American Cancer Society seeks Inland Empire volunteers for generational study

The American Cancer Society is looking to local residents to help in a historic research study. Cancer Prevention Study-3 (CPS-3) will give scientists a better understanding of cancer causes and prevention. The Society is looking for Inland Empire men and women between the ages of 30 and 65 from various racial and ethnic backgrounds with no personal history of cancer to help reach full enrollment of at least 300,000 people in the U.S., including 400 people in the Inland Empire. If you are eligible to participate, visit www.cps3inlandempire.org to make an appointment.

Signing up requires a one-time, in-person visit to read and sign a consent form, complete a survey, have a waist measurement, and give a small nonfasting blood sample, similar to what you'd do during a routine doctor visit. Participants will also complete a more detailed survey at home and will continue to receive periodic follow-up surveys over the next 20 to 30 years that researchers will use to look for more clues to cancer's causes.

Last Saturday, I was walking around town handing out Earth Fair flyers to the various merchants and I was surprised how easy it all was to get the town businesses to put flyers in their windows. Some merchants asked if they could have two flyers. To put it in a nutshell, no one says no to Earth Fair.

2013 Spring Wildflower report

Another season has come to Idyllwild with the rain in May helping things along. I have made it my goal to study all the lupine species and subspecies on the mountain and photograph them in bloom. I will publish my findings when this project is complete.

So far I have found references to nine species or varieties that have been found on the Hill. There may be as many as 42 species in Riverside County according to the Calflora listings; but I am only interested in the species that grow in and around Idyllwild and the higher elevations.

Right now, the "Lupine Report" (as I call it) has

photos for dwarf, grape soda, and bajada lupines with more to come as the season progresses.

I have already located Parish's lupine although they are not blooming as of yet.

I am looking for the white-flowered variety of the grape soda lupine so if any of my readers know where they can be found I would appreciate it they would let me know.

The white-flowered lupine used to be common in the 1970s but I have not seen one in a very long time.

A good spot to see grape soda lupines is at the end of the road out toward the dam at Lake Hemet. There are lots of large plants to the right at the end of the road.

Other recent sightings include mountain pink currant, dollar plant Lunaria annua and lots of wild strawberries in bloom just downstream from the Highway 243 bridge at Strawberry Creek. Scarlet and purple penstemon are blooming down off Saunders Meadow Road by the transfer station.

INITIAL THOUGHTS

Happy endings not on horizon of local dramas ...



When you read this column, Idyllwild Fire's May 14 meeting will already have occurred. Nevertheless, one of the agenda items merits some discussion and next week, I'll report on the action at the meeting.

In the previous episode of this soap opera, we left IFPD with the discovery of a missing \$100,000. They were planning on a "meet and confer" session with the Idyllwild Career Firefighters Association before last night's meeting.

Apparently they met, but the issue is not on the agenda and neither is a financial report. Perhaps it will be for the May 28 meeting, which leaves them 33 days until the end of the current fiscal year.

However, on the agenda is a proposed contract to hire somebody for bookkeeping and accounting services.

There's no mention of the possible cost for this contract. But they have a service agreement with Nancy Layton for \$250 weekly. She is the third person performing this function in the past three years.

Please understand no one has mentioned Nancy with this current lapse. It appears to have started before her agreement with the commission last June.

They also have an administrative captain. One of his responsibilities is "development and determining accurate budgets and accounting issues of the fire department."

He has actually been involved with the preparation and management of Idyllwild's budget since former Chief Steve Kunkle managed the department.

The administrative captain was the second highest paid member of the department last year according to the IFPD report to the state controller's office. He made nearly \$143,000, more than three fire chiefs or the captain.

Of course much of that was overtime, but how much time was devoted to those accurate accounting issues?

The administrative captain negotiates for the Association. In most organizations, the budget decisions are clearly management's responsibility, so it seems a conflict for an association member (i.e., union rep) to oversee the budget process, then negotiate against it.

So where will this money for the new financial contractor come from? Perhaps some combination of these two sums will cover the new contract; but how they will pay for it is not mentioned in the agenda.

In the last episode, Commissioner Jerry Buchanan said IFPD would probably generate another deficit this year.

Also on the agenda is preparing the third consecutive request for an advance of property tax revenue, which is due in December.

Keep tuned in on the continuing saga of your public monies managed at IFPD.

Oh yeah, they plan to raise ambulance rates? Let's ask why, since nearly 75 percent of the department's cost is for salaries and benefits, which didn't change this year.

Idyllwild Chamber

Another local soap is approaching its finale.

It is a shame that the Chamber of Commerce is dissolving. But one can't blame people for being reluctant to expose themselves to personal financial liability for actions taken by predecessors.

I've often written of the many volunteer groups in town. We depend on them and they are essential to our community, but none has the responsibility of courting visitors to Idyllwild year round.

The festivals do it for their specific event, and credit the Art Alliance, which does sponsor events throughout the year.

Perhaps in the future a replacement will arise from these ashes.

Just remember more than 50 years ago, the town had two chambers.

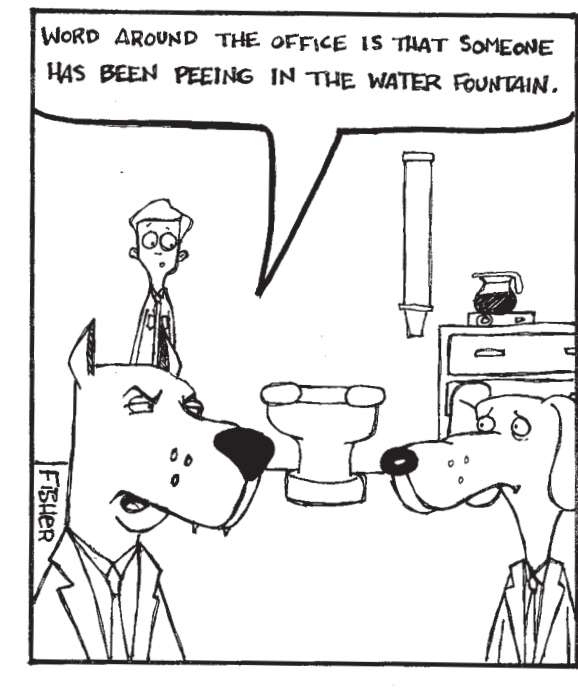
As I began reading Jeff Smith's latest letter [see the May 9 issue of the Town Crier], I thought "Oh, boy, he's at it again."

AB 642 would allow an exclusively web-based publication, with a staff of one spending time in Idyllwild, to qualify as a newspaper of general circulation in competition with you.

I have always appreciated the convenience of local newspapers for publication of notices and the many benefits they have provided. I am particularly mindful of the work [that] your staff did to locate your old obituary notice regarding

Kurt Fast, published in 1971 by your newspaper. Finding that notice saved the Estate of Marie Fast, who died in December 2005 after many years of residency in Idyllwild, a significant amount of time and effort to establish the date and place of Kurt Fast's death.

Though it seems that written work is migrating to Internet medium and storage, nothing will ever match the power of the paper-printed word.

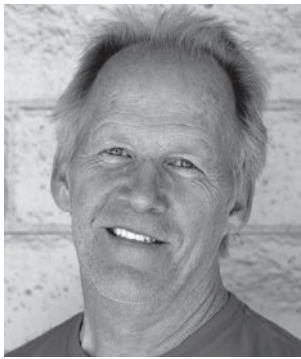

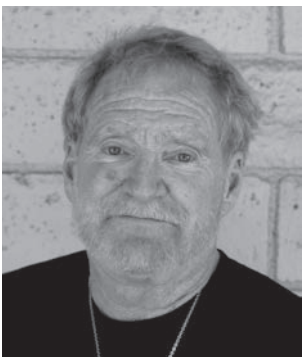

TODAY'S HEALTH ISSUES

Risky business ...

A year ago, I saw a cartoon with two people sitting across from each other at a table. One said, "I remember when we used to sit and talk about our problems over cigarettes and coffee. Now cigarettes and coffee ARE our problems."

The TV, internet and papers bombard us day and night with the next big problem. The more sensational they can make it, the more they know we will read it.

But sifting the rumors from the facts can be daunting even for a professional. This is just the briefest of outlines to get you started.

You must use your common sense and also question the sources of information and how much this new material may impact you.

This is difficult to do especially with the Internet. The levels of authority are often problematic. We may have a blogger quoting the National Institute of Health or quoting his grandmother. Unless he or she makes it clear, it is impossible for the reader to sort out.

Health risk assessment is a complex issue where multiple factors may play a very important role. There are some factors that we can do little about, like genetics. We may be at higher risk for a particular cancer if several relatives of our family had that cancer.

There is a difference between genetic risks and familial risks. For example, we may be at higher risk for developing colon cancer because members of our family had it. This is genetics. On the other hand, we may be at risk for lung cancer or other respiratory conditions because of secondhand smoke where we grew up; this is familial. These risks are sometimes manageable while genetics is not.

At the other extreme we have diseases of lifestyle and behavior that are under our control. We can elect not to

Collective amnesia ...

Well, the first bill submitted by freshman Senator Elizabeth Warren attempts to lower student loan rates down to the same rate given to banks by the Federal Reserve.

Starting July 1, student loan rates are scheduled to double from 3.4 percent to 6.8 percent, while banks borrow money at a rate of .75 percent.

Once again Congress shows the American people where their allegiance lies, and I've got news for you, it's not with the middle class. I applaud Sen. Warren for hitting the ground running.

What's disturbing to me is the collective amnesia that has taken over the country. These are the same banks that are responsible for the worst economic collapse since the Great Depression, who have already benefitted from government assistance and are now making money hand over fist during the recovery; look at the recent profits Bank of America has posted. (In April, the Bank of America Corporation reported net income of \$2.6 billion for the first quarter of 2013 compared to \$653 million in the first quarter of 2012. Revenue, net of interest expense basis, rose 5 percent to \$23.7 billion from \$22.5 billion a year ago.)

The same banks that have withheld money, earmarked for debt relief, from the very homeowners and buyers it was intended to assist. And yet, it's back to business as usual and we don't bat an eye.

Bravo, Sen. Warren, for leading the charge in a fight that the American people are disinterested in, a fight with which we would just rather not be bothered.

How soon we forget the lessons of the past six years, or of the last 25 years. Those who forget the past are forced to re-live it. What happened to our outrage?

Fight or flight? To stay and fight or evacuate from an approaching wildland fire

It's late in the afternoon, and the air is hot, and smoky. The wind is increasing and sirens can be heard in the not so far distance. Down the street comes a police car with its lights flashing, broadcasting the message to evacuate the area immediately because of an oncoming wildfire.

What do you do? Do you stay and try to defend your property or do you evacuate as directed?

Previously I wrote about preparing your house and property for the wildland fire season. Have you started to get ready? Or are you still thinking about it?

Well, the time is now because fire season is already here! This will be a major factor if you should try to defend against an oncoming wildfire or evacuate for safety's sake.

It is also the time to prepare yourself and family should you find yourself in the position of having to evacuate — whether it be for a wildland fire,

earthquake, flood, or other disaster.

If you think you are going to stay, you need to consider some very important factors. The first one is you. Age, general health, and physical ability are probably the most important.

If you are not a spring chicken anymore, have any health problems, are sporting a few extra pounds, or do not have the stamina of a well-conditioned athlete, you should not even begin to think about sticking around. If you do not fall into any of these categories,

move on to the next one.

How will your loss effect your friends and loved ones? And by your loss, I mean you.

If you were to die defending your property from an oncoming wildfire, because that may be a very real possibility, what will happen to your family — mentally, emotionally, physically, and financially? Are you still determined to stay?

Do you have any training and experience? What about the proper protective clothing? Any real firefighting

Red Cross to work with Idyllwild disaster preparedness groups

Dr. Dick Goldberg, medical director of Mountain Disaster Preparedness, has long sought to establish a support and training relationship with the American Red Cross — a relationship that acknowledges the Hill would likely be cut off for an extended period if a major earthquake strikes. Key to those plans would be training of locals to open and manage shelters, since Idyllwild would likely be inaccessible to off-Hill Red Cross personnel after a disaster.

On Wednesday, May 8, Goldberg said he was pleased with the fruit of those efforts. Hill disaster preparation volunteers attended a standing room only meeting with Irene Long, Red Cross Disaster Services manager for Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino counties and Chris Fielder, her chapter's volunteer coordinator. Long enthusiastically promised to support Hill volunteers in becoming certified in Red Cross disaster response courses. She demonstrated her commitment with a pledge to provide requested instruction locally rather than requiring Hill volunteers to travel to Riverside.

"It's extraordinary they [Long and Fielder] would

be willing to do this given their resources are stretched so thin," Goldberg said.

Both Long and Fielder said they were impressed with the turnout and anxious to begin training Idyllwild volunteers. After Fielder's presentation about Red Cross history and how the organization functions today in disaster response and relief, Idyllwild volunteers began registering online with Fielder's two laptops that he had brought for that purpose.

Of particular interest to Idyllwild disaster volunteers was a Red Cross training unit called Disaster Action Team. According to Long, Disaster Action Teams respond to single and multi-family disasters as well as larger incidents. As part of that response, teams

access disaster scenes and determine what support is needed from the Red Cross to immediately assist those in need. Teams are authorized to provide food for a week, clothing, lodging assistance in a hotel or motel and support with general health, as well as mental health services as needed.

Of primary importance to the Hill is certification of Idyllwild School as a designated shelter, a process that has already begun. "Idyllwild School is designated as an emergency shelter," Goldberg said. "The contract has yet to be formalized."

Once formalized, certification would enable Goldberg and his nursing staff to establish an emergency surgical center at the school. "MDP

will enter into an agreement with Red Cross where we will be providing treatment," he said.

He also noted the likely shelter relationship with Red Cross would be either a partner or supported shelter. In a "partnered" shelter, administrative control is by the Red Cross with all shelter operational expenses borne by the Red Cross. In a "supported" relationship, administrative control is local, by an organization such as MDP, and Red Cross assists with shelter operation expenses.

Post-disaster medical treatment in Idyllwild would be similar to what Goldberg did when he went to Louisiana after Hurricane Katrina and established a medical facility to treat evacuees. "There were 1,000 displaced people in the shelter," Goldberg remembered. "The Red Cross provided 3,000 meals a day as well as clothing, shelter and safety. I was so incredibly impressed with what a resource the Red Cross is."

Given Idyllwild's isolation, it could be up to two weeks or more before outside help could arrive, Goldberg stressed. Long opined that it could be up to six weeks. Long and Fielding stressed the importance of having a large supply of water. "Store five cases of water per person," Fielder said.

Fielder also discussed a Red Cross program called Map Your Neighborhood. "Make a list of 20 people in your neighborhood who you can get to within an hour. Call a meeting in your home to prepare a neighborhood disaster plan. See preparedness.org/blog/tag/map-your-neighborhood/ for additional information.

Of the turnout for the meeting, Goldberg, a retired emergency room physician said, "It seems clear there is a critical mass in the community that are interested in taking responsibility for disaster preparedness." Sixteen Idyllwild and Pine Cove locals registered on

the Red Cross volunteer site at the meeting, according to Fielder. "I can't tell you how impressed we are with the community and its desire to be prepared," he said.

At present, there are only two locals certified by Red Cross to open and staff a shelter. Many more are needed Goldberg urged. See www.redcross.org/ca/riverside/volunteer for information on how to register as a Red Cross volunteer or contact Chris Fielder at christopher.fielder@redcross.org or call (888) 831-0031, ext. 2013.

a groundwater over purge event was conducted for approximately six hours on well MW-2 using a vacuum truck. All of the remediation projects have resulted in substantial reduction and near elimination of the hydrocarbon presence.

The case began with the removal of two 4,000-gallon underground storage

tanks in October 1994. Hydrocarbons were then detected in the soil and near the surface.

Cheryl Crane, Lana Turner's daughter, discusses her life and book

Cheryl Crane, Lana Turner's only child, opens Eduardo Santiago's third Author Series. She'll discuss her autobiographical book, "Detour: A Hollywood Story" (Arbor House, 1988). The book offers a look inside her storybook youth as the child of one of the biggest stars in Hollywood and a single incident that dramatically changed the story.

Crane remembers Hollywood in its post-war heyday and the exuberant glamour and excitement of the restaurants, clubs and nightlife of which her mother was such a public part. She recalls enjoying the privileges that came with being the child of a movie star. "It was wonderful," she said, "a bit lonely, but basically I enjoyed my life."

"It was a company town, a small town where you knew everyone in the business. The studios ran the town," Crane related. "They could kill a photo or a story, they had that

much power."

But one story the studios could not kill was one that overnight thrust Crane and her mother into the glare of the tabloid and mainstream press. Crane's life changed when, at the age of 14, fearing for her mother's life, she stabbed to death Turner's then lover, small-time gangster Johnny Stompanato.

Crane had overheard Stompanato threaten to

kill her mother. Although the court ruled the action justifiable homicide, Crane was still sentenced to juvenile hall.

In her book, Crane talks about how the stabbing changed her life and launched a detour of negative behavior that could have ended very badly for her. Instead, at 18, she began working for her father, restaurateur Stephen Crane, owner of the famed Luau Restaurant on Rodeo Drive in Beverly Hills and worked her way into a managerial position. Ending the long detour that followed the stabbing, Crane went on to fashion a career as a high-end real estate agent.

For many years Crane would not publicly discuss April 4, 1958, the night of the killing. But in an interview, she admitted to reading so many inaccuracies and stories about that night and her actions that she felt she had to tell her story. Writing the book, published in 1988 with author Cliff Jahr, provided Crane both a personal release and closure.

"I needed to write the book to close that door," Crane said. "It was tremendously cathartic and kind of put the cap on that part of my life."

"Detour: A Hollywood Story" was on the New York Times bestseller list for 18 weeks. "It was much bigger than I expected," she remembered. "I was interviewed on the Today Show, by Bryant Gumbel, for three days in succession. I was terrified. I guess I expected a lot of negativity." But she recalls the interview as kind and respectful, which is also how she characterized reader response, as evidenced by the many letters she received after its publication. "They thanked me for writing the book," she said. "One even said she gave it to her mother and that it brought them closer together."

As to the successful life she built in business and with her partner Joyce "Josh" LeRoy, Crane said, "I'm optimistic and try to see the best in people. I'm not the type who holds onto the dark. I am a survivor."

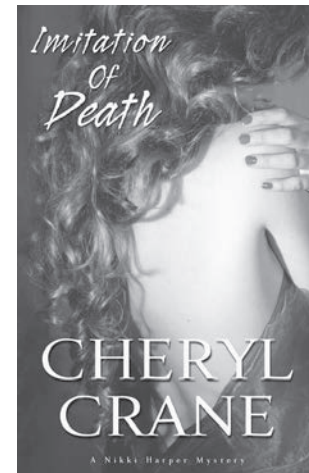
Crane wrote another book about her mother, with pictures of and vignettes about her organized around things her mother liked — homes, hats, pets, cars and personal friends. "Lana, the Memories, the Myths, the Movies (Running Press, 2008)," features hundreds of never-before-seen photos from Crane's private collection. Questioned about

what she meant in the title by myths about her mother, Crane said, "She was really spectacular. Some said she was cold. She wasn't. She had a fabulous sense of humor and loved to play practical jokes. She would go to elaborate lengths to put them [the practical jokes] together." Crane said that in public Turner was always the star, well dressed and coiffed as part of the studio star system, but at home she was down to earth and great fun.

Crane has authored two mystery novels and is now finishing the third in her Nikki Harper series, due to be published in August. "You write what you know," said Crane of her mysteries that feature a movie star mother, a real estate agent to the stars, and authentic restaurants, nightclubs and settings in Hollywood and Beverly Hills.

Crane appears at 3 p.m. Sunday, May 19, on the upper deck of Café Aroma.

Art Alliance launches deer project

The Art Alliance of Idyllwild is on a mission to enhance Idyllwild's reputation for art by establishing a new marketing niche as a public arts town. Planning is underway to permanently install 15 full-size aluminum deer in 10 public locations throughout the village. Local artists will use acrylics to paint each deer with its own individual theme. "We want to extend the goal of Chris Trout when she founded the Art Alliance in 1998, to make Idyllwild known as an arts community and a

destination for cultural tourists," said project manager Shanna Robb.

Although Idyllwild has been recognized in the past for its numerous art galleries, AAI's deer project aims to take Idyllwild art from within galleries to outdoor public locations accessible to all. The project is, according to Robb and AAI President Gary Kuscher, the first of many planned public art projects.

The 15 deer each weigh more than 60 pounds and stand nearly 5 feet tall, with bucks and does larger and the five fawns smaller. The bucks and does have

their heads raised measuring 53 inches long and 55 tall, five doe, heads raised, 53 inches long and 47 tall and the five fawns 31 inches long, 27 tall, are grazing with heads down. Each recycled aluminum deer will be painted to celebrate a cultural or historical theme characteristic of Idyllwild — such as hiking, film, art, music, logging, Native American influence, wildlife, flora, or seasons. The AAI board decides which themes will be used and assigns them to the individual artists.

"This is a community project," said Robb, who

said she welcomes community input. "Art will be appropriate for all audiences, including children and will stress AAI's mission to promote art through education, creativity and exhibition." Artists would be able to choose representational or abstract styles.

AAI President Kuscher noted public art confers numerous benefits in towns and cities in which it is displayed. "It promotes tourism, creates joy, increases foot traffic that benefits local stores and restaurants, beautifies the business district and builds a sense of community," he said. "This

project could not be done without Robb's expertise and extensive project management background. She's thought through everything," he said. In answer to questions about art placement, insurance, liability, and ownership of the finished art, Robb produced forms to be signed by both artist and land or business owner clarifying project requirements and responsibilities. Completed art is owned by AAI, including use of image for publicity purposes.

AAI will both insure and maintain the artists' *See Deer, page 15*

creations, including resealing when necessary. It also agrees to defend and indemnify any land or business owner on which the art is placed from liability and claims of damage, whether from personal injury or property damage. Each "Permissive Land/Use Agreement" is terminable, with or without cause, for any or no reason, by either party with 30 days notice.

The progenitor for this kind of public art was the international "Cow Parade" project in which artists painted life-size fiberglass cow sculptures. Originated in Zurich, Switzerland, by sculptor Pascal Knapp, the project spread first to Chicago in the U.S. and then to every continent except Antarctica. After months of public exhibition, the painted cows were then auctioned for charity.

Robb and Kuscher stressed deer installations would be permanent, memorializing the donors and the artists and designed to tell Idyllwild's story — what it was, has been and is known for. "The installations will promote conversation about the village and its history," said Robb.

Artists agree by contract with AAI that their artwork must be free of political views or any other content that could be considered inappropriate for the general public including children. The finished art cannot contain logos, commercial advertising or specific website or business addresses. It must simply be art which when completed, becomes the property of AAI with all appurtenant rights.

Artists, all of whom must be dues-paid AAI members, will be notified of selection on June 2. Two weeks later, the deer will be available for artists to pick up. Artists must complete their deer by

mid-September. AAI's plan is to have all 15 in place by its Saturday, Oct. 12, Art Walk & Wine Tasting event.

As of this writing, eight of 10 deer installation sites have been approved: Café Aroma, Idyllwild Inn, Spruce Moose at the Fort, BBVA Bank, Idyllwild Area Historical Society, the Nature Center, Village Centre and Oakwood Village. Two additional sites, one county, one federal, are awaiting contract or supervisory approval.

Each deer will have its own informational plaque. In addition, a larger plaque will be installed at Village Centre explaining the genesis and purpose of the project.

Of fifteen sponsorships available at \$475 each, nine are confirmed, leaving four

remaining opportunities. Organizers cite reasons for sponsorship as gifts to family members as living legacies, creation of public art as living history, and support of Idyllwild artists. Although some businesses have agreed to sponsorships, the majority of sponsors at this point are families.

All donations or sponsorships are tax-deductible, said Kuscher. Robb, the public face of the project, said she welcomes community input and questions. Contact her at srobb@givingyoutime.com. For more information about the project and sponsorship opportunities, see www.art-idyllwild.org.

homeowners abate their properties — removing hazardous ‘fuels’ and bringing their properties into compliance with fire code. The removed trees are cut into firewood, often made available to low-income and senior individuals, and other ‘green’ waste is chipped into mulch or taken to a biomass plant where it is turned into energy,” Owens wrote summarizing some of the reasons for the MCFSC Greenwood Award this year.

The grant request for funds to help homeowners replace cedar shake roofs with fire-safe shingles is another example of changing community attitude, added director Tom McCullough.

When the idea was first

proposed, he had a friend question the merit of subsidizing individuals for new roofs. But when it was explained how burning embers can enter homes, cause fire and expand the fire, recognition of its community benefits created supporters.

While its 2012 grant funding is still available, the MCFSC is uncertain what if any funding will be available in 2013. Nevertheless, their efforts in educating the public about the risk of fire in a community on the edge of the forest will continue.

The search for new funds and new funding sources remains a high priority. MCFSC Executive Director Edwina Scott has said the approval of the grant funding for replacing cedar shake roofs has been approved.

The Federal Emergen-

cy Management Agency is providing these funds, MCFSC’s first FEMA grant. But the council is working with FEMA for future grants. According to Scott, the federal agency is more familiar and comfortable making awards for flood threats, but after the roofing grant, they recognized the danger of wildland fires and want to add this category to their grantee list.

“FEMA said they’re willing to learn,” Scott said. “We just have to demonstrate that it’s a high risk hazard.”

Another new focus may be seeking funds for watershed protection. Large wild fires can do great damage to watershed habitat,

so reducing that threat comes from fire safety, Scott said.

One of the Woodies’ new projects is inspecting local oak trees for indications of the Goldspotted oak borer. Inspections can be arranged through the MCFSC, The GSOB hotline number to arrange inspections is (951) 659-8328.

Highlighting this recent threat to the local forest, the Earth Fair committee has asked Kevin Turner, Goldspotted oak borer coordinator for UC Agricultural and Natural Resources at UC Riverside to discuss how Goldspotted oak borer has devastated native oak forests around San Diego and is now here

in Idyllwild and Riverside County. He will be speaking Saturday, May 18 at the fair. Arborist Deborah Geisinger will also be available for more information.

The Greenwood award is annually presented to honor an individual or group for exemplary action in service to our regional environment. Individual recipients of the Greenwood Award have included

Dr. Kate Kramer in 2012, Ina Rae Lengyle and former County Supervisor and Idyllwild resident Kay Cenicerros. Organizations, which have been honored, include Sage Mountain Farm in 2010, the Coachella Valley Mountains Conservancy and the Friends of the San Jacinto County Parks.

Zoo-raised Yellow-legged frogs to be released

Efforts to re-establish the native population of Mountain Yellow-legged Frogs will resume in 2013.

The initial project will be relocating several hundred frogs — sub-adults — in the James Reserve later this spring, according to Adam R. Backlin, ecologist at the U.S. Geological Survey's Western Ecological Research Center in Irvine.

"The last couple of years the captive breeding colony has produced fewer eggs," Backlin explained. Consequently, the project team did not release any tadpoles in 2012. "But this year it will be exciting to attempt to release frogs.

This will have a lot better chance of success."

With fewer tadpoles available last year, the research team raised them at the zoo. Now the tadpoles are adults and the team will be releasing them in a few weeks, Backlin said.

Results of earlier tadpole releases are still uncertain, according to Jennifer Gee, director the James San Jacinto Mountains Reserve. "Last summer, we saw tadpoles here in Indian Creek. I am not sure if those tadpoles survived to mature into frogs, and it has been too cold to survey this year," she said.

Besides the frog release this spring, Backlin is hoping the captive breeding colony will produce a large tadpole cohort this year. If so, he believes another



release of 400 to 500 tadpoles could occur in late summer.

The Hemet Unified School Board has decided to appoint the replacement for resigning trustee Bill Sanborn.

Applications are available on the district's website www.hemetusd.k12.ca.us, at the district office, 1791 W. Acacia Ave., Hemet, or from Superintendent Barry Kayrell's office, (951) 765-5100 ext. 1001.

The submission period began Wednesday, May 8, and applications must be returned to the district's Professional Development Service Center at 1791 W. Acacia Ave., by 5 p.m. Wednesday, May 22.

Applicants must be residents of Trustee Area 1 (see map).

The district board stressed that applications received after the deadline will not be considered.

Interviews may occur at the June 4 Board of Trustees meeting.

"We hope to make the decision in June and give the oath of office before the July 16 meeting," said Marilyn Forst, president of the HUSD Governing Board.

The board chose to make an appointment for the remainder of Sanborn's term, because "It's a lot less expensive than holding a special election," Forst said.

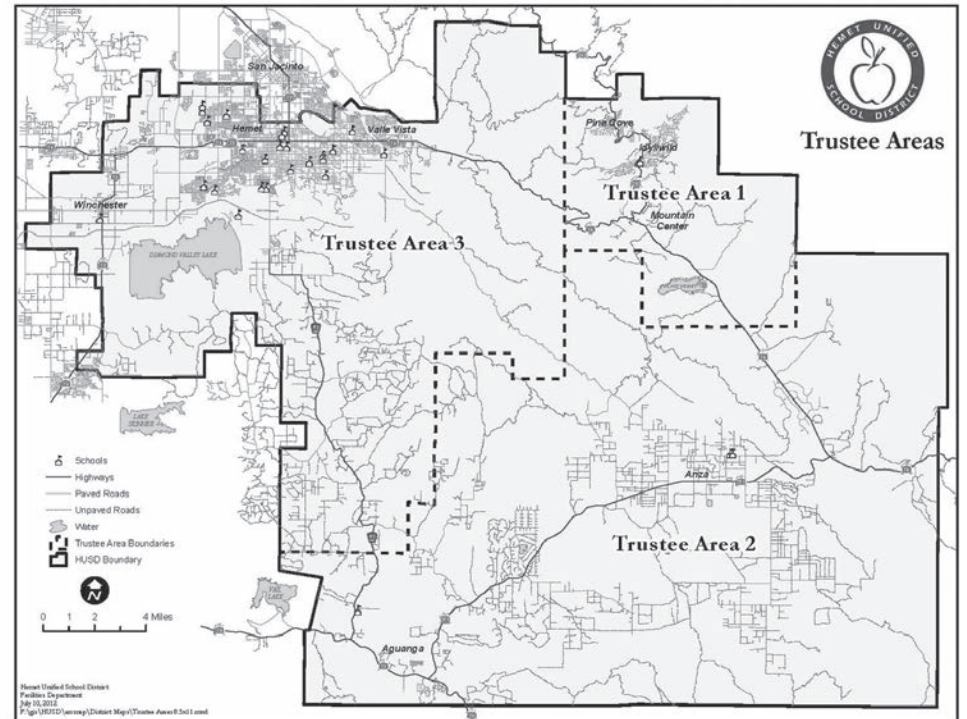
Sanborn is willing to

Pine Cove Water District reviews 2013-14 budget

At its May 8 meeting, the Pine Cove Water District board of directors began reviewing the proposed budget for fiscal year 2013-2014 that begins July 1. Revenue estimates of \$760,000 are the same as this year (2012-13); but expenses increase \$65,000 for a total of \$825,000.

Differences would be made up from a combination of restricted reserves and a \$40,000 carryover for the current budget year. No rate increase will be needed to cover this difference.

The \$15,000 additional in salaries and benefits is primarily for a 3.5 percent cost of living raise; overtime for

a part-time employee from June through September to assist in pipeline replacement; PERS contributions and medical and life insurance. These increases are partially offset by reductions in other tax payments (such as FICA) and worker's compensation.

The improvement account grows \$11,000. More than \$40,000 is for main line replacement work, which is partially offset with decreases in source development and well replacements.

The largest change is \$33,000 for post-employment benefits (typical health insurance). This is unfunded and this amount is about a third of the total due. The board will consider paying it sooner depending upon the

result of the state's return of other money due the district. The board will vote on the joining CalPERS Retirement Benefit Trust and decide on what investment strategy to adopt.

The board voted to adopt resolutions setting district policy regarding the Ralph M. Brown Act, the Public Records Act, conflicts of interest, financial reserves and workman's comp.

In his report, General Manager Jerry Holldber noted recent rainfall has helped district wells. "All are in good shape," Holldber said. Production is down slightly from April 2012 levels (2.2 million gallons compared to last year's 2.4 million) but 300,000 gallons more than 2011.

Grading has begun on the lot across from the Pine Cove Water District offices that will soon house additional CAL FIRE Station 23 personnel in a temporary trailer. The trailer is needed to house fire staff for the new Schedule B engine that is being brought to Station 23. The district has a month-to-month agreement with CAL FIRE for renting the property at \$500 per month. Holldber estimates the rental period to last for one to two years.

State Health Inspector Chun Huang said the district system was very well maintained, according to Holldber.

"Whatever furniture or office supplies are left at the end of the month, could be stored in the bus," Jerome said.

Only two general members, Smith and Marge Muir of the Idyllwild Association of Realtors, attended in response to Jerome's call for a committee. Local innkeeper Chris Singer and Idyllwild Town Crier Publisher Grace Reed had previously told Jerome they would serve on the dissolution committee. Chris Titus, previous

Chamber president, could not attend but has been asked to serve.

Jerome has continued, in the face of members' lack of interest, to perform Chamber dissolution functions in accordance with Chamber bylaws and state law. He said the next step is to convene the committee and, assuming there are nonprofits interested in receiving Chamber property, dispose of it by the end of the month.

In reviewing Chamber financial books, Jerome discovered balances of \$600 in checking and \$700 in the monumnet account, with

no outstanding bills and a likely final utility bill for the Chamber office of \$400. The small group present discussed giving any remaining cash to the HELP Center.

The Chamber office closes on May 31. Titus, Jerome and Singer had jointly funded office rent for May.

There was a time when there were two Chambers in town. Now there is no organization charged with representing and advancing the interests of town businesses. Longtime resident Muir advocated for a successor organization to perform functions vital to town business. But, if the

slow death of the Chamber and the disinterest of the general membership in the organization's survival or asset dispersal is any indication, an immediate successor to this Chamber seems unlikely.

Death by lawsuit and dissolution by default are sad ends to an organization that once appeared healthy, committed to the community, staged rollicking mixers, had a full board of directors, and had optimism about Idyllwild and its role in promoting it.

abuse alcohol or drugs. We can avoid unhealthy environments. Our risk for a disease or an injury is determined, among others, by our sex, race, family history, age, occupation, personal behavior, social environment and access to health care.

In the U.S., cigarette smoking is responsible for 90 percent of lung cancers. Despite this fact, 45 million people continue to smoke in the U.S. It is estimated that 160,000 Americans died of lung cancer in 2012. Ninety percent of these deaths were preventable, 90 percent!

The financial burden on health care for lung cancer alone is about \$10 billion annually. The number of lung cancer deaths, a preventable condition, is the same as the combined deaths from colon, breast and prostate cancers.

In addition, chronic smoking causes emphysema, which is among the three respiratory diseases, asthma and chronic bronchitis being the other two, responsible for a large number of people disabled and now the fourth cause of death in the U.S. following heart disease, cancer and stroke.

We have seen a significant increase in asthma, especially among young children. The fact that this increase is more intense in large inner cities would indicate that environmental exposure is most likely one of the important causes.

One in eight women will develop breast cancer over their lifetime. But only one in 36 will die as result of breast cancer due to the benefits of modern medicine. The changes in risk, especially over time, may be due to social or environmental changes.

The death rate for lung cancer risk in females in the 1960s was less than five per 100,000. At that time the death rate for breast cancer was about 30 per 100,000. In 1987, following a remarkable change in the American society, the breast cancer risk of death remained the same but the risk of death due to lung cancer is now greater than breast cancer. Presently the risk of dying of lung cancer is twice the risk of breast cancer in women. Quoting an old commercial, “You’ve come a long way, baby.”

Risks of any type must be placed into perspective. For instance, the death risk for breast cancer is almost identical to the risk of dying of an accidental injury. The lesson here is that as much as we are concerned about mammograms we must also be concerned, for instance, about auto accidents and the most common causes of it,

ment. ignore mandatory evacuation orders and to place the liability back on the person or the estate of the person who ignores mandatory evacuation orders.

This means that should this come to pass, not only could you be charged with a crime, you could be held liable for any cost, injury or death incurred as a result of your failure to respond appropriately to mandatory evacuation orders.

Now let’s consider what really should make or break the decision after all the aforementioned is contemplated — maybe even before.

Is your property even defensible? Think about all those things that we discussed previously — defensible space, noncombustible construction, etc.

The time to prepare is before you need to do anything, not at the time

of the emergency. If you find yourself trying to prepare during the emergency, it is more likely too late. There is no sense in sticking around if you are going to be fighting a losing battle.

What about your water supply? Is a little garden hose or sprinkler really going to do any good against a fast-moving fire in heavy fuels (lots of brush and debris or large trees)? There are ways to make the most of your water or even pretreat your property so that you can just evacuate.

There are products out there that can help to defend against an oncoming wildfire. They have their application, but they are not a “cure-all,” nor do they replace all those things we discussed that lend themselves to good prevention.

These products are not available at your corner

speeding and drunken driving.

There is a silver lining in this area. Because of regulatory efforts and the increased safety awareness by the auto industry, the year 2011 had the lowest incidence of auto accident deaths since 1949.

What we do for a living also determines our risk. Most of the time we associate risk with certain professions, men and women that put themselves daily in harm’s way, like police officers or firefighters. This is not accurate; in reality the most dangerous occupations are fishermen and women, timber cutters, pilots and construction workers.

There has been a significant emphasis on control of excessive body weight and high blood pressure. Both are of enormous importance for a healthy life.

But we must also bear in mind that unreasonable exposure to sunlight without sunscreen, the use of tanning salons, exposure to dangerous illegal drugs and abuse of “legal” pharmaceuticals also play an important role.

At the end we have to contend with the same issue with which I started this column; there are certain risks that are not within our control and some that are. It is up to all of us to minimize our risks in areas where something can be done.

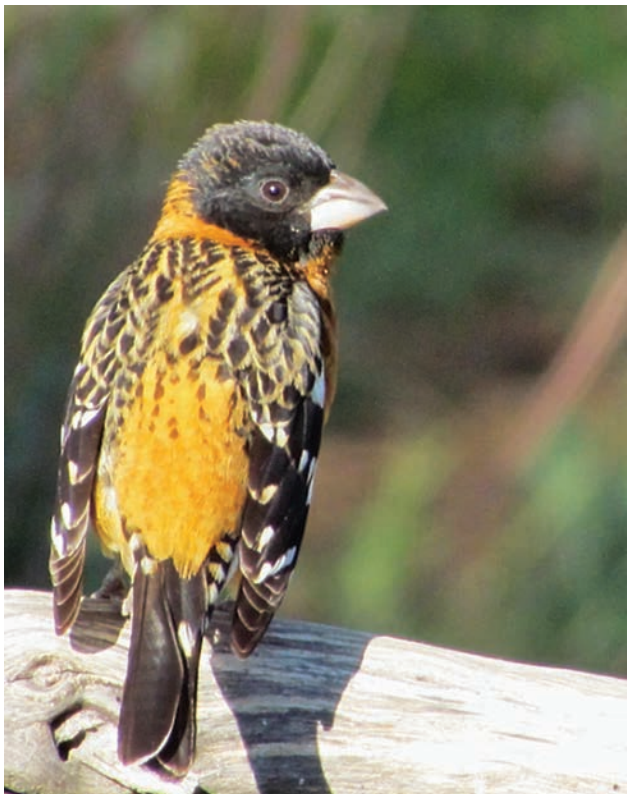

American Cancer Society seeks Inland Empire volunteers for generational study

The American Cancer Society is looking to local residents to help in a historic research study. Cancer Prevention Study-3 (CPS-3) will give scientists a better understanding of cancer causes and prevention. The Society is looking for Inland Empire men and women between the ages of 30 and 65 from various racial and ethnic backgrounds with no personal history of cancer to help reach full enrollment of at least 300,000 people in the U.S., including 400 people in the Inland Empire. If you are eligible to participate, visit www.cps3inlandempire.org to make an appointment.

Signing up requires a one-time, in-person visit to read and sign a consent form, complete a survey, have a waist measurement, and give a small nonfasting blood sample, similar to what you'd do during a routine doctor visit. Participants will also complete a more detailed survey at home and will continue to receive periodic follow-up surveys over the next 20 to 30 years that researchers will use to look for more clues to cancer's causes.

2013 Spring Wildflower report

Another season has come to Idyllwild with the rain in May helping things along. I have made it my goal to study all the lupine species and subspecies on the mountain and photograph them in bloom. I will publish my findings when this project is complete.

So far I have found references to nine species or varieties that have been found on the Hill. There may be as many as 42 species in Riverside County according to the Calflora listings; but I am only interested in the species that grow in and around Idyllwild and the higher elevations.

Right now, the "Lupine Report" (as I call it) has

photos for dwarf, grape soda, and bajada lupines with more to come as the season progresses.

I have already located Parish's lupine although they are not blooming as of yet.

I am looking for the white-flowered variety of the grape soda lupine so if any of my readers know where they can be found I would appreciate it they would let me know.

The white-flowered lupine used to be common in the 1970s but I have not seen one in a very long time.

A good spot to see grape soda lupines is at the end of the road out toward the dam at Lake Hemet. There are lots of large plants to the right at the end of the road.

Other recent sightings include mountain pink currant, dollar plant Lunaria annua and lots of wild strawberries in bloom just downstream from the Highway 243 bridge at Strawberry Creek. Scarlet and purple penstemon are blooming down off Saunders Meadow Road by the transfer station.

INITIAL THOUGHTS

Happy endings not on horizon of local dramas ...



When you read this column, Idyllwild Fire's May 14 meeting will already have occurred. Nevertheless, one of the agenda items merits some discussion and next week, I'll report on the action at the meeting.

In the previous episode of this soap opera, we left IFPD with the discovery of a missing \$100,000. They were planning on a "meet and confer" session with the Idyllwild Career Firefighters Association before last night's meeting.

Apparently they met, but the issue is not on the agenda and neither is a financial report. Perhaps it will be for the May 28 meeting, which leaves them 33 days until the end of the current fiscal year.

However, on the agenda is a proposed contract to hire somebody for bookkeeping and accounting services.

There's no mention of the possible cost for this contract. But they have a service agreement with Nancy Layton for \$250 weekly. She is the third person performing this function in the past three years.

Please understand no one has mentioned Nancy with this current lapse. It appears to have started before her agreement with the commission last June.

They also have an administrative captain. One of his responsibilities is "development and determining accurate budgets and accounting issues of the fire department."

He has actually been involved with the preparation and management of Idyllwild's budget since former Chief Steve Kunkle managed the department.

The administrative captain was the second highest paid member of the department last year according to the IFPD report to the state controller's office. He made nearly \$143,000, more than three fire chiefs or the captain.

Of course much of that was overtime, but how much time was devoted to those accurate accounting issues?

The administrative captain negotiates for the Association. In most organizations, the budget decisions are clearly management's responsibility, so it seems a conflict for an association member (i.e., union rep) to oversee the budget process, then negotiate against it.

So where will this money for the new financial contractor come from? Perhaps some combination of these two sums will cover the new contract; but how they will pay for it is not mentioned in the agenda.

In the last episode, Commissioner Jerry Buchanan said IFPD would probably generate another deficit this year.

Also on the agenda is preparing the third consecutive request for an advance of property tax revenue, which is due in December.

Keep tuned in on the continuing saga of your public monies managed at IFPD.

Oh yeah, they plan to raise ambulance rates? Let's ask why, since nearly 75 percent of the department's cost is for salaries and benefits, which didn't change this year.

Idyllwild Chamber

Another local soap is approaching its finale.

It is a shame that the Chamber of Commerce is dissolving. But one can't blame people for being reluctant to expose themselves to personal financial liability for actions taken by predecessors.

I've often written of the many volunteer groups in town. We depend on them and they are essential to our community, but none has the responsibility of courting visitors to Idyllwild year round.

The festivals do it for their specific event, and credit the Art Alliance, which does sponsor events throughout the year.

Perhaps in the future a replacement will arise from these ashes.

Just remember more than 50 years ago, the town had two chambers.

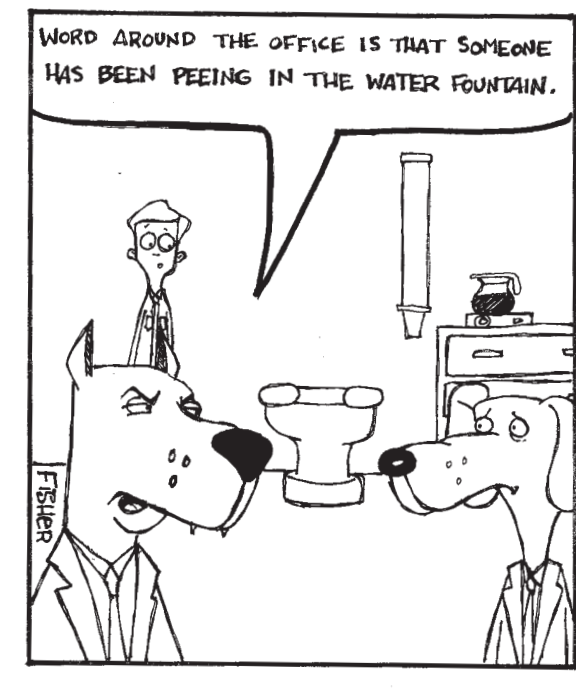
As I began reading Jeff Smith's latest letter [see the May 9 issue of the Town Crier], I thought "Oh, boy, he's at it again."

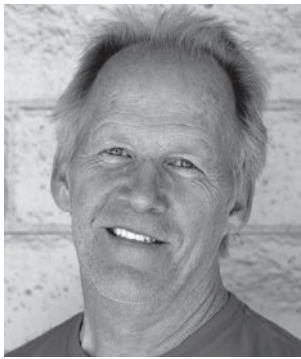

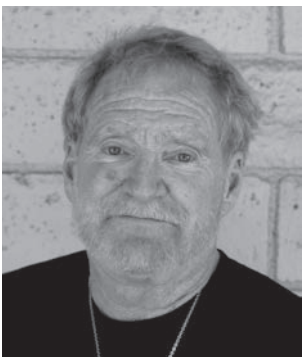

TODAY'S HEALTH ISSUES

Risky business ...

A year ago, I saw a cartoon with two people sitting across from each other at a table. One said, "I remember when we used to sit and talk about our problems over cigarettes and coffee. Now cigarettes and coffee ARE our problems."

The TV, internet and papers bombard us day and night with the next big problem. The more sensational they can make it, the more they know we will read it.

But sifting the rumors from the facts can be daunting even for a professional. This is just the briefest of outlines to get you started.

You must use your common sense and also question the sources of information and how much this new material may impact you.

This is difficult to do especially with the Internet. The levels of authority are often problematic. We may have a blogger quoting the National Institute of Health or quoting his grandmother. Unless he or she makes it clear, it is impossible for the reader to sort out.

Health risk assessment is a complex issue where multiple factors may play a very important role. There are some factors that we can do little about, like genetics. We may be at higher risk for a particular cancer if several relatives of our family had that cancer.

There is a difference between genetic risks and familial risks. For example, we may be at higher risk for developing colon cancer because members of our family had it. This is genetics. On the other hand, we may be at risk for lung cancer or other respiratory conditions because of secondhand smoke where we grew up; this is familial. These risks are sometimes manageable while genetics is not.

At the other extreme we have diseases of lifestyle and behavior that are under our control. We can elect not to

Collective amnesia ...

Well, the first bill submitted by freshman Senator Elizabeth Warren attempts to lower student loan rates down to the same rate given to banks by the Federal Reserve.

Starting July 1, student loan rates are scheduled to double from 3.4 percent to 6.8 percent, while banks borrow money at a rate of .75 percent.

Once again Congress shows the American people where their allegiance lies, and I've got news for you, it's not with the middle class. I applaud Sen. Warren for hitting the ground running.

What's disturbing to me is the collective amnesia that has taken over the country. These are the same banks that are responsible for the worst economic collapse since the Great Depression, who have already benefitted from government assistance and are now making money hand over fist during the recovery; look at the recent profits Bank of America has posted. (In April, the Bank of America Corporation reported net income of \$2.6 billion for the first quarter of 2013 compared to \$653 million in the first quarter of 2012. Revenue, net of interest expense basis, rose 5 percent to \$23.7 billion from \$22.5 billion a year ago.)

The same banks that have withheld money, earmarked for debt relief, from the very homeowners and buyers it was intended to assist. And yet, it's back to business as usual and we don't bat an eye.

Bravo, Sen. Warren, for leading the charge in a fight that the American people are disinterested in, a fight with which we would just rather not be bothered.

How soon we forget the lessons of the past six years, or of the last 25 years. Those who forget the past are forced to re-live it. What happened to our outrage?

Fight or flight? To stay and fight or evacuate from an approaching wildland fire

It's late in the afternoon, and the air is hot, and smoky. The wind is increasing and sirens can be heard in the not so far distance. Down the street comes a police car with its lights flashing, broadcasting the message to evacuate the area immediately because of an oncoming wildfire.

What do you do? Do you stay and try to defend your property or do you evacuate as directed?

Previously I wrote about preparing your house and property for the wildland fire season. Have you started to get ready? Or are you still thinking about it?

Well, the time is now because fire season is already here! This will be a major factor if you should try to defend against an oncoming wildfire or evacuate for safety's sake.

It is also the time to prepare yourself and family should you find yourself in the position of having to evacuate — whether it be for a wildland fire,

earthquake, flood, or other disaster.

If you think you are going to stay, you need to consider some very important factors. The first one is you. Age, general health, and physical ability are probably the most important.

If you are not a spring chicken anymore, have any health problems, are sporting a few extra pounds, or do not have the stamina of a well-conditioned athlete, you should not even begin to think about sticking around. If you do not fall into any of these categories,

move on to the next one.

How will your loss effect your friends and loved ones? And by your loss, I mean you.

If you were to die defending your property from an oncoming wildfire, because that may be a very real possibility, what will happen to your family — mentally, emotionally, physically, and financially? Are you still determined to stay?

Do you have any training and experience? What about the proper protective clothing? Any real firefighting

Red Cross to work with Idyllwild disaster preparedness groups

Dr. Dick Goldberg, medical director of Mountain Disaster Preparedness, has long sought to establish a support and training relationship with the American Red Cross — a relationship that acknowledges the Hill would likely be cut off for an extended period if a major earthquake strikes. Key to those plans would be training of locals to open and manage shelters, since Idyllwild would likely be inaccessible to off-Hill Red Cross personnel after a disaster.

On Wednesday, May 8, Goldberg said he was pleased with the fruit of those efforts. Hill disaster preparation volunteers attended a standing room only meeting with Irene Long, Red Cross Disaster Services manager for Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino counties and Chris Fielder, her chapter's volunteer coordinator. Long enthusiastically promised to support Hill volunteers in becoming certified in Red Cross disaster response courses. She demonstrated her commitment with a pledge to provide requested instruction locally rather than requiring Hill volunteers to travel to Riverside.

"It's extraordinary they [Long and Fielder] would

be willing to do this given their resources are stretched so thin," Goldberg said.

Both Long and Fielder said they were impressed with the turnout and anxious to begin training Idyllwild volunteers. After Fielder's presentation about Red Cross history and how the organization functions today in disaster response and relief, Idyllwild volunteers began registering online with Fielder's two laptops that he had brought for that purpose.

Of particular interest to Idyllwild disaster volunteers was a Red Cross training unit called Disaster Action Team. According to Long, Disaster Action Teams respond to single and multi-family disasters as well as larger incidents. As part of that response, teams

access disaster scenes and determine what support is needed from the Red Cross to immediately assist those in need. Teams are authorized to provide food for a week, clothing, lodging assistance in a hotel or motel and support with general health, as well as mental health services as needed.

Of primary importance to the Hill is certification of Idyllwild School as a designated shelter, a process that has already begun. "Idyllwild School is designated as an emergency shelter," Goldberg said. "The contract has yet to be formalized."

Once formalized, certification would enable Goldberg and his nursing staff to establish an emergency surgical center at the school. "MDP

will enter into an agreement with Red Cross where we will be providing treatment," he said.

He also noted the likely shelter relationship with Red Cross would be either a partner or supported shelter. In a "partnered" shelter, administrative control is by the Red Cross with all shelter operational expenses borne by the Red Cross. In a "supported" relationship, administrative control is local, by an organization such as MDP, and Red Cross assists with shelter operation expenses.

Post-disaster medical treatment in Idyllwild would be similar to what Goldberg did when he went to Louisiana after Hurricane Katrina and established a medical facility to treat evacuees. "There were 1,000 displaced people in the shelter," Goldberg remembered. "The Red Cross provided 3,000 meals a day as well as clothing, shelter and safety. I was so incredibly impressed with what a resource the Red Cross is."

Given Idyllwild's isolation, it could be up to two weeks or more before outside help could arrive, Goldberg stressed. Long opined that it could be up to six weeks. Long and Fielding stressed the importance of having a large supply of water. "Store five cases of water per person," Fielder said.

Fielder also discussed a Red Cross program called Map Your Neighborhood. "Make a list of 20 people in your neighborhood who you can get to within an hour. Call a meeting in your home to prepare a neighborhood disaster plan. See preparedness.org/blog/tag/map-your-neighborhood/ for additional information.

Of the turnout for the meeting, Goldberg, a retired emergency room physician said, "It seems clear there is a critical mass in the community that are interested in taking responsibility for disaster preparedness." Sixteen Idyllwild and Pine Cove locals registered on

the Red Cross volunteer site at the meeting, according to Fielder. "I can't tell you how impressed we are with the community and its desire to be prepared," he said.

At present, there are only two locals certified by Red Cross to open and staff a shelter. Many more are needed Goldberg urged. See www.redcross.org/ca/riverside/volunteer for information on how to register as a Red Cross volunteer or contact Chris Fielder at christopher.fielder@redcross.org or call (888) 831-0031, ext. 2013.

a groundwater over purge event was conducted for approximately six hours on well MW-2 using a vacuum truck. All of the remediation projects have resulted in substantial reduction and near elimination of the hydrocarbon presence.

The case began with the removal of two 4,000-gallon underground storage

tanks in October 1994. Hydrocarbons were then detected in the soil and near the surface.

Cheryl Crane, Lana Turner's daughter, discusses her life and book

Cheryl Crane, Lana Turner's only child, opens Eduardo Santiago's third Author Series. She'll discuss her autobiographical book, "Detour: A Hollywood Story" (Arbor House, 1988). The book offers a look inside her storybook youth as the child of one of the biggest stars in Hollywood and a single incident that dramatically changed the story.

Crane remembers Hollywood in its post-war heyday and the exuberant glamour and excitement of the restaurants, clubs and nightlife of which her mother was such a public part. She recalls enjoying the privileges that came with being the child of a movie star. "It was wonderful," she said, "a bit lonely, but basically I enjoyed my life."

"It was a company town, a small town where you knew everyone in the business. The studios ran the town," Crane related. "They could kill a photo or a story, they had that

much power."

But one story the studios could not kill was one that overnight thrust Crane and her mother into the glare of the tabloid and mainstream press. Crane's life changed when, at the age of 14, fearing for her mother's life, she stabbed to death Turner's then lover, small-time gangster Johnny Stompanato.

Crane had overheard Stompanato threaten to

kill her mother. Although the court ruled the action justifiable homicide, Crane was still sentenced to juvenile hall.

In her book, Crane talks about how the stabbing changed her life and launched a detour of negative behavior that could have ended very badly for her. Instead, at 18, she began working for her father, restaurateur Stephen Crane, owner of the famed Luau Restaurant on Rodeo Drive in Beverly Hills and worked her way into a managerial position. Ending the long detour that followed the stabbing, Crane went on to fashion a career as a high-end real estate agent.

For many years Crane would not publicly discuss April 4, 1958, the night of the killing. But in an interview, she admitted to reading so many inaccuracies and stories about that night and her actions that she felt she had to tell her story. Writing the book, published in 1988 with author Cliff Jahr, provided Crane both a personal release and closure.

"I needed to write the book to close that door," Crane said. "It was tremendously cathartic and kind of put the cap on that part of my life."

"Detour: A Hollywood Story" was on the New York Times bestseller list for 18 weeks. "It was much bigger than I expected," she remembered. "I was interviewed on the Today Show, by Bryant Gumbel, for three days in succession. I was terrified. I guess I expected a lot of negativity." But she recalls the interview as kind and respectful, which is also how she characterized reader response, as evidenced by the many letters she received after its publication. "They thanked me for writing the book," she said. "One even said she gave it to her mother and that it brought them closer together."

As to the successful life she built in business and with her partner Joyce "Josh" LeRoy, Crane said, "I'm optimistic and try to see the best in people. I'm not the type who holds onto the dark. I am a survivor."

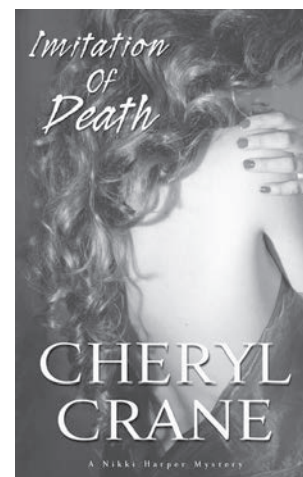
Crane wrote another book about her mother, with pictures of and vignettes about her organized around things her mother liked — homes, hats, pets, cars and personal friends. "Lana, the Memories, the Myths, the Movies (Running Press, 2008)," features hundreds of never-before-seen photos from Crane's private collection. Questioned about

what she meant in the title by myths about her mother, Crane said, "She was really spectacular. Some said she was cold. She wasn't. She had a fabulous sense of humor and loved to play practical jokes. She would go to elaborate lengths to put them [the practical jokes] together." Crane said that in public Turner was always the star, well dressed and coiffed as part of the studio star system, but at home she was down to earth and great fun.

Crane has authored two mystery novels and is now finishing the third in her Nikki Harper series, due to be published in August. "You write what you know," said Crane of her mysteries that feature a movie star mother, a real estate agent to the stars, and authentic restaurants, nightclubs and settings in Hollywood and Beverly Hills.

Crane appears at 3 p.m. Sunday, May 19, on the upper deck of Café Aroma.

Art Alliance launches deer project

The Art Alliance of Idyllwild is on a mission to enhance Idyllwild's reputation for art by establishing a new marketing niche as a public arts town. Planning is underway to permanently install 15 full-size aluminum deer in 10 public locations throughout the village. Local artists will use acrylics to paint each deer with its own individual theme. "We want to extend the goal of Chris Trout when she founded the Art Alliance in 1998, to make Idyllwild known as an arts community and a

destination for cultural tourists," said project manager Shanna Robb.

Although Idyllwild has been recognized in the past for its numerous art galleries, AAI's deer project aims to take Idyllwild art from within galleries to outdoor public locations accessible to all. The project is, according to Robb and AAI President Gary Kuscher, the first of many planned public art projects.

The 15 deer each weigh more than 60 pounds and stand nearly 5 feet tall, with bucks and does larger and the five fawns smaller. The bucks and does have

their heads raised measuring 53 inches long and 55 tall, five doe, heads raised, 53 inches long and 47 tall and the five fawns 31 inches long, 27 tall, are grazing with heads down. Each recycled aluminum deer will be painted to celebrate a cultural or historical theme characteristic of Idyllwild — such as hiking, film, art, music, logging, Native American influence, wildlife, flora, or seasons. The AAI board decides which themes will be used and assigns them to the individual artists.

"This is a community project," said Robb, who

said she welcomes community input. "Art will be appropriate for all audiences, including children and will stress AAI's mission to promote art through education, creativity and exhibition." Artists would be able to choose representational or abstract styles.

AAI President Kuscher noted public art confers numerous benefits in towns and cities in which it is displayed. "It promotes tourism, creates joy, increases foot traffic that benefits local stores and restaurants, beautifies the business district and builds a sense of community," he said. "This

project could not be done without Robb's expertise and extensive project management background. She's thought through everything," he said. In answer to questions about art placement, insurance, liability, and ownership of the finished art, Robb produced forms to be signed by both artist and land or business owner clarifying project requirements and responsibilities. Completed art is owned by AAI, including use of image for publicity purposes.

AAI will both insure and maintain the artists' See Deer, page 15

creations, including resealing when necessary. It also agrees to defend and indemnify any land or business owner on which the art is placed from liability and claims of damage, whether from personal injury or property damage. Each "Permissive Land/Use Agreement" is terminable, with or without cause, for any or no reason, by either party with 30 days notice.

The progenitor for this kind of public art was the international "Cow Parade" project in which artists painted life-size fiberglass cow sculptures. Originated in Zurich, Switzerland, by sculptor Pascal Knapp, the project spread first to Chicago in the U.S. and then to every continent except Antarctica. After months of public exhibition, the painted cows were then auctioned for charity.

Robb and Kuscher stressed deer installations would be permanent, memorializing the donors and the artists and designed to tell Idyllwild's story — what it was, has been and is known for. "The installations will promote conversation about the village and its history," said Robb.

Artists agree by contract with AAI that their artwork must be free of political views or any other content that could be considered inappropriate for the general public including children. The finished art cannot contain logos, commercial advertising or specific website or business addresses. It must simply be art which when completed, becomes the property of AAI with all appurtenant rights.

Artists, all of whom must be dues-paid AAI members, will be notified of selection on June 2. Two weeks later, the deer will be available for artists to pick up. Artists must complete their deer by

mid-September. AAI's plan is to have all 15 in place by its Saturday, Oct. 12, Art Walk & Wine Tasting event.

As of this writing, eight of 10 deer installation sites have been approved: Café Aroma, Idyllwild Inn, Spruce Moose at the Fort, BBVA Bank, Idyllwild Area Historical Society, the Nature Center, Village Centre and Oakwood Village. Two additional sites, one county, one federal, are awaiting contract or supervisory approval.

Each deer will have its own informational plaque. In addition, a larger plaque will be installed at Village Centre explaining the genesis and purpose of the project.

Of fifteen sponsorships available at \$475 each, nine are confirmed, leaving four

remaining opportunities. Organizers cite reasons for sponsorship as gifts to family members as living legacies, creation of public art as living history, and support of Idyllwild artists. Although some businesses have agreed to sponsorships, the majority of sponsors at this point are families.

All donations or sponsorships are tax-deductible, said Kuscher. Robb, the public face of the project, said she welcomes community input and questions. Contact her at srobb@givingyoutime.com. For more information about the project and sponsorship opportunities, see www.art-idyllwild.org.

homeowners abate their properties — removing hazardous ‘fuels’ and bringing their properties into compliance with fire code. The removed trees are cut into firewood, often made available to low-income and senior individuals, and other ‘green’ waste is chipped into mulch or taken to a biomass plant where it is turned into energy,” Owens wrote summarizing some of the reasons for the MCFSC Greenwood Award this year.

The grant request for funds to help homeowners replace cedar shake roofs with fire-safe shingles is another example of changing community attitude, added director Tom McCullough.

When the idea was first

proposed, he had a friend question the merit of subsidizing individuals for new roofs. But when it was explained how burning embers can enter homes, cause fire and expand the fire, recognition of its community benefits created supporters.

While its 2012 grant funding is still available, the MCFSC is uncertain what if any funding will be available in 2013. Nevertheless, their efforts in educating the public about the risk of fire in a community on the edge of the forest will continue.

The search for new funds and new funding sources remains a high priority. MCFSC Executive Director Edwina Scott has said the approval of the grant funding for replacing cedar shake roofs has been approved.

The Federal Emergen-

cy Management Agency is providing these funds, MCFSC's first FEMA grant. But the council is working with FEMA for future grants. According to Scott, the federal agency is more familiar and comfortable making awards for flood threats, but after the roofing grant, they recognized the danger of wildland fires and want to add this category to their grantee list.

“FEMA said they’re willing to learn,” Scott said. “We just have to demonstrate that it’s a high risk hazard.”

Another new focus may be seeking funds for watershed protection. Large wild fires can do great damage to watershed habitat,

so reducing that threat comes from fire safety, Scott said.

One of the Woodies’ new projects is inspecting local oak trees for indications of the Goldspotted oak borer. Inspections can be arranged through the MCFSC, The GSOB hotline number to arrange inspections is (951) 659-8328.

Highlighting this recent threat to the local forest, the Earth Fair committee has asked Kevin Turner, Goldspotted oak borer coordinator for UC Agricultural and Natural Resources at UC Riverside to discuss how Goldspotted oak borer has devastated native oak forests around San Diego and is now here

in Idyllwild and Riverside County. He will be speaking Saturday, May 18 at the fair. Arborist Deborah Geisinger will also be available for more information.

The Greenwood award is annually presented to honor an individual or group for exemplary action in service to our regional environment. Individual recipients of the Greenwood Award have included

Dr. Kate Kramer in 2012, Ina Rae Lengyle and former County Supervisor and Idyllwild resident Kay Cenicerros. Organizations, which have been honored, include Sage Mountain Farm in 2010, the Coachella Valley Mountains Conservancy and the Friends of the San Jacinto County Parks.

Zoo-raised Yellow-legged frogs to be released

Efforts to re-establish the native population of Mountain Yellow-legged Frogs will resume in 2013.

The initial project will be relocating several hundred frogs — sub-adults — in the James Reserve later this spring, according to Adam R. Backlin, ecologist at the U.S. Geological Survey's Western Ecological Research Center in Irvine.

"The last couple of years the captive breeding colony has produced fewer eggs," Backlin explained. Consequently, the project team did not release any tadpoles in 2012. "But this year it will be exciting to attempt to release frogs.

This will have a lot better chance of success."

With fewer tadpoles available last year, the research team raised them at the zoo. Now the tadpoles are adults and the team will be releasing them in a few weeks, Backlin said.

Results of earlier tadpole releases are still uncertain, according to Jennifer Gee, director the James San Jacinto Mountains Reserve. "Last summer, we saw tadpoles here in Indian Creek. I am not sure if those tadpoles survived to mature into frogs, and it has been too cold to survey this year," she said.

Besides the frog release this spring, Backlin is hoping the captive breeding colony will produce a large tadpole cohort this year. If so, he believes another



release of 400 to 500 tadpoles could occur in late summer.

Applications are available on the district's website www.hemetusd.k12.ca.us, at the district office, 1791 W. Acacia Ave., Hemet, or from Superintendent Barry Kayrell's office, (951) 765-5100 ext. 1001.

The submission period began Wednesday, May 8, and applications must be returned to the district's Professional Development Service Center at 1791 W. Acacia Ave., by 5 p.m. Wednesday, May 22.

Applicants must be residents of Trustee Area 1 (see map).

The district board stressed that applications received after the deadline will not be considered.

Interviews may occur at the June 4 Board of Trustees meeting.

"We hope to make the decision in June and give the oath of office before the July 16 meeting," said Marilyn Forst, president of the HUSD Governing Board.

The board chose to make an appointment for the remainder of Sanborn's term, because "It's a lot less expensive than holding a special election," Forst said.

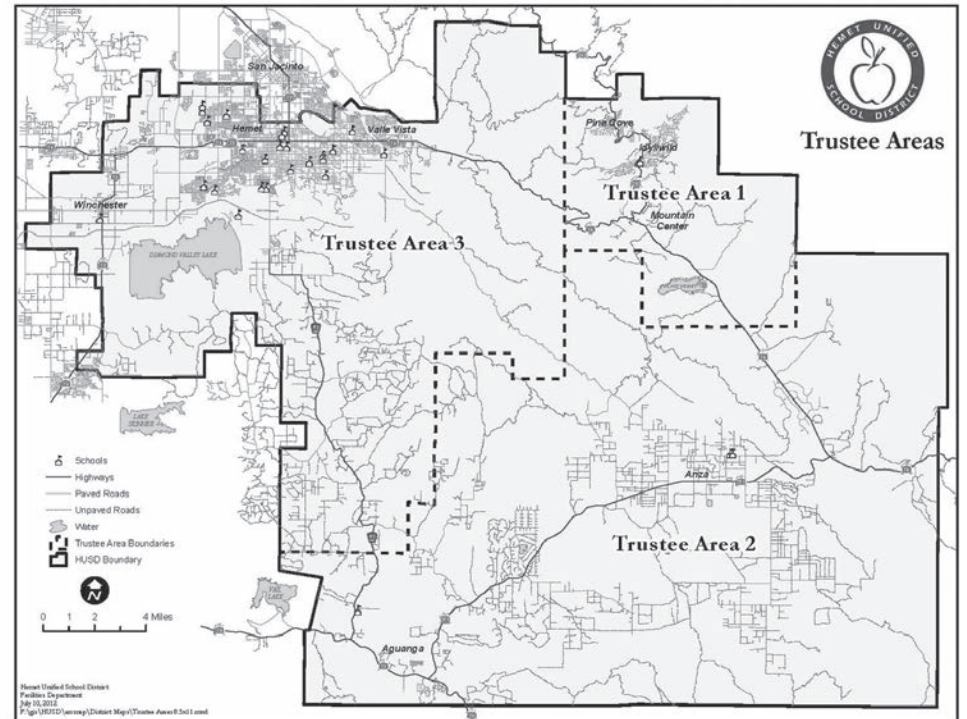
Sanborn is willing to

meet with any prospective applicant to help them understand the issues, "give them a little bit of a heads up," he said.

Pine Cove Water District reviews 2013-14 budget

At its May 8 meeting, the Pine Cove Water District board of directors began reviewing the proposed budget for fiscal year 2013-2014 that begins July 1. Revenue estimates of \$760,000 are the same as this year (2012-13); but expenses increase \$65,000 for a total of \$825,000.

Differences would be made up from a combination of restricted reserves and a \$40,000 carryover for the current budget year. No rate increase will be needed to cover this difference.

The \$15,000 additional in salaries and benefits is primarily for a 3.5 percent cost of living raise; overtime for

a part-time employee from June through September to assist in pipeline replacement; PERS contributions and medical and life insurance. These increases are partially offset by reductions in other tax payments (such as FICA) and worker's compensation.

The improvement account grows \$11,000. More than \$40,000 is for main line replacement work, which is partially offset with decreases in source development and well replacements.

The largest change is \$33,000 for post-employment benefits (typical health insurance). This is unfunded and this amount is about a third of the total due. The board will consider paying it sooner depending upon the

result of the state's return of other money due the district. The board will vote on the joining CalPERS Retirement Benefit Trust and decide on what investment strategy to adopt.

The board voted to adopt resolutions setting district policy regarding the Ralph M. Brown Act, the Public Records Act, conflicts of interest, financial reserves and workman's comp.

In his report, General Manager Jerry Holldber noted recent rainfall has helped district wells. "All are in good shape," Holldber said. Production is down slightly from April 2012 levels (2.2 million gallons compared to last year's 2.4 million) but 300,000 gallons more than 2011.

Grading has begun on the lot across from the Pine Cove Water District offices that will soon house additional CAL FIRE Station 23 personnel in a temporary trailer. The trailer is needed to house fire staff for the new Schedule B engine that is being brought to Station 23. The district has a month-to-month agreement with CAL FIRE for renting the property at \$500 per month. Holldber estimates the rental period to last for one to two years.

State Health Inspector Chun Huang said the district system was very well maintained, according to Holldber.

"Whatever furniture or office supplies are left at the end of the month, could be stored in the bus," Jerome said.

Only two general members, Smith and Marge Muir of the Idyllwild Association of Realtors, attended in response to Jerome's call for a committee. Local innkeeper Chris Singer and Idyllwild Town Crier Publisher Grace Reed had previously told Jerome they would serve on the dissolution committee. Chris Titus, previous

Chamber president, could not attend but has been asked to serve.

Jerome has continued, in the face of members' lack of interest, to perform Chamber dissolution functions in accordance with Chamber bylaws and state law. He said the next step is to convene the committee and, assuming there are nonprofits interested in receiving Chamber property, dispose of it by the end of the month.

In reviewing Chamber financial books, Jerome discovered balances of \$600 in checking and \$700 in the monumnet account, with

no outstanding bills and a likely final utility bill for the Chamber office of \$400. The small group present discussed giving any remaining cash to the HELP Center.

The Chamber office closes on May 31. Titus, Jerome and Singer had jointly funded office rent for May.

There was a time when there were two Chambers in town. Now there is no organization charged with representing and advancing the interests of town businesses. Longtime resident Muir advocated for a successor organization to perform functions vital to town business. But, if the

slow death of the Chamber and the disinterest of the general membership in the organization's survival or asset dispersal is any indication, an immediate successor to this Chamber seems unlikely.

Death by lawsuit and dissolution by default are sad ends to an organization that once appeared healthy, committed to the community, staged rollicking mixers, had a full board of directors, and had optimism about Idyllwild and its role in promoting it.

abuse alcohol or drugs. We can avoid unhealthy environments. Our risk for a disease or an injury is determined, among others, by our sex, race, family history, age, occupation, personal behavior, social environment and access to health care.

In the U.S., cigarette smoking is responsible for 90 percent of lung cancers. Despite this fact, 45 million people continue to smoke in the U.S. It is estimated that 160,000 Americans died of lung cancer in 2012. Ninety percent of these deaths were preventable, 90 percent!

The financial burden on health care for lung cancer alone is about \$10 billion annually. The number of lung cancer deaths, a preventable condition, is the same as the combined deaths from colon, breast and prostate cancers.

In addition, chronic smoking causes emphysema, which is among the three respiratory diseases, asthma and chronic bronchitis being the other two, responsible for a large number of people disabled and now the fourth cause of death in the U.S. following heart disease, cancer and stroke.

We have seen a significant increase in asthma, especially among young children. The fact that this increase is more intense in large inner cities would indicate that environmental exposure is most likely one of the important causes.

One in eight women will develop breast cancer over their lifetime. But only one in 36 will die as result of breast cancer due to the benefits of modern medicine. The changes in risk, especially over time, may be due to social or environmental changes.

The death rate for lung cancer risk in females in the 1960s was less than five per 100,000. At that time the death rate for breast cancer was about 30 per 100,000. In 1987, following a remarkable change in the American society, the breast cancer risk of death remained the same but the risk of death due to lung cancer is now greater than breast cancer. Presently the risk of dying of lung cancer is twice the risk of breast cancer in women. Quoting an old commercial, “You’ve come a long way, baby.”

Risks of any type must be placed into perspective. For instance, the death risk for breast cancer is almost identical to the risk of dying of an accidental injury. The lesson here is that as much as we are concerned about mammograms we must also be concerned, for instance, about auto accidents and the most common causes of it,

ment. speeding and drunken driving.

There is a silver lining in this area. Because of regulatory efforts and the increased safety awareness by the auto industry, the year 2011 had the lowest incidence of auto accident deaths since 1949.

What we do for a living also determines our risk. Most of the time we associate risk with certain professions, men and women that put themselves daily in harm’s way, like police officers or firefighters. This is not accurate; in reality the most dangerous occupations are fishermen and women, timber cutters, pilots and construction workers.

There has been a significant emphasis on control of excessive body weight and high blood pressure. Both are of enormous importance for a healthy life.

But we must also bear in mind that unreasonable exposure to sunlight without sunscreen, the use of tanning salons, exposure to dangerous illegal drugs and abuse of “legal” pharmaceuticals also play an important role.

At the end we have to contend with the same issue with which I started this column; there are certain risks that are not within our control and some that are. It is up to all of us to minimize our risks in areas where something can be done.

equipment? What are you going to do if you get in over your head?

So you still want to stay behind and fight to save your property. Stop and think about your potential rescuers. Do you think that if you were to get in over your head, someone will rescue you? Are they going to be able to even get to you to rescue you?

Are you putting their health, life and safety in unnecessary danger just because you selfishly failed to heed the warning? In some places, it is a crime to

ignore mandatory evacuation orders and to place the liability back on the person or the estate of the person who ignores mandatory evacuation orders.

This means that should this come to pass, not only could you be charged with a crime, you could be held liable for any cost, injury or death incurred as a result of your failure to respond appropriately to mandatory evacuation orders.

Now let’s consider what really should make or break the decision after all the aforementioned is contemplated — maybe even before.

Is your property even defensible? Think about all those things that we discussed previously — defensible space, noncombustible construction, etc.

The time to prepare is before you need to do anything, not at the time

of the emergency. If you find yourself trying to prepare during the emergency, it is more likely too late. There is no sense in sticking around if you are going to be fighting a losing battle.

What about your water supply? Is a little garden hose or sprinkler really going to do any good against a fast-moving fire in heavy fuels (lots of brush and debris or large trees)? There are ways to make the most of your water or even pretreat your property so that you can just evacuate.

There are products out there that can help to defend against an oncoming wildfire. They have their application, but they are not a “cure-all,” nor do they replace all those things we discussed that lend themselves to good prevention.

These products are not available at your corner

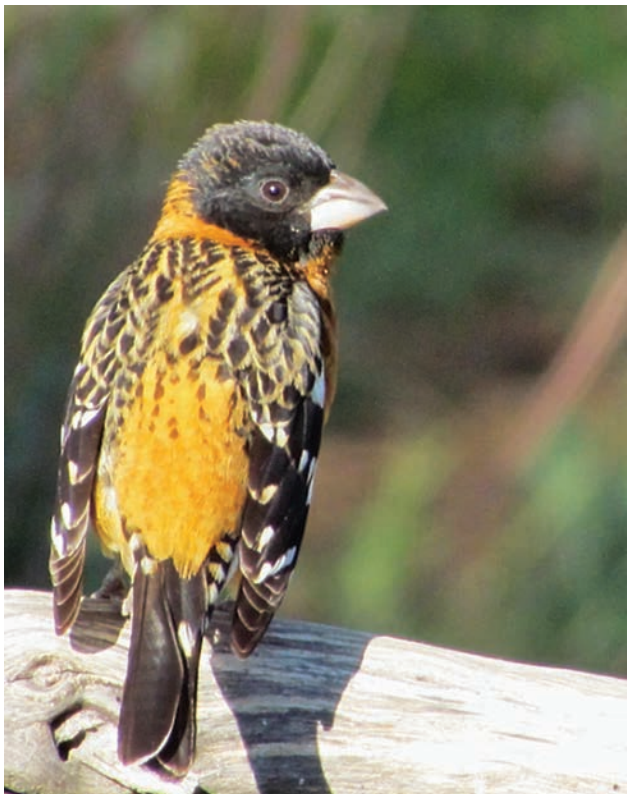
