

# Stone attends IBRT dinner

uring an Idyllwild Business Roundtable (IBRT) dinner for 3rd District Supervisor Jeff Stone held on Wednesday, June 16, at the Quiet Creek Inn, Stone made several announcements regarding corporate "green" concepts, abundant Idyllwild's future.

### Library

"I'm tired of the delay." Stone began after announcing he had come directly to Idyllwild from a meeting about the longstanding delay in expanding the Idyllwild branch county library. The impediment to expansion has centered on the proximity of Suburban Propane's tank field to the library. The plan for enlarging the library has been

bouncing between the town and the county supervisors since 2000.

Stone said the county has decided to completely remodel the library at its present location, expanding into the parking lot area, according to Stone's Chief of Staff Verne Lauritzen. Stone said the remodeled facility would inskylights and be infused with state-of the-art technology.

Using Community Development Building funds, the county may be able to contribute \$400,000 to \$500,000 for the refurbishment of the library. Lauritzen estimates completion sometime after the first of the year.

# IWD approves higher rates

The Idyllwild Water District (IWD) directors approved a 6-percent rate increase for each of the next five years. At the Tuesday, June 15 public hearing on the proposed rate changes, no customers spoke against or even attended the public session.

Currently, R1 residential (the smallest) monthly base rate is \$21.50 and will become \$22.80 on July 1, growing to \$28.80 on July 1, 2014. Other fees such as new water meters and sewer rates will also increase effective July 1.

The additional revenue from the increasing month-IWD's budget to a net op-

erating surplus. This fiscal year and last year, the operating expenses exceeded the agency's operating revenues. The non-operating income, primarily its property tax revenues, has generally ensured IWD has an overall net surplus.

However, even for this fiscal year (ending June 30), Auditor Controller Jim Ludy is estimating a \$64,000 deficit, which will be made up through the use of reserves. For next year, with the higher rates, he projects a 40-percent decrease in the operating loss (from nearly \$250,000 to \$158,000) and total income of nearly \$35,000.

# Chamber expels Carlson

On Monday June 21, at the Idyllwild Chamber of Commerce's monthly meeting, Chamber Directors Mimi Lamp and Richmond Blake, the majority of the three member board, voted to expel Chamber President Ken Carlson for "conduct unbecoming a Chamber member."

Lamp and Blake had previously given Carlson a public 30-day notice to present the reasons why

he should not be expelled. The reasons cited in the 30day notice were: "willfully voiding the membership check of the Town Crier and claiming that they had not paid [dues] to prevent their membership renewal ... ignoring and voiding Chamber board votes and recommendations for expulsion of Town Crier; election process not following bylaws and ballot tampering; drop in membership due to your presence on the board; unwillingness of County See Chamber, page 12

### Outside Idyllwild

### Hydro Botanic ...

Two things that are calling me outdoors right now are the abundantly flowing streams and the wildflowers. Last week I talked about

lemon lilies and stream orchids. This week, I have begun to concentrate exclusively on riparian ecosystems. Or to put it simply, I am interested in streams and the plants that thrive in wet environments.

It started simply enough with the purchase of a Flip HD movie camera. You could probably put two of these mini cams in your shirt pocket. Once I started taking videos with my Flip, I could not stop. So, after shooting all my aquariums and pets, I decided it was time to get outside and start shooting videos of the local streams.

I now have 13 stream videos, which run from two to three minutes each. Half of them were shot by a friend in and around the Law's Camp area. I kept hearing reports that Willow and Tahquitz Creeks were really flowing this year due to all the snowmelt. Unfortunately, my knees have been really giving me trouble and I am unsure if I could make it up to Law's while the streams are still running strong.

Basically I am doing these two minute clips without any commentary or titles and the only sound is from the water trickling down the mountain and, of course, any birds that happen to be in the area. I think of these film clips as two minutes of communing with nature even though you are sitting in front of your computer.

So far, I have videos of Strawberry Creek, where the Suicide Rock trail crosses the creek, Ernie Maxwell Scenic Trail, County Park, Fuller Mill Creek, Willow Creek, Tahquitz Creek, Candy's Creek and several others. I'm hoping I can mitigate my knee pain and eventually be able to get up to all the creeks in the high country this year. Until then, I will continue to film streams in the lower elevations.

As to the "Botanic" part of the title above, I hope to get both videos and stills of the many wildflowers that grow along the streams. This week I will be concentrating on one of my favorites — the monkey flowers of the genera Mimulus.

Several species of Mimulus inhabit our local mountains. The flowers, although relatively small, are intense red or yellow. There is a nice stand of the scarlet monkey flower at Middle Spring on the Devil's Slide Trail. The yellow monkey flower can be found along streams and in wet areas. Their 1-inch yellow flowers can be quite showy if in full bloom and bunched together.

Probably the most fragrant of the stream-loving plants in our mountains is the Western azalea, Rhododendron Occidentale. The Western azalea is a bushy perennial that blooms in late spring or early summer. There is no mistaking the white flowers for any other plants once you smell its intoxicating fragrance.

You can find Western azaleas in the lower elevations wherever the trail crosses a stream. This includes Deer Springs, Ernie Maxwell and Devil's Slide trails. I highly recommend that you get out and smell the azaleas while they are still in full bloom.

This species likes part shade, tolerates full shade inland, full sun along the coast, good drainage, and little summer water (summer wash offs). Hummingbirds will visit it during flowering season. 

This "clever" quip appears on the Dog Park entrance sign. I'm ashamed and embarrassed. There is no place for this type of derogatory behavior. It serves no purpose other than to please one or more cowards. But they are unwilling and afraid to express their opinions openly.

Free speech is not unlimited. As a newspaperman, I know this. But the public exchange of ideas, even of bigoted thoughts, has value. But slinking around and tagging other's property is cowardly and abusive.

Perhaps I'm overreacting. Maybe I'm misinterpreting a puerile joke. Perhaps the author wrote these words on this sign attempting to create a pun and was referring to poodles, bulldogs or komondors.

Some might consider that clever, but given the common societal meaning for the term; I think it is still a mistake. It's repugnant and certainly the antithesis of our culture.

In the 1770s and 1780s, white males may have been largely responsible for creating our government; but they didn't cede themselves the right to perpetual control.

What makes us different, makes us American, is the oft stated epigram, "We are a country of laws and not men." Our laws, criminal, economic or tort, are intended to be applied the same regardless of the plaintiff, the defendant or the public supplicant.

We're not a country of white, black, lambda or male power. The laws are equal. Sometimes we may disagree with the outcome. We may protest, we may take political action, but it's a battle of open and public ideas.

Despite popular entertainment such as "24," we are not defined by the outcome or ends. A country of laws cares about the means first, then the ends. How we achieve is as important as what we accomplish. Our laws and processes are vital and what separates us from the rest of the planet's hoi polloi.

Summer arrived this week. This is the time when Idyllwild invites many friends and visitors to our share our amenities. The Idyllwild Summer Concert Series begins in two weeks. The Lemon Lily Festival is barely a month in the future. And just as the concert series ends, we'll enjoy two full days of wild and exciting jazz, led by one of the best musicians and teachers I know. I'm ashamed for him to know this two-word essay, even if it were a joke, occurred here.

But I feel worse when I think that this despicable action may not be an isolated event. While the desecration of the school may be unrelated and the perpetrators may be different, the idea, the purpose and intent bear similarity and the community bears some responsibility.

I know the first step is to wash it off. But that doesn't make it go away. How can we address these ideas or this fear of others? With a plethora of volunteers and many able counselors and therapists, what can the community do to combat this virus and clean our minds.

More clandestine "tagging" may create a reputation that will easily obliterate all the good will that the festivals and the volunteers generate.

# Re: Raises or cuts at Idyllwild Fire?

Editor:

Two years ago the Idyllwild Fire Commissioners approved a \$200 per month annual salary increase (equivalent to \$2,400 per person plus the cost-of-living allowance) beginning July 2008 and continuing until July 2013. That seems like a small increase, but for nine full-time employees with benefits, this adds \$30,000 to budgeted expenses each year — the same amount as the current year's deficit.

The Commissioners are considering doubling parcel fees — from \$65 to \$110 or more annually — in order to cover that expanding deficit. When asked for a guarantee that this fee increase would be used only for operational expenses — not to pay for the salary increases — the Commissioners would not give it.

The budget oversight process creates visibility and accountability to taxpayers. Clearly, government's revenues have eroded, and we taxpayers share responsibility for electing a government that doesn't know how to tighten its belt when there's no more money to spend.

I'm glad the Commissioners will take this to the public in an open Town Hall meeting. It's a tough issue and it needs cooperation from the public, the Idyllwild firefighters and the Commission.

In my view, the Commissioners need to find a way to renegotiate those raises. In times like these, are Idyllwild property owners to give it up for salary increases, let alone operating costs?

If you want to voluntarily give more of your money to the public agency of your choice, including the good folks at Idyllwild Fire, open your checkbook and google for "Gifts to Reduce the Public Debt." The government we've all elected takes enough from me already.

### **Reminiscing about Grandpa**

My grandparents' utility room was where I could usually be found in the late afternoon on a cold, wet, dreary and blustery Michigan winter day. The utility room had access to the kitchen and a 2-acre vegetable garden. The large wood stove with cast iron plates across the top for cooking such things as Grandma's apple butter in big copper pots dominated the room.

Grandpa also had a couple of pointers that were bred and trained to hunt pheasant. Gear for a number of activities was hanging on the wall and from the ceiling. Odors of leather, wool and the smoky smell of the burning wood in the big stove permeated the room.

Benches for sitting surrounded the stove and woolen shawls that one of the aunts had knitted could be wrapped around one's shoulders to provide more warmth if needed.

Grandpa loved to tell stories that, for the most part, originated in the deep Tennessee hollows of his childhood. He also enjoyed talking about spiritual, political and moral issues. Very little escaped the notice of his keen eye and exceptional intelligence.

Most mornings in spring, summer and fall Grandpa would be out at daybreak with his small (probably 5quart) white enameled stockpot with a narrow red band forming a stripe around the top.

The property sloped dramatically down to Stony Creek, lush with collards, mustard greens and nettles in the spring. The pot was on the wood stove most of the time, cooking the greens that Grandpa foraged along

with a chunk of bacon. I almost forgot the wild mushrooms — Delicious!

The school bus stop was about one-half mile down a dirt road from Grandpa's. Long shadows were cast on the cold, wintry landscape. If the wind was blowing off the lakes, as it usually was, it was difficult to convince your body, especially your hands and feet, that you had enough clothes on to stay warm.

Finally, I arrive at Grandpa's, throw open the door, stomp the snow off my boots and remove my mittens and heavy coat. I am greeted by the familiar smells of oak burning in the stove, the dog's leather leashes and paraphernalia, greens cooking and Grandma's lavender boughs hanging from the ceiling.

Best of all, Grandpa is sitting on one of the benches with a shawl on his shoulders, reading.

My Grandfather taught mathematics in the hollows of Tennessee. Born on a farm and taught by his mother, he never attended school.

Physically he was a handsome man. He was tall, lean and muscular with black hair and piercing blue eyes. His profile clearly defines his Cherokee lineage. He was gentle, compassionate, loving and emotional about the values that he held dear. He was the most ethical person I have ever known and set a very high standard for integrity.







"I thought we provided good information that supported the increase to our customers through the mail, in the District's newsletter, ads in the [Town Crier] and the notice on our water bills," Lyons said Wednesday morning.

The additional revenues also mean IWD can continue its capital investments over the next five years without worrying about eroding its reserves. In fact, IWD will be able to protect its deferred maintenance reserves and create two new funds - retiree health benefits and compensated balance liability.

Money for retiree health benefits needs to be available to provide the benefits that IWD has promised its workers. Ludy has estimated that \$25,000 annually may be needed, but he will re-estimate the amount this year. The compensated balance reserve fund ensures money is available to pay unused employee leaves or retires.

President Allan Morphett felt the community's response was confirmation

We know that in this economic stressful situation to have the community 'approve' the rate increase is a acknowledgement that they feel we are being good stewards of the water service IWD provides," Morphett said. "So the real thanks is to the Idvllwild community we serve for their support which we will endeavor to continue to keep in mind as we move forward."

The board also approved its 2010-11 budget. Based on the new rates, operating revenues will increase nearly \$60,000 and operating expenses decline from \$1.05 million to \$1.02 million. The result of these and other changes is a \$100,000 shift for a projected \$65,000 deficit this year to \$35,000 net surplus next year.

The capital improvement program next year will include \$87,000 for refurbishing and drilling new wells, \$30,000 for a continued expansion of the district's telemetry monitoring and management system, \$30,000 for master meter replacement and \$150,000 (excluding the grant money) for construction of the recycling pilot plant.

The board also approved sick and annual leave if an a change in the conservation or retrofit program, starting in July. Rebates for toilets and washing machines will be decreased 25 percent.

unit will be \$75 and washing machines will qualify for a \$300 rebate. To qualify, the new washing machine must reduce water use at least 33 percent

Additional rebates for new conservation appliances will be considered in the fall. This fiscal year IWD has invested more than \$18,000 in water conservation rebates.

In other business, Lyons reported that Cost Control Associates (CCA), the firm hired to evaluate the efficiency of IWD's energy use, found only one area for improvement. And that will only save IWD \$1,650 annually. CCA will receive a third of the monetary savings after three years.

Water production continued its decline this year. In May, IWD produced 6.7 million gallons, 33 percent less than the May 2009 production of 10 million gallons. Based on production through the first five months of 2010, IWD's total production will be the smallest volume since 2003

This is one reason for the declining revenues. Customer conservation and a wet, cool spring has dampened water demand considerably. While the May 2009 volume was very high (at 10 million gallons), the average for 2006 through 2008 is 8.6 million. J.P. Crumrine can be

# Idyllwild Fire and **Fire Safe Council** may partner

At the beginning of Saturday's Idyllwild Fire Commission special meeting, Interim Fire Chief Norm Walker discussed the possibility of working more closely with the Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council (FSC). Pleased with the prospect of increased community cooperation, the commission encouraged Walker to learn more about the opportunity.

Last week, FSC Executive Director Edwina Scott and Director Thomas Mc-Cullough spoke to Walker about forming a closer relationship between the two organizations.

"They have two prospective grants which they'd like us to administer for them," Walker explained to the board. "They need some form of government oversight."

Each prospective grant includes funds for oversight. The county Office of Emergency Services has been providing this function for the FSC.

"It would be nice if the administration monies went to a local agency," Scott said in a phone interview.

One of the grants will provide funds to help hom- com.

eowners replace shake shingle roofs with composition shingles. Before beginning work, the FSC was planning to ask the appropriate fire department, either IFPD or Cal Fire, to verify that the abatement was done.

Since IFPD staff would be involved in this aspect of the grant, Scott thought there might be other ways to work closer.

The other grant funds abatement work in cooperation with property owners. FSC has more than 40 homeowners needing abatement, ready to participate in the cooperative grant once funds are approved and released, according to Walker.

Walker told the board he recommends that the fees, which IFPD would receive from administration of the grants, should be used to augment the agency's fire prevention program. This would permit the department to complete its abatement inspections faster since it could assign additional staff to inspection work and allow the department to not rely exclusively on on-duty staff.

Walker and Scott plan further discussions of the possible arrangement. J.P. Crumrine can be



with state-of-the-art radios and more modest line-ofsight radios. They are inventoried and stocked on a regular basis, with Medical Director Dr. Richard Goldberg M.D. in charge of making sure medical supplies are current and up-to-date.

MDP also maintains, under Goldberg, a MASH mobile field hospital unit on land owned by Idyllwild Pines. The MASH unit can serve as a surgical or operating room should that be needed. Under a proposed Memorandum of Understanding for which Idyllwild Fire Protection District (IFPD) Interim Chief Norm Walker has expressed support, the IFPD could make its treatment room available as a surgical or operating room. Alt notes that 18 local nurses and EMTs are part of MDP's emergency roster and would be available to assist medically.

Peter Lent, Deputy Director of the Riverside County Office of Emergency Services (OES), advises Hill residents to be prepared to survive without outside assistance for prolonged periods of time following a major quake. Lent notes first be deployed to major marshall@towncrier.com.

population centers where damage and casualties will likely be concentrated.

Idyllwild benefits from the years of infrastructure and membership building that Goldberg, Nancy Layton, Rick Foster, Veronica and Dave Alt and team have devoted to MDP. When, not if, the earthquake hits, Idyllwild is far better equipped to survive by the network building MDP has done through outreach to other Hill disaster teams, Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service, IFPD, and county OES.

Under Training Director Foster, MDP conducts an aggressive schedule with its over 100 volunteers, many of them CERT trained. On July 10, MDP plans a major boots-on-the-ground exercise. "We'll send out two teams on [simulated] post disaster neighborhood evaluations," said Alt. "The exercise is designed to test our radio communication ability with the IC, and off the Hill." In August, MDP will participate in an OES exercise networking all Hill disaster preparedness groups' radio communication ability.
