

Billboards and busses boost business

n its first two months, the Idyllwild Business Roundtable (IBRT), a collection of local merchants. and business people, found the means to rent two billboards promoting Idyllwild on interstates 10 and 215.

For a while, this accomplishment seemed to become an albatross that might infect the group's positive thinking. Raising money for the rest of the year-long lease and possibly extending it another year was not a simple task for a volunteer group. But IBRT has found solutions thanks to Jeff Stone, Third District supervisor, and Idyllwild Arts (IA). Stone has offered to find some funding to pay

the balance of 2010. The IA owner of Harvest Market, is considering a way to share space on the billboards.

Now, IBRT is bounding into year two with more projects planned to increase the visibility of Idyllwild as a tourist spot and destination, according to Brent Miller, an IBRT participant. Recently, the group invited the Palm Springs Convention Center Desert Resorts Communities and Visitor Authority to visit the town and speak to the IBR.

"They are easily what we're looking for," Miller said. "They reach out around the world. We're the jewel at the end of the road from the desert. We have a beautiful rock and historic buildings to offer tourists from below."

and Miller understand that the changes needed here to create new mindsets miles away will take time. But the results will be a healthier and stronger business environment in Idyllwild.

Local teens deface school

wo local teens, former Idyllwild School students, tagged seven middle school campus buildings with white supremacist symbols and text, including swastikas and hate messages, between 8 and 10 p.m. Monday, March 1.

By Tuesday, largely based on tips from current middle school students, the Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RCSD) had the identities of the two and arrested both. A search of one boy's room revealed a stash of white supremacist material. Further searches of the boys' computers showed their MySpace pages filled with similar supremacist screed. Neither set of parents professed any knowledge of their sons' suprema-

cist opinions, according to RCSD Deputy and School Resource Officer Josh Cadenhead who reported the incident.

Some of the slogans scrawled on the school's campus were particularly shocking and offensive because this kind of hate mongering is rare in Idyllwild, according to Deputy Cadenhead. School Principal Matt Kraemer advised parents to check their children's MySpace and Facebook pages to see what they're viewing. "It could be a wake-up call," said Kraemer and prevent catastrophic school incidents that have become all too familiar since Columbine.

The duo calls themselves So Cal Skins (SCS) and signs their graffiti "SCS." Deputy Cadenhead advised anyone See Taggers, page 8

Many Forest Service roads reopened

On Thursday, March 4, 2010, the San Jacinto Ranger District opened Forest Service Rroads on the northwest section of the forest, as well as Santa Rosa and Thomas Mountain. Forest Service Roads that are now opened are: 4S05 (Mellor Ranch Road), 4S06, 4S10, 4S19 (Angelus Hill Road), 4S21 (Indian Truck Trail), 5S06 (Control Road), 5S07 (Bee Canyon), 5S09 (San Jacinto Truck Trail), 5S10 (Red Hill Truck Trail) and 5S24 all part of the Cottonwood and Esperanza burn areas, as well as, 7S02 (Santa Rosa Mountain) and 6S13 (Thomas Mountain).

These road closures were for public safety because of the chance of ice, mud, rockslides, washouts, flash flooding, slippery road surfaces and snow. The closures also serve to protect the road system itself. The Forest Service has a responsibility to minimize damage to the road system in case of an emergency or disaster. Even though the Forest Service maintains the road system on an annual basis, its limited capacity to do so often results in road maintenance not being completed until well into fire season. Therefore, under unusual or extreme winter weather conditions, it sometimes becomes necessary to temporarily close the road system in order to minimize damage to the roads, thereby allowing access to fire suppression and emergency responders earlier in the fire season before the road maintenance is completed. These roads are subject to possible future closures pending any additional inclement weather.

Forest Service Road 4S01 (Black Mountain Road) will remain closed at Highway 243 until further notice.

OUTSIDE IDYLLWILD

Monkey Phur and Windstopper: In search of the golden fleece

Any experienced outdoorsman or woman knows the importance of layering when it comes to choosing clothing for outdoor

activities. No matter what time of year, you need to have a mid-layer for warmth and a waterproof jacket for rain and snow. The midlayer and rain shell are two of the 10 essentials that should be in your pack at all times.

All clothing systems start with a base layer which can be anything from a short-sleeve synthetic t-shirt and a pair of shorts for summer to a full set of long underwear, long-sleeve top and pants. If you are just hanging around town you could get by with a base layer and a big thick jacket but this type of outfit is impractical on the trail.

In the current winter conditions, a base layer and a mid-layer are both necessary to keep your core temperature up, even when you are doing strenuous exercise. For outdoor activities, most people think a technical fleece layer will fill the bill.

So how does technical fleece differ from the stuff you can buy at Old Navy? First, it wicks moisture away from the body so you don't get wet from the inside. Secondly, it is designed to give you the maximum warmth with the lightest weight possible.

When I started working at the shop 10 years ago, fleece came in two weights - thick and thicker. The reason is fleece does not block wind so thicker adds warmth. Still, without a way to deflect the wind, it is not as warm as the fleece jackets made today.

Fleece manufacturers have done two things to improve this defect. First, they developed a fuzzy type fleece that traps warm air but weighs less than the thicker counterpart. They also added Gore Windstopper to increase the warmth factor without adding too much weight. The Windstopper provided a jacket that was very warm, breathable, moisture



wicking, windproof and lightweight.

The next innovation was the soft shell. Basically a soft shell is a hybrid of a fleece and a rain jacket. A soft shell is smooth on the outside like a rain jacket but is fleece on the inside. A soft shell is thinner, lighter, windproof, moisture wicking and is made from a stretchy fabric that moves when you do. Also, a soft shell can be anything from water-resistant to almost completely waterproof depending on either DWR (durable water resistant) coatings or other more waterproof membranes.

Finally, in the last three years a wide array of extremely lightweight down jackets have arrived and they are great as mid-layers. With thinner and lighter-weight nylon shell materials and high-quality goose down (in the 700 to 850 range), you have down jackets that no longer make you look like the "Pillsbury Doughboy" when you are wearing them on the trail.

Whatever mid-layer you choose, try to get as many of the technical features as you can. In the end, having a tech fleece jacket significantly adds much to your outdoor wardrobe without weighing heavily on your back or in your pack.





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Community spirit, volunteerism and the glory of Idyllwild have been the themes pitched on this page for nearly four months. So are Judy Begin, proprietor of the Idyllwild Gift Shop, and I the only ones reading this column?

We haven't seen one brick laid for the 1 new community center, one dollar contributed to the summer concert series, one endowment granted for an Idyllwild School teacher or one new trail blazed through the forest.

But neither of us expected immediate changes. In fact, "change" may be the wrong word. Volunteerism is already rooted and rampant in this hamlet. As I've mentioned, more than 100 people assist the Associates of Idyllwild Arts to produce the annual Jazz in the Pines. The Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council's Woodies are always busy cutting and stacking wood for the HELP Center. Most recently, the Art Alliance of Idyllwild was resuscitated with an influx of volunteers.

This weekend, you can visit the Parks Exhibition Center on the Idyllwild Arts Academy campus to see the results of the smARTS program. A group of parents and local artists have been supplementing Idyllwild School's art progam for nearly seven years. Each year they exhibit the students' art in a special show.

Judy's suggestion that we search for community spirit was not intended to reinvigorate a limp and lifeless community. The spirit of helping and volunteering is ubiquitous in our alpine home. Judy was hoping to find a bigger purpose or goal that would unite much of the town - merchants and residents, Woodies and Quilters, music fans and athletes. An intention that would reverse the natural tendency of spinning objects to fly off in random directions.

She wanted to find a more unifying cause than we have seen in years. Judy's inspiration came from the stories of the whole town building Town Hall or planting trees at Living Free.

No new ideas were proffered this week. Of the five - planting a garden in front of the Idyllwild Area Historic Society building, creating an endowment for the Summer Concert Series, building a teen center, improving our efficient use of biomass and returning Jo'An's to a park — which I described last week, Judy thought two ideas made the town "look good" and three helped us "do good." Re-establishment of a town square or park would attract many people's involvement and thus embody her original idea of "community spirit."

But Judy believes some people have already started something just as valuable. The work to create and establish the Lemon Lily Festival is already envigorating the community with a unifying spirit.

"The Lemon Lily fest is a good indicator that people here want to do good," she said.

If you visit the Lemon Lily site (www.lemonlilyfestival. com), you'll see many local groups are already involved. The Nature Center, the Garden Club and many businesses up and down North Circle Drive.

Despite letter writer Tim Bennett's concerns about sufficient water to enable the bulbs to survive, people want to be part of the effort to revive this native flora.

The Idvllwild Business Roundtable has taken a deep interest, but involvement is not limited to merchants. The Pine Cove Property Owners Association recently donated funds for the festival.

Beth Nottley's story last week showed that participation is growing and ideas are proliferating. Recently, Bryan Tallent, co-owner of The Spruce Moose, revealed they are developing a special lemon lily fragrance for their candles.

Finally, for those who have difficulty letting go of the possibility of a town garden, Judy has copies of "Kid Gallahad," filmed in Idyllwild when there was only Eleanor's Park.

Preparing for "I'm lost!" ...

In my 15 years of experience with Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit, the vast majority of our call-outs from the Sheriff's Department have been due to someone being lost.



These calls are usually initiated by worried

friends or family members who become concerned when their loved one does not arrive home at the appointed time. Many of these situations could be avoided altogether, but if people do find themselves lost, following a few tried and true rules may mean the difference between being found quickly, or not at all.

People tend to get lost most commonly due to lack of adequate planning. Hikers sometimes think they have a better understanding of the area they are in and will split up with their hiking partners. This can easily turn into a missed switchback or taking the wrong trail. While the hiker that went ahead may be okay, the one left behind frequently misses the friend's path.

Hikers these days often carry GPS units and cell phones. These devices, while very helpful, often give the inexperienced hiker a false sense of security. Once they find themselves lost, the fact that satellite signals are often not available can lead to panic.

Many hikers are often unable to read a map or use a compass. Before heading out to an area, hikers should make sure they have a familiarity with the area, a plan as to when and where they will be and to make sure they have shared that plan with someone so if something does happen, there is a concerned and informed reporting party that can help focus a search.

in town who has had property similarly tagged and signed to contact RCSD Hemet Station at (951) 791-3412. "There may be just these two in the gang, or maybe more," he said. "So far there are no links or ties to anything bigger.

"This does not qualify as a hate crime because there was no specific person targeted," said Cadenhead. Still this is an affront to the school and the town's sensibilities, in his opinion.

"Our middle school kids were very upset that this happened," said Kraemer. "They know that this is their school and it has been attacked and defaced." Kraemer said he would institute immediate school-wide security measures, including locking of all gates during school hours and requiring

any school visitors, including parents of students, to come to the office and sign in before proceeding onto campus. "This will be a closed campus during the school day," he said. "I'm doing this to maintain a safer student environment for students and staff."

Kraemer contacted Town Hall Recreation Director Bob Lewis to consult on the incident since the community uses school facilities at night. "I've asked him to contact Community Patrol to see if they could patrol the campus while community recreation events are taking place."

Kraemer said the new security measures would remain in effect for the time being

license suspension. Smith's harsh words should be directed at Kunkle's administration, not the current IFPD chief or board.

Our community was never at risk despite Smith's conspiracy theories. The board members fulfilled their promises to our community by monitoring the issue until it was properly resolved.

While Reyes brought this subject up in a public meeting himself, he has protections under The Firefighters' Bill of Rights and to discuss it further could be a violation of those rights.

However, it remains unfortunate that this was not properly resolved in the many months of known contact between Reyes, Kunkle, and REMS. Had it been done, the community would not have incurred the additional expense of the required extra paramedic. Former Chief

Kunkle made that choice and after his unexpected resignation it came to Interim Chief Mulhall to address the issue and it was resolved quickly.

Chief Mulhall is working with the many fine men and women of IFPD to ensure the continuation of the quality service Idyllwild and Pine Cove residents have come to rely upon. I firmly believe that Chief Mulhall has already had a very positive effect at IFPD.

Much has been accomplished in a period of just over 90 days by IFPD's "new" board, Chief Mulhall and IF-PD's employees who are truly motivated by community service. Our community is safer than ever and I am very eager to see where we will be this time next year — despite any further conspiracy theories.

Full credits are allowed for other manufacturers.

For 2009 and 2010, the new American Opportunity Tax Credit for higher education has been created. The credit equals 100 percent of the first \$2,000 of qualifying expense plus 25 percent of the next \$2,000 up to a total of \$2,500.



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Rain, but not records

It's wet, but not wet enough to end the drought. Despite the presence of "El Niño" conditions, rainfall this rain year (July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010) is barely going to exceed the longterm rainfall average of 25.7 inches.

Through February, Idyllwild has received 19 inches and Keenwild Ranger Station has received about 20.6 inches since July 1. If the March through June averages are achieved, Idyllwild's rainfall will be about 26 inches this year.

During the decade from rainfall was 29.44 inches. In three years — 1993, 1995 and 1998 — the rainfall exceeded 45 inches. In the past 10 years, annual rainfall has exceeded 40 inches only once — 2005. The average rainfall for these 10 years has been 20.6 inches - twothirds of the prior decade's rainfall.

"The El Niño impact is there, but nothing like we saw in 1998," Patzert said. "No records this winter."

But rainfall has been increasing. From 2000 through 2004, the average was 17.7 inches and from 2005 through 2009, it grew to 23.4 inches, which is still almost 10 percent less

than the longterm average. So rainfall is increasing and is much better than the beginning years of the 21st century. The current El Niño is only disappointing to those hoping for massive rain or snow.

The Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit's (RMRU) snow survey detected 5.5 to 6 feet of snow at Saddle Junction. The snowpack had a very high water content, according to RMRU President Lee Arnson.

Eventually the melted snow will manifest itself in the groundwater levels of the local water districts' wells. Terry Lyons, Idyllwild Water district general manager, says Lake Foster is already full again. "So, some nice rain and

snowpack, but no droughtbuster for Idyllwild or most of California," Patzert continued. "Come summer, you'll still be watching your water levels and local water managers will be preaching conservation."

IFPD buying med equipment

The Idyllwild Fire Protection District (IFPD) commission held a special meeting Thursday, March 4 to authorize a plan to finance the purchase of the Zoll Medical equipment.

The commission is using \$40,000 from its reserves and obtaining a financing lease with PNC Equipment for the balance of the \$112,000 total cost.

When asked if the county Emergency Medical Services Agency has given IFPD approval to use the AutoPulse units (a strap placed around the thorax to perform automatic cardiopulmonary resuscitation), Commission President Jeannine Stigall replied that she expected the approval would be granted.

"I don't see any reason why we wouldn't eventually get approval from the county," she said. "Some new or revised protocols

such as tracking their use and others are needed."

On Feb. 20, commission members decided to seek financial help to purchase the equipment, which had been originally ordered in September 2008.

Commissioners Peter Capparelli and Paul Riggi contacted and reviewed several sources. Last week, they recommended PNC to the commission who approved the submittal of the lease application. IFPD will have a monthly payment of about \$1,355 for 60 months, at which time the equipment will belong to the district.

The equipment includes new defibrillators and two AutoPulse units.

The IFPD funds were sent to Zoll overnight. Zoll company trainers will introduce the IFPD staff to the defibrillators and assist in training them on the equipment.

- Ahhhhh, WET WEATHER! How is this rainy season contributing to our water resources? At this point, Foster Lake is full and that is a good sign. Historically, 27 inches of annual rainfall from July 1st to June 30th is considered a good year for precipitation in Idyllwild. In 2007/08 we received 24 inches, 2008/09 we received 19 inches and currently from July 1st to date we have received 19 inches. For the three-year period a total of 62 inches have been received, less than the historic average of 81 inches total rainfall. The Pine Cove and Fern Valley areas receive different rainfall totals than we do in Idyllwild. We anticipate more moisture for the "Hill," so remember when it rains we should all say "Ahhhhh, WET WEATHER." IWD will be maintaining the Stage 1 voluntary Water Conservation. Any questions, give us a call at (951) 659-2143.
- **GREASE AT WASTEWATER PLANT** Our plant operators recently needed to remove about 10 gallons of grease before it entered our wastewater treatment process. We have been investigating numerous manholes to locate where the grease is coming into the District's sewer collection system. This is a serious health violation issue and also negatively affects the functions of the treatment facility. Businesses install grease interceptors to keep grease from flowing into our sewer system. It is the responsibility of the owner and managers of restaurants and other businesses to oversee the proper maintenance and cleaning of their interceptors. They are expected to inspect their grease interceptor tank every six months and need to assign someone in-house to oversee the proper maintenance and pumping. During the year, businesses will provide us with pumping reports. To maintain a business permit, owners need to work closely with us so they don't pollute the environment and come under the scrutiny of the County Health Department. We are all stewards of our environment and working together will help us maintain the quality of life that we enjoy here on the Hill.
- **SYSTEM FLUSHING CONSIDERED** Periodically we try to flush the water system to remove the natural buildup of iron and manganese. It's been five years since we scheduled a water system flushing program. This program helps maintain our water quality and maximizes the highest fire hydrant flows. This flushing program is performed over several days at night to minimize traffic conditions. We will notify our water customers when we schedule the water flushing program based, of course, on much warmer temperatures. Although we flush dead-end water mains throughout the year, the system flushing program is done when we are in a position to use the flushed water. We will divert some of the flushed water to help clean the sewer collection system.

wise freed up male pilots for combat duty. From 1942, with the creation of the Women's Auxiliary Ferrying Squadron (WAFS) to the December 1944 disbanding of the successor WASPs, over 1,000 WASP pilots transported 12,650 aircraft from swift fighter planes to B-26 heavy bombers. Thirtyeight WASPs lost their lives in service — 11 in training and 27 in active duty.

Wood recounted in her book, "We Were WASPS," the pure joy of the experience. "Towing targets was only part of our work. One phase that was highly popular with the pilots was the strafe mission. Troops would be camped out in the [U.S. Southwest] desert, camouflaged elaborately. We would fly over and spot them. Peeling off, we'd dive down on emplacements, trucks, chow lines or anything visible. The men would track us with guns, simulating actual combat conditions. One over-anxious WASP spotted a jeep with two soldiers careening down the road one bright morning. She made a pass and nothing happened. The soldiers were so used to this treatment that they didn't even look up. But the [WASP] pilot, having been dragged out of a warm bed at five o'clock, swore it would be a success. The next pass was a lulu. The soldiers fell out of the jeep and ran. The jeep continued merrily down the road until brought up short against an embankment. Pulling up in a steep chandelle [a maneuver] she gave them time to climb back in the jeep and dove on them again. From the shelter of the ditch where they hastily retired the soldiers called up unheard curses on the strafer while the jeep went scooting down the road once more." Idyllwild years, Lewis, an accomplished artist, illustrated Wood's book.

Wood was part of the class of 43-7 (the seventh scheduled class in 1943) at Avenger Field in Sweetwater Texas. As part of being accepted into the program, each WASP came into the program with a commercial pilot's rating and, on average, 1,400 flying hours. They received 30 days of orientation to learn Army paperwork and to fly by military regulations.

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Contacted by phone in Virginia, Lewis, now 94, said she is looking forward to the medal ceremony. "I think it's a wonderful thing," she See Pilots, page 19

Oyler kin to be tried

Christopher Vaughn Hillman, 48, of Hesperia, the brother-in-law of convicted arsonist and murderer, Raymond Lee Oyler, must stand trial on seven counts of jury tampering.

On Thursday, March 4, Judge Michael B. Donner ruled there is enough evidence against Hillman for him to stand trial. The court record states, "... the court finds sufficient cause to hold the defendant to answer on all charges. ... an information arraignment is set for March 19."

In October 2006, Oyler started the Esperanza Fire in the Cabazon pass which killed five U.S. Forest Service firefighters. The blaze burned more than 41,000 acres and destroyed 34 residences.

Oyler was charged with the murders of the five firefighters and his trial was held from January through March 2009. A jury convicted Oyler of five counts of murder and recommended he face the death penalty. On June 5, 2009, Judge W. Charles Morgan sentenced Oyler to death.

In February 2009 during Oyler's trial, fliers appeared on the car windows of members of his jury. These fliers spoke of another potential defendant, a former Forest Service employee who had been investigated but was cleared. They included copies of newspaper articles describing various pretrial rulings by Judge Morgan in Oyler's trial which prohibited the defense from introducing this evidence. A 6-month investigation led to charges being filed against Hillman in August.

Three of the jurors in Oyler's trial discovered the fliers during the noon recess and Riverside County sheriff's deputies located four more fliers on the windshields of other jurors.

The District Attorney alleges Hillman prepared and delivered the fliers to juror's vehicles parked in County of Riverside juror parking lots.

If I may use an analogy of losing a child in a grocery store — while you are walking around looking down every aisle, the child is doing the same thing, and you keep missing each other. If the lost child had stayed put, he would have been found very quickly.

Once you decide you need to stay put, make sure you are away from running water. Once search and rescue units are dispatched, we hike the area we think you may be in and try to establish voice contact. Proximity to running water can drown out our calls. Listen carefully for people calling out, or for the sounds of a search

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helicopter.

Don't be fooled by "city lights" that appear to be much closer than they are. The terrain between you and those lights may be impassable. Accept the reality of the situation and stay put.

Being lost can be a terrifying experience, but by properly preparing, you may avoid ever making it your own personal experience. As always, **plan for being out longer than you think**. Always have appropriate food, clothing and water with you. Many people scarcely clothed for a warm day hike can become hypothermic as day becomes a cold mountain night.

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

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

Daylight Saving: Not just a clock adjustment

At 2 a.m. on March 14, people in most states will set their clocks one hour forward to begin Daylight Saving Time (DST). The "spring forward" first advocated by Benjamin Franklin was adopted by the U.S. in 1918. The government's objective was to save energy for war production by taking advantage of the extended daylight hours from April through October.

Between the wars and after World War II, Congress left it to states and communities to decide on DST adoption. As a result, Arizona (except for the Navajo nation that straddles three

the U.S. Virgin Islands and American Samoa do not

observe DST. Indiana was the DST oddball. Not only is the state split between two time zones (Eastern and Central), but until 2005, when the Indiana legislature voted to adopt DST statewide, only some parts of the state observed DST and the majority did not.

In 2005 the U.S. Congress passed the Energy Policy Act which made DST four weeks longer than it had been. The law took effect in 2007. Grammatical purists will argue that DST is itself a misnomer since no daylight is actually saved - it is shifted later in the

> Scientists and economists have documented that this small one hour clock adjustment produces surprisingly large effects in many parts of our daily lives — energy use, the business economy, public safety, and health.

Water agency studies grant options

On Wednesday, March 3, the San Jacinto Mountain Area Water Agency (SJWA) held its first quarterly meeting of 2010. The agency is seeking ways to develop additional monitoring wells for the Hill and to refurbish existing production wells.

For most of the meeting, the board reviewed potential sources for grants or

investigate further the availability of state Proposition 84 funding. Grant applications will be due in April and the board asked its general managers to explore the feasibility and benefits of seeking funding under this authority.

"I'd like to know the intricacies of how we could use the money," said SJWA President Jim Billman, for Idyllwild Water District. "It's a baby step to find out. We don't have the information financing. They decided to now but this would allow

us to use a door stop to prevent the [funding] door from closing [on us].

IWD General Manager Terry Lyons encouraged the board to pursue a grant. He argued that "it's small districts and communities that are now favored."

The California Department of Water Resources manages the local groundwater assistance program. About \$4.7 million, authorized by the approval of Proposition 84, will be com.

awarded to local public agencies. The grants are from groundwater management, monitoring and studies. The maximum award will be \$250,000.

"This might be an extension of our first groundwater management plan," Lyons said. "We would monitor the flow of groundwater through our valley, the quality of water and its age."

Seven candidates for SD-37: Peters interview

Editor's note: California Secretary of State Debra Bowen certified seven candidates for the Senate District 37 race: Democrats Justin Blake, Arthur Bravo Guerrero and Anna Nevenic; Republicans Russ Bogh, Bill Emmerson and David W. Peters and American Independent Matt Monica. Immediately prior to the election we will identify our stories about this campaign. Bogh and Emmerson have already been interviewed. Former Hemet school board member David Peters is interviewed below.

David W. Peters, former Hemet Unified School District trustee and current Perris High School math teacher, a Republican, is running again for Senate District 37. He was a candidate in 2008 and renews some of the same campaign themes previously used.

Peters still recommends docking legislator salaries for every day they fail to balance the budget after the July 1 beginning of each fiscal year. "Their failure affects many public boards, including school districts, who have to guess what their own budgets should be," said Peters. "There should be a law that states once the budget is past due, all elected officials are off the clock.'

Peters would also support

having a part-time legislature, especially in times of fiscal crisis, to save legislative salaries and force action only on key issues. He does not believe that having a full time legislature allows elected officials to become too cozy with lobbyists and special interests. "I think the coziness comes from having to raise funds for subsequent campaigns," said Peters. "It's a full-time job. I'm not going to raise money from special interests."

In 2008, Peters opposed any new taxes. Today, he advocates two new taxes - on liquor and on pornographic materials for sale. Peters said he does not support the recent sales tax increase because of its chilling effect on business. Rather than repealing the increase, Peters recommends rebating 2 percent of that increase on goods and services at marshall@towncrier.com.



IAHS builds new addition

The Idyllwild Area Historical Society (IAHS) hopes to soon begin construction of its new 732-square-foot climate-controlled Archive and Research Center according to Bob Smith. "The architect [Jim Marsh] thinks we'll get an approved permit this week," said Smith. "I think we'll be able to schedule groundbreaking at our Friday [March 12] board meeting. After that, we think we'll be looking at about a 4month construction process, with completion by end of summer."

IAHS accepted a bid from Griner Construction, one of three bidders that included Roby Gray and Bob Kanter. "Griner's was the lowest bid," did not set out to select low marshall@towncrier.com.

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Historic District Town Hall Meeting scheduled

Jerry Jolliffe, deputy director of the Riverside County Planning Department, announced that the long-delayed Town Hall meeting to discuss the case for Idyllwild's becoming the county's sole Historic District will take place this month. Given concerns over possible snow, Jolliffe selected four dates, the first being Thursday, March 18 from 7 to 9 p.m. Depending upon snow conditions, the other three dates won't be needed.

If snow threatens the first date, Jolliffe will decide at the latest Tuesday morning, March 16, whether the meeting should be shifted to the next date, Thursday March 25. The same scenario exists for this date. The third option is Wednesday, March 31, and the final back-up date is Thursday, April 8.

Jolliffe said all this information would be posted on the planning depart-

org/planning and mailed to landowners within the Historic Resources Survey current boundaries. Attending the meeting with Jolliffe will be Leslie Mouriquand of the Planning Department, Keith Herron, County Historic Preservation Officer, Regional Park and Open Space District, Olivia Barnes, legislative assistant to 3rd District Supervisor Jeff Stone and Verne Lauritzen, Stone's Chief of Staff.

The Historic Resources Survey of Idyllwild, dated Sept. 30, 2009 and prepared by consultant LSA Associated, Inc. is available on the county Web site. The survey shows the boundaries of the current proposed district for landowners to view. A printed version is available at the Idyllwild Branch Library.

Jolliffe urged residents, especially those property owners within the confines of the district, to view the survey document and attend

ment Web site www.rctlma. the meeting, now scheduled in the evening so that more business owners can attend. Although Jolliffe said county counsel must determine the specifics of approval of a historic district designation by Idyllwild residents, the previous ordinance drafted for Old Town Temecula required approval by a majority of property owners within the designated district.

Potential benefits to Idyllwild as a historic preservation district include protection of Idyllwild's historic character with a board charged with design review for new construction and maintaining the character of existing historic construction; possible relaxation of some Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) provisions; other incentives

regarding less stringent parking requirements; applicability of state historic building codes; and possible use by the county of the Mills Act, whereby the county reduces property taxes on historic buildings on the condition that the property owner puts the amount of the reduction back into the property as improvements. Probably most important would be the additional cachet Idyllwild would have as a tourist destination as the county's sole historic preservation district — a lost in time Brigadoon, a mid-century piece of Americana preserved much as it was when Packards started making the trip to Idyllwild from Los Angeles.
