Two RMRU missions

Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit (RMRU) volunteers were needed twice this past weekend.

According to Lee Arnson, RMRU president, and volunteer Ralph Hoetger, who was involved with both rescues, two Marines who had begun

early Friday, April 16 got lost that night near Saddle Junction. A Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RCSD) Aviation Unit helicopter spotted them Friday night and with a bullhorn told them which direction to hike out in the morning. The Marines went in the opposite direction

hiking at Black Mountain April 17 at Carumba. Another helicopter unit picked up RMRU volunteer Nick Nixon at Skunk Cabbage and hoisted him down to the two. All were hoisted up and the mission wrapped around 8 p.m. that night.

In the April 18 rescue, five local kids, four girls and one boy, went to the grotto near and wound up at noon on Idyllwild Arts late Saturday

and kept hiking down until they got stuck, according to Arnson. "They basically stayed in the drainage, and with so much flowing water, they could not even hear the calls of our team members," he related. "They hiked themselves out, getting back to their cars around 2 a.m."

OUTSIDE IDYLLWILD

Equipment odds and ends ...

It seems that every year brings new products on the market for hikers and climbers. Some of them have a "duh" factor, as in why didn't anyone think of this

before? Then there are products that seem to be trying to create a fix for an unknown problem.

Ultra light gear, LED headlamps and UV water sterilizers fall into the first category. Things like digital pedometers with FM radios, camping espresso makers, battery-powered socks and roller ball ice cream makers fall into the latter category.

This week we will look at some of the better new products that make your hiking a lighter and more pleasurable pursuit. In other words, gear that you may not think you need but is functional nonetheless.

First up is Injinji toe socks — the sock most people dismiss or, in the case of most men, actually look upon with disdain. The truth is that toe socks are the perfect design for summer hiking. They wick moisture away from the foot and keep the toes from rubbing together and creating blisters. With the new Vibram Five Fingers shoes, the shoe with separate toes, toe socks are the only way to go.

Next up is the newest in "alphalight" flatware — the 7075-T6 aircraft alloy titanium spork. Weighing in at .3 ounces, 9 grams, this is probably the lightest and most durable spork on the market.

One of the biggest complaints from the Pacific Crest Trail hikers is that their hands get fried when they are crossing the deserts and mountains. Last year they asked me for lightweight fingerless sun gloves.

After doing some research, I found the perfect glove, called Dr. Shade, for their needs. The glove features a fingerless Lycra glove with Kevlar stitching and 50+ UPF sun protection. When you are out hiking and using trekking poles, these gloves allow you the dexterity to perform any task and keep your hands protected from harmful UV radiation.

Vibram's relatively new Five Fingers shoes are quite the fad of the moment. Like the huge Crocs fad that preceded it, the Five Fingers is becoming a must-have shoe for runners and hikers.

With a separate compartment for each toe and each toe compartment having its own attached sole, this shoe is still unique in the outdoor industry. Whether it is a passing fad or a new category of footwear remains to be seen. By the way, Vibram also makes hiking shoes for your dog.

Leki, the biggest name in trekking poles, has come out with a new line of poles with a Speed Lock System. Basically, instead of turning the trekking poles to adjust the length, there is a small lever that you flip open and after setting the pole to the proper length, you flip it closed and it is locked in place. The new poles are a little heavier and they don't have an anti-shock model just yet but they are definitely easier to adjust and there is less chance that the poles will collapse.

There are many other new products and this column only hits a few highlights but these are definitely some of the best of the recent gear innovations.



INITIAL THOUGHTS

Another CSA 36 opinion ...



The Town Crier is devoting considerable space to the commotion over management of the Hill's recreation activities. On page one, we start with Monday's public meeting to hear the Idyllwild Community Recreation Council (ICRC) vision for a recreation program.

ICRC is a contractor, paid to deliver recreation to Idyllwild. So it was interesting to observe some members attempt to hijack CSA's announced agenda. Despite a colleague's opposition, Director Dawn Sonnier reversed her silence and shared the ICRC ideas with the gathering.

The article on the Thursday, April 15 regular CSA 36 meeting is on page 14. This meeting lasted nearly four hour. A few stalwarts remained to the end, including ICRC Director Linda McCaughin.

Also, on page 12 we are publishing CSA 36 Chairperson Holly Maag's letter to Supervisor Jeff Stone with the Advisory Committee's thoughts and recommendations.

But it is the public session, attended by more than 70 local residents and the feverish activity leading up to the meeting that I wish to address. The confusion over its purpose fueled the meeting's sluggish pace.

Let's start with money. Several people suggested the county envies the parsimonious nature of Hill residents. CSA 36 has accumulated a reserve balance of nearly \$311,000. Some implied or hinted the county might be trying to access this money for its own purposes.

Idyllwild property owners have imposed an annual \$35 parcel fee to finance CSA 36's recreation and street light responsibilities. This fee is not the sole revenue source for CSA 36. There are revenues from recreation programs, but nearly 40 percent of CSA 36's annual funding comes from the generosity of other county residents.

Since 2002, the rest of the county has contributed more than \$525,000 to the Hill's recreation activities. These funds come from the ad valorum property tax. Without these funds, CSA 36 would have zero reserves and \$200,000 less for operations.

Instead of spending \$190,000 (exclusive of our own program fees), largely for staff salaries, CSA 36 would only have \$125,000 each year.

So in that spirit, what did the author of the flier mean with the phrase, "Save Town Hall"? How is it threatened? Not by the county; title to the building belongs to the Idyllwild Chamber of Commerce, not CSA 36 or ICRC. If it is threatened, it's because the current owners and users have put very little into its maintenance.

There is good reason for the frugal investment in this 64year-old building. We all assume a new community center will be built shortly and will replace this historic building.

You might better ask, what will the Chamber do if it has no more operating funds? I think Town Hall is safe and will remain in the community's possession for many years.

What about the statement "Well the county of Riverside wants to take these programs and the decisions made about them out of the hands of ICRC and govern Idy's recreation through the county."

The fact is ICRC is only a contractor. Just as you might hire someone to abate your property, CSA 36 and Riverside County hired ICRC to operate the local recreation programs.

ICRC doesn't govern local recreation, it simply implements it. All the folderol that youth and adult sports, summer camp, preschool and others will be gone is false. These programs existed for decades before ICRC and will continue as long as there are volunteers who want to coach and help our children.

The county has not denied any reimbursements for children's expenses. What has caused friction are the reimbursement requests without any vouchers and the expectation that public funds would pay for private meals and personal purchases. These have been addressed and corrected, but they are not minor bookkeeping mistakes.

The issue, which the CSA 36 Advisory Committee and the County have with ICRC, is its ability to competently manage and fulfill its contract commitments.



FVWD on budget

At its Friday, April 16 meeting, directors of the Fern Valley Water District (FVWD) received a report from General Manager Steve Erler indicating that in the third quarter of the fiscal year, FVWD is on budget, at 71 percent of operational budget. The largest portion of district expenditures is for salaries and employee benefits, general insurance and worker's compensation insurance. Comparably, other operational and maintenance expenses are relatively small.

Production and demand, as in other Hill districts, is down owing to home foreclosures and fewer people visiting or using their parttime residences. Average demand in 2010 is 63 gallons per minute, compared to 79 in 2007.

PCWD water production down

Pine Cove Water District (PCWD) production is down dramatically in March 2010 compared to March 2009, 2,210,320 gallons compared to 3,190,490 gallons in 2009, owing to home foreclosures and the economic downturn in general, according to General Manager Jerry Holldber's report

Holldber reported on the budget — that at 73 percent in the third quarter, "We're pretty close to last year. The question will be how much property taxes we'll have coming in."

In making his operations report, Holldber noted a 12percent water loss. PCWD billed for 8,436,240 gallons but accounted for only 7,421,273 gallons. "I can't explain that," he said to the board. "Nothing jumps out. I think the losses probably have to do with meters. People in Pine Cove are very conscientious in reporting leaks. A few years ago we replace 700 out of 800 marshall@towncrier.com.

meters. If a meter is running slow, we'll lose money over time." Concluding he added, "It pays to replace meters more often."

Holldber also told the board that Southern California Edison would come up to test for well efficiency on both wells and boosters, at no cost to the district. "It's a free service to customers with agricultural rates — our rates are agricultural."

Board President Tom McCullough observed, "I assume you'll use that information to replace what is not efficient?" Holldber said he would.

Hollber reported that he had applied for a summer intern through the federally funded and county administered Summer Work Experience Program that provides an employee age 14 to 24 at no cost to the employer. The county pays an \$8.00/hour salary as well as workman's compensation insurance.



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reviewing rate increase

The Idvllwild Water District (IWD) held a special meeting Tuesday, April 13, to authorize a public hearing to discuss raising water rates and other fees. The intent was to schedule the hearing concurrently with IWD's May 18 regular meeting; however, the board learned that Proposition 218 required a longer notice period.

Consequently, at the Tuesday, April 20 meeting, the board planned to schedule the public hearing for the June 15 regular meeting. The meeting was held Tuesday evening after the Town Crier went to the printer.

Regardless of the hearing's date, the board will be considering raising water rates six percent for next year and perhaps each of the next few years.

"We are going to put together the multi-year discussion of the rates," said IWD President Allan Morphett. "In this economy it is not popular. Having said that, it's our duty and responsibility to act as stewards of

the water and the district's assets."

IWD's General Manager Terry Lyons and Auditor/ controller, Jim Ludy, provided the board with an indepth analysis of the district's financial performance over the past decade and the expected funding needed for the next five years.

Without any rate increase, Ludy projected the district's operating losses would nearly triple and approach \$700,000, compared to \$236,000 last year.

The draft proposal analyzed a 10-percent increase for next year followed by four years of 5-percent increases. Base rates would increase 10 percent at all levels, while the usage rates would increase only for the third and fourth tiers which begin with consumption of more than 500 gallons in the month.

Combined (water and sewer) operating revenues (exclusive of the district's share of county property taxes) were \$970,000 in fiscal year 2000-2001. Ten years later, 2009-2010 (this fiscal year), the combination is See IWD, page 27

Billing change steams customers

A Lake Hemet Municipal Water District (LHMWD) decision to change customer billing frequency from bimonthly (every two months) to monthly has caused upset to district customers. Effective in March 2010, the change means that water users will have to pay the delivery charge, the Eastern Municipal Water District (EMWD) sewer charge (in parts of the district where applicable), and the LHMWD sewer charge every month instead of every two months.

as it did in April, Emmerson will likely win big. His fund-raising machine and edge dwarf whatever Blake or Monica could mount in the less than two months before the election.

Blake is realistic about his chances. "Democrats got 30 percent of the vote [on April 13] where most of the interest was in the Republican contest," said Blake. "That's not a bad place to start. Three out of four votes cast were registered Republicans." Blake also notes the less than 4 percent edge of Republican over Democratic registration in the district. "For me, it will be about getting out the vote," he said. "You can never outraise a Republican." By his campaign's analysis, Emmerson spent \$36 a vote [votes obtained as a percentage of money spent] to Blake's \$2 a vote

Blake just returned from three days at the state Democratic Convention in Los Angeles. "My endorsement from the party was formalized on the convention floor by all state delegates," he said. "But for me, this will be a grassroots campaign even though my fundraising will be significantly improved going into June and I'll get some funds

from traditional Democratic groups. I think in this election year, the issues I'll run on are important to the public. Democratic principles have historically always ended recessions." Blake will campaign on prioritizing green energy business importation into the district and improving education funding to grow a 21st-century workforce.

Only Blake and Bogh campaigned in Idyllwild prior to the April vote. Blake came in third in Pine Cove (Emmerson 47, Bogh 40, Blake 30) and second in Idyllwild (Emmerson 176, Blake 96, Bogh 74. Democrat Anna Nevenic got 39 votes, raising the Democratic total in Idyllwild to 135).

Monica, who garnered 4,195 votes, or 4.39 percent, has a long road to even be competitive. He plans to

Monica campaigns on cutting back the California Legislature to part-time and privatizing all or part of the prison system. Front-runner Emmerson plans no retooling of his message. "Government reform, improving the economy, lowering unemployment levels, and providing incentives to bring new businesses into California are the themes I will run on," said Emmerson in interview. Emmerson is



also a strong proponent of improving transportation infrastructure in the Inland Empire. He is not opposed to debating his opponents in principle, but noted that none have yet been scheduled.

Emmerson expressed strong support for the water bond on the November bal-

lot, "The Safe, Clean, and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act." "The water bond is the most important thing to me," said Emmerson. "We can't allow the Salton Sea to fail, or the agricultural interests in and around Indio."

CSA 36 letter to Supervisor Stone

yesterday's public meeting, Holly Maag, chairperson of County Service Area 36 (Idyllwild) Advisory Committee, wrote the following letter to Third District Supervisor Jeff Stone.

DEAR SUPERVISOR STONE,

As Chair of the CSA 36 Advisory Committee, I am respectfully submitting to you our recommendation regarding the issues of contract renewal for Idyllwild Town Hall Recreation as managed by the Idyllwild Community Recreation Council (ICRC). We hope you will find this letter useful in your decision-making process with respect to that contract.

At the CSA meeting held on Thursday, April 15th, 2010, Bill Brown and Mike Franklin of the Economic Development Agency requested that the Advisory Committee consider four options for the operation of Idyllwild recreation programs in 2010. Mr. Brown graciously put together an 'outline" containing the options: #1- Contract with Local Non-Profit or Recreation Organization; #2-County Direct Oversight with County Employees; #3-Hybrid: County Oversight with Contract Employees; #4- blank, or an opportunity to consider other ideas. After considerable preliminary discussion, the Committee decided that options 1 and 2 were the most viable, and the remainder of our discussion centered on those ideas.

Mr. Brown and Mr. Franklin were present for the entirety of the meeting. I trust they will provide an accurate recap of that discussion for you. Additionally, I am enclosing a copy of the CSA 36 minutes of that meeting for your review. Please be advised that as of this writing, the minutes have not been formally approved.

However, I would like to state that the Committee queried the ICRC board members in attendance closely about the past issues, which called into question their ability to manage a Town Hall Recreation contract. They were asked whether they believe past operational problems have been corrected, and whether

Editor's note: Following they believe they can move morning's meeting clarifying However, the Committee cur, ICRC has stated they forward in cooperation with the County to negotiate a contract renewal. Their responses and positive assertions satisfied the Committee on these points. We encouraged them to contact Mr. Brown as soon as possible to begin a dialogue regarding contract negotiations. It is my hope that they have done so.

Mr. Brown provided an informative, and quite frankly, visionary presentation with respect to option #2. Given that, I believed it was only fair to offer ICRC a similar opportunity to discuss what they could bring to the community in terms of expanded recreation opportunities. Since we were requested to provide our recommendation to you no later than Tuesday morning, April 20, a special meeting was scheduled for this morning, Monday, April 19, 2010.

The meeting was very well attended by members of the community. Prior to the meeting, numerous e-mails had been sent to myself and to the other Committee members containing opinions regarding County operation of Town Hall Recreation programs. I am enclosing copies of the emails for your review. Many of the e-mails contained considerable misinformation. Some of the more prominent items were:

• The special meeting was not noticed (it was legally noticed well before the 24-hour requirement)

• The community has had no opportunity to provide input (they did today, and, of course, the community can attend all CSA meetings)

• Idyllwild recreation is moving to the County (no decision to do so had been made at the time of the special meeting)

• The Committee is making the decision to transfer the management of recreation to the County (the Committee provides a recommendation, not a final decision)

• The County wants the CSA 36 reserves for other financial purposes (clearly, CSA money must be spent within the CSA for the specific purposes of the CSA).

these issues of misinformation, and others as well. Even so, the sentiment of those in attendance that spoke can be described as strongly opposed to County operation of the recreational programs in Idyllwild. Additionally, it is very apparent that the community at large does not understand issues related to aspects of CSA financial obligations, nor the finer points of recreational management. I believe it is incumbent on this Committee to present that information at future CSA 36 meetings, and we will endeavor to do so.

At the beginning of the ICRC Board presentation, member Vic Sirkin read a letter requesting that we postpone our recommendation, and instead, hold a public meeting at which County officials would be present in order to answer questions about potential County management of the recreation programs. A copy of Mr. Sirkin's letter is enclosed for your review. The Committee declined Mr. Sirkin's request, and went forward with the special meeting as planned.

ICRC was then provided with the opportunity to bring their vision to the Committee and to the public in attendance. Dawn Sonnier presented on behalf of ICRC. She summarized ICRC's ideas that if provided funding and latitude to do so, ICRC would offer several new programs to the community. Frankly, many of the ideas were echoes of those that Mr. Brown brought to the CSA during the April 15 meeting. However, they are excellent ideas, many, if not all of which the community of Idyllwild undoubtedly would enjoy. By announcing their intent to introduce these programs and others as well, the Committee believes ICRC is exhibiting a renewed commitment to bringing these recreation opportunities to the Idyllwild community, and will make every effort to do so.

The community members present were offered the opportunity to comment about the issues covered at the meeting. As stated above, there was general consensus that the attendees did not want the County to take over We spent time at this the recreation programs.

realizes that not all comcontract issue were able to attend this meeting. Additionally, some attendees with contrary opinions may not have spoken up, for whatever reason. To that end, Shane Stewart has offered to run an advertisement in the Town Crier, effectively asking the community what their thoughts are. Additionally, the Town Crier is planning an extensive survey to query community members about the types of recreation programs they would like to have. The responses to the advertisement and survey results will be collected and published by the Town Crier. The Committee wholeheartedly embraces Mr. Stewart's and the Town Crier's plans, and undoubtedly will discuss the outcomes at the next CSA 36 meeting. Mr. Brown will be provided with copies of all comments and

results. At the end of the meeting, the Committee discussed that which we had heard today and formulated our recommendation. While mindful of community opinion, I assure you it was not the driving force behind our deliberations or recommendation.

As such, CSA 36 Advisory Committee recommends as follows:

1. The ICRC contract to operate Town Hall Recreation will be renewed for a one-year period, July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2011.

We believe that one year provides ICRC with ample opportunity to demonstrate the changes they have made and their ability to properly manage Town Hall Recreation programs under the terms of a County contract.

In support of our recommendation, the Committee finds that:

1. The ICRC Board has expressed a strong desire to continue to manage the County contract for Town Hall Recreation programs.

2. The ICRC Board has taken steps necessary to correct the errors and missteps that have occurred in the past with respect to the management of the County contract.

3. If future mistakes oc-

will take quick action to munity members who have correct them, and adjust an interest in the recreation their policies to prevent recurrence.

4. ICRC Board members have stated their willingness to move forward in a spirit of cooperation with the County to provide outstanding recreation services to this community.

5. ICRC has drafted a revised set of bylaws, which have been described as containing language relating to compliance with Brown Act provisions when the Board considers issues relating to County funds or a County issue. The Committee did not receive the bylaws in time to review or discuss them prior to the special meeting. We will review them at the next CSA 36 meeting.

6. ICRC has stated they will revise or draft operational procedures with respect to management of CSA 36 recreation funds. They will be offered to the Committee for review.

7. ICRC has offered ideas regarding expanded recreation opportunities for the community, and has vowed to bring those ideas to this Committee to explore ways to fund, establish and measure the success of the

programs.

8. Many Town Hall programs are performed in cooperation with other organizations here in Idyllwild, such as Idyllwild Elementary School, the Idyllwild HELP Center, local Idyllwild artists' groups and many of our local service organizations. It is a concern of the Committee that these relationships could be jeopardized or dissolved if the County were to take over the management of the recreation programs.

To fairly characterize the deliberations behind our recommendation, Steve Kunkle and I strongly support the renewal of the County contract for one year. Please be assured that we recognize our duty not to allow the year to pass without more stringent oversight and inquiry into the operations and management of any Town Hall Recreation program for which CSA 36 funds are expended. Procedures to implement an oversight plan will be formulated and discussed with Mr. Brown as soon as practicable.

Although he agrees with the CSA recommendation, Michael Freitas expressed a desire for more information with respect to County See Maag, page 27



Mountain yellow-legged frog returns home

Thursday afternoon, April 15, mountain yellow-legged frog eggs were planted in a local stream. If nature cooperates, the population of the indigenous endangered frog will be re-established in its native habitat and begin to thrive.

A multi-agency team planted three clutches, about 500 to 600 eggs, in the stream. Adam Backlin and Liz Gallegos, both of the U.S. Geological Survey, carefully removed the clutches from their Tupperware home in a plastic bucket and placed them in a larger screened box to protect the eggs as much as possible from natural predators.

Mountain yellowlegged frogs were collected from the wild. Scientists have been trying to breed this population since 2006. This winter, they hibernated 31 of the frogs cooled them in a refrigerator. This mimicked the frog's natural mountain winters, according to

"A group of us came up with the idea to duplicate their winter," Backlin said. The scientists will keep a close eye on the egg clutches.

Tadpoles should develop and begin swimming about the pools in early summer. Their natural predators are raccoons, hawks and especially garter snakes. The tadpole stage will transform to frogs late next summer. Just before winter the first step in the recovery tadpoles will metamorphosize into small frogs.

"Then they are imof the James San Jacinto mediately punished with their first winter," Backlin

added. In addition to planting the eggs, the research team plans to reintroduce a large number of tadpoles at about the same time as these eggs transform to tadpoles. One reason for testing both frog stages is determining whether the egg release or waiting until the tadpole stage would be the more successful reintroduction technique.

"This is an amazing program for this wonderful frog, and we are looking forward to having the frogs here for a long time to come," Fenwick said.

Once common throughout much of Southern California, the mountain yellow-legged frog's population has been steadily declining for several decades. Today, only a small wild population of fewer than 200 individuals can be found in the San Gabriel, San Bernardino and San Jacinto Mountains.

Last summer, scientists believe they identified or discovered another natural population in the local mountains. This summer, more research will be conducted on the size and habitat of this yellowlegged frog population.

The team works at the San Diego Zoo's Institute for Conservation Research. Besides the U.S.G.S. biologists, other participating agencies included the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the Forest Service and the University of California James Reserve.

"Can you present to this board a list of pilot programs and procedures for measuring them that will be just as successful as what Bill Brown has presented?" asked Holly Maag, CSA 36 chair, at the conclusion of the Thursday meeting. Linda McCaughlin, the only ICRC director remaining at the meeting's end, affirmed she understood the request.

On Monday after her summary of Thursday's meeting, Maag permitted ICRC Director Vic Sirkin to read a letter in which the ICRC board stated this was not the time to make their case for retaining recreation or to present their menu of expanded recreational opportunities.

Maag reminded the ICRC board that they had been asked for their recipe for expanding recreation and the record would reflect that they either spoke or did not. Dawn Sonnier then outlined a list of expanded recreational possibilities — out of a list of nine new recreational opportunities, Sonnier offered six that Brown had already proposed on Thursday. He faulted the county for asking the Committee to make its recommendations without information Frietas said he needed, such as from where county employee benefits would be paid.

Addressing the present ICRC board members immediately prior to the Committee "vote" he said, "ICRC doesn't do anything until they're forced to. That's my opinion and I may be wrong, but this board needs to be more active, and get more help." "These employees [Town

Rec contract to be decided

The Thursday, April 15 meeting of the County Service Area (36) Advisory Committee focused primarily on a discussion of options for recreation management in the 2010-2011 fiscal year. Bill Brown, Riverside County CSA operations manager, brought these ideas to the Committee because of the approaching expiration of the recreation management contract with the Idyllwild Community Recreation Council (ICRC). In the audience were four ICRC members

Although Brown had identified four distinct recreation management options, the Committee focused discussion on only two - renewing ICRC's current contract either for a full or limited term and the county providing the recreation program directly, with increased CSA 36 supervision and oversight.

discussion, two CSA members — Steve Kunkle and If issues of animosity come Michael Freitas favored the idea of county management. Maag wanted to hear ICRC's proposal for expanding recreational offerings to counter what Brown had presented.

Maag deftly facilitated a marathon meeting in which she noted a history of ICRC contractual failings, requests for reimbursement submitted in error and ICRC board conflicts with the county. She sought assurances from attending ICRC board members Chris Singer, Linda Mc-Caughin, Dick Goldberg and John Simpson that, should Third District Supervisor Jeff Stone decide to renew ICRC's contract, ICRC's management stumbles would not be repeated.

"I want assurances that any past negative actions directed to or lack of cooperation with the county will not be an issue," she said. "We all need to cooperate better to see that recre-

before this board again, we don't want to hear it." "The relationship with the county must be better," said Kunkle. "I don't want to see tension," said Frietas.

The Advisory Committee's final recommendation about what recreation management options could best serve Idyllwild residents was requested to be provided to county representatives by Tuesday April 20.

All Advisory Committee members wanted to see a final draft of ICRC bylaws, incorporating promised Brown Act open meeting language and clear separation between ICRC's public and private interests and duties on or before the special meeting.

Goldberg stated, "The [draft] revision contains language that makes us totally Brown Act compliant." Singer countered, "I can't guarantee that the [ICRC] board will

CSA Operations Manager Bill Brown noted that ICRC bylaw revisions had been promised the county in September 2009 and remain undelivered. "It does concern me that bylaw revision is not in place and was not in place from the beginning," said Maag. "I would like to see the anticipated revisions now."

Brown then elaborated on how the county might manage the local recreation program; noting a menu of county recreation options, already in place in other CSAs, that could be made available to Hill recreation within current budgetary guidelines while retaining all existing Town Hall recreation programs.

During their April 13 meeting, the Idyllwild Fire Protection District's (IFPD) commission devoted several hours to questions about its budget, its financing procedures and whether to reconsider the role of paid-call or volunteer firefighters which surfaced at the March meeting. The "Citizen Com-

ments" portion of the meeting opened with a request for the commission to discuss the March decision to suspend the authority of paid-call firefighters to act in certain positions until required training was completed. Paid-call firefighter Capt. Larry Donahoo asked to speak to the board in closed session about this subject.

After a lengthy discussion of the legality of holding a closed session on this topic, Donahoo chose to depart rather than offer his views and recommendations in the public forum.

Last month, Interim Chief Mike Mulhall raised the issue. Following a workshop, Mulhall was convinced that IFPD has extensive legal liability risks if an accident or tragedy occurs during an incident involving its volunteer members, especially if they are commanding any portion of the incident. Consequently Mulhall suggested temporarily demoting them until they had taken training equivalent to that of the career firefighters.

The commission object-

and recommended the suspension of authority during an actual incident. Last week, the board expressed its intention to follow up on Donahoo's concern.

Defending the decision, Killingsworth said, "I believe we were putting the fire department in jeopardy [until the training is completed]."

"How much jeopardy are you creating while the town is without any backup to career staff, most of whom don't live in the community?" replied Keith Smith, also a volunteer captain. Commission Vice President Pete Capparelli then injected his concern about the liability and added, "Maybe [the commission reaction] was a knee-jerk reaction.'

Before ending the discussion, IFPD President Jeannine Charles-Stigall reaffirmed, "It's not a question of Larry Donahoo's commitment and talent. I wish we had a hundred more Larry Donahoos to serve with you [to Smith]. We started as a volunteer company and we can't lose that. The paid-call live in the community."

\$1,200, although the budget account reported EMTs received nearly \$3,000.

Jack Peckham, IFPD's fire prevention officer, announced that self-inspection abatement letters would be mailed at the end of last week or this week. [Editor's note: They were mailed April 16.] Residents will need to get out rakes and begin abating their property. He thought IFPD inspections would begin about May 15.

Mulhall reported that the Zoll Medical heart monitors had arrived and staff training on the equipment would be held by the end of April. Training to use the Autopulse equipment had not yet been scheduled, he said.





composure while determining how to handle the new drive-in facility.

"Someone called the TC to say a car had crashed into the Idyllwild Water District building. None of the editorial staff were available to cover the incident, so I grabbed my camera and a notebook and went up there," Crandall said explaining his opportunity. "When I got there I found a jovial crowd of firefighters, law enforcement people and casual bystanders ... I went up closer and found the driver was still behind the wheel, grasping the steering wheel in the proper 10 o'clock and 2 o'clock position."

Photographer Jenny Kirchner's photograph of two friends covering their Army buddy, who had just died in a motorcycle collision, with an American flag was chosen as the secondplace photograph.

"I remember very well when I took this photo. It was my day off, and I happened to come upon the scene," Kirchner said. "Before I even knew what was going on, I snapped a

American flag being laid on sports photograph category this young soldier. Then my battery died.

The photo that won was the first photo I took on scene," she continued. "At that point I didn't have the story on what happened and just reacted when I saw the memorial unfold in front of me. After learning about the victim and his fellow riders, it made the event even more meaningful."

Kirchner also earned

with her shot of a Town Hall soccer game from October 2009.

The paper's writing and investigation skills were also recognized. Reporter Marshall Smith's May 2009 story about "Hikers sing for veterans" was selected for second place in the overall writing category. This is not Smith's first writing award.

Nearly 4,000 entries from newspapers across the state represent their best work in 28 categories and nine ing, photography and many other categories offer some of the toughest competition anywhere, according to CNPA Director for membership and the BNC, Bryan Clark.

In addition to these writing and photography awards, the CNPA specifically honored the Town Crier's former Publisher and Editor, Becky Clark. She was given a plaque, recognizing her 10 years of service to the organization.

The inscription reads, CNPA Appreciation Thank you for years of dedication, loyalty and service to CNPA Board of Directors. 2000 to 2009."

The recognition of her peers was particularly exciting and rewarding, Clark said

"No one else in your town, no matter how small or large, can understand what you do as publisher or editor," she said. "CNPA is a coming together as your own community."

No longer either a publisher or editor, Clark remains involved in journalism. She is now a member of the California Press Association board.


