Laser show on Tahquitz

Issues are prior consultation, permits and tradition

The Fourth of July laser show on Tahquitz Rock was a first. And now it's history. Intended as a memorial to a wife who loved fireworks, the show sparked comments positive and negative from Idyllwild residents.

For many, especially those who posted on Facebook, the laser show was a spectacular success, a first-time home run.

Some loved the flash and sparkle of the laser show as a modern-day technological marvel and substitute for fireworks that are prohibited in the forest. Some thought the images were not well thought out, and were randomly projected without a cohesive script that told a story, either about Idyllwild and the mountain or about the Fourth of July.

Some felt the show was not in keeping with Idyllwild's homespun and low-key celebrations. They cited the Fourth of July parade and Christmas Tree Lighting ceremonies as the kinds of home-town-produced and simple celebrations that could have been held 100 years ago in any small town in America.

Some thought the laser show, by comparison, was a sophisticated big-city import from Los Angeles, out of keeping with Idyllwild's small-town vibe.

For some, the inaugural laser show was a precursor to even larger laser celebrations in the future — good for local commerce and bringing more off-Hill visitors to Idyllwild. For others, the flow of cars scurrying throughout the village to find the perfect vantage point to view the show was reminiscent of the disruptive onslaught of off-Hill snow-play visitors.

For some, the show was a beautiful tribute from a loving husband to a cherished wife and should be acknowledged and appreciated for that reason. For others, it seemed a decision and project made without adequate consultation within the wider community.

Some thought the show had been vandalized because of green beams that preceded and seemed to delay the show. Show funder

Chic Fojtik explained, "The green beams shooting out across the valley were to draw attention to the rock and probably caused more confusion and distraction."

For Native Americans, Tahquitz towers over their ancestral grounds and is and has always been a source of great power and energy. It is energy held in precarious balance and is not to be trifled with or treated disrespectfully, according to Cahuilla elder Kim Marcus.

"Tahquitz was a great shaman and helped the Cahuilla, but misused his powers," recounted Marcus. "There is great power in the rock, and it is has been held in balance for many years. For us, it is a sacred site. To disrespect that power and our traditions will cause a disruption in the balance of power and there will be consequences."

When some residents raised the issue of Tahquitz's sacred status to Native Americans, other residents dismissed those concerns summarily, noting that native people have not lived in Idyllwild for more than 130 years.

Gerald Clarke, Cahuilla tribal member

and former head of the Visual Arts Department at Idyllwild Arts Academy and current teacher of Native American history at University of California, Riverside, noted, "There's a whole tribal life that continues in Idyllwild but it goes unseen. We come to gather our acorns and visit our ancestral grounds."

Clarke thought, as did Marcus, that the consultative process with Native Americans was too brief and was more afterthought than respectful dialogue.

Clarke stressed Native American objections to the laser show on Tahquitz had nothing to do with halting a Fourth of July celebration. "We're patriots, too," he said. "My dad, uncle and great uncles served in the U.S. military. The Cahuilla elder I learned our songs from was a master sergeant in the Army."

"There's a time and a place for everything, and this just wasn't it." Asked if the show could have been projected on another surface, one not considered sacred to the Cahuilla, Clarke noted that was a possibility that could

County approves Idyllwild Fire request for property tax advance

At its May 23 meeting, the Idyllwild Fire Protection District's commission approved a resolution requesting that Riverside County grant the district an advance of its December property tax receipts.

The request is for \$400,000, the same amount as the 2016 request. The district and county have agreed to an advance for

each fall since 2011.

From July through the middle of December, the district's cash flow is limited to ambulance collections because it receives no property tax or assessments during that period.

With the advance from the county, bills are more easily paid and the December revenue reimburses the county for the advance and small fee of about \$3,350.

Private drones affect the fighting of Lake Mathews fire

The late afternoon of July 4th, the Eagle Fire started near Lake Mathews in Riverside County. It burned 205 acres and was fully contained 24 hours later on July 5.

While no structures

were threatened or an evacuation warning issued, firefighters were endangered during the incident.

According to Riverside County Fire Department, two privately owned drones flew over the fire area. The first drone necessitated withdrawing aerial firefight-

ing equipment. During the lapse of air craft, after equipment had returned to Ryan Air Attack Base in Hemet, a second drone was seen over the fire area.

County fire officials were concerned about firefighter safety and efforts to fight fires. They stressed, "Aerial fire-

fighting aircraft, such as air tankers and helicopters, fly at very low altitudes; sometimes just a few hundred feet above the ground ... Drones flying in or near a fire or incident where aircraft is working present a critical life safety hazard; not only to the public, but to the firefight-

ers in the air and on the ground working tirelessly to extinguish these fires."

Once again, fire officials are asking the public to keep drones out of the air space needed to fight fires.

The Federal Aviation Administration requires testing and reg-

istration of most drones. Similar to a crime tip line, those who have information about irresponsible drone operators who have flown close to disasters and emergencies can call 1-844-DRONE11 (1-844-376-6311). This telephone line is not for reporting emergencies.

be further investigated.

Clarke and Marcus felt the conversation about the proposed show could have started sooner and involved more input from the tribes. Clarke said, "It's our belief system that there is no hurry but you must give it [decisions] true consideration."

Said Marcus, "This is another example of the dominant culture dictating over us again, creating more separation between people. This [Tahquitz] is a site that many of us still believe is sacred."

For Fojtik, who launched and totally funded this expensive project, this was a labor of love and not intended to offend anyone. Fojtik admitted the consultation within the Idyllwild community and with the Native American tribal communi-

ties could have been done more thoroughly. He said he and co-producer Gary Kucher had made initial attempts to consult with the tribes but perhaps could have done more before the show.

He noted he and Kucher moved quickly to get the project mounted so that people could then judge the result, rather than have massive push-back before the first event was even produced.

Fojtik said he initially didn't fully appreciate the Native American objections since the inspiration for this show had been a laser show he and his wife Pamela had seen in Egypt. The show was projected

on one of the world's most historic and iconic sites — the Great Pyramid of Giza with initial sponsorship by the Egyptian government, dating back to the time of Gamal Abdel Nasser.

Fojtik also referenced a 2015 projection of a laser show on the façade of St. Peter's Basilica at the Vatican, one that highlighted the dangers facing the world from rapid climate change. The multi-million dollar show titled "Fiat Lux: Illuminating Our Common Home" was created and funded by climate-change partisans and population-control advocates with the goal to "educate and inspire change around the climate crisis across generations, cultures, languages, religions and class." Catholic leaders pushed back, calling the show sacrilegious. They were outraged that Pope Francis had ap-

proved such an insult to a sacred site.

Fojtik noted that with any project, no matter how well-intended or meritorious, there are always some who object. "I couldn't really accept their [tribal] argument that the lighting would somehow be sacrilegious while people climb on it [Tahquitz] and the [Native American] casinos make money from people with gambling addictions."

He said any future show would have to be managed by someone else, perhaps a nonprofit. But the \$10,000 cost might be a bit much for the village to manage, especially given objections from some within the community, and questions over whether adequate permitting processes were followed prior to the event.

Pickleball will have a permanent Idyllwild home

The fastest growing sport in the United States

Despite the peculiar name, pickleball is nothing to sneeze at or derisively dismiss. It is the fastest-growing sport in America. Since its founding in 1965 by Washington State Congressman Joel Pritchard, the paddle- and net-based sport has exploded in popularity. It is played in all 50 states at over 4,000 locations and has its own corporate brand and sponsor, the USA Pickleball Association.

Now, as recently announced by the Idyllwild Community Center board, pickleball will have a permanent Idyllwild home and be listed on the USAPA's website "Places to Play" map.

Given that Idyllwild is a dog-loving town with a dog for a mayor, pickleball is especially appropriate here. The sport was allegedly named after the Pritchard's dog Pickles who, during games, would chase the ball and run off with it, repeatedly interrupting the first matches of the nascent sport.

The San Jacinto Mountain Community Center board, ICC's parent, announced that pickleball courts will be built at the Idyllwild Pines Camp and Conference Center, adjacent to two other Idyllwild Pines-hosted and ICC-managed recreational venues — the Idyllwild Skate Park and the Rick Barker Dog Park.

According to the board's press release, ICC signed a three-year lease with Idyllwild Pines to allow construction of permanent courts on the camp's land.

Phase one of the Community Center's construction would have displaced pickleball play during construction on the ICC site. Final plans for all Community Center project phases would not have left enough flat land on the ICC site to accommodate an adequate pickleball playing area. "When it became obvious that the pickleball program would be displaced for the entire time of construction on the ICC site, the board was proactive in making certain that there would be a resolution that would be in the best interests of the pickleball players whose number has grown under the leadership of Barry Wallace," noted the ICC press release.

The courts will cost \$49,480, with \$20,000 coming from county funds (Developer Agreement Fee Regional Parks Fund), \$20,000 from ICC funds, and anticipated "volunteer efforts to close any [construction funding] gaps that remain." Said SJMCC President Janice Lyle, "This is a successful example of how a community can quietly work with public and private sources to resolve an issue and fulfill a demonstrated need."

Pickleball's rapid growth is attributed to its popularity with seniors, and within retirement communities, community centers, YMCA facilities and physical-education classes.

The Sports and Fitness Industry Association estimated there were 2.5-million pickleball adherents in 2016. SFIA is the premier trade association for top brands, manufacturers, retailers and marketers in the sporting goods and fitness industry. Core (regular and devoted) players were 73 percent male and 27 percent female. Seventy-five percent of core players were 55 years of age or older with the largest demographic, 42.7 percent, 65 or older.

Wallace, ICC board member, has been the driving force behind launching pickleball as an Idyllwild recreation staple. A physical-education teacher by profession and an avowed "racquet ball junkie," Wallace, with the help of Robert Priefer and support from ICC, installed three pickleball courts on the existing tennis courts on the ICC site. "I started it, but once installed, it just took off. The community grew the game as I knew it would."

Asked about the permanent courts to be built on the IP site, Wallace said, "I'm happy as can be. Pickleball is a social sport, not dog-eat-dog like some other sports. When people play, they leave happy and smiling."

ICC Phase 1 construction, originally scheduled to begin this summer, has been delayed. The delay allows pickleball to be played throughout the summer at the ICC site. Construction of permanent courts on the Idyllwild Pines Camp will begin as soon as the county issues final plan approval. "Regardless of the ICC [construction] timetable, we'll get going on the Idyllwild Pines site as soon as possible," said Wallace. He said he anticipates no interruption of play for pickleball players. "We're going to go first class with this," he said, "to make tournament-ready courts." Construction also will include bleachers, storage kiosks and fencing.

Wallace noted there are 50 to 60 local players on the pickleball player list Ron Perry maintains. Wallace anticipates the number of local players will grow when permanent courts at Idyllwild Pines expand available pickleball playing time. Currently, on the ICC site, pickleball is played only in the morning because of playground use in the afternoon.

Wallace said he would offer to teach the game to younger Idyllwild Pines campers. The new courts will be available for Idyllwild Pines' use as well as for Idyllwild locals.

Dorothy once made fresh-squeezed orange juice for the King of Tonga who was visiting San Diego and their dealership. She was known for her wonderful, delicious oranges and contributed thousands of them to be included in sack lunches distributed by Interfaith Community Services in Escondido.

Dorothy used to make little gift bags with candy, hot chocolate, dog balls, etc., for Chris' guests at Silver Pines Lodge. They helped with the annual Christmas dinner for almost 20 years, and Dorothy, Tom and Chris' sister Debbie were partners with Chris in obtaining and refurbishing Creekstone Inn. She loved Idyllwild and supported Chris in everything she did.

Dorothy is survived by her loving husband Tom Hawthorne; three of their six children Brian Thomas (Suzy) Hawthorne, Debbie (Tee) Hawthorne Ness and Christine (Steve) Hawthorne Perreault; 10 grandchildren; and 13 great-grandchildren.

For years, I've been fascinated by what is called "the placebo effect," thinking of the benefits in consciously harnessing and directing this phenomenal capacity.

In the 1970s, when I was trained as a registered nurse, nurses were encouraged to value the placebo effect as normal and positive. Placebo was not a dirty word for us. We regarded it as a powerful ally and our very manner of bedside nursing was meant to enhance placebo effects.

Truth is, all of us are elegantly designed to self-heal. It isn't mumbo-jumbo, it's just the way it is; a scientifically demonstrable fact. Harvard Medical School's Dr. Ted Kaptchuk states that brain-imaging studies bring "... good preliminary evidence that describes the hardwiring of the placebo effect—that is, the impact of symbolic treatment, and how it's mediated through the neurobi-

YOU PASSED YOUR INSPECTION! ...

By the time this article is published, the Hill will have more than 90 percent of its inspection compliance with PRC 4291 completed. This is great news for all of us!

A number of properties are still being abated through Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council, which is excellent because that's the reason we're here. In the event you've been thinking about calling us to arrange a free inspection and abatement estimate, this is definitely the time to do it. We have the grant money to help you out and the active part of our year-long fire season is definitely here.

After you have passed your inspection, the key is to keep your property in compliance. Most Hill residents know that this part is not easy and is even more difficult for part-time residents.

Most homes are lost in wildfires by spot fires (caused by ember cast) finding a path to the structure. This "path" is usually pine needles or dry grass that leads up to the house. The fire creeps up to the structure, gets established in wood siding or a deck and then takes down the house very quickly. The roof and rain gutters also are places for needle cast to accumulate and become very receptive to hot embers.

After your property is abated, there are two recurring issues. The roof (including gutters) must be kept clean and the first 10 feet around all structures must be kept raked down to mineral soil.

The problem is, you rake, the wind blows and it all comes back! It's the price we pay for the lifestyle we live.

Firefighters have decisions to make about which homes they make an effort to save and which homes they drive by in a wildfire. This is because they have very little time to spend at each house. If five engines are assigned to protect 30 homes in an area, there is no time for them to do your abatement for you.

Engine companies do what's called "bump and run." It means they check your house, put out any small fires they find and move on to the next house. The goal is to save the maximum number of homes as possible while maximizing firefighter safety. The abated homes are the ones that get the most attention.

There will never be enough fire engines to have one at every house during a large wildfire so we, as homeowners, owe the fire departments our best effort to make them successful at our property.

Success is not always guaranteed in a wildfire. The idea is to tip the odds in your favor through your abatement, your neighbor's abatement and our fire agencies keeping up maintenance on their fuelbreaks.

From Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council, thank you to all those putting forth the effort to make our communities as safe as possible!

Robert Hewitt seeks re-election to Pine Cove Water board

Editor's note: Four directors for the Pine Cove Water District are on the August mail-in ballot. The terms for three — Board President Robert Hewitt, Joel Palmer and Lou Padula — expire in December. They and challenger Jeffery Kleefisch are on the ballot for four-year terms.

The fourth director, Vicki Jakubac, replaced Tim Lange, who was elected in the August 2015 election and resigned in March 2016. She is unchallenged for the final two years of Lange's term.

Ahead of the election, the Town Crier will interview the four PCWD candidates over the next several weeks.

The interviews begin with Robert Hewitt who was originally appointed to the board in 2012. He was elected to a four-year term in 2013 and has served as president since 2015.

Hewitt moved to Idyllwild in 2010. He is a retired battalion chief for the Los Angeles County Fire Department, where he served for 35 years. He currently serves on the County Service Area 38 Advisory Committee and is a volunteer at Animal Rescue Friends of Idyllwild.

What are your thoughts about the district's goals for the next 12 months?

As we have discussed at board meetings, I want to continue our improvement of the district's infrastructure. We have several plans to replace water mains and the addition of several fire hydrants.

Locating the hydrants nearer the district's border will improve the fire protection for all.

Also, I look forward to the relationship with our customers.

I expect and will encourage the board to continue its collegial working relationship, especially our efforts to analyze issues, discuss them at meetings and improve the district's service.

What are your thoughts about the district's goals for the next four years?

We need to replace one or two vehicles in this period and continue the replacement of aging mainline piping. I don't see the need for any well digging.

We will continue to improve our service to customers and account for every gallon of water.

Why do you want to serve another term?

For the same reason that I initially wanted to serve. I wanted to make my experience in the fire service available to the community of Pine Cove. One way that I use this is service on CSA 38.

With my fire background, I have an understanding for water systems and their use. Once involved, I learned more about our responsibility to the customers. And I enjoy the challenges to better serve the community.

The state just came out of a historic drought. Do you believe PCWD can withstand another drought? Or what should the district do to mitigate the effects of another drought?

One of my priorities with the other directors is the promotion of water conservation. The principles of conservation apply whether we're in a drought or not.

That is the number one program we need to press.

Given the nature of our system of wells, we were still in a very good [water] position in the height of the recent drought. Pine Cove Water is in an outstanding position to withstand another drought.

We will review and discuss our plans to increased resources if an extended drought were to re-occur. We'll study ideas.

The nature of our system and the focus of past general managers and staff has put us in a really good place and it's easy to feel comfortable.

But we're not sitting on our laurels. We need to plan for the next one.

Water production, through May, is the greatest since 2007. Are you worried about the conservation ethic dying or leaks in the system?

The loss figures, discussed at our meetings, are always a consideration for me and other directors. They are always mentioned during the general manager's report and primarily somewhat discouraging.

But the increased production is also attributable to an increase in population [within the district].

The staff has checked meters to be sure we're not losing water. We've bought new leak-detection equipment for the staff to evaluate the distribution system.

As an agency, we're doing all we can to maximize how to account for water. I don't believe the customers are falling back on conservation.

Without the lease payments from the Rocky Point communication companies, PCWD's budget would be in a different position. Should rates for water usage be increased and the lease payments set aside for "rainy days" or capital projects?

With respect to water rates, I'd never support an increase without a lively discussion from the staff, board and public, and a justification.

The current budget structure has operating costs supported by radio fees. This is a very stable situation.

The recent audit report suggested increasing reserves in case of an emergency and we've been doing that for two years.

The Rocky Point fees don't concern me. There is no need to change what we're doing. They are only a more stable funding source.

Concerts were no longer going to advertise, I wrongly suggested that Ken Dahleen had made that decision, when in fact it was a joint decision of the Summer Concert board.

I am a member of that board and agreed to the motion of not placing ads. Our reasoning was simple: Creating an ad every week was one more thing on our already full plates and I, for one, was thrilled to no longer have that weekly deadline. Our decision was in no way intended to alienate the TC.

For the past 18 years, the TC has graciously given up revenue-producing ad space in exchange for a concert sponsorship. No ads, no sponsorship. Our decision was not thought through and was a disgraceful way to treat a long-standing, mutually beneficial relationship. I sincerely apologize, to Becky, Jack, the TC staff and to Ken.

In point of fact, the TC has consistently offered to create our ads for us, especially when the deadline was imminent and I had fallen behind. I'm hopeful that this situation can somehow be rectified.

The Summer Concerts are a highlight of summer activity in Idyllwild. Without Ken Dahleen and our generous sponsors, including the Town Crier, there would be no Summer Concerts.

Idyllwild Water director urges colleagues to re-visit rate policy, capital improvement plan, etc.

Idyllwild Water District Director Vic Sirkin shared with his colleagues five pages of questions regarding recent board action and pending decisions Monday morning.

Among the issues Sirkin hopes the board will re-consider or consider with more legal input or analysis are the new rate structure, the long-time policy of “pre-paid water,” staffing issues and not just the waste water treatment manager, but the eventual hiring of a permanent general manager, and the cost and priority of capital-improvement projects.

In his letter, Sirkin wrote, “As a new board, there is much to learn and evaluate yet there always seems to be a rush to action. It is disquieting. Access to legal explanations and opinions will provide the needed education this board requires for future planning ...”

Sirkin is very unsatisfied with the new water-rate structure and particularly with its continuation of the concept of “pre-paid water.” First, he argues that ultimately the current structure favors commercial users over residential, who pay more per gallon for usage of more than 3,500 gallons.

Besides a personal concern over the equity of the policy, he felt the public comments during the meeting raised some questions with merit about the recently approved water-rate structure. He urged the board to obtain a written opinion from its legal counsel regarding compliance with Proposition 218.

Later in the meeting, General Manager Jack Hoagland said he had an email stating that opinion and would share it with the directors.

The current policy gives residential customers about 2,250 gallons monthly at no cost. But as usage increases, the per-gallon cost for residential customers exceeds the cost for commercial customers.

Sirkin raised several concerns and

questions about the “free or pre-paid” water policy that does not encourage conservation. Secondly, for customers such as single people and part-time customers, they seldom consume the pre-paid amount. Consequently, they subsidize the other users.

The district should establish a reasonable and fair base rate to cover the basic operating expenses and then charge all customers the same amount for each unit of water consumed, Sirkin opined.

“Charging for water actually used will promote conservation and many will see a smaller bill,” he wrote.

He also argued that changing the water policy would make Idyllwild’s fee policy similar to the other two local districts — Fern Valley and Pine Cove.

An evaluation of pipelines and a long-term plan for maintenance, repair and replacement is necessary, he urged his colleagues.

The need to decide whether to use a Riverside County grant for replacing 3,000 feet of pipe has raised these questions. The grant is for \$155,000. When the previous board applied for it, the estimated total project cost was about \$450,000. Recently, Hoagland has told the board that the total project cost may approach \$600,000 to \$675,000, without provisions for oversight and change orders.

Since this is about a fifth or a quarter of the district’s reserves, Sirkin is asking what the total districtwide need and cost is for pipeline repair and replacement.

He concluded with this advice. “To promote absolute transparency and fairness to all, we need to be in a position of knowledge ... not only the knowledge but also the reasoning behind all critical decisions.

“All of us are smarter than one of us, ... Now we need to pause, think together and take more time — if necessary — to make decisions that will work for us in the long term.”

Idyllwild Water returns funds to Idyllwild Arts

Plans purchase of new equipment for water plant

In a special meeting of the Idyllwild Water District Monday morning, the board unanimously approved a new memorandum of understanding with the Idyllwild Arts Foundation. The agreement deals with water connection fees and replaces a 2013 MOU.

Four years ago, the school paid the district \$150,000 in advance for water fees. As of today, about \$123,000 remains. IWD is returning this money to Idyllwild Arts because the recently approved water rules and regulations emphasize the size of the customer’s water meter. In the future, if the school requires a larger meter, it will “pay the then prevailing water facilities connection fees ...,” according to the board.

The board also easily approved General Manager Jack Hoagland’s recommendation to purchase two new pumps for the wastewater treatment plant. The total cost, including installation, will be about \$43,000.

The district has two pumps, one of which is broken. Both have needed extensive repair over their lifetime, according to Hoagland. The new pumps will chop “non-organic” material, which gets into the sewer system and damages the current pumps.

“We need to do something,” he urged the board. “The new pumps will be less

maintenance and last longer between rebuild.”

Director Steve Kunkle concurred that the new pump would work better and be less of a problem. “I think it is needed,” he added.

However, the third item, a request to approve a job description and salary range for a field operations supervisor, failed for lack of motion. For several years, the district has sought a chief sewer operator without success. Consequently, it has had to contract for part-time oversight from the California Rural Water Association. This has cost the district about \$12,000 monthly.

Using a recruit firm, Hoagland found a candidate he wished to hire for about \$85,000 annually. The job description gave the person full management authority for the waste-water system and oversight of the water distribution system.

Several directors raised questions about the long-term success of the arrangement. After taking some time to consider the proposal, none of the directors (Peter Szabadi was absent) offered a motion to accept Hoagland’s recommendation.

During the closed session, Director Vic Sirkin submitted his resignation to President Dr. Charles Schelly. He resigned for health reasons and stressed that it was unrelated to his letter addressing recent board decisions (see story at left). He is confident his former colleagues will address these issues and wishes he could participate, but does not believe it would be beneficial for his current health conditions.



International star mural painter comes to Idyllwild

His technique is shared by no others

What would it be like to be internationally known as a painter who paints in total darkness? Whose work is invisible during the day but only visible at night? Whose detailed depictions of the cosmos are unique one-of-a-kind creations, numbering over 1,200 projects found in 13 countries?

Fourteen years ago, “Startist” (star artist) Rip Read was contemplating a career change while living in Pine Cove. He had been an independent book seller in corporate sales, with a dependable territory, solid prospects and a six-figure paycheck. Then, while on vacation with his wife in Loreto, Baja, Mexico, his corporation

cancelled his business.

Read, very much a self-starter, had always been fascinated with astronomy — with the stars, the nebulae and the galaxies. He noticed an ad for Starscape, which interested Read in the idea of creating the cosmos on the ceilings of patrons.

He researched materials and perfected techniques he notes are unique to him. His ceiling creations are totally invisible during the day, but when a room goes black, the ceiling becomes a glowing cosmos, in which stars twinkle and move, yes move. And, before long, after diligent experimentation, Read launched a new career. He became the Startist.

“This is a proprietary process — movement without projectors,” said Read. “No other human on the planet can do this. Over the years, I have made it my mission to study, research, experiment, learn and apply the

highest degree of science and innovation to my materials, tools, techniques and processes. My work has been made up of equal parts science project and astronomical art. And I’ve enjoyed both.”

Read has pages of international endorsements from many clients — private homes, estates, private aircraft, yachts, hotels and casinos.

He is returning in mid-July to Idyllwild to redo a ceiling in a client’s home, a ceiling that was damaged when a tree fell onto the house. Because his work cannot be replicated by others, the home’s owner requested Read’s unique artistic intervention.

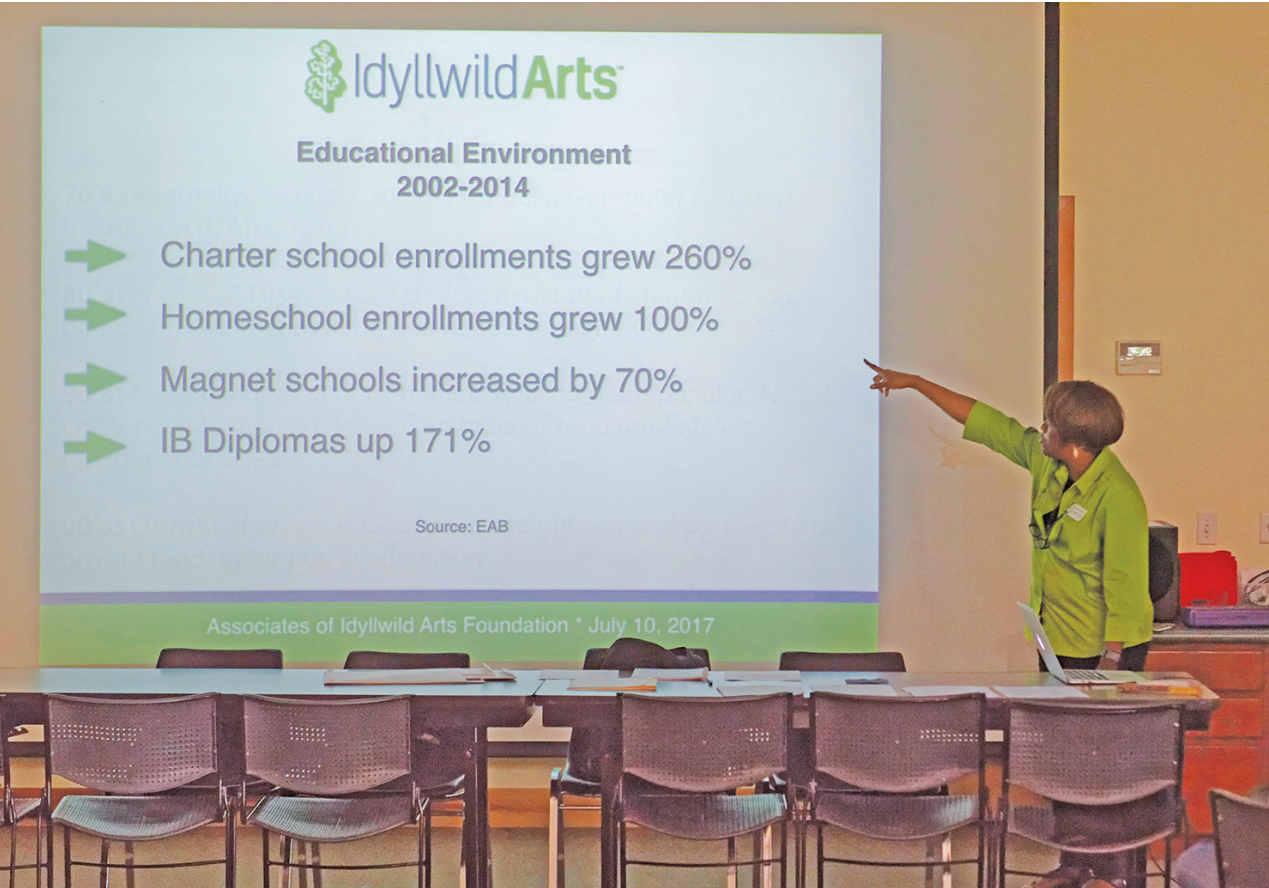

For households who do not list a Food Stamp, CalWORKs, Kin-GAP or FDPIR case number, the application must include the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the signature and corresponding Social Security number of an adult household member.
