Pine Cove will evaluate future of special tax

he County Service Area 38 Advisory Committee was advised last week to begin thinking about its parcel tax for the ambulance contract with Riverside County.

Since the committee's January meeting, the county Board of Supervisors has agreed to renegotiate its ambulance contract with American Medical Response. As part of the negotiations, 3rd District Supervisor

Jeff Stone has asked the county's Emergency Medical Services Agency to find a way to include Pine Cove within the prospective contract with AMR.

"The stated intent of Supervisor Jeff Stone is for Pine Cove and surrounding communities to be included in the countywide contract," said Bill Brown, operations manager for the county's CSAs. "If so, you'll be treated like all other areas of county ... So, you should begin See Special tax, page 5

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Pine Cove Water District considers major equipment purchase

Buying or continuing to rent major equipment future pipeline replacement and repair projects was a major topic during the Pine Cove Water District meeting last week.

Laying new pipeline, which the district did last summer, or replacing pipeline with PCWD employees is less expensive than contracting the work, General Manager Jerry Holldber told the directors. But doing the work with district staff requires using specialized equipment, such as an asphalt planer.

To lay the nearly 1 mile of pipeline last summer cost nearly \$16,000 in equipment rentals, he told the board. Pipeline replacement projects will continue for several years into the future. For example, this summer, work is planned along Franklin, Forest Lake, Skyline and several other local roads. To rent this specialized equipment costs between \$5,000 and \$6,500 per month.

"We need something different. It hurts to spend that much money,' Holldber told the board. "What if we buy the equipment?"

County agencies receive \$7 million




The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development announced the award of \$253.6 million of grants for support of more than 800 local homeless housing and service programs in California.

Riverside County received \$7.1 million for local programs such as ABC Recovery Transitional Housing, Martha's Village and Kitchen Transitional Housing, Shelter Plus Care Consolidated All County and the Transitional Housing for Dually Diagnosed.

Provided through HUD's Continuum of Care Program, these grants support a variety of programs, including street outreach, client assessment and direct housing assistance to individuals and families with children experiencing homelessness.

RMRU has two rescues this week

The Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit was involved in two successful rescue efforts this weekend, both of which exemplified the problems hikers can encounter when they go off on trek without being fully prepared.

The first started about 6:30 p.m. Saturday, April 12, after the Palm Springs Aerial Tramway received a call from three lost hikers. According to the Riverside County Sheriff's Department press release, the hikers, who reside in the city of Irvine, were identified as Keith Irvine, Ali Deway and Matt Ashcraft, all in their 20s and wearing summer clothing.

They were stranded at the 7,000-foot elevation, at the base of a steep incline near Skyline Trail, and were unable to hike down.

The Riverside County Sheriff's Aviation Unit located the hikers and dropped cold-weather clothing and sleeping bags for their use in case the RMRU team could not reach them that night.

Edison planned outages continue

Another power outage affecting the business area and many residential neighborhoods is planned between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. Wednesday, April 16. Several smaller and limited outages have also occurred since the April outage, which affected much of the local area, including Pine Cove. One outage affected about 15 customers on Marion View Drive Tuesday. Last week, one outage affected about 40 customers on Lower Pine Crest Avenue.

"We are putting in equipment to make the substation more efficient," said Louis Davis, Southern California Edison region manager. "We are upgrading from 4,000 volts to 12,000 volts.'

Davis was very apologetic to the community and understands frustration SCEimposing, but Idyllwild has only one substation. No duplication of equipment is available. Power cannot be shifted to other equipment or back-ups used while this substation is shut down.

"There is no good time to shut off the power," he explained. "We try to avoid nights because of the temperatures and people needing alarms in

the morning."

The new equipment should eliminate some problems future and possibly avoid those outages, but Davis stressed that Idyllwild is "... a little remote and it takes longer for service vehicles to get here."

Although Hemet Unified School District tried to negotiate a change in the date and length of the outage, Edison was adamant that it could not modify it to accommodate the Idvllwild School. Consequently, Principal Matt Kraemer arranged three field trips for students.

The kindergarten through second-grade students were to go to the Idyllwild Nature Center until about noon, when the kindergarten students had to return. Kraemer had some other activities planned for the older children until school ended.

The third through fourth grades were to take a hike along the Ernie Maxwell Trail. The middle schools students (sixth through eighth grades) were to travel to the Palm Desert Aquatic Center.

The district did hook up a generator enabling school to offer pre-school activities and have lights and power in the cafeteria and office.

RMRU members Les Walker and Eric Holden took trail," said Lohr. the tram to the top and then hiked down to the lost hikers. They connected about 10 p.m. RMRU guided them to the tram where they spent the night.

On Sunday morning, all took the first tram down to the base and left without any medical problems.

The second rescue started about an hour after the first. RMRU was notified that two hikers, a male and female, were lost on the Marion Mountain Trail. RMRU members Lee Arnson and Helene Lohr responded.

"At first we were thinking it was serious. But one of the hikers got cell service and described their location," Arnson said. They were at the Marion Mountain campground — only 10 minutes away. "They felt genuinely lost."

"They did the right thing," Arnson stressed. "They stayed in one place." They had no headlight, no topographical maps, inappropriate clothing and not enough water. "They completely underestimated the

Several earthquakes on and near the Hill

Several earthquakes occurred on the Hill and in nearby areas in recent days. All were less than 3.0-magnitude.

The most recent and strongest was 2.9-magnitude quake at about 7:40 a.m. Monday, April 14. It was centered 7 miles south southwest of Idyllwild and 10 miles southeast of Valle Vista.

This was the fifth quake in this area over an eight-day period.

The first occurred about 7 p.m. Monday, April 7, when a 2.6-magnitude tremor originated about 11 miles south of Aguanga.

Two days later on Wednesday, April 9, two more quakes shook the Hill softly. About 7:50 a.m., a 2.5-magnitude quake occurred about 3 miles south of Idvllwild and 9 miles east of Valle Vista. The second one that day was magnitude 2.7 and occurred 16 miles northeast of Indio.

On Thursday, April 10, a fourth quake of magnitude 2.3 occurred north of Idyllwild about 3 miles south-southeast of Banning and 8 miles northeast of Valle Vista.

The three young men lost on the Skyline Trail did not have enough water and were wearing T-shirts and shorts, according to Arnson.

"People get confused and are not prepared for the steepness of the [Skyline] Trail, the steepest in North America," Walker said.

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department reminds hiking enthusiasts to carry proper equipment for any outdoor excursion. Proper preparedness includes a well thought-out travel plan shared with friends and family, as well as familiarity with common hiking equipment, such as GPS, maps and compasses, proper clothing and plenty of water.

Multiple violations of both groups within this agency occurred because the meetings were neither noticed nor opened to the public. A quorum of the Finance Committee also rode in a car together, to and from the Perris meeting.

CNPA Attorney Jim Ewert said, in all his decades of advising newspapers, he has heard of one agency committing two Brown Act violations but never heard such breadth of this agency's violations that day.

Former IFPD Commissioner Ben Killingsworth has stated, "Other than abiding by many state laws that govern its activities, [IFPD] is not beholden to anyone ..." The truth is, the agency is definitely beholden to the public, and the Brown Act is one of those state laws guaranteeing us citizens the opportunity to participate in our government. Local agencies' actions affecting our lives do not form from nothing. They arise out of deliberations and discussions, and it is our right to know these.

This event makes it clear that this agency is in ignorance of certain laws. Board and committee members need Brown Act training. We hope that, whether required to or not, this agency's public representatives make a deliberate effort to get trained not only on the Brown Act, but in ethics as well. After defending numerous grand jury reports, why mess around?

Beware of malware ...

Malware, or malicious software, that contains viruses and spyware, can be downloaded via links contained in bogus emails. The perpetrators of these scams can take control of, or monitor use on, the infected computer and use this information to steal personal information.

Scammers will use any ruse to inspire recipients to click on the link, up to and including fake death notices. These notices appear official, offering condolences and inviting recipients to attend a funeral service celebrating the life of a friend or loved one. When the link is clicked, rather than going to a funeral home website, scammers download malware and effectively hijack the computer of the unsuspecting target.

The Federal Trade Commission advises that recipients delete email immedithe ately. Do not click on the link. Also, be sure to keep current virus/security software. A few more tips include verifying that security settings are set high enough to recognize unauthorized downloads; use a pop-up blocker and never click links within a pop-up; and most importantly, respond to unexpected pop-up messages or emails, especially ads that claim to have scanned your computer.

IFPD accepts 2012-13 audit; dismisses auditor

The Idyllwild Fire Protection District Commission accepted its 2012-13 audit and decided to seek a new auditing firm at the board's April 8 meeting.

Before discussing the district's financial condition, which continues to deteriorate, Fire Chief Patrick Reitz said, "I want to publicly admonish RAMS [Rogers, Anderson, Malody and Scott, LLP, the district's auditors since November 2010]. I requested representatives at this meeting.

"We're not important enough, even though they were on the Hill today," Reitz continued. "That they were not available to us tonight is extremely unprofessional."

In the absence of the actual authors of the audit, Reitz asked the district's financial consultant, Rob Dennis, to discuss the results.

"IFDP got a clean opinion," Dennis stated.
"There are no liquidity or solvency issues."

Despite this comment, the audit's discussion states "... the General Fund reported a decrease in fund balance of \$138,753." For another year, the district's expenditures continued to exceed revenues. Consequently, its assets (other than property) were about \$430,000, a decline of nearly

\$200,000 in two years.

A positive result in 2013 was the growth of property tax revenue by nearly \$72,000 to \$1.1 million. IFPD projects tax revenue will grow 4 percent this year.

This is the third consecutive year of negative income. Consequently, reserves, exclusive of capital assets, have fallen from nearly \$900,000 at June 2007 to about \$240,000 at June 2013.

The current year's budget (2013-14) has a \$45,000 net income, according to Dennis' report. However, without the \$218,000 from the one-time sale of the cell tower in September, the budget would have shown a \$173,000 deficit.

In addition, Dennis posts ambulance billings as revenue rather than actual cash collected. There is an expenditure charge for write-offs and uncollected bills.

Also in this year's budget, the March ambulance billing reduction total was the same as the amount for February, thus underestimating the March net result. Treasurer Nancy Layton said Dennis did not have time to update this portion of the budget.

Commission President Jerry Buchanan stressed that the Commission would have to devote more attention to the medical response reports in the future because the emergency medical incidents will be a significant contributor

to IFPD's revenues.

"These reports [of departmental medical calls] will be a key indicator of future revenues," Buchanan said. "If medical billings go down, future income declines."

For example, the total medical calls, both transports to medical facilities and non-transports, increased from 29 in February to 38 in March. This compares to 36 in February 2013 and 33 in March 2013.

IFPD's legal costs increased again in 2013, according to the audit report. They continue to grow this year. In September, the commission budgeted \$20,500 for legal expenses. Actual expenditures this year were nearly \$24,200 through February and another \$7,000 (nearly a third of the budget amount) was recorded in March, for a total of \$31,200.

A draft of the budget for fiscal year 2014-15 may be available next month, Reitz said. A tentative budget must be approved by July 1 and a final budget before Oct. 1.

County fire doubles crews at Pine Cove

Another fire engine and crew has been added to the Riverside County Fire Station 23 in Pine Cove. Also, an engine and crews are supplementing the Station 53 (Garner Valley) staff, Cal Fire Mountain Battalion Chief Sean Dakin said at last week's County Service Area 38 meeting.

"There will be six people at the station every day," Dakin said. Two complete crews, including medic engineers, will be at Station 23 daily, as well as a relief crew on the seventh day of each week.

The additional resources are available from new state funding and Cal Fire Chief Ken Pimlott had dedicated them to this area, according to Dakin.

Two of the new captains were at the April 9 CSA meeting and Dakin introduced them to the Advisory Committee.

some discussion of winding down the special tax."

If the new contract with AMR provides service to CSA 38, Brown told the committee that there would no longer be a need for the special tax for the enhanced ambulance services approved in an August 2004 special vote.

The current contracts between the county and AMR, and the county and the Idyllwild Fire Protection District (which provides the ambulance service to Pine Cove and the area north of Pine Cove) both expire June 30, 2015.

The current contract between the county's EMSA and IFPD costs CSA 38 \$124,000 this fiscal year and will increase to \$129,000 for fiscal 2014-15. This is about \$40,000 more annually than the special tax generates.

The tax could be totally eliminated or reduced. Brown advised the CSA 38 Advisory Committee that it might assess whether other public safety needs or programs would be useful with the Pine

Cove residents.

In the spring of 2015, the county will begin preparation for its property tax collections in December 2015. Thus, next March would be the appropriate time to decide the tax's future, Brown said.

The committee now plans to discuss the tax's disposition during its future meetings leading to perhaps a decision next spring.

Muir Marge and Robert Hewitt are the Budget Committee to recommend a 2014-15 spending plan inclusion in the county's 2014-15 budget. Budget Committee will work with Cal Fire Mountain Battalion Chief Sean Dakin and send the proposal to the full committee after its submission.

The Advisory Committee did agree to Dakin's request for \$15,000 this fiscal year to re-model portions of Station 23 to accommodate increased staffing. This work would include additional lockers and changes to the kitchen and storage rooms. (See accompanying story.)

meeting in section 54952.2(c), such as attendance at a conference open to the public, or at another open and publicized meeting of another local agency. Even social or ceremonial occasions are allowed, provided the members do not discuss among themselves issues under district's purview.

But in regards to the March 18 event, "These are definitely Brown Act violations," opined Peter Scheer, a lawyer and executive director of the California First Amendment Coalition.

The violations include failure to post the meetings of a quorum of the commission and of a quorum of its Finance Committee. And finally, a quorum of the Finance Committee traveled in one vehicle together, which constitutes a meeting.

Buchanan's reaction was that he had asked his commission colleagues not to speak in order to avoid "discussing" the though several issue. members admitted to speaking at the Perris The public meeting. was prevented from any hearings, deliberations, discussions or actions of the two public bodies, thus violating the principles of open government, said Ewert.

Also, the discussion at the commission's April 8 meeting arose during the chief's regular report, when he talks about his activities during the past month, but a discussion of the Perris meetings was not posted on the agenda. So any constituent interested in the status of the dispatch contract would not have known this discussion was to occur at the April 8 meeting.

Preventing the human trafficking of youth

Opal Singleton knows the dangers of trafficking of young people both in the United States and in third-world countries. And the recruitment methods are not that dissimilar, regardless of first- or third-world location. "A lot of recruitment has to do with gangs," said Singleton, noting that the ubiquity of smart phones and the Internet makes recruitment far easier

Singleton is a board member and director of development for Rapha House, an organization provides rescue and healing programs for victims of child sex trafficking in Thailand, Cambodia Myanmar,

and Haiti. She is also president and CEO of the the need to be loved U.S. organization Million and Kids. serves as the training outreach coordinator for the Riverside County Sheriff's anti-human trafficking task force. "It's called Million Kids because over one million kids are trafficked each year," she said. Singleton will discuss

this rapidly growing crime and its inroads in Riverside County at a presentation for the Soroptimist International of Idyllwild at 6 p.m. Thursday, April 17, at the Rainbow Inn. She calls her talk and trademarked program, "The Love Trap." The discussion is free to the public and light refreshments will be provided.

"It's easy money and included," MillionKids.org Singleton, explaining the attraction for minors and young adults. "It's the fastest-growing crime in the United States, and California is number one among the states for trafficking growth. Seventy-two percent of victims are U.S. citizens and a significant percentage of those are minors and young adults 21 to

Singleton noted that in San Diego County, according to a report by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, gangs are now making more money from sex trafficking than from drug sales. "Anybody can be recruited," she noted. "Very seldom is someone kidnapped. It's

Protection sought for flying squirrel

In early April, the Center for Biological Diversity announced its intention to fight for federal protection of the San Bernardino flying squirrel, a native to both the San Bernardino and San Jacinto mountains.

No sightings of the flying squirrel in the San Jacinto Mountains have been confirmed for several decades. And a recent five-year wildlife resurvey study in the region failed to find any of the squirrels, according to the CBD.

CBD filed its notice of intent to sue the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service under the Endangered Species Act. The remaining population in the San Bernardino Mountains faces threats from climate change, habitat destruction and cat predation. This is the second CBD action to protect the local squirrel.

The center petitioned in 2010 to have the squirrel protected under the Endangered Species Act. In January 2012,

review of the squirrel's status and "determined such protection may be warranted." The agency said further evaluation of the squirrel's status and the impending threats to its habitat would be conducted.

The service is now more than two years overdue in making the 12-month required finding decide whether protection will be granted.

In its press release, CBD said, "This rare, truffle-eating flying squirrel is threatened by climate change, forest habitat destruction and predation by domestic cats, and it has disappeared in recent decades from one of the two conditions. mountain ranges it lives in near Los Angeles."



Ron Singerton exhibits artistic versatility

Singerton The Gallery, located at 54245 N. Circle Drive, is home to all forms of art paintings, bronze sculptures, stone sculptures and glass work — but what is truly impressive about the collection is that it is the work of one man, artist Ron Singerton. "A lot of people come in the gallery and they'll say, You do paintings, you do bronze, you do stone, you do glass, you do all of this stuff,' and most artists do one thing," said Singerton. "A lot of artists have achieved perfection in one form of art, but to attain perfection in another form of art that you are going to display and going to sell requires the willingness to make the mistakes and to put in the time, the money, the effort to build up to that level. If it is going to be a one-man show, it's got to be an eclectic show."

Singerton's greatest influence was his father, Alexander, who grew up in poverty in Philadelphia. A self-taught artist, young Alexander would sneak into art classes, and listen and watch, and while his talent undeniable, his was confidence was lacking. "Whenever he thought he was going to get a commission, it always fell through and he didn't have enough self-confidence to get into the Franklin Roosevelt [New Deal Art Program]," said Singerton. "If he had had formal training and had had a couple of breaks, he would have done

really well."

A native Californian, Singerton was born in 1942, and while family returned the to Philadelphia for a short time while his father was in the Army Reserves, they returned to Southern California in 1946 or 1947. Singerton attended college at Long Beach City College and Long Beach State, and completed his graduate work at the former, as well as his student teaching in 1965 before going into the military.

"When I got out of the Army in 1970 the only district that was hiring at the time — because there was a glut of teachers — was Compton so I taught Compton for three years," said Singerton. At Compton, he taught history and social studies to middle school students. "Then I went over to L.A. Unified and taught in South Central for 10 years, again at middle school level with some high school thrown in." After a failed business, Singerton returned to teaching in San Bernardino where he taught art.
