Recovery plan for yellow-legged frogs

On Wednesday, Oct. 15, the Center for Biological Diversity and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced an agreement to litigation CBD had filed for protection of Southern California's mountain yellow-legged frogs.

The Fish and Wildlife Service has agreed to prepare a recovery plan for the endangered frogs by December 2018.

Recovery plans are a key tool for identifying actions necessary to save endangered species and eventually remove their Endangered Species Act protection. Species with dedicated recovery plans are significantly more likely to improve than species without plans.

CBD has filed numerous lawsuits to protect the local amphibian; the most recent was in February seeking the preparation of a recovery plan. The mountain yellow-legged frog was listed as endangered in July 2002.

FWS also will pay \$14,250 in attorney fees to CBD.

Although the frogs have been protected under the ESA for more than a decade, the federal agency has not completed the required recovery plan.

"I'm so glad these severely endangered frogs will finally get a recovery plan," Collette Adkins Giese, a CBD attorney and biologist, said in a press release. "Recovery plans really need to be developed soon after species are protected, because they give us a roadmap of exactly what we need to do to ensure those species won't go extinct.'

Despite the absence of a plan, efforts to re-establish the mountain yellow-legged frog have been ongoing on the Hill for several years. Researchers from the U.S. Geological Survey's Western Ecological Research Center in Santa Ana and the San Diego Zoo Institute for Conservation Research have been breeding captive frogs and releasing eggs and — last spring — tadpoles in several local streambeds, primarily on the University of California's James Reserve in these mountains.

However, threats to the species recovery sometimes are beyond the scope of a plan. The Mountain Fire in July burned through several frog habitats, and run-off and de-

bris impinged the habitat, according to the Forest Service's Burned-Area Report.

The report concluded that the probability of damage or loss to the frog's habitat in the Tahquitz watershed was very likely. However, the authors speculated that the increased sediment in the stream channels would not create irreversible damage. In summary, it said, the fire's results will be "significantly negatively impacting the MYLF population in the Tahquitz water-

Idyllwild Water's finances in good condition

District seeks grant funding

The Idyllwild Water District Board of Directors approved three grant applications at its Wednesday, Oct. 15, meeting. The \$2 million request for a recycled water project is the greatest. The other two grant requests were for a total of \$150,000 for security fencing and well rehabilitation.

The application for the recycling project has been revised because new funding is available from the state, General Manager Tom Lynch told the board. This application also allows the inclusion of costs (nearly \$220,000), which have already been paid. Construction and planning costs approach \$1.5 million.

The two smaller grants are being submitted through Riverside County for federal Community Development Block Grant funds. The larger one is for security fencing to surround the district's new storage tanks — Tollgate and Golden Rod. The smaller request will enable the district to rehabilitate four wells near Foster Lake. If approved, these grants provide 100 percent of the cost of the project; therefore, IWD will not have to provide any matching funds, according to Lynch.

He indicated that the success of the application may be known in spring 2015 and the funds available later in the summer of 2015.

In other water business, Lynch presented to the board a request to extend IWD's sewer service to the

end of Country Club Road. After some discussion, Sewer Manager Steve Kunkle referred the board to an "Infiltration and Inflow" report, several years old, which advised against any further expansion of the sewer district.

The board asked Lynch to further research the capacity of the sewer plant and the legal precedent of expanding the service. This request for sewer service will be reviewed at IWD's Nov. 19 meeting, the board decided.

Also, the board heard a presentation about the new generation of water meters, iPERL, from Ed Funk, an engineer at Aquametric Inc, the district's water meter supplier. He stressed that the Sensus meters rarely fail and independent verification is a great test. And Lynch told the board that a meter in question was tested and its accuracy was measured at 99.7 percent.

In financial business, the board received and accepted its 2013-14 audit. Scott Manno of Rogers, Anderson, Malody and Scott, the accounting firm, told the board the audit of IWD's financial condition earned the firm's "highest level of assurance."

For the fiscal year, IWD's total revenue was almost \$1.93 million and expenses, which include nearly \$240,000 for depreciation, were \$1.95 million. Expenses were also up because the district had a contract with former General Manager Terry Lyons for several months after Lynch started. IWD invested more than \$660,000 in construction during 2013-14.

The district ended the year with more than \$2.9 million in cash and investment reserves, according to the audit.

For this fiscal year, 2014-15, Chief Finance Officer Hosny Shouman reported that IWD's water program

has a net income of \$45,000 for the first three months of the year, while the sewer program has a \$3,500 loss.

Water consumption for September was almost 9 million gallons, which is 316,000 gallons more than produced in September 2013 and 1.2 million more than the August production.

Since January, IWD's 2014 water production has decreased about 7.5 percent from the same period in 2013.

"We're still in Stage 2, but monitoring the wells very carefully," Lynch said. Also, Lynch reported that he has had the horizontal wells above Foster Lake evaluated.

"At least seven will undergoing further testing," he said. If a common pipeline serving the wells can be repaired or installed, Lynch estimated these wells could add another 13 to 15 gallons per minute to FVWD's water supply.

Property tax bills to increase after recession

If you paid a smaller tax bill in recent years because the Riverside County Assessor lowered your property value to match slumping real estate prices during the recession, you might see more than the typical 2-percent maximum increase on this year's bill.

Under Proposition 13, property valuations throughout California usually can increase no more than 2 percent a year, and valuation determines the amount of your tax bill. The way it works is that the assessed value in the year you buy a piece of property is set as a baseline and valuations in future years are controlled by limits set in Prop. 13.

Valuations for all properties are reviewed annually and in an economic downturn, another state law requires counties to reduce assessed values to keep them in line with property values in your area. But that law, Prop. 8, also says that when real-estate prices start increasing again, the lower valuation that trimmed your tax bill during a recession must increase to match the current real-estate market.

"Prop. 8 means you pay less in taxes when real-estate prices are down, and we make sure you don't pay more than your fair share," Assessor Larry Ward said. "But when real-estate prices start getting back to normal, state law says your fair share does, too."

Taxpayers who think their property values are set too high this year may contact the Riverside County Assessor to determine the reason for the amount of the valuation. Often, the differences can be resolved at this stage. If a taxpayer and the assessor can't reach agreement, the taxpayer has the right to appeal the assessment. But if you appeal, make sure you pay your property tax bill while the appeal is pending. If taxes are not paid on time, you will be subject to a 10-percent penalty regardless of

whether your assessment is subsequently adjusted.

Property owners who disagree with their property's assessed value may file a free decline-in-value application online. Applications are due by Nov. 3 and are available at www.riversideacr.com.



Fraudulent phone calls

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department would like to warn the public of fraudulent scam phone calls. Recently, vari-

ous frauds have occurred in the Riverside County area where criminals contact victims by telephone to impersonate law enforcement officials or utility company officials.

Court scam

In the first type of scheme, the caller claims to be a member of law enforcement, or the court system. The victim is told he or she has a warrant for failing to appear for jury duty. The caller demands payment for the warrant via credit card information, or a Green Dot card. The suspect typically remains on the phone with the victim while he or she travels to the store to obtain the Green Dot card. The suspect further instructs the victim not to tell anyone who they are talking with. After obtaining the serial numbers to the Green Dot cards, the money deposited to the card is immediately removed by the suspect.

The caller is not connected with the Riverside Superior Court or Sheriff's Department. No Riverside County court or Sheriff's Department employee contacts the public to ask for financial information or payment in lieu of attending court proceedings, or to make up for failure to appear for jury duty.



Utility scam

In the second scheme, the caller claims to be from a utility, or service provider-type company. The victim is told their bill is overdue, or a meter needs to be replaced at the victim's expense. The caller demands immediate payment for the overdue bill or installation of a new meter.

If payment is not received, the victim's service will be shut off. The caller demands credit card information or a Green Dot card, as described in the first scheme.

The caller is not connected with any utility or service providers. Victims are encouraged to advise the caller they will call the utility company directly, and discontinue the call.

The victim should then contact the utility company themselves through legitimate and verified numbers.

It should be noted there are several technologies and methods that allow callers to conceal what number they are calling from, or to give the appearance they are calling from the Sheriff's Department, court, service provider or utility company.

Anyone receiving a telephone call from a person claiming to be a Riverside County court or Sheriff's Department employee or other law enforcement official seeking money should refuse the demand and report the incident to your local sheriff station.

More than \$2 million going to Senate contest

Fundraising continues strongly in the final weeks of the campaign for the state Senate District 28 seat. Both candidates, Bonnie Garcia of the Coachella Valley and Jeff Stone of Temecula, are raising considerable sums directly for their campaign coffers, while supporters are independently supplying even more money.

In the three weeks since the last campaign finance reports were submitted, Garcia has raised \$67,300 from 25 contributors — individuals, organizations and political action committees. The single largest donation was \$8,200 from the State Building and Construction Trades Councils of California PAC.

HUSD contested Trustee Area 2 election

Greater Idyllwild residents can vote in the Hemet Unified School District Trustee Area 2 election even though the winner will not represent them, unless they have children attending schools in Trustee Area 2.

Running in Trustee Area 2, which covers schools in Aguanga, Pinyon and the Garner and Anza valleys, are former teacher and current business owner Megan Haley and Native American Cultural Preservation Coordinator and long-time volunteer athletics coach Maurice Chacon.

Both are trustee district residents. Chacon, a Mountain Cahuilla tribal member, has lived in the district since birth, and Haley for the last 12 years. Prior to that, Haley lived in the Temecula area.

Chacon, a Hemet High School graduate, studied Indian law and Native American Studies at Haskell Indian Nations University in Lawrence, Kansas. He has worked as yard supervisor in a number of district schools before taking his present position with Torres Martinez Temporary Assistance for Needy Families, a social service organization offering temporary financial assistance to Native American families with children — providing educational incentives and work opportunities with the goal of leading to self-sufficiency. Chacon also has volunteered as an assistant coach in football and track at a number of district schools. In 2007, he started a wrestling program at HUSD Tahquitz High School.

Haley, born in San Diego and raised in Temecula, has a bachelor's degree in history from University of California, Riverside, and a master's in educational administration from California State University, San Bernardino. She has a teaching certification and has taught both in the Murrieta and Hemet unified school districts — kindergarden, first and sixth grades in Murrieta and third grade in Anza. She also has served as assistant principal at Hamilton Elementary and several other HUSD district schools, and spent 15 years in the educational sector as teacher and administrator

She said she took a leave of absence from teaching to run for HUSD trustee and currently works in her husband's business, Heritage Well, a residential and commercial water company in Aguanga.

Asked about key issues facing HUSD and Trustee Area 2 in particular, the candidates expressed similar positions on budget priorities.

Chacon has three children in district schools and a 3-year-old who will join her siblings when she is old enough. "Speaking as a father, I see the need for more funding for after-school activities and for ensuring that teachers have what they need in the classrooms," said Chacon. "My whole thing is kids first. I'd like to see more music and arts programs in our area schools." Regarding the current contract impasse between the district and the teachers' union, Chacon said, "Teachers are the key to the district and I'm open and listening to their side. There needs to be transparency in the negotiations and both sides need to be prepared for those negotiations in advance, having determined key priorities."

Chacon said he'd work to secure more resources for schools in his district, noting that schools on the valley floor often have more resources owing to larger enrollments. "I think our schools have not gotten the same opportunities as others in the district," he said.

Asked why voters should choose him, he replied, "I come from ground level as a parent. I see kids struggling with how the curriculum is currently structured. Teaching to the test is not practical. It gives teachers no flexibility."

He said he has not enough information to comment on Common Core, although he sees merit in having standardized basic subject matter taught in such a way as to be transferable from district to district and state to state.

Haley has a son in second grade at Cottonwood School in Aguanga, one of the higher performing K-8 schools in the district. She noted the close involvement of parents with the school as part of the reason for Cottonwood's success.

As to the current contract impasse between district and union, Haley faults what she calls backroom deals with the district administration and cabinet members and the "political agenda" of the current superintendent, Barry Kayrell. "The money is there for teacher raises," she said. "I don't have an issue with what they're asking. The superintendent has inappropriately used Parent Link to talk about the negotiations with district parents and has placed videos on the website presenting his side." She noted that the current HUSD board has been absent in the negotiations. "No board members have been involved," she said, a lack of involvement she found disturbing.

She said teacher tenure, appropriately evaluated and regulated, is a good thing. "Ninety percent of teachers are dedicated lifelong learners. Administration often does not do due diligence in supervising tenure and they should

Subish accepts misdemeanor plea

At his felony settlement conference, Friday, Oct. 17, Matthew Subish, 41, of Idyllwild, pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor charge for possessing a firearm or ammunition. Subish's previous felony convictions are the reason he is prohibited from possessing a firearm, according to state law.

His sentence for this misdemeanor includes three years of probation and 45 days in the custody of Riverside County sheriff, which he has already served and been credited.

In May, Subish was originally arrested on a felony charge for possession of a firearm and had pleaded not guilty. The District Attorney's office agreed to reduce the charge to a misdemeanor and Subish pleaded guilty.

She said any new funding sources, any new money, should "first and foremost go back to students — for computers, facilities and student activities." She supports Common Core. "I saw a lot of flexibility with the introduction of Common Core. It holds students to a greater level of academic necessity and forces them to think outside the box. It also allows teachers more room to bring in subjects that have been pushed to the side."

Asked why she should be elected, Haley said, "I want to change the face of this board, so that it does not go along with all this superintendent suggests. I know a lot about the system and how it works. My opponent does not have that advantage. It all goes back to my experience in education as both a teacher and administrator."



Fern Valley Water board selects Schnetzer for director

Richard Schnetzer will be the next Fern Valley Water District director. The board selected Schnetzer last week to fill the vacant seat due to Ron Korman's June resignation.

In September, the board established a committee to review the applications from Schnetzer and Chad Taylor. At Friday's meeting, Wix told his colleagues, "I think we have two qualified candidates who applied for the seat. The committee met after listening to them at the last meeting and reading their letters. We decided Richard was the better of the candidates for the purpose and who we recommend."

Vice President Jim Rees also echoed the view that both men were well qualified and the board had good choices.

After Schnetzer's selection, which was unanimous, he began his term Friday afternoon when Office Manager Jessica Priefer swore him into office. The term ends in December 2015. He is the third person to serve this term. In August 2011, Director Diana Johnson was re-elected to her fifth term. She resigned in May 2013 and Korman was appointed to replace her in June 2013.

Schnetzer and his wife, Patricia, were part-time Fern Valley residents until January 2012 when they became full-time. For nearly 50 years, Schnetzer has worked in special education for children, youth and adults with disabilities. During this time, he has served as a teacher, administrator, and board member of schools and agencies serving these individuals.

He currently works with the California Association of Private Special Education Schools.

President Robert Krieger told Taylor he would have other opportunities to serve in the future. Taylor and his wife also are recent additions to the Fern Valley community. They moved to Idyllwild from Long Beach. He said has worked for large corporations and owned his own

Lilly and Company, the California Statewide Law Enforcement Association and Federal Express.

Through the end of September, Ĝarcia had raised \$312,600. In the three weeks, since the end of the latest reporting period, she has garnered another 20 percent.

Besides contributions to her campaign fund, which she directly controls, independent expenditures have totaled more than \$1.1 million on her behalf.

Spirit of Democracy California has spent nearly \$830,000 to help Garcia capture the Senate seat. The spending began in May and went toward polling, and TV and cable network ads. Expenditures in support of her total \$485,000 and another \$320,000 has been spent opposing Stone.

The major independent committee opposing Garcia, Taxpayers Opposing Bonnie Garcia for State Senate 2014, spent and collected almost all of its \$54,600 in May before the June primary. Stone does not report any other outside expenditures, although the Spirit of Democracy lists a \$25,000 expenditure in his support on Sept. 29.

Otherwise, Stone's contributions this month total \$73,500 or 13 percent of what he received for the first nine months of the year.

Stone's October contributions have come from 39 contributors. He also has received one \$8,200 contribution from Alexander Haagan of Los Angeles. While more of his contributors were individuals, corporate money has found its way to Stone's benefit, also. The California Refuse Removal Council South PAC and Albert Webb Associates each gave money to Stone's campaign, as did 2nd District Supervisor John Tavaglione.

business. Currently, he is semi-retired.

In water business, General Manager Steve Erler said the removal of tank 5 is completed and the work on the tank farm manifold project is underway. The district is extending 12-inch pipeline installed along Fern Valley Road to its tank farm.

In response to a question about moving to Stage 2 Water Emergency from the district's current status of Stage 1, Erler replied, "I don't foresee it any time soon ... For the year, I don't anticipate any problems. For next year, I'm hoping for some moisture."

He stressed that the district's wells have been working wonderfully and he hasn't observed any drop in capacity despite lower groundwater well levels currently compared to last year's levels.

The district's wells have been the major source of

water since the drought has reduced stream flow through the district. September's water production relied much more on ground water than in 2013 and in the past. The portion of water supply from the district's wells was slightly more than 70 percent last month compared to 60 percent in August and 40 percent a year ago.

FREEZE PROTECTION — When temperatures begin to drop in the fall, it's time to prepare for winter. A simple plan to protect against water loss is to remember to turn off your water service line at the customer box at the street when you are away. We also want to stress the importance of wrapping all your water lines to protect them from freezing temperatures. Insulate pipes or faucets in unheated areas. The worst thing in the world is trying to wrap pipes when its 20 degrees outside. Or worse, not having your sprinkler system purged before the freezing weather comes. If you have pipelines in an unheated garage or cold crawl space under the house, wrap the water pipes before temperatures plummet. Take a few minutes to check if last year's wrapped water lines need to be rewrapped. Remember to disconnect your garden hoses from the outside faucets and drain them if you store them outside. You may also want to consider an insulated cover for the hose bib. To winterize your home if your house will be vacant during the winter:

- Open all faucets and drain all waterlines.
- Drain the toilets, the water heater (turn off the gas or electric supply first) and the expansion tank.
- Get an air compressor to blow the lines (including the irrigation lines) of excess water. Eliminate or dilute the water in drain traps by pouring biodegradable ("RV" type) antifreeze solution into them, as directed by the instructions.
- Close the sink and tub drains.
- If a house is to be vacant for an extended time, you may prevent water in a toilet's trap from evaporating (and thereby permitting sewer gases to enter the home) by raising the toilet's lid and seat and covering the bowl with plastic wrap.
- If you have an indoor or outdoor pool, drain the water.
- Turn off and drain fountains and other sources of standing water.
- Drain water from dishwashers and use biodegradable antifreeze following manufacturer's directions.
- For refrigerators (with a water dispenser or an ice maker) and washing machines, following the manufacturer's directions. Remove the water filter from inside the refrigerator.
- Remove and empty any "whole house" or "in line" type water filter canister.

<u>WATER LEAKS</u> – The Idyllwild Water District offers a very unique service to our customers. When the office staff receives your water usage calculations, which are taken electronically at the end of the month, each account is reviewed to see whether your usage is abnormally high. If it is determined that you may have a leak, our field personnel are sent to your home or business to get a second **manual** reading. (**Did you know that your water meter has a leak detector? If not, our office will show you how to find and "read" it.)** If your leak detector is turning and it appears that you may be an absent resident, our field personnel may turn off your customer valve at the curb and a door hanger will be left to alert you that you may have a problem. Our office staff then calls to alert you that there may be a leak or to inquire whether there is a reason for higher usage. Office staff will review reasons for possible high usage and let you know there are free toilet tablets for your use. Many toilet leaks are silent. If you have abnormal usage we are of course concerned about leaks in these drought times, but we also don't like to see our customers receive unexpected large water bills.

This kind of customer service is not common. Please let our office know if you have changed your phone number or if you have a cell phone number, so we can reach you during these times. We would also like to have your email address.

Town Crier interviews campaigner Jeff Stone

Editor's note: On Oct. 15, Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Jeff Stone, a candidate for the state Senate's 28th District, spoke to the Town Crier on a variety of issues from the campaign. This is the first of a two-part article that will continue in next week's edition.

Education and the recent state court decision on tenure

In June, Judge Rolf Treu of the Superior Court of Los Angeles County ruled that several state laws relating to the administration of education policy were unconstitutional. The most prominent was his ruling against teacher tenure after only two years on the job, but Treu also found that the statutes on the dismissal process for ineffective teachers and the layoff process of last-hired, first-fired were uncon-

In September, State Attorney General Kamala Harris appealed Treu's decision, with the full support of Gov. Jerry Brown and Superintendent of Schools Thomas Torkalson.

When asked his opinion of the ruling and appeal, Stone immediately said, "I'm disappointed with the appeal. There're a lot of wonderful teachers."

"Tenure can be a good thing," Stone continued. "There are good and bad teachers, no different than other professions." Stone's concern with the appeal is the difficulty that school officials have had when trying to dismiss teachers with serious and egregious issues, such as sex offenses.

While Stone supports tinues to grow. the June court decision, he stressed that teachers' appraisals after voiding the tenure opportunities must be done carefully. "The rules for review must be carefully crafted. We can't permit any retaliating from administrators with a beef," he added.

Realignment between state prisons and county jail space

In 2011, the state began implementing Assembly Bill 109 that transferred or kept many convicted felons in county jails in order to reduce the state prison population pursuant to a federal court

"This has become a terrible catastrophe for the counties instead of the state of California doing the right thing," Stone said bluntly.

The state and county prison and jail system is intertwined, just as state and county roads are, he said. Stone characterizes both as government infrastructure. Consequently, the problem of space for incarcerated prisoners has been exacerbated because California's population con-

Similar to officials in many other California counties, Stone is well aware of the ramifications of the realignment policy. Many of the least violent and dangerous convicted felons are released before serving a full sentence.

Even constructing a new county jail in Indio will not be a permanent solution, Stone despaired. "We'll still be behind the eight ball," he said.

Then he offered a plan toward improving the problem. Stone recommends selling the state's San Quentin prison because it is valuable water property. He estimated the state could sell the prison property for \$1 billion. These funds would be sufficient to build two new state prisons, he said. "But we have to take the money and build more efficient prisons because the big expense is staffing [the prisons]," Stone stated and explained, "We can't build four-star

"Prison should be a place of punishment," he stressed. Nobody should want to go back to prison."

Stone believes the state Board of Corrections includes many frills, which ultimately makes the state vulnerable to more lawsuits. He is still a fan of Arizona's Maricopa County Sheriff "Joe" Arpaio, who instituted tent cities adjacent to his county jail.

Stone also advocated more educational opportunities for inmates. "We need more instruction in jails, so that prisoners can earn a GED and vocational skills," he said. "When they're released from jail, they can use skills such as car repair and be productive members of society."

Garcia discusses state Senate issues with Town Crier

Editor's note: On Sept. 30, former state Assemblywoman Bonnie Garcia and current candidate for the state Senate's 28th District spoke to the Town Crier on a variety of issues from the campaign. This is the second in a two-part interview. The first ran last week.

Role of the Brown Act

The Brown Act is the source of California's open government laws. When asked her opinion of this law, Garcia adamantly replied, "It doesn't go far enough. It should cover subcommittees of elected officials.

And she disagreed with Gov. Brown's recent veto of AB 194 that codified many court rulings implementing the law. She recommended that the actions of any elected or appointed official or group of officials who recommend the use of taxpayers' resources should be open to public knowledge. "What's wrong with public transparency?" she asked. "Public is the key word."

State budget

Garcia stressed that she believes the approval of Proposition 30 in 2012, which raised some tax levels, was a temporary, not a permanent, fix to the state bud-

Personal income tax increases expire in 2018, and sales tax rate increases sunset in 2017.

Yet, Garcia said she worries about adequate funding for education and classrooms to help students learn.

Hemet Fire Department

Recently, the Hemet City Council approved an agreement to transfer management of its fire department to Riverside County. This decision is quite controversial and many voters would like to see a referendum on a ballot.

Garcia agreed that "local communities should have a voice in something that dissolves 100 years of performance. It's a decision that should be made by voters and not the council.'

Work-force training

Garcia is proud of her past efforts and vowed to continue to stress funding for improving work-force training and support for the California state university system. This extends to the recent legislation passed and the governor signed to allow community colleges to award bachelor degrees in fields not currently served by the California State University or University of California

The new four-year-degree programs could be offered in vocational occupations for which an Associate of Arts degree had been acceptable in the past, but now increasingly

require a bachelor's degree to be competitive. These fields and occupations can include dental hygiene, industrial technology, allied health technology, emergency medical technology and data management for health care.

Also, she will work for programs aimed at 30- to 50-yearold adults who seek new career paths. And she strongly supports plans for statewide pre-school education. "Education is the great equalizer and better for all of us. Income level or community school shouldn't matter," she believes. "There should be no barriers to access for education."





Written and performed in 1622 and first printed in 1653, "The Changeling," is a joint effort between John Middleton (a protégé of William Shakespeare and cowriter and adapter of some of Shakespeare's plays) and William Rowley (a collaborator/playwright best known as an actor) and is considered one of the best tragedies of the Jacobean period and the first tragicomedy.

The plot (Beatrice-Joanna, Alsemero and Deflores) and subplot (Lollio, Isabella, and Antonio) mirror one another, disguise and deception, and thus the use of the very large mirrors on the set that reflect the deformity of human nature and the iniquitous fall into insanity or recognition of their faults in both storylines. The motif of

"eyes," used to see beauty and moral goodness, betray us by imposing on us what we want to see and not what is there in reality, leading to the tragic choices that cause the fall.

J. Barrett Cooper (director) returns to Idyllwild Arts Academy where he taught Shakespeare and Stage Combat and directed "A Midsummer Nights Dream" and is in his first semester as chair of the Theatre Department.



Steele in the money again

Brendan Steele has played the weekend in his first two tournaments of this new 2014-15 PGA Tour season. The native Idyllwilder fired a 9-under-par 68-70-69-68 — 275 to garner a tie for 33rd place in the Shriners Hospitals for Chil-

dren Open in Las Vegas last week. He added about \$30,000 to his official earnings and earned 34 FedEx-Cup points, giving him 82 points already for the season. He now stands 23rd on the FedExCup points list.

His stats suggest he played exceptionally well from tee to green, but he struggled a bit with his putter. His drives found 62.5 percent of the fairways while averaging 320 yards. He hit 73.6 percent of the greens in regulation, but he gave away nearly a stroke putting to the field.

Nevertheless, Steele did occasionally put it all together. One outstanding moment came during the first round when he cut off the slight dogleg of the 341-yard, par-4 15th hole, nailing the green with a 311-yard drive that finished 9 feet from the pin. He then canned the put for an eagle 2.

After two consecutive weeks of west coast tournaments, Steele will stay home rather than travel to Georgia for this week's PGA Tour event.

er, Ernie is a poly on all four Verv paws. rare. They are 6-month-old kittens that still need some socialization to respond to the human touch.



No Ebola identified in California

Much of country concerned about disease spreading

The Ebola virus has not been found in California, stressed the state's highest public health officials last week. "There are no cases of Ebola or suspected cases in California," said Dr. Ron Chapman, director of the California Department of Public Health, on Wednesday, Oct. 15.

However, on Monday, Oct. 20, as concerns and some fears have grown in the past week, Riverside County health officials created a website to address questions about the virus. The website, www.rivcoph. org/Ebola.aspx, will house information from the Riverside County Department of Public Health, California Department of Public Health, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and other reliable sources to give the public and health providers the latest updates on Ebola and what is being done to prevent the virus' spread.

Nevertheless, they are prepared and still preparing in case a patient may be identified in California. Over the past week, officials have held conference calls with hospitals, doctors, nurses and other first responders throughout the

They have stressed that local health officials look at hospital readiness and capacity. Hospitals through-

out Riverside County were conducting these examines all of last week.

Nurses in California and the country are concerned about adequate and appropriate safety when caring for Ebola patients. Gov. Jerry Brown met with leaders of the California Nurses Association and the National Nurses United in Sacramento last week. They discussed ways to make California the national leader in enacting the highest Ebola safety standards and protocols to protect nurses, other frontline health care workers, patients and the public.

The discovery of a second health-care worker with Ebola in Texas escalated the fear of the virus spreading throughout the nation. Two different surveys found the fear of the virus growing. On Thursday, airline stocks declined sharply due to fears of a decline in flying.

While two possible Ebola victims were identified in California last week, tests for the virus came back negative, state officials said in a Wednesday teleconference.

"But it would not be unexpected for California to have a confirmed case of Ebola, therefore we need to be prepared to respond promptly and carefully," advised Dr. Gil Chavez, deputy director of CDPH's Center for Infectious Diseases. "But Ebola does not

pose a significant public health risk to communities in California at the present time.

One of the steps state officials have initiated is working with the federal government to screen possible infected individuals arriving in California at one of the state's international airports.

"California is an important destination for many travelers. We believe our international airports in the state have potential for exposure," Chavez said, explaining why the state was urging screening for some state airports.

In a Kaiser Health Policy survey, nearly two out of three Americans said they were very closely or fairly closely following the news about the Ebola outbreak. Nearly 90 percent are aware of at least one case in the United States.

In a Harvard School of Public Health survey, more than half of the respondents were concerned that an Ebola outbreak might occur in the U.S during the next vear.

public knows the disease is

spread through direct contact with the blood or body fluids of a person who is sick with Ebola or showing symptoms, two-thirds believe it can be transmitted through the air and more than half think shaking hands is sufficient to transfer the virus. Eighty-five percent of the respondents in the Harvard survey thought it was likely that a sneeze or cough could spread the virus.

"Current scientific evidence testifies that people cannot get Ebola through the air, food or water," Chavez stressed. "Ebola virus does not survive more than a few hours on surfac-

And Dr. James Watts, director of the Division of Communicable Disease Control, stressed, "Patients are not contagious when they are not symptomatic."

Only about one in five Americans believe there has been too much coverage of the disease and slightly less feel there has been too little media cover-

assure the future of California journalism through encouragement of education, and to provide a social and educational forum for its members."

The announcement by the selection committee came as a complete surprise to Clark, who at the time was chairing a meeting of the Cal Press Board of Directors during the quarterly meeting of the CNPA in Sacramento. "I was stunned," she said later. "For a small paper in a little town in the mountains . . . I never dreamed of this." Clark did not even know she had been nominated for the award, which will be presented at Cal Press's 137th-annual Winter Meeting in San Francisco on Dec. 5.


What means most to her, Clark said, is that the award cites her efforts to bring open government to her community. "Clark encountered several obstacles in trying to cover the local water districts and fire districts that dot the region the Town Crier serves. Chief among the obstacles was the longstanding culture of contempt for public scrutiny held by many of the 'good

ol' boys' who served on the various boards," Cal Press' current newsletter recounts. The article notes that Clark obtained information about local special districts unaccustomed to public scrutiny, and that she organized Brown Act and California Public Records Act workshops, inviting members of the local boards and community to attend and ask questions of lawyers conducting the training. "Clark was able to transform the culture of how many of these public entities did business as well as what residents expected from their local officials," the article states.

Much of the credit goes to the local agencies themselves, Clark says. She particularly notes that the Pine Cove Water District, an early adversary when it came to open government, eventually embraced the concept and has received open government an award from the California Special Districts Association.

"Clark and the Town Crier have undertaken dozens of battles over the years to better inform readers and positively affect the community in which she lives," the citation went on. "She has See Clark, page 24

Mares explained the new language. "The proposed language would allow garages or carports to be constructed up to the front or side lot line on such properties, but only if configured to prevent a vehicle directly exiting or entering onto the adjacent roadway. Properties above an elevation of 4,000 feet would be excluded from this development standard."

The planning staff's latest revision to section 18.18 appears to respond to many comments similar to what Kay Jennison, com.

Idyllwild Realtor, wrote to the commission.

"In Idyllwild, many lots are on slopes, being able to build near the property line is the only way to have cars not parked in the street and often in the right of way," Jennison wrote in her Sept. 29 email. "As Idyllwild is not a subdivision community, with standard-width streets with curbs and sidewalks, parking is an issue of concern. This is especially true in the winter with ice and snow on the ground."

100 feet would apply to all property owners within those circles.

If abatement is not completed, fire officials would have the authority to use a contractor to perform the necessary work and the costs would be imposed on the property owner by means of a tax lien.

Throughout much of the county, fire officials already have this authority except on the Hill.

"Since the Mountain Fire, public attitudes have changed. We're terrified," Nash told the group. "Everybody wants to do this. When it is presented to the community, we'll say, 'If you want to save your structure, don't fight us.' We'll need all the enforcement effort to go after absentee property owners."

Fire officials acknowledged that stronger enforcement is the key to effective abatement compliance.

"What doesn't work now is the lack of enforcement," said Brandon Smith, a county fire prevention investigator. He stressed that Riverside County Fire Department conducts thousands of successful inspections, but enforcement of compliance needs more staffing. "This ordinance will need increased staffing. I think that what we're missing in enforcement."

Riverside County Fire Chief John Hawkins, who established the committee following an Idyllwild

Town Hall meeting in agreed. "We've June, done a lot of inspections. but we'll need to define a framework for actions and the intricacies of finances, including inspection staff and abatement costs for contractors.'

The committee's next step is to decide how broadly to spread the ordinance and how it will be enforced, Hawkins told them. "People need to have a safer mountaintop. You'll be given as much protection as possible."

Idyllwild Fire Chief Patrick Reitz, also a member of the committee, concurred with Hawkins. "I think there is a real need for this. I'm supportive but have questions.'

He also raised the issue of the time and cost for additional inspection personnel and particularly the availability of funds to pay contractors until property owners can be assessed the cost and pay

Next steps include drafting a new ordinance covering parcels with structures in mountain communities only that is consistent with the current county code, with state law and with county amendments to the state fire code; and to meet with fire code enforcement people in San Bernardino County, who already have ordinances for their mountain communities, and inquire about enforcement techniques there, according to Nash.

Recovery plan for yellow-legged frogs

On Wednesday, Oct. 15, the Center for Biological Diversity and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced an agreement to litigation CBD had filed for protection of Southern California's mountain yellow-legged frogs.

The Fish and Wildlife Service has agreed to prepare a recovery plan for the endangered frogs by December 2018.

Recovery plans are a key tool for identifying actions necessary to save endangered species and eventually remove their Endangered Species Act protection. Species with dedicated recovery plans are significantly more likely to improve than species without plans.

CBD has filed numerous lawsuits to protect the local amphibian; the most recent was in February seeking the preparation of a recovery plan. The mountain yellow-legged frog was listed as endangered in July 2002.

FWS also will pay \$14,250 in attorney fees to CBD.

Although the frogs have been protected under the ESA for more than a decade, the federal agency has not completed the required recovery plan.

"I'm so glad these severely endangered frogs will finally get a recovery plan," Collette Adkins Giese, a CBD attorney and biologist, said in a press release. "Recovery plans really need to be developed soon after species are protected, because they give us a roadmap of exactly what we need to do to ensure those species won't go extinct."

Despite the absence of a plan, efforts to re-establish the mountain yellow-legged frog have been ongoing on the Hill for several years. Researchers from the U.S. Geological Survey's Western Ecological Research Center in Santa Ana and the San Diego Zoo Institute for Conservation Research have been breeding captive frogs and releasing eggs and — last spring — tadpoles in several local streambeds, primarily on the University of California's James Reserve in these mountains.

However, threats to the species recovery sometimes are beyond the scope of a plan. The Mountain Fire in July burned through several frog habitats, and run-off and de-

bris impinged the habitat, according to the Forest Service's Burned-Area Report.

The report concluded that the probability of damage or loss to the frog's habitat in the Tahquitz watershed was very likely. However, the authors speculated that the increased sediment in the stream chan-

nels would not create irreversible damage. In summary, it said, the fire's results will be "significantly negatively impacting the MYLF population in the Tahquitz watershed."

Idyllwild Water's finances in good condition

District seeks grant funding

The Idyllwild Water District Board of Directors approved three grant applications at its Wednesday, Oct. 15, meeting. The \$2 million request for a recycled water project is the greatest. The other two grant requests were for a total of \$150,000 for security fencing and well

The application for the recycling project has been revised because new funding is available from the state, General Manager Tom Lynch told the board. This application also allows the inclusion of costs (nearly \$220,000), which have already been paid. Construction and planning costs approach \$1.5 million.

The two smaller grants are being submitted through Riverside County for federal Community Development Block Grant funds. The larger one is for security fencing to surround the district's new storage tanks — Tollgate and Golden Rod. The smaller request will enable the district to rehabilitate four wells near Foster Lake. If approved, these grants provide 100 percent of the cost of the project; therefore, IWD will not have to provide any matching funds, according to Lynch.

He indicated that the success of the application may be known in spring 2015 and the funds available later in the summer of 2015.

In other water business, Lynch presented to the

end of Country Club Road. After some discussion, Sewer Manager Steve Kunkle referred the board to an "Infiltration and Inflow" report, several years old, which advised against any further expansion of the sewer district.

The board asked Lynch to further research the capacity of the sewer plant and the legal precedent of expanding the service. This request for sewer service will be reviewed at IWD's Nov. 19 meeting, the board decided.

Also, the board heard a presentation about the new generation of water meters, iPERL, from Ed Funk, an engineer at Aquametric Inc, the district's water meter supplier. He stressed that the Sensus meters rarely fail and independent verification is a great test. And Lynch told the board that a meter in question was tested and its accuracy was measured at 99.7 percent.

In financial business, the board received and accepted its 2013-14 audit. Scott Manno of Rogers, Anderson, Malody and Scott, the accounting firm, told the board the audit of IWD's financial condition earned the firm's "highest level of assurance."

For the fiscal year, IWD's total revenue was almost \$1.93 million and expenses, which include nearly \$240,000 for depreciation, were \$1.95 million. Expenses were also up because the district had a contract with former General Manager Terry Lyons for several months after Lynch started. IWD invested more than \$660,000 in construction during 2013-14.

The district ended the year with more than \$2.9 million in cash and investment reserves, according to the

has a net income of \$45,000 for the first three months of the year, while the sewer program has a \$3,500 loss.

Water consumption for September was almost 9 million gallons, which is 316,000 gallons more than produced in September 2013 and 1.2 million more than the August production.

Since January, IWD's 2014 water production has deeased about 7.5 percent from the same period in 2013.

We're still in Stage 2, but monitoring the wells very carefully," Lynch said. Also, Lynch reported that he has had the horizontal wells above Foster Lake evaluated.

"At least seven will undergoing further testing," he said. If a common pipeline serving the wells can be repaired or installed, Lynch estimated these wells could add another 13 to 15 gallons per minute to FVWD's wa-

Property tax bills to increase after recession

Editor's note: This is from a Riverside County press re-

If you paid a smaller tax bill in recent years because the Riverside County Assessor lowered your property value to match slumping real estate prices during the recession, you might see more than the typical 2-percent maximum increase on this year's bill.

Under Proposition 13, property valuations throughout California usually can increase no more than 2 percent a year, and valuation determines the amount of your tax bill. The way it works is that the assessed value in the year you buy a piece of property is set as a baseline and valuations in future years are controlled by limits set in Prop. 13.

Valuations for all properties are reviewed annually and in an economic downturn, another state law requires counties to reduce assessed values to keep them in line with property values in your area. But that law, Prop. 8, also says that when real-estate prices start increasing again, the lower valuation that trimmed your tax bill during a recession must increase to match the current real-estate market.

Prop. 8 means you pay less in taxes when real-estate prices are down, and we make sure you don't pay more than your fair share," Assessor Larry Ward said. "But when real-estate prices start getting back to normal, state law says your fair share does, too."

Taxpayers who think their property values are set too high this year may contact the Riverside County Assessor to determine the reason for the amount of the valuation. Often, the differences can be resolved at this stage. If a taxpayer and the assessor can't reach agreement, the taxpayer has the right to appeal the assessment. But if you appeal, make sure you pay your property tax bill while the appeal is pending. If taxes are not paid on time, you will be subject to a 10-percent penalty regardless of

whether your assessment is subsequently adjusted.

Property owners who disagree with their property's assessed value may file a free decline-in-value application online. Applications are due by Nov. 3 and are available at www.riversideacr.com.



Fraudulent phone calls

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department would like to warn the public of fraudulent scam phone calls. Recently, vari-

ous frauds have occurred in the Riverside County area where criminals contact victims by telephone to impersonate law enforcement officials or utility company officials.

Court scam

In the first type of scheme, the caller claims to be a member of law enforcement, or the court system. The victim is told he or she has a warrant for failing to appear for jury duty. The caller demands payment for the warrant via credit card information, or a Green Dot card. The suspect typically remains on the phone with the victim while he or she travels to the store to obtain the Green Dot card. The suspect further instructs the victim not to tell anyone who they are talking with. After obtaining the serial numbers to the Green Dot cards, the money deposited to the card is immediately removed by the suspect.

The caller is not connected with the Riverside Superior Court or Sheriff's Department. No Riverside County court or Sheriff's Department employee contacts the public to ask for financial information or payment in lieu of attending court proceedings, or to make up for failure to appear for jury duty.



Utility scam

In the second scheme, the caller claims to be from a utility, or service provider-type company. The victim is told their bill is overdue, or a meter needs to be replaced at the victim's expense. The caller demands immediate payment for the overdue bill or installation of a new meter.

If payment is not received, the victim's service will be shut off. The caller demands credit card information or a Green Dot card, as described in the first scheme.

The caller is not connected with any utility or service providers. Victims are encouraged to advise the caller they will call the utility company directly, and discontinue the call.

The victim should then contact the utility company themselves through legitimate and verified numbers.

It should be noted there are several technologies and methods that allow callers to conceal what number they are calling from, or to give the appearance they are calling from the Sheriff's Department, court, service provider or utility company.

Anyone receiving a telephone call from a person claiming to be a Riverside County court or Sheriff's Department employee or other law enforcement official seeking money should refuse the demand and report the incident to your local sheriff station.

More than \$2 million going to Senate contest

Fundraising continues strongly in the final weeks of the campaign for the state Senate District 28 seat. HUSD contested Trustee Area 2 election

Greater Idyllwild residents can vote in the Hemet Unified School District Trustee Area 2 election even though the winner will not represent them, unless they have children attending schools in Trustee Area 2.

Running in Trustee Area 2, which covers schools in Aguanga, Pinyon and the Garner and Anza valleys, are former teacher and current business owner Megan Haley and Native American Cultural Preservation Coordinator and long-time volunteer athletics coach Maurice Chacon.

Both are trustee district residents. Chacon, a Mountain Cahuilla tribal member, has lived in the district since birth, and Haley for the last 12 years. Prior to that, Haley lived in the Temecula area.

Chacon, a Hemet High School graduate, studied Indian law and Native American Studies at Haskell Indian Nations University in Lawrence, Kansas. He has worked as yard supervisor in a number of district schools before taking his present position with Torres Martinez Temporary Assistance for Needy Families, a social service organization offering temporary financial assistance to Native American families with children — providing educational incentives and work opportunities with the goal of leading to self-sufficiency. Chacon also has volunteered as an assistant coach in football and track at a number of district schools. In 2007, he started a wrestling program at HUSD Tahquitz High School.

Haley, born in San Diego and raised in Temecula, has a bachelor's degree in history from University of California, Riverside, and a master's in educational administration from California State University, San Bernardino. She has a teaching certification and has taught both in the Murrieta and Hemet unified school districts — kindergarden, first and sixth grades in Murrieta and third grade in Anza. She also has served as assistant principal at Hamilton Elementary and several other HUSD district schools, and spent 15 years in the educational sector as teacher and administra-

She said she took a leave of absence from teaching to run for HUSD trustee and currently works in her husband's business, Heritage Well, a residential and commercial water company in Aguanga.

Asked about key issues facing HUSD and Trustee Area 2 in particular, the candidates expressed similar positions on budget priorities.

Chacon has three children in district schools and a 3-year-old who will join her siblings when she is old enough. "Speaking as a father, I see the need for more funding for after-school activities and for ensuring that teachers have what they need in the classrooms," said Chacon. "My whole thing is kids first. I'd like to see more music and arts programs in our area schools." Regarding the current contract impasse between the district and the teachers' union, Chacon said, "Teachers are the key to the district and I'm open and listening to their side. There needs to be transparency in the negotiations and both sides need to be prepared for those negotiations in advance, having determined key priorities.'

schools in his district, noting that schools on the valley floor often have more resources owing to larger enrollments. "I think our schools have not gotten the same opportunities as others in the district," he said.

Asked why voters should choose him, he replied, "I come from ground level as a parent. I see kids struggling with how the curriculum is currently structured. Teaching to the test is not practical. It gives teachers no flexibility."

He said he has not enough information to comment on Common Core, although he sees merit in having standardized basic subject matter taught in such a way as to be transferable from district to district and state to state.

Haley has a son in second grade at Cottonwood School in Aguanga, one of the higher performing K-8 schools in the district. She noted the close involvement of parents with the school as part of the reason for Cottonwood's success.

As to the current contract impasse between district and union, Haley faults what she calls backroom deals with the district administration and cabinet members and the "political agenda" of the current superintendent, Barry Kayrell. "The money is there for teacher raises," she said. "I don't have an issue with what they're asking. The superintendent has inappropriately used Parent Link to talk about the negotiations with district parents and has placed videos on the website presenting his side." She noted that the current HUSD board has been absent in the negotiations. "No board members have been involved," she said, a lack of involvement she found disturbing.

She said teacher tenure, appropriately evaluated and regulated, is a good thing. "Ninety percent of teachers are dedicated lifelong learners. Administration often does not do due diligence in supervising tenure and they should

Subish accepts misdemeanor plea

At his felony settlement conference, Friday, Oct. 17, Matthew Subish, 41, of Idyllwild, pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor charge for possessing a firearm or ammunition. Subish's previous felony convictions are the reason he is prohibited from possessing a firearm, according to state law.

His sentence for this misdemeanor includes three years of probation and 45 days in the custody of Riverside County sheriff, which he has already served and been credited.



Fern Valley Water board selects Schnetzer for director

Richard Schnetzer will be the next Fern Valley Water District director. The board selected Schnetzer last week to fill the vacant seat due to Ron Korman's June resignation.

In September, the board established a committee to review the applications from Schnetzer and Chad Taylor. At Friday's meeting, Wix told his colleagues, "I think we have two qualified candidates who applied for the seat. The committee met after listening to them at the last meeting and reading their letters. We decided Richard was the better of the candidates for the purpose and who we recommend."

Vice President Jim Rees also echoed the view that both men were well qualified and the board had good choices.

After Schnetzer's selection, which was unanimous, he began his term Friday afternoon when Office Manager Jessica Priefer swore him into office. The term ends in December 2015. He is the third person to serve this term. In August 2011, Director Diana Johnson was re-elected to her fifth term. She resigned in May 2013 and Korman was appointed to replace her in June 2013.

Schnetzer and his wife, Patricia, were part-time Fern Valley residents until January 2012 when they became full-time. For nearly 50 years, Schnetzer has worked in special education for children, youth and adults with disabilities. During this time, he has served as a teacher, administrator, and board member of schools and agencies serving these individuals.

He currently works with the California Association of Private Special Education Schools.

President Robert Krieger told Taylor he would have other opportunities to serve in the future. Taylor and his wife also are recent additions to the Fern Valley community. They moved to Idyllwild from Long Beach. He said has worked for large corporations and owned his own

Lilly and Company, the California Statewide Law Enforcement Association and Federal Express.

Through the end of September, Garcia had raised \$312,600. In the three weeks, since the end of the latest reporting period, she has garnered another 20 percent.

Besides contributions to her campaign fund, which she directly controls, independent expenditures have totaled more than \$1.1 million on her behalf.

Spirit of Democracy California has spent nearly \$830,000 to help Garcia capture the Senate seat. The spending began in May and went toward polling, and TV and cable network ads. Expenditures in support of her total \$485,000 and another \$320,000 has been spent opposing Stone.

The major independent committee opposing Garcia, Taxpayers Opposing Bonnie Garcia for State Senate 2014, spent and collected almost all of its \$54,600 in May before the June primary. Stone does not report any other outside expenditures, although the Spirit of Democracy lists a \$25,000 expenditure in his support on Sept. 29.

Otherwise, Stone's contributions this month total \$73,500 or 13 percent of what he received for the first nine months of the year.

Stone's October contributions have come from 39 contributors. He also has received one \$8,200 contribution from Alexander Haagan of Los Angeles. While more of his contributors were individuals, corporate money has found its way to Stone's benefit, also. The California Refuse Removal Council South PAC and Albert Webb Associates each gave money to Stone's campaign, as did 2nd District Supervisor John Tavaglione.

business. Currently, he is semi-retired.

In water business, General Manager Steve Erler said the removal of tank 5 is completed and the work on the tank farm manifold project is underway. The district is extending 12-inch pipeline installed along Fern Valley Road to its tank farm.

In response to a question about moving to Stage 2 Water Emergency from the district's current status of Stage 1, Erler replied, "I don't foresee it any time soon ... For the year, I don't anticipate any problems. For next year, I'm hoping for some moisture."

He stressed that the district's wells have been working wonderfully and he hasn't observed any drop in capacity despite lower groundwater well levels currently compared to last year's levels.

The district's wells have been the major source of

water since the drought has reduced stream flow through the district. September's water production relied much more on ground water than in 2013 and in the past. The portion of water supply from the district's wells was slightly more than 70 percent last month compared to 60 percent in August and 40 percent a year ago.

FREEZE PROTECTION — When temperatures begin to drop in the fall, it's time to prepare for winter. A simple plan to protect against water loss is to remember to turn off your water service line at the customer box at the street when you are away. We also want to stress the importance of wrapping all your water lines to protect them from freezing temperatures. Insulate pipes or faucets in unheated areas. The worst thing in the world is trying to wrap pipes when its 20 degrees outside. Or worse, not having your sprinkler system purged before the freezing weather comes. If you have pipelines in an unheated garage or cold crawl space under the house, wrap the water pipes before temperatures plummet. Take a few minutes to check if last year's wrapped water lines need to be rewrapped. Remember to disconnect your garden hoses from the outside faucets and drain them if you store them outside. You may also want to consider an insulated cover for the hose bib. To winterize your home if your house will be vacant during the winter:

- Open all faucets and drain all waterlines.
- Drain the toilets, the water heater (turn off the gas or electric supply first) and the expansion tank.
- Get an air compressor to blow the lines (including the irrigation lines) of excess water. Eliminate or dilute the water in drain traps by pouring biodegradable ("RV" type) antifreeze solution into them, as directed by the instructions.
- Close the sink and tub drains.
- If a house is to be vacant for an extended time, you may prevent water in a toilet's trap from evaporating (and thereby permitting sewer gases to enter the home) by raising the toilet's lid and seat and covering the bowl with plastic wrap.
- If you have an indoor or outdoor pool, drain the water.
- Turn off and drain fountains and other sources of standing water.
- Drain water from dishwashers and use biodegradable antifreeze following manufacturer's directions.
- For refrigerators (with a water dispenser or an ice maker) and washing machines, following the manufacturer's directions. Remove the water filter from inside the refrigerator.
- Remove and empty any "whole house" or "in line" type water filter canister.

Since your residence may have special conditions, it is recommended that you contact your plumber to assist you with draining and winterizing your home properly.

<u>WATER LEAKS</u> – The Idyllwild Water District offers a very unique service to our customers. When the office staff receives your water usage calculations, which are taken electronically at the end of the month, each account is reviewed to see whether your usage is abnormally high. If it is determined that you may have a leak, our field personnel are sent to your home or business to get a second **manual** reading. (**Did you know that your water meter has a leak detector? If not, our office will show you how to find and "read" it.)** If your leak detector is turning and it appears that you may be an absent resident, our field personnel may turn off your customer valve at the curb and a door hanger will be left to alert you that you may have a problem. Our office staff then calls to alert you that there may be a leak or to inquire whether there is a reason for higher usage. Office staff will review reasons for possible high usage and let you know there are free toilet tablets for your use. Many toilet leaks are silent. If you have abnormal usage we are of course concerned about leaks in these drought times, but we also don't like to see our customers receive unexpected large water bills.

This kind of customer service is not common. Please let our office know if you have changed your phone number or if you have a cell phone number, so we can reach you during these times. We would also like to have your email address.

Town Crier interviews campaigner Jeff Stone

Editor's note: On Oct. 15, Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Jeff Stone, a candidate for the state Senate's 28th District, spoke to the Town Crier on a variety of issues from the campaign. This is the first of a two-part article that will continue in next week's edition.

Education and the recent state court decision on tenure

In June, Judge Rolf Treu of the Superior Court of Los Angeles County ruled that several state laws relating to the administration of education policy were unconstitutional. The most prominent was his ruling against teacher tenure after only two years on the job, but Treu also found that the statutes on the dismissal process for ineffective teachers and the layoff process of last-hired, first-fired were uncon-

In September, State Attorney General Kamala Harris appealed Treu's decision, with the full support of Gov. Jerry Brown and Superintendent of Schools Thomas Torkalson.

When asked his opinion of the ruling and appeal, Stone immediately said, "I'm disappointed with the appeal. There're a lot of wonderful teachers."

"Tenure can be a good thing," Stone continued. "There are good and bad teachers, no different than other professions." Stone's concern with the appeal is the difficulty that school officials have had when trying to dismiss teachers with serious and egregious issues, such as sex offenses.

While Stone supports tinues to grow. the June court decision, he stressed that teachers' appraisals after voiding the tenure opportunities must be done carefully. "The rules for review must be carefully crafted. We can't permit any retaliating from administrators with a beef," he added.

Realignment between state prisons and county jail space

In 2011, the state began implementing Assembly Bill 109 that transferred or kept many convicted felons in county jails in order to reduce the state prison population pursuant to a federal court

"This has become a terrible catastrophe for the counties instead of the state of California doing the right thing," Stone said bluntly.

The state and county prison and jail system is intertwined, just as state and county roads are, he said. Stone characterizes both as government infrastructure. Consequently, the problem of space for incarcerated prisoners has been exacerbated because California's population con-

Similar to officials in many other California counties, Stone is well aware of the ramifications of the realignment policy. Many of the least violent and dangerous convicted felons are released before serving a full sentence.

Even constructing a new county jail in Indio will not be a permanent solution, Stone despaired. "We'll still be behind the eight ball," he said.

Then he offered a plan toward improving the problem. Stone recommends selling the state's San Quentin prison because it is valuable water property. He estimated the state could sell the prison property for \$1 billion. These funds would be sufficient to build two new state prisons, he said. "But we have to take the money and build more efficient prisons because the big expense is staffing [the prisons]," Stone stated and explained, "We can't build four-star

"Prison should be a place of punishment," he stressed. Nobody should want to go back to prison."

Stone believes the state Board of Corrections includes many frills, which ultimately makes the state vulnerable to more lawsuits. He is still a fan of Arizona's Maricopa County Sheriff "Joe" Arpaio, who instituted tent cities adjacent to his county jail.

Stone also advocated more educational opportunities for inmates. "We need more instruction in jails, so that prisoners can earn a GED and vocational skills," he said. "When they're released from jail, they can use skills such as car repair and be productive members of society."

Garcia discusses state Senate issues with Town Crier

Editor's note: On Sept. 30, former state Assemblywoman Bonnie Garcia and current candidate for the state Senate's 28th District spoke to the Town Crier on a variety of issues from the campaign. This is the second in a two-part interview. The first ran last week.

Role of the Brown Act

The Brown Act is the source of California's open government laws. When asked her opinion of this law, Garcia adamantly replied, "It doesn't go far enough. It should cover subcommittees of elected officials.

And she disagreed with Gov. Brown's recent veto of AB 194 that codified many court rulings implementing the law. She recommended that the actions of any elected or appointed official or group of officials who recommend the use of taxpayers' resources should be open to public knowledge. "What's wrong with public transparency?" she asked. "Public is the key word."

State budget

Garcia stressed that she believes the approval of Proposition 30 in 2012, which raised some tax levels, was a temporary, not a permanent, fix to the state bud-

Personal income tax increases expire in 2018, and sales tax rate increases sunset in 2017.

Yet, Garcia said she worries about adequate funding for education and classrooms to help students learn.

Hemet Fire Department

Recently, the Hemet City Council approved an agreement to transfer management of its fire department to Riverside County. This decision is quite controversial and many voters would like to see a referendum on a ballot.

Garcia agreed that "local communities should have a voice in something that dissolves 100 years of performance. It's a decision that should be made by voters and not the council.'

Work-force training

Garcia is proud of her past efforts and vowed to continue to stress funding for improving work-force training and support for the California state university system. This extends to the recent legislation passed and the governor signed to allow community colleges to award bachelor degrees in fields not currently served by the California State University or University of California

The new four-year-degree programs could be offered in vocational occupations for which an Associate of Arts degree had been acceptable in the past, but now increasingly

require a bachelor's degree to be competitive. These fields and occupations can include dental hygiene, industrial technology, allied health technology, emergency medical technology and data management for health care.

Also, she will work for programs aimed at 30- to 50-yearold adults who seek new career paths. And she strongly supports plans for statewide pre-school education. "Education is the great equalizer and better for all of us. Income level or community school shouldn't matter," she believes. "There should be no barriers to access for education."





Written and performed in 1622 and first printed in 1653, "The Changeling," is a joint effort between John Middleton (a protégé of William Shakespeare and cowriter and adapter of some of Shakespeare's plays) and William Rowley (a collaborator/playwright best known as an actor) and is considered one of the best tragedies of the Jacobean period and the first tragicomedy.

The plot (Beatrice-Joanna, Alsemero and Deflores) and subplot (Lollio, Isabella, and Antonio) mirror one another, disguise and deception, and thus the use of the very large mirrors on the set that reflect the deformity of human nature and the iniquitous fall into insanity or recognition of their faults in both storylines. The motif of

"eyes," used to see beauty and moral goodness, betray us by imposing on us what we want to see and not what is there in reality, leading to the tragic choices that cause the fall.

J. Barrett Cooper (director) returns to Idyllwild Arts Academy where he taught Shakespeare and Stage Combat and directed "A Midsummer Nights Dream" and is in his first semester as chair of the Theatre Department.

Steele in the money again

Brendan Steele has played the weekend in his first two tournaments of this new 2014-15 PGA Tour season. The native Idyllwilder fired a 9-under-par 68-70-69-68 — 275 to garner a tie for 33rd place in the Shriners Hospitals for Chil-

dren Open in Las Vegas last week. He added about \$30,000 to his official earnings and earned 34 FedEx-Cup points, giving him 82 points already for the season. He now stands 23rd on the FedExCup points list.

His stats suggest he played exceptionally well from tee to green, but he struggled a bit with his putter. His drives found 62.5 percent of the fairways while averaging 320 yards. He hit 73.6 percent of the greens in regulation, but he gave away nearly a stroke putting to the field.

Nevertheless, Steele did occasionally put it all together. One outstanding moment came during the first round when he cut off the

slight dogleg of the 341-yard, par-4 15th hole, nailing the green with a 311-yard drive that finished 9 feet from the pin. He then canned the put for an eagle 2.

After two consecutive weeks of west coast tournaments, Steele will stay home rather than travel to Georgia for this week's PGA Tour event.

er, Ernie is a poly on all four Verv paws. rare. They are 6-month-old kittens that still need some socialization to respond to the human touch.



No Ebola identified in California

Much of country concerned about disease spreading

The Ebola virus has not been found in California, stressed the state's highest public health officials last week. "There are no cases of Ebola or suspected cases in California," said Dr. Ron Chapman, director of the California Department of Public Health, on Wednesday, Oct. 15.

However, on Monday, Oct. 20, as concerns and some fears have grown in the past week, Riverside County health officials created a website to address questions about the virus. The website, www.rivcoph. org/Ebola.aspx, will house information from the Riverside County Department of Public Health, California Department of Public Health, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and other reliable sources to give the public and health providers the latest updates on Ebola and what is being done to prevent the virus' spread.

Nevertheless, they are prepared and still preparing in case a patient may be identified in California. Over the past week, officials have held conference calls with hospitals, doctors, nurses and other first responders throughout the

They have stressed that local health officials look at hospital readiness and capacity. Hospitals through-

out Riverside County were conducting these examines all of last week.

Nurses in California and the country are concerned about adequate and appropriate safety when caring for Ebola patients. Gov. Jerry Brown met with leaders of the California Nurses Association and the National Nurses United in Sacramento last week. They discussed ways to make California the national leader in enacting the highest Ebola safety standards and protocols to protect nurses, other frontline health care workers, patients and the public.

The discovery of a second health-care worker with Ebola in Texas escalated the fear of the virus spreading throughout the nation. Two different surveys found the fear of the virus growing. On Thursday, airline stocks declined sharply due to fears of a decline in flying.

While two possible Ebola victims were identified in California last week, tests for the virus came back negative, state officials said in a Wednesday teleconference.

"But it would not be unexpected for California to have a confirmed case of Ebola, therefore we need to be prepared to respond promptly and carefully," advised Dr. Gil Chavez, deputy director of CDPH's Center for Infectious Diseases. "But Ebola does not

pose a significant public health risk to communities in California at the present time.

One of the steps state officials have initiated is working with the federal government to screen possible infected individuals arriving in California at one of the state's international airports.

"California is an important destination for many travelers. We believe our international airports in the state have potential for exposure," Chavez said, explaining why the state was urging screening for some state airports.

In a Kaiser Health Policy survey, nearly two out of three Americans said they were very closely or fairly closely following the news about the Ebola outbreak. Nearly 90 percent are aware of at least one case in the United States.

In a Harvard School of Public Health survey, more than half of the respondents were concerned that an Ebola outbreak might occur in the U.S during the next vear.

public knows the disease is

spread through direct contact with the blood or body fluids of a person who is sick with Ebola or showing symptoms, two-thirds believe it can be transmitted through the air and more than half think shaking hands is sufficient to transfer the virus. Eighty-five percent of the respondents in the Harvard survey thought it was likely that a sneeze or cough could spread the virus.

"Current scientific evidence testifies that people cannot get Ebola through the air, food or water," Chavez stressed. "Ebola virus does not survive more than a few hours on surfac-

And Dr. James Watts, director of the Division of Communicable Disease Control, stressed, "Patients are not contagious when they are not symptomatic."

Only about one in five Americans believe there has been too much coverage of the disease and slightly less feel there has been too little media cover-

assure the future of California journalism through encouragement of education, and to provide a social and educational forum for its members."

The announcement by the selection committee came as a complete surprise to Clark, who at the time was chairing a meeting of the Cal Press Board of Directors during the quarterly meeting of the CNPA in Sacramento. "I was stunned," she said later. "For a small paper in a little town in the mountains . . . I never dreamed of this." Clark did not even know she had been nominated for the award, which will be presented at Cal Press's 137th-annual Winter Meeting in San Francisco on Dec. 5.


What means most to her, Clark said, is that the award cites her efforts to bring open government to her community. "Clark encountered several obstacles in trying to cover the local water districts and fire districts that dot the region the Town Crier serves. Chief among the obstacles was the longstanding culture of contempt for public scrutiny held by many of the 'good

ol' boys' who served on the various boards," Cal Press' current newsletter recounts. The article notes that Clark obtained information about local special districts unaccustomed to public scrutiny, and that she organized Brown Act and California Public Records Act workshops, inviting members of the local boards and community to attend and ask questions of lawyers conducting the training. "Clark was able to transform the culture of how many of these public entities did business as well as what residents expected from their local officials," the article states.

Much of the credit goes to the local agencies themselves, Clark says. She particularly notes that the Pine Cove Water District, an early adversary when it came to open government, eventually embraced the concept and has received open government an award from the California Special Districts Associa-

"Clark and the Town Crier have undertaken dozens of battles over the years to better inform readers and positively affect the community in which she lives," the citation went on. "She has See Clark, page 24

Mares explained the new language. "The proposed language would allow garages or carports to be constructed up to the front or side lot line on such properties, but only if configured to prevent a vehicle directly exiting or entering onto the adjacent roadway. Properties above an elevation of 4,000 feet would be excluded from this development standard."

The planning staff's latest revision to section 18.18 appears to respond to many comments similar to what Kay Jennison, com.

Idyllwild Realtor, wrote to the commission.

"In Idyllwild, many lots are on slopes, being able to build near the property line is the only way to have cars not parked in the street and often in the right of way," Jennison wrote in her Sept. 29 email. "As Idyllwild is not a subdivision community, with standard-width streets with curbs and sidewalks, parking is an issue of concern. This is especially true in the winter with ice and snow on the ground."

Crier took over its phone number and assumed operation of the town's Visitor Center, which it cited as an example of her "unwavering commitment to serve Idyllwild and businesses in the surrounding area."

Past winners of this award throughout nearly the last a half century include executives from the Riverside Press-Enterprise, the Orange County Register, the Los Angeles Daily News, the San Francisco Examiner, the San Jose Mercury News and the Sacramento Bee.

100 feet would apply to all property owners within those circles.

If abatement is not completed, fire officials would have the authority to use a contractor to perform the necessary work and the costs would be imposed on the property owner by means of a tax lien.

Throughout much of the county, fire officials already have this authority except on the Hill.

"Since the Mountain Fire, public attitudes have changed. We're terrified," Nash told the group. "Everybody wants to do this. When it is presented to the community, we'll say, 'If you want to save your structure, don't fight us.' We'll need all the enforcement effort to go after absentee property owners."

Fire officials acknowledged that stronger enforcement is the key to effective abatement compliance.

"What doesn't work now is the lack of enforcement," said Brandon Smith, a county fire prevention investigator. He stressed that Riverside County Fire Department conducts thousands of successful inspections, but enforcement of compliance needs more staffing. "This ordinance will need increased staffing. I think that what we're missing in enforcement."

Riverside County Fire Chief John Hawkins, who established the committee following an Idyllwild

Town Hall meeting in agreed. "We've June, done a lot of inspections. but we'll need to define a framework for actions and the intricacies of finances, including inspection staff and abatement costs for contractors.'

The committee's next step is to decide how broadly to spread the ordinance and how it will be enforced, Hawkins told them. "People need to have a safer mountaintop. You'll be given as much protection as possible."

Idyllwild Fire Chief Patrick Reitz, also a member of the committee, concurred with Hawkins. "I think there is a real need for this. I'm supportive but have questions.'

He also raised the issue of the time and cost for additional inspection personnel and particularly the availability of funds to pay contractors until property owners can be assessed the cost and pay

Next steps include drafting a new ordinance covering parcels with structures in mountain communities only that is consistent with the current county code, with state law and with county amendments to the state fire code; and to meet with fire code enforcement people in San Bernardino County, who already have ordinances for their mountain communities, and inquire about enforcement techniques there, according to Nash.
