# Stone will extend and subsidize local ambulance contract

The ambulance contract between Riverside County and the Idyllwild Fire Protection District will be extended, according to Jeff Stone, 3rd District Supervisor.

"Pine Cove bought a 12-minute response time from Idyllwild. The county service is 29-59 [not more than 29 minutes and 59 seconds]. That's extremely unacceptable," Stone, a pharmacist, said explaining his reasoning.

Just two days earlier, the County Service Area 38 Advisory committee recom-

mended that the contract be terminated and IFPD's ambulance service be replaced with American Medical Response, the countywide ambulance server.

Stone credited Bruce Barton, director of the Riverside County Emergency Medical Services Agency, with the idea to subsidize the IFPD service until the county knows the results of the larger countywide ambulance service contract offering in two or three

The county will provide \$47,000, in addition to the current CSA 38 payment of about \$95,000 and \$3,000

# RMRU assists rescue of injured Girl Scout





# Outside Idyllwild

#### No Devil's Slide Trail on Sunday ...

Last Sunday we had made plans to hike the Devil's Slide Trail and shoot some pictures of the scarlet monkeyflowers at the third spring. Our friend Rob Bowman decided to tag along for the hike to Saddle Junction and then on to Skunk Cabbage Meadow.



Early on Sunday morning Rob stopped by the U.S. Forest Service office and all the Devil's Slide Trail permits in the kiosk outside the front door were gone. We decided to meet at the office at 8 a.m. when they opened and get our hiking permit. Unfortunately so did about 30 other would-be hikers. When we arrived at the Forest Service office, there was parking and the porch was stacked with people.

Even if we did manage to get a permit, I knew I would not enjoy the crowds on the way up the trail so we decided to head home and walk over to the Perimeter Trail at the County Park. I was interested to see what wildflowers would be left this late in June and Sue wanted to see Tilly the tortoise at the Nature Center again.

We proceeded down

County Park Road and the first thing we saw was a large stand of wild roses right along the road. I decided I would not be taking out my camera right away and I would get some pictures of the roses on the way back.

The Perimeter Trail is on the right just before the park entrance and Sue was headed up the trail at a fast pace wearing her new hiking shoes and feeling her Cheerios. The day was very mild and the bugs, mostly the deer flies, seem to have subsided considerably in the last couple of days so it was a perfect day for hiking.

After a stop at the Nature Center, where we watched a video about the San Jacintos, we headed out to the Hillside

I got serious about finding wildflowers to photograph. We saw golden yarrow, yarrow, Indian paintbrush, milkweed, columbine and some yellow monkeyflowers growing by the mostly dried up Lily Creek.

It wasn't until we got to the south end of the park that I found a new species to photograph. This purple daisy-like flower with a yellow center turned out to be fleabane, a member of the sunflower family, Asteraceae.

Coming back toward home the Perimeter Trail runs along a tributary of Strawberry Creek. I always love hiking through this section because it is lush, green, shady and filled with birds.

The creek was dry but the ground was moist and the creek bed was filled with wild roses and columbine. The

# Lola's kitchen

#### Let's do brunch ...

The only problem with dining on a lovely brunch, it starts at about 10 a.m. or so. By then most people are famished.

My favorite brunch is Eggs Benedict of course. I first prepared this full brunch while I lived in Arizona.

A variation on traditional Eggs Benedict 4 servings

Slice four full-size crescent rolls, horizontally, just use the top. Save bottom for another use.

Grill four beef fillets. Rather than round fillets, try to find eliptical. Briefly toast the crescent slices on grill.

Poach 4 or 8 eggs, depending on how many eggs guests would prefer. Prepare your favorite Hollandaise Sauce.

Place toasted crescent slices on plates, sliced side up. Top with grilled fillet steak, then poached egg or eggs. Drizzle with Hollandaise Sauce, top with snipped chives and sliced olives.

A good side dish is about five asparagus spears wrapped with bacon and grilled until bacon looks done and fork goes into asparagus easily.

Serve with watermelon slices or strawberries and blueberries.

replied. I had never seen this plant before and it turned out to be grand Collomia (Collomia grandiflora), a phlox family member that grows above 4,000 feet. This summer bloomer has a very pretty star-shaped flower with anthers tipped with blue pollen.

For beverages, serve coffee or tea, mimosas in fluted, chilled glasses, orange juice and lemon water with lots of ice. Heck, if anyone wants a Bloody Mary, go for it. An excellent side dish came from Williams-Sonoma's

Home fries with red & green bell peppers

4 servings.

5 red potatoes, 1-1/4 pound total weight, scrubbed and patted dry

2 tablespoons unsalted butter

2 tablespoons canola oil

"Breakfast" cookbook.

1 small red bell pepper, seeded & cut into 3/4 inch squares

1 small green bell pepper, seeded and cut into 3/4 inch squares

1 yellow onion, cut into 3/4 inch cubes

1/2 teaspoon best-quality chile powder

1/2 teaspoon paprika

fine sea salt

Pour water to a depth of 1 inch into a large pot and bring to a boil. Put the whole potatoes into collapsible steamer basket and set over boiling water. (The boiling water should not touch the potatoes.) Cover and steam for 15 to 20 minutes, depending on their size, or until potatoes are tender when pierced with a small knife. Transfer to bowl. When cool enough to handle, cut into 1-inch cubes.

In a large cast-iron frying pan over medium-high heat, melt the butter with the oil. When the butter has foamed and the foam begins to subside, add the red and green bell peppers and onion, cook stirring occasionally, until the vegetables are glossy, about five minutes.

Add potatoes and cook, without disturbing them, until they begin to brown, about five minutes. With a metal spatula, turn the potatoes over in several large portions, (don't mix too much) and cook, turning, (not stirring) only twice during the cooking time, to achieve the optimum crust and browning, about 15 minutes longer. Sprinkle with chile powder and paprika, and 1/2 teaspoon salt, cook one minute longer. Stir together to blend the spices, then taste and adjust the spices. Serve at once.

In the summer a brunch outdoors on your patio is fun if you can get rid of the flies and mosquitoes. For outdoors, use a lace or floral tablecloth, matching napkins, and a big vase of spring flowers. Enjoy



# Obituary Diane Olsen

My mother's connection to Idyllwild started long before she was born. Her Grandma T used to drive an old Packard automobile up the dirt road from Hemet to Idyllwild to enjoy the sparkling air. (On one of the trips the radiator hose burst, and Grandma T tied it back together with a ribbon off the picnic basket. Grandma T was fierce.)



Grandma T and her daughter Roberta spent many summers in Idyllwild. When Roberta was 16, she was riding horseback across a meadow in Fern Valley. Right then a young pilot landed his plane in the meadow in search of a good lunch. He saw the attractive woman riding horseback so he removed the spark plugs from his plane and feigned that it wouldn't start again. It was 1931.

Two weeks later, he put the spark plugs back in and flew with Roberta to Arizona where a marriage could be arranged without a waiting period. The night before the wedding he asked how old she was. She said, "Sixteen." He said, "You're too young, I'm taking you back." She refused so he married her. They stayed happily married until their deaths half a century later.

My grandpa was a stunt pilot, and he'd let Roberta fly with him when he had an open seat. One time he was flying a Tiger Moth bi-plane with cloth wings in a stunt show and asked Roberta if she wanted to go up. She was eight months pregnant with my mother. She said, "Sure!"

The plane had an open cockpit and Roberta was too pregnant to fasten the seat belt. She yelled at him not to take off, but he couldn't hear her over the engine noise. He took off and immediately started flying upside down. My grandma fell out of the plane but was able to hold onto the ends of the seat belt. Eventually he righted the plane and she tumbled back into her seat.

He did the whole arsenal of stunt tricks; barrel-rolls and loop-the-loops. The people on the ground thought

this was fantastic. They had never seen an 8-month pregnant woman coming in and out of a plane like that in a stunt show.

Less than a month later, Diane Olsen was born in 1932. Mom loved to fly and loved freedom above all. And Idyllwild was in her blood and it stayed there for her entire life.

Mom graduated from Stanford University where she met my father, Charles Robert Olsen, and agreed to marry him as long as they would never have to live in New York or Los Angeles, both cities she hated. They moved to San Francisco, but two years into their marriage my father got a research job in New York City despite his promise. Then they moved back to San Francisco again where they lived in Haight-Ashbury during the '60s.

In the '70s my father got a job he couldn't refuse in Los Angeles. Diane said the only way she would move there was if she could buy a lot in Idyllwild. They purchased an A-frame kit to build a house. Mom escaped to Idyllwild almost every weekend and for entire summers when she could.

In 1973, my father died and my mother moved up to Idyllwild permanently. She got her master's degree in public health at Loma Linda University by commuting up and down the mountain. Then she worked at Jurupa and Riverside Schools, again commuting on a daily basis. Her son Erik met his wife Dorothy in Idyllwild and the family connection to Idyllwild continued.

When mom retired 14 years ago, she took up volunteering at the Idyllwild Nature Center and passionately lobbied for abandoned animals, children and equal rights.

On Easter this year mom took a bad fall and hit her



#### INITIAL THOUGHTS

#### Truth and dependency ...



Last week was tumultuous. On Wednesday, the County Service Area 38 Advisory Committee recommended that Supervisor Jeff Stone support the termination of the county's ambulance service contract with Idyllwild Fire Protection District.

On Friday, Stone, in Idyllwild for his monthly constituent meetings, said he couldn't do that. He feels less than 12-minute response time is critical in many emergency cases.

Consequently, he wants the county's Emergency Services Agency to find \$47,000 to augment the contract payments to IFPD.

As an Idyllwild resident, I'm grateful to the county for protecting and ensuring our ambulance support.

Interim Idyllwild Fire Chief Mike Sherman twice said that if there were no contract with the county and no CSA 38 payment, Idyllwild would no longer staff two ambulances.

Only one would be staffed. When it went on an incident, staff for the second would then be called in. Currently, thanks to the contract terms, Idyllwild must have two ambulances fully staffed all the time.

Keep in mind, Idyllwild says it is losing more than \$30,800 annually providing service to Pine Cove and \$56,000 serving Zone 3 (the area to the north). So without the county ambulance contract, the district saves that money.

When I asked an IFPD commission member why Idyllwild residents would suffer a decrease in service because the district was no longer providing service for which it loses money, I was told that was just a semantic difference.

Service would not change for Idyllwild residents, they said. No, two staffed ambulances are better and greater service than one staffed ambulance. It is not a word game. One does not equal two.

This is the reason IFPD officials say that an AMR ambulance in Pine Cove or elsewhere on the Hill will not be additive. The advisory committee's recommendation would not bring a third ambulance to serve the Hill's residents and visitors. Instead, there would be the AMR ambulance and an Idyllwild ambulance staffed and ready "24/7"; but the second IFPD unit would be dependent on staff responding to a call from the station.

Extending the contract benefits Idyllwild residents, so thank you, Supervisor Stone and CSA 38.

But the other and sadder issue related to these negotiations is the assertion that the advisory committee had multiple options to consider.

On June 13, Riverside County EMS Director Bruce Barton attended the regular CSA 38 meeting and outlined three options to the public and advisory committee. These were reported last week.

A week later, the committee recommended the second of the three. But, it appears from conversation with the Supervisor, only extending the contract met his criteria of protecting the response time.

It would have been better to tell the committee the blunt and difficult truth. They would have objected and been angry, but they would have known their limitations.

Last week, the Gallup organization released another survey detailing the declining trust Americans have for our institutions.

Whether it's elections, sports or romance, Americans learn and understand that "you win some and lose some." So they will try hard to win, but if their effort cannot affect the result, they learn to invest less in the process.

Less time, less research and less involvement lead to poorer decisions and less faith in decision makers.

I don't know the best solution for the Hill. I believe all the players were striving to achieve it in their opinion. But I know we're all interconnected and need each



# SITTING BY THE FIRE

BY MICHAEL B. SHERMAN, INTERIM FIRE CHIEF

#### Change happens and will ...

In April, I wrote about being prepared for the large fires and potential evacuations. I said at the end of that article I would have more later on survival "in place" for major disasters. Also, last month I talked about changes at IFPD, such as the recruitment of a new fire chief. I will touch on both subjects in this column.



It used to be the norm to have everyone prepared to live without help for 72 hours during a major disaster. Most professionals now have increased that time to 120 hours (5 days), especially in the mountains.

Mountain residents can easily be isolated for long periods of time. I believe mountain residents should be prepared to take care of themselves for up to two weeks.

Why would that be? First, emergency services (law enforcement, fire and emergency medical) are thin at best in mountainous, rural areas. Just regularly expected fires, EMS calls, and crimes stress local services.

Second, major population centers will be the highest priority for outside resources in most major disasters. It is real simple, the greater the number of people threatened, the greater the need for response (therefore, higher prior-

Finally, there are far less agency representatives available on the mountain at any one time than there are in higher population centers. The representatives that are on the mountain will be up to their ears in "doing" emergency response, therefore, diminishing their potential for getting in the right queues for outside help. One great thing is that state, county, and local disaster resource coordination in Riverside County is as good as any in the nation.

So how should you prepare? First, make sure ample water, food, heat, light, dry clothing, medicines, sanitary

facilities, and first aid supplies are available to you without outside help to last at least two weeks for everyone you must care for (including pets) and a little left over to possibly help close neighbors.

Second, make sure everyone in your group knows the plan on how those resources will be used, especially if one or more members are gone or injured. Third, have a list of individuals or agencies you can contact once you have the ability to communicate out from your location or travel for help. These lists need all the standard emergency numbers and addresses, but you also need friends, neighbors, and family members information.

Local fire departments, the Sheriff's office, the County OES, Cal EMA, the Red Cross, and FEMA all have great resource documents for preparing for emergencies.

Finally, get involved in local preparedness groups. The mountain has at least three great locally coordinated groups that can help with information and training from nuts to bolts" concerning local emergencies. They are the Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council, Mountain Disaster Preparedness, and the Mountain Community Emergency Response Team. They will help you and your family members prepare for many different threats, but you can also help your community as a whole to be better prepared.

Now, about the new fire chief, the board of commissioners directed me to advertise for the recruitment of a new fire chief. That was done from late May to June 10. The board then interviewed the top four candidates Saturday, June 23. Background checks and potential contract negotiations have begun. If successful, the board hopes to announce their new fire chief within the next few weeks.

I have agreed to stick around long enough to create smooth transition of leadership through the first few weeks after the new chief arrives. Then my family and I will be moving on to our next challenge.

Until next time, its time to put out the dog and douse the fire.

Six weekends in a row the dormitories in Meadow Camp, where children were staying, were broken into while the kids were in sessions in other areas of the camp. On several occasions

after our guests have retired for the night, meeting halls have been broken into and media and computer equipment stolen. For several nights early in the winter, someone broke into unoccupied dormitories and stayed the night leaving cigarette butts, beer cans and birth control devices behind.

only left flyers with neighbors who were home so that as not to reveal residents were away," said Kay. At the Thursday meet-

ing, Brause explained that Neighborhood Watch groups are effective crime deterrents because residents are most likely to recognize suspicious activity and people in their neighborhoods. He explained that neighbors who are connected by phone trees and emails can best observe suspicious activities, verify with their neighbors whether vehicles or individuals in the area are legitimate or not, and report, if appropriate, to the Sheriff's Department. He emphasized that "watch" is the key element in Neighborhood Watch.

'Observe and share information," said Brause. "Without an immediate physical threat, your job is to back off and observe. But always let the Sheriff's Department know if you see something [that appears criminal in nature] in progress. Let them know it's in progress and that a deputy is required as quickly as possible."

Brause said Neighborhood Watch effectiveness boils down to common sense. "It's your preservation of your neighborhood. Use teamwork. Record license numbers and descriptions of suspicious vehicles

# Idyllwild Water approves rate increase

By J.P. Crumrine

The Idyllwild Water District directors approved a \$1.9 million budget (water and sewer programs), which includes a six percent water rate increase.

Even with the rate increase, the district will use nearly \$115,000 of its reserves to balance the budget. Without the rate increase, the overall loss would have approached \$190,000. The water and sewer revenues do not equal the district's operating expenses. Through April of this year, the district's operating losses (water and sewer) total about \$245,000. With the addition of the nonoperating revenue, principally the property taxes, the district's revenues exceed costs by about \$85,000.

In 2012-13, expanded capital improvement programs exacerbated the total loss. The rate increase does not eliminate it.

The district passed an annual six percent rate increase in June 2010 through 2014. Last year, the board did not implement the

General Manager Terry Lyons stressed the district has been reducing costs throughout the past year. More than \$12,000 has been saved through changes to retiree's medical costs. No cost of living increases have been approved and the lowre-evaluated this summer.

for 2012-13 will decrease \$40,000, although benefits remain about level. Capital expenditures will total about \$580,000, a \$275,000 increase above the 2011-12

Nearly half of capital spending is targeted for a replacement of the Golden Rod storage tank. The capacity of the new tank, when finished, will be 200,000 gallons, doubling the current storage capacity.

If the state approves the recycled water facility construction funding, Idyllwild may begin construction of the \$750,000 facility during this fiscal year.

# Forest Service adds tankers, helicopters and C-130s

The Forest Service has been adding to its air resources during the past three weeks.

First, the agency announced the award of four contracts to separate companies for seven next generation air tankers. The second step was the addition of adding four heavy helicopters to the aviation firefighting fleet.



# Amy Finley discusses food, celebrity and justice

Amy Finley, author of "How to Eat a Small Country: A Family's Pursuit of Happiness One Meal at a Time" will talk about her family's six-month moveable feast odyssev through the French countryside as the next author in Eduardo Santiago's Idyllwild Authors Series. 



# Lemon Lily Festival art banners decorate town

from the county for coverage of the Zone 3 corridor, to extend the contract.

In its negotiations with the county, Idyllwild Fire said it was losing nearly \$90,000 annually in providing service to Pine Cove and Zone 3. The district wanted the \$90,000 or a minimum of \$67,000 if the county offered a multi-year contract.

Further, Stone assured the Pine Cove community that ambulance service would be available after June 30.

"If it all falls apart, there'll be a county ambulance here, but the current contract specifies a 365-

day termination. Riverside County will supplement the contract with Idyllwild Fire," Stone stated. "Nothing is stopping June 30."

Stone said the county would recommend the multi-year contract, but it would coincide with the countywide contract with American Medical Service. The board of supervisors voted last week to extend this contract three years, but it must re-compete the contract within two years.

Despite continuing ambulance coverage at no members of the CSA 38 Committee were disappointed.

of a lot of people in Pine Cove for our recommendation," said Committee Chair Jerry Holldber. "All of a sudden, it was switched. It doesn't matter what we think. Nobody knows why or will explain what happened. It's not over yet."

Stone's decision followed the committee's unanimous (5-0) recommendation to terminate the existing ambulance service with IFPD and ask the county Emergency Service Agency to replace this service with AMR.

The committee met apparent additional cost, Wednesday, June 20, at Station 23 with about 30 people in attendance. After nearly an hour of discus-"We were headed down sion about the pros and cons, committee member Lou Padula made the motion and Thom Wallace seconded it. After answering some additional questions,

the committee voted to make a change to ambulance service on the Hill.

At the meeting, interim Idyllwild Fire Chief Mike Sherman said without the money from Pine Cove, he would have to limit Idyllwild's staffing to one ambulance. When the ambulance is on a call, he would request reserves, paid call firefighters and career staff who may not be on shift to return to the station to staff the second ambulance.

Fire Commissioner Dr. Charles "Chip" Schelly, who said he was not there in an official capacity, expressed regret that Pine Cove residents had not been invited to be more involved in the ambulance decisions.

He would have had Pine Cove representatives on the board and voting.

CSA 38 Chair Jerry Holldber wondered why the offer was made tonight rather than several months ago.

Most attendees supported the committee's action, but several were concerned about the adequacy of response time and the lack of a specific plan.

"It seems to me with this option, we have no idea how it'll work," said Jim Quenzla, Pine Cove resident. "What if we don't like their plan? Then what would we do?"








# Emergency MDP site launched

Following the Jan. 10, 2010, devastating earth-quake in Haiti, Francoise Frigola spent three days attempting to find information about the well-being of a friend's relatives. This search led Frigola to realize that she had the technical expertise to establish an emergency Internet plan for Idyllwild.

Readers may or may not know that in case of an emergency all land lines and cell phones (assuming they are still working) will be shut off and assigned to rescue operations. So, how will friends and family members make sure that we are OK, and that the Hill is safe?

Ron Perry and Les Walker, Disaster Aid Station captains, and Frigola set up a website: www.idyllwildemergency.com and three separate Facebook pages: Idyllwild Emergency, MDP-Idyllwild, and MCFSC.org.

Even without phone lines and Internet connections, the MDP Idyllwild Internet Emergency committee, made up of Mary Morse, Susan Weisbart and Frigola, has taken on the responsibility of updating the website and Facebook pages during an emergency. This committee is under the auspices of MDP Communications Director Dorian Paul.

Thanks to a generous grant from Riverside 3rd District Supervisor Jeff Stone's office and the County of Riverside, MDP will soon have a portable satellite with phone and Internet options in order to

operate during any emergency. Plans are underway to devise a mutual cooperation program for sharing, that could include MDP sister agencies such as the newly formed Garner Valley Preparedness group, Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council and others.


In the event of any emergency it may take a few hours to gather vital information to publish on these sites.

In the event of a fire on the Hill, or the surrounding area, which has the potential to cut off access to or from the Hill, the committee will keep communications current until we are ordered to evacuate.

In case of an earthquake, emergency information will be gathered from the nine Disaster Aid Stations located on the Hill. (Neighborhood DAS locations can be found at www.mdp-idyllwild.com/das.html.)

Those who are on the Hill at the time of an emergency need to check in at their neighborhood DAS. With permission, information collected by DAS volunteers will be used to update the website as often as necessary and practical.

Now what? Residents will want to make note (bookmark) the website and make sure that your friends and relatives do so as well. Residents will also want to "like" the Facebook pages so that they will receive automatic updates to these sites, thus being kept in the loop! Mountain Disaster Preparedness Idyllwild Internet Emergency committee will coordinate with sister agencies.



The Mile High Radio Club now has access to a large mobile command center. The trailer is equipped with ham radios, large screen monitors for satellite Internet access and is totally off the grid. In case of an emergency, this unit can be called in and set up as a communications command center when no other communication is available on the mountain.





# Idyllwild Arts revises master plan

The Idyllwild Arts Academy is in the midst of revising its current campus master plan. Riverside County Planning Department has scheduled a hearing on the proposed changes for 1:30 p.m., July 9 at the Desert Permit Assistance Center in Palm Desert.

"The primary reason for the current revision is the relocation of the proposed Performing Arts Complex and Health Center," said Jon Millhouse, IAA marketing manager, in an email. "Both projects were previously entitled [approved], however the sites have been relocated. The latest revision proposes 17 new structures; however, there are 16 proposed (already approved) structures that are being deleted from the plan."

The new facility would be a fourth summer cabin, according to Laura Sherman, IAA's project man-

"[It will be located] in the children's area. And each [cabin] is a 900-square-foot dorm unit," she wrote in a separate email. "Three of these cabins were already approved and a fourth is included in this plot plan revision."

Although the notice implies significant new parking is being proposed, Sherman explained that all but five new spaces for the health center had been included and approved in prior revisions.

Although the plan describes major changes to the campus in the future, Millhouse stressed that all new construction is dependent upon securing funding. The school does not have a capital program.

"The majority of the proposed improvements, many of which were established on the 1996 plan, have no proposed building schedule," he said.

During the next few years, the only construction explicitly scheduled is for the health center and some faculty housing, according to Millhouse.

The planning hearing will be at the Desert Permit Assistance Center, 38-686 El Cerrito Road, Palm Des-

# County vote totals certified

#### By J.P. Crumrine **EDITOR**

On Friday, June 22, the Riverside County Registrar of Voters certified the totals from the June 5 primary election. The certification deadline is Wednesday, June

Once again, Hill voter turnout for the June 5 primary exceeded both the statewide and countywide voter participation. The Pine Cove turnout, poll voters and vote-by-mail ballots, was 44.5 percent and Idyllwild's turnout was slightly lower at 42.3 percent.

The county turnout was 28 percent and statewide voting totaled 32.8 percent out of more than 5.4 million ballots cast, which is 10 percent less than projections. As of Monday, June 25, only 100,000 ballots remained to be counted.

Hill voting patterns tended to reflect the overall results for most races. A few differences were notice-

In the Third District supervisor's race, more than 75 percent of Idyllwild and

Pine Cove voters supported incumbent Jeff Stone. In the rest of the district, he garnered 66 percent of the

In the Assembly District 71 race, which is 10 percent Riverside County and 90 percent San Diego County voters, incumbent Republican Brian Jones was re-nominated to oppose Democratic newcomer, Patrick Hurley. But John McLaughlin was the leading voter getter in this

On the Hill, McLaughlin and Jones split votes and Hurley received the most votes, nearly half in Assembly District 71 Idyllwild.

The Proposition 29 cigarette tax vote varied among Hill communities. Anza, especially, as well as Garner Valley opposed the levy much more than countywide or statewide voters.

The Idyllwild and Pine Cove votes were much closer, similar to the overall statewide vote, which "No" is winning by only 28,000 votes out of more than 5.5 million cast.

And, we've had our administrative offices broken into this year.

Beer cans, almost naked, disoriented men sitting on picnic tables, go-cart riders, people with multiple dogs on and off leashes, are but a few of the struggles we've been faced with.

I attended a discussion with local officials and the Sheriff's Department not long ago on a Saturday afternoon to learn that crime has increased substantially on the Hill. Idyllwild Pines has been hit hard by theft and vandal-

ism. We have free-standing games and activities on the camp that get vandalized as well as signs and lighting that are regularly destroyed. Just the standards established last month one of our golf carts was stolen — last seen driving down the mountain early in the morning. Seriously, it was being driven down the Hill.

the camp are courteous, many, however, are not. Some who walk through the camp are good, solid residents of Idyllwild; but many are here temporarily, shopping, hiking and biking, enjoying the Hill for a day or a weekend. county and local codes and ordinances in every area of our operation. We are also rigorously monitored by with the American Camp Association and the Christian Camp and Conference Association. All in an effort to protect the millions Some who move through of kids who go to camp across America each year. Here at Idyllwild Pines we host more than 9,000 campers — children, teens and young adults — each year. It is our responsibility to protect them from harm to the extent possible.

Yes, unfortunately we are required to enforce the actuality that we are a private camp located on private property and eliminate access to the camp by the general public, which will reduce the risk of harm to our young guests. First and foremost we do this because we are committed to the protection of our children; and secondarily, to remain an accredited organization within the camping industry.

Idyllwild Pines has been, and remains, a vital part of this community. For more than 89 years we have been on this site, our contribution and involvement in the community of Idyllwild has likely ebbed and flowed. These days, it is our goal - as stated in our Operational Plan and budgeted for in our annual budget — to be fully integrated into this beautiful mountain resort town by continuing to host the Firefighters' annual spaghetti dinner, the skate park, and the dog park (within the last two months when asked, we

took over the trash responsibilities at the dog park at no charge because the town had no one else).

We provided meals durthrough our accreditation ing the building of the community park, welcomed craftsmen and artists onto the property offering a place for them to create their projects. We provide space in several areas of the camp to house and store critical disaster preparedness materials and supplies and remain prepared to feed many in the event of a disaster. We intentionally keep our business contracts and purchases here "on the Hill" supporting local businesses in every way we possibly can. Idyllwild Pines Camp and Conference Center is always looking for ways to be better partners with the community, and to contribute more and more to Idyllwild. While we can't be involved in everything, we will consider any suggestions members of the community may have.

> Hopefully, after reading this letter, you will sense our hearts and our desire not to exclude the community, but rather to protect the next generation; growing them, nurturing them and sheltering them from harm. Our motivation is pure, and we ask for unity and understanding from our community as we endeavor to fulfill our purpose, while presenting a safe environment for children to experience camp, nature, and this creation fashioned for them by their creator.
