certified stroke center, wound care center, behavioral health unit and a senior housing community. The emergency department revamping also is in progress, along with the subacute unit expansion.





Snow group proposes government snow-play area

Despite daffodils and lilacs blooming all over the Hill, some residents aren't willing to let go of winter — at least when it comes to talk of recreational snow visitors.

Marsha Kennedy is leading a group of grassroots volunteers, mostly residing in the area of Fern Valley Road which has been heavily impacted by off-Hill snow visitors over the past two winters. Residents have experienced "tons of safety issues," as Kennedy put it at a public meeting before about 25 people Saturday at the Nature Center. These issues range from illegal parking to trespassing to rude and bulling behavior.

Over the past few months, the snow group has produced a mission statement and investigated solutions to the issue of Idyllwild and surrounding areas not having the resources to accommodate the hundreds of people who have now discovered the Hill during winter.

Emergency vehicles being able to get through to a residence, residents' liabilities if a snow visitor gets hurt on their property and possible violent confrontations with trespassers all were discussed at the meeting. "They can sue you if they get hurt, even if they are 99 percent responsible," said Kennedy, after explaining California's Pure Comparative Negligence Standard. "So, we have a high motivation to get people off our property.'

"I guarantee I will sue if an emergency vehicle cannot get up if I have an emergency. I will," said one man in the audience.

Kennedy said the California Highway Patrol commander in San Bernardino urges residents to not be confrontational with trespassers or illegal parkers. Instead, ask them to leave. If they do not, don't say, "I'm going to call the police." Just go call 911. "Remember," Kennedy said, "they may not do anything to you now but they know where you live.'

But even if you call 911, who will come? Idyllwild Fire Chief Patrick Reitz told the audience that CHP sent two extra officers up here one of the weekends. "They can't keep doing that unless someone pays for it,"

So, what is the solution? Kennedy said her group is asking the U.S. Forest Service to change Humber Park's name to Humber Park Trailhead because the name "park" implies a place to park and play in the snow. And then post signs that say "Snow Parking and Snow Play Prohibited; Humber Park Closed." But post them not only at the park but down on the highway and six places throughout Idyllwild. That way, visitors will not even venture up Fern Valley Road, they hope.

Kennedy said the belief that merchants weren't complaining because they were "making a killing" is a misconception. The snow group surveyed more than 25 percent of merchants and learned that the ones who did best were coffee shops, candy stores and convenience stores.

Restaurants had increases but not across the board. Many of the snow visitors came in large groups who could not be accommodated. Some ordered a cup of cocoa just so they could use the restroom.

"Some shops closed," she said. "Real estate tanked. Increased theft was noted." At one grocery store, no one was buying but the restroom lines were long. Toilets backed up and someone even defecated on a restroom floor. "There were no grins on faces after they left us," she added.

She called the situation "an endless and irreversible force."

The group has approached Mountain Community Patrol to put warnings on people's windshields that they are illegally parked. But they are wary to get involved because of liability issues.

They approached Bill Tell of WNKI-1600 AM, who is working on ideas involving scrolling LED signs directing people to snow play areas. Idyllwild Community Center's Janice Lyle told the group that 145 parking spaces will be available at the site in June of 2018 on over 5 acres of property.

The group has talked to people in Big Bear, Julian and Forest Falls, which has an even bigger challenge in that it is in a culde-sac. The community of only 1,200 was able to get a sheriff's office in their town. But Reitz pointed out that Riverside County is planning cuts to law enforcement right now that will affect the rural areas. "Law enforcement is on the chopping block," he

Reitz did not poo-poo the group's efforts, however. "Patience and persistence," he said. He also suggested expanding one of the County Service Areas to include law enforcement or vote in a new CSA to fund increased law enforcement.

Kennedy's group is proposing a longterm solution of a snow play area at a 6,000foot elevation on either county, state or federal land. It would have parking, bathrooms, trash cans and even food conces-

sions.

She researched past Town Criers and discovered that in 1971, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved the Idyllwild County Park as a play area.

For the time being, she said the Mt. San Jacinto State Park superintendent has agreed to allow snow visitors to play at the park. The group is working to get signs directing snow visitors to Mt. San Jacinto State Park, Idyllwild County Park and the Nature Center.

Nature Center Park Interpreter Amanda Allen said she walked around the Nature Center during the snow weeks talking with visitors and handing out trash bags. She said she would welcome volunteers to help do the same. "I had luck walking around with an educational vs. enforcement approach and that helped," she said.

"The alternative," Kennedy said, "is to continue to tolerate the recreational snow visitor issue and prepare for far-reaching consequences."

However, the populations in the surrounding areas are growing and will continue to grow. Hemet was predicted to grow 61 percent between 2005 and 2035; Riverside County, 72 percent. And Banning and Coachella Valley were not better, Kennedy pointed out in a PowerPoint display.

So, the group is not giving up. Future tasks include a law enforcement officer at the chains required sign at the bottom of the Hill; meeting of Idyllwild business owners; a media campaign telling off-Hill residents "we do not have what you want up here"; more signage.

During a question-and-answer session, Annamarie Padula of the Pine Cove Property Owners Association said their group is purchasing new trespassing signs with the Penal Code in English and Spanish for PCPOA members. But Marge Muir of Pine Cove said, "What is the image you're creating? Be careful. Too many people found us, that's the problem."

One woman complained about her friends voting for Idyllwild as a Top 10 town. "Why do that? You're creating a problem," she said.

At the back of the room, people signed up to volunteer in the group.

'We hope we can accomplish things,' said Kennedy. "The history of Idyllwild shows that we get things done by collaboration of many rather than the leadership of a

Editor's note: Jack is taking a turn this week. First of all, what does "circulation" really mean?

We order 5,600 newspapers printed every week. (We used to order only 2,800 in the paid-paper days.) The press usually overprints somewhat, somewhere between 5,600 to 5,700. All of them are "distributed," which means they go to points from where readers can get

(It takes two weeks before we have all the figures.) You can see, below, that the distribution of the March 30 Town Crier was 5,700. The circulation was 5,551.

That's a huge percentage of distributed papers in circulation because we don't just distribute, we re-distribute and re-re-distribute. I'll be glad to show you how that

Our old paid-paper circulation was only about 2,350. Now, it's 236 percent of that old circulation figure — way more than double.

So, Town Crier newspaper advertisers are now getting more than twice as much exposure for their ads due to more than twice as much actual circulation. Your ads are bigger, due to our new broadsheet format, and they're sharper and brighter than ever before.

Please, don't turn away when I say that April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month. I know we prefer not to talk about it. Nevertheless, it's still a major problem for women, men, children and even elders. It doesn't go away just because we turn away.

Sexual assault affects not only survivors' long-term emotional health, but their health in general. Survivors report feeling depressed and anxious, worthless and damaged, and often are diagnosed with post-traumatic stress disorder. Survivors may self-medicate the enduring emotional pain with drugs and alcohol. Survivors often have higher incidences of chronic health problems such as asthma, arthritis, diabetes and hypertension.

Sadly, much sexual assault could have been prevented if bystanders had not turned away but instead, had intervened to prevent or stop the assault. Some call this bystander intervention being an "upstander."

Even without professional training, we can all help to By John R. Hawkins prevent, stop or reduce sexual assault by learning simple, safe and proven-effective bystander intervention techniques.

Read on!

The "bystander effect" is an odd reality where folk tend not to help in risky, especially interpersonal, situations. Instead, we ignore and walk away. One cause is simply because we don't know what else to do.

Lucky for us, public-health advocates all across the globe have developed something called the "4 Ds" of bystander intervention: direct; delegate; distract; delay.

First, here are some overarching guidelines.

Do not put yourself at risk.

Do not make the situation worse.

Look for early warning signs of trouble, such as raised voices, pushing or shoving, cornering, trying to isolate a potential victim from the group and from help or witnesses, or ganging up. If the potential victim is incapacitated or feeling too intimidated to help her- or himself, these early signs can be solid indicators that nothing good is about to happen.

Intervene at the earliest point possible, preventing escalation. This is often the easiest moment in which to successfully change the dynamic.

Intervening does not necessarily mean confronting. Check out your options below.

Ask for help from others standing by. Group intervention may be safer than going solo. It is effective and the deterrent effect can be longer-lasting. It takes a village.

The 4 Ds:

Direct: Step up by stepping in to prevent or stop a problem. Remember the first guideline, though: do not put yourself or others around you at risk.

Delegate: There may be good reasons to not go direct. Seek help from someone with more authority to intervene.

Distract: Interrupting the situation without directly confronting the offender. This can be fun, even: "Hey, isn't that your car? You're getting a ticket." Then spirit away the victim. Be creative.

Delay: If none of the above seems like a good idea, then check in later with the victim. See if they need help, support, or someone to talk to or to assist them to get professional help

Understanding 911 & Emergency Reporting

FIRE CHIEF

CAL FIRE/RIVERSIDE COUNTY FIRE DEPARTMENT

Your pulse is fast, your hands are sweaty. You grab the phone and dial 911 because you need help NOW!

Whether this is the worst moment of your life, or just a report of something unusual, calling 911 can be stress inducing. Frequently, it is known as "siren anxiety." Understanding how the 911 system works and what to expect when you dial those three-numbers will ease some anxieties, knowing help is on the way.

If you have or see an emergency, one of the most important things you can do is immediately report the incident via 911. So, what should you know?

If you experience or see an emergency such as fire, medical, traffic collision, rescue or hazardous materials discharge, please immediately call 911. Don't worry about getting in trouble for calling 911. Only flagrant, repeat abusers of the system are criminally prosecuted. The 911 System is for you so that your family — you and every other citizen — can quickly reach emergency assistance.

Please, also don't believe you will get quicker service by directly calling a fire station. Doing so could be a very serious error. The fire station personnel may well not be at their fire station. They could be on another emergency, doing training, presenting a public education program or out for a multitude of other reasons.

Call 911. You will be assured of a professional swering your need.

On the mountain, 911 calls go the Primary Public Safety Answering Point, which is the Riverside County Sheriff's Department. If it is a law-enforcement emergency, the Primary PSAP will dispatch deputies to the call. If it is a fire, medical emergency, traffic collision, rescue or hazardous materials discharge, the Primary PSAP immediately transfers the call to the Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire Department Perris Emergency Command Center (Secondary PSAP), who also dispatches for the Idyllwild Fire Protection District.

This center is staffed 24 hours a day, every day of the week and year. Its dispatchers, certified by the International Academy of Emergency Dispatch, are ready to answer and process your call. Emergency resources are immediately sent to the incident.

For a medical emergency outside IFPD, the Perris ECC digitally transfers the patient's transport need to American Medical Response. Within IFPD, the Perris ECC dispatches a district ambulance. Last year, the Riverside County Fire Emergency Command Center received hundreds of thousands of phone calls and processed 158,613 incidents.

"Fire Department, what is the address of the emergency?" This is the first step to getting help fast. Fire communication dispatchers will first ask for location-specific information including:

What is the address or cross-streets of the emergency?

What city are you in?

Is this a house, apartment or business?



A Healthcare Heuristic ...

I am deviating from my plan to write more about the history of healthcare and the U.S. government because of Saturday's Campaign for Guaranteed Healthcare rallies, and offer this attempt to guide thinking about solving the problem of healthcare. I believe the conclusion follows logically from the statements, but you might reach a different conclusion if you don't agree with an item. If so, please write. We need to develop an informed electorate who communicates with our representatives; dialogue is one way to get there.


- No one can afford to be sick in America (well, almost no
- Therefore, if I get sick, someone who is healthy must pay for it (sorry, this means that men need to pay for maternity care, and women need to pay for prostate exams — we are not paying for our own care).
- The most cost-effective way for someone else to pay for it is for everyone else to pay for it.
- Insurance companies, even the so-called not-for-profit ones, make money by denying care, unlike Medicare, whose sole purpose is to pay for healthcare. Why should shareholders profit from illness?
- Although Americans do not like being told what to do by the government, why do we have less problem being told what to do by United Healthcare, Cigna, BC/BS and other companies we don't vote for. Nevertheless, Medicare is extremely popular (77 percent in a recent poll) and paying for healthcare with a payroll tax works well. (An estimate for Medicare-for-All puts that tax at 3.3 percent, much lower than the 7 to 12 percent businesses spend when they provide health insurance).
- Americans change jobs about every four years. Tying health insurance to employment no longer makes sense.
- Healthcare is too expensive and costs are rising too quickly so regulation of costs is necessary. Cutting out the middleman (there are almost twice as many health-insurance workers as physicians in the U.S.), negotiating drug and other prices, and shifting care away from the emergen-
- Having a single system will improve data collection so we will have a better idea about what works, what doesn't and support to family caregivers who face challenges manand what it costs. Science-driven medicine is better medi-
- Improved Medicare-for-All, the only rational solution, is not socialized medicine and it would not limit choice of physician, hospital or other provider. The government would not be in charge of your healthcare, just in charge of paying for it.

More history next time; imagine what President Nixon proposed!

Legislature ratifies road-repair revenue plan

Governor will sign bill

It only took one week, after announcing an agreement to finance major repair and maintenance of California's road and highway systems, for the Legislature to enact Senate Bill 1 on Thursday night.

Over the next 10 years, SB 1 will generate annually about \$5.2 billion in new revenue. All these funds will be for road and highway-construction maintenance.

The sources of the new funds will be a combination of a 12-cent gasoline tax increase, a 20-cent increase in diesel excise tax, a 5.75-percent increase of the diesel sales taxes, a fee on a car's valuation and a \$100 fee for zero-emission cars.

The gasoline tax will be effective Nov. 1, 2017. The zero-emission vehicle fee will start July 1, 2020.

These revenue increases required at least a twothirds majority of both houses for the bill to pass. The Senate voted 27-11, and the Assembly passed the bill 54-

The new revenue measures are estimated to cost the average vehicle owner about \$10 a month.

While Gov. Jerry Brown and legislative leaders were happy with the results, some who opposed the new taxes expressed disappointment with additional taxes. One of these was local Sen. Jeff Stone.

"Senate Bill 1 hurts the working poor and middle class families, the very people Democrats in the Legis-

lature always say they are trying to protect," he said in a press release after the vote. "Yes, our roads are falling apart. Yes, our streets need repair.

If this Legislature simply had the courage to use money that we collect from our taxpayers to pay for the programs we promised the people that money would be spent on, we wouldn't be in this position."

Riverside County will be a beneficiary of the new road funds. Sen. Richard Roth, a Riverside Democrat, was unsure how he would vote on SB 1. But after several meetings with the governor and the bill's sponsors, Roth eventually supported the bill.

After its passage, he and Assembly member Sabrina Cervantes (D-Corona), released the following statement, ""For too long, Sacramento has failed to provide Inland Southern California with the resources we deserve. Though this was a difficult vote, the cost of our region not getting its fair share is too high. That is why we went to the table to ensure Inland Southern California's needs are represented with the vigor and dedication they de-

The negotiations resulted in an agreement of funding for the following Riverside County highway projects:

- Highway 91/Interstate 15 North Connector: \$180
- I-15/Limonite Interchange: \$48 million
- McKinley Grade Separation: \$84.45 million

Also, the governor will support legislation to reimburse the cities of Eastvale, Jurupa Valley, Menifee and Wildomar for the vehicle license fee funding, which has been denied them for several years.

Protect yourself from fraud

The Riverside County Code Enforcement Department offers several tips to protect yourself from fraud.

Verify any employee of a government agency or public utility before providing them with personal information or access to your property.

Code Enforcement Officers:

- always wear uniforms
- always carry a photo identification card
- always drive a clearly marked vehicle always allow you to verify their identity
- never request or accept money

The best practice for verifying the identity of an employee of a government agency or public utility is to find the phone number of the agency by using a telephone directory or web site and call that number to verify the employee. You should not ask the employee what number to call. Make sure you are calling a published number for that agency.

Daniel Ellis pleads guilty to possessing stolen property

32-month state prison sentence imposed

Daniel Ellis, 24, of Mountain Center, pleaded guilty to a felony charge of receiving a stolen Kawasaki motorcycle. He was sentenced to two years and eight months in state prison.

Ellis was arrested in October and had several subsequent arrests, including one Jan. 9, also for possession of a stolen Kawasaki Ninja motorcycle, before pleading guilty on Monday, April 3. Besides the August charge, Ellis also pleaded guilty

to two other separate felony arrests and charges, includ-

ing the January arrest, and a December misdemeanor for vandalism. For the original arrest, Judge Mark Mandio sentenced Ellis to state prison for 32 months. For the other convictions, he was sentenced to two separate 16-month terms, which are to be served concurrently with the longer term. For the vandalism conviction, Mandio imposed a 32-day sentence; but Ellis was credited for the time he

But my kids don't have a credit card, house or car. Why should I check their credit report?

Because somebody else could be using your child's personal information. Once a child's — or anyone's Social Security number is stolen, it can be used by identity thieves.

Checking to see if your child has a credit history, and then thoroughly reviewing it when they turn 16, can help you spot signs of identity theft. If you find false or inaccurate information, you'll have time to correct it before your child applies for a job, a loan for college or a car, or tries to get a credit card or a place to live.

Generally, children won't have credit reports unless someone is using their information for fraud.

Physician speaks out for single-payer healthcare

Insurers not salvation for private-sector health services

Dr. Thomas Kluzak, a retired physician from Wichita and former head of the University of Kansas Medical School's Pathology Department, spoke Saturday at the Idyllwild Library about a single-payer health insurance system. Kluzak is passionately in favor of a single-payer

A single-payer system is often referred to a "Medicare for All." A single public or quasi-public agency organizes healthcare financing but the delivery of the care remains largely in private hands, according to the Physicians for a National Health Program.

"Practicing medicine and seeing what happens to people, the current system makes no sense," he stated. We need 'Medicare for All'."

He questions why the public accepts a "single-payer" system for police and fire protection, but opposes the concept for healthcare.

Hospitals with emergency rooms must accept, as a patient, someone with complaints regardless of whether they have insurance. In this limited instance, we are already paying for everyone's care, Kluzak noted.

A single-payer system will benefit not only individuals, with or without insurance, but doctors, too, in Kluzak's opinion. His strong feelings about this topic evolved over 30 years of looking through a microscope at the healthcare system.

"Essentially, we remove the intermediary — insurance companies — and create a savings," he said. Administrative costs for Medicare are about 2 percent. For most insurance companies, administrative expenses approach or exceed 30 percent. These include advertising

and sales staff. In addition, doctors and hospitals maintain administrative staff to submit bills and respond to insurance inquiries.

"Drug companies pay more on marketing and administration than research," Kluzak said.

Besides the substantial financial savings, which Kluzak foresees, the quality of medical care will improve, too. No longer will insurance administrative staff have approval over your physician's recommendations and actions caring for your health.

Not only will it eliminate the time insurance staff need to review and advise on the doctor's orders, but will likely lead to elimination of excessive tests needed to justify a doctor's decision.

Kluzak's opinion is not an aberrant view among the medical professions. He is a PNHP member. A nonprofit research and education organization, PNHP is composed of more than 20,000 physicians who advocate a single-payer health system.

He and PNHP stress that a single-payer system is not "socialized medicine." The doctors and hospitals remain private. They receive their compensation from the single-payer. Currently, payments come from a multitude of sources, including Medicare, Medicaid and private insurance companies.

Rep. John Conyers (D-MI) has authored House of Representatives 676, a bill to establish a single-payer system for the U.S. It authorizes a privately delivered, but publicly funded, universal healthcare system. He argues that the U.S. healthcare costs are double the costs in other countries with single-payer systems such as France, Germany and Canada.

Kluzak and his wife, Kathy, have been Idyllwild residents since January 2016. The uprooted Kansans followed their son and grandchildren to California. They found Idyllwild and are only a few hours from their fami-

Do you know whom Marion Mountain was named for?

Dave Hunt, a regular participant in "So you think you know the Hill" was the first to answer, followed by two more correct answers.

"Marion Mountain was named after Marion Kelly by Edmund Perkins Jr. who surveyed and mapped the San Jacinto Mountains in the 1890s. Marion was a teacher from Michigan who taught at the Morongo Indian Reservation. They met while she was camping and fell in love :)," wrote Hunt.

Mark Dean wrote, "Found this on Wikipedia." These peaks were named in 1897 by USGS topographer Edmund Taylor Perkins, Jr. Perkins named Jean Peak for his sweetheart and future bride, Jean Waters of Plumas County, whom he married in 1903. He named Marion Mountain after Marion Kelly, his girlfriend, a teacher for the Indian Bureau at the Morongo Valley Reservation. According to a local legend, Perkins spent the summer of 1897 deciding which woman to marry while he conducted his topographical survey of San Jacinto Peak and its environs.[6]

The reference refers to "The San Jacintos," a masterful history book of our area by John W. Robinson and Bruce D. Risher.

And finally, our local renowned historian Bob Smith gave us even more information: "According to John Robinson, topographer Edmund Perkins, who directed the first careful survey of the San Jacintos in 1897-98, named Marion Mountain 'for Marion Kelly of White Cloud, Michigan, a young school teacher employed at the Morongo Indian Reservation. Perkins met her when she was camped with friends in Strawberry Valley. The story goes that Miss Kelly fell deeply in love with Perkins, who was described as tall and good-looking, but he kept putting her off by saying he was married to his work. But he did think enough of the young woman to place her name on the mountain.' He goes on to say that Marion Mountain's neighboring summit, Jean Peak, Perkins named for Jean Waters, whom he married in 1903.

"P.S. Perhaps somebody could convince the county (?) to correct the spelling of 'Marian View Drive'?"

Hazardous waste collection

The Riverside County Department of Waste Resources has scheduled a free household hazardous-waste collection event on in Idyllwild from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, April 29, at the County Road Yard. The collection is open to all Riverside County residents.

The event will accept residentially generated household hazardous wastes. Waste from businesses or nonprofits will not be accepted.

Typical wastes include used motor oil, paint, antifreeze, household and automotive batteries, pesticides, cleaning products, sharps (needles/syringes or lancets), unused medication (except controlled substances), fluorescent lamps, and electronic wastes such as televisions, computers, VCRs and telephones. Limit the amount of waste transported to no more than 15 gallons, or 125 pounds maximum per vehicle. Individual containers should be no larger than five gallons nor weigh more than 50 pounds.

The collection will not accept explosives, radioactive material, ammunition, asbestos, compressed-gas cylinders over 40 pounds, or infectious or medical waste other than sharps.



IAA senior among 10 percent admitted to Swarthmore

IAA curriculum demands both talent and brains

There is a shared anxiety for high school seniors as they wait to hear whether they're been admitted to the college or colleges of their choice.

There is a once-in-a-lifetime moment when they receive their first acceptance. And for a few, there is the added thrill when that acceptance comes from their first

Idyllwild Arts Academy senior Sumi Onoe received early acceptance from her first choice, Swarthmore College. Swarthmore admitted only 10 percent of applying freshmen this year and has long been known as one of the most prestigious and demanding liberal arts colleges in the United States.

Although a music major at an arts academy, trained in classical and jazz piano, and jazz guitar, Sumi chose to attend a liberal arts college known for its broad-based curricula and rigorous academic standards rather than follow a music conservatory or arts-centered university

Her choice highlights a common misperception about the IAA curriculum. Although admitted based on demonstrated ability in one or several arts disciplines, IAA students must also excel in strict academic curricula. If accepted to arts programs at major universities, IAA students also must qualify academically in order to be admitted.

IAA academic classes occupy students' mornings and arts classes their afternoons. If they are performers, evenings often involve rehearsals. If they are visual artists, students spend their evenings in studios, working on their art. It is not unusual for a typical IAA school day to begin with classes at 8:30 a.m. and conclude with rehearsals finishing before a 10 p.m. in-dorm curfew.

What makes Sumi's Swarthmore choice even more extraordinary is that when she came to IAA from Japan, her conversational English was rudimentary. "I had studied English grammar in Japan beginning in first grade, but there was not much training in conversation." Sumi related that her parents had at first wanted her to come to the U.S. to study English for a year. Since she had studied classical piano from the age of 6 and guitar from the age of 14, Sumi told her parents she would prefer to study at a U.S. school that had a strong music program. She started at IAA in jazz guitar, then began studying classical piano with faculty member Dr. Jeanette Louise Yaryan. One year at IAA turned into three.

Sumi is finishing her senior year with a flourish. Not only was she a key part of the winning Idyllwild Arts septet at the Berklee High School Jazz Festival, she also received a coveted acknowledgement for Outstanding Musicianship at the festival, one of two top individual awards.

She played George Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue" with full orchestra, exhibiting strength, style and elegance at the recent Black History Concert at the academy's new William M. Lowman Concert Hall.

Sumi is modest, graceful and articulate. "I'm interested in engineering," she said. "I've always liked math and science. And the school [Swarthmore], founded by Quakers, has Quaker values of community and equality.

Sumi related that after visiting the school last summer, she felt an immediate connection when she saw Swarthmore's outdoor amphitheater, which looked very much like the one on the IAA campus. "All the concerts on campus are free, just as they are at Idyllwild Arts."

Sumi noted that in their freshman year, students are graded "pass/fail," allowing them to try a variety of courses to better choose areas of concentration. "They do have a music program and great practice rooms with

Steinway pianos," she said. "Also, you can audition for the music faculty to help find and pay for private teachers in New York City or elsewhere. I'm hoping to do a double major incorporating music and something else," she said. "That's really possible at Swarthmore."

Sumi had also applied to Stanford, Northwestern, University of Michigan and Carnegie Mellon University but committed early to Swarthmore, her first choice. She is graduating from IAA with a 4.19 GPA.

American impressionist Robert Ferguson opens studio in Pinyon Pines

'My paintings are windows into a place in time'

Robert Ferguson is a contemporary impressionist painter in the mode of Claude Monet, Edgar Degas and Paul Cézanne. He is opening a studio in Pinyon Pines that backs onto national forest land with an unobstructed view of the mountains and a light-enriched environment.

Ferguson's paintings are rich with color, as were those of the old impressionist masters. "It's about the color of the air and the light," said Ferguson, noting that working outdoors in his new Pinyon Pines studio environment ("en plein air" in painter parlance) is a tonic for the soul.

Ferguson recalled that often, when showing at art fairs, he overhears potential patrons saying, "Let's go into the 'gallery," meaning into his booth of impressionist oil paintings. They ask who did them and when he answers that he is the painter, they respond, "Oh, you're alive?"

It's an amusing story but indicative of the fact that Ferguson's more than 2,000 career paintings do recall a style reminiscent of another time — from the late 19th century to early 20th century.

Said Ferguson of his work, "If it is a true impressionist painting, the eye will gravitate to the light. My paintings are windows into a place in time. Two hundred years from now I want people to view my works and experience what I experienced while creating them."

Schooled at Parsons School of Design in New York, La Mesa (San Diego) native Ferguson quickly became a noted graphic designer and art director in Manhattan. But after a visit to the Metropolitan Museum on Fifth Avenue in Manhattan, Ferguson saw a brochure he had created, and was especially proud of, lying in the gutter, having been rained on and repeatedly stomped on. "It was an epiphany," he said, and at that moment, he decided to move back to the West Coast and commit himself to a career in fine art.

"It was a five-year transition," he said, noting that it took a while to become financially successful in fine art after leaving his high-end and secure NYC art director career. "I painted my first plein-air painting in Blue Sky Canyon in Rancho Bernardo," he remembered. "It was a tree and a path. It was too green with not enough color," he said. But from then on, it was an upward career arc.

"People like my work and want to own it," he said. "My paintings only have value based on how much joy they can bring to others. I've done over 2,000 paintings. I number each of them on the back and write where I was when I painted them."

Ferguson has researched his ancestry and found he was related to Winston Churchill and Jane Austin, among others. "Knowing my ancestry explained my work to me," said Ferguson. "I'm always the most traditional and conservative painter at art shows." And echoing a statement of Churchill who was a prolific painter and believed success came from creating a body of work, Ferguson joked, "I am prolific enough to be important."

Ferguson's studio opening is from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, April 22 and 23, at 69250 Indio Avenue in Pinyon Pines. Flamenco guitarist Milton Merlos plays from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. There is a \$5 admission charge that entitles entrants to win one of three signed prints and one of Ferguson's paintings. Twenty percent of proceeds from art sales at the opening will be given to the California Desert Arts Council to fund its education mission. To view Ferguson's work, visit www.fergusonart.com.

IAA sophomore Alex Bishop wins national poetry award

She is next speaker at Idy Talks

Idyllwild Arts Academy sophomore Alex Bishop, creative writing major, is the next speaker at the academy-sponsored Idy Talks. The series is part of IAA's "Art in Society" program designed to foster students' commitment to using their art to contribute to society.

Alex's talk is timely. She just won a prestigious national award from the Poetry Society of America, the nation's oldest literary organization devoted to poetry. Founded in 1910 in New York City, past members of PSA have included Robert Frost, Langston Hughes, Edna St. Vincent Millay, Marianne Moore and Wallace Stevens.

Alex won PSA's annual Louise Louis/Emily F. Bourne Student Award for best student poem of 2017. The PSA's annual awards are among the most prestigious honors available to poets. They offer emerging and established poets recognition at all stages of their careers.

Alex is thoughtful and gracious. She answers questions about herself and her art clearly and articulately. She noted that, as a child emerging from her parents' difficult divorce, her writing, always in poetry, was personal and self-revealing. "Writing has helped me with so many issues in my life," she said. "Then, as I moved beyond the divorce, I began to be comfortable in my own issues of coming out and transgender identity."

Alex said she had originally planned to attend a traditional prep school such as Cate [in Carpenteria] or Thatcher [in Ojai] but that she felt an immediate "click" and connection when she toured the IAA campus. "I had this gut feeling, a 'click' in the sense that this is where I belong," she confided. Now in her second year at IAA, Alex said her gut instinct has proven to be correct. "It's fantastic here," she said. "This is not a polarized environment. The students are very accepting, of gay, transgender, anything. It's easy for students to be here, without having to be defensive, and simply concentrate on their art. "

Alex won for her poem "Ever Met a Human Spork?" For those who don't know what a spork is, it is a hybrid eating utensil combining the elements of both spoon and fork. In her poem, Alex opens a window into how it is to feel duality of identity.

She states in her poem's opening lines who she was, is and is becoming. "It's having short hair after private school; it's hiding tubes of mascara atop bathroom cupboards; it's two dollar razors; it's not singing happy birthday when you turn thirteen because of thicker vocal chords; it's waiting for people to walk out of the restroom before walking in and then rushing through your makeup; it's the fear of gaining weight; it's the fear of losing weight; it's gaining five pounds on your stomach not your hips; it's dressing androgynous because you can't fill out the tops, and then claiming it's that you just have an avant-garde fashion sense..."

But it's at the end of her poem that Alex, who appears to have a studied and assured poise and sense of self, shows the emotional cost of her brave journey: "...it's always being the big spoon; it's wearing crop tops because your stomach is the only part of yourself you like, and yet still feel bloated; it's deleting Instagram comments from people who think you're disgusting; it's associating duct tape with pain; it's having a life expectancy of twenty-eight."

Asked about poetry as her medium of choice, Alex said, "It's because poetry [compared to other literary forms] does not have any guidelines. When you begin to impose guidelines you realize they don't apply." She talked of an IAA course last year, "Poetry Experiments" taught by Alice Bolin, in which she realized how many different types of poems there are and can be. "Now I have a catalogue of references," she said. "With all that has been done before, why don't I try something new?"

As to what comes next, after graduation from IAA, she deferred, saying she has not decided. "Idyllwild Arts provides such a strong foundation you can later choose the direction you want to go," Alex noted. "I'm also interested in





The Riverside County Department of Waste Resources will make good, reusable household products available for free to residents and businesses through the new Drop & Shop stores at the Lamb Canyon Landfill in Beaumont and Badlands Landfill in Moreno Valley.

Many products collected through the Household Hazardous Waste Collection program are in good or unused condition and can be reused instead of processed for disposal. The Drop & Shop program is open from 6 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturdays at both landfills.

Shoppers may take home used household, yard- and car-care products for free. Availability varies but may include: paint, cleaners, pool-, spa-, lawn-care and automotive products. Residents also may drop off common wastes like antifreeze, batteries, paint and used motor oil, and shop for free products at the same location. The program is funded by a grant from the Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery.

Brendan Steele finished with a fine 3-under-par 69 in the Masters on Sunday. The Idyllwild native opened birdie-birdie in his last round, eventually posting seven birdies on the day. Unfortunately, they were blunted by two double bogeys, one on each nine. For the tournament, he posted a 3-over-par 74-73-75-69 — 291 to earn a tie for 27th place.

He now has 960 FedExCup points and stands 10th on that list, and he remains in 56th position on the Official World Golf Ranking. It is important that Brendan be in the top 30 on the FedExCup list and the top 50 on the OWGR for entry into post-season tournaments, as well as major and other high-level tournaments during each

Brendan did a very cool thing for his fans this last week. He kept a Masters Diary in the form of videos, one each day beginning with his Monday arrival. He made seven diary entries, only a few minutes each, which really capture the flavor of his experience at Masters week.
