The challenges of year two

Lytle ready for 19th jazz fest

Marsha Lytle, chair of the 19th Annual Idyllwild Jazz in the Pines, is tired but excited about the 2012 edition of the local jazz festival.

For example, she is looking forward to Mary Stalling's performance on Saturday, Aug. 25, in the Barn. "I haven't seen her in about 35 years. The last time was in San Francisco at a local club," Lytle said. "I'll spend time in the Barn because that's the kind of jazz I like. It reminds me of smoky night clubs with jazz combos," she added, revealing her extensive jazz background and longtime affection for this genre.

She's also looking for-

ward to seeing the kid (Ray Goren) again. "He has his own group now," Lytle said. "I'm anxious to see how he's evolving with the music."

And all of the returning alumni attract Lytle's attention. Since the festival is for scholarships, she said,

"It's rewarding to see what they're doing."

Despite the festival's expanding reputation among artists, Lytle is worried about ticket sales for this year. Thus far, they are lagging the successes of 2011, when the Associates were able to give Idyllwild Arts an astounding \$80,000 for scholarships just from Jazz in the Pines revenue.

Nearing the finish of her second year as festival chair and looking forward to the performances, Lytle showed some of the burden involved in producing the event. The volunteer part-time position in the fall quickly evolves into full-time work. It begins with a critique of the previous festival and identifies ways to improve it

Fire district reviews budget, approves employee contract

The Idyllwild Fire Commission discussed its budget for fiscal year 2012-13, which began July 1, and approved a new contract with the Idyllwild Career Fire Association.

The commission plans a public hearing and approval of the proposed budget at its Aug. 28 meeting.

The total budget equals about \$1,663,700 and balances revenue and expenditures. The largest revenue increase, about \$45,000, is from the new ambulance contract with the county. IFPD is projecting only a \$7,000 increase from property tax receipts from all sources.

Salary expenses are

estimated to be \$11,000 below the current year and CalPERS payments will decline nearly \$30,000 for a total reduction of about \$40,000 for all payroll.

Offsetting these cuts were increases for items such as \$25,000 for mobile data computers, another \$20,000 for possible contingencies and a 20 percent increase in utilities.

Chief Patrick Reitz said the district has had no response from Riverside County regarding its August request for a \$425,000 advance, until December, of its property tax revenue.

After a closed session, the commission approved its new contract with ICFA. The contract continues the seven percent cut to base

Thieves steal copper from KATY antenna

Thieves stole more than 400 pounds of copper fixtures from KATY's (Temecula 101.3) antenna at Inspiration Point in Idyllwild. The thieves visited the site on multiple occasions to scout and then steal the valuable copper antenna fixtures. They also damaged other station equipment. The antenna site has a working video surveillance system and Hemet Station investigators are examining tapes to determine if there are leads that can

be followed.

Bill McNulty, KATY general manager, is assisting law enforcement with evidence that could lead to identification of the thieves.

The stolen antenna pieces (see photo) are valued at more than \$20,000. Each piece weighs around 100 pounds, according to McNulty. They were stored inside the fenced area at the KATY transmitter site. McNulty discovered the theft on a routine inspection of the site on Aug. 8, when he noticed a portion of the fence surrounding the

Sheriff's raid nets two arrests

On Monday, Aug. 20, Riverside County Sheriff's Deputies conducted a second search of a home in the 26800 block of Highway 243, near Idyllwild School that led to the arrest of two men. Law enforcement had previously searched the same home in an earlier operation on March 28.

Deputies arrived in five unmarked and a marked patrol car around noon on Monday. Information obtained during interrogation of individuals at the house led to the subsequent arrest of Idyllwild locals Harry Dennis, 26, and Daniel Plott, 43, at Strawberry Plaza in front of Gary's Deli.

Dennis was arrested on suspicion of possession of stolen property including firearms and a large container

of collectable stamps that are identifiable. Investigators are in the process of trying to locate rightful owners of the recovered property. Plott was arrested on suspicion of being in possession of a controlled substance and violating the terms of his probation.

Both Dennis and Plott were transported to the Larry Smith Correctional Facility in Banning. Bail for Plott was set at \$25,000 and for Dennis at 5,000. Both had court dates on Wednesday, Aug. 22, at Southwest Justice Center.

Buck Fire burns 2,700 acres



Last week, the Buck Fire in Aguanga burned 2,681 acres. Fire crews contained it Friday morning, Aug. 17, and fully controlled it on Monday morning, Aug. 20.

Lightning ignited the fire Tuesday afternoon, Aug. 14, after which it grew quickly throughout the night.

On Wednesday, CAL FIRE officials brought in Incident Command Team 6 to manage the containment and control of the fire. They established a command post at Diamond Valley Lake. Battalion Chief Ray Chaney of CAL FIRE, Ramona Air Attack Base, was the team's Commander and assumed control

of the firefighting teams, which exceeded more than 1,000 people at the incident's height.

OUTSIDE IDYLLWILD

Butterflies, thunderstorms and sunsets ...

The butterfly season is almost done for the year. It was a good season for wildflowers and that made it a good year for butterflies and bees.

In the past week I have seen the painted lady, western tiger swallowtail, mylitta crescent, marine blue, an all white and a Lorquin's admiral butterflies.

It would seem to be a hard world out there right now for butterflies. There are less and less flowers to feed on and their life spans are short. The few butterflies left seem to be flying around aimlessly but of course all butterflies fly around this way.

In order to get any photographs of butterflies this time of year, it is best to go into gardens where lots of flowers remain on which the butterflies can feed. When I do see flowers around, I always have a smart phone camera in my shirt pocket. If a butterfly does show up I am ready.

Next year I will be planting butterfly bushes in my front yard and will also have a small mud hole for the butterflies. They use mud as a source for minerals in their diet.

If I owned my own home I would put in a garden designed to attract both birds and butterflies with a birdbath, feeders and of course flowers.

Currently, the place with the most flowers is the nursery on the highway. After learning that they had butterfly bushes, I went over with my cell phone in my pocket. I will probably wait until next spring to buy and plant them but I really like the way they look.

At any rate, I found several painted lady butterflies and numerous species of bees and bumblebees to photograph. The painted lady (*Vanessa cardui*) is common in Idyllwild. But a guide book will be necessary to distinguish it from several similar species, such as the American lady and the western lady, both in the genus *Vanessa* as well.

At the county park, I ran into Lorquin's admiral (*Limenitis lorquini*) sitting on an incense cedar branch. It seems that some butterflies feed on the sap of trees and that is probably was the reason it was sitting still. This was the one and only time this year that I have seen this particular species.

A friend has several large purple flowered sage plants in his yard. Here I spotted a mostly orange with small dark spots butterfly. This one was harder to identify since there was no exact match in my guide. But I believe it was the


The chicken became my sister's and my next pet and we named her Pearl. She would jump on our lap to be petted. Maybe she thought that she was a dog.

I keep hoping to see one of the released monarchs from the Butterfly Daze festival but I am very concerned how many survived the heavy hail and rains of our biggest thunder storm of the year. The release time of 4:30 pm was also the time that the thunder storm hit and it lasted for quite a time. Long enough for my street to turn into a river. Well maybe next year I will see a monarch butterfly in the "wild."

So this concludes the coverage on butterflies for this season. The great thing about studying flora and fauna is that there is always more to learn.

LOLA'S KITCHEN

I have to hand it to my mom, she was resourceful. Now for the recipes. As an adult I love duck [to eat]. The following recipes are great together and delicious. Serve with a good burgundy or syrah. Make your favorite salad and you are set.

Duck with port-cherry sauce

Makes four servings

- 1 cup soy sauce
- 1 cup sherry
- 4-6 ounce duck breast halves
- 12 frozen dark sweet cherries, thawed and halved
- 1 cup canned low-salt chicken broth
- 1 cup canned beef broth
- 1/2 cup ruby port
- 1 sprig fresh thyme
- 1 tsp. cornstarch dissolved in 2 tsp. water
- 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter, cut into 1/2 half-inch pieces

Whisk soy sauce and sherry in medium bowl to blend. Using sharp knife, make diagonal cuts at 1/2 inch intervals in duck skin (not through meat). Place the duck, skin side up, in a glass baking dish. Pour the soy sherry marinade mixture over the duck breasts. Cover duck with plastic wrap and place in the refrigerator for two hours to six hours.

Bring cherries, chicken stock, beef stock, port and thyme sprig to boil in heavy sauce pan over high heat. Simmer, about 15 minutes, until mixture is reduced to 1/2 cup, and discard thyme sprig.

Meanwhile, heat a heavy large skillet over medium heat. Remove the duck from marinade and place the duck breasts, skin side down, in skillet. Cook until skin is crispy, about ten minutes. Turn duck over and continue cooking to desired doneness, about five minutes for medium. Transfer duck to work surface.

Add cornstarch mixture to port-cherry sauce. Bring to simmer, whisking constantly. Add butter one piece at a time, whisking until butter is melted before adding next piece. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

The Board of Governors of the Idyllwild Arts Foundation announced an interim leadership plan until a new president is selected. The governors will continue to use two senior administrators to manage the campus and programs.

Steve Fraider becomes the interim executive director of the Idyllwild Arts Foundation and oversees fundraising, marketing, and the Krone Museum. In addition to these duties, Fraider will continue to lead the summer program. Fraider has been with the school more than 25 years.

Dr. Doug Ashcraft will be responsible for the daily operations of Idyllwild Arts

Academy in his expanded role as interim head of school. He remains dean of the arts for the Academy.

The governors designated Fraider and Ashcraft as co-equal partners with distinct responsibilities and both report to a President's Council comprised of members of the Board of Governors.

Board Chair Faith Raiguel stated in a press release, "As we plan a search for our next president, I am so pleased that the programming and staffing at Idyllwild Arts are as robust as they have ever been. Doug and Steve have a spirit of collaboration that is born of long-term respect and association with the institution."

Three new candidates in school board race

Filing for a Hemet Unified School District trustee position in the November election closed Wednesday, Aug. 15. The original Aug. 10 deadline was extended five days because incumbent Charlotte Jones decided not to seek re-election. Jones was first elected a HUSD trustee in 1996. She will finish her fourth term in December.

After the new deadline closed, five candidates qualified for the November ballot.

Incumbents Marilyn Forst and Lisa DeForest are running for re-election. Forst served two terms from 1998 to 2006, when

she was defeated for re-election. She overcame this setback by winning her third four-year term in 2008.

DeForest was elected trustee in 2008 and was the leading vote getter during that election.

Three new candidates — John Graham, Boyd Lachlan Roberts and Jim Smith — also submitted candidacy papers and qualified for the ballot.

Smith is a former HUSD administrator. Graham, a former member of the Hemet Teachers Association, and Roberts say they are businessmen.

New Hemet High School facilities

Monday was the first day of school at Hemet School District. Idyllwild students attending Hemet High School entered an almost totally new environment.

In the past four years, the district has given its oldest high school a completely new look, including a state of the art theater complex.

The theater is only one of the new features that students encountered on their first day of school. A total of 41 new classrooms opened,

replacing the former mobile temporary classrooms. That's nearly half of the school's classrooms that will be new and state of the art, including science rooms for chemistry and physics.

The total cost of the additions was more than \$60

million and expanded the school nearly 20 percent.

According to Principal Dr. Emily Shaw, enrollment for this year already surpasses the district's projection.

RMRU rescues disoriented hiker

A hiker who started his hike at about 7 a.m. from the desert floor in 110-degree heat with only two liters of water, required the rescue at about the 3,500-foot level of the Skyline Trail according to Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit volunteer Ralph Hoetger. RMRU was called out at about 1:30 p.m. on Sunday, Aug. 19.

The single hiker identified in a sheriff's press release as Long Nguyen of Antelope, Calif., became disoriented and lost after leaving the trail and was stranded on an outcropping of rock.

A sheriff's aviation unit

spotted Nguyen around 2 p.m. but was unable to extract him because of his position. They relayed coordinates to RMRU volunteers who hiked up to the individual reaching him around 4 p.m. The team hiked him down to the Palm Springs Aerial Tramway desert station, completing the rescue at around 7:30 p.m. Nguyen was uninjured and required no medical treatment.

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department advises hikers to carry proper equipment, especially sufficient water for summer hikes on the mountain.

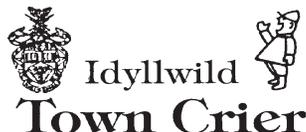

RAMBLINGS FROM ROSCOE

THE FIRE DOG, AS INTERPRETED BY PATRICK REITZ, IDYLLWILD FIRE CHIEF

The *Town Crier* welcomes another new columnist to the paper. Idyllwild Fire Chief Patrick Reitz is sharing some of the thoughts from Roscoe, the Fire Dog.



Kids and school, part 1 ...

First, I want to thank everyone for being so welcoming to my master and I. What a great community and dog-friendly too! The cats are not too happy about it, but hey, they are cats. Are they ever happy about anything?

We are very happy to meet all of you, so please introduce yourself. Remember to be patient with him, there is only one of him for you to meet and remember his name, and all of you for him to meet and remember your names.

My master, the Fire Chief, is honored to serve the community, alongside the good men and women that are your Idyllwild Fire Protection District. He looks forward to seeing what we all can do — together!

But enough about him. I have some ramblings to get to ...

It's back-to-school time. And time for some thoughtful reminders for this time of year.

Before they head off to school, are the kids current on their shots? While schools are not letting kids start the first day of elementary school without a current shot record, this is often overlooked as they get older, even if they are getting sports physicals.

What about their eyes and ears? Have they had baseline sight and hearing tests? Often falling grades and inattention can be indicators of seeing or hearing problems. Sometimes the child is too embarrassed to admit the problems or does not want to risk the ridicule children can dish out.

Do your children need to take medication during the school day? If so, it is important to know the school's policy for students taking medication. This applies to sting kits as well. Most require keeping it with the school nurse, office, or teacher. Be sure that the medication is current, not expired, and that there is enough of the medication for its application. It is also important for the person controlling the medication to understand what it is for, what it does, and if the child understands (if possible) the same to avoid problems in the future. Do you know what your child is taking and why?

And now for my soapbox — medication and over-medication. There are some very good studies out that indicate our children are over-medicated. The studies further indicate that diagnoses of Attention-Deficit Disorder (ADD) & Attention-Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) are over-used. They have found several reasons for this including treating the symptom and not the problem. This is not to say that ADD & ADHD are not real, just that they may be applied improperly at times.

Traditional schooling is not for everyone, and the child may just be bored. They are not slow or unintelligent, just bored and not challenged. The problem may go away when the child's energy is channeled in the proper direction and medication may not be needed.

Have as many contact numbers as possible and keep them current as the year wears on. It is especially important to keep the medical history current, including allergies as they are identified.

Take the time to get to know the teachers and staff that are assisting and influencing your child's development. Your child spends six to eight hours or more, five days a week, nine months a year, for twelve to thirteen years being influenced by these people. Talk to other teachers, parents and kids who have dealt with them before to find out more about them.

Ask questions, and get answers. If you don't like the answers, be a part of the solution not the problem. If you have a problem, let the appropriate people know so that

SCIENCE & REALITY TODAY

Quantum physics: Why reality is weirder than we could imagine ...

As a child I was a huge fan of the 1980s NBC television science fiction series "Amazing Stories." Despite only airing three seasons, this Steven Spielberg-created show was a cross between "The Twilight Zone" and "The X-Files."

One of the first episodes of the show, titled "The Mission" (starring Keifer Sutherland and Kevin Costner) involved a World War II gunner and aspiring cartoonist who, while trapped in the belly of a B-17 aircraft, faced imminent death. To avoid a painfully gruesome demise, Sutherland's character was recruited to perform a mercy killing on the gunner before the plane landed.

By now you may be asking, what happens to the gunner? Or what the hell does this have to do with quantum physics. I don't want to give away the ending, but as to the latter question, and if you ever watch the episode, it shows how reality is more mysterious than we can imagine. I know this seems like a strange example but let's take closer look.

Quantum physics is a branch of science that deals with discrete, indivisible units of energy called quanta as described by the quantum theory. Its main ideas are that energy is not continuous, but comes in small but discrete units.

The elementary particles behave both like particles and waves. The movement of these particles is inherently random and it is impossible to know both the position and the momentum of a particle at the same time. The more precisely one is known, the less precise the measurement of the other is.

To locate a particle requires equipment which can detect its location or speed. This equipment transmits energy.

Have you ever heard of Schrödinger's cat? If not, then look it up. It seems impossible that a cat could be both dead and alive until you take a peek.

It will make anything Spielberg could ever imagine look tame in comparison. Like the ending to the episode I brought up at the beginning where something could come from nothing (like the universe itself perhaps).

OK, I will ruin the ending now. The gunner is saved by something most would classify as a miracle and not consistent with our everyday notions of reality, namely his imagination. Just like the quantum world which is so dynamic and elusive, pretty much nothing is out of the realm of possibility.



The community built the playground; it can repair it

At its first meeting since the playground dedication on June 17, the board of the Idyllwild Community Recreation Council announced its plan for maintaining and repairing it. "It's community built so the community should maintain it," said ICRC acting chair Dawn Sonnier.

The board clarified that money left in the budget for maintenance would be restricted to replacement of damaged equipment and for miscellaneous items such as the thick cushion of wood chips designed to mitigate injury from falls.

Community members would be asked to make minor and everyday repairs, according to the board. "If you notice it, fix it," said Sonnier. They cited the fact that many skilled volunteers had shown up to build the playground and there would be no shortage of those available and willing to make needed repairs as they became apparent.

The board then considered how to post lists of needed repairs for the attention of community volunteers. Director Claudia Posey suggested Facebook.

When asked what would happen if an unsupervised repair made by a community volunteer led to injury of a playground user, the board responded that vol-

unteers could make minor repairs but "beyond that it could be a problem," and that some system would have to be devised for those contingencies.

In other business, board directors Posey and Cheryl Vladika previewed the 7th annual Idyllwild Skate Park Games scheduled to take place on Friday, Aug. 17, at the park on the Idyllwild Pines Camp property. "They were cancelled because of rain," said Sonnier, "but will be rescheduled for September."

After presenting a treasurer's report, Treasurer JoAnn Graham announced her resignation, effective in October. Though end of July, the ICRC playground fund had a balance of \$37,142.40, the operating account \$30.51, the Idyllwild Community Center building fund \$499.70 and the popular Speaker Series \$1,542.50.

With the resignation of ICRC Director Scott Redeker, who helmed the series last year, the board announced there is no one to head the speakers' series this year. "We need more volunteers and though there is money for the speaker series we don't currently have anyone with the time to plan it. Without more volunteers, it may not happen," said Director Emily White.

Idyllwild Water adopts recycled water policy

After several months of discussion, the directors of the Idyllwild Water District approved an ordinance for mandatory recycled water use.

The new ordinance mandates the use of recycled water "for the following purposes: agricultural irrigation, construction use, landscape irrigation, landscape and or recreation impoundments and wildlife habitat."

The board also declared the use of potable water would be prohibited for these uses if recycled water is available.

The policy indicates the

district may require the use of recycled water instead of potable water and that the customer, whether existing or new, would incur the costs of a separate delivery system. However the district does provide exceptions when economics does not justify the conversion.

The directors next approved a resolution establishing a new process for customers to obtain a "will serve" letter from the district. Usually, this letter is a county requirement to obtain approval for construction or plans.

The new process is much more specific about obtaining water demand, including for fire and other uses and

how those estimates should be calculated. Board President Allan Morphett stressed that the principal change is specifying who may make the water demand calculations. Also, a fixture audit may be required before the final approval letter is issued.

In water business, General Manager Terry Lyons reported declining flows in Strawberry and Lily creeks. Consequently, Foster Lake water level was 14.5 feet in July compared to 17 feet or nearly full in June.

In addition, the district is repairing well nos. 13 and 23. Their production volume has declined. Lyons is confident the repair work will result in a substantially increased

pumping volume at both sites.

The board also approved a resolution changing monthly board meetings from Tuesday to Wednesday. The first meeting pursuant to the resolution will be 6 p.m., an hour earlier, Sept. 19.

At that meeting, Director John Cook said the pension committee would report to the board on its review this summer. He indicated that topics such as size of the district retirement set-aside, employee share and retirement age would be discussed. But before returning to the board, he hopes to meet with employees.

County postpones Idyllwild Arts planning decision

Several members of the Idyllwild Arts Academy management team attended the Aug. 14 meeting of the Idyllwild Water District. The school is in the process of obtaining Riverside County approval for a revision to its master plan, but needs a letter from the water district indicating that sufficient water is available to supply both the potable and potential firefighting needs

of the school.

But the county has deferred action on the request. "No decision, it was continued off calendar. A new public hearing notice will go out once the environmental work is completed. That cannot commence until the IWD weighs in on the validity of the water study provided by the applicant's consultants," wrote Matt Straite, Riverside County Planning.

IWD had requested a study from the school of the

entire water demand needed to satisfy all the potential construction encompassed in the revised master plan.

The district has insisted that approving individual projects piecemeal could result in significant problems in the Tollgate area.

In July, former Idyllwild Arts President Brian Cohen sent a letter indicating it would be willing to share the upfront cost of constructing a new 300,000-gallon water storage tank in the area.

The study confirms the

school needs additional water resources to meet the future demands, including fire suppression. This is one reason the school is seeking a larger meter connection from the water district.

The cumulative increase in water demand will be nearly 45 percent by 2035, although the school estimates the immediate increases will be no greater than its use five years ago. Wastewater is estimated to grow more than 60 percent in the same period.

Forest Service air tankers hot topic

"This is a dangerous time," Riverside County Fire Chief John Hawkins said at the last Mountain Area Safety Taskforce meeting. The hot dry days, with little nighttime cooling, pose serious risks for fire.

Since Jan. 1, there have been 42,488 wildland fires nationally. That is the fewest number of wildland fires in the past 10 years and about 80 percent of the average number of fires from Jan. 1 through Aug. 20.

However, more than 6.9 million acres have burned, 28 percent higher than the average acreage burned from January to Aug. 20.

The Hill is fortunate to have the availability of several firefighting agencies as demonstrated by the response to last week's Buck Fire.

Air resources are one of the many tools which fire managers want to have available in order to contain and eventually control fires. The largest firefighting agency, the U.S. Forest Service, has seen its air fleet dwindle from 43 air tankers in 2000 to only 11 last year. Two more were lost this spring. But changes and improve-

ments, which will begin to rebuild the agency's air support, will appear next year.

Last month, Sen. John McCain of Arizona with support from California's Sen. Dianne Feinstein and Florida's Sen. Bill Nelson introduced a bill (S. 3441 or the Wildfire Suppression Aircraft Transfer Act of 2012) to direct the Department of Defense and the United States Air Force to transfer 14 excess C-27J Spartan Aircraft to the Forest Service. The Air Force plans to scrap the aircraft under its Fiscal Year 2013 Force Reduction Plan.

"The Forest Service needs to modernize its entire air tanker fleet," said Sen. John McCain. "We have an opportunity to take the C-27J, an aircraft the Pentagon no longer wants, and give it to the Forest Service to enhance aircraft safety and lower existing maintenance costs. The C-27J should be kept in the service of the American people to help our brave fire crews, rather than sit in an airplane bonyard."

Unlike past proposals that directed the transfer of excess military aircraft to private firefighting contractors, the legislation intro-

duced by Senator McCain keeps the aircraft under Forest Service ownership and dedicates them solely to fighting wildfires.

This proposal has captured the attention of several groups throughout the country. Last week, Riverside County Supervisors Jeff Stone (3rd District) and Bob Buster (1st District) announced their support for the legislation and have placed the topic on the agenda of the next board of supervisors' meeting on Tuesday, Aug. 28.

Both supervisors believe these aircraft will enhance the Forest Service's efforts to fight fires throughout Southern California.

On Aug. 3, the National Association of State Foresters wrote the senators who introduced S.3441 stating their support for the bill, as well as for implementation of the Forest Service's Large Airtanker Modernization Strategy, which was released in February.

"NASF supports a mix of aerial aviation resources including large air tankers, water scoopers, single engine air tankers and rotor wing aircraft to respond to fires in the highly variable terrain and fuel types that exist across the country,"

wrote Randy Dye, NASF president and West Virginia state forester.

"As a medium air tanker, the C-27J can be effective in many parts of the country, but there is still a need for the larger new generation air tankers with a 3,000 gallon capacity in many forest types with heavy fuel loads," Dye added.

Independent of federal legislation, the RAND Corporation recently released a study of the Forest Service's air resources and recommended expanding the scooper type of craft.

RAND's analysis included fixed-winged aircraft, air scoopers and helicopters and acknowledged the value of a fleet that used a variety of air resources. However, RAND's final recommendations were much more weighted toward a fleet dominated by scoopers rather than other aircraft.

The scoopers were considered more efficient because of lower capital costs and their ability to make more drops before needing to return to base to refuel. However, on the Hill, local water sources, such as lakes Hemet and Fulmor are likely too small for scoopers. Helicopters could access

this surface water more efficiently and CAL FIRE's Hemet Ryan air base offers a close source of fuel and retardant.

Just a week ago, the Forest Service announced that it will use helicopters capable of nighttime flying and firefighting next year.

"We have made this important decision very carefully," said Forest Service Chief Tom Tidwell. "We have studied night operations from every angle — risk management, business and operations — and we have concluded we can conduct night operations safely and effectively."

The helicopters, which will be based in Southern California, would support wildfire suppression on Forest Service-protected lands, including communities and homes within and adjacent to the Angeles, Cleveland, and San Bernardino National Forests, and the southern half of the Los Padres National Forest.

Initially, they would be equipped to drop water and retardant. In the future,

mission capability could expand to include incident emergency medical transport, prescribed burning, and aerial supervision of aircraft traffic in the air above an incident.

The Forest Service did fly at night in the 1970s but ceased those activities after a major crash.

As of May 14, the Forest Service had 11 large air tankers on exclusive use contracts this fire season and had the ability to mobilize an additional 16 large air tankers and 1 very large air tanker. In addition, the agency had the ability to mobilize more than 100 helicopters and Single Engine Air Tankers (SEATS) to augment the large air tanker fleet.

In March, with the aid of legislation, the Forest Service began to implement its Modernization Strategy, when it issued a contract for the purchase of the next generation of air tankers.

pay, but other special pay incentives such as holiday, longevity, paramedic license and cost of living increases were untouched.

For example, the cost of living increase for 2011-12 was 3.1 percent. And regardless of the change in the indices, two percent was established as the minimum annual increase.

The contract also for-

mally establishes a fourth captain's position, Administrative Captaincy for Mark Lamont. Thus IFPD has a chief, four captains and five engineers and firefighters. Commissioner Dr. Charles "Chip" Schelly objected to the inclusion of this section and abstained from voting for the contract. The other four commissioners voted to accept the contract.

In other business, the commission officially approved a resolution revising ambulance fees. As part of

the discussion, Chief Reitz was asked about what would be the threshold for imposing the \$144 dry run fee. Commissioner Schelly suggested a significant level of service should be provided, "and not just applying a band aid or taking blood pressure."

In response, Reitz explained that when supplies which have to be restocked are used, then a cost to maintain the department's inventory would be necessary. He stressed that the fee is for the replenishment of supplies and not simply the cost of the run or visit.

The application of the nonresident fee for Zones II and III met opposition from Marge Muir, Pine Cove resident and member of County Service Area 38 Advisory Committee. Since

for the cost of ambulance service was unfair and an affront to Muir.


The ambulance fee for Idyllwild residents will be \$1,089.17. Pine Cove res-

Mary Stallings, the best kept secret in jazz

Vocalist Mary Stallings, considered by many one of the great jazz singers, has also been called one of the best-kept secrets in vocal jazz. She had a very successful career in the 1960s, then a long mid-career hiatus. She stays close to her San Francisco roots and consequently is not a household name.

"Jazz was my second family," said Stallings. "This is the only art form that has that family feeling. To have had the opportunity to come together with all these guys and hear the stories they passed down to me — the beauty and depth of what they've been through, the pain and the joy that's the core of jazz."

She remembers, as a young singer in her 20s, being gently encouraged by Dizzy Gillespie to find out who she was as an artist. "I always had a thirst for knowing about my music," she said. "He made me dig in my own soul to find what I had. He knew I had a lot of feeling down inside that

needed to get out. Even when he was being funny he was always picking your brain."

Stallings is modest when telling her own story, a story of a remarkable personal and musical evolution. Called by the New York Times, "Perhaps the best jazz singer singing today," Stallings has sung with and learned from many of the greatest names in jazz. Yet she has remained firmly anchored in her roots of city, family, and personal authenticity.

"Jazz is not a music of yourself," she said. "It is inclusive of all who are part of this shared family. Everybody comes with their own ingredients. It's very individual. The music is you, yet there is respect in this family for the individuality in all of us." Stallings said she feels that each jazz artist is an ambassador of the art form. "It's our music, the music of our country," she said. "We set the precedents on how this music is perceived. My responsibility as an adult is to tell that story, especially to young people and developing artists, and

be upright and honest and true."

Stallings started very young in the music business. While still in high school she joined blues, jazz and boogie-woogie bandleader Louis Jordan's Tympany Five.

In the early 60s she sang with Dizzy Gillespie, including the 1965 Monterey Jazz Festival. She finished out the decade with the Count Basie Orchestra. "I met all the heroes of music and then got a chance to work with them," she said. These greats of jazz, and many others, were her teachers.

With the birth of her daughter in 1972, she decided to concentrate on raising her. In the early 90's local musicians pulled her back onstage and in 1992 she returned to the recording studio. Her 1994 debut album on the Concord label, "I Waited for You," put her back on the jazz map.

According to critics and

fans who rediscovered Stallings in this second installment of her career, she is at her peak in interpreting a lyric and telling the emotional stories in the songs she chooses. She appears on Saturday, Aug. 25 at Jazz in the Pines with pianist arranger Eric Reed. "The first time I heard him I knew I loved this guy," said Stallings. There was this instant connection."

Reed returned the compliment, "Rarely does one encounter a singer who is so genuinely musical, so soundly in the moment. If you want to talk about jazz, the subtleties and the intricacies, the storytelling and the harmonies, there isn't a woman alive who sings better."

Town Jazz compliments jazz fest weekend Year two

Town Jazz, the three-day in town event serves up a bountiful menu of jazz designed to add additional hours of pleasure and entertainment to its venerable progenitor, Jazz in the Pines.

Jazz luminaries from all over Southern California have answered the call of Idyllwild jazz icon Marshall Hawkins to play at Town Jazz. The Idyllwild Chamber of Commerce is providing support for the event now in its second year. Beginning Friday evening, Aug. 24, and concluding Sunday evening Aug. 26, Town Jazz features an impressive lineup including Yves Evans, Sherry Williams, Melissa Morgan (the "Three Divas" who will close the event on Sunday night at Jo'An's Restaurant), Henry Franklin, Joshua White, Paul Carman, Mundell Lowe, Bob Boss, Graham Dechter, the Peter Sprague Consort,

Gilbert Castellanos, Daniel Jackson, Roy Gonzales, and Najite and the Seahawk MOJO String Quintet.

Casey Abrams, featured as special guest with the Three Divas, closes the event on Sunday, Aug. 24, at Jo'An's from 7:45 to 9:30 p.m. Check the ad on page 12 of this week's edition for schedule information and all artists' venue and appearance times.

As before, wristband tickets will be sold at Jo'An's Restaurant. The \$20 ticket price permits admission to all venues for all scheduled Town Jazz acts. Tickets will also be available at Mile High and Idyll Awhile Wine Shoppe.

The Chamber is responsible for selling tickets and collecting money, including donations. Funds will then be used to pay featured

talent and cover advertising expense. Volunteers are needed. Call (951) 659-5015 if interested.

In addition to evening entertainment at all venues, this year adds the opportunity for jazz, coffee and breakfast at both Café Aroma and Mile High Café on Saturday and Mile High and the Creek House on Sunday.

Hawkins, a walking history of jazz who has played with the greats, brings this weekend as a gift to the town. As he is fond of saying, "Idyllwild jazz, all the time, all over." As a complement to Jazz in the Pines, the weekend now offers a breakfast, lunch, dinner and dessert smorgasbord of delicious jazz.





Friday, started choppy. Steele had two birdies and two bogeys in the first six holes. Then he navigated the rest of the round bogey free while adding five more birdies, including four in a row on holes 12 through 15.

The turn around came from hot iron play in the second round — his proximity to the hole stat dropped to less than 30 feet and he bettered his strokes-gained-putting stat by more than three shots.

Steele sank a 15-foot putt on no. 3 and a 14-footer on no. 13, both for birdies. He made the cut with two holes to spare and rose to a tie for 47th place, but he went into the weekend needing to rise still higher in position to earn a FedEx Cup playoff berth.

Unfortunately for Steele, Saturday and Sunday were more like Thursday than Friday. His 40-foot proximity to the pin returned and that was too much for his putter to overcome.

He did garner \$10,660 for the week to add to his official earnings, but he fell about 30 FedEx Cup points short of making the playoffs.

Consequently, Steele will have about five weeks off from PGA Tour competition during the playoffs. But he will have an opportunity to add to his official PGA Tour earnings in the Fall Finish, which comprises four tournaments in October and early November, and to add unofficial earnings from other tournaments, including defending his 2011 co-championship with Keegan Bradley at the Franklin Templeton Shark Shootout in November.

where waivers have not been granted in accordance with this Ordinance.

c. Customers with Alternative Water Supply: The District may approach or be approached by prospective user(s) within the District's regular service area who currently utilize an alternative to the District's recycled or potable water supply and who desire recycled water service. The District shall then make a preliminary determination whether the existing service(s) can be converted to the use of recycled water and shall provide notice regarding that determination along with a request for a letter of intent from the prospective user(s). The District shall assist customers to complete the application process.

d. Customers Outside Regular Service Area: Although IWD customers will always be considered first, the District may approach or be approached by prospective user(s) outside the District's regular service area who currently utilize an alternative to the District's water supply and who desire recycled water service. The District shall then make a preliminary determination whether the existing service(s) can be converted to the use of recycled water and whether any legally conflicting service arrangements, express or implied, exist, and shall provide notice regarding that determination along with a request for a letter of intent from the prospective user(s). The District shall assist customers in completing the application process.

e. Notice: Whenever the District has made a preliminary determination that use of recycled water is mandatory or authorized; the District shall provide written notice to the prospective user(s), of the District's preliminary determination. Such notice shall include, as a minimum: descriptive information about the planned recycled water system, user responsibilities under the rules and regulations governing the use of recycled water, current recycled water pricing, and an explanation of the customer's right to request reconsideration or a waiver.

f. Reconsideration and Waiver Process: Within thirty (30) days from the date of a notice of determination by the District that a customer will be required to convert to recycled water service, the customer may request reconsideration of the determination or waiver of the requirement. The request for reconsideration or waiver must be in writing and specify the reasons for the objection. A request for reconsideration or waiver must be based upon facts indicating that the conversion to recycled water would not be economically feasible, or would present an undue risk to health and safety, or that under the particular circumstances; the requirement of use of recycled water would impose an unreasonable hardship or burden upon the customer.

Unless a request for reconsideration or waiver is submitted in a timely manner, the preliminary determination shall be final. District staff shall review the request for reconsideration and shall confirm, modify or abandon the preliminary determination. Upon issuance of a final determination by District staff, the prospective user(s) may appeal the determination to the General Manager of the District. The District shall issue a waiver to the prospective user(s) where its objection or appeal is successful.

g. Recycled Water Use Permit Process: Upon a final determination by the District that a property shall be served with recycled water, the prospective user(s), owner or applicant shall obtain a recycled water use permit in accordance with the application process detailed in these regulations.

h. Temporary Use of Potable Water: At the discretion of the District, potable water may be made available on a temporary basis until recycled water is available.

Before the applicant receives temporary potable water, a recycled water use permit as required in Section 6, must be obtained for the onsite recycled water distribution facilities. Prior to commencement of recycled water service, an inspection of the onsite facilities will be conducted to verify that the facilities have been maintained and are in compliance with the recycled water use permit and current requirements for service. Upon verification of compliance, recycled water shall be served to the parcel for the intended use. If the facilities are not in compliance, the applicant shall be notified of the corrective actions necessary and shall have thirty (30) days to take such actions prior to initiation of enforcement proceedings.

Section 7. Costs of Conversion to Recycled Water

a. Customers with Existing Potable Water Service: A potable water customer, with an existing connection to the District's potable water system, who is required by the District to use recycled water for mandatory uses, shall bear the cost for those modified or additional facilities on the customer's property which are necessary to convert such uses from potable to recycled water.

b. New Water Service Application: Applicants for new water connections, regardless of whether the property was previously developed or is newly developed, will be required to bear the entire cost of those facilities required to accommodate recycled water for all mandatory uses, and, if desired, any authorized uses.

c. Customers with Alternative Water Supply: For an existing water use site, the cost for those modified or additional facilities not necessitated by conversion from potable to recycled water shall be borne entirely by the potential user(s).

Section 8. Enforcement

a. Enforcement Methods: The District may implement all enforcement methods and penalties otherwise provided in these regulations to any violator of the terms of this Ordinance.

b. Water Service: Water service will not be provided to new applicants for water service from the District unless and until they have complied with the requirements for installation of a recycled water system for mandatory uses and complied with all requirements of the District's Rules and Regulations.

c. Recycled Water Conversion: Where recycled water is available in offsite facilities, if after one hundred and eighty (180) calendar days from the date of the District's final determination under Section 6, the prospective user has not completed required onsite conversion work, then, in addition to those penalties set forth in subsection (a) above, the District shall impose a surcharge of its potable water rate in effect at the time of violation, such surcharge to be included in the customer's monthly billing.

Section 9. Validity

If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the Ordinance and the application of such provisions to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

Section 10. Severability

If any portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

Section 11. Publication

This Ordinance shall be certified by the Secretary of IWD and the Secretary is hereby ordered and directed to publish said Ordinance as set forth within one week for publication two weeks in the Idyllwild Town Crier, a newspaper of general circulation published in Riverside County, California, pursuant to the provisions of Section 35424 of the California Water Code.

Slice duck breasts thinly on diagonal and fan out on plates. Spoon the port-cherry sauce over the duck and serve.

Wild-rice-stuffed acorn squash

Makes six servings

- 1 14-1/2 ounce can reduced-sodium chicken broth
- 1/2 tsp. dried thyme, crushed
- 1/3 cup wild rice, rinsed
- 1/2 cup chopped leeks
- 1/3 cup long grain rice
- 6 acorn squashes
- 1/4 cup dried cranberries or dried currants, both are available at Country Farms
- 1/4 cup snipped dried apricots
- 3 tbs. butter, melted
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- fresh sage leaves, optional

In a heavy medium sauce pan, bring the chicken broth and thyme to a boil. Add the wild rice. Reduce the heat. Simmer, for 30 minutes, while covered.

Add the leeks and long grain rice. Cover and simmer for 15 minutes more until rice is tender. Let stand, covered, for five minutes. Drain excess liquid, if necessary.

Meanwhile, wash the squash and cut off the top third including the stem end. With a teaspoon, remove seeds. Place the squash, cut side down, in a shallow baking pan. Bake in a 350-degree oven for 30 minutes. Turn cut sides up. Cover pan with foil and bake about 20 minutes more or until tender. Remove from oven. Set aside.

In a large bowl, combine the rice mixture, dried cranberries or currants, and dried apricots. Stir in the melted butter, salt and pepper.
