## Debate continues without Emerson

he Pine Cove Property Owners Association (PCPOA) and the Idyllwild Town Crier sponsored a civil and spirited debate between Democrat Justin Blake and American Independent Matt Monica at the Idyllwild Fire Department on Friday June 4. Republican candidate, Bill Emmerson (AD 63 Redlands), who had accepted the debate invitation, cancelled fewer than three hours before the debate start. Blake, Monica and Emmerson are contending in the June 8 election for the California Senate District 37 seat previously held by current Fourth District Supervisor John J. Benoit.

Emmerson had not previously agreed to publicly debate Blake and Monica so his acceptance of the Idyllwild invitation was noteworthy. His spokesperson said an unexpected personal and family problem occurred.

Although separated by ideology and firmly held positions, Blake and Monica demonstrated that civility and cordiality still can coexist in our prevailing intemperate national conversation. Both were gracious to each other and the audience.

Debate moderators Doug Yagaloff and Annamarie Padula posed the questions that PCPOA members and Idyllwild Town Crier staff prepared and chose several questions which the audience submitted during the debate.

Arizona's recent and controversial new immigration law, SB1070, received a lot of attention from both candidates. Blake said he did not support it and that it

## **Idyllwild Trailer** Park woes

nce again, the Idyllwild Trailer Park (ITP) is under the county microscope for alleged violations of county code. Officials from Code Enforcement (CE), Environmental Health and Safety, Building and Safety, and County Counsel met with residents on Saturday, June 5 in the ITP meeting room. Park owners did not attend. County representatives expressed concern over park owner violations, including substandard electrical wiring attached to trees and other improper connections, as well as resident violations that include unpermitted room additions

and other construction that does not meet county code requirements.

## **Park Owner Violations**

CE Director John Boyd noted that chief among county concerns were code violations that raised issues of public safety that potentially endanger not only park residents but the wider Idyllwild community - improper electrical wiring attached to trees and otherwise jerry-rigged in obvious contravention of code. Yet even though the county inspected the park in 2008, and noted the prevalent improper wiring and consequent potential danger, current owner La Cumbre Management has See Trailer Park, page 22

Lost hiker does the impossible

ichard Wong, 23, of Valencia, a col-lege student in San Francisco, confounded Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RCSD) searchers and all search scenarios by turning exhaustion into a prodigious physical feat and a curtailed hike into an endurance marathon.

On Monday, May 31, Wong and four friends began hiking from Humber Park to what searchers had been led to believe was Tahquitz Peak. That misinformation proved costly to Wong. In a June 7 interview, Ter-See Debate, page 23 rance Tringali, one of Wong's

hiker friends, said the group had always intended to hike to the summit of Mt. San Jacinto. Around noon, a mile below the Saddle, Wong told his friends he was not feeling well, was experiencing extreme exhaustion and was going to head back to Humber Park. He never arrived there.

Around 10:30 Monday night, Wong's friends returned to Humber and reported him missing. Early morning on Tuesday, June 1, RCSD mobilized Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit, who, along with Desert Search and Rescue and an RCSD helicopter unit, began combing the area from the top See Hiker, page 23






"Happiness begins where selfishness ends," said John Wooden. Rest in peace.

## Obituary Aleen Agranowitz, Ed. D., CCC, SLP,

Aleen Agranowitz, a noted speech pathologist, passed away peacefully at her home in Long Beach on May 10 surrounded by her family. She was 94. She was a part-time Idyllwild resident and founder of Speech and Language Development Center, which established Morning Sky School here on the Hill in 1979.

In 1955, Dr. Agranowitz co-founded a speech clinic. Her home served as the original clinic which became the Speech and Language Development Center (SLDC) in Buena Park, Calif. She led the school as the Chief Executive Officer and served as Chief Advancement Officer until

April 2010. In addition, she continued her practice as a speech pathologist.

Dr. Agranowitz was born Aleen Crittsinger on June 16, 1915, in Waterbury, Conn. She was the only child of Edith and Lewis Crittsinger and was raised in Massachusetts and New Hampshire. Dr. Agranowitz graduated in 1938 from Worcester State Teachers College. In 1972, she graduated from the University of Southern California (USC) with a Master's degree in Speech Pathology and, in 1987, she earned her Doctorate in Education from the University of La Verne.

Her interest in language and special education problems began when she worked with adult aphasics at the Bethesda Naval Hospital near Washington, D.C. during her service in the U.S. Navy. Aleen was a Naval officer from 1943 through 1947.

She came West to study under Dr. J.M. Nielsen, a neurologist who was a leading authority on aphasia, and to work with brain injured WWII veterans at the Veterans Hospital in Van Nuys, Calif. When the hospital moved to Long Beach, Dr. Agranowitz was made Director of the Aphasia Clinic. She married a former patient, Aaron Agranowitz, in 1951. She resigned from the Veteran's Hospital to raise her family in Long Beach where she ultimately began the clinic for children with special needs.

Although, the clinic began with three children with special needs, today SLDC serves over 300 children and young adults diagnosed with disabilities in the areas of



language, learning and behavior. More than 70 percent of the students have a diagnosis of autism. Over 45 public school districts and Regional Centers in Los Angeles, San Bernardino, Riverside and Orange counties refer their students to SLDC. Parents have traveled from as far away as Ireland to have their son or daughter attend SLDC. Today, SLDC has grown into one of the largest, state certified, non-public, special education schools in California.

Especially dear to Aleen's heart were the children, families and staff of SLDC as well as the Adult Aphasia program that she began and met with weekly for the past 30 years.

Under Dr. Agranowitz's leadership, SLDC has operated two other programs. In addition to Morning Sky, which existed for 29 years as a residential and school program for boys 11 to 18 years here in Mountain Center, there also was Daybreak, two group homes in Placentia, Calif., which served and provided a stable home for 12 severely disabled adults for 19 years.

SLDC also has a sister school in Hermosillo, Sonora Mexico, the Instituto Angel de la Guarda, which Dr. Agranowitz and the staff of SLDC helped to found in 1968. A close connection with this school continues today. The Instituto serves more than 150 children and young adults. SLDC staff members continue to visit the Instituto and evaluate students twice each year, and provide professional development for teachers and par-

"Aleen's intelligence, wit and charisma were quite amazing," said Patty Bauman, president of the SLDC Board of Directors. "Her ability to speak extemporaneously was a gift that few possess, and her memory was quite unbelievable. The skill and caring that Aleen showed as a therapist set the standard for what SLDC is today."

Aleen is survived by her children, Sara, David and Joel; three grandchildren; and her beloved dog, Boomer. Sara Jones, along with husband E.C. and son Michael live in Long Beach; David and Santy Agranowitz with daughter Natalia and son Gabriel live in Idyllwild and Buena Park; and Joel and Janet Agranowitz live in Orange. All will miss her zest for life.

## Grinding facility now open on Saturday


The Idyllwild green waste grinding facility is now open from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. every Saturday.

I hope your father is doing better. It was a great disappointment when you canceled your appearance at the Senate District 37 debate Friday evening.

While this letter will not appear until after election day, that's good timing because it's not about the election. It's about being a representative of all people in your district.

Idyllwild is a small community, less than 4,000 permanent residents - not exactly a rich vein of voters. But this community cares about its elected officials and turns out to vote in high percentages. Being so elevated gives us a different perspective than many of your other constituents.

Interestingly all of the other elected officials have found time to visit Idyllwild and listen to our residents. You may have practiced dentistry here, but significant turnover has occurred during the intervening years. Most of us only know Dr. Dunn and Dr. Dunn and are very happy with them.

The former Senate incumbent — Supervisor John J. Benoit — of the seat your seeking, and I assume have now won, frequently came to the Hill. Sometimes those were official visits and sometimes he came simply to enjoy one of our special events.

Russ Bogh, the candidate whom both you and Benoit defeated in Republican primaries, has ventured up the winding Highway 243 to share his views and talk several times with locals about life 25 miles from a traffic light.

Assemblyman Brian Nestande, unopposed in the general election, found time to come and talk with the Hill communities before the election.

The county's five supervisors are able to work together and solve problems more effectively than the squabbling, bickering, partisan state legislature. Perhaps their willingness to spend time outside the office helps them understand their constituents' plight. The 3rd District's supervisor is Jeff Stone, whom you didn't support as a future senate colleague.

Most people here had no idea who this Temecula pharmacist was and what he could do for us before his election. Now they know and embrace him. It's not because of the tens of thousands of dollars he has brought to Idyllwild. He's a friend because he cares and shows it. He comes here monthly to meet with anyone who schedules an appointment. He listens, takes notes and assigns staff to find a solution.

But it's not just county pols who know how to drive mountain roads. Our Congresswoman, Mary Bono Mack, a Republican like you, comes to the Hill several times a year.

Saturday, she spoke at both the Idyllwild Arts commencement and the Keenwild Helibase dedication. She helped secure the funds for its renovation. As she told the gathering, her job is to help before an emergency occurs.

If you don't have time to visit, to listen or discourse with our residents, how can we expect you to help us? We live in a fire prone area. Wildland fires, not structure fires, threaten our community every year. Will you know how to explain to your colleagues how the regulations, protecting air quality in the flatlands, stifle winter controlled burns on the Hill?

Do you know that the \$11 billion water bond has minimal affect here because our water districts rely almost exclusively on groundwater and local streams, not the Sacramento Delta or Colorado River. Yet, Idyllwild Water District has to go to the federal government for funds to construct a pilot recycling plant.

While you're balancing the state budget, what are you doing about the lawsuit over state education funding, to which our local school district — Hemet Unified — is a plaintiff.

So good luck Senator-elect. Let us know when you'll be in Idyllwild. We will tell people and local groups who really would like to meet you and share their views.





## OFF THE MAIN ROADS

Devices help, common sense is best...

Visits to wild places are often deeply rewarding. But these adventures also entail risks that can occasionally prove life threatening, even for the most experienced outdoors people. New technology offers help, but not prevention.

Personal Locator Beacons (PLBs), available for use in the United States since 2003, provide a powerful safety net for wilderness travelers.

A PLB is a portable transmitter capable of sending out a personalized emergency distress signal to a network of orbiting military satellites. These satellites then relay your information to search-and-rescue teams, such as the Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit (RMRU), anywhere in the world.

This is a great tool if used correctly. But search and rescue teams around the U.S. are finding them being used for trivial reasons, as the following incident, written up in an Associated Press story, tells.

Two men and their teenage sons recently tackled one of the world's most difficult summertime hikes the Grand Canyon's parched and searing Royal Arch Loop. With their bedding and food, the inexperienced backpackers also packed a PLB."Yuppie 911" is now the phrase used for these devices.

Three times in three days, the hikers summoned help — mobilizing helicopters for dangerous, lifesaving rescues inside the canyon's steep walls. The hikers used their PLB to summon a helicopter rescue after running out of water; but they insisted on continuing rather than being lifted out.

After finishing their own water, the only water they could find "tasted salty."

Search and rescue teams are finding out that these new devices give hikers overconfidence that help is nearby. They sense help is just a button push away - and thus risk the lives of others because of their

inability to know when they are well beyond their own safety level.

Another example occurred in Oregon. Last winter, eight climbers attempted to reach the summit of Mount Hood. When trouble began — a snowstorm in which they became stranded, they called for help.

Officials have begun to question whether individuals would have taken this kind of risk in the absence of the PLB "security blanket." Would those hikers have gone up the mountain knowing the weather was worsening if they had not been able to take the beacons?

The message is: Don't let these new devices remove the self-sufficiency that's required in the backcountry. They should only be used when an emergency occurs. Plan your backcountry adventure as if you're not taking a PLB, check the weather, know the area, and don't go beyond your ability.

These devices do save lives when used properly, such as here last winter. In December 2009, RMRU received a call to locate and to extract a lost hiker. This person's PLB had been activated and carried medical information. The hiker was stranded in a rainstorm on the Pacific Crest Trail. He was experiencing seizures and had no medication.

RMRU responded to the signal's location. We found the hiker in a hypothermic state and just coming out of a seizure. RMRU got him to the hospital where doctors said the PLB and RMRU saved his life. This hiker would probably not of made it if he had not used the PLB to get help.

The best advice that can be given with all this new technology available is: Always prepare your adventure as if you did not have any of these new toys. Common sense is the best device! To donate to RMRU, go to www.rmru.org.

## **Business improvement district** meetings continue

Doug Yagaloff, Judy Begin, Bryan Tallent, Larry and Pam Allen, Gary Budnick and other Idyllwild Business Roundtable (IBRT) participants have said they came together to help their respective businesses survive a deteriorating economy and to contribute to the common good of invigorating Idyllwild's business climate.

The latest project, an exploration of the merits and attendant challenges for Idyllwild's becoming a Business Improvement District (BID), intends to inform the community about the process. The series of public meetings features leaders from neighboring BID's and county representatives.

On Wednesday, May 19 Temecula Valley Convention and Visitors Bureau Chairman Dennis Ferguson told attendees, "You have to do this if you are going to compete in destination marketing," because funds from state, county, and municipal agencies to assist with promoting tourism are drying up

On Thursday May 27, Joy Meredith, president of Main Street Palm Springs, the

downtown Palm Springs BID Meredith said that once echoed Ferguson. "The best way [to promote area business] is to pool the money together [through a BID] because individually you can't do much good," she said.

Meredith's business is one of the smaller members of the Main Street BID, and she touted the advantage of being promoted on an equal footing with much larger players. "It was important to me that everyone was on a level playing field," she said. "It's empowering for businesses to see they're not alone. This is a tough economy and working together gives you power. What could I do alone with my \$300 [yearly assessment]? That wouldn't even buy me a decent ad."

Objections generally raised about BIDs are about how assessments are levied, are they fair, and are they based in part on the likely benefit to the specific participating business. Speakers from Temecula, where assessments are based on a two, recently raised to four percent pass-through per night lodging charge, said end users had voiced no objections in the five years

Main Street BID participants could see how their money was being spent and how effective it was to aggregate those funds, BID objections dropped away.

Meredith spoke encouragingly about how a BID can integrate and bring a business community together. "It's all about community," she stressed. "You want your neighbors to prosper." Looking out at her audience, Meredith spoke about the Idyllwild she and her husband have visited often and come to love. "There's a vibe and a lightness about this place that you have to let people know about," she said. "But you have to have money to do that."

IBRT facilitator Doug Yagaloff and participant Brent Miller put together four explanatory meetings to present the BID concept and give local business owners a chance to attend, ask questions, and become better informed about the benefits and responsibilities of Idyllwild's forming a BID in an effort to invigorate an increasingly cash-strapped economy.

At 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, June 9, the Palm Springs the BID has been in place. Desert Resort Communities

Convention and Visitors Authority (CVA), of which many local businesses are members through IBRT initiative, will speak about its process of formation and its \$7 million plus yearly budget. Among issues to be addressed are the many ways assessments can be levied. BID's are often funded through "pass-through" assessments levied on end users, not business owners. Municipalities or counties collect the assessments. Locally elected boards, often with hired professional management, spend the funds to promote tourism and improve local business health. IBRT urges local busi-

ness owners, especially those who may have negative preconceptions about BIDs, to attend and ask questions. Referring to her own experience in helping form Main Street Palm Springs BID, Meredith said, "I'm glad to have the opposition [speak]. It's an opportunity to address those points."

On Wednesday, June 24, IBRT presents the last of the four BID meetings at which the county will talk about its involvement in the process




## ONLY IN IDYLLWILD

## Pine Cove property owners make local grants

At its annual General Meeting on Saturday, June 5, the Pine Cove Property Owners Association membership voted to give a total of \$5,750 to nine different organizations serving the public on the Hill.

## **IDYLLWILD WATER DISTRICT JUNE 2010 NEWSLETTER**

- OAKWOOD WELL IWD has purchased an existing well on Oakwood Street. This well was drilled in 1991, meeting community domestic well standards. Under a well agreement, the District operated this well during the 2002/03 multi-year drought and it produced 30 gallons per minute. The well's water quality is good, however, similar to our Foster Lake wells, it will require treatment to adjust the pH level. This well can provide water for 175 residential services, or about 20% of our May 2010 water demand of 161 gpm. This well was a very good investment for the District.
- GROUND WATER REPLENISHMENT PROGRAM The District has been investigating a Recycled Water Project. The District received a \$35,000 grant from the State Water Quality Control Board to prepare a Feasibility and Planning Report. The State has requested that we provide our alternatives for providing new water supplies.
  - Alternative #1 Truck delivery of the recycled water to customer's "green tanks" for irrigation use.
  - Alternative #2 Use it for groundwater replenishment.
  - Alternative #3 To drill additional wells.

For 30 years the District has replenished ground water with the District's existing secondary treated recycled water located at our percolation ponds. A proposed 20gpm "pilot" project using an advanced tertiary treatment process would provide high quality water, nearly meeting drinking water standards. This tertiary treated water would be pumped to Foster Lake for a groundwater replenishment pilot program. The Bureau of Reclamation has \$500,000 of grant funds for recycled water projects that IWD can apply for.

- REBATES FOR RETROFITS The District will be reviewing their toilet and washing machine rebate program at the June 15th Board meeting. We have been discussing adjusting the rebates offered for the toilet and washing machine replacement program. The Board may consider lowering the amount of the current rebate funds. We have been spending more than our annual rebate budget account. For the past 10 months nearly \$18,000 has been spent for these programs. Since these rebate programs have been in effect, August 2002, a total of nearly \$44,000 has been granted for these rebates. Staff will be considering adding new customer rebate programs (such as irrigation devices) that will help conserve water. If you have any ideas that you would like to see considered please let us know.
- RATES, FEES AND CHARGES The Board will be considering increasing water and sewer rates at the June 15, 2010 board meeting. These rates were last increased in 2005. They will also be looking at the current schedule of additional charges. These include capital facilities fees for water and sewer, transfer fees and turn on/turn off fees. These charges were last reviewed in December 1996.

## Fire season started and agencies prepared

The May 26 Mountain Area Safety Taskforce (MAST) meeting was a celebratory moment as two important, but former, members returned, at least temporarily, and simultaneously demonstrated the purpose of these sessions and how fleeting the personal moments are when danger, especially fire, threatens the Hill.

Both former CalFire Pre-Management Fire Division Chief Kevin Turner and former San Jacinto Ranger District Fire Chief Norm Walker sat at the IC's [incident commanders] table during the meeting.

As the meeting began, fire officials were holding cell phones to their ears or reading messages on their blackberrys and rapidly keying replies because of the Fairview Fire near Fairview and Whittier Avenues east of Hemet. Before the meeting ended, the California Highway Patrol and Riverside Sheriff's attendees were called to help on the fire and left the meeting in mid-session.

At 79 acres, the Fairview Fire would not be considered major, but it was the first large fire of 2010. The room was unusually somber. The Fairview Fire signaled the possible dangers these public safety officials could confront during the next five months of fire season.

Although Southern California fire officials have adjusted to a constant threat of wildfire, spring does symbolically identify the start of a new fire season because

## **Idyllwild Fire Protection** District (IFPD)

The IFPD abatement program has started. The initial letters have been mailed to property owners and IFPD's first neighborhood inspections have begun, according to interim Fire Chief Walker.

Unfortunately, current budget concerns have forced IFPD to conduct its inspections with on-duty personnel, rather than Walker's preference to augment his resources with additional inspectors.

At the May IFPD meeting, the commission did agree with Walker's recommendation to clarify the local ordinance to ensure consistency with state Public Resource Code 4291, which authorizes fire abatement inspections.

The changes clarified how needles and duff will be inspected. Within 10 feet of a structure, pine needles, leaves and duff must be removed. In the next 20 feet, two inches of duff may remain under the trees' drip line.

### **Riverside County Fire/** Cal- Fire

Pursuant to the Governor's recent executive order, CalFire's Riverside unit has additional staffing, engines and air tankers. Riverside County Fire has committed to complete 13,000 inspections this year, Deputy Chief Mike Ritchey stated.

'We go to peak staffing first week of June," reported Ritchey. This includes four person engine staffs.

A revision of the Commu-

will begin soon, Turner reported. This version will likely encompass a larger portion of the county, including south to the San Diego border.

## **U.S. Forest Service**

The Forest Service is quickly approaching full strength summer staffing, according to San Jacinto Ranger District Fire Chief Dan Felix. At this point, six of the district's seven fire stations will be open seven days per week. Shortly, Felix expects to be able to expand the seventh station to seven days from five days per week.

The Forest Service has completed pile burning on 118 acres within the local district according to Chris Fogle, one of the district's battalion chiefs. They are planning work on the Indian Mountain fuel break, he added.

Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council (MCFSC)

Despite the expanding staffing at the fire agencies in case of an emergency, Mike Esnard, president of the MCFSC, reported his agency has used all of its existing grant fund to help property owners abate.

"We are working with the state and county for another grant," Esnard said. He also added that funds for replacing wood roof shingles will not be awarded until the county's emergency plan is approved."

Southern California Edison (SCE)

"This is the lowest point we seen since starting the [Bark Beetle program]," reported SCE's project manager Dave Simmons. Although SCE has seen some dying trees, Simmons stated overall mortality continues to decline.

## Bono Mack dedicates Keenwild helibase

On Saturday, the U.S. Forest Service held a ribbon cutting and dedication of its renovated Keenwild Helibase. A larger and betterequipped facility replaces an old helibase of minimal and mediocre conditions that for decades occupied the ridge above the Keenwild Fire Station.

With the help of local Congresswoman Mary Bono Mack, a state-of-the-art helibase is now in place in the San Jacinto Mountains. The helicopter stationed at the base from late May through November circles the district looking for smoke or fire and, if necessary, is capable of dropping 260 gallons of water on or ferrying firefighters to the conflagration, according to Doug Ross, helibase superintendent.

After bringing air equipment back to the San Jacinto District in the early 2000s, former District Fire Chief Norm Walker, currently the interim Idyllwild fire chief, began efforts to establish a permanent quality helibase here.

By 2007, internal Forest Service funding was available to initiate the project, but was insufficient to complete the quality helibase Walker had envisioned. With the help of Bono Mack and her staff, additional funding was secured as part of the fiscal year 2008-09 Forest Service budget.

Construction work on the new facility began last June, according to Forest Supervisor Jeanne Wade Evans.

On Saturday, dozens of former Forest Service firefighters and members of the public saw and toured the new 2,200-square-foot

building. A command center, pilots' office, training and meeting space, sleep area and a kitchen are all part of the new building which is more than four times the area of the original building.

was cobbled together from a building at the Cranston station, Walker said. They found an old shed, razed it, transported it to Keenwild and reassembled it with some new parts. The former helibase center was 500 square feet with an obstructed view of the landing pad.

This [renovation] was a necessity, aviation is complex and fighting fires from air isn't easier," said current San Jacinto District Fire Chief Dan Felix.

Bono Mack paid tribute to Walker for his persistence and insistence of the need and importance of this facility.

When an environmental catastrophe occurs, such as in the Gulf [of Mexico] now, I don't want to be in the way," she said. "My job starts before it happens — thinking about the risks. This is a good example of thinking ahead."

### Fire safety requires preparation ...

Snow's over, now's time to think about fire. The Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council (FSC) sponsored a community meeting about fire on May 26 at Idyllwild School.

After two hours of presentation and discussion, there are many lessons to take away and I will focus on just a few.

On the prevention side, Chris Fogle and Dan Felix of the US Forest Service and CalFire's Kevin Turner spoke of the fuels projects around the mountain. Idyllwild and Pine Cove residents should feel reas-

surrounding the community. These would not necessarily stop a fire, but they would slow it down enough for the fire agencies to gain the upper hand.

Both Chris and Kevin mentioned an important fact regarding fuels reduction projects, which I will paraphrase this way: the time of big government money is over, so we now have to spend what money we have on maintaining our existing projects.

The background here is that the huge bark beetle infestation caused severe tree die-off around 2001. Eventually with help from

sured by the 11 fuelbreaks Congressman Jerry Lewis The "ready" (R-CA 41) and Sen. Dianne Feinstein (D-CA) large federal grants came to our area. This influx of money made possible fuels projects that the agencies had wanted to do for some time. Most of these projects are complete, and it is highly unlikely that we will get similar funding levels in the near future.

The key word now is maintenance. What money is available must go towards maintaining all of the fuelbreaks and evacuation route projects currently in place.

Regarding residents and fire, County Fire Chief John Hawkins argued for the "Ready, Set, Go" formula. needed to get out quickly.

part of this refers to proper fire abatement of your house, making sure that hazard-

ous fuels don't provide a pathway directly to the structure. Most of us at the MCFSC know this; if you don't, call (659-6208) for a free consultation on what abatement should be

done on your property. The "set" part refers to evacuation planning in their jobs. the event of an actual fire. The key here is to plan where you would go and what you would take if you every agency is not only

prepared bag, that makes leaving easier. We need to remember things like prescriptions, glasses, key documents and our pets. Families should consider having a meeting point in the event of separation and a third-party contact outside the area to help pass messages. The "go" part means leave when the order is given. Don't shelter in place, and don't delay. Just leave, and let firefighters do

The last lesson to mention is about our fire agencies. It is clear to me that willing but eager to talk

We all need a list, or a to the public on these matters. We had lots of highly trained and experienced fire personnel in the gymnasium, all willing to talk to anyone interested about abatement or fire suppression. Norm Walker, Idyllwild Fire interim chief, spoke for all when he talked about working with all residents toward success.

## Forest Service studies night flights

At a congressional hearing last month, Forest Service Chief Tom Tidwell said his agency was re-evaluating its no night flying policy. The re-analysis is the result of the post-evaluations of the August 2009 Station Fire in the Angeles National Forest.

Local Los Angeles county officials have argued that more aggressive action, including night time use of helitankers, would have contained the fire within the first 48 hours. The fire started on Aug. 26 and was not fully contained until the second week of October. It burned a total of 160,000 acres, destroyed 89 homes, claimed two lives and cost more than \$100 million to fight.

At the behest of Sen. Dianne Feinstein (D-CA), the Senate Appropriations Interior, Environment and related agencies subcom-

mittee held the hearing May 26. The Appropriations committee held the hearing because funding Forest Service programs is intertwined with firefighting policy, Feinstein explained.

"The big issue in the West is nothing is like having your house burn down," she told Tidwell. "If we're [the government] supposed to protect people, and knock out the fire in the first 24 hours, air assets are critical and have to be in place and accessible."

Currently Los Angeles, Kern and Santa Barbara counties and San Diego city have regulations to oversee night flying for aircraft fighting fires.

Tidwell agreed and indicated the Forest Service review, which will include both rotary wing and fixed wing aircraft, should be completed by the end of the vear





Next weekend, June 18 to 20 is the Aroma Spring Jazz Festival. Five different groups will perform inspiring and luscious music on Café Aroma's deck from Friday evening through the last table bused on Sunday evening.

Several of the groups and individuals are very familiar to Aroma regulars and the Idyllwild Associates Jazz in the Pines Festival. But the Spring Festival's music director Paul Carman has worked hard to bring new, different and accessible jazz music to Aroma's confines.

This year, he has invited Ryan Dart's Manouche Swing to play for diners Saturday evening. Dart brings a jazz style rarely heard on the Hill, but that does not mean cutting edge or avante-guard jazz. He and his members play a traditional genre

Europe secretively embraced the new American music and this jazz was played in the back rooms of Paris and London before and during WWII. Django is the progeny of early American jazz and Romani, or gypsy, music

a Gypsy jazz guitarist, became a legend after his death in 1953. Many famous and well-known American guitarists credit Reinhardt as their inspiration or motivation. Some of the most famous guitarists and musicians who publicly admire Reinhardt include Jimmy McCulloch, Chet Atkins, B.B. King, Jerry Garcia,

foreign flavor is authentic. Reinhardt has played and recorded with some of the great jazz musicians including Coleman Hawkins, Louis Armstrong and Dizzy Gillespie.

With violinist Stéphane Grappelli, he created the Quintette du Hot Club de France, which has been Jean "Django" Reinhardt, called one of the most original bands in the history of recorded jazz.

"Think blue grass swings like jazz," Carman said describing this unique genre. "There is no drummer, the rhythm is handled by the guitars. It's all strings!





## **Residents' Violations**

In an April 29 letter to residents, Boyd stated, "Inspections conducted by Code Enforcement and Building and Safety departments found that many spaces had recreational vehicles or park models installed, as well as construction without permits and items such as room additions, patio covers, decking, covers and unsafe utility connections ... All property owners and residents must ensure that all the buildings and mobile homes in their spaces are in accordance with these codes. Health and safety are the preeminent concerns [of the county]."

And that is the conundrum that the long and fractious June 5 meeting did little to resolve. Residents who own RV or park models with room additions (likely more than half the units at ITP) are faced with removing the additions, which often constitute the majority of their living space and investment, since neither county nor state regulations permit additions to RVs. Also, since additions to ITP RV units often involved altering the original structure of the RV,

The county is in the process of completing individual unit inspections and instructing residents to correct violations "within a reasonable timeframe." But resident after resident who spoke at the meeting, who are caught in a quandary of if and when to spend the money to remedy those violations, suggested it is not in their interests to invest to correct violations before park owners correct theirs

Most residents present said they had bought their units with the room additions and other cited issues in place. ITP Property Owners Association member Keith Seifert, acting in President Ron Murray's stead, noted

park has communal shower and toilet facilities — that not only were RV's permitted, they were the original permitted units, and that previous park owners routinely permitted add-on room additions to any unit in the park.

The county has said it would work with mobile home owners to bring their units to code but held out little hope for resident RV owners with room additions. As county counsel Lisa Traczyk explained, "State statutes and local ordinances [that apply to ITP] are all enacted for county safety and are something the county cannot waive." Said Boyd, "Some [ITP] units may not be able to be brought to code."

would likely be found unconstitutional. Monica said he wholeheartedly supported it because the federal government has failed in its border policing efforts.

From then on, the gulf between the candidates narrowed a bit as they focused on the issue of illegal immigration, its causes and potential remedies. Monica contended that paying for social services for 2.7 million California illegal aliens contributes to the state's economic crisis. Blake said that most illegals pay into the state economy through purchases and sales tax and income tax. Both candidates supported some path to citizenship for illegals already here, with Monica limiting it to a one-time, two to three-year amnesty so that illegals could pay state income tax and help alleviate what Monica termed a catastrophic state budget crisis.

An impending November ballot measure to legalize possession of small amounts of marijuana for personal use and to permit taxation of those sales by municipalities and implementation of a statewide regulatory plan also revealed candidate differences. Monica, based on his experience as a psychologist, espoused the oft-quoted view that marijuana use leads to other drug use and that

he adamantly opposed any form of legalization. Blake countered that medical marijuana use in California is already legal and that getting rid of marijuana prohibition for possession of small amounts for personal use would permit state regulation, fill tax coffers and help get drug dealers off the streets. Blake said it was disingenuous to rail against illegality when, for all practical purposes, marijuana is already legal and in wide use in the state. He likened the current situation to liquor prohibition in the 1930s with its concomitant rise in syndicated crime and control of the market.

Blake touted green energy jobs and manufacture as a means to economic health for Riverside County. Although Monica agreed, he cautioned that "97 percent of us drive cars that use oil, and until the oil lobby and 'elitists' reach out to blue collar workers and respond to our needs," green talk is premature. Blake countered, "Oil has built corporate socialism" garnering record profits at the expense of American is a place and function for workers. "When shall we address our oil addiction? When we run out? We need to address it now. We in government have to take on this corporate goliath and leave a clean, desirable and livable planet to our children.'

of the Palm Springs Aerial Tram to Humber and Tahquitz.

Searchers had been told Wong had left the group to return to Humber, so search efforts focused on the areas in which searchers expected to find him. Yet somehow, after telling his friends he was too exhausted to continue, Wong found the stamina and sure footedness to safely navigate his way to the 10,834-foot peak of Mt. ## Strange but true

Greece's Parthenon is a famous ruin, but many people today don't realize that it wasn't time that caused the destruction of the structure. In 1687, the Ottoman Turks occupied the Acropolis and used the Parthenon to store gunpowder. A mortar fired by the attacking Venetians hit the building and ignited the gunpowder, causing much of the widespread damage we see today.

## Vehicle use map for National Forest

San Bernardino National Forest Supervisor Jeanne Wade Evans has announced the implementation of the new Motor Vehicle Use Map (MVUM) in compliance with the U.S. Forest Service Travel Management Rule. The new map is available to the public at no cost and identifies the system of designated roads and motorized trails available to the public on the San Bernardino National Forest.

The map identifies the roads and trails specifically designated for motor vehicle use. Other public roads are also shown on the map for information and navigation purposes only. The map does not display non-motorized recreational uses or facilities and attractions, so a Forest Visitor Map is still recommended for general information.

The 2005 ruling required all National Forests to designate a system of roads, trails, and areas for motor vehicle use with the intent to enhance opportunities for outdoor recreation while ensuring forest resources are properly managed over the long-term.

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




