# Despite rain, drought remains

ast week's, rainstorms brought more than 4 inches of precipitation to the Hill. Keenwild Ranger Station recorded 4.3 inches of rain since Thursday, which brings the total rain since July 1 to 11.8 inches.

George Tate reported that Pine Cove received 5 inches of rain, bringing its rain year total to 13.04 inches. Also, about 2 inches of snow fell in Pine Cove and the higher elevations of Fern Valley. The Vista Grande area recorded 5.5 inches of rain during the storms.

Despite the abundance of recent precipitation, the total is only 63 percent of the normal longterm rainfall from July 1 until March, which is 18.7 inches.

Historically, about 7 inches of rain falls during the remaining four months of the rain year (July 1 through June 30). If that occurs this year, the rainfall here would still be 8 inches less than normal, which would be the third-consecutive year of below-normal rain.

The Accuweather.com extended forecast next sees the chance of rain in nearly two weeks March 22.

Local water district managers were disappoint-



ed with the rainfall amounts. While all were glad to have the volume extended over several days, they acknowledged that it was not sufficient to overcome nearly three years of drought.

'The streams are still not running much. Tahquitz Creek is still completely dry," noted Fern Valley Water District General Manager Steve Erler. "When the temperatures rise later this week, I hope we'll get some stream flow."

"The past storm was good moisture, unfortunately, it was the only one we've had this winter," said Pine Cove Water District General Manager Jerry Holldber.

While he has no problem keeping PCWD's wells full, he will continue to monitor them. See Drought, page 3

# Governor signs drought legislation

n Saturday, March 1, Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. signed legislation to assist drought-affected communities and provide funding to better use local water supplies.

"Legislators across the aisle have now voted to help hard-pressed communities that face water shortages," said Brown in the press release. "This legislation marks a crucial step — but Californians must continue to take every action possible to conserve water."

The bills provide \$687.4 million to support drought relief, including money for housing and food for workers the drought directly impacts, bond funds for projects to help local communities more efficiently capture and manage water, and funding for securing emergency drinking water supplies for drought-im-



#### Bald eagle volunteers needed

Volunteers are needed to help count bald eagles for the annual winter bald eagle counts in and near the San Bernardino and San Jacinto mountains on Saturday, March 8. These counts have been conducted since 1978.

Concurrent bald eagle counts are held at Big Bear Lake, Lake Arrowhead, Lake Silverwood, Lake Perris and Lake Hemet. Volunteers are stationed at vantage points around the lakes, where they watch for bald eagles during a onehour period on the count mornings. Volunteers record their observations on maps and data sheets.

"I'm concerned about the future because of the lack of water this year," Holldber said. "That's why there will be further discussion at next week's meeting [10 a.m. Wednesday, March 12] about the possibility of moving into [Water Emergency] Stage 1."

'It isn't sufficient enough to deal with the drought conditions," confirmed new Idyllwild Water District General Manager Tom Lynch. He said the bottom of Foster Lake is now a puddle. (See photo) While the weather was beneficial for the district, the associated power outages created small problems, but he said the IWD staff responded to them quickly and prevented problems at the treatment and other district facilities.

In other Southern California areas, the National Weather Service reported that Garner Valley received 3.2 inches of rain and Anza saw 2.4 inches during these storms. Lake Arrowhead had nearly 9 inches of rain and Palomar Mountain got 8.8 inches, according to the NWS.

Sunny days returned Monday. As temperatures rose, the NWS forecasts days in the 70s for the end of the week

## Don't be scammed

The Franchise Tax Board issued an alert on Feb. 6 warning of a taxpayer scam. Scammers posing as IRS or FTB employees are tricking taxpayers into revealing their personal information on threat of arrest. State Controller and FTB Chair John Chiang warns, "Do not give out Social Security, bank or credit card numbers over the telephone or by email to anyone who cannot verify they are FTB employees," he said. According to Chiang, taxpayers should "ask the FTB agent to confirm information on the tax notice the FTB mailed to you, or hang up and contact the FTB immediately to talk to a live agent."

In October, the FTB also issued an alert regarding elderly people in Beverly Hills receiving bogus calls claiming that monies were owed for unpaid traffic violations. The scammers instructed potential victims to load money on a prepaid debit card and mail it to a fake address.

The FTB advises taxpayers that FTB agents will never ask for personal identification numbers, passwords or other account access information nor will they threaten incarceration. Taxpayers can verify their FTB account information by visiting www.ftb.ca.gov or by calling 1-800-852-5711.



When the power when out all over the mountain last Friday, Jack and I

left the office for the wine bar so I could sit and update the situation on our website for our readers.

During last summer's fires, social media played a big role as an information source for people to ask questions and leave comments. The same was true Friday evening.

Our website has been online since 1995 and before social media, it was where most public comments about news items were posted.

After the storm, JP and I talked about why we think the comment posting has shifted to the TC's Facebook page.

When FB first became widespread, it was a forum between family and close friends — a more intimate setting than posting on a news site for all the public to see.

That isn't the case any longer. Once a link is posted, it's a free-for-all of sharing it not only in that medium, but through other social media sources.

Yet even as FB grew into connecting more and more people, users still trust that intimacy — that what they post is just between family and friends, even on a newspaper's FB page.

And, they believe, the informality of the setting is much like an oral conversation between one or more people vs. a news site where more thought might be given to a response.

And so, while we post links from FB to idyllwildtowncrier. com news articles, because of the FB perception, we sometimes use FB to "chat" with our "friends." In the process, we learn information, such as when I asked Friday night who was with or without power and where were they.

We were able to basically map out where power was and was not on: Garner Valley and Mountain Center were back on first, Pine Cove last,

# President to propose change to wildfire funding

On Tuesday, President Barack Obama released his fiscal year 2015 (starting Oct. 1, 2014) federal budget proposal. Beginning next year, the President plans to change the ways the federal government funds its costs of fighting wildfires. The proposal provides certainty, safeguards and effectiveness for paying these annual costs, which are in the billions of dollars.

"... this budget advances new approaches to address the growing cost and damage from wildfires," said the president in his budget message.

In meetings last week with the National Governors Association, Obama telegraphed his intentions. "In the budget that I'll send to Congress next week, I'm going to propose fundamentally reforming the way federal government funds wildfire suppression and prevention to make it more stable and secure, and this is an idea that's supported by both Democrats and Republicans.'

Currently, during a fire season, if the U.S. Forest Service or other land management agencies, such as the Bureau of Land Management, deplete their fire suppression budget, they must use funds from other programs, such as recreation or resources. In the following fiscal year, Congress appropriates more money to replace the borrowed amounts.

But this proposal, which has been

offered in various forms as legislation, would fund suppression costs for large and severe fires in the same manner as the federal government funds emergency activities for natural disasters, such as earthquakes and hurricanes.

"... for abnormally active fire seasons, [these fires would be treated] as extraordinary costs that would be funded outside the discretionary budget caps much like we fund response to other natural disasters," said Presidential Press Secretary Jay

The Tuesday White House statement reads, "This new approach for funding suppression of catastrophic fires better safeguards non-suppression programs from transfers that have diminished their effectiveness in addressing threats to communities and landscapes.

Supporting the proposal was Robert Bonnie, USDA under secretary for Natural Resources and the Environment, who said, "The president's proposal is an important step toward solving a recurring problem in the Forest Service budget. In many recent years, because of severe fire seasons, the Forest Service has run through its fire suppression budget and has had to 'borrow' funds from other budget areas, most notably funds used to restore forest health. This has affected USDA's ability to manage forests in a way that could reduce the incidence of wildfires in the future."

#### Feds move to fix funding but homeowners still key ...

"Facts are stubborn things," as John Adams said, and a very stubborn thing over the last two decades has been how much we have spent on putting out forest fires. Not surprisingly, wildfire protection costs have risen substantially.

A recent paper from Headwaters Eco-

nomics puts the federal annual-average fire suppression cost during the 1990s at slightly less than \$1 billion per year, and the average cost since 2002 at more than \$3 billion per year.

This tripling of firefighting costs is a result of longer fire seasons, higher temperatures and fuel build-up in the forests, all leading to more frequent and intense

An arresting fact is that firefighting now accounts for nearly half of the U.S. Forest Service's annual budget.

A huge problem for the Forest Service and the Department of the Interior is that they are the only agencies who must pay for natural disaster response out of their regular annual budgets. This being the case, these agencies found they had to "borrow" from other programs, such as fire prevention, to pay the costs of fire suppression.

This puts them in the position of having less money to prevent fires because they need more money to put

had to take more than a billion dollars from other programs to pay for fire suppression.

The good news is that lawmakers want to change this. A heavily supported bill, the Wildfire Disaster Funding Act, has been introduced this session in both the House and Senate, brought up by Sens. Wyden, D-Oreg., and Crapo, R-Idaho, and by Reps. Simpson, R-Idaho, and Schrader, D-Oreg.

The bill would allow the federal firefighting agencies to treat unusually large firefighting expenses as FEMA does for natural disasters. High suppression costs would be drawn from special disaster funding outside the Forest Service and Interior budgets, making sure ongoing programs such as forest management would not be raided in bad fire years.

This is one of the few times this Congress is likely to act with full bipartisan support and the strong support of the White House, made possible by support from almost every group that has anything to do with forests and rangelands.

But none of these federal-funding changes relieves property owners from our own responsibilities. We all hope this bill will allow for more consistent fuels treatments on the mountain. But even with more and better fuels work around us, we will still have fires. Some will be big, and what we do on our own properties is still crucial.

Scientists from the Rocky Mountain Research

them out. In the last two years, the Forest Service Station proposed a risk management model for fire protection in a recent study (Calkin et al. 2014). The authors emphasized the importance of the Home Ignition Zone.

> Since most homes are destroyed in wildfire by embers contacting surface fuels touching the house, they argue that landscape projects that ignore the ignitability of homes will not prevent home loss in large fires.

> They want policymakers to define the problem not as a wildfire-control problem, but as a home-ignition problem. In their words, "... mitigation of the HIZ is the most cost-effective investment for reducing home destruction ...'

> In other words, home fire abatement is the smartest thing we can do to keep our houses safe.

# At the intersection of art, music and logic

It is difficult to know just how much money Kathy Harmon-Luber has raised for the many charities she has served professionally, but based on her energy and talent, one would guess that the amount would be significant. Harmon-Luber spent 12 years in Washington, DC working with environmental organizations, the Smithsonian and the Democratic National Committee raising money. "I've always worked in fundraising. I got into it quite by accident, but it came from a love of making a difference in the world," Harmon-Luber said.

Realizing that the DC scene was just too intense, she answered the call of the West and, in 1993, moved to California. And while Los Angeles was not her first choice, it is where she found a job. Little did she know that a life-changing surprise was waiting for her when she arrived in LA. On her very first day, she met the man she would marry, Ken Luber. An accomplished author, Luber recently completed a musical, "Esperanza," that is in production and set to reach the stage in October at the Desert Ensemble Theatre in Palm Springs.

Nature is and has always been a big part of Harmon-Luber's life. "I guess it has always been my inner nature to enjoy being in nature. There are beautiful parks and natural places; I would always gravitate towards those. Coming to California, being at the beach, I always incorporated nature into my life in some way, and in Idyllwild it is 24/7. I feel very lucky in that regard," she said.

A love of music likely comes from her mother who jammed with the likes of Henry Mancini just for fun. "My Mom is still very creative. She played piano when I was a kid, and she remembers it very vividly: I was 3-ish and she sat down to play the piano and I jumped up on the bench beside her and started playing; that's when my piano lessons began," she laughed. Harmon-Luber studied piano until she was 16 or 17. Today, she is an accomplished classical flutist who jammed weekly with the late Mary Austin, an Idyllwild treasure, who was also Harmon-Luber's best friend. "I miss her every day," she said with great sadness. Mary Austin died on March 9, 2009.

Arts and crafts were also popular in the Harmon household as was photography. "My dad was a photographer and he gave me my first 35mm camera when I was 16. It was his," she said. "He was in Japan during the occupation and he was actually a photographer for the Army so he taught me how to use my first camera and the rest is history. I've been hooked ever since."

wait for it ... biology. Yes, biology. Fearing she would be a starving artist, her father encouraged her to major in business. "I didn't want to major in business, so I kind of wrestled with all of it. I ended up majoring in biology thinking pre-med or something. I happen to love biology and environmental studies," she said. "There wasn't a time when I was not playing my flute or taking photographs or drawing or painting." A true triple threat, Harmon-Luber is one of those rare artists with a head for business and science and a drive that compels her to create.

Travel is a passion and inspiration for Harmon-Luber and her photographic studies of many destinations reflect her deep reverence for different cultures. Harmon-Luber

reflects on a few of her favorite destinations: Of France, "I love Paris; it is such an amazing city. The more you go, the more you fall in love with the place. I don't like going and seeing the top sites, I like digging in and visiting neighborhoods and kind of living like a local." Of Greece: "Athens is an extraordinary city; it has so much history, I really fell in love with that, but the best part was the islands. The islands are gorgeous." Of Scotland: "My husband is writing another novel set in Scotland in the middle ages. He said 'We have to go there and do some research in the Highlands.' We got there and it was magical." Of Italy: "Florence is a favorite city."

A trip to Venice is planned in the coming year. "The last time I was in Venice was for seven days and this whole reflections portfolio really evolved," she explained. "I want to build on that. I have something all new and different that takes place in Venice. Right now, my photography is all about going there and realizing that."



Photography was Harmon-Luber's main artistic outlet until she discovered collage. "About four years ago, I got the bug to start doing collage and I bought a book and I looked up the technique of how to do collage, then I sold the book," she explains. "I have been doing my own thing ever since and I really like it." Incorporating photographs, ephemera, layers of paint, distressing inks, words and collectibles, Harmon-Luber creates collages that "mean something." And while most of her early photography was in black and white, collages are a departure in style. "When I started doing collage it was just this eruption of color. They are all very, very bright. It was all the color coming out I guess." Harmon-Luber was chosen as the 2012 Artist of the Year by the Art Alliance of Idyllwild.

When the Art Alliance called for proposals from artists wishing to participate in the public art display, the Deer Project, Harmon-Luber jumped right in. Once accepted, however, fear set in. "The funny part of the story is that I See Artist, next page

was really excited to get it and then the moment of terror hits you and I was like 'Oh no, what will I do?'" she laughs. After creating a watercolor of the design she planned to use, it took some time spent living with the deer before translating the watercolor to the acrylic paint she would use.

"In the summer months I sit out on my deck with my computer and I check my email. That's my office, so I would sit there every morning for about a month and stare at the deer," Harmon-Luber explained. "I had already bought the paint, I had all of the brushes, I had everything I needed; I just couldn't get at it. It took me that long to figure out how I wanted to approach it." Once she began, however, there was no stopping her. "After that initial month, once I actually started painting, I could not get enough of it; I was just so excited. I would do another one in a minute. I had so much fun with it." The theme of Harmon-Luber's deer is Lake Fulmor, which represents the water element of Idyllwild, and it is on display in front of Compass Bank on Ridge View Drive.

Weekend visits to Idyllwild instigated by husband Ken captured Harmon-Luber's heart. "He used to bring his boys up here to Idyllwild and his sister used to live here. He kept saying to me that we have to go up to Idyllwild, 'You'll love it,' and of course, I did," she said. "It was the same every time, we never wanted to leave." So the couple decided to take the "huge leap" and made their move. "We just believed in living here so much that we decided to make the big jump." That was 11 years ago and the couple has not spent a single moment regretting their decision. "We fell in love with the town, not just the beauty of it, but the people. I think it is a place of kindred spirits," Harmon-Luber explains. "There are two things I love, one is doing something creative every day and the other is making a difference in the world and in our community. That's what drives me."

Brendan Steele posted a 6-under-par 69-66-71-72 — 278 in the Honda Classic at Palm Beach, Fla., last week. The Idyllwild native's performance was only six shots off the lead, but the scores were so tightly bunched that 40 golfers scored that well or better.

Except for driving distance, in which category Steele was 13th in the field at 295.3 yards, his stats were not particularly remarkable, either way. At more than 1.8 putts per green, however, he gave away too many strokes on the tabletop.

Yet Steele earned more than \$30,000 for his trouble, and he gained 34.5 FedExCup points to raise him from 45th to 43rd place on the points list with 345 points. Another 100 or so points this season should ensure that he will finish in the top 125 on the list.

Steele has made the cut in seven of 10 tournaments after about three months of play so far this season. He has more than five months of play left before the season-ending playoffs begin.

FedExCup points are important not only because the top 125 point-earners get playing privileges on the PGA Tour for the next season, but because they determine

#### Self-employed retirement savings plans ...

Saving for retirement has never been more important. The Social Security system is being placed under increasing strain as people live longer and the baby boomer generation retires.




Federal deficits should increase as the costs of Social Security and Medicare skyrocket and now the Af-

fordable Care Act is added to the federal budget. This is leading to pressure to increase taxes, especially on the more affluent. Therefore, the incentives for the self-employed to save for retirement and cut their current tax bill have never been greater.

Individual Retirement Arrangements allow one to save up to \$5,500 a year (or \$6,500 if you are over age 50) if you have earned at least those amounts. ROTH IRAs do not give you a deduction or tax savings now, but offer the potentially much greater tax savings of tax-free income when you retire.

SEP-IRA plans allow a business to make a contribution of up to 25 percent of compensation (20 percent for the owner) for all employees up to a maximum of \$52,000 for 2014. SEP-IRAs can be set up by the due date of the tax return, including for extensions.

Simple IRAs allow employees to make elective deferral contributions similar to 401(k)s. However, these plans are much simpler to administer for the employer. The maximum employee deferral amount



has increased to \$12,000 for year 2014 plus another \$2,500 for those over age 50. There is a required employer dollar-for-dollar match up to 3 percent of compensation. You are not restricted to a percentage of income.

The Simple IRA needs to be set up by Oct. 1 of the tax year for which it is to take effect. Employee contributions need to be elected before they are paid, with contributions withheld from their pay and deposited into the plan.

Many sole proprietors who run a business by themselves or with their spouse, without any other employees, have set up Single K Plans. These are similar to 401(k) plans but are much easier to administer. With them you can defer up to \$17,500 per year (plus another \$5,500 if you are over age 50). The overall limits of \$17,500 (\$23,000 for over age 50) for deferred and \$52,000 (\$57,500 for over age 50) total contributions apply to the aggregate of all plans a taxpayer participated in during the year. Sometimes taxpayers inadvertently contribute over the limit, especially when they switch employers and the new employer doesn't know about contributions previously made. Excess contributions need to be withdrawn by the due date of the return to avoid a penalty.

A retirement savings contribution credit also is available if your adjusted gross income is under certain limits: married filing joint (\$59,000), head of household (\$44,250) and single (\$29,500). Above

# Forest Service seeks public's comment

announced last week that San Bernardino National Forest recreation managers will be seeking public comments on their proposals for the 2013-14 State of California Off-Highway Vehicle grant program.

Specifically, these grant proposals would be for Cooperative Agreements with the Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Division. The national forest staff is encouraging the public to provide it with constructive criticism and/or suggestions that will enable it to better its program.

According to state requirements, public comments can

be submitted from Tuesday, on May 5. The state is using copies may be requested by March 4, through Monday, April 7.

The state now uses a three-step application process to allow public comment and feedback before final submittal. In February, the Forest Service solicited, received and considered public recommendations regarding the development of preliminary applications.

The preliminary grant applications were due March 3. This opens the second public review and comment period. The Forest Service will review and consider the public comments and then submit its final grant applications

an online grant application process as the means to apply for state funding.

The Forest Service will be submitting three preliminary grant applications. The grants include projects for ground operations (trail/ facilities maintenance, trail/ habitat monitoring and erosion/sediment control), law enforcement (patrols and safety/regulatory equipment), and the Baldy Mesa Trails and Staging Area Development (trail construction/ staging area improvements). The preliminary applications will be available online at www.ohv.parks.ca.gov. Hard contacting Deveree Kopp at 909-382-2831 or dkopp@ fs.fed.us.

The Division's website will provide detailed instructions for accessing the preliminary application and submitting comments. Comments must be submitted via email to both the OHMVD and the SBNF. Comments to the SBNF should be submitted to Al Colby at acolby@fs.fed.us and to California State Parks by using the "Grants" tab on its website at www.ohv.parks.





## Fire committee learns about payroll process

The budding Idyllwild Fire Protection District Finance Committee held its second meeting Monday. At this session, the committee learned about the IFPD's payroll process and some pending CAL PERS changes to future firefighter retirement benefits.

At the meeting's beginning, Chair and Commissioner Nancy Layton introduced Rob Dennis, the department's bookkeeper and accountant, to the citizen committee members. She is assisting him to develop year-to-date, monthly financial details.

district can get very complicated," she explained. Layton has previously served in this position. She then introduced the main topic of the day —the monthly payroll. "Capt. LaMont will give you a bird's eve detail of the payroll calculation. This is the largest and most complex part of the budget."

Administrative Capt. Mark LaMont explained step-by-step how payroll checks are issued to staff members — from individual's time cards, through management review, to Rapid Data for processing and back to the depart-

"Bookkeeping for the ment's financial consultant 55 and receive 3 percent of for records, La Mont explained the details for the committee members.

Most of the calculations and formulae are part of the Memorandum of Understanding negotiation between the department and the Idyllwild Career Firefighters Association.

Chief Patrick Reitz emphasized that he does review the payroll requests. For example, undocumented overtime requests are returned to staff and supervisors for verification, he stressed.

The meeting also included a brief explanation of future changes in retirement benefits for public safety employees. Current IFPD employees may retire at age their final salary for each year worked at IFPD. For example, a firefighter retiring with 25 years service earns 75 percent of their final year's salary.

This benefit is changing, according to Reitz. Eligibility would lengthen to age 57 or 60 and the benefit reduced to 2 or 2.5 percent of the final annual salary.

The committee's next scheduled meeting will be Monday, March 24. As they finished, Layton stressed to the citizen members that "[there's an] expectation you're ambassadors of accurate information to the community."
