## Jordan, a leader in arts education

**T**he new president of the Idyllwild Arts Foundation, Pamela Jordan, is from Chicago. She comes here familiar with the campus and town and prepared to lead the institution forward in the 21st century.

After 23 years at the Chicago Academy of the Arts, Jordan decided it was time for someone else to guide her child, time for change in her life. Then Idyllwild Arts announced its search for a new president.

"There are only four independent high schools for the arts in the country. Three are boarding schools and the other, Chicago Academy of the Arts, is a day school, where she was the head," said Bill Lowman, former President of Idyllwild Arts Academy who retired in 2011. "She comes with a lot of experience in independent art schools."

This was the only job she has ever sought since she joined the Chicago school in the early 1990s and she brings a wealth of experience — not only in leadership and leadership in arts education, but international experience and a broad network of connections throughout the U.S.

"I knew her from the board of the Arts Schools Network, she is reputable leader," Lowman said. "She is terrific and just right for here."

When she left Chicago, the trustees were so grateful and appreciative of her contributions to the school's maturation they bestowed the Kupcinec Civic Award on her. This award is named after one of the original founders of the Chicago Academy and is given to individuals who strive to positively affect and develop the Chicago arts community. Demonstrating the esteem in which she is held, 23 alumni took part in the presentation.

"When Idyllwild Arts Foundation began their search for a new president, the board sought input from faculty and staff as well as other constituents. We concluded we had a strong management team in place but needed a leader with a proven track record who could help us look

## Jazz is coming Aug. 16

**I**dyllwild, August and music, whether it's word association, a recipe or a formula, the combination always results in the Idyllwild Jazz in the Pines. It is only two weeks until the 21st Annual Jazz in the Pines opens the gates and music blares over our mountain Saturday morning, Aug. 16.

This year, the festival will open with a traditional secondline parade beginning on Apela Drive at the front gate and proceeding to the French Quarter Stage. Leading the second line

will be the Euphoria Brass Band, said Anne Finch, one of three co-chairs of this year's jazz fest.

More than 20 acts will appear on three stages over two days, and, "It's going to be great," Finch promised. She knows quality, having performed with many of the entertainers and having chaired several past jazz fests.

Highlighting Sunday's entertainment will be singer and songwriter Casey Abrams, Idyllwild Arts Academy alumnus and American Idol finalist. "There will be a great representation of alumni,"

said Anne Erikson, another co-chair.

Other world-renowned musicians and Academy alumni will be on stage both days. On Saturday, clarinetist Evan Christopher combines virtuosity, taste and enthusiasm with a commitment to exploring the full range of possibilities in the New Orleans clarinet tradition.

Another alumnus, trombonist Jason Jackson, will join Christopher on stage. Jackson is a member of the Grammy-winning Vanguard Jazz Orchestra and now lives in New York City.

## State parks conducts two rescues Saturday

The local California Department of Parks and Recreation was busy Saturday, July 26. A ranger and aides from Mt. San Jacinto State Park performed two rescues — a 25-year-old female from Huntington Beach and two juvenile females from Pico Rivera.

The first effort started around 3:30 p.m. when the park office was notified that a hiker was calling for help below Notch Five of the Desert View Trail. A search for this hiker began immediately and she was located before 4 p.m.

“The stranded hiker did not know how to hike back to safety without help. The rescuers assisted the subject through heavy vegetation, on a hillside with larger granite boulders and loose footing, to safety with the use of specialized rescue equipment,” according to the press release from Todd Friedman of the state parks.

By 6:30 p.m. the park’s peace officer was notified that two juveniles were missing. Another search commenced.

According to the mother of one of the kids, “she let her daughter and daughter’s friend walk down the walkway that leads from the Palm Springs Aerial Tramway’s mountain station down into Long Valley (a wilderness area). The mother did not know if the juveniles planned to hike, once in Long Valley, or set up a time when they should return back to the mountain station,” Friedman reported.

Both were found about 8 p.m. on the Desert View Trail still in Long Valley.

# Rattlesnake vaccine may reduce risk of death in dogs

For people concerned about their dogs succumbing to rattlesnake bites, a preventive measure may be *Crotalus Atrox Toxoid*, a rattlesnake vaccine for canines that Red Rock Biologics in Sacramento developed.

The vaccine "was developed to provide protection for dogs against Western Diamondback Rattlesnake venom," Red Rock's website reads. "...this vaccine may also provide protection against the venoms of the Western Rattlesnake (including the Prairie, Great Basin, Northern and Southern Pacific varieties), Sidewinder, Timber Rattlesnake, Massasauga and the Copperhead. Partial protection may be obtained against Eastern Diamondback Rattlesnake venom. This vaccine does not provide protection against venom from the Water Moccasin (Cottonmouth), Mojave Rattlesnake or Coral Snake."

The company claims that in dogs the vaccine generates antibodies that neutralize the venom. And while the vaccine doesn't prevent a reaction to the venom, canines "experience less pain and have a reduced risk of permanent injury from rattlesnake bite," according to Red Rock. "Veterinarians typically report that vaccinated dogs bitten by rattlesnakes experience less swelling, less tissue damage and a faster recovery from snakebite than unvaccinated dogs."

Janice Murasko of Animal Rescue Friends of Idyllwild said, "We give the vaccine at Sadie's Clinic, and we have had at least two people say their dogs were hit by a rattler, and the only reason they survived was because of it. It gave them the time to get to the vet off the Hill."

"The first year, the dog gets two injections a month apart," she said.

"After that it is once a year." A shot costs \$25 and the supply is unlimited, she said. To make an appointment, call 951-659-1122 and leave a message on number 2.

But the vaccine is controversial. Local resident Kathy Keane's dog, Lucky, died despite having a vaccination within six months of his death from what she believed was a Southern Pacific rattlesnake along a trail in Idyllwild. He was due to receive the vaccine in June when he was bitten May 30 of this year.

Still, Keane recommends vaccinating but warned, "It's important to know that the vaccine only protects against venom B, the typical rattlesnake venom, a hemotoxin that causes localized swelling and tissue damage (and later possible neurological damage if treatment is delayed)."

She agrees with Murasko that it gives a person more time to get to the vet for anti-venom administration, if necessary. "The vaccines do not protect at all against venom A, the neurotoxic venom," said Keane. "Our Southern Pacific rattlesnake has both types of venom."

The University of California, Davis, Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital goes even further and discourages the vaccine with its canine vaccination guidelines: "The product license is currently conditional as efficacy and potency have not been fully demonstrated. Based on existing evidence, the UC Davis VMTH does not currently recommend routine

vaccination of dogs for rattlesnake envenomation, and the vaccine is not stocked by our pharmacy."

Pets Vet Office Manager Jordan Schrader in Hemet said Dr. Robert Rizon in that office recommends the vaccine, however. "We've had a big success rate in dogs bitten by rattlesnakes," Schrader said. "The share of survivors is greater. It's not a cure, however, but most dogs survive because it gives the owner time to get to a vet who offers the anti-venom as we do."

Unfortunately, Lucky did not make it when he was taken to Pets Vet. "We think it was a different type of [venom] strain," Schrader said.

Schrader said Pets Vet vaccines also are \$25 and the vet recommends a booster shot three weeks later, then an annual shot.

Dr. Lindsay Crowley, a mobile vet in Anza, also carries anti-venom for horses, said Murasko. Her phone number is 951-444-1838.

No vaccine has been developed for humans.

"Burro Bill and Me" is a wonderful read, especially for anyone contemplating a simpler life and doesn't mind hard work. Page 13 talks about the new version of Edna's adventures with Bill.

Well I picked up some fingerling potatoes. Never having prepared them before, of course, I went online to find a recipe. These little potato puppies are delicious. I ended up combining several recipes to get the most flavor. Enjoy this recipe. they are delicious.

### Spectacular Fingerling Potatoes

- 2 lbs. fingerlings
- 4 tbsp. olive oil (I just sprinkle until it looks good.)
- 2 tbsp. melted butter
- 6 cloves of garlic (However you want to crunch them up.)
- 6 tbsp. fresh parsley
- 2 tbsp. minced fresh rosemary
- 2 tbsp. fresh thyme (I add this herb because it gives great flavor.)
- 6 tbsp. grated parmesan
- Salt and pepper to taste

Preheat oven to 425°. Place potatoes in one or two large sauce pans and cover with water. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat, cover and cook 10 minutes or until al dente. Place on two cookie sheets sprayed with cooking spray. Combine the remaining ingredients except for parmesan cheese, drizzle over potatoes and toss to coat. Sprinkle with grated parmesan cheese, season with salt and pepper to taste. Bake uncovered 10 minutes or until tender stirring once. Place in serving platter. Serves six.

# Supervisors intend to continue community grants

The Riverside County Board of Supervisors submitted a 22-page response with attachments to the county grand jury's May report critical of the board's awarding Community Improvement Designation funds to local nonprofits.

While the board agreed to review some actions and the process for making the choices, it adamantly maintained that the program was legal and carried out free of the political abuses the report implied occurred.

On the first page, the board's response quotes Government Code section 26227, "which authorizes the board to appropriate and expend money from the General Fund to establish county programs or to fund other programs deemed necessary to meet the county population's social needs, including, but not limited to, the areas of health, law enforcement, public safety rehabilitation, welfare, education and legal services..."

The board stressed that difference of opinion over the value of these awards is legitimate. Ultimately, the law allows the board to decide that "such grants provide essential public funding for community services and charitable orga-

nizations, helping to bridge the gap between government programs and local needs."

The awards have become even more important to local communities during the "Great Recession," however, the board concedes the merit of several of the report's findings and recommendations.

In particular, the use of the Economic Development Agency account to extend the time to use the funding will be stopped. Also, the board directed the county executive officer to develop a countywide policy governing the use of CID funding. The proposed policy will be part of future board meetings. The board agreed that the oversight of the program needs to be improved and eligibility for funding should be more clearly explained in a board policy.

The board's response also strongly stated that no state political abuse laws were violated and the implication of improprieties was inappropriate. "Nothing in the grand jury report substantiates or concludes that any board member had violated or ignored any [Political Reform] Act's provision involving conflict-of-interest laws or election campaign provisions of the act."

## Art Alliance stages benefit for injured local artist

The Art Alliance of Idyllwild plans to stage a fundraiser to help pay mounting medical and rehabilitation expenses for local artist Hiroko Momii, seriously injured in a May 2014 car accident on Highway 243.

The event takes place as part of the Second Saturday Art Fair that takes place on the grounds of the Idyllwild Community Center, from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m., Saturday, August 9.

Organized in conjunction with AAI and the Elders of the Idyllwild Conversation, the benefit will feature sale of Momii paintings and artwork with 100 percent of sales dedicated to defraying her medical expenses. There will also be a raffle and drawing with one of Hiroko's paintings as the grand prize.

Momii, on her webpage, quotes Vasily Kaddinsky, as to why artists

create: "Spirituality is the purpose of art." Momii explains her own motivation in this way. "My work has been created through my close feelings of affinity with nature and indigenous cultures, which is, by nature, spiritual," she noted. "I believe in beauty, awe and sublime in life. Painting is the art of reaching that state of being for me. My paintings are about uplifting my spirit and that of the viewer's."

Born in Japan, Momii grew up with the traditional Japanese value system — that a woman's happiness and fulfillment are inextricably tied to her marriage, the home and raising children. She did not, however, feel comfortable in taking on this role as her culture required.

She came to the U.S. in 1979 and while working in a silk screening shop, found her life's purpose and inspiration — the creation of art and beauty. In 1991 she quit her

job and dedicated her life to becoming a painter. In 1994 she enrolled in Cal State Long Beach's MFA program in painting and drawing and graduated in 1998. She had previously obtained a bachelor's degree in English at Kobe University in Japan.

Her work has been featured in solo and group exhibitions at galleries in Los Angeles, Santa Fe, New Mexico and in Japan and is part of the collection of the New Orleans Historical Museum as well as collections of many private collectors.

Momii notes that her growth as an artist has directly paralleled her personal spiritual growth. One sustained and enriched the other.

Momii's injuries were severe and her recovery will take time. As Elizabeth Miller, a member of the Idyllwild Elders relates, "Medicare, at some point a few months ago, inexplicably denied Hiroko further stay in the rehabilitation home, where she was receiving physical therapy. She had to move to a board and care facility where she is now facing

large out of pocket medical expenses which she is ill-equipped to pay."

AAI is asking the Idyllwild community, known as one that reaches out to those in need, to attend the fundraiser, purchase some exquisite, spiritually enriched art and give back to one whose life-work has been a spiritual gift to others.

## File for unclaimed refunds

Riverside County property owners and businesses have until Aug. 1, to file for unclaimed property tax refunds. Filing instructions and a listing of all unclaimed property tax refunds from tax year 2009 and prior is on the treasurer-tax collector's website at [www.countytreasurer.org/taxcollector/unclaimedmoney/propertytaxunclaimedrefund.aspx](http://www.countytreasurer.org/taxcollector/unclaimedmoney/propertytaxunclaimedrefund.aspx).

According to Treasurer-Tax Collector Don Kent, 2,214 refunds totaling \$2,344,366.69 remain unclaimed. Largely due to valuation reductions by the county assessor, most of the refunds are a result of corrections or cancellations to the tax roll after taxes had already been paid. California state law provides that property tax refunds that remain unclaimed for four years after the payment date or one year after the mailing of the claim form, (whichever is later) may be transferred to the county general fund by order of the Board of Supervisors. After Aug. 1, 2014, any money left unclaimed will become the property of the county and can no longer be claimed.

## County advances \$300,000 to IFPD

The Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved the Idyllwild Fire Protection District's request for a \$300,000 advance of its 2014-15 property taxes.

California's constitution authorizes a county to lend available funds to a special district if the amount does not exceed 85 percent of the district's expected tax revenue.

IFPD's annual property tax revenue exceeds \$1 million, so the request easily met the conditions and was approved at the board's July 29 meeting.

The agreement restricts the use of these funds to essential services to the local community and any normal operating expense.

IFPD agreed to pay interest to the county for compensating the lost investment earnings during this period.

While the first property tax distribution is in December 2014, the advance and interest can be repaid from the January 2015 tax distribution.

Previous requests, beginning in September 2011, have exceeded \$400,000, but the IFPD commission believed it needed less this year because it is beginning to build its own cash reserves from the funds received when it sold the cell tower lease a year ago.

ART'S CORNER

It may have been an oversight of some sort in the hours following Friday's thunderstorm activity in the area, causing the ostensibly responsible parties to reroute the schedule of both chamber concerts from Stephens Hall on the Idyllwild Arts campus that evening — scheduling does get a bit crowded as well as confused — but the two events did occur, if not exactly as planned, in the spacious confines of the IAF Theatre that night, and students, faculty and other audience members (a goodly number in any case) were more than amply rewarded for their presence.

Such electrical events could hardly have confounded the members of the harp, wind and brass ensembles; the performances being so uniformly exemplary in execution as evidenced by this particular listener. The first presentation (dubbed "Harp Recital" upon the program) turned out to be a display of the talent of harpist Emma Dyson, as well as the pedagogy of IA faculty member Allison Allport, in various solo and ensemble pieces. In particular, the "C Minor Fantasy" of Louis Spohr provided the widest range of her abilities (foremost being Dyson's right-handed muting technique), and in the Debussy "Danse Sacree" (with piano accompaniment by Pepi Pilibossian) and the Broughton "Toccata" for two harps and mallet instruments (with Robin Sharp's help on marimba, xylophone and electronic keyboard, as well as Allport's able assistance), Dyson proved her training and technical skills over again. This is not to belittle the two other student performers; both Xochitl Dercyz and Sebastian Ko were able to project their talents as well in pieces by Grandjany and Handel; and in the initial display of harp sonorities for all three student players in a medley of operatic themes by Puccini.

No sooner was the stage cleared of the harp strings and percussion than a contingent of more than 20 brass and woodwind players marched on the scene to deliver their version of a popular Lady Gaga riff (in a quasi-classical fugal arrangement). Soon after this brass incursion, a more sedately classical succession of sounds ensued: three movements of the Beethoven "Opus 87 Trio" were essayed by three different combinations of two oboes and English horn players who delivered their talents more than adequately in spite of changes in the involved timbres. Johann Sebastian Bach fared a little less well with an arrangement for "oboe choir" (with additional English horn and bassoon players) of the finale of his "Italian Concerto;" the tampering with the original keyboard timbres was somewhat of an obstacle, however bravely essayed by the respective woodwind players.

Virtually all of the remaining numbers provided examples of firm ensemble playing, whether from flute, French horn and/or trombone groupings. One could have wished for better choices of material for such displays (American folk songs and further "pop" intrusions such as the "Pirates of the Caribbean" suite of themes), but each ensemble, large or small, acquitted itself very well, and only whetted this listener's audio appetite for greater endeavors by the same players later in the summer session, in orchestral and/or symphonic band situations, where the usual dearth of wind and brass (as evidenced in prior sessions where they had to be brought in from off the Hill to fill out the youth orchestra) was clearly acted upon through active participation of one sort or another.

In short, if not in length, an auspicious boding for the remainder of the summer, with orchestral and band offerings to come in the next few weeks — but not to forget the upcoming chamber concerts from the Pacific Trio and friends.

## A center for Idyllwild's Jewish community

"There are so many Jews up here in Idyllwild, we should get together and say some prayers," Trudy Levy remembers saying more than a year ago.

Levy began planning how and where to create a spiritual home for Idyllwild's Jewish community. "What we wanted was to create a center for our community that would make everyone comfortable and to embrace Jews of all backgrounds."

The result is Har Shalom, Mountain of Peace, a spiritual center to host monthly Sabbath or Shabbat services as well as High Holy Day services and celebrations. Last month, more than 30 people attended Shabbat at Caine Learning Center, where all future services are currently planned.

Rosh Hashanah services will be held at Caine at 6 p.m. Thursday, September 25, 2014, followed by a potluck dinner. Shabbat services will be held once a month.

Levy said the board employed Julian King, a Rabbi in training, to conduct services. King and the Har

Shalom board will also host classes to expand understanding of Jewish principles and practices. Classes could include Torah study, classes to help understand the meaning of certain prayers and ones to explore the mysticism of Kabbalah.

"Kabbalah is an ancient wisdom that reveals how the universe and life work. On a literal level, the word Kabbalah means 'to receive.' It's the study of how to receive fulfillment in one's life," the definition from The Kabbalah Center.

Levy said organizers are exploring ways to give back to the greater Idyllwild community: Tzedakah in Hebrew is a plan to assist those in need on the Hill.

Har Shalom is supported by the Jewish Federation of the Desert and operates 100 percent on donations. 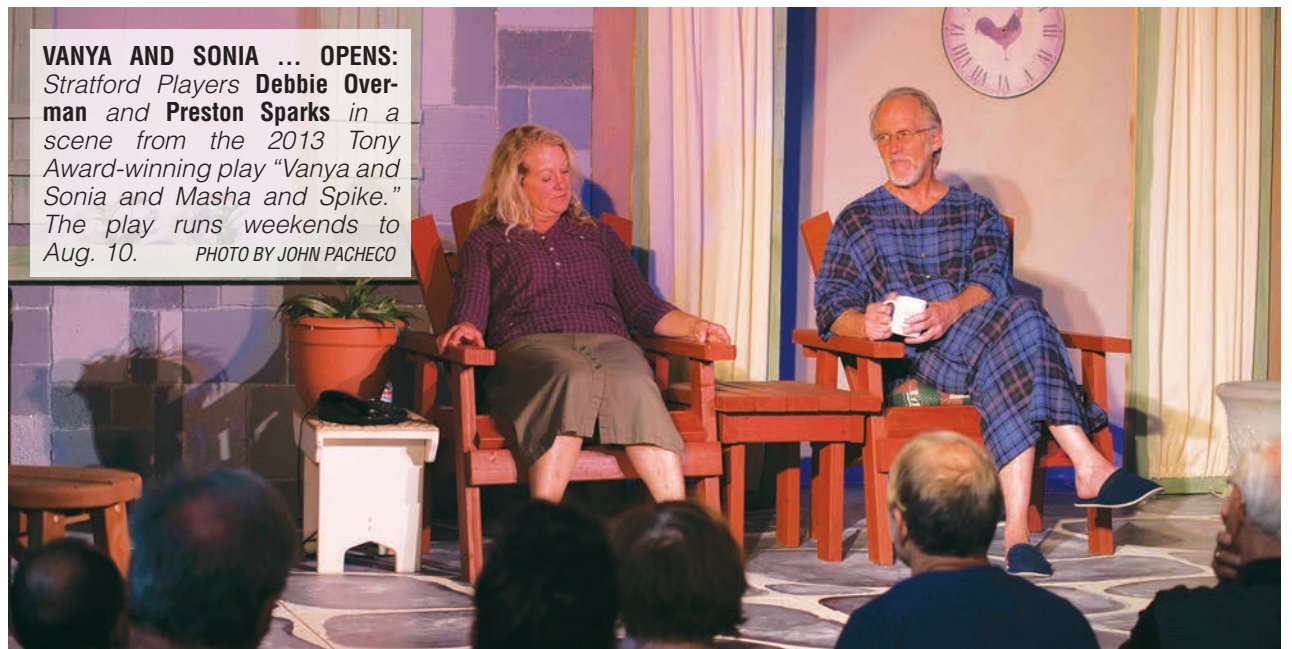
tor and lifetime member of the Associates of Idyllwild Arts Foundation.

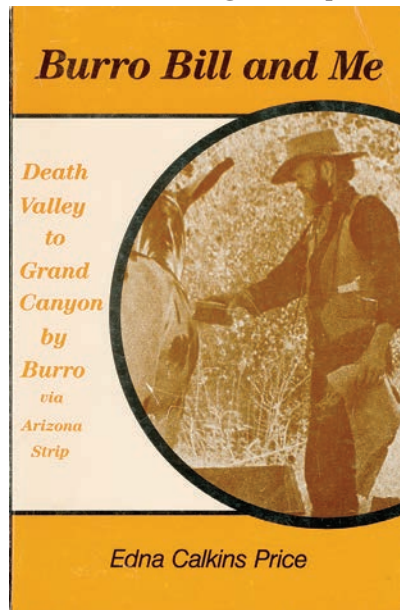
# "Burro Bill and Me," book by Edna Price, comes full circle

With the new E-publication of "Burro Bill and Me," a charming and funny memoir by former Idyllwild resident Edna Price, two circles have been linked and one degree of separation has been bridged.

Rick Christian, president of Alive Communications of Colorado Springs, Colorado, graduated from Stanford in 1978 and came to work as a cub reporter for the Idyllwild Town Crier, under then-owner Luther Weare. Christian said he chose this route because of a love for Idyllwild — one nurtured through time spent at a cabin on Fern Valley Road his parents had bought.

While at the Town Crier, Christian discovered "Burro Bill and Me" that Luther had first published in 1973 through his Strawberry Valley Press. Christian relates that when he first met Luther and his wife Marilyn, they had just returned from a trip to France, financed by the proceeds from a film option on "Burro Bill," a deal struck with bud-

ding screenwriter Melissa Mathison, who later wrote "The Black Stallion" in 1979 and "E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial," in 1982.

He recounted that the option was a big deal in a small town and got him interested in reading the memoir. "It was quite a treasure, a jewel of Western Americana that detailed her unusual love story as a newlywed in Death Valley," he said. "Edna had died five years before I landed in Idyllwild but Luther remembered her fondly and spoke of her uncommon gentleness as a kind of paramedic before such jobs existed." Her husband, Bill, was the fire chief for the volunteer company in town.

When Christian's career later took him onward as a literary agent and magazine publisher, he resold the book for the Weares to the Death Valley Natural History Association. "And when that edition had lived its natural lifetime, I breathed life into it yet again in e-book form," he said. "It's just launched on Amazon and other e-pub channels in its third iteration."

On Bondfire's site, [www.bondfirebooks.com/burro-bill-and-me](http://www.bondfirebooks.com/burro-bill-and-me), Christian relates the unusual story that

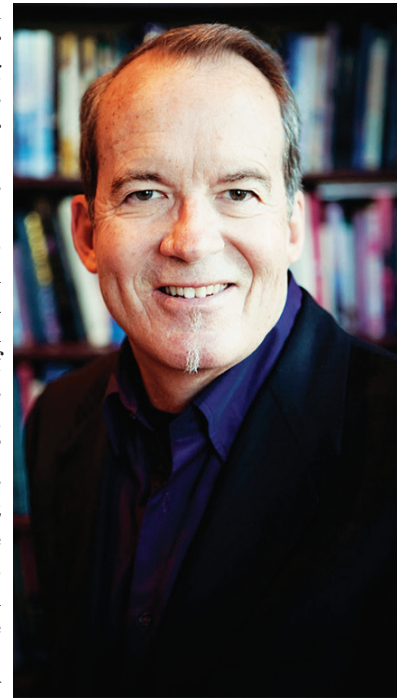
first captivated him and many other readers including current TC Owner and Publisher Becky Clark.

"Raised as a well-to-do Virginia girl, Edna fell head-over-heels in love with a semi-literate and restless young man whose dreams of adventure and freedom were as wide as the California sky," the book's description reads. "I can't take a soft life," he told his bride. 'It rots a man.' Thus began an uncommon love story.

"For 10 happy years, 1931 to 1941, Edna and Bill Price abandoned city life and roamed sun-scorched Death Valley and the Arizona badlands on foot with their string of pack burros. They slept under the stars, scratched out a meager living from the wasteland, and hobnobbed with prospectors, outlaws, herders and hobos. 'In this place,' Bill explained, 'a man can find his God.' Far from feeling displaced, Edna thrived as a desert flower.

"In her extraordinary memoir, Edna writes with wit and grit, recalling 'those years when we knew no bed but the ground, no roof but the sky, when we were known all over the deserts simply as Burro Bill and Mrs. Bill.'"

Christian said he felt a need to continue to give life to this book. "It's the historic nature of it and recounts careers coming full circle — she ended her career in the place and just before the time I was beginning mine — in Idyllwild," he noted. "In addition to it being fall-in-over-funny, I felt 'Burro Bill and Me' would be an attractive read to young people who appreciate natural beauty and feel a need to get off the grid."

# Pain brings gain for local artist

It took an emergency operation in 2005 for Evelia Nash to discover her talent for painting.

"Because I was in pain, I needed to be doing something," she said. "I started making little lines here and there because I don't draw, I don't know [how to draw]. It has never been part of me. I just started making little lines and colors." After several days of drawing her husband Richard Nash, said, "You need to get a canvas." Richard made the trip to Michaels arts and crafts store and returned with a few canvases and some acrylic paint. Over 300 paintings later, Evelia is still actively creating art and participating in every Art Alliance of Idyllwild event.

Evelia was born in Zacatecas, Mexico, and raised on a little ranch. She is the ninth of 11 children born to Mr. and Mrs. Gonzales and had no interest in drawing. "Any drawing they wanted me to do was always the same. It was a mountain, it was an 'M' for a mountain, the sun had a happy face always, the house was a square with another little square on top for a chimney. That's as far as my drawing went," she said laughing.

Evelia came to the U.S. in 1979 when she was 10 years old. Her father, however, had been coming to the states since 1941. "He came as bracero (a Mexican worker who is allowed entry into the United States to work for a limited time). That's when they used to hire people in Gua-

dalajara to come and work for the orange run," Evelia explained. "That was back when everything was legal before you even came to the country. He was 16 when he first came." Her mother emigrated to the U.S. in 1972.

Tradition was important to Evelia's family, so when Richard Nash came calling, he learned just how strict Evelia's Mexican upbringing was. After three years working together, Richard had become friends with Evelia and her brother. Over time, Richard was interested in taking the relationship with Evelia from friends to something more. "He asked me if I wanted to go out with him. In the Hispanic language there is no word for 'going out,'" she said. "You're boyfriend, girlfriend, fiancé, married or friends. So I told him, 'No, I'm not going out.'" Richard persisted, but Evelia, still living at home, required permission from her parents. "I said, 'If you are willing you can go and talk to [my parents] and see what they say.'"

More an event than a simple request for a date, the entire family was on hand; Evelia's mother and father, sisters and brothers and their spouses all gathered in the family home for Richard's day of reckoning, 7 p.m. on April 4. Not allowed to sit on the same couch, Evelia sat across the room in a rocking chair and watched her family reject everything Richard asked. "Then my husband did something I was not expecting; he looked at them and said 'Mr. and Mrs. Gonzales, I want to ask for your

daughter's hand in marriage.'" Evelia nearly fell over backwards in the rocking chair. Chaperoned by family throughout their courtship, the couple married four months and four days later. On Aug. 8 they will celebrate their 27th anniversary.

Richard had a house in Norco where they lived for a year while running a business they started six months into their marriage. The business quickly grew to over 100 employees. "We used to silkscreen plastic bottles, cosmetics, all kinds of things," Evelia said, except T-shirts. "As soon as you say silk screening, people think T-Shirts." Tired of working 18-hour days, the family sold the company and moved to Fullerton.

With his new company a success Richard suggested to Evelia that she stay home and care for the family, which she did for several years. The couple then moved to Grand Terrace where they would spend 11 years. It was during that time that a friend introduced them to Idyllwild. "In 2008 we bought a little trailer at Lake Hemet because a friend of ours, Larry, had one there and we came for a barbecue and liked it. For two years we came there every weekend," Evelia re-

called. "That's where I met Gary Kuscher."

Kuscher learned of Evelia's talent and asked if she had photos. "I showed him photos on my iPhone and after that he kept on telling me, 'You have to join the Art Alliance.'" After purchasing a home in Idyllwild, Evelia went back to say goodbye to Lake Hemet and new friend, Gary Kuscher. "I went to say thank you and [Gary] said, 'Here!' He had the ap-

plication. He said, 'I know you are not going to do it. All you have to do is give me the check, it's already all filled out, and sign [the application].'" Three years later, Evelia has entered every show and won a ribbon at each of them.

Compared by some to abstract expressionist Jackson Pollock, Evelia's work is the result of many processes. "I don't really paint with brushes," Evelia explained. "I use spong-

es, knives, spatulas, whatever I have available. I put the paint down and I'm taking layers off. I'm revealing something that is there. That's how I paint most of my paintings." Discovering the use of water in her work opened entirely new horizons for Evelia.

Between running Idyllwild Laundry Service, which she and husband Richard purchased from Dan Singer about two years ago, daughter Shelby, 21, who attends college at the Fashion Institute in Los Angeles and son Richie, 18, who recently graduated from high school, and her art, Evelia is constantly busy which, judging by her broad smile and warm demeanor, makes her very happy.

"I have met an amazing assortment of people. [In] most towns once in a while you meet someone a little different, but here, [there are] so many different people but at the end we all come [together] as one," she said passionately. "I'm from a little ranch, so everybody gets together to help the neighbor ... that's the most beautiful thing about this town. It's the people and that's the number one thing."

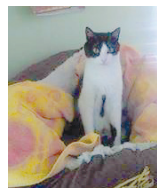

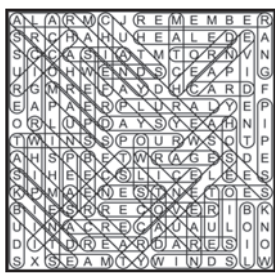

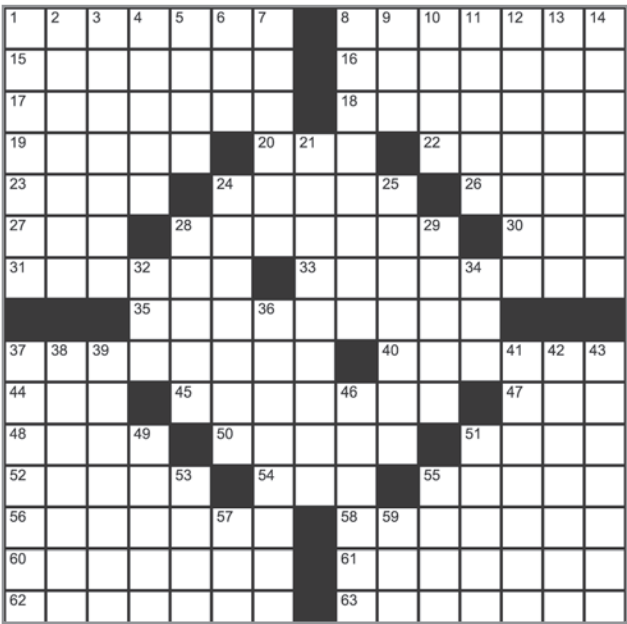

Loved by many, changed by most, Donald "Don" Sterling, 72, died of lung cancer on the morning of Tuesday, July 22, 2014.

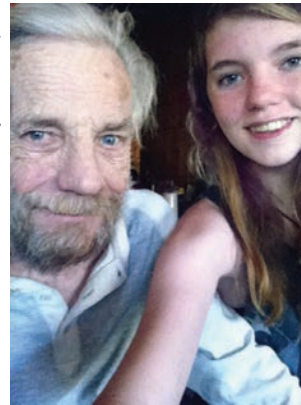
Donald was a resident of Idyllwild for about 30 years where he lived with his wife, Robin Sterling, and their daughter, Dawn Marie Sterling.

# Red Cross organizing Hill volunteers

Despite the lack of an imminent emergency, several American Red Cross officials were in Idyllwild Tuesday evening, July 22. And they were very complimentary of the local residents involved in Red Cross efforts and the Mountain Disaster Preparedness group's efforts to keep the Hill prepared for a potential disaster.

"Idyllwild is a model program," said Debbie Leahy Graves, the Regional Disaster program officer. She shared that the district executive officer frequently mentions and points out the Idyllwild effort as a model program to other communities.

Since the initial meet-

ings in the early fall of 2013, MDP has focused its attention on gaining a bond with the Riverside Red Cross Chapter. One of the major steps was recruiting Pat Schnetzer, a former registered nurse, to head the effort of finding and training Red Cross volunteers.

The regional Red Cross has already recognized her success. In the intervening 12 months, Schnetzer has recruited 40 volunteers to help with Red Cross events on and off the Hill.

Red Cross service is "an opportunity to help people in need," Graves commented. "I commend all of you and the entire community for what you've done to bring [Idyllwild] to the next level. That's preparedness."

Graves and others promised a prompt Red Cross in case a catastrophe might occur on the Hill. "You might be alone for awhile, but we're in the

background ramping up to get here," she said.

"You're a unique group; head and shoulders above most communities in preparedness and resiliency,"

said Tom Hyatt, disaster program manager for the Riverside County chapter.

Red Cross plans to hold quarterly meetings in Idyllwild. Also, both Michelle Aleman, disaster program coordinator and her boss, Hyatt, will support the Idyllwild Red Cross initiative.

"Going forward, we need more frequent training," Schnetzer said. And Graves and Hyatt are prepared to deliver.

"We'll focus on training and building capacity," Hyatt promised during the meeting. "The bottom line is we're here to support you." One of the first training sessions will be explaining and preparing participants to use the Red Cross's online features, especially "Volunteer Connection." Future sessions will address access to online training capabilities, too.

One of the needs for many of the local volunteers is more training and participation in the Disaster Action Team activities. Since these teams are normally activated in response to home fires, limited opportunities are available on the Hill. In response to a question from Dr. Dick Goldberg, one of MDP's medical coordinators, Aleman said, "There

are several areas with few calls, so we can create some scenarios to produce and engage between calls so you can get together with fellow volunteers." She also added that shelter training could be simulated, too.

On Wednesday after the session, Goldberg was very positive about the future relationship between Red Cross and MDP.

"We were very impressed and gratified that the Red Cross leadership came up here to talk to us," he said. Then he modestly added, "The compliments were ahead of the curve in terms of preparedness. I don't think any of us feels that way. There's so much to do such as managing shelters and the medical aspect of disaster preparedness. But I'm gratified they will really be a presence here and are willing to help Idyllwild."

The next Red Cross meeting for the Idyllwild volunteers is at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 4, at the Idyllwild Fire Station. Hill residents interested in becoming Red Cross volunteers may contact Pat Schnetzer at patschnetzer@gmail.com or call her at 818-571-6079.

to the future," wrote Jeffery Dvorak, chair of the Idyllwild Arts Foundation Board of Trustees. "We believe Pamela is uniquely qualified to do this. She is recognized as a leader in various independent school organizations and has already brought a number of her fellow leaders to Idyllwild to talk about the importance of arts education."

The Chicago school was founded in 1981 — younger than the Idyllwild academy. Jordan has guided much of its growth and prominence. In 2013, the Chicago school received the Kennedy Center's School of Distinction Award. During this time, she has connected with and shared experiences with the leaders of other art schools, since they have common and unique responsibilities.

Knowing former Idyllwild Arts President Bill Lowman has influenced her own growth. "I listened to his passion about art education. It was an epiphany when he retired," she said.

With alumni in Los Angeles and trustees in Palm Springs, trips to California were not uncommon. Often she would leave Interstate 10 to stop at Idyllwild Arts, she said.

When she announced her intent to leave Chicago, she told a trustee, "... I love [Chicago] so much. I've been here all my life." He was empathetic and told her she would "fall in love again."

"He was right, I fell in love all over again," she said about her brief time already at the Idyllwild academy. Here she oversees a boarding school with a very diverse student and faculty community. Describing Idyllwild as isolated is a mistake, she stressed.

"Idyllwild is a destination. You're here because of a choice," she emphasized. "Coming to Idyllwild Arts is a conscious decision ... [which] creates and fosters a lifestyle."

Even the participants in the Summer Programs are not passing through Idyllwild Arts, they're coming here, Jordan stressed. Arts-dedicated schools are sprouting up all over the world. Jordan helped develop one in Singapore.

"There's nothing like coming here and expanding one's experience with art and art making," she said. "But I want [the school] to be better known. I want people to know it's

the place to come to make art and to make meaning."

When Max and Bea Krone founded the school, they had other choices. "Why did they choose here?" Jordan asked. "I want to know why they chose Idyllwild and I want to know the town of Idyllwild. It's integral to these choices."

Although education was not her original career choice, she comes from a long line of educators, including a mother, who ensured each of her children could play the piano. So she is aware of the expectations associated with the choice to be at Idyllwild Arts and the responsibility of leading an educational institution, especially an arts school.

"One of her top priorities during the next year or so will be to lead us through a strategic planning process that will establish a vision for the future of Idyllwild Arts Foundation and provide a road map to help us achieve that vision," Dvorak said.

"Nothing in our mission says, 'We will tell you when you're an artist.' Twelve-year-olds must believe

that before they come," she said. And over the next two years, she plans to lead a strategic planning process to better articulate IA's purpose and path. As president, Jordan plans to move IA into its next chapter. "We'll have a shared vision that's both aspirational and inspirational in nature."

Jordan's background extends beyond the walls of academia. She studied music and spent a year in Austria training to become an opera singer. But eventually, the desire to build and lead an arts school prevailed.

"I stopped singing 10 years ago," she stated. When she commits, she invests fully in the opportunity; consequently, she did not have the time to maintain the quality of singing she possessed. "If you can't sustain it, you'll walk away. It's an option because you're good enough to do that," she explained.

Now Idyllwild Arts Academy is the focus of her attention, but her devotion is also shared with her husband, Christopher Scott, a former trombonist with the Chicago Philharmonic Orchestra.

Now a fundraiser, he is devoting "this year to support me in this role," Jordan said with a smile.
