It takes a village to stop tagging

uring the last several weeks, at least three taggers hit locations in and around Strawberry Plaza, including the U.S. Post Office. Taggers deface property with a signature that identifies them.

According to Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RCSD) Special Investigations Supervisor Sgt. Steven Mike, once graffiti

response is required from the community and law enforcement to prevent further spread. "Taggers like the publicity, so their vandalism needs to be taken down quickly, but not bestarts in a locality, rapid fore photographs have been

taken to document it," he advised. "And every incident of tagging or graffiti needs to be reported to the Sheriff's Department," said Mike, "otherwise incidents and targets will multiply." Once the stuff of innocent messages on trees or walls, graffiti has morphed into an insidious and expensive national epidemic, with messages of racism, hatred and gang turf battles defacing public and private property in urban and rural areas.

CSA 36 and ICRC hold joint meeting

In order to be counted, state law requires ballots to be collected by the Registrar by 8 p.m. of Election Day.

Due to a mix up between the Registrar's staff and the U.S. Postal Service, these ballots were not delivered until Wednesday morning. The Secretary of State's office could offer no relief.

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Outside Idyllwild

Flowers one more time

I thought I would wrap up this series of columns on wildflowers by mentioning some resources for further reading.

Of course, tons of information is online.

You can search on Google for any plant if you already know its name. If you want to find a species that is unknown to you, it is always best to have a book that you can thumb through and find the matching pictures.

The book I have used for most of my identifications and information is "Nature Guide to the Mountains of Southern California by Car and by Foot" by Bill Havert and Gary Gray with color illustrations by Sue Adams.

Yes, these are the same authors of the local hiking guide that I mentioned a couple of weeks ago. This nature guide is currently out of print and I am hoping that it will be reprinted, as the hiking guide recently was.

The color drawings of wildflowers are very well done and I actually prefer them to most color photographs when it comes to identifying unknown plants. The written descriptions are also top notch and they give just enough information without getting too technical.

Next up is "Flowering Plants of the San Bernardino Mountains" by Robert Reed. This guide is basically a picture book with minimal information on each species. The author gives the genus, species, common name, plant family, habitat and blooming season of over 100 species of flowering plants. For quick reference, is an index in the back

Because this book is a local guide, you have a very good chance of finding the plants you are looking for and the smaller format makes it easy to carry when you are hiking.

If you are looking for something with a little more detail, "Introduction to California Mountain Wildflowers" by Philip A. Munz may be the book for you.

Being a University of California Press publication, this work has decidedly more details. Since it is a state-wide guidebook, you may have to do more searching to find things that grow locally, but there is plenty of interesting details about each species.

The book is broken down into five sections. The first section covers ferns and fern allies. The next four sections are divided by color with chapters on reddish, whitish, bluish and yellowish flowers.

Most of the photographs are a little on the small side, but they are clear and sharp. I would recommend this book to anyone who likes to see the big picture and have all the species of wildflowers in one slightly larger than pocket-sized book.

Finally, during my research on wildflowers, I accidentally stumbled upon "Plants of the Devil's Slide Trail, San Jacinto Mountains" on the Web. This is an amazing in-depth look at the flora of the Devil's Slide Trail. It includes very specific and local information about where each species can be found on the trail. You examine it by Googling the title above or by typing in this link: tchester.org/sb/plants/guides/devils_slide.html.

Strange but true

If you've never heard of the quagga, don't blame yourself. The creature, once found on the plains of Africa, has been extinct since 1883. An odd-looking creature, this subspecies of zebra was once thought to be half-zebra, half horse. Though the front part of its body had the zebra's stripes, those stripes faded out mid-body and the rest of the equine looked remarkably like a common horse.



Scarlet Monkey Flower (Mimulus cardinalis) is a beautiful native, growing about 2 feet high with a 3- to 4-foot spread. Its deep orange-red flowers are common along rivers and streams through much of California, including Strawberry Creek in Fern Valley, where it is currently in bloom. An excellent hummingbird flower, it needs sun and water, but can survive in the garden with once weekly watering. This flower, the lemon lily and several other flowering natives may be seen on the Idyllwild Garden Club Creekside Tour during the Lemon Lily Festival.

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
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INITIAL THOUGHTS

Volunteers needed: special skills



Volunteering has always been a way of life in Idyllwild. Stories in the Town Crier have related how families and community members donated time, money and resources to construct Town Hall.

The legacy of that effort reverberates throughout the current community life and

The Borrego Springs quake was finally calibrated at 5.4. What if a larger earthquake, such as the April Mexicali quake, occurred on the San Jacinto fault line? Its magnitude was measured at 7.2. That's more than 10 times stronger than the Borrego Springs quake.

Would 60 people be enough? That's about one MDP person per 50 or 60 residents.

On a brighter and sunnier side, the Lemon Lily Festival is only days away. Three days of lemon lily lectures and confectures, welcome people to Idyllwild (See "On the Fringe").

Joking aside, the participation in this event is phenomenal. Hundreds of volunteers have come together to organize and offer three days of education, entertainment and exercise.

And the biggest annual Idyllwild event — Jazz in the Pines — is still weeks away; but dozens of volunteers have already contributed time to begin preparation for this fabulous weekend

Our coverage of the Jazz Fest begins this week with the headliners' story on page 18.

These are just three examples demonstrating the cooperative capacity of our whole community. But I have to mention one area where our volunteer energy and teamwork has waned.

Recreation Director Bob Lewis reported to the CSA 36 Advisory Committee and his Idyllwild Community Recreation Council that only two individuals have committed to support the proposed "Masters" softball league. This league will showcase the fading athletic skills of the over-50 age group.

Both he and I are shocked at the poor turnout. This is an opportunity to exercise, socialize and have fun. Just running to second base will be enough time to arrange several dinner or card parties with friends who can concentrate without staring at a cell phone.

Games will be early so that dusk or twilight will not bother your vision and you won't have the blinding sun behind home plate interfering with the basket catches in center field. Fear of injury shouldn't be a deterrent. What are the odds that there will be someone who can even get the ball across home plate let alone hit the batter?

Town Hall Administrative Director Claudia Posey has informed me that a special practice has been scheduled for 4 p.m. Thursday at the softball field. (Yes, behind Idyllwild School!)

Don't worry about any sanitary issues; although the school is locked, a porta-john is located at the bottom of the stairs up to the field. So, you can stay and play the entire game. If, of course, you can make it up and down that staircase.

I don't believe that MDP, Lemon Lily and Jazz Fest have consumed the time of all "Master" residents over age 50. Many stalwarts of former Idyllwild softball champions are still puffing around town. Come on out Thursday.


OFF THE LEASH

The mock 'Big One' hit Idyllwild on Saturday

Wednesday's earthquake in Borrego Springs was another warning to the Hill that this is an earthquake zone. Timely, but coincidently, the local Mountain Disaster Preparedness (MDP) group had already designed and scheduled a major quake drill Saturday. If the "Big One," a disastrous earthquake, passes under Idyllwild, MDP teams are ready to hit the ground running.

On Saturday, July 10, more than 60 people participated in the exercise. Nurses, paramedics, a doctor, and many CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) trained volunteers turned out for the mock earthquake drill at locations from Pine Cove to Idyllwild, said Bob Edwards, who manned the Disaster Assistance Station (DAS) in Pine Cove off Franklin Road.

"This is the biggest one we've ever tried," Edwards said.

At approximately 8:45

a.m., the call came across arm in a sling. the radios that the mock "Big One," a 7.9 scripted earthquake, had hit north of the Salton Sea. The teams quickly took action. They radioed back and forth between command teams and determined where the injured citizens of Idyllwild, Pine Cove and Mountain Center were and how they needed treatment. The Pine Cove team, including Captains Lynnda Hart and Richard Levitsky, made sure that all the radios were properly working and had backup batteries.

MDP members gathered medical cots and supplies and set them up at numerous locations, including the Pine Cove site and at the Idyllwild Fire Department.

At the Idyllwild Fire Station, a group of about 20 medical professionals including Dr. Dick Goldberg, an emergency room physipatients, one of whom was Norman Sears. Sears had a badly broken leg with exposed skin showing, a badly injured arm and a broken

"I'm not too good at the moment," Sears said while being carefully treated by Gigi Kramer, a registered nurse.

The Idyllwild Fire Station, in the case of a true emergency, is even set up for surgery. Many minor injuries can be treated at the DAS locations, Goldberg said. During the course of the drill, Goldberg also demonstrated radio triage for reported victims not in need of transport to the surgery. The team then reviewed the procedures for treating those that needed more intensive care.

At the drill's conclusion Goldberg also provided volunteers with a refresher on "on-the-spot" wound care and an update on current medical thinking regarding the most common earthquake-related injuries.

Edwards said that the cian, were treating mock eight stations are placed according to population. Two are in Pine Cove, two are in Mountain Center and four are located in Idyllwild.

At Saturday's exercise,

Commander Steve Espinosa and Captains Dora Dillman and Micheline Caron-Sears managed DAS C at St. Hugh's Episcopal Church. DAS H near the entrance to Idyllwild Arts was in the hands of Commanders Pamela and Chic Fojtik and Captains B.J. and Edith

After the drill ended, MDP met at Town Hall for an evaluation of the results. According to Veronica Alt, MDP president and one of the incident's acting commanders, many good suggestions and comments were received and will be implemented.

For example, while equipment functioned well, "it was pretty unanimous that we need to acquire several more radios ... for the search and rescue teams and several of the more costly Kenwoodtype radios," Alt said. "This practice drill emphasized that our present supply of two FRS radios in each DAS is insufficient and restricts the number of teams that can be deployed and hinders the management of them."

REBATES FOR RETROFITS – The District reviewed its toilet and washing machine rebate program at the June 15th Board meeting and adjusted the rebates offered for the toilet and washing machine replacement program. The toilet rebate is now \$75 (replacing an older toilet with a 1.6 gpm flush or less) and the washer credit is \$300 (replacing with a washer 33% more efficient). These credits are recorded in the customer's account.

RATES, FEES AND CHARGES – The Board also voted to increase water and sewer base and usage rates at the June 15 board meeting. These charges were last reassessed in July 2005. A letter was sent to each customer outlining the changes. The Board also adopted increased additional charges. Some of these increased fees are:

Turn on/turn off fee \$ 50 Transfer fee \$ 25 \$ 20 Return check fee

\$5,092 per EDU Water capacity fee Sewer capacity fee \$5,447 per EDU

PREPARING YOUR HOME – When leaving on vacation, it's easy to forget to prepare your home for your absence. No matter what time of year, you could be in for an unpleasant surprise when you return. IWD has material at the office regarding protecting your piping. We highly recommend turning off your customer valve at the curb when leaving the residence. The customer valve is located in your box behind the meter. Make sure the customer valve is operational and shuts off completely. If necessary to leave water on for irrigating, please have someone (neighbors or maintenance personnel) occasionally check to make sure the system is working properly. Enjoy your vacation knowing you are not wasting water or your

WD WATER METER – Often customers with a higher than normal monthly bill wonder if their meter is incorrect or if it was read improperly. IWD meters are highly sophisticated electronic devices that are finely calibrated. They are almost always within the plus or minus two percent tolerance range. We regularly test meters for accuracy. These meters are read with an electronic wand and downloaded at the District office. If a higher than normal reading is detected, our field personnel read the meter manually to check for accuracy and inspect the leak detector to see if it's spinning. If a possible leak is detected, the homeowner is notified. The most common cause of high bills is an increase in water usage. High bills are rarely due to a faulty, fast running meter. In fact, a meter tends to gradually slow with age, underestimating water usage, benefitting the customer.

This year, ICRC approved significantly higher wages than previous years to maintain its staff. Lewis said that he, and Administrative Director Claudia Posey, would take pay cuts for the new fiscal year that began on July 1.

The recent graffiti incident at Idyllwild School (IS) that splayed offensive racist epithets on seven IS buildings shocked the school population and caught the attention of the Sheriff's Department. The "White Power" message at the Idyllwild Dog Park evidenced another destructive swipe at the community. There is a growing belief nationwide that graffiti, left unaddressed, creates the opening for introduction of more serious crimes that can quickly degrade low-crime areas such as Idyllwild — taggers testing the community's tolerance for illegality.

Graffiti proliferation in any community has also been shown to contribute to property value decline. Statistics show that the presence of graffiti acts to dis-

courage people from living or shopping in affected areas. James Q. Wilson, UCLA criminologist, in his "broken window" theory, states that signs of disorder in society, such as graffiti, abandoned cars, broken windows, and uncollected trash, frighten law-abiding citizens into avoiding public places. That is why Sgt. Mike stressed the importance of stopping this Post office wall. rash of tagging quickly and decisively. Idyllwild's taggers may likely be indolent young people with time on their hands but current law can subject them and their parents to stiff penalties.

"Here is what the community must do," Sgt. Mike said. "First, notify Sheriff's Department Dispatch at (951) 776-1099, take pictures of the graffiti or tagging, remove it or have it removed as soon as possible." Mike said it is important the department gets reports of all incidents so that it can collect information, in-

record in a station database to help to track down and arrest offenders.

Idyllwild's Mountain Community Patrol (MCP), under the aegis of RCSD, is tasked locally to remove graffiti and echoes Sgt. Mike's admonition to take pictures of graffiti and call it in to RCSD so that an official report can be generated. Sherry Edwards, whose husband Bob is one of three MCP volunteers

cluding tagger signatures, to who supervise graffiti removal, reminded residents to also call MCP at 659-5457 when they sight graffiti. "We're always driving around town and looking [for graffiti]" said Edwards. John Edmiston and Bob Rahman are the other two MCP graffiti busters.

"When graffiti is on private property we have to get owners' permission to remove it, since the sandblasting would necessitate owner responsibility to repaint,"

Parton envisions Idyllwild lilac festival

Gary Parton sees lilacs coloring and enhancing Idyllwild's business district and spreading throughout the town — a vision of lilac profusion. And he has a strategy to make it hap-

Former schoolteacher Parton is a man with a plan, and a carefully constructed one at that. Parton is the third in an Idyllwild lineage of lilac devotees and propagators. Ron (Tommy) Emanuel, the "Lilac King," was first. Then Reva Ballreich, whose May opening of her lilac garden drew crowds from on and off the Hill, was Parton's lilac mentor. Ballreich eventually served as president of the International Lilac Society. Now Parton, whose pride of show extends to hybrids Ballreich developed including especially her "Idyllwild" varietals.

Parton's home on Fern Valley Road is a lilac haven, neatly organized over nearly an acre, into discreet districts of particular varietals. Each year in May, as Ballreich did, he opens his garden to the public with a special tea, music and sweetly beckoning lilacs in every part of his property.

Yet he harbors a vision for spreading lilacs beyond his garden. Parton wants to see and sniff their perfume throughout Idyllwild business core, public places and residential streets. That is his current passion.

He plans to provide potted lilacs free to willing Idyllwild businesses as part of a lilac-based town beautification program designed

to build tourist identification for Idyllwild as a lilac

Parton refers to Lombard, Ill. Since 1869, the burghers of Lombard have striven mightily to make "lilac" synonymous with Lombard, in the same way that Milwaukee is identi-

fied with beer and Corning with glass. Even though, as Parton explained, lilacs are surprisingly hardy plants, they still need a champion or champions. In Lombard, that champion was Civil War veteran Colonel William Plum who turned his estate into what is now

Lilacia Park, after a visit to begin with recruiting three the famous lilac garden of Victor Lemoine in Nancy, France. "Lombard's annual festival has turned into a very big event," said Parton. They've had a parade every year since 1930."

And it is that communal involvement that Parton foresees as another reason for putting Idyllwild on the map for the kind of tourist that would come to appreciate its natural beauty.

"Making Idyllwild a major destination for viewing lilacs in California during the first two weeks in May each year starting in 2015," is his goal. His plan is already designed through the next five years. Starting this year and continuing the following years, these steps

teams.

One team would be four people to contact local businesses and mark placement for the lilacs at those businesses in September for an October planting. The second October team of 15 to 20 people will volunteer two Saturdays of the last three in October to plant the lilacs in the designated commercial locations. The third team of five to six people will dig and pot lilacs.

On a ride around town, Parton pointed out tall, healthy and relatively unattended lilacs. "Once they're established, they need very little water," said Parton. He hopes that local property owners would donate See Lilac, page 30





The endangered lemon lily, native to the "Hill," now has its own month thanks to the efforts of Idyllwild citizens who are promoting the Lemon Lily Festival.

A group of seven Lemon Lily Festival volunteers sang The Lemon Lily Festival, the official Lemon Lily Song titled "Lemon Lily ... I Love You," to the supervisors and a packed crowd of about 75 people. The song was written by Idyllwild resident Marilyn O'Connor.



Isis performs 'Boston Marriage'

The Isis Theatre Company is staging a David Mamet comedy, "Boston Marriage," that brings the early 1900s love affair of two women to life on stage. The production is next weekend, Friday and Saturday, July 23 and 24.

Mamet, a contemporary playwright, wrote "American Buffalo" and "Glengarry Glen Ross." He has been credited with reinventing American theatrical language, said the play's actor and director Suzanne Avalon, also the president and founder of Isis Theatre Company.

"We wanted to do another piece that was not your average play," Avalon said. "I love David Mamet's work and he rarely writes for women. It is cutting edge and hilariously funny.'

In "Boston Marriage," Mamet has fled from the grunge in exchange for elegance, and crude verbal banter for the parlor talk of two Victorian ladies whose

relationship represents the living arrangements of many unmarried women of the period and most famously fictionalized in Henry James' novel, "The Bostonians."

Mamet's dialogue is often terse, cryptic and profane, Avalon said. "It is a joy to bring this three-character play to Idyllwild and show the diversity of the women on stage," she added. "Mamet's best known plays revolve around tough, male, macho characters in grungy settings."

The two main characters Anna (Avalon) and Claire (played by Jeri Greene) are two scheming "women of fashion," who have long lived together on the fringes of upper-class society. The two women engage in a plan to further their own desires for wealth and romance, while exchanging barbs and taking turns taunting Anna's hapless Scottish parlor maid, Catherine (sure to be a scene stealer, played by Monica

"We like to bat the maid around like two cats playing with a mouse," Avalon said. "It's very funny. My character gets her frustrations out with the maid."

In most of the Boston

Marriages of the 1900s it wasn't clear what type of relationship the two women had intimately, but in Mamet's play it is very much explicit in the verbal ping-





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New and familiar stars headline 17th-annual Jazz in Pines


This year's presentation of Idyllwild's Jazz in the Pines will feature a number of prominent as well as up-and-coming musicians, including headliners Tom Scott on saxophone and David Benoit on jazz piano, both of whom have had careers spanning decades.

On Saturday, Aug. 28, three-time Grammy-award winning saxophonist Tom Scott will light up the Holmes Amphitheater with his Cannonball Adderley tribute.

Scott began his extraordinary career as a high-demand session musician, and later became a solo artist, guest artist, composer, and conductor of 30 symphony orchestras. In the past 40 years, he has released 29 solo albums, 13 of which received Grammy nominations

Aside from his phenomenal solo career, Scott is perhaps most well-known for his numerous film and television scoring credits, including writing the theme songs for "Starsky and Hutch" and "The Streets of San Francisco," as well as performing and arranging music for several films such as, "Taxi Driver,"
"Bladerunner," and "Monsters, Inc." Besides onscreen work, Scott was the musical director for the 68th Academy Awards and for several Emmy Award shows from 1996 to 2007.

He has collaborated with a diverse array of artists such as Barbra Streisand, Frank Sinatra, Arethra Franklin, Blondie and Pink Floyd, and has participated in over 450 recordings with other big-time artists. Hits such as

Joni Mitchell's "Court and Spark," Paul McCartney's "Listen to What the Man Said" and Whitney Houston's "Saving All My Love for You," display this performer's great flexibility.

Scott recently released an album entitled "Cannon Re-loaded — A Tribute to Cannonball Adderly" that he will feature at the 2010 Jazz Festival, where you can see firsthand this experienced player.

On Sunday afternoon, five-time Grammy-nominee and musical innovator David Benoit returns to the verdant and vibrant amphitheatre. He also returns to Idyllwild to headline Jazz in Pines for the third time. He was here previously in 2002 and 2004.

But Benoit has spent much more time on the Hill than he has in the Holmes Amphitheatre. Benoit grew up in Hermosa Beach, but between the ages of 8 and 15, he spent much time in Idyllwild, including many Thanksgivings. His father, a behavioral psychologist, and his mother, a school teacher, loved the town.

"At about 15, I couldn't be away from the piano. It was winter and we were in Idyllwild. My mother found a piano at the old town Hall," Benoit shared. "There's a photo of me

playing the piano outdoors in the freezing cold in Idyllwild. I was just so happy playing the piano."

Benoit has contributed to both the jazz and classical music scenes as a composer, guest artist and conductor, most significantly of the Asia America Symphony Orchestra, with whom he presented Leonard Bernstein's "West Side Story" in 2009, and later, Beethoven's Ninth Symphony at Disney Hall in Los Angeles. Other prominent symphonies he has conducted include the Los Angeles Philarmonic and the London Symphony Orchestra, part of his always expanding list of exemplary musical leadership.

His expansive repertoire includes 25 recordings, the first of which is his "favorite" debut, "Freedom at Midnight." This and other albums such as "This Side Up" and "Every Step of the Way' are considered by the jazz world to be classics of the genre, and works of great aptitude and inventiveness.

Currently, Benoit is touring and performing his lat-

est release entitled "Earthglow," an album experimenting with both Latin and Brazilian tones. In October, he will be honored with a Lifetime Achievement Award at The American Smooth Jazz Awards.

These two accomplished musicians will be kick starting a jazz-filled weekend that also includes artists such as Kenny Washington, Robin Alder & Mutts of the Planet, Oscar Hernández, and Evan Christopher. 



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Steele hits well in Canada

Brendan Steele was on his game again last week, turning in his second-best performance of the year on the Nationwide Tour.

Playing in the Ford Wayne Gretzky Classic on two golf courses in Ontario, Canada, the Idyllwild native posted a 15-under par 68-68-65-69- 270 total. He tied for 14th place and earned more than \$14,400 in winnings.

During the tournament, he hit 83 percent of the fairways with drives averaging 310 yards, resulting in a remarkable 87 percent of greens in regulation and producing 22

Steele currently stands in 55th place on the tour this year. If he maintains this position, he will earn a second year with fully-exempt status on the Nationwide. A top 25 finish would result in promotion to the PGA Tour in 2011, and he has more than a dozen tournaments remaining in which to improve his position.

This week, Steele plays in the \$550,000 Chiquita Classic at the TPC River's Bend course in Cincinnati, Ohio, where the first-place finisher will take home \$108,000.

registrar from certifying the vote totals unless the stranded 12,500 ballots were counted.

After a week's delay to consider both sides, Judge Fisher ordered the Registrar to count these ballots and include them in the totals submitted to the Secretary of State, whose deadline is Friday, July 16.

Despite several close races for example, only 12 votes separated the Democratic candidates for the 40th State Senate District — the inclusion of these ballots did not change any of the previous tentative results. Former Assemblyman Juan Vargas still outpolled current Assemblywoman Mary Salas for the Democratic nomination against Republican Brian Hendry in the 40th Senate District. The winner succeeds Sen. Denise Ducheny.

Judge Paul Zellerbach still defeated incumbent District Attorney Rod Pacheco.

The 12,563 ballots ultimately represented nearly 5 percent of the voters participating in the June primary.

County Executive's report

Besides the court action, the county Board of Supervisors had asked County Executive Bill Luna to review the Registrar's office and evaluate what might have contributed to the slow counts, miscommunication between the Registrar's office and the public waiting for

Luna presented the board with a 20-page report summarizing the problems encountered election night and the actions contributing to the problems. He also included several pages of recommendations to correct and to improve ballot counting procedures.

If adopted, many of the recommendations, such as increased funding for temporary help and overtime, would be implemented before November's General Election.

Some of the problems are directly attributed to the increasing number of voters using the mail to return ballots. While an available option for decades, its use has significantly grown since 2007 when the Secretary of State decertified the use of electronic voting machines.

In Riverside County, nearly 60 percent of the June 8 ballots arrived by mail and 80 percent of those arrived on Election Day.

The county staff did examine the confusion between the Registrar's office and Postal Service. No conclusive blame was levied because ambiguous messages and lack of confirmation were large parts of the situation.

However, they did affirm that the Registrar's office has never retrieved ballots from the Postal Service's Moreno Valley center.

"It is important to note that the Registrar of Voters has never picked up mail from the Moreno Valley center, neither on Election

results and also the Postal Day nor at any other time .. The Registrar's office did not vary from procedures used in previous elections to collect last-minute ballots before 8 p.m.," read the

"Still formal procedures for handling mail on Election Day are needed to prevent the problem from recurring," was a recommendation, which the author indicated the two agencies were already negotiating.

The report also conceded that the Registrar had reduced overtime and temporary staff in order to comply with her new budget ceiling. Due to the county's significant budget deficit, the Registrar's office budget had been reduced \$3.8 million, from \$13.5 million to about \$9.7 million.

New equipment will also speed the counts and the report recommended the county invest several hundred thousand dollars in ballot scanners, extraction and sorting machines, signature-recognition software and facility expansion to accommodate the new equip-

Supervisors plan for local historic district

The Riverside County Board of Supervisors initiated the process that could ultimately create the Idyllwild Historic Preservation District. One of the early steps involves amending the existing county Historic Preservation District Ordinance (578).

The county Planning Director, Ron Goldman, submitted a request to the board for authorization to develop the necessary modifications for the current ordinance and then to proceed with a draft of a charter, resolution or possibly separate ordinance to establish a historic preservation district (HPD) in Idyllwild.

"The existing ordinance hasn't been changed in decades," said Verne Lauritzen, 3rd District Supervisor Jeff Stone's chief of staff. "This will result in the necessary changes and make things happen to fit up there

commercial district was completed in September 2009 and identified considerable historic resources. The conclusion was the establishment of a local historic preservation district would protect those resources and benefit the community.

The county adopted Ordinance 578 in 1979 when there were plans to establish a preservation district in Old Town Temecula. The general amendments would ensure the county's ordinance is consistent with current state and federal policies.

Lauritzen said county officials intend to convene another community meeting to discuss the ordinance amendments and the Idyllwild proposal. A tentative date has not been decided, but according to Deputy Planning Director Jerry Jolliffe, they are considering the last week of July or very early August.

The cost to complete A survey of Idyllwild's the work on the ordinance amendments and Idyllwild proposal is estimated to be \$100,000. Laurtizen said Stone has already allocated that sum from his community improvement designated (CID) funds.

> While 3rd District Planning Commissioner John Petty encouraged the planning officials to incorporate residential areas into the district, Jolliffe said the initial focus will be on the core commercial properties.

> While some boundary adjustment recommendations have been received, Jolliffe thought the planning staff could make those reviews and assessments. This would obviate the need for an additional survey at this time. In the future, if the district were approved, it could incorporate a bigger swath of residential neighborhoods.

cuttings from established plants to further Parton's propagation and distribution vision.

Parton plans free planting of 100 lilacs in commercial Idyllwild venues in October 2010; 300 in October 2011; 300 in October 2012; and 300 in October 2013. Also in 2013, Parton will make available 300 "Lilac Idyllwild" varietals to nonbusiness owner residents at a reduced price of \$10.

In May 2015, Parton envisions Idyllwild hosting its First-annual Lilac Festival, cosponsored by local organizations such as the Garden Club, Chamber of Commerce, Idyllwild Business Roundtable, Idyllwild Community Center or an

Idyllwild Business Improvement District (which could, as other district's have, incorporate a landscape maintenance function).

Lombard, Ill., has promoted Col. Plum's vision for nearly 150 years, now featuring a flowering of events including a queen coronation, concerts, arts and crafts fair, Mother's Day brunch, tours of lilac venues, a lilac ball, beer and wine tasting events, and of course, the parade. and the California Coastal Commission in April 1997. The Campaign provides boater education throughout California in partnership with public and private agencies. Locally, the partnership between WRCOG, Lake Hemet and KOLA radio seeks to educate Lake Hemet boaters about boating in an environmentally conscious manner.

According to Lake Hemet Ranger and Campground Manager Burt Quick, boaters will also get tips on how to keep themselves safe. "We'll be talking about not speeding, not standing up in the boat, watching out for other boaters — that kind of practical information," he said.

This is Lake Hemet's third year hosting the event and Quick expects it to be well attended. Although the event is free, Lake Hemet charges a \$12 day-use fee per vehicle with two individuals and

boaters also pay a \$7 boat launch fee. A fishing license is required to fish, whether from a boat or from the shore. Licenses are available for sale at the Lake Hemet Market and the campground rents motorboats and rowboats.

In addition to Saturday's event, Lake Hemet is planning to host a Full Moon Flotilla from 6:30 p.m. to 10 p.m. each Saturday closest to the full moon, July through October. The first full moon event takes place Saturday, July 24.

The event is unique because boating at night is generally not allowed at Lake Hemet. At the Full Moon Flotilla, boaters are encouraged to decorate their vessels and enjoy fishing by moonlight.


