Bell ringer and bell

If you're on the corner of North Circle and Cedar at 9:15 on a Sunday morning, you're in for an experience. The bell of the Idyllwild Community Presbyterian Church demands the attention of all.

It peals in 12 bongs, so cleanly and so loudly you'll think it must be an electronic bell with a huge speaker and an amplifier turned up to nine. But then you see the 3-foot-diameter bell swinging in the open, above the roofline — with an ordinary rope attached.

A quick walk around the bell end of the church one recent Sunday revealed Gerald Van Zanten pulling on a long, wooden-handled hook slipped through a loop in a rope hanging from the roof. Van Zanten has been the church bell ringer for about two years now, he said, having taken over from long-time bell ringer Ralph Reid. Since Reid was Van Zanten's bell-ringing teacher, the student suggested that I talk with Reid directly.

Reid, 93, still a parishioner, answered a few questions. "The 12 bongs are for the 12 apostles,"

he informed.

"We ring the bell at 9:15, and again at 9:25 — one to wake 'em up, and one to get 'em in," he added with a wry smile.

As near as anyone can figure, Reid had rung the bell for about 20 years at the church. When asked how the bell could be rung so clearly and evenly, with

no stuttering at the start, Reid explained. "You pull the rope down until the bell is up," he said. "Then you let it fall."

Radio club ends WNKI offer to Idyllwild Fire

Negotiations about Idyllwild's emergency radio station, WNKI, between the Mile High Radio Club and the Idyllwild Fire Department have reached an impasse, according to MHRC President Bill Tell.

Since Bob McCullough retired as WNKI's manager in the fall of 2012, the position has been vacant,

although volunteers have kept it functioning. But MHRC offered to manage the station and bring their expertise to its dials and antenna almost two years ago.

Speaking to members of the Pine Cove Property Owners Association, Tell said he had sent a letter to Idyllwild Fire Chief Patrick Reitz indicating MHRC had withdrawn its offer to manage the radio station.

The club's original offer

DA dismisses charges against Pinyon homicide suspects

Nearly seven months after two men were arrested for a triple homicide that occurred eight years ago, the Riverside County District Attorney's office has dismissed all the charges against Robert Lars Pape and Cristin Conrad Smith.

In March, a grand jury indicted Pape and Smith, but because he was under 17 years old at the time, Smith's indictment had to be dismissed and he had to be arraigned in front of a judge. Riverside County Judge James Hawkins later ordered Smith to stand trial for the homicides, too.

Governor signs plastic bag bill

As expected by many, the governor signed the plastic bag bill on which the Town Crier reported last month. The law will go into effect July 1, 2015, or July 1, 2016, depending on the type of store.

As the Town Crier reported, “full-line, self-service retail stores” selling “a line of dry groceries, canned goods, or nonfood items, and some perishable items” with gross annual retail sales of at least \$2 million must comply with the law starting July 1, 2015 — as will stores with pharmacy licenses that have 10,000 square feet of retail space and generate local sales or use taxes under the Bradley-Burns Uniform Local Sales and Use Tax law.

Other stores selling retail food goods for consumption off the premises and holding either Type 20 or Type 21 licenses issued by the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control and stores with such a liquor license selling a “limited line of goods, generally including

milk, bread, soda and snack foods,” on the premises must comply by July 1, 2016.

The law requires stores to stop providing single-use carryout bags to customers unless they are recycled paper bags or compostable bags for which customers must pay at least 10 cents. But the compostable bag exception is available only where certain other criteria are met — specifically, an enabling vote of the local governing authority and with available curbside collection of foodwaste for composting. Also, stores may not require customers to use the single-use bags — customers may choose to use reusable bags instead.

All funds collected from such single-use bags will be kept by the stores, but may be used only for certain purposes, including the costs of complying with this new law, of providing the bags themselves, and of educating and encouraging the public to use reusable bags.

The law is intended to ban single-use carry out bags, whether they be made of plastic, paper or

other material, “that is not a recycled paper bag or a reusable grocer bag that meets the requirements” of a section of the new law. That section requires that reusable grocery bags sold by covered stores be manufactured by a certified reusable grocery bag producer. Also, such bags must be cleanable and disinfectable, and have at least 15 liters of capacity with a handle designed to withstand at least 125 uses.

Not all single-use bags are prohibited. Besides compostable bags and bags made of recycled paper,

bags provided by a pharmacy for prescription medications, and nonhandled bags used to protect a purchased item from damaging or contaminating other purchased items when placed inside a carryout bag, are not prohibited, nor are bags used for unwrapped food items or bags over articles of clothing on a hanger.

The law is to be enforced by cities and counties with civil fines of \$1,000 per day for the first offense and up to \$5,000 per day for third and subsequent offenses.

Stores on our Hill that

may possibly be affected by this new law include Fairway Foods, Village Market, Skye Island Natural Foods, Idyllwild Pharmacy, Mountain Top Liquors, Idyllwild Shell, Pine Cove Market, and the market at 1000 Trails. But when the new law will apply to each of them or other stores — or even if it will apply to them at all — will depend upon variables such as the store’s annual sales, square footage and liquor licenses, if any.

New law amends state fire prevention fee

Gov. Jerry Brown signed legislation last week that specifies the state's fire prevention fee will be applied to "habitable structures." The current law simply says the fee applies to structures.

The new language makes it clear that habitable structures are for residential use and exclude "commercial, industrial, or incidental buildings such as detached garages, barns, outdoor sanitation facilities, and sheds."

The changes also exempt the fee if the State Board of Equalization may exempt any habitable structure that

is subsequently deemed uninhabitable as a result of a natural disaster during the year for which the fee is due, as well as one subsequent year if the habitable structure has not been repaired or rebuilt.

To qualify for the exemption, the owner of the habitable structure must certify that the structure is not habitable as a result of a natural disaster and document that the habitable structure passed a defensible space inspection conducted by Cal Fire or by one of its agents within one year of the date the structure was damaged or destroyed.

Northstate District 1 Assemblyman Brian Dahle

of Bieber in Lassen County sponsored the bill. His district includes Shasta, Lassen, Nevada, Siskiyou, Modoc, Plumas and Sierra counties, and portions of Butte and Placer counties.

"Like most North State residents, I'd rather see the fee simply repealed," Dahle said in a press release. "In the meantime, this bill reforms some of the worst aspects of the fee. In particular, it was egregious that the law taxed homeowners who'd lost their homes to fire."

Other amendments include removing the requirement that the fee be adjusted for inflation annually. That is now a discretionary

decision of Cal Fire.

AB 2048 also eliminates the 20-percent penalty for each 30-day period in which the fee remains unpaid after becoming final and replaces it with the state's general 10-percent penalty that applies to late payments of fees.

Another amendment addresses the possibility that the current litigation over the constitutionality of the fee may succeed. It authorizes the state to refund past fee payments even if the property owner did not file an official petition for redetermination with the appropriate fiscal year.

The amendment states, "The untimely petition may

be treated as an administrative protest or claim for refund if the department determines that the facts presented indicate that the fire prevention fee originally determined may have been excessive or that the amount or the application of the fee may have been the result of an error by the department, its agent, or the State Board of Equalization."

In 2011, the legislature passed AB 29X1 requiring the Board of Forestry and Fire Protection to adopt emergency regulations to establish a fire prevention fee. In January 2012, the board issued regulations, establishing a fee of \$150 per structure on a parcel lo-

cated within SRA, with a \$35 reduction for each structure that is also within the boundaries of a local fire protection agency. A structure was "defined as a building used or intended to be used for human habitation, on a parcel that is within a state responsibility area."

Currently, the fee was adjusted for inflation and is \$152.33 per habitable structure outside a fire protection district and \$117.33 for habitable structures within a fire protection district.

Revenues from the fee are to be used exclusively for fire protection.

Air quality reducing cancer risk

Editor's note: SCAQMD is the air pollution control agency for Orange County and major portions of Los Angeles, San Bernardino and Riverside counties. This report is from an SCAQMD press release.

A major study by Southland air quality officials has found that reductions in toxic emissions have cut residents' cancer risk from air pollution on average by more than 50 percent since 2005.

"Air pollution controls on everything from cars to trucks to industrial plants have dramatically reduced toxic emissions in our region," said South Coast Air Quality Management District Executive Officer Barry Wallerstein. "However, remaining risks are still unacceptably high in some areas," Wallerstein said. "We need to maintain our commitment to reducing toxic emissions so that everyone can breathe healthful air."

SCAQMD's Multiple Air Toxics Exposure Study IV found that the average cancer risk from air pollution across the region declined from 1,194 in 1 million during MATES III in 2005 to 418 in 1 million in 2012-13 using similar methods of analysis. The risk reduction follows a trend of declining toxic emissions in the region since the first MATES study in 1987.

MATES IV found that diesel particulate emitted from diesel trucks and oth-

er diesel-powered vehicles and equipment was responsible for 68 percent of the total cancer risk. Fully 90 percent of the risk is due to mobile sources, which includes everything from cars and trucks to ocean-going ships, locomotives, aircraft and construction equipment.

The highest cancer risk, about 1,050 in 1 million, was found in and around the ports of Los Angeles, the region's hub of goods movement activity powered by ships, trucks and locomotives. Central Los Angeles and transportation corridors including freeways and rail lines also had some of the highest risks. The lowest cancer risks were found in central and south Orange County, southwest Riverside County and the Coachella Valley. Since MATES III, the greatest reductions in cancer risk have occurred in areas with the highest overall risk, including the ports.

MATES IV measured levels of some 37 gaseous and particulate air toxics, from benzene to lead to diesel particulate, at 10 permanent monitoring stations across Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino counties. Toxics were monitored every sixth day from July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013.

In addition to the permanent monitoring sites, SCAQMD used mobile monitoring platforms to assess local impacts in several loca-

tions including near airports, rail yards and warehouses.

Air quality data and economic trends between 2004 and 2013 indicate that the reduction in toxic emissions and cancer risk was not due solely to the recession. From 2010 to 2013, for instance, the number of containers shipped through the ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach — a key indicator of goods movement activity — has rebounded, and yet toxic emissions during that period continued to decline.

Although toxic emissions

and the resulting cancer risk have been significantly reduced over time, a recent assessment by the California Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment has found that the actual magnitude of cancer risk has been significantly underestimated by current state guidelines.

During the past decade, scientists have found that children's sensitivity to air toxics has been underestimated. When OEHHA approves and implements its revised cancer risk guide-

lines, expected during the first quarter of 2015, cancer risk estimates will increase by an average factor of 2.7. SCAQMD's risk numbers for MATES IV, and risks posed by mobile sources, businesses and industrial plants, will be revised upward accordingly.

This revision in the cancer risk calculation methodology does not change the fact that actual emissions and risk have declined by more than 50 percent since 2005.

SCAQMD's landmark MATES studies combine

monitoring of ambient air toxics, toxic emissions inventories, and complex computer modeling to present a detailed picture of the sources of cancer risk from air pollution and the magnitude of those risks across the entire Los Angeles Basin.

MATES I measured a limited number of air toxics in 1987. MATES II in 1998-99 and MATES III in 2004-06 monitored more than 30 toxic air pollutants at the same 10 locations used in MATES IV.

The more time I spend on Facebook, the less I enjoy it any longer.

It sufficiently keeps me up-to-date on distant relatives and friends but only if I'm willing to spend hours unearthing their individual posts. I'm becoming less interested in doing so. I would rather spend time on the NY Times website reading news or tangling with the day's crossword.

Mostly, I'm tired of the unoriginality of most people's FB posts — the borrowed posters with clever sayings, the shared videos gone viral, the obvious truth that people lack communication skills except vicariously through others. This is sad, actually.

I also find troubling how people feel FB is a private forum and they willingly post personal information they would not want published in public. Yet often what they post becomes immediately available to anyone with a computer and a Facebook account — birthdays, children's names, upcoming vacations (so thieves will know they're not home).

They express political and personal viewpoints they likely would never want published in a newspaper. They think that FB is more private when, depending on their privacy settings, it could be spread to an even wider audience than they imagine.

As much as I dislike FB for my own personal use, I find it invaluable in my business to locate people for interviews and to get leads for stories. I use it to make connections, and to inform and infer.

And for one of my hobbies — genealogy — I'm able to build onto my family tree simply by reading the personal information distant family members post about their immediate families such as children's names and birthdays. People reveal a lot about themselves in that forum.

Bicycle riders

EDITOR:

I understand bicyclists have laws now to protect them on the road, but the danger going up (especially) and down the mountain on a bike is potentially (very probably) going to injure or kill someone.

I usually go no more than 40 to 50 mph up and down the mountain road. The speed limit is 55 mph unless otherwise posted. Bikes can't do that going up; they are barely moving. So a car going around a partially blind corner at about 30 mph could fine a bike and/or body in a car grill.

Going down isn't as bad because the biker can go faster and a car can usually see them better. The 3-foot space on a two-lane mountain road is ridiculous. All it does is cause a traffic backup and possible/probable accidents.



If we vehicle drivers pay taxes via our vehicle registration for road improvement and the use of roads, why don't bicyclists? We have laws for bicyclists — same as for a car, truck and motorcycle — bike lanes and now a 3-foot space to drive by a bicyclist, so I think they need to pay registration for their bike and also stay off mountain roads, except for certain allocated times posted on the road.

The life they save may be their own. By the way, I ride a bike also, but smarter.

I will be contacting our government reps to have them look into registering bikes and changing the laws for two-lane mountain roads; they are always looking for a way to get more tax money and this one makes sense.

Proposition 46 aimed at medical malpractice

Proposition 46, the Medical Malpractice Lawsuits Cap and Drug Testing of Doctors Initiative, also known as the Troy and Alana Pack Patient Safety Act of 2014, is the result of a personal family tragedy in which two children, walking with their mother to get ice cream in their neighborhood after a Halloween party, were killed by a driver under the influence of prescription drugs. After the deaths of Alana, 7, and Troy, 10, their father Bob Pack quit his job to become a full-time activist and advocate for changes to existing law that, in his view, if enacted, could prevent similar tragedies in the future.

The legislation captures the critical elements

Pack believed precipitated the tragedy: a driver who had gone "doctor shopping" to get multiple prescriptions for pain medications; doctors who had failed to consult a controlled-substance database that could have revealed the multiple prescriptions for the patient in question; lawyers who refused to take Pack's case on behalf of his children because of the low (\$250,000) cap on medical malpractice, originally enacted in 1975; and the lack of drug-testing laws for doctors.

The proposed legislation would require health-care practitioners to consult the state prescription drug history database before prescribing certain controlled substances as medications; increase the state's cap on non-economic damages (pain and suffering) in medical negligence lawsuits to adjust for inflation with subsequent yearly adjustments (with a likely maximum of \$1.1 million to account for nearly four decades of inflation); require drug and alcohol testing of doctors and reporting of positive tests to the California Medical Board; require the CMB to suspend doctors pending investigation of positive tests and take disciplinary action if the doctor was found to have been drug-impaired while on duty; and require all health-care practitioners to report any doctor suspected of drug or alcohol impairment or medical negligence.

The measure, if approved, would be the first in the nation to require

Attorney general releases second report on statewide truancy

Partially successful with legislative package

In a second report on truancy throughout the state, California Attorney General Kamala Harris repeats her admonition from last year's findings that "a truancy crisis continues in California."

"California elementary school students continue to miss school at unacceptably high rates," Harris said in a press release. "Improvements in education policy are moot if students are not in class. California needs common-sense solutions that help parents and educators reduce elementary school truancy."

This year's report found that 20 percent of elementary school students were truant. Truancies have increased in the past year.

Research in "In School + On Track 2014" found that more than "... 250,000 elementary school students were chronically absent in 2013-14 — defined as missing 10 percent or more of the school year." That is more than 18 days of school.

"... over 50,000 elementary students were chron-

ically truant, and over 40,000 missed at least 36 days of school in one year," the report found.

The truancy rate in the Hemet Unified School District was 27.3 percent last year. Locally, it was 18 percent at Idyllwild Elementary and dropped to 10 percent at Idyllwild Middle School, according to HUSD's Coordinator of Child Welfare and Attendance Frank Green.

In HUSD's Local Control Accountability Plan, approved in June, the district set a goal to reduce chronic absenteeism rates. While HUSD's truancy rate is lower than the average for Riverside County and the state, district officials will attempt to reduce it 1 percent annually over the next three years. To achieve these goals, hiring more elementary counselors is in the plan.

HUSD also will attempt to lower its suspension rates over the same period.

Idyllwild School Principal Matt Kraemer takes some extraordinary efforts to ensure students can be at school and have the op-

portunity to learn. Kraemer might make home visits to check on a student.

After three unverified absences or late by more than 30 minutes three times, he asks to meet with the family. "Sometimes these sessions can get contentious, because parents think the child only represents money, the ADA [average daily attendance reimbursement from the state]. But that the furthest from our mind, its the educational role of the school," said Kraemer.

"Sometimes we learn things we didn't know, such as a serious family illness or car problems," he said.

Last year, a mother living in a remote area broke her leg and couldn't drive. Kraemer arranged for a teacher, whose commute passed near this home, to pick up the student so they wouldn't miss school. "Of course, this was a temporary measure," he said.

During the spring, following a release of her first truancy report in September 2013, Harris partnered with several legislative members to formulate a package of bills to address these problems.

The bills would help schools and counties work with parents to address

the core reasons behind truancy and chronic absence. They would give local school districts and counties tools to comply with attendance-tracking requirements in the Local Control Funding Formula, state truancy mandates, and state and federal reporting requirements.

All four were passed in August, but Gov. Jerry Brown signed only two of them — Assembly bills 1643 and 2141. The latter requires that District Attorney offices provide a report to school officials on the outcome of truancy-related referrals. This will help school officials determine which outcomes are most effective and guarantee baseline information sharing between referring agencies and prosecutors.

However, Brown vetoed Assembly bills 1672 and 1866. In his veto message, Brown explained, "AB 1866 would require school districts to collect and report a significant amount

of new student attendance information through the California Longitudinal Pupil Achievement Data System. While well intentioned, the collection of data for the interest of far-away authorities would not get to the root of the issue — keeping kids in

school and on track.

"AB 1672 would place new data collection and reporting burdens on districts that have voluntarily established local School Attendance Review Boards. A broad group of local education leaders believe AB 1672 'is simply a new requirement that mandates large amounts of specific data collection, disaggregation, formatting and Internet posting.' I agree. Districts already have the ability to collect attendance and truancy data, and must address school attendance and chronic absenteeism under the Local Control Funding Formula.

"[LCFF] was created because local education agencies are the ones best suited to set goals and guidelines for their students. In the same vein, efforts to combat truancy are best exercised at the school level among teachers, principals and local school officials."

In response to the governor's veto action, Harris said in a press release, "I am disappointed that Governor Brown vetoed AB 1866 and AB 1672. These are missed opportunities to help keep California's youngest and most vulnerable students on track.

The facts are very clear ... We must get serious about keeping track of whether young children are in school."

But she added, "The governor has expressed his commitment to reducing absenteeism and his signature of AB 1643 and AB 2141 are good steps in the right direction."

"In School + On Track 2013" also made the point that elementary school truancy is at the root of the state's chronic criminal justice problems. Missing large amounts of school is one of the strongest predictors of falling behind academically and dropping out, even in early grades.

Students who don't read proficiently by the third grade are four times more likely not to receive a high school diploma than proficient readers, which puts them at risk of becoming a victim or perpetrator of crime. An increase of graduation rates by just 10 percent would result in a 20-percent drop in violent crime, and prevent 500 murders and more than 20,000 aggravated assaults per year in California, according to the report.

Estimating cancer risk from air pollution is not an exact science. There are some uncertainties in the cancer potencies of substances, the estimated population exposure and the estimates for diesel particulate pollution. However, SCAQMD staff, aided by a technical advisory panel of outside experts, used the best-available science to assess risk in MATES IV.

Toxic air pollutants are specific hazardous chemicals known or suspected to cause cancer or other serious health effects. Health effects from other pollutants, including ozone and fine particulates (PM2.5), are not addressed in the MATES studies and are assessed in the agency's AQMP Plans.

A 24-hour drop box is available outside the main entrance of the Registrar's

office at 2724 Gateway Drive in Riverside. Vote-by-mail ballots also may be dropped off at any polling place within Riverside County before 8 p.m. election day, Nov. 4.

Any registered voter may request a vote-by-mail ballot until Oct. 28. The request form is on the back of the sample ballots. Also voters may use the application form on the Registrar of Voters website at www.voteinfo.net. The request forms may be returned by mail or by facsimile to 951-486-7272.

Early voting at the Registrar of Voters office began Monday, Oct. 6, and continues Monday through Friday (excluding county holidays) from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The hours will be 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. the Satur-

days of Oct. 25 and Nov. 1.

The Registrar's office will be open to voters on election day from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Early voting also will be offered from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday to Sunday, Oct. 24 to 26, at the Galleria at Tyler, 1299 Galleria at Tyler in Riverside; at Westfield Palm Desert, 72-840 Highway 111 in Palm Desert; and the Promenade in Temecula, 40820 Winchester Road.

In the June 2014 primary election, an all-time high of 69 percent of ballots cast were by mail. More than 51 percent of participating voters used vote-by-mail ballots in the November 2012 general election.

Local jurisdictions are more Republican than the state

Given the upcoming general election, while Democrats represent 44.3 percent of the registered voters in California, the local registration tilts toward Republicans. Total state registration is higher than four years ago.

Republicans are 39.8 percent of total Riverside County registered voters but only 28.2 percent of the statewide electorate. Republican registrants have been declining for nearly two decades.

In California, 7.7 million registered Democrats represent

43.4 percent of total party registration, but less than the 46.7 percent Democratic registration in 1998. That is nearly 2.7 million more than Republicans who only outnumber individuals with no party preference by 900,000 voters. The number of voters choosing no party preference has grown from 12.6 percent of voters in 1998 to 23.1 percent in September 2014.

In Riverside County, Democrats are 35.6 percent. No party preference was the choice of 19.4 percent.

According to the secretary of state, the 876,748 registered county voters represent 63 percent of eligible voters, whereas statewide, 72.7 percent of eligible voters have registered.

Within county Supervisorial District 3 (which includes all of the Hill neighborhoods), Republicans dominate the party choices, representing 44.8 percent of registered voters. The 3rd District includes 83,136 registered Republicans, the greatest number of the county's five supervisorial districts. And registered Democrats number 52,216 or 28.1 percent, which is the least of the five. No preference was the choice of 21 percent of the local voters. The 39,012 with no party preference are the greatest number of the five districts.

The 3rd District has 185,906 registered voters, which is the most of all five supervisorial districts.

Proposition 47 reduces penalties for some crimes

Leading in polls

Proposition 47, alternatively the Reduced Penalties for Some Crimes Initiative or The Safe Neighborhood and Schools Act, seeks to "ensure that prison spending is focused on violent and serious offenses, to maximize alternatives for non-serious, nonviolent crime, and to invest the savings generated from this act into preventing and supporting programs in K-12 schools, victim services, and mental health and drug treatment."

The effects of the legislation, say proponents, would be to open currently overcrowded prison bed space to the most dangerous criminals and save the state criminal justice system hundreds of millions of dollars annually spent prosecuting lower-level offenders. A similar annual savings would also accrue to the county criminal justice system. Both estimates of savings come from the state's legislative analyst and director of finance. The measure is leading in both the Field and Public Policy In-

stitute of California polls with margins from 57 to 62 percent in the "yes" column.

Caveats are in place in the legislation, placed on the ballot through the initiative process, that attempt to ensure that resentencing does not release inmates with prior convictions for murder, rape, certain sex offenses or certain gun crimes.

The measure would require a "thorough review" of criminal history and mandate a risk assessment of any individual prior to resentencing to ensure they pose no danger to the public. About 10,000 current inmates would be eligible for resentencing, according to Lenore Anderson of Californians for Safety and Justice. Measure guidelines would apply to juveniles as well as adults.

Prop 47 would also create a "Safe Neighborhoods and Schools Fund," using estimated savings of \$150 to \$250 million per year, with 25 percent of annual savings to be directed to the Department of Education, 10 percent to the Victim Compensation and Government Claims Board, and 65 percent to the Board of State and Community Correction to fund mental health and substance abuse treatment and victim services as well as reducing

school truancy and preventing school dropout rates.

Specifically, the measure would require misdemeanor or sentencing instead of felony for the following crimes in which the value of the criminal "taking" does not exceed \$950: shoplifting; grand theft; receiving stolen property; forgery of check, bond or bill; fraudulent use of a check, draft or order; or authoring of a bad check. Also eligible

State budget process on November ballot — again

Once again state voters will have an opportunity to vote on a proposition affecting California's finances. Its purpose is to pay state debt sooner and set aside funds each year for future economic emergencies and exigencies.

State debt

For the next 15 years, Prop 2 requires the state to spend at least 0.75 percent of General Fund revenues each year to pay down 1) debts for pension and retiree health benefits and 2) specified debts to local governments and other state accounts. (The funds spent on pension and retiree health costs must be in addition to payments already required under law.)

As of 2014-15, the 0.75 percent allocated to debt

for penalty reduction would be personal use of most illegal drugs.

Opponents include many law enforcement agencies including the California District Attorneys Association, California Coalition Against Sexual Assault, California Police Chiefs Association, the California State Sheriffs Association and Crime Victims United. San Diego Police Chief Shelley Zimmerman says the measure would release thousands of dangerous inmates and would prevent judges from blocking early release of prisoners except in "really rare cases." She also asserts that reducing penalties for "date rape" drugs to misdemeanors undermines current laws against sex crimes.

San Francisco District Attorney George Gascon, who cosponsored the initiative, cited prison overcrowding, incarceration of non-violent offenders with mental health or substance abuse problems, and increased rates of recidivism as elements of a broken sentencing system that need to be fixed. "Incarceration doesn't fix the problem," he said, arguing that sentencing needs to be revised.

A recent analysis by a non-partisan think tank, the California Budget Project, found that passage of Prop 47 would likely reduce recidivism rates, improve community health and lower crime rates and criminal justice spending.

Additional opponents include: the California Republican Party, the California Retailers Association, California Peace Officers Association and the California Correctional Supervisors Association.

Supporters include: the California Democratic Party, California ACLU, the AFL-CIO, the California Federation of Teachers, the California Labor Federation, the League of Women Voters, and the California Catholic Conference of Bishops.

equals about \$800 million annually.

Also, when state tax revenues from capital gains are higher than average, Prop 2 requires the state to spend some of these higher-than-average revenues on these state debts. In the past decade, this occurred about half the time.

One effect of this proposition is that more funding for debt payments reduces the availability of funds for other programs, such as schools, jails and social services.

State reserves

The proposition would also require the state to set aside in reserves the same amount as goes toward paying debt each year for the next 15 years. The addition to the state reserves would range from \$800 million to \$2 billion each year.

However, the amount dedicated to reserves could be reduced in some situations if the governor calls a "budget emergency." The situations, for which the governor can declare a budget emergency are 1) if a natural disaster, such as a flood or an earthquake, occurs, or 2) not enough money is available to keep General Fund spending at the highest level of the past three years (adjusted for changes in the state population and the cost of living).

However, the legislature would have to agree to reducing the set-aside for reserves.

Under current law, the governor has no restrictions on reducing the reserve allocation.

Existing law sets a maximum reserve total of \$8 billion. Prop 2 would set the limit at 10 percent of the General Fund, about \$11 billion now.

School district reserves

Prop 2 also specifies criteria for establishing and funding a state reserve for school districts. Before money would go into this reserve, the state would have to make sure the amount spent on schools and community colleges grows along with the number of students and the cost of living. And it does not directly change the total amount of state spending for schools and community colleges over the long run.

However the proposition includes a new state law that sets a maximum amount of reserves, which school districts could keep at the local level. (This would not affect community colleges.) For most school districts, the

maximum amount of local reserves under this new law would be between 3 and 10 percent of their annual budgets, depending on their size. In the past, most school districts have kept reserve levels much higher than these maximum levels.

The minimum school district reserve requirements that exist under today's law would still apply. Therefore, district reserves would have to be between the minimum and the maximum in these years.

This new law would apply only in a year after money is put into the state reserve for schools described above.

These provisions have been the lightning rod for opponents to Prop 2. Mostly they represent groups in favor of greater educational spending or autonomy.

"After even a penny goes into Prop 2's 'school rainy day fund,' local school districts will only be allowed to save for — at most — a few weeks of expenses. Why does it matter if Sacramento determines what districts can save? For the last seven years, Sacramento has delayed billions in payments to schools until after the end of each school year — funds needed to pay teachers, staff and suppliers. Without locally controlled reserves, districts would have faced higher borrowing costs and deeper cuts. Depending on Sacramento is a losing proposition for schools," wrote the directors of Educate our State.

The governor, the State Assembly speaker and the California Chamber of Commerce president support Prop 2. They argue, "California needs Proposition 2 because it prevents the state from spending more than it can afford. Only three years ago, California faced a \$26 billion budget deficit that required the legislature to make painful cuts and voters to approve temporary tax increases. Proposition 2 will make sure that we don't repeat this cycle of boom and bust budgeting."

In an early September poll, the Public Policy Institute of California found 43 percent of likely voters supported Prop 2 and about a third opposed it. The undecided voters were about 24 percent of the electorate.

The polls authors reported, "Just 30 percent of likely voters say the outcome of the vote on this measure is very important to them. At the same time, a solid majority of likely voters (62 percent) say the state's budget situation is a big problem, and 53 percent say the state budget process is in need of major changes."

ART'S CORNER

The inaugural presentation of the Idyllwild Arts Academy Orchestra under its new conductor took place in the IAF Theatre this past Saturday evening with a nearly all-Baroque program, small in scale, but nonetheless major in outlook. Conductor Timothy Verville provided a short introductory statement, broadly sketching the program's works and indicating the general direction of his plans for the remaining three concerts.

It is a vision worthy of student ambition as well as audience anticipations; fresh from his accomplishments in Japan and several conducting positions in the western U.S., Verville provides the Idyllwild Arts people with an equally fresh thrust toward scintillating programming arrangement, a convincing conducting style and a basic approach to the fundamentals.

As was evident from the first work on the program, the overture to the oratorio "Saul" (which Handel designated as a "symphony" in the old sense of that word) was given as short and straightforward a performance as it demanded, emphasizing both string and wind choirs in somewhat fast tempos throughout, and giving the as-written role of the organ continuo to the very able keyboardist Jeanette Louise Yaryan, whose harpsichord technique was put to the test spectacularly in an extended cadenza.

Following the conductor's short speech, the IAA Music Department's chair who put his talent as oboist on display in the revised version of the Alessandro Marcello oboe concerto; the more familiarly (if not so easily) essayed version in the key of C minor proved a proud accomplishment for Ryan Zwahlen, and the fulfillment of his wish to perform the work (expressed to this writer at the Ponderosa Concert Hall this past May) in an Idyllwild setting. Zwahlen's proficiency at tone projection in such a large concert venue was particularly noteworthy, as was the give-and-take in the accompanying orchestral part.

A welcome change in the form of Andrew Park Jackson's recent and undated "a continuum" was effected, with the addition of more players to complement the Baroque ensemble (principally brass and percussion). In this work, Verville demonstrated his handling of the ever-shifting metrical patterns of the piece — somewhat of a modern workout on such varied ancient dance rhythms as the gavotte, minuet and gigue — as well as his style of cueing the various orchestral members, and a pleasant overall effect was appreciated.

The second major work on the program followed a short intermission, and as revelatory in essence of the movement from the Baroque to the Classic in the late 18th century could not be better demonstrated. Mozart's "Great G Minor" symphony, was integral to any orchestra's repertory, was given as perfect a rendering as it deserved, particularly in the outer movements; but in both the "Andante" and the "Menuetto," Verville's conducting prowess came over most specifically, re-emphasizing the contrast the composer wished to present between the earlier gallant era and the revolutionary times to come, both symphonically and politically.

Overall, the remainder of the 2014-15 IA season is in as trustworthy hands as necessary.

Local teen author Kara Swanson spoke about her book "Pearl of Merlydia" (entrustsource publishers, 2014) at the Idyllwild Library and signed books for about 25 young fans last Thursday.

Swanson spoke briefly about how the inspiration for the book, for her and her co-author/editor Charis Smith, was living as children of missionaries in Papua New Guinea. Swanson spoke of how she dealt with loneliness, fear and insecurity as a young teen in those remote and strange environs. Her feelings were the inspiration for the challenges and struggles of her heroine, Pearl.

She described Pearl's story in this way. When the magical jewel that protects her undersea homeland is tragically stolen, Pearl, a young princess, must venture out into a strange world to retrieve it. Armed with only her courage and faith, Pearl must face terrifying monsters,

Swanson wrote from her experiences of coping with living as a teen in a missionary family in one of the most primitive countries and cultures in the world. She incorporated the details and concerns of her daily life in Papua New Guinea into her heroine's coming-of-age story.

Kara described how she would write a chapter and then Charis, her friend, would edit.

Kara was 16 when she wrote the book. She urged her young audience, should they have any dreams of becoming an author, to "write, write and write some more — to read, to write and to soar."

Whatever you decide, save the "flippy." It'll be worth at least \$200 on the vintage market in 50 years.

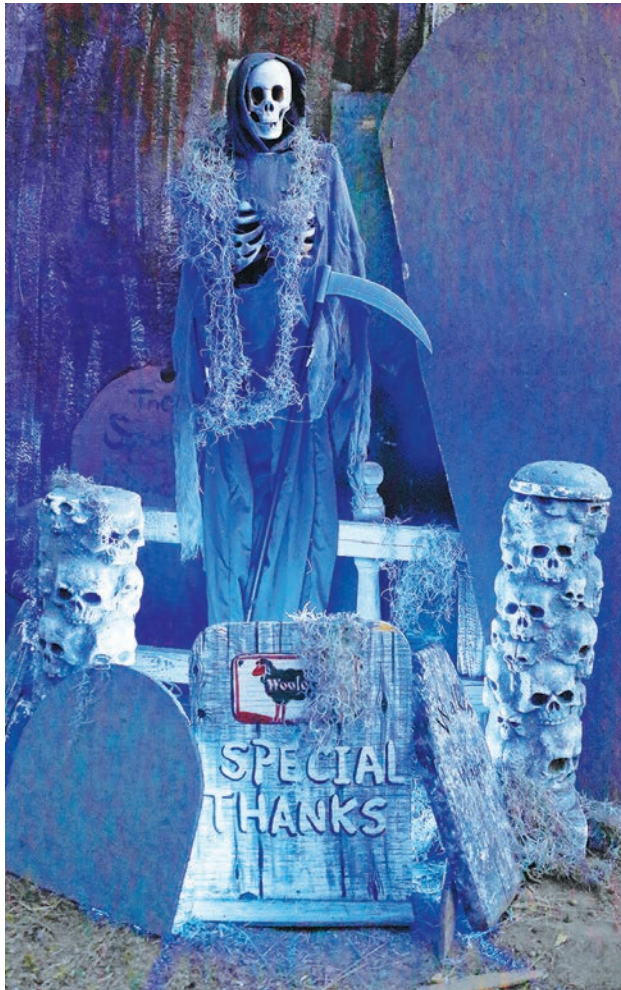
Dear Dr Know It All:

Jim Viglione gets to the heart of his art

The art Jim Viglione creates is about as unique as it gets. Art enthusiasts stop excitedly by his booth at art shows just about everywhere he displays his work, including the 2nd Saturday Art Fair in Idyllwild. The question is always the same: "What kind of wood is that?" And as far as Viglione knows, he's the only guy using the heart of the Whipple Yucca, also called the "Lord's Candle," to create his art. "Right now, [I'm the only one] unless someone copies it in the future ... A lot of people do the pine needles on gourds and very often people will walk by my booth and say, 'Oh, are these gourds?' because they've seen them so often with pine needles on gourds," Viglione explained. "They're yuccas so usually I have a picture of the yucca in bloom so they can see what it looks like. Then on the back of the photograph it has [them] in their raw state ... so they can see the amount of work that goes into them. If you could see them when they come out of the ground they're pretty ratty."

Viglione first saw the heart of the Whipple Yucca in raw form. "I saw one once that was just a raw one, right out of the ground, and someone had stuck a bunch of dried flowers in it," he recalled. "I got to looking at it and I thought, 'With a little embellishment that could be really nice — maybe sand it smooth.'" So he cleaned, sanded and varnished it and, later, began weaving pine needles and adding stitching to each piece that has resulted in some truly awe-inspiring creations.

"When I get them I never know what part of them is still sturdy [until] I start cleaning them and I realize that [the piece] has decayed from age and weather. I cut out all of the decayed part and then once I do that, I can look at it and think about what I can use. Do I just keep weaving around and around or do I need a little medalion?" he explained. "I try to work with what nature has already provided. On the simple ones I'll go a little fancier, but if it's got a nice shape to it I'll keep the stitching relatively simple so it doesn't take away from the piece itself." In addition to the uniqueness of the wood itself, Viglione's stitching and weaving, a skill he learned early in his life, adds an additional element of originality.

Born in Connecticut, Viglione's family lived in the country and his father, in addition to working for the railroad, also raised goats. Young Viglione helped his father make goat cheese. "To cure the goat cheese we had to make these little baskets about 4 inches around," he recalled. "I would help weave the baskets when I was little and then we would pack the goat cheese and let it cure." Always interested in art, Viglione took art classes in all of his four years of high school. For graduation, his parents gave him a very special gift. "The graduation gift my parents gave me was a trip to San Miguel de Allende in Mexico. There's an art institute there," he said. "They sent me there for a summer course."

After a stint in the military where he was stationed in Monterey and Petaluma before being sent to Fukuo-ka, Japan, he returned to Connecticut where he worked in a weaving mill for a time. A move to Palm Springs some 50 years ago further sparked his interest in weaving and coiling. "I got really interested in the native Cahuilla basket work. I understand some of the Cahuilla from the San Diego area are doing this pine needle work now," he said. "They're selling them at the little Cahuilla Museum on Palm Canyon Drive right downtown ... it's the Kumeyaay, the tribe down in San Diego. They are all related with the Cahuilla."

Pinyon Pines, where Viglione has resided for 19 years, provides him with ample supplies of the wood he finds mostly on private property in the area, avoiding the potential of a problem with the U.S. Forest Service, which he has contacted several times to inquire

about the permit process. "I've checked with [the Forest Service] three times about a permit and believe it or not, twice they never answered; they said they had no idea they would have to check into it and call me back, [which they] never did," he offered. "The third time [I talked to] a very nice forestry lady that lives down in

Palm Desert and she said, 'I'll get you an answer.' About a week later I was talking with her and I said, 'Did you get an answer?' and she said, 'No, I can't.' She said, 'No one knows. They said no one has ever asked for a permit for this. For manzanita, yes, for pines for firewood, yes, but for this, they said no one has ever asked. We don't know what to tell you.'" Viglione carries a shovel and saw in his car just in case he spots one while he's out driving. "I think for the most part, people with vacant lots up here are just happy to get them off their lot. It is fuel for fire," he added.

Despite his success at selling his art, Viglione, who is retired, hesitates to turn his hobby into a full-blown business. "I would go out and I'd find a nice piece and I'd clean it up and paint it, maybe stick some dried flowers in it or something and I'd give them as birthday, Christmas or a house gift, a host or hostess gift," he said. "Right now I just enjoy doing it, but if I got a bunch of people asking, 'Is my piece done? Is my piece done?' it's going to be a job and I don't want that. I didn't retire to do all of that."

He does, however, attend art fairs because it allows him to pick and choose the ones he would like to attend. One of his early showings was at a Memorial Day Art fair he attended in Idyllwild the year before last, "I just got a folding table and went down there with a few pieces and they all sold; it was kind of funny ... everyone was there with these fancy canopies and table cloths and everything. I had a chair, a folding table, and some of these [art pieces] on it," he said laughing. "I kept moving [my table] because it was kind of chilly and I would move out to the sun, then I would drag the table into the shade for a while. I wondered if I sold them all because people felt sorry for me. I was this one little guy sitting there all by myself." Little by little, Viglione has stepped up his art fair display by purchasing a "nice canopy" to display his work.

With the Art Alliance's Art Walk and Wine Tasting from 2 to 5 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 11, Viglione is looking forward to the season-ending 2nd Saturday Art Fair that happens to coincide with the Art Walk event. "We're going to have a wine pour [at the 2nd Saturday Art Fair location] so that's good because a lot of folks will come in," he said excitedly.

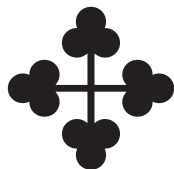

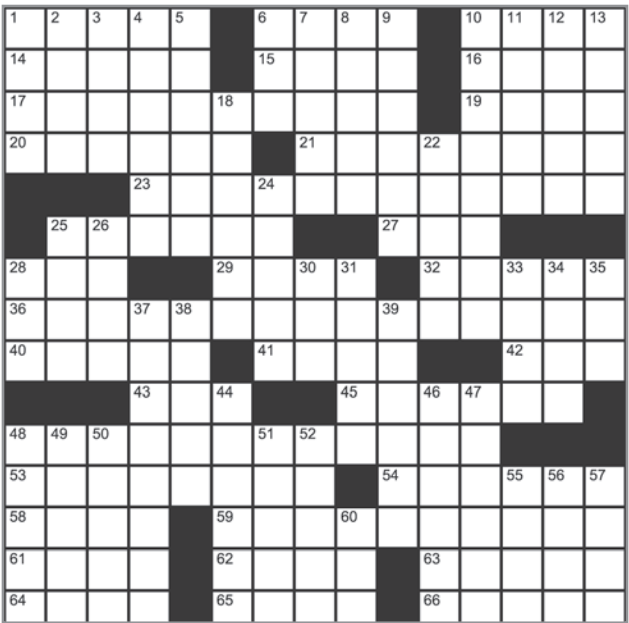

drug testing of physicians, although drug testing is in place for many public-service and public-safety personnel.

Opponents say the initiative isn't about protecting patients, but about increasing the legal fees of lawyers who prosecute medical malpractice suits.

The state legislative analyst and state finance director estimate increased state and local government health-care costs from

raising the cap on medical malpractice damages will range from tens of millions of dollars to several hundred million dollars annually. They posit that those costs could be offset by potential savings to state and local governments from required doctor monitoring of the state prescription drug database to alcohol and drug testing of physicians.

Specific provisions of the legislation cite studies showing one in 10 doctors suffers from drug or alcohol abuse during his or her

career resulting in misdiagnoses and botched surgeries that can cause permanent injury or death to their patients.

Proponents argue that health-care costs to consumers won't rise if malpractice insurance fees to doctors are raised as a result of this legislation. They note medical malpractice insurers have consistently had such high profits annually that even if the cap on medical negligence lawsuits were raised, insurers would continue to earn high prof-

its. They claim that the insurance industry overall earns a 6.5-percent return whereas the medical malpractice insurance industry earns a 16.7-percent return, more than 250 percent of the industry average. They claim that the state has "an effective and successful system to regulate medical malpractice insurance premiums" that won't change if the cap is raised.

Supporters include: Consumer Watchdog, the Consumer Federation of California, the Congress

of California Seniors and the Consumer Attorneys of California. Opponents include most medical associations, the California Republican Party, the California Chamber of Commerce, the California NAACP, ACLU of Southern California, the California Teachers Association and the Los Angeles County Democratic Party.

Opponents argue that if the legislation is passed, medical lawsuits and payouts will skyrocket and that health care consumers will have to pay the

bill. They also cite privacy concerns from doctors being mandated to consult a database with personal patient information with no increased security standards. They also claim doctors in poor areas could be negatively impacted by higher costs of practicing in those areas, leading to reduction of patient care in underserved communities.

It was time for the 9:25 ringing, so Van Zanten suggested that Reid demonstrate, and, with a bit of hesitation, he complied. He pulled the rope downward slowly and carefully, making the bell tilt upward. The heavy clapper remained hanging straight down, and Reid was careful not to let the bell touch it. Then he let the bell fall onto the clapper and kept it swinging. Out came a peal of 12 perfectly spaced bongs. Reid then stopped the bell from swinging just as expertly.

Van Zanten clearly has mastered the art, too — his peal at 9:15 had sounded exactly like Reid's at 9:25. Both men appeared quietly to enjoy the task.

About the bell itself, from Bob Smith — historian with the Idyllwild Area Historical Society, who also writes a regular column for the

Town Crier — we learned:

"A minister by the name of E. Dow Hoffman once owned a cabin in Pine Cove, where he frequently scheduled retreats for members of his First Methodist Church of Upland. That church, which was built in 1899, originally had a bell that tolled for some 50 years before it was replaced by chimes during an expansion project. The bell thus became surplus, and to preserve it, Rev. Hoffman brought it to his Pine Cove cabin. A few years later he decided to donate it to the Idyllwild Community Church where it was installed and first rang on Palm Sunday, March 30, 1958, to celebrate the start of Easter week."

"The only problem with the bell," bell ringer Reid revealed, "is when it snows, the rope freezes to the roof."

Enterovirus confirmed in teen

Health officials have confirmed Riverside County's first case of a potentially serious respiratory illness in a teenager from southwest Riverside County. From mid-August to Oct. 7, a total of 628 people in 44 states and the District of Columbia have been confirmed to have respiratory illness caused by EV-D68, according to the federal Center for Disease Control.

The teen was treated at a medical facility in San Diego County for enterovirus D68 (EV-D68) and is recovering at home, said Dr. Cameron Kaiser, Riverside County public health officer. Several other suspected cases also are being investigated.

"The illness has affected many portions of the country and state, including Southern California, so its arrival in Riverside County is not a surprise," said Kaiser. "But there are simple steps that can be taken to slow the spread and lessen its impact on the community."

As of Oct. 1, the California Department of Public Health has confirmed EV-

D68 infection in 14 patients this year. Besides Riverside County, the patients are residents of Alameda (2), Los Angeles (1), San Francisco (1), Santa Cruz (1), San Diego (5), Solano (1) and Ventura (1) counties, and Long Beach City (1), Dr. Ron Chapman, CDPH director and state health officer announced Friday. The ages range from less than 1 year to 15 years.

"Given the magnitude of EV-D68 in other parts of country, we are pleased with the number of new confirmed cases in the state not growing as rapidly as it is elsewhere," said Dr. Gil Chavez, CDPH deputy director, who acknowledged that CDPH expects the number of cases to continue to grow.

Thirteen of these patients have had respiratory illness and one has had acute flaccid paralysis. Other specimens from throughout the state are

being tested at CDPH laboratories and more cases are anticipated in the coming weeks. CDPH continues to work with local health departments to collect and test specimens from patients with severe respiratory illness and acute flaccid paralysis without other known causes.

Enteroviruses are transmitted through close contact with an infected person, or by touching objects or surfaces contaminated with the virus and then touching the mouth, nose or eyes.

Here are some health tips to protect yourself from respiratory illnesses:

- Do not go to work or school if you are feeling sick.
- Wash hands often with soap and water for 20 seconds.
- Avoid touching eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid kissing, hugging and sharing cups or eating utensils with people

who are sick.

• Disinfect frequently touched surfaces, such as toys and doorknobs, especially if someone is sick.

Most of the illnesses across the country have occurred in young children and many have reported a history of asthma. For children with asthma, parents should review the asthma plan and contact their health care provider if the condition worsens.

It is estimated that 10 to 15 million enterovirus infections occur in the U.S. each year. While more than 100 types of enteroviruses commonly cause respiratory illness, EV-D68 is a less common type, which was first identified in California in 1962.

Enteroviruses can cause a wide range of illnesses, including the common cold. EV-D68 has also been detected in children with other illnesses, including paralysis, but there is no known link between the virus and other types of illnesses. Although some enteroviruses can cause serious disease such as polio, the vast majority of enterovirus infections are minor and patients recover completely.

Legal cat fight precedes homicides dismissal

While the motions between the District Attorney's office and Robert Pape's attorney became more heated, the contention between the prosecutor and defense ultimately became moot when the DA's office dismissed its charges against Pape for the 2006 triple homicides in Pinyon.

Whether Riverside County DA Paul Zellerbach would have to appear as witness to be questioned by Pape's attorney, Richard Blumenfeld, became the equivalent of a legal food fight.

In its Sept. 19 motion, the DA's office complained that Blumenfeld's original motion of 32 pages, "exceeds the page limit set forth by local court rules ..." Further on, the motion accuses Blumenfeld of "wast[ing] scant judicial resources and the time of an elected official by frivolously serving subpoenas ..." and characterizes his motion as "an improper 'fishing expedition.'"

In his response, Pape's attorney compared the DA's office efforts to dismiss Zellerbach's subpoena to notorious political actions of the past.

"[T]he entire episode more resembles a second-story operation like the Watergate break-in than a judicial proceeding. Instead of E. Howard Hunt and G. Gordon Liddy, the henchmen here were Kelli Catlett and Emily Hanks [the deputy DAs working this case]. And like Watergate the object of the exercise is the obstruction of justice," he wrote.

Blumenfeld originally filed a subpoena for Zellerbach on Sept. 9. A hearing was held on Sept. 12, and Judge Michael Naughton, who was not assigned to the case, quashed the subpoena. However, Blumenfeld missed the hearing.

But at the scheduled hearing on Sept. 15, Blumenfeld appealed that decision to Judge Charles Stafford, who acknowledged that another judicial official had quashed the subpoena and he was unwilling to overrule it. Eventually, during the hearing, he decided to order Zellerbach to appear at the October proceeding and said the court does not need to subpoena his presence.

After this hearing, the DA's office said, "DA Zellerbach is aware of the judge's order and intends at this time to abide by the order."

Subsequently, on Sept. 19 and 24 and as late as Oct. 2, the day before dismissing the charges, the DA's office filed motions to quash Zellerbach's court appearance. Basically, they argued that Blumenfeld had provided no reason why Zellerbach knew anything about the case that the deputy DAs wouldn't know. Since he had no direct personal knowledge of the grand jury proceedings, his appearance as witness was unnecessary.

Near the conclusion of the Sept. 19 motion, the DA's office shared its opinion of the defense's actions. "Other than the inherent harassment, intended fishing expedition and resultant sideshow circus created by compelling the presence and testimony of the current top law enforcement of-

ficer in Riverside County post-election, there is no legitimate purpose in subpoenaing Mr. Zellerbach."

Blumenfeld's opinion of the DA's argument for quashing the intended court appearance was to liken him to the "Sun King, ...somehow above the law and that the law must bend to his will or whim."

On Oct. 2, the DA's office described Blumenfeld's response as "unprofessional vitriol" and diversion tactics, blatant intimidation and gamesmanship. The next day, the DA's office dismissed all charges.

Since the charges against Pape and his friend Cristin Smith were dismissed at the hearing scheduled to decide whether the DA should be a witness, the court avoided making a decision on this peculiar and antagonistic legal debate.

was made Friday morning Oct. 3, at the scheduled hearing on whether to deny a motion for DA Paul Zellerbach to appear as a witness in an evidence hearing.

In a press release, the DA's office stated, "Upon a closer review of the grand jury proceedings,

the District Attorney's office has determined that legal issues arose during the proceedings against defendant Pape that make it appropriate to dismiss the case at this time. Although defendant Smith was held to answer after a preliminary hearing, the District Attorney's office has concluded that it would not be appropriate to contin-

ue the criminal proceedings solely against defendant Smith so the charges against both men have been dismissed."

In the release, the District Attorney's office stated its commitment to continuing its investigation of the murders of Becky Friedli, 18, her mother, Vicki Friedli, 53, and Vickie's boyfriend, Jon Hayward, 55, who were found

dead on the night of Sept. 17, 2006.

When asked if Smith and Pape would continue to be suspects in the ongoing investigation, John Hall, DA's office senior public information specialist, responded, "All we are saying is the investigation is ongoing."

is nearly two years old, Tell said. The length of time for the negotiations has been frustrating for MHRC's steering committee, which decided to rescind its offer and hope that is recognized as a wake-up call.

Nevertheless, Tell indicated he still hoped an arrangement between IFPD and the club might still be possible.

"I hope it spurs the fire department to re-enter negotiations," he told the group. He asked PCPOA and County Service Area 38 (Pine Cove) to draft a letter supporting MHRC's management of WNKI. "If we pull together and put your weight behind MHRC, we may bring IFPD back to the table."

Current PCPOA president Annamarie Padula

said she would "definitely prepare the letter."

As of Tuesday, Oct. 7, Reitz has not responded to an email from the Town Crier asking if he was optimistic that a successful agreement could be reached between the two organizations.

"[The club] has a vision to broadcast WNKI from Poppet Flat to Pinyon," Tell said. "We can cover the entire area that's part of the [Community Wild-fire Protection Plan]. People are screaming, 'We can't hear you.'"

With mountain terrain, coverage of the whole Hill is a challenge, according to Tell, but MHRC member Tom Pierce has developed a plan that should accomplish this task of propagating the station's signals.

"The MHRC has the vision, the engineering know-how and the drive to

pull together a team from multiple agencies to make this happen," Tell has said.

When PCPOA President Annamarie Padula asked what would happen if the letter failed to be a catalyst to complete the agreement, Tell remained positive. "I've been to many meetings in town and a lot of people are behind us," he replied. "County Fire is helping with a repeater on Santa Rosa Mountain. There are a lot of parts which can help it happen."

WNKI, 1610 AM, was established in 1988. The station founders were George Covington and Carol Lindholm who were involved in managing the station until 2003 when McCullough, Pine Cove resident and former water district director, assumed the daily management, especially during fires and

other emergencies.

Covington and Lindholm envisioned a station to keep Hill residents informed of approaching disaster threats, updates during emergencies and information for residents who have complied with evacuation orders.

"[The station] was George's idea, WNKI was his baby," McCullough told the Town Crier in 2012. "IFPD said they'd provide the space, but George had to raise the money."

While IFPD holds the FCC broadcast license, Covington did raise the \$19,000 from various agencies, such as Cal Fire, the Forest Service and private donations, to equip the station. WNKI also provides local weather information and public service announcements, but its primary function is to broadcast emergencies.
