

Rain pummels the Hill

ince Friday, Idyllwild has received more than 6 inches of rain. While it seems like a torrential and unending storm, each of the past three Decembers — 2007 through 2009 - has brought nearly 6 inches of rain to the Hill, which is almost 50 percent more than the long-term December rainfall average of 3.75 inches.

In 2007, nearly 4 inches fell in two days — Nov. 30 and Dec. 1 — then another 3.2 inches between Dec. 7 and Dec. 9. Last year between Dec. 7 and Dec. 13, 4.8 inches of rain fell here.

But the overall impression of this being a wet fall is true. As of 4 p.m. Monday, 9.7 inches of rain have been recorded at the Idyllwild Fire Station since July 1. Through Tuesday afternoon, more than 12.42 inches of rain have been recorded at Keenwild Ranger Station during the same period.

This storm has brought more than 7 inches to the Pine Cove area and further north at the Forest Service Vista Grande station, more than 9 inches have been See Weather, page 2

Rain dampens sales season

n an all-important pre-Christmas sales week for local merchants, five days of continuous rain have begun to dampen local sales. On Sunday, Dec. 19, with fog, mist, wind and light rain graying the local landscape, a handful of tourists scurried from shop to shop on a very gloomy day. In Village Lane, the only business open was the Greek Place restaurant.

"Tourists were leaving early on Sunday, fearing mudslides or snow," said Bryan Tallent, co-owner of Spruce Moose in the Fort. Tallent noted that a result of this widespread storm, deemed a "weather effect" See Holidays, page 24 seen only once every 10

to 15 years, was that fewer tourists were making the trek up the Hill. "We had a good week last week, up until the storm," said Tallent. "But these three weeks [pre-Christmas through New Year's Day] are the most important [for sales]." On a positive note, Tallent mentioned that he is seeing more locals in his shop this holiday season.

The storm has drenched the Los Angeles basin. As of Tuesday, Dec. 21, local precipitation totals, for the storm that began just after midnight on Thursday, Dec. 16, ranged from a couple inches in Idyllwild to seven inches in Pine Cove and more than nine further north at Vista Grande.

Interview with Bob Romano: Part III

Editor's note: This week's column concludes Bruce's interview with Bob Romano of the Forest Service Volunteers Association (FSVA).



Bruce Watts: It seems the Forest Service is a lot less strict than the state about wilderness camping?

Bob Romano: That's right. The state requires you to camp at a post site. But in our [U.S. Forest Service] wilderness, as long as you are 200 feet away from a trail, stream, meadow or another camper, you can pretty much pick out your own campsite.

Watts: So you have a rule about camping right next to someone else's tent?

Romano: Right, you have to be at least 200 feet from that person. If you are going into the wilderness to camp and someone else is going into the wilderness to camp, neither of you wants to see the other. So hopefully you to the public so they get a better understanding of what are going to find places where you are not going to be able to see or hear someone else.

I have actually been at a post site and somebody wanted to camp right next to me because they arrived late, about 10 p.m. It was already dark and they were afraid to go anywhere else because of the dark. So I told this one guy, "Why don't you just go a little ways down below me here and you can camp down there. I don't want you to put your tent right next to me. (I was laughing) This is a wilderness."

So it's all about the education, that's what the Forest Service is trying to do and that's our biggest role. We are out there telling people what the rules are and why we have those rules and how they can be a better user of the forest.

Watts: As far as the patrolling end of it goes, I was aware of what they do because I talk to Joe Bressi and other FSVA members, but I really didn't know much about the administrative functions of what you do here.

Romano: Right, we also have a parade unit that represents the Forest Service. They wear Forest Service uniforms and participate in different parades; but it is all about education.

We had 32 wilderness volunteers that did that work and they were working trailheads, dispersing sites, working in the office and patrolling — but they were all representing the wilderness doing a job. We also have a volunteer who has taken a lot of pictures on the forest and the San Jacinto Wilderness map has been redone.

ATTENTION UNLICENSED CONTRACTORS AND HOMEOWNERS:

"California Business and Professions (B&P) Code requires all home improvement jobs (grading, construction, remodeling, landscaping, etc.) valued at more than \$500 for labor and materials be done by an individual or company with a CSLB (Contractors State License Board) license, and that license number must be included in all advertisements for their contracting services. ... The number is required by law to be printed on all contractor business and advertising documents, such as the bid, contract, print ad, or business card." (This is not the same as a Riverside County Business Registration number, AKA: County Business License number.)

"If you're caught contracting (verbally or in writing, by bid or hourly) without a license, you will likely have to go in front of a judge to answer to misdemeanor charges, which carry a potential sentence of up to six months in jail and/or a \$500 fine, and a potential administrative fine of \$200 to \$15,000. If you get caught again, the penalties get stiffer. You could face a mandatory 90-day jail sentence as well as a fine of 20 percent of the contract price of the work performed, or a \$4,500 fine."





FIRE AND FOREST

Winter

We have now officially entered winter. We have already had snow, a good deal of rain and fog, and an early blast of cold. Winter changes the way we interact with the environment, pushing most of us indoors. The clouds can completely take away our views

of the mountains and forest, further limiting our contact. Most of us just want to stay warm and, if we don't have to be anywhere, curl up with a good book or in front of a football game. Activity slows, the days are short, and nature seems to put a premium on conserving energy, being still and being inward.

Yet we have bursts of sun and energy. When storms clear we get the bluest skies imaginable, framing snowy peaks and alpine forest. Clear winter days can be breathtakingly beautiful up here, and nature pulls us outside to see new forms and colors. Summer pines can fade into the forest green, each indistinguishable from its neighbors.

Winter pines can hold yards of snow on their branches, displaying their unique shapes, with the contrast of white snow and green bough adding a striking palette. Oaks follow a different path, dropping "summer's empire" as Joni Mitchell sang, revealing their architectures in all their unique and adaptive complexities. And lower in the forest, but not forgotten, lies manzanita, whose lustrous red/brown bark when wet can warm the dreariest, fogshrouded day.

Rain and snow slow things down and can make getting places treacherous, but they are also the condition that allows us to live here. All the water we use falls out of our sky, the great majority in our winter storms. We don't pipe water from the Colorado or the California aqueduct — we use the water we find in streams and in the mountain to make our lives here possible, just as the trees and animals do.

Obviously we are experiencing one of the longest rainstorms in recent history in Southern California. It is a "warm" storm but by the time this is published we may have snow at our elevation, so here are a few suggestions:



If you wish to track the storm on your computer, the abc7.com site has many weather threads including the same Doppler radar that they use on their news broadcasts. It is easy to navigate and the Doppler radar is extremely accurate for our area.

If you need sandbags, they are available at Forest Lumber, Village Hardware and IFPD [Idylwild Fire Department].

Do not hesitate to call 9-1-1 if you become isolated snow, flooding or falling trees. Even if the mitigation the problem is not IFPD's responsibility, we will get of you the proper help that you need.

If candles are part of your holiday celebrations, please be very careful that they are mounted firmly so they cannot fall over. Obviously, keep all flame sources away from your Christmas tree and extinguish all candles before leaving your home for any reason.

IFPD postpones audit acceptance

The Dec. 14 meeting of the Idyllwild Fire Protection Commission focused predominantly on financial issues. While the 2008-09 audit approval was deferred to the January meeting, the commission did discuss efforts to make prior year adjustments, the current year's budget and the ambulance fee billing contract.

Through the first five months of the fiscal year, IFPD has had to draw upon its reserves to pay expenses. Through November, the district had used about \$300,000 of its total \$438,000 in reserves. Beginning in December, Riverside County will send the first property tax and assessment payment, which will reverse the declining trend and help restore the reserves

Local resident Leigh Humphries has volunteered to help the department with its accounting backlog, Walker told the commission. He provided a two-page summary of her assistance to date and said he expects the financial data to be ready for the 2009-10 audit shortly. The commis-

sion postponed accepting the 2008-09 audit until January when this work is competed.

However, in a separate letter to the board, former auditor Smith Marion identified four issues, which they described as material misstatements:

• Post audit adjustments for 2004 through 2008;

· Accrue current year accrued vacation as a liability:

• Properly record capital assets;

• Correct for postings across multiple funds.

In their letter, Smith Marion said IFPD "management determined that their effects [of the misstatements] are immaterial, both individually and in the aggregate to the financial statements.'

In other business, the commission approved a new contract with Complete Billing and Data Management to collect its ambulance and medical fees. Walker told the board that the contract had not been revised or reviewed for 6-1/2 years until this fall. The new contract was approved 5-0.

IWD to set goals in January

The 2010 year ended well for Idyllwild Water District (IWD). During a Dec. 14 meeting, the board reviewed the current budget, discussed the current water status and agreed to use the Jan. 18, 2011 meeting to decide the agency's goals and objectives for next fiscal year, July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012.

the current fiscal year, IWD's total net income is \$19,250. Revenues have been slightly less than budgeted and lower water demand has contributed to this result.

In November, water sales revenue was \$3,000 less than IWD Auditor and Controller Jim Ludy had estimated last June. Actual sales volume was 7.6 percent less than expected. Both commercial and residential use has declined equally, he added.

Currently, expenses are ahead of the projected budget level - approximately \$23,000 in water and \$7,500 in the sewer fund, a total of 4.9 percent.

Water supplies continue to be good, according to General Manager Terry

Foster Lake water level is 12.5 feet, substantially above a year ago when it was at 1.5 feet and in 2008 when it rested at 7.5 feet. For most of IWD's wells. the ground water levels are above the November 2009 levels. For example, the water level for well no. 26 at the Nature Center is 23 below ground level and a year ago is was 29.5 feet below the surface.

Water production in Nearly halfway through November was 15.5 percent less than 2009. Since January, water production is 10.1 million gallons (11.2 percent) less than the 90.6 million produced during the first 11 months of 2009. Both Fern Valley and Pine Cove water districts are experiencing declines in water consumption, but IWD's drop is the greatest.

> The Board also agreed to put a decision about 2011-12 goals and objectives on the January meeting agenda.

> 'The board is a team of five individuals committed to providing guidance to the district regarding the allocation of time and effort," Board President Allan Morphett said in response to a question about the value of this effort.







'Gremlin's' director Dante is featured filmmaker

Director Joe Dante of "Gremlins" fame is the featured filmmaker for Idyllwild 2011: Independent Festival of Cinema (IIFC). Dante will be in Idyllwild for the screening of "Gremlins" and his short movie "Splatter" with five optional endings from which an audience can choose. Both films screen on Friday, Jan. 14.

Festival Director Stephen Savage is excited about Dante's presence at IIFC. "I mean, this is one of the biggest directors of the past 30 years, and here we are, a second-year festival with nothing to offer except the promise that our town is special," he said. Savage noted that established festivals often pay honorees to attend. "Joe has always been very giving of this time but he's a very busy guy, so I am incredibly humbled and honored that he didn't hesitate when asked [to attend]."

Dante, who began his career at B-movie king Roger Corman's New World

Dante continued to impress critics and audiences, cleverly combining humor and sci-fi or horror with his 1981 vampire hit "The Howling." Pictures, broke out with The Movie." In a review in the Chicago Sun Times, Roger Ebert bashed the segments directed by then A-list directors Spielberg and John Landis. But Ebert lauded Dante's weird, offbeat and audacious take on the movie's third segment.

> In 1984, Dante made "Gremlins," his biggest commercial hit, again combining

for \$11 million, "Gremlins" grossed \$148 million domestically. In this adult romp with a kid's heart, Dante importance Dante places continued to develop his signature blend of humor, satire, special effects and stories with a warm center.

"Joe is a perfect fit for films reflect his personality. He does huge budget features with lots of special effects and computer-generated imagery, and yet, with Joe, it's always about the story first. His soul is front and center in his movies. 

One of the striking things about living on this mountain is that you can rather easily drive out of winter; a relatively short drive takes you out of what can feel like Montana to sunny, southern California. You take off your parka and put on your sun glasses, and you are in a different world. It can be a delightfully warm and sunny world, but it gets its water from other places, because there is not enough there to satisfy all the needs of those who live there. We, on the other hand, get our water from what natures brings to the mountain.

So the rain and snow slow things, but life doesn't stop. On certain days, the town swarms with people wanting to experience a "real" winter, wanting to breathe cold, clean air for just a little bit, or wanting to show their children what snow looks and feels like.

And amazingly, the Woodies don't stop, though they might slow down. They keep going, keep cutting and splitting wood donated by various community members, keep giving the wood to the HELP Center, which in turn gives it to people in need of firewood. Their work has taken on a new meaning in these hard economic times.

The Woodies will keep working through the winter, part of the great recycling process that never stops. Like so much of the beauty up here, they almost seem to me to be a feature of nature — persistent, noble, and renewing.



Friday morning in the drizzle, Woodies worked their magic, the cutters using the chainsaws, the splitters carefully sizing up the wood, the transporters supplying the splitters with the half and quarter rounds, the relayers wheeling the barrows over to the stacker-tosser working the "cage." Teamwork is needed to keep the HELP Center clients supplied with firewood come the cold days and nights ahead.


