Santa Anas posing fire threats

By J.P. Crumrine News Editor

Santa Ana wind event combined with near-record low fuel moisture posed a substantial fire threat through last weekend.

The National Weather Service had forecast a Red Flag warning from early Friday morning, Oct. 4 through Sunday evening,

Besides the immediate threat that the weekend's winds created, fire officials are concerned about it recurring until late November, despite predictions of moisture — including snow — midweek. In its three-month weather prediction, Cal Fire's Southern Operations unit in Riverside forecast multiple Santa Ana events before winter arrives.

"From October through November, there may be two- to three-day Santa Ana winds every six to eight days," said Riverside County Fire Chief John Hawkins.

"Across the southern part of the state, relief from the parched fuel conditions will

remain elusive through October and much of November. But wetting rains should arrive by the middle to latter portion of November with greenup occurring shortly afterward," the Predictive Services unit reported in its latest "Seasonal Outlook."

"However, the prospect of a third drier-than-average winter in a row will likely increase the drought condition which is already at ... extreme levels over much of Southern California."

In anticipation of the potential fire danger this past weekend, state and federal fire agencies took several actions to prepare and augment protection in the region, including the Hill.

"Here in Southern California there is additional risk of fire," said Dan Felix, San Jacinto Ranger District fire chief. He was talking to his state and local colleagues during last week's Mountain Area Safety Taskforce meeting. Federal fire suppression staff were exempted from the current federal government shutdown.

Shake-out set for Oct. 19

n Saturday, Oct. 19, at 9:22 a.m., Mountain Disaster Preparedness will host the fourth-annual Idyllwild Shake-out, a major earthquake simulation drill. Idyllwild Fire Protection District, Cal Fire and the Riverside County Office of Emergency Services are co-sponsoring the event.

Certified Emergency Response Teams, Mile High Radio Club and Woodies will mobilize to go through real-case scenarios at Disaster Aid Stations A (Pine Cove) and H (Idyllwild). Observers are welcome. "This will give our community an opportunity to observe how the MDP functions in an emergency," said Mike Feyder, MDP president.

CERT teams go will go out and identify issues that have been distributed at various locations throughout the community. During the hour-and-a-half-long drill, the MDP radio network is activated, communication devices within the DAS units are activated, and the teams will practice real search and rescue drills. Local theater group Isis serves as victims of the various disasters. Triage units will be active at each of the DAS units. IFPD and Cal Fire

threat is lessening so we're moving resources here where we think they'll be needed," Felix stated.

An extra hotshot crew and extra patrols were on the San Jacinto district over the weekend. Also, an extra strike team and additional Type 2 helicopters were assigned to the San Bernardino National Forest, according to Felix.

Cal Fire also increased its staffing here, according to Hawkins. Four more

Type 3 engines, more dozers and an additional air tanker for Hemet-Ryan Airbase were moved here.

"You can never reclaim getaway time," Hawkins said, explaining why these resources would be moved. If a fire starts, the initial attack would be intense and immediate. Because of the low fuel moisture and relative humidity, fire officials wanted to minimize the time to bring resources to bear on the potential fire.

"All of our people are aware of the situation and primed and prepared to be called in," said Idyllwild Fire Capt. James Reyes. He added that another two firefighters had been on duty in case of a fire.

The Cal Fire's predictive services unit at the Southern Operations in Riverside advised, "The gusty northeast winds may extend well above the valley floors to include elevations above 8,000 feet in Southern California, which is significantly higher in elevation than the surface winds typically produced during offshore wind events."


IFPD plans open house for Fire Prevention Week

Fall is prime oak borer identifying time

Since confirming the first oak tree infested with Goldspotted oak borers, another 20 oaks have been identified, according to Gregg Bratcher, Cal Fire unit forester on the Hill. While the apparent presence of the beetle is still far from the level of devastation it has inflicted in San Diego County, forest officials are still worried about its spread.

The GSOB was a principal topic during last week's Mountain Area Safety Taskforce meeting.
"Thus far, Forest Service

still has found nothing on the national forest," reported Kevin Turner, GSOB coordinator for University of California Agricultural and Natural Resources at UC Riverside. "But this summer, new discoveries were made in eastern San Diego County."

Not only did Bratcher and Turner emphasize that property owners and visitors should still be very careful about bringing oak firewood to the Hill, they also advised that caution should be taken about taking oak off the Hill.

In a conference call later in the day, Turner said the GSOB Steering Committee at the University of California, Davis, was investigating using California Penal Code section 384.5 as a model for tracking firewood move-

The existing statute requires a permit from the property owner, including the federal government, from where the wood was acquired, and the name of the purchaser.

"This would be a good model for firewood orders to track from cutting to where sold," Turner explained. "It would track the origin and any treatment."

As fall proceeds, both men said the possibility of identifying more infected trees may be better. Leaves on the sick and dying trees will be brown, not yellow, and remain on the tree rather than falling.

Property owners are encouraged to call the GSOB hotline at 951-659-8328 to report trees or request an inspection. The Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council has several trained inspectors who have been active throughout the community since spring.

"The Fire Safe Council's Woodies have been really good identifying these trees," Bratcher said. Since spring, FSC volunteers have inspected nearly 450 oaks, dedicating nearly 300 hours of their time to the community's safety, reported Chris Kramer, FSC 1st vice president.

Several hotspot areas have been identified, according to Bratcher. One is Marion View Drive near Crest View. A second is along South Circle Drive in

Mighty oaks from acorns

Replacing the lost oaks from the Goldspotted oak borer attack was the subject of a conference call last week for the GSOB Steering Committee.

How to grow mighty oaks from acorns to replenish the lost trees was the subject Dr. Tom Scott, University of California, Riverside, discussed with an online audience. "It's the season to collect acorns and do what we can for restoration," he began.

While acorns can be collected from the ground, now is the right time to harvest them directly from the tree because they will have the highest water content, according to Scott.

The trick is to determine which acorns are the most likely to germinate roots and grow. Scott recommends putting them in a container of water. The acorns that sink are the most viable. The acorns that float on the water's surface should be discarded.

They float because air has gotten through the acorn's surface into the core, thus potentially damaging the seedling nourishment.

After choosing the best acorns, place them in a damp and dark canvas bag for three days up to a week. Roots should begin to appear.

When planting acorns, Scott suggests areas where oaks have already been established. Selecting new areas may seem appealing, but there may be reasons that oaks have not grown there, he stressed.

The area will need to be weeded and maintained. Watering will be helpful and Scott suggests that it mimic a normal year — more in the winter and spring and less in the summer and fall.

Acorns will be the topic of a special event at the Idyllwild Nature Center from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 12. There will be educational and fun learning opportunities for all. And former Forest Service Archaeologist Daniel McCarthy and consulting Archaeologist Leslie Mouriquand will discuss how acorns were part of the menu for native Californians.

the Darryl Road area. A third hot spot is near Saunders Meadow and Castle Rock.

Identified trees have been cut down and the wood removed. "It's prudent to take down any newly identified trees," Turner told the group.

"If we take the tree down at our cost, we'll take the tree to the grinding station," Bratcher stated.

Early in the San Diego County infestation, property owners were allowed to keep a cord of firewood. "Invariably the tarps and coverings came loose," Turner said, indicating that officials believe this has contributed to the GSOB's eastward movement. "In

GSOB has now been discovered on the Pacific Coast in La Jolla. Turner also attributed this movement to weaker controls on cut wood in the past.

In response to a question about the possibility of spraying the infected trees, Turner replied, "We have no recommendation. But registered pesticide appliers are listed on our website." He stressed that they must be licensed with Riverside County. Visit http://ucanr.edu/sites/gsobinfo/Resources/By_County/Riverside County/Licensed_Pest_Control_Operators-Riverside_County/.

Cal Fire has approached the state Board of Forestry to expand the current zone of infestation to include Riverside County and the Hill specifically. In September 2012, the board designated 1.1 million acres in San Diego County as GSOB-infested. This action formally recognized the GSOB as a threat to California's forest and woodland resources

In other GSOB-related news, Mike Feyder, Idyllwild Mountain Disaster Preparedness president, reported that the Idyllwild Garden Club was producing 10 more signs warning drivers about bringing oak firewood to the Hill and five will be in Spanish.



Steele kicking off new PGA Tour season

Brendan Steele will open the newly-formatted PGA Tour season this week when he competes in the \$5 million dollar Frys.com Open at the CordeValle Golf Club in San Martin, Calif., Oct. 10 to 13. The winner will earn \$900,000 and 500 FedExCup points.

This is the first PGA Tour season to begin before the New Year; it is officially designated the 2013-14 season.

Steele plans to get an early jump on earning FedExCup points in his fourth year on the PGA Tour by competing in four official PGA Tour events before the holidays.

Generally, a total of about 350 to 400 FedExCup points for a season will place a player within the top 125 golfers earning PGA Tour playing rights for the following season.

Later this month, Steele plans to enter the Shriners Hospitals for Children Open in Las Vegas, and the CIMB Classic in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. In November, he will tee up at the OHL Classic at Mayakoba in Playa del Carmen, Mexico.

A scary month ...



This has been a brutal week for Southern California. We in Idyllwild have been

on pins and needles for several reasons.

The Santa Ana winds fuel tension and irritability, interfering with normal routines and upsetting sleep patterns. The erratic winds bang against and seep through our old cabins and homes, and we listen for the creak and groan of falling trees, edgy and fearful. Many of my staff wore redrimmed eyes to work Monday

Nearly a year after the Esperanza Fire broke our hearts, another fire siege is ripping apart our neighbors, many who have family members and friends in Idyllwild.

In earlier times, August was our heaviest fire season since it often brought lightning storms. But with climate changes, we now face October with trepidation each year.

It was Oct. 21, 2003, that the Grand Prix Fire began, eventually joining the Old Fire that began Oct. 25. The Grand Prix fire burned nearly 60,000 acres; the Old Fire, 91,000.

The Cedar Fire began Oct. 25 and destroyed 273,000 acres. In all, firefighters fought 14 fires during that fire siege, and 22 lives were lost.

Esperanza started Oct. 26, 2006 and took five lives.

Firefighters who risk their lives in these Santa Ana wind-driven October fires liken them to war. Residents of areas that weren't susceptible to wildfires in the past, such as downtown San Diego, are now living in a war zone.

Editor's note: For the Aug. 21 Idvllwild Fire Protection District election of three commissioners, 1,593 residents were registered to vote. Of these voters, 591 (37.1 percent) returned ballots. Since voters could choose three of four candidates, the total number of possible votes cast was 1,773. The actual number of counted votes for the four eligible candidates was 1,203, 67.8 percent of the potential.

So 63 percent of registered voters did not return a ballot. Of the ballots returned, the individual voted for only one or two candidates or chose to write in another name. We do not know how many ballots cast were in either of those categories.

Tips: Big hikes for little ones ...

A recent hike with my exuberant little niece made me think of how important it is to get your kids out into nature. Here are a few tips to help you addict your kids to hiking.



• Make it fun. If you want your kids to be excited to go hiking with you again,

don't get so committed to your "destination" that you forget your kids' priorities. Bugs, acorns, tree roots and pine cones are wonderful discoveries to be examined and not just trail-side distractions.

Make it educational.

The wilderness is a perfect open-air classroom. Carry field guides (or use a phone app) to inform you on trail history and help you identify the plants, rocks, birds and by the California Medical Board. animals your kids encounter along the way.

Leave no trace. Teach your kids "Leave No Trace" principles to help them grow into stewards of the outdoors. Find useful and cool LNT reference cards — one with a cartoon Bigfoot — at http://lnt.org/shop/reference-cards.

For natigation, use a fun activity like Geocaching to introduce bigger kids to the basics of map, compass and

• Make it safe. Dress your child in bright, easy-to-spot colors, make sure they carry a whistle on a lanyard — teach them to stay in place and blow it if separated — and have easy access to a headlamp.

Practice. Introduce little legs to hiking with extended walks (up to two hours) in a natural setting near home. The earlier in life your kids become comfortable on long walks (as early as age 3), the more likely they will enjoy

- Get them involved. Make trip planning a family affair. Ask your kids for ideas of things they'd like to see or do at your destination or along the way. Listen to them.
- · Share (a little of) the weight. Kids like to feel a degree of independence. Give your kids a small pack and let them carry a few lightweight items like their favorite snacks, water, trail-side treasures and rain gear. You can still carry the weight for your smallest kids so they don't get worn out and frustrated.
- Bring a friend. Having a good friend or special stuffed animal to share the trail discoveries with can make a world of difference. For smaller ones, make sure to tuck their Teddy bear in their pack (with his head sticking out for a better view) to share in their adventures.
- Be prepared. As an adult, it is your job to think ahead and always carry the "Ten Essentials." (Search it online.) Make sure you have enough food, water and comfortable, weather-appropriate clothing for you and your kids.
- Be watchful. If you have two-plus adults in your party, keep one in the lead and one following behind to serve as the "sweep," with kids securely in the middle.

Don't forget to have fun. Remember, you have long legs, an adult timeframe and adult priorities. Go at a kid's pace and respect their interests. Relax, learn to marvel at the natural world with your child's fresh eyes and your hike will be a hit with many encore performances.

Midwifery passes senate/assembly

The California Senate and Assembly both voted unanimously in support of AB 1308 that now heads to Gov. Jerry Brown's office.

AB 1308 protects the legal practice of midwifery without requiring physician supervision. This will eventually allow midwives to accept Medi-Cal payment for home birth and deliveries at freestanding birth

The American Congress of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, the California Association of Midwives and California Families for Access to Midwives all support the bill.

About 300 midwives are licensed

Future fire protection projects

While on alert during the Santa Ana winds, fire officials are also making plans for enhancing fire protection on the Hill during the winter season. The status of approved projects and early planning for others were discussed at the Oct. 2 Mountain Area Safety Taskforce meeting.

Fuelbreaks

The federal shutdown has affected the Hill in several ways. Not only have many San Jacinto Ranger District employees been furloughed, but the consequence is that maintenance contracts for fuelbreaks are on hold.

"The shutdown has put a halt to a lot of projects," said Arturo Delgado, San Jacinto District ranger. "For example, the West Ridge and Strawberry fuelbreaks; I was planning to sign these contracts this week."

Planning and implementing the Pine Cove fuelbreak should occur next (fiscal) year, according to Delgado. He also hopes that staff can assess May Valley and Bonita

Fuel work in the district was limited to the Thomas Mountain area during the summer, according to District Fire Chief Dan Felix. Broadcast burning within the district also will be studied next year.

Modifying the current Forest Closure is in abeyance during the shutdown, according to Delgado. "It is to be revised, but the Office of General Counsel review won't occur during the shutdown," he said.

After the shutdown, Delgado plans to have a person dedicated to implementing and overseeing contracts for all emergency treatments within the district.

Cal Fire Unit Forester Gregg Bratcher on the Hill reported that work has continued on several 20-acre fuelbreaks, including Dark Canyon.

The Mountain unit is also watching the status of conifers, as well as oaks, during this dry period. Several clusters of pine have been identified as dead or dying from bark beetle attacks, which are more successful during drought periods, according to Bratcher. These clusters have been marked for removal, he added.

Fire Safe Council

The Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council has continued its fuel abatement work throughout the summer, reported Chris Kramer, FSC 1st vice president. With funding from two separate grants, the FSC has helped to abate nearly 200 properties, equivalent to 111 acres. Their cost was about \$250,000.

Importantly, Kramer told the group that the roof replacement grant work has begun on 19 properties. Another 16 have received authority to proceed.

After evaluating the possibility of developing a bio-mass generation project for the Hill, Kramer said the FSC board has decided to end the project. "The biomass conversion process on the Hill is not feasible at this time," he said.

The idea had been to use excess and scrap-wood products as fuel in a small electric generator and sell the

electricity produced to Southern California Edison.

One model for the idea is the Colmac Energy plant in Mecca, Calif., just south of Indio, which produces 47 megawatts of power. Truckee County in Northern By J.P. CRUMRINE California, with much more biomass, has also put its evaluation of the generation facility on hold.

"We hit some walls with the county," Kramer said. "There was not a lot of interest and it's probably not economically feasible here."

While no longer an active project, the FSC will continue to look for opportunities to revive it in the future,

Mountain Disaster Preparedness

MDP President Mike Feyder and Medical Coordinator Dr. Dick Goldberg attended the meeting to request support to develop plans for camps in case a disaster prevents access or egress from the Hill. "We're talking about the possibility of a 'lock-down' and the need to shelter-inplace for up to 10 days," Feyder said. "How prepared is the community to sustain itself if isolated for a couple of weeks?" asked Goldberg.

Both Director Peter Lent of Riverside County's Office of Emergency Services and Riverside County Fire Chief John Hawkins welcomed the offer and suggested that OES and MDP schedule a meeting to begin developing these types of plans.

"We definitely would like to work together to improve existing systems and plans," Lent replied. "It's an opportunity to work together." He also reminded the group that there will be potential landing sites for helicopters to ferry supplies and physicians if this scenario occurred.

Series of quakes last weekend

Two minor quakes Saturday and another Sunday were felt in and near Idyllwild.

A 2.5 trembler occurred about 1:30 p.m. Saturday. It was located about 5 miles northwest of Anza and 11 miles southeast of Valle Vista, near the location of a 2.4 quake the prior weekend.

HUSD to explain Common Core standards

The Common Core standards will be the subject of a forum on Nov. 4. Hemet Unified School District began implementing the Common Core State Standards this year and will discuss and explain them to parents and the community next month.

Since 2010, 45 states have adopted the same standards for English and math. These standards are called the CCSS.

The session begins at 6 p.m. and the first 30 minutes are a general discussion of the Common Core. Dr. David Horton, assistant superintendent for Education Services, will explain what is currently happening in the classrooms.

HUSD Superintendent Dr. Barry Kayrell has said, "[CCSS are] the most significant change we've seen in pedagogy in many, many years. Technology has greatly impacted how teachers teach."

Kayrell described the change as blending and flipping the former instructional models where the teacher stood

shift emphasis to the students to do their own research on the each subject.

In his opinion, this will enable teachers to garner a more authentic assessment of the students' learning. "No longer will a verbatim repetition of the teacher's lesson be sufficient. Students will have to display problem-solving skills and teamwork," Kayrell said. "We've piloted several segments [of the core curriculum]. They provide an almost instantaneous result."

Idyllwild School is already using the CCSS and this is a transition year from the State Testing and Reporting process to CCSS, said Idyllwild Principal Matt Kraemer.

After Horton's talk, there will be four separate 15-minute presentations about English Language Arts in the elementary grades. Concurrently, there will be two half-hour presentations about English Language Arts and mathematics in the middle school and high school grades.

The Nov. 4 session will be at the district's headquarters,

New frogs establishing new homes

The young adult Mountain Yellow-legged frogs released in Indian Creek on the James San Jacinto Mountains Reserve in June "appear to be doing great," said Adam R. Backlin, ecologist at the U.S. Geological Survey's Western Ecological Research Center.

In September, another 200 subadult MYL frogs were released in Fuller Mill Creek, according to Backlin.

'The release went well and we have high hopes that these frogs will re-establish the site," he said.

As the efforts to re-establish native MYLF populations proceed, the consequences of July's Mountain Fire on the natural populations in upper Tahquitz Valley and Willow

damaged in the rainstorms near the fire's end, according to the U.S. Forest Service's "Burned Area Emergency Report," which was released just weeks after the fire was contained in August.

The Forest Service's team characterized the MYLF condition in these areas as an emergency. They were most concerned about the likelihood that stream habitat would

Commonly used medications can impair memory

As we age our bodies go through many "normal" changes such as skin becoming less elastic, hair beginning to thin, hearing and vision acuity decreasing, sleep patterns changing, bone density diminishing, and metabolism slowing. Perhaps the most frustrating of all are changes to our memory — our ability to recall recent memories, names and details is often affected.

Some memory lapses are considered "normal" such as absentmindedness - misplacing car keys, forgetting your wallet or purse; scrambling - confusing details of events; blocking - words are on the tip of your tongue but you can't recall them; fade out – the inability to recall memories over time; retrieval - recalling the name of a person you just met or a movie you just saw; muddled multitasking - loss of the ability to do more than one task at a time. [Mary A. Fischer for AARP]

As one might expect, alcohol, cigarettes, sleep deprivation, vitamin deficiencies, stress and numerous injuries and diseases can significantly impact memory, but research is now showing that prescription drugs designed to treat a variety of medical conditions such as high blood pressure, high cholesterol, prevent seizures, relieve pain, treat depression and anxiety, relieve allergy symptoms and treat incontinence may contribute to memory loss.

In an article by Armon B. Neel Jr., PharmD, CGP, a board-certified geriatric pharmacist who has devoted his career to guiding health professionals and older adults in the appropriate use of medication, has discussed the impact of these frequently prescribed medications on memory. And the results may be significant, especially as we age. The effects on memory of some of the more widely prescribed drugs are outlined below.

Anti-anxiety drugs - (Benzodiazepines) ex. Xanax, Librium, Klonopin, Halcion - slow activity in key parts of the brain that help in the transfer of short term to long-term memory.. If your physician has prescribed these drugs, do not reduce or discontinue use without first consulting your physician.

Antidepressants – (tricyclic antidepressants) ex. Elavil, Norpramin, Sinequan, Pamelor – 35 percent of adults report memory impairment and 54 percent report difficulty concentrating while using these types of antidepressants. TCA's block the action of serotonin and norepinephrine

– key chemical messengers in the brain. Work with your physician to explore non-drug alternatives or a reduction in dosage.

Drugs for reducing cholesterol – (Statins) Lipitor, Zocor, Crestor - not only do these drugs reduce cholesterol in the blood, they also reduce cholesterol levels in the brain which is vital to the formation of connections between nerve cells. One-quarter of the cholesterol in your body is stored in the brain. As an alternative consider (with your physician) a cocktail of sublingual B-12 (1,000 micrograms daily), folic acid (800 micrograms daily, and vitamin B6 (200 milligrams daily).

Narcotic painkillers - (opiod analgesics) ex. Norco, Vicodin, Dilaudid, OxyContin, Percocet — the purpose of these drugs is to block the flow of pain signals in the central nervous system, but the effects can interfere with long and short-term memory by disturbing chemical messengers in the brain, especially if they are used over a long period of time. Work with your physician to explore

non-narcotic alternatives such as non-narcotic tramadol. Combining tramadol with Tylenol may be an effective alternative.

High Blood Pressure Drugs – (Beta-blockers) ex. Coreg, Betapace, Lopressor, Inderal - these drugs slow heart rate and lower blood pressure, but it is widely believed that they also interfere with key chemical messengers in the brain. Ask your physician if a benzothiazepine calcium channel blocker would be effective in your treatment.

Antihistamines – (First-generation) ex. Chlor-Trimeton, Benadryl, Tavist – these medications inhibit activity in the memory and learning centers which can cause memory loss. Claritin and Zyrtec are considered newer generation and do not present the same risks as first-generation antihistamines.

If you are taking more than one of these memory-draining drugs, the effects may be exacerbated. Again, consult your physician to explore healthy alternatives.

There are many ways that you can improve your memory. Exercise, diet and sleep are important. Exercise increases blood flow to the brain and enhances the effects of helpful brain chemicals and also protects brain cells. Diets that include a lot of fruit, vegetables, whole grains, healthy fats (such as nuts and fish) and lean protein can improve your memory. If your diet includes red meat, whole milk, butter, cheese, sour cream, and ice cream this can increase your risk of dementia and impair concentration and memory. Eating too many calories as you age can also increase your risk of cognitive impairment. Sleep is also critical to brain function and is necessary for memory consolidation.

There are also things you can do now to improve

your brain function. To remember facts use association; create an image in your mind. For example, if you're trying to remember a name, try associating it with an image — Martha Muir might conjure the image of Martha Washington taking a hike on the John Muir trail. It also helps to repeat a person's name back to them — "nice to meet you Martha." If you're trying to remember a numeric string, consider grouping the numbers into a meaningful sequence. I remember my new home address by adding the numbers together in sequence.

Group similar things together — if you forget your grocery list for example, try to recall fruits, vegetables, meats, and collective items. Rhyming is also a fun way to help your memory — 30 days has September, April, June and November ... Brain games like Sudoku and crossword puzzles are also effective in strengthening your mind.

There are also "brain games" you can play online — Lumosity is a popular online brain game that will help you improve your memory, attention, speed, flexibility, and problem solving. Visit www.lumosity. com. Nintendo offers a game called BrainAge for their Nintendo DS which estimates the age of your brain based on a number of exercises. You can then work to improve your brain age through a number of exercises — the more you do them, the "younger" your brain gets. It only requires a few minutes of your time each day.

Use Google, Bing or Yahoo to search "brain games" and you'll find a plethora of results designed to help you maximize your brain power.
