Dining with dogs now legal

Restaurants may now cater to canines, if outside

hroughout all of California, dogs may soon dine with their owners on restaurant patios, under certain conditions. Gov. Jerry Brown signed the legislation, which will be effective January 2015.

Assembly Bill 1965, sponsored by Assemblymember Mariko Yamada (D-Davis), gives restaurant owners the option to permit canines and humans to chow together, if certain conditions are met, and no local ordinance prohibits the comingling.

Current law permits dogs to dine outside food establishments if the dogs are under the control of a uniformed law en-

forcement officer or a disabled employee or person in an area not used for food preparation.

However, AB 1965 allows local governing bodies to prohibit the presence of pet dogs even in the outside dining areas. And the owner of the restaurant must also permit the joint dining area. The bill does not mandate providing separate canine corners.

A separate outdoor entrance must be available for dogs to enter without going through the food establishment and pet dogs are not allowed on chairs, benches, seats or other fixtures. The law also states, "The pet dog is on a leash or confined in a pet carrier and is under the control of the pet owner."

Public questions need for more water revenue

uring the public hearing on Idyllwild Water District's proposal to reduce the volume of water included in its base rate, three customers spoke out.

Steve Holldber, the owner of Idyllwild Heating, told the board he was attending his first meeting, even though he has been a customer since 1976.

"I'm opposed to the water increase, not the sewer, based on what happened to me at my office," he said.

His water bill this spring peaked at about 800 gallons daily. After several calls and requests for help, both his water meter and sensor, the electronic scanning device used to read the meters without having to get out of a vehicle, were replaced. Since that change, his usage has dropped to 62 gallons daily, the normal levels for the previous several years, he said.

During his research about the problem, Holldber learned that Sensus, the scanner manufacturer, has had problems in many communities through the country.

"Most of these favor the customer and not the dis-

trict," he stated. "[The sensors] read the meter too slowly. Phoenix was losing millions of dollars each year until they changed equipment."

Based on his situation and apparently a similar one at Idyllwild Community Church, he recommended that IWD check its meters and scanners to verify they are accurate before implementing the new changes.

"I didn't use the water and nobody stole the water," he said. "As soon as the meter and sensor changed, the usage changed. No way I was using 800 gallons per day."



Pinyon murder suspects' hearing rescheduled

On Friday, Aug. 22, a hearing on whether to combine the trial of Robert Pape and Cristin Smith for a triple homicide in Pinyon in 2006 was rescheduled for Monday, Sept. 15.

In July, the prosecution submitted a request to consolidate the trials, but Pape's defense objected.

The District Attorney's office recommended that the trials of Pape and Smith be joined based on California Penal Code 1098. "The

present case grows out of the same event, occurring on the same date, involving similar behavior, and the elements of the three charges each defendant faces are the same ... given the similarities between the cases of the two defendants," according to the DA's brief to the judge.

Pape's attorney, Richard Blumenfeld, objected to the joining of the two trials for several reasons, which he argued would be prejudicial to his client. One reason was that Smith made a statement to Riverside County Sheriff's Department investigators that Pape might not

want admitted at his trial.

On the night of Sept. 17, 2006, Becky Friedli, 18, her mother, Vicki Friedli, 53, and Vicki's boyfriend, Jon Hayward, 55, were found dead at their Pinyon home. Becky's body was found burning in a wheelbarrow outside the house. The other bodies were found inside the burning home.

On March 11 this year, both Pape, 26, and Smith, 25, were arrested and charged for these murders. They were high school friends.

How serendipity saved a man's life

For Anza resident Scott Firth, the events of last February, are indelibly etched in his memory. An early evening trip down Highway 74 to the desert turned into a life-threatening disaster when he swerved to avoid another motorist and his vehicle cartwheeled 300 feet down the side of a steep ravine.

Firth, who was dressed for anticipated desert warmth, was ejected from his vehicle and lay in freezing temperatures overnight with broken back, shattered lung, broken arms and shattered shoulder, hidden from view of the busy traffic above.

Serendipitously, Caltrans worker Marcus Austin, based in Idyllwild, had been working with his crew that same night on each side of the location where Firth had left the highway. But it wasn't until he was returning home around 7 in the morning after completing his shift that he noticed skid marks on the recently blacktopped section of highway just past the Pinyon fire station.

"Because the blacktop was fresh, I hadn't noticed the skid marks that night even though our crew had been driving past that area," said Austin. "I noticed them the next morning and knew they were recent since I travel that area regularly."

Austin got out, peered over the side and saw Firth's truck, pretty badly damaged. "I figured if anyone was in the truck they were probably dead," he remembered. When he climbed down, he found Firth. "I talked to him, then went back up to flag someone down to call for emergency help."

There was no cell reception so Austin asked a motorist who had stopped to drive to where he could get or call for help. "I was down there for five minutes and I was shivering uncontrollably," Austin remembered.

Firth said he believed he would die there. He used his lighter to signal but he was too far down and not visible from above. "I could see car lights on the highway but nobody could see me," he said. But because Austin, as a Caltrans worker who regularly traveled that road, saw the skid marks from Firth's vehicle and knew they were recent, he investigated. "A lot of vehicles go over the side on that section of 74," said Austin. "His truck is still down there."

"I'm alive all thanks to Marcus," said Firth. "It's been six months now and I'm still in a wheelchair, paralyzed in one leg from the knee down. A ligament needs to be replaced. But I am alive and I am grateful."

Austin said anyone else would have done what he did. But the question is would anyone else have been as familiar with the road and noticed as he did?

State confirms West Nile virus in county mosquitoes

The state has confirmed that mosquitoes collected from several locations in the Murrieta and Temecula area and one location in the Hemet area tested positive for West Nile virus.

The Riverside County Department of Environmental Health received the confirmation after samples were collected Aug. 11 and 12 from locations at Monroe Basin, the northwest corner of Temecula and western Hemet.

It is not unusual for mosquitoes in parts of Riverside County to test positive for the virus, especially during the summer

In 2013, 81 mosquito samples tested positive for the virus.

The virus can be transmitted to humans and some animals through the bite of an infected mosquito. Most individuals infected will not experience any illness. Others will have only mild symptoms, such as fever, headache and body aches.

However, young children, the elderly or individuals with lowered immune systems are at greater risk of more severe symptoms. Anyone with symptoms is advised to contact their health care provider

The department also advises:

- Protect yourself against mosquito bites by using insect repellent. Use a repellent with DEET (N, N-diethyl-m-toluamide), picaridin (KBR 3023), oil of lemon eucalyptus [p-methane 3, 8-diol (PMD)] or IR3535 according to the instructions on the product label. DEET products should not be used on infants under 2 months of age and should be used in concentrations of 30 percent or less on older children. Lemon eucalyptus oil should not be used on children under age 3.
- Be aware of peak mosquito hours. Dawn and dusk are peak biting times for many mosquitoes. Consider rescheduling outdoor activities planned for those hours.
- Clothing can help reduce mosquito bites. Wear long sleeves, long pants and socks when outdoors to help keep mosquitoes away from skin.
- Mosquito-proof your home. Drain standing water where mosquitos lay their eggs. Limit the number of places for mosquitoes to breed by draining/discarding items that hold water, like old tires. Check rain gutters and drains. Empty unused flowerpots and wading pools. Change water in birdbaths and pet bowls at least weekly.

By our count, there are at least 10 local legislative bodies whose decisions affect all of us who live or work on the Hill. Most of our readers can't attend their meetings, which is exactly why we do.

After the war in Germany, the school children were taken to the concentration camp of Buchenwald. We were shown the ovens where many Jews were killed.


Yes and yes again — the Holocaust happened. We must never forget and this must never happen again.


Enforcement increases on highways

Caltrans and the California Highway Patrol are warning motorists statewide that the CHP is conducting maximum enforcement of traffic laws in active construction zones as part of a public safety campaign focused on work zone safety.

As part of this campaign, Caltrans will activate its electronic highway message signs in active construction and maintenance work zones around the state to display the following warning: "Workers Ahead, CHP on Patrol, Max Enforcement."

"This is about protecting the safety of California's motorists and the men and women working along the state's highways," said Caltrans Director Malcolm Dougherty. "Using our highway message signs and increasing CHP's presence around these areas, we are reminding California drivers to do their part in reducing collisions and hazardous conditions in these work zones.

Drivers should be aware that any traffic infraction committed within a construction work zone will result in a doubling of the usual fine. The enforcement message will be displayed Sept. 23 to 25 on any electronic highway message signs within 5 miles in advance of active construction work zones. The enforcement message will be activated when there are no critical emergency or traffic safety messages or Amber Alerts.

New England Clam & Corn Chowder With Herbs

Ingredients


- 6 thick bacon slices, cut crosswise into 1/2-inch pieces
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2 large carrots, peeled and chopped
- 1-1/4 tsps. dried thyme
- 1/4 tsp. crushed dried rosemary
- 3 tbsp. all-purpose flour
- 4 cups whole milk
- 18 oz. unpeeled, white-skinned potato, cut into 1/2-inch
- 36-1/2 oz. cans of chopped clams in juice
- 18-1/4 oz. can of corn kernels, drained
- chopped Italian parsley

Directions

Cook bacon in large saucepan over medium heat until crisp. Transfer bacon to paper towels to drain. Pour out all but 3 tbsps. drippings from pan. Add next four ingredients to pan. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Saute until crisp tender, about 5 minutes. Sprinkle flour over and stir 1 to 2 minutes. Gradually add milk to pan, stirring constantly. Bring to boil, reduce heat to medium and cook until slightly thickened, stirring often, about 5 minutes. Add potatoes, clams with juice and drained corn. Bring to a boil, reduce heat to medium-low and simmer until potatoes are tender, stirring often, about 10 minutes. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Divide soup among bowls, sprinkle with bacon and parsley, serve. Serves 4.

Note: Many of you may know this: Rub the dried herbs between your fingers. It releases flavor. Because of our altitude, I let every step cook a couple of minutes longer. Serve with garlic bread and a salad of your choice. Enjoy.





Bob Leih returns to Idyllwild School

A "Hillbilly," defined up here as an individual who attends Idyllwild School from kindergarten through eighth grade, has returned to school. Bob Leih, a teacher for 30 years and an Idyllwild resident for most of his life, is now the middle school (sixththrough eighth-grade) science teacher.

So now a third Leih has joined the Idyllwild School faculty. Both his father, Lewis, and mother, Marilyn, taught at Idyllwild School. For 28 years of his 30-year career, Leih has been teaching in the Hemet Unified School District. He started at Hamilton Elementary. After about 12 years, he moved on to Bautista Creek Elementary and now returns to his home.

"The schools are very similar because they are small schools where the teachers know all the kids and want to take responsibility for all them, too," Leih said, smiling. At teachers' meetings or even lunch, faculty members at these schools discuss their students' progress.

"If a student struggles in my class, I'll ask [a colleague] if he is struggling in your class' and should I try a different approach?" he said. "We're constantly working together at Idyllwild School and the kids get attention to a much greater degree."

When he and Lynne, his wife, returned to Idyllwild after he got hired at HUSD, Leih chose Hamilton Elementary. "I was very close with many of the faculty," he said. "My father had been a teacher and principal there for 19 years. They were good family friends."

The Leihs have four children — Kindra, Amy, Jonathan and Josh — all Hillbillies, too. But as they started high school in Hemet, Leih felt it would be a good time to transfer schools and be working in Hemet, which is why he began at Bautista Creek.

"I could take them to school and bring them home," he explained. "It

was good car time and all were involved in afterschool activities from choir, dance to sports."

Teaching in Hemet also allowed Leih to be involved in other activities. For example, he served as Hemet High's assistant junior varsity volleyball coach for several years.

After 16 years at Bautista Creek, an elementary school, Leih is teaching middle school at Idyllwild and able to fully apply his science major for the first time, one of his passions.

"The community of Idyllwild is an outstanding living laboratory," Leih said. "It's a living, breathing, unique ecosystem in Southern California. All I have to do is explain science in my hometown."

Besides the classroom instruction, Leih also has inherited responsibility for the three middle school offsite trips — Joshua Tree, Astrocamp, and Catalina Island. He has gotten much help from his predecessor, Lenore Sazer, who retired at the end of the 2014 school year. They worked closely over the summer after Leih was selected to replace her and continue.

But the classroom is Leih's other love. "One of my big goals and passions is to build great school relationships with students, their parents and the staff I work with," he stressed. "The more the three of us communicate and work toward some trusting relationship, the more successful we'll be educating the students.

He is not the only Hillbilly on the Idyllwild School faculty. Fourth-grade teacher Brennen Priefer

also is a Hillbilly.

So far only daughter Kindra is pursuing an educational profession, but Leih doubts she will be at Idyllwild. While at a private school currently, he said he would not be surprised to learn she is headed to China to teach.

In reviewing Yamada's bill, the Senate Rules Committee report identified a 2013 article in the "Journal of Environmental Health," which found the "overall public health risk is low as long as safety, sanitation and hygiene practices are stringently enforced."

Some local California jurisdictions have already enacted ordinances to make this practice lawful. The Senate Rules Committee noted that "the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health implemented guidelines for the allowance of pet dogs in outdoor dining areas. These guidelines are similar to those outlined in this bill ... and other county environmental and public health departments, including Pasadena, Sacramento and Santa Barbara, have issued guidelines for allowing dogs in outdoor dining areas."

After Brown signed the legislation, Yamada said in a press release, "It will soon be legal to take your beagle with you to dinner. With Governor Brown's signature, restaurateurs in California will see more businesses catering to their customers and the canine companions they love. I wish everyone 'bone-appétit.'"

Dry Times









Above are pictures of a very barren Foster Lake. Normally, the Lake percolates to feed primary IWD wells. When it is full, it is 18 feet deep. Unfortunately, the Lake has been dry since January, resulting in reduced water levels in our wells. The drought in California has been persistent. Drying vegetation increases fuels for wildfires. Earlier this year, the Governor issued an executive order declaring a State of Emergency to exist due to severe drought conditions. There is no guarantee that winter precipitation will alleviate the drought conditions. Locally, we are in a Stage 2 mandatory conservation condition. This has been very successful in saving water — more than 6 million gallons in the first six months of 2014 as compared to the first six months of 2013. Thank you for your efforts to conserve water!

- However, with reduced water consumption, higher energy costs and increased pumping depths (times) revenues drop and customer rates will need to increase. What can you do to help?
- Take shorter showers....we have 3 minute timers available for customers.
- Don't let the water run when brushing your teeth.
- Stop and check for leaks. IWD has toilet tablets available if you believe you may have a silent toilet leak.
- Only water landscaping between the hours of 6pm and 8am in the morning. (This is mandatory during Stage 2. During Stage 3 there will be no watering of outside landscaping, unless you purchase water for an on-site water tank.)
- If you see running water or sprinklers running during the day, please call the IWD office at 951-659-2143
- Replace water thirsty landscape with drought tolerant or California native landscaping.
- When in an Idyllwild restaurant, ask for water if you need it otherwise pass it up! We will post additional information on our website: idyllwildwater.com

Idyllwild Water changes billing structure to raise revenues

The Idyllwild Water District approved a proposal to create a new water billing tier last week. Currently, the majority of residential customers pay a flat fee of \$28.70 for the first 3,740 gallons used each month. Usage of more than that amount costs less than a penny per gallon.

But Resolution 693, which was approved 4-1, will now charge most residential customers on a per-gallon basis for consumption greater than 1,870 gallons. The maximum charge for the next 1,870 gallons would be \$13.27. So, the same 3,740 gallons — assuming it is all used — will cost \$41.97 under the new rule.

All other customers also will have the volume of water provided for a flat fee reduced by 50 percent and begin paying on a per gallon basis for the difference. No changes were made in the usage for the higher tiers above these levels.

"Our pricing is very low compared to a lot of districts," said General Manager Tom Lynch.

The change, along with the previously approved 6-percent rate increase, is estimated to generate another \$192,000 for IWD, according to Financial Officer Hosny Shouman. The current 2014-15 water revenue projection is \$1.1 million.

However, Director John Cook recognized that the proposed change embedded two conflicting objectives. One was an increase in revenues, during a period when dropping consumption also reduces revenue. The sec-

ond is an effort to encourage conservation during water emergency Stages 2 or 3.

He recommended that the proposed new tier be implemented only during a declared Stage 3 emergency. "In Stage 3, we need additional revenue and customers use less water, but we need the funds to pay our bills," he said

He also recommended that the new tier be set at a level that encouraged conservation and helps educate customers about the appropriate usage levels. "The 250 cubic feet [1,870 gallons] is arbitrary," Cook noted. "What is the typical residential usage if they conserve in Stage 3?" he asked rhetorically.

If the flat fee amount were based on typical usage and conservation, then customers who exceeded the target would not be conserving, he said. He argued for a level that would send a message from the district.

In response, Shouman said that if the new tier proposal were limited to Stage 3, the additional revenue would not be sufficient to support IWD's water capital improvement program and, consequently, reserves would continue to decline.

"If we keep the status quo, we'll lose the capital program and take a chance of catastrophic failure. We would have no choice but to use reserves," Lynch replied.

During a Stage 2 condition in fiscal year 2001-02, the average usage per IWD customer was nearly 5,000 gallons per month. During the current Stage 2, average consumption has fallen to 3,700 gallons per customer, a nearly 25-percent decline.

Cook's colleagues agreed to look at the current rate

structure for the various water stages, particularly Stage 3, at a future meeting. While he was grateful, Cook still opposed the resolution creating the new tier. He felt strongly that this policy should be deferred until the board had made decisions about a business plan and a long-term capital improvement plan, and discussed what an appropriate reserve amount should be.

After adopting this change, the board officially set Sept. 10 as the date for a public hearing on the proposed sewer-rate increases.

During his discussion of work in progress, Lynch reported that IWD's well levels are "holding or slightly diminished." The recent rain has had little effect on the wells and Foster Lake remains dry, Lynch said.

IWD's July water usage was 9.7-million gallons, a 1.6-percent increase above the 2013 usage. However, for the first seven months of 2014, total usage (49.3-million gallons) has dropped nearly 11 percent compared to the same period in 2013 (55.3-million gallons).

In the next few weeks, Lynch plans to test some of the Southern California Edison recommendations for reducing electric costs. He will use two similar wells. "... one we will operate as we normally have and the other will be operated with different procedures," he told the board. "We'll see if we can achieve projected efficiencies. If we do, we could save substantially on pumping costs."

The new Tollgate tank has been inspected by the State Public Health Department and is being filled and shortly will be a new addition to the distribution system, according to Lynch.

Other communities that have had meter-reading problems with Sensor equipment include Muskogee, Oklahoma, Saranac Lake, New York, Honolulu, Hawaii, Katy, Texas, and recently Faribault, Minnesota.

IWD staff said they checked Holldber's meter and General Manager Tom Lynch said it was tested and reported 99.7-percent accuracy. But Holldber responded that Sensor has said the meter and sensor cannot be tested separately.

"We do not know what was wrong. No answer yet," commented Board President Jim Billman.

Steve Moulton, Bubba Books proprietor, spoke next. He pointed out that the district also receives revenues from property taxes and asked if water revenue in July had been sufficient.

"Yes, it was a good month for us. July is usually the highest month of the year," responded Chief Financial Officer Hosny Shouman. The water revenue in July was slightly more than \$110,000 and resulted in a net surplus of \$37,100 after expenses were deducted, according to Shouman.

Shane Stewart, local businessman, attended and asked what the district had done to reduce its costs before seeking more revenue.

In response, Shouman explained that the changes in employee benefit packages had produced \$145,000 in savings. The employees were now making a greater personal contribution to retirement plans and some plans had been changed.

IWD also has finished making its payments on long-term bonds, resulting in a \$125,000 annual savings, added Lynch. This year, IWD will test recommendations Southern California Edison has provided to reduce pumping costs. (See accompanying story.)



The Desert Sun/Elliott-Pope school reunion

More than 100 people affiliated with the Desert Sun School (later the Elliott-Pope Preparatory School) in Idyllwild from the year 1942 to the school's closure in 1990 held a reunion last Saturday. The reunion was on the school campus, now the site of Astrocamp.

Some Idyllwild notables who attended were Marshall Hawkins, who taught sports at Elliott-Pope in 1986. Although Hawkins is primarily known for his music abilities, he also taught and coached many different sports. He recalls he didn't really know

much about girl's volleyball. He said, "The girls taught me volleyball, and I taught them how to be together as a team." The team went on to win the CIF state championship.

Another local who attended the school in 1963 was David Salk. He remembers being in the cafeteria, where the reunion luncheon was held, and hearing the news that President Kennedy had been shot.

Garner Valley resident Margaret Wellman Jaenke was hired by Edith Elliott, founder of the Desert Sun School in 1942, when the school was in Mecca. Jaenke recalls she had just graduated from high school when she became a housemother, cook and bookkeeper. She left in 1943 to study education.

When the school moved from Mecca to Idyllwild in 1946, Jaenke's family provided the horses for the students and staff from their cattle ranch in Anza. Jaenke led many trail rides for the school. Never one to slow down, Jaenke founded and operates the Anza Historical Museum.

Math teacher Gordon Wilson and his wife Evelyn, the French teacher, were greeted by former students. The Wilsons met on the Saunders Meadow campus in 1969, fell in love and were married three months later.

Michael Melas, class of 1979, enjoyed reminiscing with other students. His mother, Herta Melas, taught at the school from 1969 until it closed.

Ian Livingston from Northern California and his sister Ellie Livingston Row enjoyed coming back to Idyllwild. While looking over Jaenke's album, they discovered some pictures of their mother, Jesse Whitman, who had been a teacher at the Mecca location in the early days.

After lunch, Bob Smith, Idyllwild historian, spoke on the history of Saunders Meadow before it became a school. In 1925 it was the Idyllwild Golf Club. The grandsons of Edith and Richard Elliot were in attendance and gave anecdotes about their grandparents.

Kaththe Fenters, Carol Creveling and Bruce Epstein organized the 2014 reunion. Lynnda Hart put together the school's history — on display at the Idyllwild Area Historical Society Museum — as well as a timeline Smith produced on the development of the property. The museum is open from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays at 54470 North Circle Dr. Admission is free.



A plan to complete Scott Foster's documentary

Reko Moreno, lead cameraman on the late Scott Foster's Idyllwild Herd Gathering documentary, needs locollaborators help finish the ambitious project. Moreno, a friend and professional associate of Foster. is based in Los Angeles and needs help locally to coordinate postproduction of the valentine to Idyllwild and its artists that Foster fought to complete up until his untimely death.

The documentary uses the recent public art Deer Sightings project as a metaphor for what makes Idyllwild unique — how residents come together to make the town a better and more lovely place to live; how they help when help is needed; how they give when there is a worthy cause; and how they celebrate the town they love in ways large and small.

Foster filmed interviews with many residents, always asking the same questions: Why was the Deer Sightings public art installation important? What does it do for the community? What makes Idyllwild special? And why do you choose to live here?

"Scott raised enough money for the production of the film, but not post-production," said Moreno. "He was going to edit, compose, sound design and do voice over. We had talked about raising money for color correction, graphics, title sequence and deliverables, but he passed away before we ever really got to it." Foster died of kidney cancer at age 43 in May of this year.

Now Moreno, along with Foster's partner Annie Brook and his mother Maria, need local volunteers to administer postproduction. Scott left notes about how to finish the film through postproduction. What Moreno and the family hope to find is a local group to shepherd the film through postproduction to completion and distribution, and coordinate a campaign to fund the balance. Major funding for the documentary itself, nearly \$30,000, was gathered through a public-platform Kickstarter campaign.

"Scott knew everyone in the community," said Moreno. "That kind of personal connection with the community is what we still

need to finish this project." Moreno noted that Foster was struggling with his own worsening health as he was conducting the interviews for the project. "We have a lot of footage of Scott dealing with his own stuff," said Moreno, noting that that material could be part of an epilogue. "He managed to bring so many people together on this project. It's why he lived in Idyllwild. He talked a lot about why he moved here and how important it was for him to give back. He kept asking, 'What have I really done for other people?' In the last two weeks he was pushing himself beyond limits."

Moreno estimates it might take another \$30,000 to \$50,000 to finish and secure distribution for "The Herd Gathering." But more than the money, Moreno feels it's critically important to have a local committee that feels as Scott did — why it is so important to tell the story of those who have been drawn to this community and enrich it through their creative spirit, love and gifts.

"He always said, 'It's not about me, it's about Idyllwild," remembered Moreno.



Steele in FedEx-Cup playoffs

Last week Brendan Steele made it into Sunday's play in The Barclays, the first of four FedExCup playoff tournaments, but he didn't score well enough to help himself in the standings. The Idyllwild native posted an evenpar 71-71-69-73 — 284 to finish in 57th place.

He found only 53.6 percent of the fairways with drives averaging 281 yards and hit 66.7 percent of the greens in regulation, while gaining only 0.11 strokes putting against the field. Nevertheless, he pulled off some sterling shots, like Sunday's 172-yard iron from the left fairway bunker on the par-4 seventh hole that left him a 2-footer for birdie.

Quintuple FedExCup points are awarded during the playoffs, so although Steele picked up 63 points last week, he dropped nine places in the FedExCup standings — from 67th to 76th place. This is important because he must be in the top 70 to advance into the third tournament, the BMW Championship.

Steele easily qualifies (top-100) for the second FedEx-Cup playoff tournament this week, the Deutsche Bank Championship on the TPC Boston course in Norton, Massachusetts. But he likely will have to score better in the Deutsche Bank than he did last week in The Barclays to advance into next week's BMW.

Pine Cove water negotiating communication lease renewal

By J.P. CRUMRINE News Editor

Since the July Pine Cove Water District board meeting, Director Robert Hewitt and General Manager Jerry Holldber have been studying how the district might modify the proposed lease renewal for one of its Rocky Point tower customers.

Wednesday, the two shared their idea with the whole board, who embraced it unanimously.

"I think it's a good deal," commented Director Diana

Initially, the proposed monthly rental for this year (fiscal 2014-15) would have been \$1,477.36, about \$70 more than last year, with 5-percent annual increases in the following years. In a June letter to the board, lessee Fred Parker, president of Comtronix, Inc. of Temecula, requested re-consideration of the annual rate because of a loss of customers.

Holldber and Hewitt recommended reducing this year's charge to \$1,300 per month with 3.5-percent annual increases. The result would save Comtronix more than \$13,000 over the next five years.

The district could also use Comtronix to provide maintenance on its electronic communications equipment or help install new equipment as well as reprogram the district's radios.

During August, Holldber reported that a unique problem occurred in one of the Rocky Point aeration plants. The firm that constructed the plant recommended replacing them rather than repairing the 16-year-old equipment. Two new aeration units will cost \$8,000.

"This was unexpected and unplanned, but the funds can come out of the improvement fund," he told the board. "The aeration units do everything we wanted and add better quality to good water."

In water business, Holldber reported that July usage was about 3.7 million gallons, 120,000 gallons more than the July 2013 production of 3.6 million gallons.

"It's a little more than last year and a little less than a couple of years ago," he said and attributed the increase to construction projects.

While the ground-water level of the district's monitoring well dropped 2 more feet in July to a depth of 114 feet, Holldber told the board that all the other wells were doing well. The monitor well's depth has fallen 16 feet in the past year and a total of 37 feet since July 2012.

"The summer rains gave the wells a chance to recover; most are doing alright," Holldber reported.

"They're doing better than I would have expected without a snowpack," commented Eskew.

Through July, the first seven months of the year,
