nterim Idyllwild Fire Chief Mike Sherman continued to bring budget warnings to the Idyllwild Fire Protection District's meetings. At Tuesday's meeting, he first alerted the commission that the 2011-12 ambulance revenue estimate of \$335,000 was unlikely to be achieved.

'You've never received more than \$240,000 in [ambulance] revenue," Sher-

man said. "Through December, we've collected about \$127,900, so if that's doubled, we might get \$256,000 to \$260,000."

The current IFPD budget overestimates ambulance revenue by a minimum of \$75,000, according to Sher-

Commissioner Dr. Charles "Chip" Schelly agreed with Sherman and said it was a very optimistic estimate because the ambulance fee schedule See IFPD, page 9

Lemon Lily Festival planning begins

lanning for the third annual Idyllwild Lemon Lily Festival is underway. With its tripartite mission of fostering appreciation for this once abundant local flower, as well as providing public education and restoration, festival planners are in the process of organizing festival events, locations, schedules and monetary allocations to best accomplish festival goals.

They have decided that Town Hall will not be an event site and that most festival activities will take place at the Nature Center, off Highway 243 between Idyllwild and Pine Cove. While this location is consistent with the educative goals of festival planners,

it may limit participation and support from local merchants and vendors, said longtime festival participant and local businessman Bryan Tallent.

Planners discussed whether in-town shuttle pickup locations would be sufficient to attract local merchant support and involvement. Tallent doubted it would.

A suggestion was made to revive a once successful bluegrass music festival and hold it in town in the late afternoon and early evening on one festival night. Similar to the successful Marshall Hawkins' in-town jazz concerts that followed Jazz in the Pines, the music festival could be held in the downtown core, giving local merchants and restaurants more of a link




Costs of rescue are borne by the county if those rescued are county residents.



that comes out of the tap. When you get low, you simply borrow" some water from our neighbors to the north. If, however, you live in Idyllwild, you know two things: One, winter isn't over until after Mother's Day (and sometimes beyond); and, two, all our water on the mountain comes from the mountain.

When people are telling you how lucky we are to have 70-degree days in the winter, you have to tell them, it is nice now; but when summer comes, we could be in for it. Then you explain about Stage II and Stage III water conservation and the consequences of droughts to the local ecosystem and economy.

For us water comes from wells, springs and stream diversions which are all supplied by rainfall and snowmelt. Many people think our water source is a pipeline coming from Hemet. We can just turn up the pressure and the water problem will be solved.

Strange but true

Those of you who need your daily java fix probably won't be surprised to learn that coffee is one of the most popular drinks worldwide and is one of the most traded agricultural commodities. Due to limitations in cultivation, however, Hawaii is the only state in the U.S. that produces the beans.

We may not be the only city or town in Southern California that must live within its means when it comes to water consumption, but we are one of the few that lacks other alternatives. We are reliant on the weather; precipitation and snow pack are very important to the town's well-being.

If you are a Pacific Crest Trail hiker or backpacker, water availabilty in the high country is almost mandatory. I think it was somewhere around 2004 or 2005 when the Mt. San Jacinto State Park began posting in the wilderness trail signs that read "No water in high country." Their message meant that you would have to bring all your own water for backpacking.

So even though I was sick with a cold and it was suddenly freezing and snowing out, I was happy to see the white stuff falling out of the sky, to hear the snowplow cruising up and down the road at night, and to notice the flashing red light.

I was happy to see the town fill up with tourist families and see all the multicolored saucers and sleds once again on the roadside.

I will be happy if the snow keeps coming for another two months. Then winter will be over. Spring will be here and everything will be as it should be.





Kudos to Idyllwild Fire

A year ago, Idyllwild Fire Commissioner Dr. Charles "Chip" Schelly proposed a resolution in response to the State Controller publishing salary data from special districts such as Idyllwild Fire.

Schelly's resolution, which was adopted unanimously, requires the district to post the salary data on its website (www.idyllwildfire.com) as well as payments greater than \$5,000 to vendors and contrators.

At last week's meeting, the commission approved the list of 2011-12 contracts that interim Chief Mike Sherman recommended for posting.

Here's a brief summary:

- The Emergency Medical Service contract with Riverside County to serve Pine Cove and Zone 3.
- The CBD Management contract this is for billing for medical services which IFPD provides, such as ambulance transports.
- The cooperative agreement with Riverside County for provision of dispatch service to IFPD.
- The Mobile Data Computer agreement with Riverside County.
- The Kansas State Bank lease and the U.S.D.A. note for acquisition of two fire vehicles in 2008.
- The PNC Equipment fiance lease for the Zoll Heart monitors in 2011.
- The Annual operating plan with the Forest Service for mutual aid.
- The recent contract between the commission and interim Chief Sherman.

I think this is very honorable and transparent step to keep the public informed of fire department business. In my opinion, it sets a standard for Hill public agencies.

Audit Triggers

TAX TIPS

The Internal Revenue Service has stepped up its audits over the past few years. In addition to traditional face-to-face audits, it is also conducting an increasing number of correspondence audits where taxpayers are requested to verify various expenses by mail.

Increasing scrutiny is being given to tax preparers who prepare fraudulent returns. Once a "bad" preparer is discovered, the IRS criminal division, which sports a greater than 95 percent conviction rate, goes after him or her. The audit division then begins auditing all the preparer's returns looking for repetitive errors.

A favorite area for fraud is the Earned Income Credit, which can be worth thousands of dollars to taxpayers

with young children and income under a certain level. Sometimes

couples pretend to be unmarried and have the wife claim the kids while subtracting the

husband's high income from cipal Residence Exclusion, the return in order to qualify for the credit. What most taxpayers don't realize is that if their preparer is cheating on their return, he is cheatensuring that eventually he will be caught.

Office in the home deductions are questioned most often when someone works as an employee. The office needs to be for the employer's convenience, not the taxpayer's. A common question is "would you be fired if you did not have the office in your home?" Written corroboration from the employer is often required.

Many people when they prepare their own returns don't bother to include sales of stocks or mutual funds. Since the IRS doesn't know the cost basis, it assumes zero and sends out a letter with a large amount of tax due.

Sheriff clarifies response policy as burglaries increase

An apparent surge in burglaries is occurring throughout the Idyllwild area. A review of incident reports received from the Riverside County Sheriff's Department's Hemet Station, shows that crimes to property (burglary, attempted burglary, vehicle theft, grand theft and felony vandalism) increased substantially in recent weeks compared to 2010 and 2011.

Property crimes grew marginally in 2011 over 2010 (23 and 20 respective reported incidents) and markedly (about 40 percent increase) over 2009 levels (13 incidents). These preliminary tallies may not represent all incidents.

However, eight incidents have already been reported since January 2012. Another two occurred in the last two weeks of 2011.

Sheriff's deputy responses are categorized, with Priority One (in-progress) criminal incidents receiving highest priority because the imminence of danger requires an immediate response.

Drier winter impacts district wells

District prepares for new water standards

Well levels are lower at Fern Valley Water District owing to a drier than normal winter. Prior to the storm that dropped eight inches of snow in Idyllwild and 13-1/2 inches in Pine Cover and upper Fern Valley, precipitation was about half of what it had been last year at this time. Now it approaches two-thirds of the long-term average precipitation through Feb-

According to District General Manager Steve Erler's report at the Friday, Feb. 17, board meeting, average decline in well levels is one to 10 feet compared to same time last year.

Tank 11, which had been temporarily withdrawn from service, has been brought back on line, according to Erler. The tank's water levels are being kept at lower levels to facilitate more frequent circulation to promote freshness.

Erler told the board that Tank 5 has been temporarily removed from service to cut down on time water remains held ("detained"), during times of minimal monthly demand, Since Tank 5 sits in series between 7 and 6, engineers

had recommended this action to cut down on buildup of disinfectant byproduct levels in the first and second quarters of 2012. By taking Tank 5 out of action, less system water stands, and proportionally more water circulates. Erler stressed that the district has never been out of compliance with California Department of Public Health Stage One byproduct standards, but this latest action was taken as a remediating step in preparation for Stage Two standards that go into effect on Oct. 1, 2013.

In a letter to the district dated June 6, 2011, the health department directed a review of the district's distribution system. The review would consider seasonal differences in water source usage and demand, water quality, storage tank operations and storage capacity that could contribute to system spikes in trihalomethane and haloacetic acid. Those levels have spiked in the past in district water. The district, according to Erler, has completed engineering recommendations on how to best meet the new standards.

Erler reported the conclusion to a standoff over See Fern Valley, page 19

was increased in 2010 and 2011.

Nevertheless, Sherman said, "The second half [of the year] revenues should be a little higher, but fees aren't high enough to meet this goal."

Later, Sherman advised the commission that even if they are able to adopt a balanced budget for fiscal year 2012-13, which begins July 1, the district is likely to need another advance from the county this fall.

'You'll need an immediate advance from Riverside County, even if you pass a balanced budget," Sherman warned. "Do what you did last year, only earlier [in the year]."

The current IFPD bank balance is about \$280,000. The next major revenue collection will be in May following April property tax payments. In 2009, IFPD received about \$250,000 during March and April, but in 2011, the district's total revenue for those two months was \$126,000.

Since expenses are between \$100,000 and \$140,000 monthly, the fire district's financial situation remains precarious.

"It will be close. I am watching the balances closely as we need about \$120,000 per month. You

can see from the balances that we would have less than three months of cash, but we get between \$20,000 and \$25,000 per month in ambulance revenue; a quarterly payment from Riverside Emergency Medical Servces] of \$24,700; some small tax payments; and several outstanding fire payments, so we should make it without any disasters," he said cautiously later in the

The negotiating subcommittee, commissioners Pete Capparelli and Jerry Buchanan, have held some meetings with the Idyllwild Career Firefighters. They also requested a closed session at the end of Tuesday's meeting to confer with their commission colleagues on strategy and issues.

The accounting firm of Rogers, Anderson, Malody and Scott of San Bernardino is still working on the 2010-11 audit. Both Sherman and Buchanan indicated this would be necessary in order to refinance the district's

While Sherman has been discussing refinancing and consolidation of the vehicle and medical equipment loans with several institutions, he did not have a specific proposal for the commission at this meeting. He is attempting to obtain lower interest rates and a longer payback period in

order to reduce IFPD's annual cash flow.

He did get agreement from Kansas State Bank, holder of one of the engine loans, to defer the principal payment, due Feb. 1, for three months until May 1 and has been discussing terms with the California Special District Association.

On Sunday, Sherman talked about his progress since the meeting.

"The refinance is in progress with CSDA," he wrote in an email. "They will need to review the audit and other financials before they would commit. The refinancing must be complete and the other loans paid off before May 1. I sent them the preliminary commitment dated and signed on the 16th [of February, Friday]."

Sherman reported that

he had met with Nancy Layton about the bookkeeping position. Leigh Humphries, the former bookkeeper has resigned, Sherman said. She had told the board of her intention to leave in late 2010. Sherman had Layton do some financial work and recommended that the commission approve hiring her. She will work 10 hours per week at \$25 per hour.

Sherman and Commissioner Buchanan were going to negotiate her specific duties and functions this week, but she will help Sherman prepare the budget and take on payroll responsibilities, although Rapid Data, which currently produces the checks will also issue payments to CalPERS now.



Forest 2013 budget request stable

President Barack Obama released his proposed 2012-13 budget on Feb. 13. If Congress approves the President's recommendation, the budget would have a \$900 billion deficit, about two-thirds of the projected 2011-12 \$1.3 trillion deficit.

Part of federal spending includes \$4.861 billion for the U.S. Forest Service, a \$15.5 million increase from the enacted 2012 budget of \$4.845 billion.

In testimony last week before the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies, U.S. Forest Service Chief Tom Tidwell discussed the three themes — restoration, communities, and fire -– of the agency's proposed fiscal year 2013 budget request.

"To make the strategic investments to grow the economy and tackle the deficit, this budget makes difficult cuts to programs — but our priorities are designed to respond to the needs of the American public," Tidwell said.

"The budget request will engage communities and help Americans reconnect to the outdoors, expand on recreation benefits and create a wide range of opportunities for economic expansion to retain and create jobs. It also fosters partnering with communities and cooperating agencies to reduce the threat local communities can move property and watersheds."

Except for the National Forest System and land acquisition accounts, all other were cut, including the Wildland Fire Management programs (-\$3.1 million).

within fire management is increased \$78 million and the recommendation for state fire assistance funding is \$17 million greater than the 2012 appropriation. Consequently the entire Wild Fire Management program is only \$3 million less than this year.

The Forest Service is not planning on any staffing changes or reduction of major equipment available for fire fighting. Just last month, the agency released a request for proposals for the next generation of fire fighting aircraft.

The strategy is to replace the fleet of aging air tankers used to battle wildfires with

large air tankers. Simpson supported the Forest Service's strategy to replace the aging fleet, but asked the agency head to work closely with the subcommittee on funding issues.

We need a core fleet of the next generation large air tankers to supplement our boots-on-the-ground firefighters for what we know will be longer and more severe wildfire seasons in years to come," said Tidwell. The effectiveness of air tankers on a wildfire is directly proportional to [their] speed and load capacity. A larger load capacity also allows larger air tankers to split their retardant loads a next generation of newer, to support different parts

The suppression activity faster, more cost-effective of a fire without delay of returning to base."

Although no large air tanker has been built specifically for firefighting, several aircraft were designed to handle similar stresses. Recommendations for the next generation of air tankers include capacity to carry 1,800 to 3,000 gallons of mixed retardant; a minimum cruise speed of 345 mph; powered by turbine engines, which are more reliable, more fuel efficient, and require less maintenance than older aircraft piston engines; able to operate from most federal air tanker bases.







Three sisters, three breast cancer diagnoses

Beginning in 2005, Idyllwild part-time resident and desert real estate agent Kathleen Sunshine O'Brien helped first one, then in 2011 another sister through breast cancer surgeries and post-operative treatments. By October, 2011, her savings, schedule and stamina had been exhausted when she learned that she had stage three breast cancer. Only a month ago, on Jan. 29, Kathleen underwent her own double mastectomy surgery.

unlikely she would develop the same disease. "I mean, how possible could it be that all three of us would develop the same cancer?" she thought. Also, with each sister's successive diagnosis, surgeries and post-operative treatments, Kathleen became more and more involved in assisting them and had little time to think about herself.

The O'Brien sisters are beautiful women. Each has achieved distinction in their own fields. Kathleen is herself a champion track and field athlete. She said she had always believed she and her sisters could face anything. "I was on the U.S. Track Team," she said. "I know about teams." But then Brenda's cancer, then Angel's, and finally her own severely tested Team O'Brien's spirit.

The O'Brien sisters are determined to use their unlikely story to help other women — to alert them to the need to research and understand family histories, and especially to demand to be shown their mammogram images and have a radiologist explain them

"All women should have the right to see their radiologist, and their mammogram films, not just a written report," said O'Brien. She had mammograms in 2010 and in 2011. At the time, she was told she had nothing to worry about, only that she had some "calcification."

But Kathleen had read that calcification, when it occurs in clusters and is visible in a mammogram image, is a strong indicator of cancer. She asked the doctor to put the 2010 and 2011 images on the screen and told him about her sisters and her family's breast cancer his-

After hearing the family history and reexamining the clustered calcification, the doctor said, "That changes everything," Kathleen re-counted. "They did a biopsy and the next day I had full-blown invasive breast cancer," she said.

We will take away lessons about how to "Expand our Awareness in the Green Schoolyard." (Fortunately, our "schoolyard" is over 200 acres of forests, meadows and creeks.) We'll also learn how we can "Green our Purchasing Program" at school. Of course my personal favorite is "Learn How to Connect Kids to Real Food Through the Use of Gardens in Schools."

All in all, there are over 100 breakout sessions taking place over the day and a half we'll be at the conference. I feel unbelievably fortunate to have four co-attendees who will voraciously devour information alongside myself.

As one would guess, the real challenge for us is choosing which sessions to attend. They all look wonderful, applicable and worthwhile. We will most definitely have to split up individually to experience the maximum number of sessions.

Yet another grouping of activities that piques our interest are the "Solution Summits" which are being offered during the conference: "The Solutions Summits will bring key players to the table — literally around a table — for 3 or 4 hours in a facilitated discussion format to define and set goals for future action. The Solutions Summits are a major departure from the typical one-way information sharing that occurs at most conferences."

I noticed that some of those key players are government officials both from federal and state governments. What attending these summits will mean is that our students will get to sit down at a table with someone such as Dr. Janey Thornton, USDA deputy under secretary for food, nutrition and consumer services, and discuss how we can get good, local, nutritious food into our schools. We will also have the opportunity to have breakfast on two mornings with members of the Environmental Protection Agency.

We at Idyllwild Arts are underway with the task of greening the campus. We have already made changes in our kitchen, on our grounds and within our plans to build new buildings and update existing buildings.

We continue to seek and explore the incorporation of environmental conservation and preservation into both our arts and academic curriculum.

Until now, we have made and carried out these plans with nominal student involvement. These four students are the beginnings of a new tradition of student directed projects and initiatives which will change our school.

It is not an accident that four students who are underclassmen were chosen to attend. We seek continuity through subsequent years. We wish to have our current culture change and build through the years.

To create lasting change takes time and teaching by example. What it will take is one of these four students simply saying next year to a new freshman, "We do it this way now.'

to all calls, regardless of priority classification.

Hemet Station Captain Scot Collins provided the following clarification about deputy response, "The Hemet Station does not have

any policy on responding to calls that is independent of the department's policy. As an agency, we essentially respond to all calls for service. Each call is given a priority ranking of 1 through 4, based on the urgency of the incident, the immediate threat to public safety, and whether the incident is in-

progress, just occurred, or in the past.

To be clear, the Riverside County Sheriff's Department responds with a department member personally to all calls, regardless of priority. The department also has a Telephone Report Unit, which takes reports for citizens who live in our

unincorporated areas, if it is the desire of the citizen caller to make the report by phone. Only a small amount of calls meet our criteria to be handled by telephone; about 4 percent of Hemet Station's calls were handled by the Telephone Report Unit over the past two months."

Forest Service develops new rules for forest planning

Last month, Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack signaled his department's intent to issue a new planning rule for America's 193million-acre National Forest System. The new rule, which has been years in the making, seeks to deliver stronger protections for forests, water and wildlife while supporting the economic vitality of rural communities.

On Jan. 26, the Forest Service posted online a Final Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement (www. fs.usda.gov/planningrule) for the National Forest System Land Management Planning Rule.

Almost 300,000 com-

reviewed on the proposed rule and draft environmental impact statement issued last February.

A notice of availability for the environmental impact statement was published in the Federal Register on Feb. 3. Secretary Vilsack plans to issue a record of decision selecting a final plan in March.

'Our preferred alternative will safeguard our natural resources and provide a roadmap for getting work done on the ground that will restore our forests while providing job opportunities for local communities," Vilsack said in a press release.

The preferred alternative emphasizes collaboration throughout the planning

ments were received and process and strengthens the role of public involvement and dialogue. It also would require the use of the best available scientific information to inform decisions.

> Highlights of the preferred alternative are below.

"This approach requires plans to conserve and restore watersheds and habitats while strengthening community collaboration during the development and implementation of individual plans," said Forest Service Chief Tom Tidwell. "Under our preferred alternative, plan revisions would take less time, cost less money, and provide stronger protections for our lands and water."

The planning rule was also a topic at a recent For-

est Service Appropriations hearing. House subcommittee chair Mike Simpson, R-Idaho, addressed the subject in his opening remarks.

"I must mention the planning rule. Chief, I know you've been working hard on this, but I'm hearing a lot of concern about the new rule," Simpson told Tidwell. "It was my hope that this rule would be practical and shorten the time and resources needed to complete a forest plan. If the rule ends up in court, which seems to be the pattern with every planning rule, we're back to the drawing board and have wasted a great deal of time and money."

Highlights of new Forest Service planning regulations:

- · Plans must include components that seek to restore and maintain forests and grasslands.
- · Plans would include requirements to maintain or restore watersheds, water resources, water quality including clean drinking water, and the ecological integrity of riparian areas.
- · Plans would be required to provide habitat for plant and animal diversity and species conservation. These requirements are intended to keep common native species common, contribute to the recovery of threatened and endangered species, conserve proposed and candidate species, and protect species of conservation concern.
- Plans would provide for multiple uses, including outdoor recreation, range, timber, watershed, wildlife and fish.
- Plans would be required to provide opportunities for sustainable recreation and to address opportunities to connect people with nature.
- · Opportunities for public involvement and collaboration would be required throughout all stages of the planning process. The preferred alternative would provide opportunities for tribal consultation and coordination with state and local governments and other federal agencies and include requirements for outreach to traditionally underrepresented communities.
- · Plans require the use of the best available scientific information to inform the planning process and documentation of how science was used in
