Gearing up to The 52nd stop oak borer Idyllwild Christmas Tree spread

By Marshall Smith STAFF REPORTER

Tince discovery of the invasive and dangerous Goldspotted oak borer in Idyllwild two weeks ago, scientists and professional responders from CAL FIRE and the Forest Service have been meeting to devise steps to contain the spread of the destructive beetle.

Kevin Turner, Goldspotted oak borer coordinator at the University of California, Riverside, said the next step is to work with the Forest Service to get an aerial survey of the Idyllwild area to map distribution of California black oak, the local oak Turner said is most

susceptible to the beetle. "We're hoping to identify and map black oak distribution on both public and private land in the Idyllwild area," Turner said.

"We've already done a 'windshield survey' of the Idyllwild area, checking trees to see if any have shown the same symptoms of early leaf shriveling and die off that characterized the infected tree recently removed on Highway 243." Those involved included Turner, Forest Service lead entomologist Dr. Tom Coleman, CAL FIRE Division Chief Kathleen Edwards and UCR's Dr. Tom Scott. "We did not find any that were similar," said Turner. Turner

RCSD's aviation unit also responded and was able to spot Perez near the Black Mountain campgrounds around 9:40 a.m.





Half (\$750) of the committee's goal will purchase 15 blank banners for next year's festival. "We're only about \$200 shy of that as it stands and we really hope "This is the first ever set to increase the number of banners to really dress the town," Hughes added. The remainder is shared with





Initial thoughts

Give and share; toys and more ...



We've just begun the holiday seasons, Thanksgiving has passed, Christmas is only four weeks in the future, then the New Year arrives.

While I shared our thanks with you last week, I'd like to continue stressing that sentiment and encourage you to

combine it with the traditional Christmas practice of giving gifts.

I'm sure you have many personal memories for which you're grateful and many family and friends on whom you plan to bestow you Christmas largess, but I hope you've read or will read the two of the stories on page 4 about poverty and helping local children.

Both offer ways in which you might be able to assist some of our residents.

The conversation at the "This is this" is tonight and perhaps you'll read the notice too late, but the problem, low income or poverty, won't be gone. You can contact Mark Yardas or another conversation participant to learn what the next step will be.

Poverty or low income is not a rare occurrence on the Hill. Even if you haven't encountered someone in this situation often, it's more prevalent than many people believe.

Nearly 60 percent of the students at Idyllwild School are considered socially disadvantaged, which means eligible for the free or reduced-price lunch program.

The 2010 Census estimated that nine percent of local families were below the poverty level and 13 percent of families with children under 18 years old.

So giving a gift through the HELP Center's Angel Tree located in the lobby of the BBVA Compass Bank or bringing a gift to one of the Spark of Love Toy Drive sites would be a very generous step.

Bring several.

But keep in mind, not only do children enjoy the Christmas gifts, but they, their parents and other local adults need some help before and after the holiday.

It was only two years ago that Riverside County established a winter warming center on the Hill. There, residents who need that warmth during the freezing nights could congregate, even our pets which Madelaine Barnett reminds us.

Just ask the Woodies how much wood they cut, split and provide to HELP Center clients?

Just three months ago, a homeless person was found dead near Highway 243. I'm not making the case that anyone of us could have prevented that tragedy, but I am suggesting there are people who need help.

As I wrote several weeks ago, people don't choose this way of life, nobody dreams about being homeless or poor.

Cajoling them to take personal responsibility may help with their appearance and self-esteem. Sometimes life puts us in situations that we never expected or want.

For those of us whose guile or wisdom has led down different paths, this is the time to reflect on our good fortune and reach out to other human beings.

Certainly our support of Measure U, which benefits the Hemet School District, verifies our willingness to help; but the stories on page 4 emphasize that sometimes charity starts at home.

Although people living in the midst of a natural disaster need help from outside, our efforts to comfort and care should not forget our friends and neighbors who have needs, too.

The effort you make doesn't have to be monetary nor should it be limited to serving food on Thanksgiving Day. Much more is needed.

This is the time of year when you might think about it and acknowledge it more, but the need is not seasonal

IDYLLWILD BOTANY

Idyllwild County Park botanical report

On Tuesday, Nov. 20, Tom Chester and I made a long overdue return to the Idyllwild County Park in order to survey and document the vegetation along Idyllwild Creek, which is on the east and south edge of the meadow and the opposite side from Lilly

Creek. In 2010, we studied and documented the park on three separate occasions. At that time, we were not aware that the creek was within the park's boundaries.

The results of that work (and a working draft for a flora of the park) can be found at http://tchester.org/sj/flora/ idyllwild_park.html as well as this beautiful photo gallery by Michael Charters at www.calflora.net/recentfieldtrips/ idyllwildpark10.html.

On subsequent walks through the park, Interpreter Shelley Kibby informed me that the Perimeter Trail follows the creek and is indeed within the park boundaries.

The goal of Tuesday's work was to relocate and verify plant species, which I've found on solo hikes and with Kibby, that were not previously on our plant list for the park.

Our teamwork resulted in finding some additional species as well. Here are just the highlights.

In the meadow, besides the native plants, there are many weeds. The most conspicuous at this time of year are the dried-up remnants of tumble mustard. Any efforts to restore the meadow could begin by simply having volunteers periodically pull up and bag these invaders.

Tom and I are very sensitive to the presence of nonnative plants, and many are in the park. Most of the offending species are in the southern half of the park.

Nevertheless, at the end of the day, Tom remarked, and I am paraphrasing, "For a park with a heavily used campground bordering on a residential area, it's not too

En route to the far end of the park we found several Mexican manzanitas. I have often looked for these elsewhere

in the park but only found the dominant pink bracted manzanita.

Another taxon which I was looking for was oracle oak a hybrid between black oak and interior live oak. Five were found near the far end of the park and another on the perimeter trail below the Nature Center.

Black oaks are highly susceptible to the deadly Goldspotted oak borer beetle, I have learned there is some evidence that interior live oaks and their hybrids are resistant. I hope this hypothesis will not be tested in the Idyllwild

Near the far end of the park, I noticed a patch of small plants with leaves that were turning red. These are the highly rhizomed non-native sheep sorrel. So far it looks as though they are confined to this small area. They are a good candidate for removal before they spread.

As expected, we found evening primrose in both Lilly and Idyllwild creeks and added it to the list. But I couldn't find the horsetails that Kibby and I had spotted earlier in the year.

Kibby also showed me periwinkle and spearmint, which she has begun to remove from the creek. We recorded those as well. Although she and I had also seen a single ivy vine, Tom and I saw no sign of ivy on this trip.

In Idyllwild Creek, I was pleasantly surprised to see sycamore tree. Reaching its maximum elevation in the Idyllwild area, we never see these trees on our high country surveys, so it was a delight to find one in the

I planted a few lemon lily seeds in different spots.

Then we hiked the Perimeter Trail to the north end of the park. Along the trail, we found a nice large patch of little prince's pine. We have been on a quest to find these plants along with their cousins pipsissewa, so I was surprised that we did not yet have it on the plant list for the park.

They would vehemently is not only a member of deny that of course, since


they must not show us how their goals have morphed into statewide shakedowns financed with money purloined from their members.

also noted that there will be little movement of larvae during the winter months, and that symptoms of infection would not likely be seen until the arrival of warm weather next year. "We've surveyed areas around the infected tree, over where the Woodies cut wood (Idyllwild HELP Center), the County Park and South Circle," Turner said. "I've been up there a lot and I saw nothing obvious that matched the same symptoms."

private landowners with black oaks on their property report any symptoms that might be indicative of infestation. Again, those include early browning or shrinking of leaves, canopy thinning, and "D" shaped exit holes in the oak bark. Also, if people have firewood they suspect came from infected areas of San Diego County, they should call Turner's office for someone to come out to inspect it. The number to call is (951) 827-2973.

If property owners suspect their trees are infected, Turner said someone from his working group would come out to check. "We can go back with the

Turner requested that property owner's permission, peel back the bark and look for [oak borer] larvae."

Scott and Turner met with community members, including the Garden Club and master gardeners and staff at the Nature Center on Tuesday, Nov. 20, as part of a citizen outreach. Scott presented a slide show and explanation of how the beetle infects a tree, the life cycle within the tree and how quickly tree die-off can occur.

He explained that entry is no higher than 30 feet from the ground with most around 10 feet. "The heaviest time of mortality is during times of drought," said Scott. "Trees with thicker

bark are attacked more frequently. And with infected visor Jeff Stone has also large trees, there is a 90 to 95 percent mortality. What we've seen in San Diego County is 80 to 95 percent death, in outbreak mode, within six to eight years after infection."

The news Scott delivered was sobering given what has already happened in San Diego County. Turner said he and Scott were encouraged to see a large turnout of around 35 people, since locals, here each day, can contribute very helpful information by observing local black

The Garden Club distributed flyers at the Tree Lighting Ceremony requesting that anyone who has purchased oak firewood from a supplier south of Idyllwild in the last three years, who has noticed any oak trees that are not as robust as they had been and are different in appearance from similar and nearby black oaks, and who knows of anyone importing wood to the Hill from an outside source to call Turner's office at (951) 827-2973.

by loss of Hill black oak. "This is an emergency," Stone said.

Many states have firewood ordinances because of concern over invasive species damage. Those ordinances are strict and enforceable. Currently neither California nor Riverside County has any specific firewood ordinances that require source labeling and limit transportation.

Soil near Shell Station nearly clean

Past remediation efforts at the site of a previously leaking underground fuel tank in Idyllwild seem to have successfully removed most of the potential contaminants, according to a recent report filed with the Riverside County Department of Environmental Health.

In early October, R.M. Environmental, Inc., the consultants for property owner Sanden & Sons, Inc., of Mountain Center conducted soil analyses and detected virtually no hydrocarbon remnants.

"In summary, the findings of this investigation indicate additional soil remediation is not warranted for this site," concluded Robert C. Manning, R.M. Environmental president, in the report's cover let-

Although some hydrocarbons, such as butyl benzene and naphthalene were detected, their concentrations were low. Neither benzene nor methyl-tertiary-butyl ethane (MTBE) com.

was detected in any of the four locations.

As a result of these data, Manning's reported concluded, "The soil vapor extractions conducted at the site significantly reduced the hydrocarbon compound concentrations of on-site soils through in-situ remediation. No significant hydrocarbon compound concentrations were detected in the soil samples."

The soil vapor extractions were conducted in 2007 and 2008. The efforts removed more than 3,000 pounds of hydrocarbons. The extractions ceased in the spring of 2008 because the groundwater level was rising.

Since then the site and movement of the subsurface pollutants have been monitored with wells. In March 2012, Manning's firm submitted a proposal to the DEH for permission to conduct the soil analyses. This was approved in June and the soil borings were taken in October.

County budget deficit: Déjà vu

With about 60 percent of the current fiscal year remaining, Riverside County budget officials are confronted with a familiar problem - projected expenses are greater than projected rev-

Last week, Chief Financial Officer Ed Corser told the board of supervisors that the county's anticipated 2013 deficit would be \$30 million unless some actions were taken between now and the end of the fiscal year on June 30, 2013.

But in a frustrating repeat of recent budgets, Corser is already estimating a \$37 million deficit for next fiscal year. Supervisor Marion Ashley (District 5) stressed that whatever needs to be done to ensure a balanced budget should be done.

Similar to the little Dutch boy plugging his fingers in Holland's dikes, the new leak this year is the county's Regional Medical Center. The size of the Medical Center's financial leak ranges from \$14 million to more than \$36 million.

"We now have a structurally balanced budget and want to keep it that way,"

to deal with problems as they arise."

Nevertheless, Corser was optimistic that county officials, with the assistance of the hospital administrator Doug Begley, will reduce the cash flow problem emanating from the facility. The budgetary stresses on the Medical Center are primarily for services to county jail inmates, mental health patients and emergency room visits.

The sheriff's and the fire departments account for the remainder of the possible red ink. The Sheriff's Department is hiring and training 50 new deputies. In addition, the implementation of a new countywide communications system is generating additional costs for both departments.

Neither County Executive Jay Orr nor Corser was optimistic that an increase in revenue would occur within the next few years, thus relieving them and the board of making additional program cuts.

"Real estate prices are slowly improving, but foreclosures and the slow pace of mortgage refinancing continue to depress the real estate market and economic activity. Those forces will Corser said. "We have an likely hold back discretionary

years," Orr wrote in his "First Quarter Budget Report."

County officials are studying possible realignment and reorganization of information technology functions as a way to generate savings going forward. Orr estimated these changes might achieve

obligation to meet and have revenue growth for several possible savings between \$40 million and \$60 million.



Serendipity describes much of Fischer's career arc. Another juncture came after he saw Kevin Smith's breakout indie film, "Clerks." "I had been a writer as a kid. I was still writing short stories [while building movie models professionally] when someone suggested I should write a screenplay. I saw 'Clerks' and then I thought, I could make a film. I could make that."

Fischer began writing

screenplays and in 2004 his screenplay for "The Men Who Fell" was put into production. Fischer spent a month on location in Tucson during which time 60 percent of the movie was shot. He describes that as his on-the-set education. Later, having acquired and mastered video editing using Final Cut Pro, he was hooked. "I realized I could do the whole thing. When you make a movie, you're the ultimate author. I love working with actors, getting everything in front of the camera. And when we're rolling, that's the most magical moment of

orchestral backing and New York City location shooting. "At times I felt my career was on hold, since it was taking so long to make," said King.

In making five features, he has managed to dip into different genres, with the result that each of his films has a different look, beautifully shot and framed, but conceptually different. Three of the films he both wrote and directed. Two were written and produced by others and he served only as director "I subscribe to the one for me and one for them approach," he said, noting that he makes both his own 'personal" films as well as those for hire.

Mentioning Steven Soderbergh as one of his favorite directors, and a model for covering many genres, King said he did not want to brand himself as a one-style-only filmmaker. Prior to Schermann, King's other features covered drama, horror, psychological drama and an action-comedy-horror

"I come from a very movie-driven family," said King. "On weekends, we'd rent five films. Over time we ran out of new releases, so my parents suggested viewing films they'd grown up with, "Rear Window," "The Music Man," and many other classics across a broad genre base." King related how seeing those different film genres as a kid influenced how he decided

what to make as an adult. "Watching those different styles, I paid attention to the process, how the filmmakers would shoot. Then when DVD's came around, with director commentary, I learned even more about the process."

Making "How Do You Write a Joe Schermann Song" proved to be King's ambitious project, a twoyear odyssey in which he wore many hats — writer, director, producer, cinematographer and editor. King noted his five-year corporate stint in Silicon Valley in HR management served him well. "I'm verv well versed in project management," he said of his experience. "I learned how to keep track of numbers and get things done."

Asked why he decided to take on such a multilayered project, King said, "I've always been interested in Broadway musicals. I grew up watching them with my parents and was always in awe of the sheer talent of the actors on the screen. I'm thrilled to make a film in a genre that does not get much recognition anymore and I believe there is an audience out there that is still hungry for unique musicals."

Schermann has already won festival awards, proving King right about audience need for and enjoyment of this genre. At the United Kingdom's London Raindance Film Festival, Schermann won the prestigious Film of the Festival award. At the Phoenix (Arizona) Film Festival, it won the Cox Audience Award along with the Dan Har-

King said one of his great pleasures as a direc-

tor is working with actors, especially in his latest project where actors had to be what are called on Broadway, "triple threats" (who can sing, dance and act). "I just find it so inspir-

ing to see people who can sing, dance and act, which is something rarely done on screen nowadays at the truly independent level."

King cautions that Schermann is not the typical "song and dance" musical reminiscent of the MGM musicals of the '30s and '40s. "The goal of the film is not spectacle," he said, "but rather a more intimate tale about an aspiring Broadway songwriter (real life songwriter Joe Schermann) who jeopardizes his relationships and budding career after showing interest in a talented singer."

From the north end of the park, we dropped back into Idyllwild Creek and were shocked to find it has been completed filled in below Camp Maranatha. The creek's flow passes through a culvert before exiting again at the end of the property. We mused at being able to walk "on top of" Idyllwild Creek.

When we returned to the Nature Center, the meeting on the Goldspotted oak borer beetle was just ending. We met two of the presenters and exchanged information with them. Tom commented that we were fortunate to receive the benefit of the information without having to sit through the entire meeting.

Tom and I once again marveled at the diversity of the vegetation in the park. Although not large, the park encompasses many different habitats giving rise to a vast array of plant life.

We now have a very good body of work that can be translated into a comprehensive flora of the park. Tom has photos of most of the plants and will work to include them on Tom's website, tchester.org.


