

# Liquor store robbed Sunday

iverside County Sheriff's Department confirmed that a man carrying a weapon robbed the Mountain Top Liquor store, at 26005 Highway 243 in Idyllwild, around 11:30 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 26.

The robber, described as 6 feet tall, 180 pounds, wearing a long tan coat, brown T-shirt, blue jeans with a red scarf and red bandana covering his face, entered the business late Sunday night, brandished a handgun and demanded money. The suspect fled on foot with an unspecified amount of money before deputies

arrived. No employees were injured during the incident and the investigation is ongoing according to the Sheriff's report.

Richard Lengyel, clerk on duty at the time of the incident, said the robber was not nervous, seemed sure of himself and apparently knew how to handle the large caliber pistol he used in the robbery.

Lengyel said he was behind the counter leaning in to catch a replay of part of the Oscars when he heard something drop behind the counter. Lengyel turned around to see the robber, about two feet away, with the gun pointed at his face. What See Robbery, page 2

## Application for recycled water plant nearly ready

he Idyllwild Water District Board of Directors approved the next step in their quest for a water recycling facility. The Title 22 Engineering Report has been submitted to the California Department of Public Health and the draft Facility Planning report for the State Water Resources Control Board will be completed this week, according to Anders Wistrom, one of IWD's two consultants

Once the state has reviewed the Facility Planning Report, IWD expects approval to begin submitting reimbursements for the planning costs which have been accumulating. Currently they are about \$75,000.

The board approved \$40,000 to proceed with the detailed Clean Water State Revolving Fund application. Since federal funding is involved, more will be expected from environmental analyses and greater breadth including potential historic resource data and endangered species status.

Ascending Engineering of South Carolina, headed by Anuj Saha, will prepare these documents. Saha participated in the meeting via See Plant, page 8

# Burglaries surpass prior years

### More property crime incidents last week





the robber had dropped was a black gym bag with red piping.

"Empty the f---ing cash register, put it in the bag. I ain't f---ing kidding and I'm in a f---ing hurry," Lengyel recounted the robber saying. Lengyel said he did not recognize the voice, since the heavy masking muffled the sound of the voice.

"He wasn't shaking," said Lengyel. "I was looking right at him." Lengyel said the robber's head was covered and his face completely masked.

Lengyel said another employee came from the back of the store during the encounter. The robber demanded the other employee drop to the floor. He refused. Lengyel said there was a moment when he thought the distraction caused by the other employee might have given them an opportunity to take the robber down. But


a retiree, I have become even more sedentary. Time to great all the time. wake up.

# Forest Folk explore community garden sites

About 10 members of the Forest Folk, a group of Idyllwild active older adults, conducted a field trip to two sites that could host a greater-Idyllwild community garden in the future. A suitable site would give residents of all ages a chance to garden and share in the provenance. Both 3rd District Supervisor Jeff Stone and Bill Brown of the county Economic Development Agency have pledged support for the endeavor.

On Saturday morning, Feb. 25, the group first visited the Mountain Center site of Chapel in the Pines. Pastor Wally Boer and his dog Brinkley met the group and hosted a tour of a large, mostly flat site near the intersection of highways 243 and 74.

The group noted that with any site, there would be issues of water, electricity and security that would have to be solved before any infrastructure could be built. Those issues are present at the Mountain Center property. An unused existing well at the property would have to be made operable at a decent rate of flow to provide water for agricultural purposes. The well would need electricity and the site would need security, likely in the form of fencing. And

there are expenses involved with getting those elements in place.

Pastor Boer expressed a willingness to consider the possibility of hosting the garden and expressed enthusiasm for the concept, especially in that it would expand the church's existing outreach program. Already the church provides a clothing exchange and a food program to help those in need. A community garden could also provide both sustenance and participation by community members currently served by the church's outreach. "We've loved serving the community on the food program and would welcome the opportunity to serve more [with a community garden]," said Boer.

Nevertheless, there are many infrastructure issues to solve before a garden to serve the Pine Cove, Idyllwild and Mountain Center communities could be hoed and planted. "It would take a miracle to get it in place by this growing season," said Boer.

At the second site, Pine Cove Water District General Manager Jerry Holldber hosted the group and likewise stated there would be a number of hurdles to cross before a garden could be started on any land in the Pine Cove area.

Although in general sup-



### **INITIAL THOUGHTS**

#### Every tree isn't a forest ... Town Crier

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This year — 2012 — has special signifi-cance, as does every year divisible by four. First, yesterday, Feb. 29, only arrives every four years. I believe the gradual diminishment of the tradition associated with Sadie Hawkins Day is further proof of the advancing maturity of our species.

Why was Sadie Hawkins Day, when women invited men to the dance, only once nearly every 1,500 days? Too bad it wasn't more frequent.

But the other relevance of the divisible-by-four years is the American election process. The Presidential election is this year.

Many pages wouldn't contain my opinion about the primary and the future presidential campaign. Nevertheless, I have one rant (maybe only my first) to share with you.

Not only is the presidential office up for election, but two Riverside County Supervisors' terms end in December 2012.

Third District Supervisor Jeff Stone has already filed for his third term. So far he has one possible opponent - Joe Scarafone. He has until Friday to confirm his entry in the race.

But First District Supervisor Bob Buster has two opponents — Assemblyman Kevin Jeffries and Mike Soubirous whom I'm glad aren't planning to campaign in the third district.

Both Jeffries and Soubirous are advocating term limits for supervisors, lowering their salaries and eliminating their pensions.

While these might be bona fide issues to debate, I don't think 2012 is the year. The county is facing its fourth consecutive year of major deficits. The interim County Executive Larry Parrish is estimating Riverside County could be bleeding \$80 million next year unless action is taken to balance the budget.

These two candidates think a nickel is sufficient to address the county's major fiscal crisis. Expenses for supervisors are insignificant within the total \$500 million county budget. Revenues have fallen nearly \$200 million in four years. Five supervisors' salaries are barely \$700,000.

The candidates are simply playing to the anger among voters. If you're frustrated, get even by cutting their salaries.

Even if you eliminate all compensation - salary and benefits - for the five supervisors, the county's deficit would still be nearly \$78 million.

But what are their plans for public safety which consumes the vast majority of the county's revenues? Read about the recent growth of crime on the Hill on pages 1 and 2.

Now you'll argue, don't cut the Sheriff's Department any more. The unincorporated area is already feeling the effects of fewer deputies.

So where do you turn? The nonpublic safety agencies are planning for a 28 percent cut this year, which is in addition to cuts totaling more than 50 percent in the past few years.

At the state level, recent polls indicate voters may be willing to support temporary tax increases to fund schools. But what about the local level? Animal Services has closed compounds and reduced officers. If we protect fire and deputies, where do we turn?

Of course, no need to cut anything else once we reduce the fat in the supervisors' wallets, right? That's my point, these guys focus on inflamatory issues without addressing their constituents' needs.

If one is elected, he'll be making decisions affecting us too.

This summer Wal Mart will be carrying genetically engineered fresh corn. Monsanto Bt [biotechcorn] will have three genetically engineered traits that have never been consumed directly by humans.

It is not known what effects the eating of this genetically engineered corn will have on people. Lab rats fed the Monsanto Bt corn suffered from organ Label genetically failure. No labeling will alert buyers to the effect that this corn is a genetically modified product.

Monsanto was a major financial beneficiary of the herbicide Agent Orange, used to defoliate the jungles of Vietnam during the war. Those of you who were here in the late 70s may remember my campaign to stop the Forest Service from using 2,4-D, a component of Agent Orange, to defoliate the fuel breaks around the Hill.

The Forest Service stopped using it up here four years before it was totally banned by the U.S. government.

As more and more weeds become resistant to herbicides, more powerful chemicals are needed to subdue them. Dow Chemical is now seeking government approval for a type of genetically engineered corn that will be resistant to 2,4-D. This way, the weeds will be killed, but not the corn.

Still, the corn will be exposed to the 2,4-D, which is known to cause cancer and birth defects. This is insane.

Please contact your local representatives, President Obama, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture and demand that they do not allow this killer corn to be approved.

And, this summer, boycott Wal Mart until they discontinue selling unlabeled, genetically engineered corn. Thank you for your time

### Before our time

#### Fore! BeFore! ...

Brendan Steele's recent success has made golf newsworthy in Idyllwild once again. News media around the country love to highlight the odd fact that he grew up in a town without a golf course. But Idyllwild has not always been a golf-free zone.



There's a reason for street names like

Fairway Drive and Green Avenue near Astrocamp or Country Club Drive just beyond the Idyllwild School. In fact, golf in Idyllwild can be traced back to 1901, when the Idyllwild Sanatorium proclaimed "golf links unequaled" in its first publicity. In 1914, the Idyllwild Inn also built a course, but the heyday for local golfers came between 1925 and World War II.

Once Claudius Emerson bought the Inn in 1917, he touted golf to attract both tourists and lot buyers. He also promised to upgrade the existing course, but did not follow through until he got into an economic arms race with rival developers Frank Strong and George Dickinson:

• 1923 — Strong & Dickinson, who had retained Fern Valley and the heights above Marion View Drive when they sold Emerson the lower valley, hired Pine Cove developer Walter Wood to begin subdividing and marketing lots.

• 1924 — Emerson countered by opening his Country Club Subdivision between Marion View Drive and Tollgate Road, which overlooked a planned 9-hole golf course between Tollgate and Strawberry Creek above Camp Emerson.

• 1925 — Wood retaliated by hiring away Emerson's resident manager of the Idyllwild Inn to help create a competing course on Saunders Meadow. Hastily opened, this new Idyllwild Golf Club offered life memberships for \$250 including a free building lot nearby.

• 1926 — Wood, vying for members, built an elegant clubhouse, furnished by Idyllwild's pioneer furniture craftsman Hal Holcomb and featuring a swimming pool. Upon opening early in 1927, it immediately became a social center rivaling Emerson's Idyllwild Inn.

• 1927 — Emerson quickly built the Idyllwild Plunge, for both tourist and resident swimmers, and raised the ante by announcing plans to expand his course to 18 holes, dam Strawberry Creek for a lake, and add an aircraft landing field.

• 1928 — Wood renamed his enterprise the Mount San Jacinto Golf Club and staged another grand opening. But it was a losing struggle against Emerson's established presence, as mounting bills drained his bank account and deer munched his greens.

1929 — Emerson staged a gala celebration for his newly upgraded country club, which became widely known as "The Mile-High Golf Course." He hired a golf pro to run tournaments to attract the state's best talent. See Before, page 22

We have gotten a bit of winter recently, but we should not forget that this has been

a relatively dry season, and that will have consequences. Without much moisture in plants, we can expect an early start of fire season. The Forest Service and CAL FIRE have already arranged their staffing to cope with drier conditions and earlier fires.

Fire and forest

Southern California was quiet in terms of fire last year, which only obscures the fact that it was a terrible year for our southwest neighbors. Arizona's Wallow Fire, which began in late May and burned over half a million acres, was the largest in state history. New Mexico's Las Conchas Fire began in late June. When it was done in August, it had briefly shut down the Los Alamos National Lab and also set a record for acreage burned (156,000) in New Mexico.

Unfortunately for Texas, their year was worst of all. Suffering from record temperatures and drought, Texas recorded a staggering 3,959,000 acres destroyed, along with 2,862 homes. Virtually every Texas record concerning fire was broken during 2011.

Probably the worst fire within Texas was in Bastrop County, east of Dallas, where about 1,900 homes burned over the Labor Day weekend. It is important to note that even within catastrophic fire areas, homes survive. Why these homes survive when most around them burn always tells us something useful about fire prevention.

One such home in Bastrop was bought as a retirement home by a couple who had been living in Houston. By their own account, they knew nothing about fire or fire abatement. But also they recognized that since they had bought a heavily wooded lot, they'd better learn. So they asked a Texas Forest Service friend for advice on how to make their home fire safe. Over the course of two years, they implemented his advice about clearing out dead vegetation, thinning the woods, and generally creating defensible space.

So when the fire hit over Labor Day, they were ready. Their home was spared, though most homes in their area were not. One of the most interesting things to me is that the owners created walking paths around their house and within the woods nearby. They had swept the pine needles off these paths and lined them with rocks. When the fire came, these paths proved to be extraordinarily effective fuel breaks, stopping the ground fire from moving over the rocks. Since they had removed the fuel ladders (shrubs under trees, unlimbed trees), there was no way for the fire to climb into the trees once it had gone to the surface, and with the paths stopping the ground fire, there was nowhere for the fire to go but out.

A contrasting scenario played out west of Dallas at See Fire and forest, page 22

teleconference and Wistrom was able to physically attend.

"The availability of recycled water for landscape irrigation provides a nearly 100 percent drought proof water supply - recycled water will always be available, even in drought years when groundwater for potable uses may be restricted," Wistrom told the board.

Wistrom's draft report identifies three project alternatives, which differ only on the length and pipeline route from the wastewater treatment plant to a water storage tank. Basic common assumptions include the fact that recycled water will be available for irrigation, the four principal customers are Idyllwild Arts campus, Idyllwild Pines Camp, the Royal Pines Trailer Park, and individuals with green tanks, and that overall demand will approach 17.5 acre-feet (5.7 million gallons).

This water volume is

wells in a drought, noted Director Warren Monroe.

All three alternatives have the pipeline beginning at IWD wastewater treatment facility. The first alternative crosses Strawberry Creek near Idyllwild Arts and constructs the main line along Idyllbrook Drive. It terminates at an existing water tank at Idyllwild Pines Camp after recrossing Strawberry Creek.

The second alternative follows Tollgate Road to Delano Drive. It crosses over Strawberry Creek at the Delano Bridge. From there it passes along the north side of Strawberry Creek to the existing Idyllwild Pines tank.

The third alternative assumes the recycled water project would be built in two phases. Thus the main line terminates at the Royal Pines Trailer Park.

The estimated cost for recycled water will be about \$6.50 per thousand cubic feet, which is about \$2 less than tier 3 potable water costs

Wistrom recommended equivalent to one or two the district designate alter-

native two as its preferred alternative. He felt its construction was simpler and less costly. The preliminary cost estimate is about \$1.2 million and the cost difference between the alternatives is primarily the length of the pipeline route, Wistrom said.

"The current construction costs have been dropping and by this time next year the cost of the material and labor will be lower," General Manager Terry Lyons wrote in an email. The board plans to seek grant funding and state loan funds to finance the project. Lyons said it may be a year or longer before the state grants final approval for the project and its construction.

"I am trying to use existing roadway as much as possible," Wistrom told the board.

The board also agreed to table a request for forgiveness of half of a customer water bill amount. Director Jim Billman recommended further investigation before the board made a decision.

The request was made to

forgive nearly \$4,800 of the customer's December bill. A sprinkler system apparently malfunctioned and the customer used more than 100,000 cubic feet (more than 700,000 gallons) of water. The bill total was \$9,677 of which the customer agreed to pay \$4,860 of the bill.

"I didn't feel I could grant the partial forgiveness," said Lyons. "The leak went on for about a week." The customer appealed to the board, which is investigating the problem further.

IWD Resolution 451, enacted October 1993, authorizes the district's General Manager to forgive a portion of bill. A customer may only receive this grant once. The criteria read, "The water loss was not the result of the customer's reasonable control." This includes maintenance of equipment to shut flow off if the premise was empty for a period of time.

Since the same customer had incurred other significant problems, including usage of more than 10,000

cubic feet in September, Lyons did not feel the problem was outside the customer's control.


In other water business, Auditor Controller Jim Ludy reported the district's budget through January was slightly below his projections, but still revenues are \$33,300 more than costs. Water sales are about equal with his projections. He noted commercial sales were slightly ahead while residential sales had declined slightly.

District customers still

are trying to conserve water. Requests for rebates for water-efficient clothes washers and toilets continued in January. Nearly 40 requests have been reimbursed this fiscal year, for a total cost of \$6,250.

January usage was about 10 percent less than a year ago. For the fiscal year (since July 1), usage is about 1.6 million gallons (3 percent) less than the prior year.

## **Ruiz in Idyllwild on 'Listening Tour'**

Dr. Raul Ruiz, Democrat challenger for Congresswoman Mary Bono Mack's seat for the new 36th Congressional District that includes Idyllwild, will be in town on Thursday, March 1. Part of Ruiz's districtwide "Listening Tour," the Idyllwild visit gives the doctor an opportunity to hear what issues are important to Hill residents. The first, in what Ruiz said are many visits to the Hill, will be held at 10 a.m. Thursday at Town Hall.

Ruiz's campaign recently replaced his locally based campaign manager, Tizoc DeAztlan, with Kyle Layman, an East Coast operative with experience running campaigns in New Jersey, Virginia and North Carolina. The switch is part of what Layman maintains had always been the campaign's intention to move to the next level as part of a national effort by the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee to raise the profile of this race. The switch in campaign managers, Layman said, was a Ruiz team decision and not one engineered by the DCCC.

Layman said he made the commitment to manage this campaign because he believes Ruiz is the right candidate for this district at this time.

Although Bono Mack is a popular incumbent who has not previously faced a serious challenge, her 45th District has been redrawn to a district (the 36th) with a 47 percent Latino population. Also, Republican voter registration advantage in the new district is now only 1.6 percent, compared to a 6 percent advantage in the old 45th. These demographic changes help Ruiz, according to Layman,

More importantly, Layman said Ruiz is helped because he is running as a nonpolitician at a time when most voters hold politicians in low regard, as evidenced by polls showing voter approval for Congress running at historic lows.

"This is a time when not being a politician is a strength," Layman said. "He's an outsider with a

unique perspective as an mographic and registration emergency doctor. He's a professional who is used to diagnosing a problem and moving to solve it. Also, this candidate is thoroughly community-focused. He has the capacity to engage new people in the process."

Valley to farmworker parents, Ruiz said he credited his parents with instillhard work, a solid education and community service are the keys to building a better life. After graduating from Harvard Medical School, Ruiz returned to the Coachella Valley and launched a Future Physician Leaders program to help local youth do what he had done — become doctors and return home to serve their own communities.

# Colliers organize 400-mile bike ride through southwest

Brendan and Mary Collier, inveterate cyclists and owners of Idyllwild Hub Cyclery, are planning and GPS mapping a 400-mile mountain to desert bicycle course for an end of April event. "It's a ride, not a race," Brendan stressed. "No prizes, no fees, just a group of friends getting together for a ride." Both Mary and Brendan will ride.

The Stagecoach 400, as it is called, is another in what are dubbed the Southern California Enduro Series of self-supported rides, with the San Jacinto Enduro already going into its fourth year. Both Brendan and Mary have ridden parts of the 400-mile course in order to complete GPS mapping that will enable participants

to stay on course.

are provided, but it's up to each rider to understand and take responsibility for the ride they are undertaking, Collier emphasized. The Enduro Series is intended for experienced backcountry cyclists, who must also determine what supplies to carry on a course that often winds though very remote areas.

Mary Collier is the first woman to complete the Tour Divide ride, a 2700mile course along the spine of the Rockies from Banff, Alberta, Canada to the Mexico border. For her, and for many of those already listed as starters for the Stagecoach 400, this should be less arduous than some of the events in which she and other of these accomplished riders have participated. Over

50 riders, from California, Start times and routes Alaska, Kansas, Georgia, Arizona, Missouri and Vancouver, Canada have already indicated an intention to take part.

> "I anticipate it would take four or five days to complete the course," said Brendan who in addition to mapping the course for GPS coordinates, sets the start time and provides a web-site interface for satellite tracking so that riders' friends and families can follow them. Jill Homer, who also completed the Tour Divide ride in 2010, has signed on to participate.

Rules include: riding your own bike, self-supported, under only your own power along the entire route; no prearranged support or assistance of any kind; don't break any law; See Ride, next page


#### College League (Kindergarten through third-grade)







and dusted the machines for fingerprints.

At the Idyllwild Trailer Park, perpetrators rifled through five vehicles, but from only one did they steal items significantly valuable to categorize the crime as felony burglary of a vehicle. Investigations in both incidents are ongoing.

These most recent incidents reinforce the feeling that burglaries are becoming ever more common and unwanted local events.

Based on incident reports from the Riverside County Sheriff's Department Hemet Station, in the five months since October 2011, there have been 25 incidents including felony burglary, attempted burglary, vehicle burglary, vehicle theft, grand theft and vandalism with damage over \$400. Thirteen just in Jan. and Feb. 2012.

By comparison, from Jan. 1 to Oct. 1, 2011 there were 12 incidents in 9 months. For the entire year, there were only 23 property crimes.

From 2009 to late 2011, the pattern shows incremental growth in property crime, but not the concentrated upswing that has occurred since Oct. 2011. In 2009, there were 11 incidents; in 2010, 17; and as indicated, 23 in 2011.

In the way of further comparison, in 2009 more crimes to property occurred in warm months, April through September. In 2010, the pattern shifted to include a fairly even distribution through all months with the highest number occurring in December 2010. In 2011, the months from Jan. through May had only 5 incidents, while in June there was steps are necessary to set

In response to this recent criminal activity, 3rd District Supervisor Jeff Stone, said he would convene a "Public Safety Summit" in Idyllwild to discuss this growth in criminal activity with residents and what possible solutions might be available. Although a date has not yet been set, Stone agreed there is a sense of urgency surrounding the meeting, given the recent rash of crimes. Stone said he would ask County Sheriff Stan Sniff and someone from the District Attorney's office to attend as well as a Sheriff's Department representative who could speak to residents about what munity-wide watches.

The sheriff's department reminds residents to lock house and car doors and report suspicious activity in their neighborhoods. For crimes in progress call 911. For non-emergency (not in progress and no perceived risk to life), call the Sheriff's Department Dispatch number (951) 776-1099. As previously reported, Hemet Station commanders note that one can request a deputy show up in person to take the report and conduct a preliminary investigation.


