





Santa Anas return Monday

"An extended period of moderate to strong Santa Ana winds is expected to impact Southern California this week starting early Monday morning," Riverside County Fire Chief John Hawkins reported Sunday.

While windy conditions began Sunday night, the winds will intensify today and Tuesday, before diminishing on Wednesday. However, the winds will return Thursday and Friday.

Early Monday morning, the National Weather Service issued both a High Wind Warning and Red Flag Warning for the

Idyllwild Fire Chief Patrick Reitz said he has increased staffing at the station for Monday and Tuesday and "... will be evaluating adding staff for the rest of the week."

The High Wind Warning is in effect through Thursday, Dec. 7.

"Areas of northeast winds 20 to 30 mph with gusts to 55 mph. Isolated gusts to 80 mph on Tuesday and Thursday," was the NWS forecast. "Winds will strengthen this morning and continue at times through Thursday. The strongest and most widespread winds are expected for late tonight into Tuesday ... and ag ain late Wednesday

night into Thursday." With the high winds and the wind direction shifting from the northeast, daytime humidity will plummet, possibly to single digits.

A Red Flag Warning means critical fire-weather conditions are either occurring now or may. The combination of strong winds, low relative humidity and warm temperatures contribute to potentially extreme fire behavior, the NWS stated.

The Red Flag Warning was issued about 3 a.m. Monday and is in effect through Thursday, Dec. 7

Humidity will decrease and the chance of fire will increase to moderate over much of the week. By next Saturday, the Santa Ana event should have ended.

By Tuesday, wind speeds could be 25 to 35 mph. At higher elevations and in some of the more wind-prone areas, the speeds will approach 60 mph, according to the forecast from the South Operations Predictive Services unit.

On Thursday and Friday, with Santa Ana winds and single-digit humidity, the Inland Empire and San Diego County will be the focus of firefighters for potential ignitions.

"Little if any rain has occurred over Southern California this fall and fuels are very dry. In addition, there is still an abundant grass crop left over from last winter's heavy rains," Hawkins wrote, noting the fire threat.

The Santa Ana Wildfire Threat Index was high for the Inland Empire on Tuesday, Dec. 5 and moderate on Dec. 7 and 8.

County ends MEMSCOMM meetings

Late Thursday afternoon, Nov. 30, Riverside County announced that the Mountain Emergency Services Committee, commonly known as MEMSCOMM, has been "disbanded." This decision would be effective the next day, Friday, Dec. 1.

In an email, Jerry Hagen, emergency services coordinator for Riverside County's Supervisory District 3, reported that Supervisor Chuck Washington's staff, as well as the County Emergency Management Division had participated in the decision.

Brian Tisdale, Washing-

ton's legislative assistant for public safety, confirmed he had been involved and explained that the attendance at the meetings had steadily declined.

"Just having another meeting, it was not worth it. There are other venues available for this information," Tisdale said. Hagen encouraged peo-

ple to attend the Mountain Area Safety Taskforce and the Mountain Disaster Preparedness Group meetings for similar information of value to Hill volunteer groups.

These "additional emergency preparedness meetings are held on the mountain, administered and maintained by both response agencies and by local community members," he said. "These groups, as well as others, more than adequately cover everything that MEMSCOMM was originally intended to do.

This year, Hagen had switched from monthly MEM-SCOMM meetings to quarterly as a way of propping up the attendance, but it was unsuccessful. From full rooms of 30 to 35 people, the sessions have declined to fewer than 10 regular attendees.

"Over the last year, the Emergency Management Department held four meetings in Idyllwild, with minimal attendance. On two occasions

Fojtik fesses up to monument crash

Idyllwild's Charles "Chic" Fojtik, actor, retired Pepperdine University marketing professor and recent producer of the Tahquitz laser show, is a familiar avuncular and upbeat presence to townsfolk.

But on the evening of Tuesday, Nov. 28, he was not his usual upbeat, but literally upset. "I was the culprit who knocked down the monument sign Tuesday eve," said Fojtik. "I was coming from the post office about 9 p.m. when I decided to video the Christmas tree. I pulled just off the road and started filming, going maybe 2 mph."

Fojtik said he believed his foot slipped off the brake during the filming, the car veered to the right and collided with the Tree Monument sign, causing his vehicle's airbags to inflate, en-

sconcing Fojtik in a cocoon of chaos, and damaging the sign.

Snow group has county take down mention of snow/ sledding in Idyllwild

Last week, Riverside County's Watershed Protection Agency distributed an email encouraging recipients to visit its website to learn more about several topics. One of the topics was titled "Enjoy A White Christmas in Riverside County."

This story had a photograph of two children being pulled on a sled in the snow. The first recommendation was to visit Mt. San Jacinto using the Palm Springs Aerial Tramway.

However, the third paragraph spoke Idyllwild and encouraged readers to visit and use Humber Park for sledding adventures.

"Humber Park in the Santa Ana Watershed is another prized spot often recommended as the best location for sledding in Riverside County," began the three-sentence recommendation of Idyllwild.

When Marsha Kennedy, head of the informal Snow Talk group formed in response to snow visitors who skirt politeness and good behavior, learned of the watershed agency's suggestion, she quickly responded with calls to county officials. She also made Facebook postings, which encouraged people to write the agency about its promotion.

sage them regarding their email blast," she urged readers.

Within two days, the paragraph mentioning Idvllwild had been deleted.

"The County Watershed people handled the situation with speed and courtesy. I am extremely pleased with their response," she wrote in an email to the Town Crier. "I'm sure they, like most people, only think of Idyllwild as a charming mountain village with snow. They have no idea of the problems caused by snow-play visitors who we have no way to accommodate or inform."

Going forward, Kennedy and the Snow Talk group will rely on the internet, she said. There is both a Facebook page, IdyllwildSnow, and a website, idyllwildsnow.com, "... to inform potential snow-play visitors of the situation up here."

Jeff Comerchero, Supervisor Chuck Washington's (3rd District) chief of staff, and Scot Bangle, director of the Riverside County Regional Park and Open-Space District, both contacted the Watershed Protection Agency on Idyllwild's behalf, too.

"To be clear, the offending posting came from the Flood Control District, not the county proper," Comerchero emphasized.

Longtime IAA Summer Program registrar faces health challenge

GoFundMe campaign started for Diane Dennis

Diane Dennis, Idyllwild Arts Academy Summer Program registrar, is, for all who know her, irrepressibly optimistic and upbeat. Her smile is always there to brighten the days of those she meets and greets. She is an effervescent, caring and nurturing presence on

Diane is now facing a major medical challenge that will likely require a complete bone-marrow transplant. Diagnosed in June 2016 with leukemia, Diane began treatment with a small dose of chemotherapy to which her body reacted negatively, causing thrombocytopenia, a dangerously low blood-platelet count.

IAA Assistant Director of Summer Programs Megan McIntyre has started a GoFundMe campaign to help Diane and partner Kenny Fransworth pay for almost daily off-Hill trips to test blood-platelet counts and get blood transfusions to raise those platelet

Next is a bone-marrow transplant at the City of Hope medical campus in Duarte, an expensive and arduous procedure requiring a 30- to 70-day hospitalization and residency at City of Hope.

A stem-cell transplant is used to infuse healthy stem cells into the body to stimulate new bone-marrow growth, suppress the [leukemia] disease, and reduce the possibility of a relapse.

In her GoFundMe campaign entreaty, McIntyre summarized, "Being so far from home will require Kenny to travel back and forth from Idyllwild to Duarte and although Diane has medical insurance the

many costs are adding up." There are travel costs, vehicle wear and tear, and medical bills and copays that continue to accumulate. "This process doesn't have an end date on the calendar and she will be dealing with treatments, appointments and an unknown timeline of when she may come home," said McIntyre. "While in the hospital, she will have chemotherapy, radiation and the bone marrow transplant when her body is ready. She will have to be quarantined for at least 10 days at the start.

"Diane is the most caring, kind, positive and giving woman. She will never fail to put another person's needs before her own." Having a bone-marrow transplant requires having a stem-cell match. The good news is that

a match has been found for Diane so that the process can proceed when her body is ready for the procedure.

"Throughout all of this Diane has never once lost her smile, her optimism, or her faith that she will overcome," said McIntyre. Please consider donating anything you can to help Diane get healthy and back home to Idyllwild as soon as possible." Donate at www.gofundme.com/dianes-medical-recovery.

When contacted today, Diane said, "Yes, I'm in good hands with the journey I am on and yes it will be a victory. I feel all of the love and support from Idyllwild and actually from all over. It's amazing.

Are you getting hounded by robocalls and wondering what you can do about them? Reporting illegal robocalls helps the Federal Trade Commission and other law enforcement agencies go after the scammers behind them. But what can you do to stop those calls now? One option

Stop illegal robocalls

is a robocall-blocking app for your mobile phone. Robocall blocking apps can give you the ability to do things like prescreen your calls before the phone rings; block certain types of calls, including calls that others have flagged as fraudulent or unwanted calls; block anonymous calls that show up as "unknown" callers; and use reverse lookup to detect fake caller ID information

from call spoofing. Which app works for you might depend on your phone's operating system. Before you consider downloading any app, think about the call protection you need and do your research. CTIA, a trade association representing manufacturers and providers of wireless products and services, has a comprehensive list of call-blocking apps.

If your mobile number isn't already on the National Do Not Call Registry at www.donotcall.gov/, it's also a good idea to add it. If you continue to get sales calls, at least you'll know the callers don't respect the law. If you continue to get illegal robocalls or other unwanted calls, report them to the FTC. Your complaints not only help us target scammers, but also help telecommunications carriers and other industry partners that are working on call blocking solutions.



State taxing ambulance transports

Intent to increase federal funds for Medi-Cal

The state is using emergency medical transports to garner funding increases for its Medi-Cal program from the federal government that will directly impact the Idyllwild Fire Department. This fall, the state Legislature passed and Gov. Jerry Brown signed Senate Bill 523 that will impose a quality-assurance fee on emergency-medical transports.

"This new tax would have a direct negative impact on our general fund and would result in a decrease of service to our taxpayers," wrote Idyllwild Fire Chief Patrick Reitz in a September letter recommending that Brown veto

The emergency-transport fee rate will be 5.1 percent of the charge for the transport, but the actual amount will not be calculated until June 2018. The new revenue will be deposited in a special account for the state's Medi-Cal program, including emergency-medical transports.

The bill's authors ar-

gued that Medi-Cal transport reimbursement payments have lagged over the past decade and this mechanism will be a way to secure more funding for emergency-transport providers.

Reitz estimates the program will result in a net loss of \$25,500 annually to the district.

"For years Medi-Cal reimbursements have only been a fraction of actual costs of transporting a patient to the hospital. For a small, rural district such as the Idyllwild Fire Protection District, this tax amounts to another cut, not an increase, in what little Medi-Cal reimburses for ambulance transport," Reitz wrote in the letter. "Our constituents should not be subsidizing a Medi-Cal rate increase that will benefit mostly large for-profit ambulance companies."

Reitz explained that ambulance companies who transport a large number of Medi-Cal patients may receive total reimbursements that could exceed their emergency-transport fee. But IFPD is not in that category.

The revenue generated by the ambulance fee will pay for California's cost to administer the program, 10 percent will be devoted

the balance for increased payment to emergency medical transport provid-

The estimated cost to operate the program is \$750,000 annually.

The 10-percent healthcare earmarked is projected to reduce the state's General Fund costs for Medi-Cal by \$3.2 million annually.

The balance, which is forecast to be about \$30 million, will be matched by federal funds resulting in about \$73 million for reimbursement to medical -transport providers.

"We're basically paying

to healthcare coverage and the state to pay ourselves," Reitz said. "We pay more for reimbursements, off the backs of local government, to subsidize the state and federal governments."

As an example, Reitz described the reimbursement for mileage expenses. There are categories: urban, suburban, rural and super rural. Transports greater than 50 miles are considered super rural and are the highest paybacks.

"But they don't look at time, geography or topology," he said. "We're not 51 miles from the local hospitals, but the time it takes

We also have five nonprofit and public agency members: Fern Valley Water District; Friends of San Jacinto Mountain County Parks; Hemet Public Library; Idyllwild Animal Rescue Friends; and St. Hugh's Episcopal Church.

But, again, we cannot give up on business advertis-

So your Town Crier advertising is focused, highly visible and enduring. And that's good for your business.

And, of course, we ask all Town Crier Members to remember to support Hill businesses that support your local newspaper with their advertising. That's a win-winwin for us all.

We've reiterated our view that a newspaper is a community watchdog that publishes the bad with the good. It warns of danger, advises of opportunity, challenges authority, praises accomplishment, investigates irregularity, marvels at art, exposes abuse, celebrates life and publishes its readers' letters. If a publication does not do all of those things, it may be something else, but it's not a newspaper.

It's now been 16 weeks since we began the Town Crier Membership model to save a newspaper for our Hill community. The objective was to keep the Town Crier from retiring when we do, which should be sometime next summer. To enable that, we need to bring the newspaper revenues up to where its currently unpaid employee positions — especially including that of the editor in chief — become reasonably compensated. Because if the Town Crier is "breaking even" only if it has an editor, proofreader, pick-up and distribution person, light-duty handyman and occasional lawyer who will work for free. then the paper isn't really breaking even at all. It would be very difficult, if not impossible, to find new owners who would be willing to work for free and continue to operate the Town Crier as a real, community newspaper.

So, it is with gratitude and renewed optimism that we can report that we are well more than halfway to the increased annual revenues we estimate we will need for the Town Crier to continue on. During these past 16

When we see an advertisement, we typically have a tasty morsel of bait dangled in front of us. But because it is in the form of an ad, we see the hook as well as the bait. We know exactly what is happening, and if we take the bait, we do so with eyes wide-open.

However, when the bait is in the form of a few innocuous paragraphs that seem almost to be a public service announcement, the hook becomes all but

Preparedness & Readiness for a

In Part I, we discussed Santa Ana Winds and how winds significantly enable wildfire spread. Riverside County clearly witnessed wind-driven fires this September and October. With the Canyon #1 and Canyon #2 fires and the Wildomar Fire that started on Oct. 26, we saw how quickly and destructively wildfires can wreak havoc on communities and how communities can also be prepared for a wildfire.

In Part II, we will discuss how you, as the homeowner, can best prepare and be ready for a wildfire. Following www.readyforwildfire.org provides you a simply understood and easily implemented home program to be ready for a wildfire.

The website emphasizes three basic preparedness steps: 1) plan, 2) know and 3) act. We will discuss these three points and add information about evacuation tips and the famous Ready! Set! Go! method to be ready to respond to the threat or the actuality of wildfire.

Cal Fire has developed and offers a free app that will best get you Ready for Wildfire. The app is available at: www.readyforwildfire.org/Ready-for-Wildfire-App/. The app will work on both smart phones and iPhones. The same website also provides, as does the app, features like checklists with steps for:

- Taking charge of your defensible space
- Hardening your home
- Preparing for bark beetle attack
- Creating an evacuation and family communica-
- Assembling an emergency supply kit
- Evacuating early

The Cal Fire app will allow you to customize your desired information to get alerts when a wildfire is reported in your chosen zip code or within 30 miles of you. You can follow active wildfires that may be burning throughout California. Fire information will include location, size and containment percentage along with other critically important information. Instructions are provided on how to sign up for Wildfire Alerts.

Under the Know Web Page, www.readyforwildfire. org/102-million-dead-trees/, you will find valuable information pertaining to the terrible impact of the drought on our forests. Even though the drought mortality is currently located in the Central and Southern Sierra Nevada Mountains, many of the San Jacinto-Santa Rosa mountains residents will remember the drought we lived through during the last decade. Thousands of trees were killed in our mountains.

In preparing for wildfire, we must be ready to act. The Ready for Wildfire website for Act is found at www. readyforwildfire.org/Defensible-Space/.

Of critical importance is the statutory requirement to Maintain Defensible Space. The statutory authority is found in the California Public Resources Code Section 4291. Specific statutory verbiage may be found at http://leginfo.legislature.ca.gov/faces/codes_displaySection.xhtml?sectionNum=4291.&lawCode=PRC.

Postal Service offers tips for sending packages

This holiday season, the U.S. Postal Service again expects to deliver more than 15 billion mail pieces.

The Postal Inspection Service, the law enforcement arm of the Postal Service, works to keep important shipments safe, and deter mail and parcel theft.

This season, the Postal Service offers 10 secure shipping tips. These will provide helpful options to ensure important packages reach their destination. See the accompanying box.

If you feel you are a victim of a crime involving the mail, you may submit an online complaint by visiting www.USPS.com and selecting the Postal Inspectors

Ten Ways protect mail and packages

1. Avoid sending cash by mail. Checks and money orders are safer than cash and may be cancelled or reissued in the event of theft.

2. Don't leave delivered mail and packages unatpurses shouldn't be left on the front seat of an unlocked car overnight; mail and packages shouldn't be left uncollected in mailboxes or on front porches for any length of time.

3. Consider an alternate shipping address. Customers can arrange to have packages delivered to neighbors who are home during the day or get packages delivered at work, if permitted.

4. Change the package's address — while it's in transit! Customers who know they won't be home when their package is delivered can try USPS Package Intercept. Prior to delivery, domestic-package shipments can be redirected back to the sender, to a new address or to the post office to be held for pickup.

5. Customize the delivfit in the mailbox and the provide delivery instruc-

tended. Just as wallets and tions online and authorize the carrier to leave it in a specified location. Visit usps.com, enter the tracking number and select Delivery Instructions. Customers can also request their packages be left with a neighbor or held at a post office for pickup.

6. Plan ahead. Ship using Hold for Pickup. When shipping packages, customers can choose the Hold for Pickup option and the recipients can collect the packages at their local post office. For customers receiving packages, they can redirect incoming packages to their local post office by selecting Hold for Pickup using USPS Package Intercept.

7. Going out of town? Hold mail at the local post office. Instead of risking leaving a package unattended for an extended period of time, customers planery. Letters and packages will be held securely at the local post office until the customers return.

8. Secure the shipment using USPS Signature Services. Signature Services help ensure the package ends up in the right hands by requiring a signature at the time of delivery.

9. Choose the most secure form of delivery. For the most valuable packages, customers can opt for Registered Mail service. Registered Mail receives special handling from the time it's mailed until it's delivered, documenting the chain of custody.

10. PO boxes might be the answer. Customers concerned about the security of their mail can consider renting a PO box at their local post office. The mail remains secure within the post office, accessible only when using the right key or combination. Many post office lobbies are open 24/7, allowing customers to retrieve mail on their sched-

U.S. Forest Service plans prescribed burns this winter

The U.S. Forest Service will conduct prescribed burning operations on the San Bernardino National Forest in the upcoming months as weather conditions permit.

The burns will be on three ranger districts — Front Country, Ranger District, Mountaintop and San Jacinto. The prescribed Raburns are one of many tools used to reduce the threat of catastrophic wildfire and improve forest

Various methods of prescribed burning will be implemented, including broadcast and pile burning to reduce accumulated fuel loadings on the forest floor and ladder fuels that can carry fire from the forest floor into tree canopies. Ladder fuels are vegetation such as, needles, small plants, brush and small trees both dead and living.

In the San Jacinto Ranger District, broadcast burns are planned for Thomas Mountain, east of Ramona Indian Reservation and west of Garner Valley.

Slash and debris pile burning is planned to the south and west of Pine Cove

Brandi Shaw also was in the crosswalk with her 4-year-old son and was

At 2:35 p.m. Friday, Dec. struck. She said the car appeared to be moving slowly and that she saw what was coming. She said she threw her son out of the way of the impact. "I ended up on the hood," said Shaw, who said she was in pain but that it was not major.

According to Meyer, Dan Bailey, 71, of Norco, was driving a 2010 Ford Fusion south on Highway 243 when he collided with Hitchcock, 46, of Idyllwild. According to the report, Hitchcock was crossing the street when broadsided by Bailey's vehicle. At the time of the incident, she was wearing a bicyclist's helmet. 





Citizen tax initiative may need only 50 percent 'yes'

IFPD legal counsel agrees bar may be lowered

Late last month, the Idyllwild Fire Protection District's commission got some positive news; however, it may have limited ability to capitalize on it.

The commission's legal counsel provided an opinion that supported concerns in the political world and musings in the media following the state's Supreme Court August decision in California Cannabis Coalition v. City of Upland.

In Uplands, the local coalition prepared and obtained signatures requesting a cannabis initiative that would legalize and tax medical-marijuana dispensaries in the city. The Supreme Court issued a decision supporting the right of citizens to propose initiatives, including Proposition 218, which has been incorporated into the state Constitution.

While the actual case only involved when the cannabis measure could go to the voters — either in a general or special election — the same section of the Constitution requires a two-thirds majority vote to approve a tax measure.

The Supreme Court essentially ruled that proposed measures initiated by voters are not coming from local government, which, therefore, excludes them from the requirements of these sections.

Since the language in the two sections is essentially identical, following the announcement of the decision, many commentators were worried about the possible ramifications of the decision. Specifically, they foresaw that local groups might inititate tax measures, which could be passed by a simple majority of voters rather than the current threshold of two-thirds.

After the Town Crier reported on the decision and its potential uses, the IFPD commission requested an opinion from its counsel. At last week's meeting, Chief Patrick Reitz reported that the agency's legal counsel opined that it would probably "work here."

The key is we can't be directly involved," stressed

Commissioner Henry Sawicki, chair of the commission's ad hoc committee on future parcel fee/tax measure.

He stressed that it must originate with a citizen group, unaffiliated with the department. If they secured signatures of 10 percent of registered voters, it could be placed on a ballot for approval. And its approval would be 50 percent plus 1 rather than two-thirds of the voters.

We would have to distance ourselves from initiating the process," he informed the commission, but added later, "A special initiative should be put on the ballot if people bring it. The board would be obligated to verify it and place it on the ballot at the earliest possible election."

Immediately after the decision's dissemination, Jon Coupal, president of the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association, issued the following statement: "If local initiatives are exempt from critical taxpayer protections, then public agencies could easily deny taxpayers their rights by colluding with outside interests to propose taxes in the form of an initiative, then submitting a tax under a lower vote threshold than that currently mandated by the constitution."

The impact of the court's opinion is "if [IFPD] brings the initiative, it requires a super-majority [two-thirds] to pass. If the public brings it, only a [simple] majority is necessary," Reitz stated.

Since the Upland case did not specifically address the two-thirds approval, other commentators believe it will require another case for the Supreme Court to decide whether voter initiatives are exempt from this requirement.

Meanwhile, Sawicki affirmed that the committee vould continue to explore whatever options are available to them to help raise revenue for the department.

"It's got to be done," he emphasized. "We need to build up some type of reserves. That's just being fiscally responsible. We have no reserves if we were to suffer a catastrophe. It's of paramount importance."

In 2015, IFPD put Measure W on the ballot. That would have doubled the current parcel fee from \$65 to \$130 annually. The majority of voters approved it. The total "yes" votes were 58 percent, which was short of the 66.7 percent necessary for passage.

We wouldn't have put it on the ballot if we didn't have a need, which has not diminished," Reitz said.

IFPD audit completed and accepted

Negative balances for CalPERS and retiree healthcare

At its Nov. 28 meeting, the Idyllwild Fire Protection District's commission heard Chris Brown, partner in Fedak and Brown of Riverside, present its audit of IFPD's fiscal year 2016-

"We have reported an unmodified, clean opinion," he was pleased to announce to the commission. "That is the best we can do." The audit also found no "material weaknesses within the district's internal controls.'

The district's net position, while still negative, improved nearly \$200,000 at the end of the fiscal year. Liabilities, primarily future CalPERS and other post-employment benefits (healthcare), create the negative balance of \$1.6 million.

However, the auditors stressed, "This deficit does not mean that the district available to pay its bills special districts until Denext year. Rather, it is the result of having long-term commitments, mostly the pension liability of \$2.6 million, that are greater than currently available resources."

During fiscal year 2016-17, revenue exceeded IFPD's costs by about \$67,000. This was attributable to greater revenue from the mutual aid asfrom the prior fiscal year.

Following the audit presentation, Finance Committee Chair and Commissioner Jerry Buchanan and Brown, along with financial consultant Rob Dennis, discussed what could be done in the future to receive the finished audit earlier. They agreed to set a goal of late September or early October for the completion of the 2017-18 audit.

After four months of this fiscal year, expenditures are about \$250,000 greater than revenue. This deficit is because the county does not forward any does not have resources property tax revenue to

cember. IFPD has received an advance of \$400,000 to bridge its cash flow until the property tax revenue begins to arrive.

Before adjourning, the board reviewed its agreement with Fire Chief Patrick Reitz. Commissioners modified it to complete future evaluation in early July to coincide with the fiscal year. He also received a compensation increase consistent with the memorandum of understanding the district has with the Idyllwild Career Firefighters Association.

The board also canceled its scheduled Dec. 26 meeting and will re-convene on Jan. 23.

Panoramic views, excitement a surprise for visitors to Lamb Canyon Landfill

People interested in getting a seagull's-eye-view at one of Riverside County's largest landfills soon will have that chance, as well as an opportunity to see how a landfill protects residents' health by safely dispatching 2,000 tons of trash a day. The Marion V. Ashley Lamb Canyon Education Center opens soon, and tours by school groups and others already have been booked into early next year.

So, you're wondering why anyone would even be interested in visiting

The goal at the open-air center is to educate residents about the importance of the landfill operations. From a bluff 200 feet above the Lamb Canyon Landfill near Beaumont, visitors can see the enormous activity that goes on six days a week. Mega machines shove a mountain of trash non-stop, covering it with layers of dirt to dispose of it safely, protect groundwater and prevent the spread of disease.

So how much trash is 2,000 tons a day? In one day, Lamb Canyon matches the amount of trash that

five million annual visitors to Yosemite National Park and 2,800 park staff members have generated annually in recent years.

The fall and winter bring an unexpected attraction, when the county hires falconers to fly raptors at the Lamb Canyon. Falcons and hawks scare off seagulls to prevent them from carrying away a trashy meal — which would present a potential public-health hazard.

"Kids love it," said Hans Kernkamp, general manager and chief engineer of the county Waste Resources Department.

The raptors are not flown to attack the seagulls but the scavengers immediately fly for their life as soon as they see a predator in the air. (Don't miss a short video about raptors at the landfill at www.you-

tube.com/watch?v=DgnTncwK-ISg.) Raptors not only are exciting to watch, they capture attention and make it easier to educate visitors.

"Most people don't think a lot about how much trash our society generates," Kernkamp said. "Hopefully, bringing people to the site and

showing them the sheer size of the landfill operation makes them think more about recycling, composting and other ways to reduce the flow of trash."

A closed-circuit camera linked to a television inside the center gives visitors a closer view of operations as they happen. Across the landfill, workers recover salvageable bicycles that are then provided to nonprofit groups and rehabbed for reuse. Metals are separated and recycled, green waste is shredded into mulch, and potentially toxic waste from computers and other electronics is sorted and disposed of safely.

But because of its bluff-top location, the visitor center offers more than just a glimpse into landfill operations. Looking into the landfill chasm, bulldozers manhandle the giant trash pile. In another direction, panoramic views stretch back toward valleys and mountains.





Local Jamie Johnston captures the 60s and 70s music scene

"Following Breadcrumbs, Tales of a Rock and Roll Girl Child"

Jamie Johnston, born into old Hollywood society, daughter of 40s and 50s era singer/movie actor Johnny Johnston and socialite real estate mother Shirley, could have become another spoiled child of privilege, content

Instead she fiercely and courageously fought to create a strong and independent feminist identity as a singer/ songwriter in the male dominated music scene of the 60s and 70s. She captures that era, the rock groups and bigger than life personalities that defined it, and her own struggle to make a difference musically in her breezy memoir "Following Breadcrumbs, Tales of a Rock and Roll Girl Child" (iUniverse Books, 2017, Bloomington,

The song "George the Magic Man," along with the introduction of Don Boyd the velvet-suited Englishman, led to a 1972 record contract in London with George Martin (of Beatles fame) for the girls' duo, "The Skiffles." They were 18 and 19 respectively when they signed.

The promising release of the Skiffles' Martin-produced single coincided with Paul McCartney's decision to return to recording with Martin after the Beatles' breakup. And so a pattern in Johnston's professional life emerged one promising really big step forward was undercut by an unexpected crash and burn. The single went nowhere and the Skiffles returned to the U.S.

sional depictions of the iconic places and people that were part of her personal and professional journey.

Hers was a life defined by chance and critical connections. In "Breadcrumbs" you don't just read about those times, places and people. You are there in the VW vans, hotel rooms, recording studios and music venues. Whether it's with George Martin, Paul McCartney, Harry Nilsson, Keith Moon or the Byrd's Gene Clark, a love that continues to define Johnston, you accompany her as she stands on peaks and slumps in the valleys of her career and personal

For those who were

shaped the woman she would there, the 60s and 70s were times defined by the music that was its beat, its soundtrack and its soul. Johnston knew the men, the women, the times and more than most, she lived the music.

She writes that her life was shaped by two seminal experiences – hearing the Beatles for the first time and meeting Gene Clark. Her book is more than a rock 'n' roll memoir. It is a lovingly told and often heartbreaking story of perseverance and grit, spunk and vulnerability. And it is a paean to that seminal time of magical music that will never come again. "Time it was and what a time it was, it was a time of innocence, a time of confidences," wrote Paul Simon in "Old Friends."

If you were there you know what it was like. If you What makes "Following Breadcrumbs" a delightful have always regretted not being there, take this opportunity to open that door.

In her intro, Johnston writes, "I don't know what happened. This started out as a coming of age story and here it ends up practically a goddamn love story for the ages. I didn't want to write this kind of stuff. There are so many writers who do it better."

And it may be possible there are better writers, but in reading Johnston's book one is stuck by her visceral honesty, her selfless and easy going style, her humor and her resilience. And interestingly for a memoir, that time, that unique cultural watershed is the central character in "Breadcrumbs," not Johnston. Although her professional accomplishments are many - success in music, acting, voice over work and writing - there is little evidence of author ego in her memoir. It's all about the music, the time, and the lessons learned.

Johnston lives in Pine Cove with Rick Clark, younger brother of Gene. And to understand how that remarkable union came about, you will have to read the book. Finding Rick is how Johnston concludes her book. It is a story of another serendipitous breadcrumb that with characteristic tenacity and devotion, she followed to find personal fulfillment.

The online reviews of "Following Breadcrumbs" are unanimous in praising how artfully Johnston tells her story and how brilliantly she captures that defining time in our country's cultural history.


"I just could not put this book down," said one reviewer. "It's a tragic, Shakespearean, life-affirming gem and a must read for anyone interested in the rock 'n' roll scene of the 60s. It goes much deeper than that however. In a Buddhist way, it reminds the reader of the fragility of life and the importance of cherishing our loved ones."

Forest Service to raise prices for printed maps

The price of national forest and grassland visitor maps (plastic or paper) will increase to \$14 per map Jan. 1, 2018. Now, visitor maps are \$10 for the plastic or \$9 for the paper

All maps are available for purchase online from the U.S. Forest Service at the National Forest Map Store, www.nationalforestmapstore. com/. Select maps are sold locally at USFS forest or district offices, and at many USFS visitor centers.

The procedures for purchasing maps in bulk also will change on Jan. 1. The USFS will offer volume discounts to any entities that wish to purchase in bulk, including interpretive associations.

Volume discount pricing will be made available only through the National Forest Map Store or 1-406-329-3024. Local USFS units will no longer provide volume sales discounts.

Most printed maps also are available digitally through Avenza Map Store for \$4.99 per side (www. avenza.com/pdf-maps/store). This is the current price and no increase for these products is planned at this

Also, the USFS will continue to sell maps through the U.S. Geological Survey store (https://nationalmap.gov), which offers its own set of discounts for volume purchases.



Opal and the Secret Code

This is the seventh in a nine-part weekly series. The series is unique because it tells the true story of a deaf girl, Opal Mehigan Fleming, and how in the 1930s, learning American Sign Language opened up a whole new world for her. It shows how her new language made her feel equal to others and not left out in a dark, lonely world.

Opal's resilient spirit enabled her to overcome so much in her lifetime. She became a well-educated, dignified person loved by so many, including the author of Opal's story. For 20 years, she was a teacher's aide at the North Carolina School for the Deaf. She died in 2003.

This year (2017) is the 200th Bicentennial of the first American School for the Deaf. Janie, who lives in Hemet, is available to visit classrooms to help mo-

tivate kids to write their own stories and build believable characters.

Pa's Story

My little Opal got kicked out of school — this time for good. The teacher said she couldn't handle her. She said Opal disrupted the class and got in too many fights. She told me that my little girl being deaf would probably never learn to read or write anyway and that I should keep her at home.

I know my Opal can learn. She's a smart little thing ... But how?

I got my answer some time later while I was riding on a train. I sat down next to a young man, gave my usual nod and introduced myself. He just pointed to his ears and shook his head. I knew right away he was deaf. Then, to my surprise, he took out a pencil and a pad and began to write his name and where he was from. We wrote back and forth, getting to know

forth, getting to know each other as the train rumbled on its way. When I asked him where he learned to read and write, I got another surprise. He had gone to a deaf school right here in the state of Oklahoma. Imagine that! There was a school for the deaf — a school for my Opal.

There was my answer. My Opal was going to the Oklahoma School for the Deaf as soon as I could make the arrangements.

When I found out that I would have to leave

her at the deaf school so far away from home — all alone — I almost changed my mind. But thinking about that young deaf man so confident and well educated, able to make his way in the world all by himself, I knew I had to bring my little girl to that school.

So I took Opal's small hand in mine and traveled to that far away place and left her there. I wiped the tears from my eyes and forced my feet to walk away from her. I told myself over and over again my little girl was going to learn to read and write.

And it wasn't long that she came home for a visit and when she did, we were all in for an even grander surprise. Not only did Opal learn to read and write, she also had become a teacher of American Sign Language!


