uirky, independent, insouciant, irreverent, droll and plucky, the Idyllwild International Festival of Cinema's (IIFC) official opening night film "Rock Slyde" was, like the festival's first day, a hit with audiences.

Lowman starts next 25 years at Idyllwild Arts

Te arrived to a completely dark campus," said Idyllwild Arts' (IA) longtime head Bill Lowman, remembering his and wife Carolyn's move to Idyllwild in January 1985. Hired to put new life and financial stability back into the renowned but financially troubled ISOMATA (Idyllwild School of Music and Arts) summer program, Lowman arrived mid-winter when the campus had no activity. He had no idea in those first bleak months what his arrival would precipitate — the birth of the only independent high school arts boarding school on the West Coast, and that he would be celebrating 25 years as its head in 2010.

Lowman, a native of Las Vegas, Nev., first came to Idyllwild to sing in ISOMATA's festival choir in the summer of 1965. "I raised the money [to attend] selling chocolates," said Lowman.

The summer campus and program, established by Dr. Max Krone and wife Beatrice in 1950 as

a place for people of all backgrounds and ages to come together to experience the arts, early on featured distinguished teachers including writer Norman Corwin, choreographer Bella Lewitzky, folk singer Pete Seeger, composer Meredith Willson, painter Francoise Gilot, Native American artist Fritz Scholder and photographer Ansel Adams. The Krones had established the Idyllwild Arts Foundation (IAF) in 1946 and purchased acreage on which to build their dream. In 1964, IAF transferred operations and general management of the property and program to the University of Southern California (USC) under the terms of an agreement that gave IAF the option to resume control when it chose.

From 1974 until 1976, Lowman worked fulltime at USC as ISOMATA assistant director, and then on campus in Idyllwild during the summers. "I had made the decision that I was not going to be a professional tenor," said Lowman, "and the field of arts management was just opening up." In 1976, he returned to Nevada where he

IFPD says budget fine

The special meeting of the Idyllwild Fire Protection District (IFPD) commission resulted in no action and a continuation of the budget watching until the regular meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 12.

"I thought we're here to address the budget," said Commissioner Dr. Charles "Chip" Schelly. "I am quite frustrated to come to meeting and just go over the budget and don't do anything."

Schelly expressed this concern after Chairman Paul Riggi announced that the session would be only a budget review and without any action requiring a vote.

Despite the absence of Commissioner and Treasurer Ben Killingsworth, who has expressed strong concern about the district's budget, Fire Chief Steve Kunkle said, "We're [the budget] spot

RMRU rescues Hemet couple

Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit (RMRU), planning for winter training in the high country, instead mobilized around 11:30 p.m. Friday, Jan. 8 at the control road near the North Fork of the San Jacinto Bridge to search for a Hemet couple reported missing earlier that evening. The training may not be rescheduled.

According to Lee Arnson, RMRU president, the couple started at 11 a.m. Friday apparently trying to hike to the waterfalls above the drainage. RMRU arrived at the scene of the couple's vehicle around midnight. "We roped their vehicle off like a crime scene, took prints, and found tracks leading up the control road," said Arnson. "About 2 miles up, it looks like they took a left turn into an area with dense brush."

Crawling on their hands and knees through the brush, the rescuers still found no sign of the couple. Volunteers caught a few hours sleep before daybreak.

Early Saturday morning, Arnson and Ralph Hoetger went separately back down to hike up the North Fork drainage. Just after daybreak they encountered the couple hiking down the drainage Both friends were in their 20s. Neither RMRU

Outside Idyllwild

Mammals: California gray and ground squirrels

The gray squirrel is the unofficial mascot of Idyllwild. What other local

animal is more ingrained in the consciousness of our mountain community? After all, gray squirrels live in the trees everywhere, including in town. You can't go outside for very long without spotting a gray squirrel with the exception of the winter months when they are out less frequently.

Gray squirrels live and nest in trees. Their nesting materials include twigs, shredded bark, grasses and even the long hair from their tails to line the nest. Squirrels give birth to one to five kits from March until August and the kits spend up to six months in the nest. This explains why you hardly ever see baby squirrels out and about.

The gray squirrel's diet consists of berries, nuts, acorns and seeds. They bury a portion of their food in times of plenty so they will have food for winter. If you spend any time watching squirrels - and we all have at one time or another — they dig small holes and bury the acorns and then cover them up for retrieval later. I don't know how their little squirrel brains remember where the acorns are buried but I imagine that it has more to do with smell than memory. Of course, any acorn left behind has a chance to become a mighty oak tree.

The term "squirrelly" surely must come from watching an attempted road crossing by our local town squirrels. For anyone who lives in town or has driven Idyllwild's streets, I do not have to describe the seeming indecision which is

comic in effect unless, of course, it leads to their unfortunate demise

Two other things I find interesting about gray squirrels are their acrobatic maneuvers in trees, which seem to be pretty amazing considering how they behave on the ground. One of my personal favorites is watching how they can run full speed, head-first down a tree and stop on a dime. I also like their mad squirrel display of tapping on tree branches and "gunking" as my friend described the noise they make. While doing some research, I found that it is the females who are the territorial gender.

The California ground squirrel is much less conspicuous than its gray cousin as it lives in burrows and prefers lower elevations. One of the best places to observe this squirrel is Lake Hemet. The fronts of their burrows are easy to see as they build them at the high water mark of the lakeside. Ground squirrels tend to stay close to the opening of their burrows where they can run for cover when threatened.

Of all the questions I have been asked by tourists, one of my favorites was from a citifiedlooking gent while I was sitting on the shore of Lake Hemet. "Excuse me," he inquired, "what is that little brown animal over there?

That's a squirrel," I replied. His response was simply, "I thought so." Anyone who knows me knows that this little exchange amused me to no

With all the predators that prey on rodents it always amazes me that squirrels do as well as they do and it sure would be a much duller forest world without them.

El Niño around until spring

Weather scientists continue to predict a moderate El Niño pattern through spring. Rain and snowfall levels have been disappointing for those who thought this El Niño would be relief from the near decade long drought.

The latest National Weather Service (NWS) Advisory predicts, "El Niño strengthened during December 2009.... Collectively, these oceanic and atmospheric anomalies reflect a strong El Niño. The models continue to disagree on the eventual peak strength of El Niño (Fig. 5). ...Regardless of its precise peak strength, El Niño is expected to exert a significant influence on the global weather and climate in the coming months. Most models indicate ... El Niño will persist through April-May-June 2010.

Through December (half way through the rain year), Idyllwild has received 8.6 inches of rain. This is slightly more than last year's 7.8 inches for the same period. Average rainfall from July 1 through December 31 is 9.2 inches,

The NWS latest climate forecast indicates that an above normal rainfall level during the late winter and spring has occurred in more than 60 percent of the El Niño weather patterns since 1958. More rain or precipitation may be coming. While more than recent years, it may only fill the average annual

Get your flu vaccine

Despite falling hospitalization rates and deaths attributable to the H1N1 (swine) virus, national health officials warn that caution and care need to be maintained for several more months.

According to Dr. Anne Schuchat, director of the National Center for Immunizations and Respiratory Diseases at the U.S. Center for Disease Control, the flu pandemic of 1957 seemed to fade after the winter holidays and then returned in late winter with nearly the same devastating strength.

Since late November, many indicators of the virus' strength and breadth have been decreasing weekly. For example, the number of outpatient visits for influenzalike-illness has declined from nearly 8 percent in early November to 2.4 percent last week.

'My colleagues and I in public health are encouraging people to be vaccinated, especially those who are at risk of complications. None of us can predict what's going to happen," Schuchat advised last

In 1957, the flu epidemic peaked in the November-December period. As it fell during early winter, health officials thought it was ending and warnings to get vaccinated stopped. Then in the as possible is our best course of action, jp@towncrier.com.

spring of 1958 deaths began to climb again, nearly reaching the fall levels despite the availability of vaccine.

[T]he best thing for us to do is ... really focus on the idea that vaccine is the best way for us to reduce the chances that we will have ongoing disease, hospitalizations and deaths," Schuchat stressed. "As long as this virus is circulating, it has the potential to cause illness.

"This next week, or beginning this weekend, we're going to kick off the National Influenza Vaccination Week. ... It includes a focus on people at high risk for complications, adults with emphysema, pregnant women, seniors, children, really a focus on encouraging vaccination for anyone who hasn't yet been vaccinated and wants to be," she advised.

At this point in the flu season, health officials have plenty of H1N1 vaccine and urge everyone to get vaccinated. After children, pregnant and post-partum women are particularly vulnerable to the flu.

They also encourage seniors, not a target population, who have yielded to children to get their vaccination now.

"Having as many people vaccinated



even if we can't read the tea leaves of the future," Schuchat said. "The illness is down. There's plenty of vaccine. It's a key window of opportunity. We don't want to repeat the story from 1957."

Obituary Robert Eastin Read





Garner Valley homeowners await vote count

Garner Valley Property Owners Association (GVPOA) ballots to recall the existing board will be counted on Saturday, Jan. 16. What the recall will accomplish, if it successful, is unclear.

The "yes" on recall group believes that the existing board, headed by Mark Lamont, was wrong to settle a lawsuit brought by property owner Marc Jones against the then GVPOA board. That bloc presumably voted "no" in a fall 2008 vote to assess each property owner \$700 to settle the lawsuit and replenish GVPOA reserves drained by board prosecution of the suit.

"It's crazy," said architect and association member Bill Swank. "They think that by recalling the board the debt will go away," he said. "But the lawsuit is settled and the bill is coming [April 2011]. If the board and the association do not settle the suit, association property and assets can be liened. There's no accounting for

the arrogance of the other side."

Swank served on the association architectural committee that approved the Jones driveway, subject of the lawsuit, in 2003. Swank said he spoke to succeeding boards about the futility of prosecuting the lawsuit owing to the documented approval of the driveway. "I tried to talk to three board presidents that Jones was in total compliance with association bylaws and governing documents," said Swank. Once again, the state is expecting a multi-billion dollar deficit and must continue to cut programs in order to come close with a balanced budget, Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger announced Friday, Jan. 8.

However, Schwarzenegger recommended no further cuts in education programs. Compared to the current year, he proposed a \$225 million increase for higher education programs. K-12 programs would receive the full amount dedicated to them by Proposition 98; however, that is less than previous years because of the total decline in state revenues, especially property taxes.

"Our state, our economy and our future is [sic] so dependent on education that, as far as I'm concerned, we must protect education," Schwarzenegger said during his press conference.

STATUS OF RECYCLED WATER PROJECT GRANT FUNDS — We should receive a decision soon for our \$22,750 grant application for the project "planning phase." Based on receiving approval we will apply for an additional \$75,000 for the construction phase. The recycled water project total estimated project cost is \$150,000. This project could provide 10,000 to 20,000 gallons of recycled water per day for interested customers for irrigation use. The recycled water will be delivered by truck to customers with approved green tanks. The District will need to provide tank inspections to ensure there are no cross-connections before approving recycled water to customers. Final consideration for approval by the board members will be needed.

DISTRICT GOALS — The Board approved a list of nine goals at the December 15th Board meeting. In the next six months, the rates and charges, rules and regulations, and personnel policies and procedures hopefully will be updated.

REDUCED PRESSURE BACKFLOW DEVICES — Many businesses in the Idyllwild Water District received letters requesting that reduced pressure backflow devices be installed. Several have been installed and tested as required. All requested devices should be installed by the end of February.

COMPUTER OPERATED WATER SYSTEM — The District contracted with Digital Telecommunication Systems (DTS) to install a "state of the art" computer control system to automate the operation and monitor our water system facilities. Progress is being made — DTS is currently installing systems at the Golden Rod, Rockdale and South Ridge sites. We currently have a computer control system operating our Wildwood water system zone.

TWO NEW WELLS — IWD will be soliciting bids for drilling two new test wells — one on Lower Pine Crest Avenue and one on South Circle Drive. The test wells will help us determine whether to drill a production well which will be based on receiving good water samples and a minimum of 25 gallons per minute production.

2010 CENSUS TESTING — Census testing will take place at the IWD Boardroom January 14th, 21st and 28th at 10:00 a.m. These part-time jobs offer good pay and flexible hours. FS grazing permits on hold

The renewal of three Garner Valley grazing permits was reversed over the holidays. An appeal from three environmental groups asked the Forest Service to reconsider the threat to the critical habitat of two endangered species and resulted in the Forest Service's reversal of its earlier deci-

In late September, San Bernardino Forest Supervisor Jeanne Wade Evans approved the Rouse and Wellman grazing allotments. The Jim Burn pasture in the Paradise allotment was shifted to the Rouse permit and the remainder of the Paradise permit renewal was denied. No decision was made on the largest of the Garner Valley allotments — the Garner permit.

The Western Watersheds Project, Sierra Club, and the Center for Biological Diversity wrote to the Forest Service with specific concerns about the negative effect continued grazing would have on the critical habitat for both the Peninsular Bighorn Sheep and the Quino checkerspot butterfly.

On Dec. 23, Wade withdrew her earlier decisions approving the Rouse and Paradise permits. Five days later, an appeal deciding officer affirmed the groups' recommendation to reverse the Wellman allotment decision.

One of the principal reasons was the difference in the size of the allotment described in the environmental assessment and the size in the decision document. The latter was about 2,200 acres bigger.

In addition, the appeal recommended that the com.

Forest Service complete an environmental impact statement that will more thoroughly examine the alternatives and offer more effective mitigation measures.

"We are pleased that the Forest Service has responded to public concern and agreed to reconsider these grazing decisions to better protect important habitat for these endangered species," said Michael Connor, California director of Western Watersheds Project. "The Quino checkerspot butterfly has disappeared from 75 percent of its range and protecting what's left of its habitat is key to its survival."

"We hope to resolve this decades-long controversy over cattle in bighorn sheep habitat and Palm Canyon," said Joan Taylor, conservation chair of the local Sierra Club group. "There is no reason to let cattle threaten valuable biological and cultural resources." The Quino checkerspot is now found only in Riverside and San Diego counties in the United States.

Michael Connor, California director of the Western Watersheds Project, had replied to the Forest Service's initial planning request and the draft environmental analysis with the same concerns about possible damage to the Quino butterfly's and the bighorn sheep's critical habitat.

This correspondence has consistently addressed Forest Service's documents that acknowledge the possibility of habitat loss from grazing. However, the Forest Service was going to try to avoid critical seasons such as spring, but the appellants argued that was not sufficient protection.



founded the Nevada School of the Arts (NSA), using experience he had gained working for ISOMATA. NSA, built on the ISOMATA summer model, featured a sixweek summer camp and after school community work during the school year.

In 1983, IAF exercised its option to resume independent management and sole ownership of ISOMATA. In 1983, Glen Stephens became IAF chair. In 1985, Dr and Mrs. Richard MacNeal became major IAF benefactors. And in 1985, IAF hired Bill Lowman, in thoughtful mode, celebrating Lowman to put the summer program on a sound financial footing.

'They were struggling with what to do with the place," said Lowman. "I was hired to reinvigorate an already extraordinary program that was financially a little shaky. I came here as an expert in summer programs but it soon became clear that to preserve the summer we had to figure out what to do with the winter [academic year]. I had eight full-time staff at the time.

Lowman said IAF discussed many options in 1985 including forming a small liberal arts college, creating a conference center and dividing up the campus into lots and selling it off. "We were losing enough money with the summer but we wanted to expand using the founders' [Krones] vision.'

Lowman said the opportunity, epiphany and eventual solution centered on Idyllwild's Desert Sun, then Elliot Pope Preparatory boarding school, located on what is now Astrocamp. The idea was to have Pope provide

during the school year and ISOMATA the arts education. Lowman was still doubtful. He told IAF chair Glen Stephens, "It's [ISOMATA] always going to run a deficit." That's when benefactor MacNeal stepped in. He told Lowman, "I'll make the money problems go away if you can start it [the new venture] in one year [fall 1986]."

By August 1985, conversations with the Pope board had not produced an agreement. "At an IAF board meeting, I just announced the partnership," said Lowman. The Elliot Pope board hastily convened and, in September, Lowman had his partnership. "It was a calculated risk," said Lowman, "something I could never do today.

"In 1985 the IAF board had some very savvy and forward-looking people who realized that the new program [whatever it turned out to be] needed to be equally academic classes to ISOMATA arts students as important as the summer for the sum-

mer program to succeed. We wrote master plans, developed programs, and planned budgets.'

In 1985, Idyllwild Arts (IA) opened with 80 students, an arts curriculum of music, dance, theater and visual arts, a budget of \$800,000, and eight to 15 employees. The Pope partnership continued until 1990 when IA began conducting academic classes on campus. In 25 years, IA has grown to a \$13.5 million budget institution, more than 270 students from 30 states and 20 countries, more than 100 employees, 36 new campus buildings constructed since 1985 and added three new disciplines — creative writing, interdisciplinary and moving pictures.

"I've given my life to this and I'm thrilled with how it's turned out," he beamed when telling how it feels to him. When asked about proudest accomplishments over his 25-year tenure, Lowman said, "It's three things. Preserving the remarkable summer program founded by the Krones and their vision that the arts can enrich human life — arts for humans' sake, across many cultures; founding the Academy and seeing its extraordinary affect on young people; and philosophically, to have been part of the movement in this country that puts art in everyone's life and its profound impact on this world."

Disappointments? "I wanted to build a larger endowment," said Lowman. "It's still hard to do and I'm not going to be able to do that. Endowments are built through generations. Also I still want to build a concert hall and a theater."

Lowman, characteristically affable and upbeat, is focused on IA sustainability in this difficult recession and in years to come. "This marshall@towncrier.com.

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



film for \$325,000 in 17 days was "finding a way to make something big that is not." He succeeded.

Patrick Warburton as Rock Slyde, a cognitively clueless detective whose nose for crime is better than his noggin, was sad eyed, pitch perfect and endearing. Resisting the advances of femme fatale Rena Sofer's delicious Sara Lee because of a childhood spent watching "Soul Train" (but that's another story), Slyde faces down adversary cult leader Andy Dick (Bart of Bartology) to save his holdout office space in the everexpanding Bartology building and rescue his brainwashed secretary. And if you think that sentence is pointedly pithy, "Slyde" is even more crammed full with over-the-top winks, asides and jokes including a cameo by Jason Alexander as a Jewish U.S. postal carrier enamored of Slyde's turn as an actor in a gay porn musical (but that too is another story).

"Rock Slyde" performances, cinematography, original score and songs (if you don't leave the theater singing, "swashbuckle me, swashbuckle, down on your knees," you're probably dead), and script are brilliant and of a piece — a carefully crafted piece that is a testament to creativity on the cheap brilliance without big budgets. It is in fact everything the festival hoped it would be.

So clever you could see it twice, "Slyde" screens again at 5 p.m. Thursday at the Rustic.



Idyllwild grows a lily festival

Once a village of numerous festivals, Idyllwild is growing another - the Lemon Lily Festival (www. lemonlilyfestival.com), to be held Friday, July 16 through Sunday, July 18, 2010.

The idea of U.S. Forest Service botanist Kate Kramer, the festival's purpose is to provide education about, celebrate and restore what was once a major Idyllwild tourist attraction - the Lemon Lily (Lilium parryi). Dr. Charles C. Parry, a renowned British-American botanist, who was among the first to collect it in the summer of 1876, also shared his name with the flower's scientific name.

Many thousands used to grow on the Hill along perennial streams and in wet meadows, canyon bottoms, seeps and springs at elevations between 4,000 and 9,000 feet. A striking plant that can grow to over five feet with up to 30 flowers on a stalk, it is known for its strong lemon vanilla scent.

Owing to over-zealous bulb collectors in the early 20th cen-

tury and to environmental changes (less water, taller trees and more shade), the once populous local lily declined dramatically until the present time when it is largely unknown to most Idyllwild residents.

On Thursday, Jan. 7, planners of the prospective festival met at the Idyllwild Nature Center to introduce the concept to the communitv. Idvllwild Business Roundtable (IBRT) member Bryan Tallent, co-owner of the Spruce Moose, speaking on behalf of an already formidable committee

that includes representatives from the Forest Service, the Idyllwild Garden Club (current sponsor),

Friends of the Mount San Jacinto County Parks (current sponsor), IBRT and a profes-

sional events planner, said the festival will be an annual event designed to return the Lemon Lily to its former prominence.

Tallent said organizers hope to generate funds and enthusiasm for propagation and planting of the Lemon Lily, create public enthusiasm for those visiting the Hill to see it in bloom and for visitors and residents alike to become stewards of its restoration, growth and continued survival. "I can't imagine that anyone in Idyllwild who is civic-minded would not want to be involved," he said, "even if you just want to plant lily bulbs. The festival is not about making money, it's about planting lilies."

Committee member, pharmacist and self-styled naturalist and amateur botanist, Dave Stith outlined how community members can "Adopt a Lily," by purchasing bulbs which volunteers will take to scouted locations and plant, as part of the propagation program. Last summer, Stith counted 2,662 Lemon Lilies along Willow and Tahquitz creeks from the end of July through September.

'Had we seen a 100 we would have been thrilled," said Stith. "We saw many more." Stith accompanied Dr. Tom Chester, self-taught botanist, astrophysicist and renaissance man, on last summer's search along the local creeks. Chester, whose website, www.tchester.org, contains a wealth of information about plants to be found along local mountain trails, estimates that at its height, prior to removal of bulbs and weather condition changes, the Hill hosted over 33,000 Lemon Lilies

The festival will have a major

educational outreach component - to teach local and visiting children the importance of conservation and stewardship of prized natural resources and to motivate young and old to help restore the Lemon Lily to previous numbers. "One of the driving forces [festival goals] will be to get youth involved," said Stith. And organizers intend it to be fun for children, with festival events that are designed to be family friendly, with children at the center of the 3-day party.

IBRT member and lily festival website manager Doug Yagaloff asks those interested to visit the site

> and sign up to receive a regular newsletter about festival developments, schedule, volunteer and sponsor opportunities.

> "I'm hoping the newsletter has 1,000 people signed up by the beginning of spring," said Yagaloff. "Our intent is to have a great presence at every event leading up to the festival. We'll have posters up at both venues of the Idyllwild [International Festival of Cinema] film festival, and representation at all festivals prior to July 16."

Monetary or in-kind donations are tax deductible since the festival is being run through the Friends of Mt. San Jacinto County Parks' 501 (c) (3) non-profit.

Although the festival planning is just beginning, what has already been talked about is: an opening reception; a juried art show (Lemon Lily inspired art) with awards; organized hikes to see the lily in its natu-



His current budget recommendations project a positive \$1,400 balance on June 30, 2010, at the end of the current fiscal year. However, Kunkle admitted that good fortune had smiled on the district.

As a result of joining the county's Teeter Plan which will provide some protection for future tax revenues, the county reviewed past years property tax payments and discovered \$138,000 of past due receipts.

"I was quite surprised," Kunkle noted. "I'm gratified, but it is one time only."

This unplanned windfall substantially ensures the budget for the remainder of the year, according to Kunkle. He also recommended net budget adjustments of about \$14,000. The largest was a \$30,000 reduction in the career salaries account due to former Capt. James Manietta's retirement. He also recommended reduc-

ing his contingency account by \$10,000 from \$28,250 to \$18,250, and paramedic training from \$7,500 to \$4,500.

His \$14,000 in adjustments plus the unexpected \$138,000 creates a budget projected to have \$1,400 surplus. But, Kunkle's proposal includes no provision for paying for the Zoll Medical equipment, if it is kept, or any other costs that may occur as a result of returning the equipment, such as a restocking fee or legal costs.

Since the commission did not yet know the final resolution and its concomitant cost, these funds could not yet be included in the proposed budget, according to President Paul Riggi.

Questions were also raised about the status of the agency's reserves. Since Dec. 2008, IFPD's reserves have fallen almost \$225,000 (or 40 percent). Much of that money, according to the Craig Coopersmith, IFPD's financial officer, was used for cash until the property tax revenues were received last month. These deposits will restore the previous reserve levels.

But \$170,000 has been "borrowed" from the benefits and capital reserve accounts without any prior discussion with the commission. In addition, nearly \$32,000 of benefit reserves were used to pay for unused vacation.

Earlier in the meeting, Schelly expressed his concern about the continuing growth of IFPD's budget. He expressed doubt that tax revenues would continue to grow at the same rate as in the past three to five years.

"If we keep that projection, we won't have revenues to meet the budget," he warned. We can't keep setting the budget higher and higher. We won't have the revenues."

In response, Kunkle said he felt very comfortable with his current five-year projections and recommendations for additional staff.

Quakes shake the Hill

Several earthquakes that occurred near Banning were felt in the Idyllwild area on Monday, Dec. 11. The strongest, registering 4.3 local magnitude, occurred at 6:36 p.m. Its epicenter was 3 miles northnortheast of Banning, with a depth of 7.1 kilometers (4.4 miles). Two others, originating from the same location, occurred earlier in the day — a 3.1-magnitude quake at 3:24 p.m. and a 3.2-magnitude quake at

Earthquakes of this size, while a little unnerving, are quite common. Quakes measuring 3.0 to 3.9 on the Richter scale are often felt, but rarely cause damage. There are about 49,000 earthquakes of this magnitude every year. Quakes measuring 4.0 to 4.9, of which there are about 6,200 each year, usually cause noticeable shaking of indoor items, but significant damage is unlikely. No immediate damage or injuries were reported as a result of Monday's quakes.

reserve that he has included in his overall proposal.

Unlike last year, state park closures are not on the horizon. According to Ruth Coleman, director of the California State Parks, the one-year reduction is over. The new budget restores the \$22 million cut and provides \$140 million for park operations.

However, state park operational funds are no longer derived from the state's general funds. The governor has proposed to fund park programs from the Trankean Ridge offshore drilling leases.

Similar to the Cal-Fire ERF, if the Legislature balks at this funding mechanism, the \$140 million will come from the reserve funds

In the last very wet year (2004-2005), 18 inces fell on Idyllwild through December 31: more than 15.5 were received after October 1.

Last year's total rainfall was 18 inches, about 70 percent of normal and the fourth consecutive year of below average rainfall.

But snowfall was more than 55 inches compared to the annual average of 38.2 inches. Through December, the Hill has seen 17.5 inches of snow. Despite the very wet winter of 2004-05, only 18.7 inches of precipitation fell as

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
