Eisenhower in 1954, with the intention of honoring U.S. veterans of all wars, not just those who served in World War I.

Local man convicted of robbery

A local man was convicted and sentenced in San Bernardino last week for an Oct. 13 robbery at a WalMart store in Ontario.

Jonathan Lee Henderson, 32, of Mountain Center, pleaded nolo contendere (or no contest) to a San Bernardino County Superior Court judge and requested immediate sentencing.

He was sentenced to 180 days in a San Bernardino County jail with credit for

12 days served and given a three-year probation.

Ontario City Police Detective Russell said Henderson stopped at the Walmart on Mountain Avenue and was caught shoplifting. When Walmart loss prevention officers attempted to detain him, Henderson fought with the officers and that escalated the charge from shoplifting to robbery and burglary, he said.

The burglary charge was later dropped. Russell did not know what had been shoplifted or its value.

Oak borer infestation not an epidemic on the Hill

Much more damage cited in San Diego County

The Goldspotted oak borer has established itself in Idyllwild, but its spread and breadth have been much slower than its invasion in San Diego County, according to Dr. Tom Scott and Kevin Turner, both of the University of California, Riverside, Cooperative Extension.

Both men were in Idyllwild last week to discuss the GSOB presence and current conditions with members of the Mountain Community Fire Safe Council and its GSOB volunteers.

"We're still discovering trees [with GSOB], but we're not seeing an escalating outbreak," Scott said. "We're still finding trees already infested, but they are not spreading rapidly."

As of early October, a total of 53 trees on the Hill had been identified as being the target of GSOB infestations. Since the first identified tree was in the fall of 2012, both men thought the GSOB's infestation has been slower and less pervasive than in San Diego County.

There, the GSOB's presence has begun to spread throughout the county from its original locations. Scott described what he believes is the first natural expansion of its habitat since it has been found in a location miles from human habitat. Since the beetle's larvae are within the bark of oaks, officials have thought the beetle spreads primarily through the transport of oak firewood until this discovery.

While it is still early to identify the difference between the GSOB's spread here and in San Diego County, Turner acknowledged that no other community has committed as much resources — funding and volunteers — to combat the insect's invasion of forest oaks as Idyllwild.

Scott estimated that nearly 40,000 acres in San Diego have been identified as GSOB locations. Between 50,000 and 200,000 oaks have probably died as a result of this infestation, he added.

Exacerbating the insect's damage, and a possible harbinger of more damage, is its attack on Coastal Live oaks near Mt. Palomar. Previous GSOB victims have been limited to Black oaks.

Advantageous weather allows pile burning

Following Friday night's and Saturday morning's rain, the U.S. Forest Service, San Jacinto Ranger District, burned some piles of forest and wood debris.

"We burned 70 piles at Lawler [Lodge]; that completes that project for us," said Dan Felix, district fire chief. "The rain will definitely help for a while, it is just a matter of how much drying occurs 'til the next rain."

Plans have been made for future burn opportunities near Keenwild Fire Station.

Implementing the burns always depends upon suitable weather. Slightly more than half an inch of rainfall on the Hill enables the Forest Service to safely conduct these burns.

in Pine Cove.

Since the beginning of the rain year (July 1), slightly more than 2 inches of rain have been recorded at Keenwild. The long-term average accumulation for July through October in Idyllwild has been 3.4 inches, thus Idyllwild has received barely 60 percent of the average rainfall for this period.

According to the recently released "Monthly/Seasonal Outlook" from the Predictive Service unit at the National Interagency Coordination Center and the Geographic Area Coordination Centers, "... expect large fire potential to remain above normal in November across the foothills, urban interface and mountains areas of Southern California from Kern and Santa Barbara counties southward. Large fire potential will eventually fall to near normal levels in December for the rest of the area."

However, this year (July to October 2014) the four-month total rainfall in Pine Cove is 5.9 inches, which is above the long-term average.

On Monday, NWS predicted an El Niño is favored to begin in the next one to two months and last into the Northern Hemisphere until spring 2015. The resultant NWS forecast for the fall and early winter expects slightly above-normal pre-

cipitation and temperatures for Southern California.

"Across Southern California, a change toward higher moisture content in native brush and shrubs will likely wait until well into December," according to the Predictive Services' report.

Based on the extent of the drought for the past three years, Tardy said, "Idyllwild would need about 23 inches of rain to balance the drought's effect."

"The severe drought over the area is unlikely to abate much in the long term. This is the third consecutive dry year and most of the area has only seen 33 to 50 percent of normal precipitation since the end of 2011. It would take several months of well-above-normal precipitation to erase the precipitation deficit which has been accrued during the last three years," concluded Predictive Services.

Cirilio Gonzalez, 54, of Perris, crossed the double-yellow lines on his Yamaha silver motorcycle traveling north on Highway 243 just north of Highway 74, crashing into a gray Toyota Tundra driven southbound by Jason Sonnier of Idyllwild, said Meyer.

Gonzalez suffered minor injuries, he said, but

Recently, the LA County supervisors met in closed session to discuss compensation negotiations, something that is perfectly legitimate to discuss behind closed doors. However, the supervisors failed to include the discussion on their agenda prior to the meeting.

And the Public Integrity Division found the supervisors in violation of the Brown Act.

DA Steve Cooley believes in open government, probably more so than any other DA in the state. He established the PID that repeatedly shines the light on public officials behaving badly.

Mike Hestrin promises a more open office when he's seated as Riverside County's district attorney in January.

Consider our county's geographic size and population of more 7,000 square miles and more than 2 million people, making it the fourth most populated county in the state.

If I had to count the number of public boards subject to the Brown Act in the county, I'm guessing it would number in the thousands.

Those public boards representing the Hill alone number 12 not to mention their committees also subject to open government laws.

I hope Hestrin establishes a public oversight division within our DA's office to ensure our representatives really represent us and not themselves.

Before Our Time

SAWMILLS WERE COMMON IN THE FOREST ...


Between 1875 and 1900 loggers and sawmills were the dominant human activity in the San Jacinto Mountains. They appeared first on Indian Creek in Hall Canyon, now home to Lake Fulmor and the James Reserve, then along Fuller Mill and Strawberry creeks.

Once steam engines replaced water wheels, logging camps spread into the forest beyond the creeks.

At least 18 different sawmills can be documented in these mountains. Exactly where each was located is typically a mystery.

Structures were of-

ten built to be readily disassembled, then reassembled at a new location, so most of the mills have left no trace on the landscape. Even the most recent one, which operated in Idyllwild for many years after 1920, is omitted from a 1928 village map so detailed



that it depicts every existing cabin.

Solving such mysteries is the kind of detective work that appeals to the ex-scientist in me, but clues are rare and unpredictable.

News stories were vague about locations. Discovered artifacts are meaningful only if they remain in their original location. Old photographs sometimes help, but only if they're reliably labeled or show permanent features like boulder formations or nearby ridge lines. Oral tradition is occasionally useful, but human memory is tricky.

The simplest case, the 1882 mill built on Saunders Meadow by Anton Scherman, the dominant logger between 1880 and 1900, is clearly labeled and dated in an archive photo.

In the case of Full-

er's Mill on its namesake creek inside the private Pinewood community, the clues were a remaining structural foundation and a misidentified but descriptive 1895 photo. Scherman's 1889 mill site on Dutch Flat was pointed out by some descendants who visited the Idyllwild Area Historical Society Museum.

My curiosity was rekindled recently by an inquiry from local botanists Dave Stith and Tom Chester. So with the help of Tom and others I've been researching another foundation, at Sawmill Flat on the trail between Marion Mountain Campground and the private Thousand Trails RV camp in Pine Cove.

Tediously comparing unidentified archive photos with Google Earth images and on-site photographs, we've finally concluded that this was the so-called Dark Canyon sawmill (1908-1922), which Hiram Roach operated for the San Jacinto Lumber and Box Company. The clincher was discovering a map depicting the footprint of a major 1914 wildfire ignited by smoldering

sawdust at the Dark Canyon mill; the footprint's shape clearly places the origin at Sawmill Flat.

Then we repeatedly visited a nearby meadow littered with old cable and rusty metal, consulted archive photos of Scherman's 1895 Stone Creek mill, especially a well-documented 1898 image from the Southern California Historical Society, and eventually deduced a likely site. There I happened upon a heavy iron object, long half-buried, that could be a crucial piece of the steam-powered machinery shown in one photo.

Another puzzle involves a Scherman mill, his last, set up in Fern Valley in 1900. Neighborhood tradition and a recently discovered band-saw blade suggest it may have been somewhere near the top of John Muir Road. Can anyone out there offer another clue?

Currently, the defense of expanding GSOB infestations has been the removal of trees that harbor it. The entire tree is removed and taken to a grinding station, which has discouraged some landowners who want the firewood.

Turner did share that some research involving debarking of trees is ongoing that might result in discovering ways to take down infested oaks and remove the GSOB larvae while permitting the property owner to keep the wood for fires. The work is still in preliminary stages so Turner could not announce a definite result last week.

Also, he mentioned that some pesticides have been successful in containing the beetle, but again, more research is needed.

Buchanan said IFPD's attorney and its insurer, Special District Risk Management Authority, were reviewing the WNKI draft agreement.

Commissioner Nancy Layton indicated support and suggested that some plans for updating the equipment should be considered.

MHRC has developed specific plans for improving the station and the signal in order to broaden the coverage area, Tell told the commission.

"We've shared this with the chief and submitted to the [Community Wildfire Protection Plan] folks in the process of revising it," he said. "This is all about how WNKI can better serve the community. We can be the bridge for many agencies involved."

"The chief [Patrick Reitz] and I don't want to run it and prefer to hand it off to people who can run it and operate it," Commission President Jerry Buchanan.

The plan would extend WNKI's signal from Poppet Flats to Pinyon Pines. Another stage would upgrade the system's software, which is still using the 1980s version.

Regarding the commission's October letter to the grand jury about the district's response to the GJ June report, Buchanan said no official reply has been received. However, he did speak with the foreman of the grand jury.

One of the issues the foreman shared with Buchanan was their concern that the district referred to the grand jury's findings as "accusations."

"He said this was a legal term used in court," Buchanan stated and felt that would be a simple correction for the commission to accept.

In financial business, Layton confirmed IFPD's cash flow has been negative during the first quarter of the fiscal year. Fortunately, it has been able to rely on the proceeds from the September 2013 cell tower lease sell. However, later this year, the Finance Committee plans to propose a plan to transfer these funds to the reserve account.

Riverside County and state finances improving

County Executive Jay Orr is "cautiously optimistic" about Riverside County's current budget and financial direction, he told the Board of Supervisors in his "First Quarter Report."

In September, the supervisors approved a final budget for fiscal year 2014-15 (which began July 1) totaling \$637.4 million. None of the projected problems, such as departmental deficits for the Sheriff, District Attorney and Fire Department, have been alleviated.

Nevertheless, Orr did not recommend any changes in using the \$23.6 million contingency fund that is part of the budget.

He indicated that assessed values of property within the county have "resume[d] a more steady increase" and no new budget problems have surfaced.

"... at this early stage, I recommend continuing to

monitor those budget units and deferring action to address those matters until later in the fiscal year," Orr said in his cover memorandum.

He plans to submit a mid-year report to the board in early February.

The financial status is also demonstrating improvement. California's economic growth propelled revenues higher in September, while spending remained in check, according to the State Controller's latest cash report.

Total revenues in September reached \$9.8 billion and beat forecasts contained in the 2014-15 Budget Act by \$671 million, or 7.4 percent. All of the major revenue generators — personal income, corporate income and retail sales taxes — surpassed expectations. In addition, total disbursements fell below the Department of Finance projections in September by \$156 million, or 1.1 percent.



GSOB GROWTH AND RESPONSE ...

A meeting last week of interested parties on the Gold-spotted oak borer provides a good moment to take stock of where we are in relation to this destructive pest.

The GSOB is an invasive insect brought to San Diego County around 2004 and since then has devastated the oak trees of many San Diego communities. Traveling mainly in firewood, GSOB was found in Idyllwild by the sharp eyes of Cal Fire's Kathleen Edwards in 2012. Since then various groups and people have acted to stop the spread before it reaches outbreak proportions in the San Jacintos.

Kevin Turner and Tom Scott of University of California, Riverside, Gregg Bratcher of Cal Fire, Edwina Scott of the Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council, and many volunteers have all worked together to contain the spread. The latest number of identified oak trees infested with the insect in Idyllwild and Pine Cove is 53, an encouraging number.

It is likely that most of the trees identified do not represent recent spreading, but rather trees that have been infested from the first years of entry in the community. Put another way, we are not seeing a dramatic spike with this number, as one would see in an epidemic, but a modest upward slope, meaning it is spreading but not very fast.

What we need to contain the beetle and protect our oaks is to continue identifying and removing infected trees. A single tree can act in spring as a veritable GSOB factory, throwing as many as 8,000 insects into the surrounding area. Anyone who owns oaks or who regularly walks the neighborhoods can be a very helpful part of the early identification process. If you see a black oak that is keeping its leaves longer than others, and the leaves are crinkly and brown rather than full and yellow, please call the hotline (951-659-8328) to have people look at it.

No tree can be removed without the owner's permission, but we hope people understand that if you do have an infested tree, the best thing to do for all the oak trees around it is to have it removed.

One team that has been regularly searching for GSOB comprises Doris Lombard, Ron Perry and Elliott Taylor. Since the team was challenged to describe precise locations, Ron found a program that allows the team to take a picture of the tree with an iPad, allowing the picture and its GPS coordinates to be sent immediately to Kevin at UCR. You can imagine what an advance this was. Also helping in this mapping effort is Dan Dever, another skilled volunteer who maintains a data base of trees at the MCFSC.

At this point we need more volunteers to search for infected trees (call 951-659-6208), and we need more calls from the community to help spot them (call the hotline). We also need people to be extremely cautious about buying firewood, and we suggest no one buy firewood from off the Hill. If you have firewood you are unsure of, make sure you burn it this winter so GSOB can't fly in the spring.

Moving forward from this meeting, Edwina will host a meeting of the volunteers to share best practices, and she will organize another public meeting in the spring. At that time we hope we will have more guidance from researchers on using pesticides for tree protection, which at this time is promising but not conclusive.

Covered California renewal period open

Improved open enrollment begins Nov. 15

The renewal process for 1.12 million individuals who enrolled in Covered California health-care plans last year has begun. Open enrollment is the next opportunity for all Californians to benefit from new insurance rules, including the requirement that insurance be offered regardless of health status.

The open enrollment period begins Nov. 15 and will con-

tinue through Feb. 15. In addition, this is the window of time when Californians can buy subsidized coverage starting in 2015.

After one season of being open, Covered California is prepared to improve and eliminate many problems and frustrations the public encountered last year. Substantial new improvements to facilitate enrollment in coverage for 2015 will be inaugurated this month.

The first wave of renewal notices was sent to consumers in October. Individuals who complete the renewal process will hear from their insurance plans in December. Their selected health plan will send a statement reflecting coverage starting Jan. 1, 2015. Consumers who take no action will be renewed into their existing plan.

Individuals who have health coverage through Medi-Cal will renew their coverage throughout the year on a rolling monthly schedule. Medi-Cal will contact them directly if they need to take action. Unless they are contacted by Medi-Cal, these individuals do not need to go to the Covered California website to renew or apply.

As of Oct. 16, a total of 1.12 million individuals had effectuated coverage and will be part of the renewal process. CoveredCA expects this number to increase as special enrollment continues and as recent enrollees effectuate their coverage, with about 1.3 million Californians participating in the renewal process through the end of the year.

After last year's enrollment period, CoveredCA evaluated its performance and, based on its report, will implement several changes to improve and simplify the public ability to enroll and choose an appropriate health plan.

"We know this open-enrollment period will be more challenging in some ways. Consumers will only have three months to enroll, compared with the six months they had last time. This is complicated by our knowledge that many who are uninsured have adapted to a culture of coping and have become accustomed to living without health insurance," said CoveredCA Executive Director Peter V. Lee.

Among the changes will be the number of Service Center representatives available to help. More than 1,300 representatives will help consumers over the phone, by chat or by processing their paper applications or documents. This is more than double the number of Service Center representatives — state employed and contractors — available at the end of the 2014 enrollment period.

With less than one month before open enrollment be-

gins, consumers can begin shopping for 2015 coverage. They can find out if they are eligible for financial assistance and find out how much a health plan will cost them, by using Covered California's Shop and Compare Tool (on CoveredCA.com at www.CoveredCA.com/shopandcompare/#calculator). CoveredCA also offers a full listing of the plans and their rates in the booklet "Health Insurance Companies and Plan Rates for 2015" (online at www.CoveredCA.com/PDFs/CC-health-plans-booklet-2015.pdf).

This year CoveredCA will have 254 Service Center representatives able to serve consumers in languages other than English, compared with 55 during open enrollment in 2013.

Service Center hours — including phone service and online chat — have been expanded to accommodate consumers after hours, with representatives now available from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday. In addition, the Service Center will be open on many Sundays during open enrollment, including every Sunday from Nov. 16 through Dec. 14.

CoveredCA is working with health plans to make it possible for consumers to make their first premium payment online as soon as they have selected a plan. This is intended to give consumers peace of mind that they have evidence that their payment has been received and they will have coverage in place.

Another effort to improve customer service was a substantial upgrade to the computer and telecommunications infrastructure. The enrollment portal can now allow for greater user capacity and speedier page loads so consumers don't have to return later to complete an application.

For self-service, CoveredCA is redesigning its interactive voice response system to handle more consumer calls while decreasing wait times and updating consumers on wait times when they are placed on hold.

CoveredCA's partners will open more than 200 storefronts in retail locations, such as malls, to help serve consumers on a drop-in basis that meets their scheduling needs. Consumers can get help at these sites to enroll, renew and learn more about health coverage options.

CoveredCA offers a range of choices of private health insurance plans. Consumers can choose the health plan and level of coverage (Bronze, Silver, Gold or Platinum) that best meets their health needs and budget.

For example, grants have been given to a grandmother raising her grandchildren, an alumnus of the House of Hope and a woman actively involved in community volunteerism whose family was experiencing severe hardship. HELP Center, Dr. Browning sponsor annual Health Fair



Dr. Peter Bryant offers a spider show-and-tell

Dr. Peter Bryant, research professor, School of Biological Sciences, University of California, Irvine, is the next guest speaker in the Idyllwild Community Center's Speaker Series, and he is fond of and a great admirer of spiders, both for their building skills and their usefulness within terrestrial food webs.

He noted that spiders are efficient controllers of insects, many of which are agricultural pests. "They are also an important food source for birds, lizards, wasps and other animals. Silk made by spiders is also used by many birds for nest building," he said. Asked why he chose as his topic spiders, about which many people have instinctive fears and aversion, he said, "Because it was Halloween." Bryant will speak at Silver Pines Lodge at 6 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 13. There is a wine and cheese bar at 5:30 p.m. Both are free to the public.

Bryant, whose inter-

ests include biodiversity and conversation, has photographed and catalogued the spiders of Orange County. The variations in appearance, habits and differing skills of the spiders in his study are, according to Bryant, part of what makes them so interesting. He notes that spiders build webs to serve specific purposes, in many different patterns and in a variety of locations, including underwater.

"The [spider] silk comes in many different forms, and some spiders can make up to eight different kinds of the protein," he said. "The silks are used in building orb webs, funnel webs, tangle webs, tubular webs, sheet webs, dome webs and fishing nets. Most of the time it is used to trap prey, but some forms of silk are used to wrap prey, to make egg cases, to make parachutes and to line burrows." He pointed out that the tensile strength of spider silk is stronger than steel and is considered one of the strongest materials in the world. In web building,

the spider spins different silk for different purposes — sticky silk to trap prey and some that is not sticky for the spider to use to get from one place to another on the web.

"I'll be talking about and showing slides illustrating the beauty, diversity and lives of spiders," he said, "including their bizarre sex lives and mating rituals."

So even if, or especially if, you have arachnophobia, you will be impressed by how very complex and interesting spiders are and perhaps leave Dr. Bryant's talk and slide show with a better appreciation for

these highly evolved animals.

Bryant holds a bachelor of science in zoology from Kings College, University of London, a master of science in biochemistry from University College, University of London and a doctorate in genetics from the University of Sussex, England.

He is a witty and engaging conversationalist and should provide an interesting, informative and educational evening.

All the old leaf blowers are scrapped and recycled.

Since the program began in 2006, SCAQMD has scrapped more than 10,000 old, polluting leaf blowers, reducing the emission of smog-forming pollutants by 88,282 pounds per year in the southland. Comfort music ...



the James

Idyllwild is set in an ecologically fascinating area. It is a mountain island surrounded by a desert sea. This patchwork of contrasting ecosystems is a window into a rich biodiversity and endemism, life that is unique to a particular place.

Scientists have long recognized the San Jacinto Mountains as a particularly interesting site to study and better understand the natural world through studies on *Drosophila* (fruit fly) evolution to the effects of climate warming.

In 1908, a group of biologists from UC Berkeley surveyed the San Jacinto Mountains. Last year, we just finished a centennial resurvey of the same sites. A century produced many changes in our natural resources, and we'll be writing about these transformations among other topics having to do with the landscape and populations of its natural inhabitants.

The James Reserve is in the backyard of Idyllwild and Pine Cove. It is part of the University of California Natural Reserve System, which consists of 38 other sites spread around California.

At the James San Jacinto Mountains Reserve, researchers and teachers come from all over the world to study this region. In the last few years, the James has hosted a variety of researchers who hail from places such as Minnesota and Germany, and locals from the James

Reserve's home campus, UC Riverside. Their work focuses on studies ranging from hybridization in oaks, small mammal and bird communities to insects.

The James also is the site of the reintroduction of the southern mountain yellow-legged frog (*Rana muscosa*), which has gone extinct locally at the James and in most of Southern California. In this and many other ways, the James Reserve provides a living library and outdoor laboratory for students, researchers and others interested in the environment. As one researcher put it, "Field stations are places where we can read the book of life in the language in which it was written," (James Kirchner, UC

Berkeley professor emeritus).

We hope this column will serve as a window into life at a field station, which itself provides a peek into the natural world that surrounds us and the people who devote their lives to monitoring it, learning how it works, sharing our discoveries and passing this understanding to others. In future columns we invite you to learn more about the James Reserve, your friendly neighbors to the north, and to explore the wonders of our distinctive region with us. Stay tuned.

Steve Moulton likes knowing people

Steve Moulton, long-time Hill resident, likes the lack of anonymity of small-town life. "I like knowing people," he said as he sat at his latest retail outlet, the Cave in Fern Valley Corners. "I'm not a private person. I like the association with others you get up here. You can get a whole lot closer to people, get to know them, and they find they can trust you and can talk with you."

And like many on the Hill, Moulton came from a larger community down from the mountain — in his case, Long Beach where his dad had several gas stations. "I've always loved retail, maybe getting that from my father," he said. He said he first came to appreciate the virtues of small-town living when his parents bought a resort in Clear Lake, California. "I went to high school there," he said. "Knowing everybody, that appealed to me." He was introduced to Idyllwild in 1971 when his sister and brother-in-law held a family reunion here.

Moulton, like Eiler Larsen, Laguna Beach greeter, famous to tourists and locals for many years, is an available friend to all, happy and willing to listen to the stories of those who stop by his shop. Moulton recounts how so many are in the habit of coming to purchase, from Bubba's Books or his collectibles at the Cave, but stay to talk and share their stories, concerns and celebrations. "People in Idyllwild are different," he said, "not so much stuck in the stress-filled 8 to 5 routine of peo-

ple down below. They're more laid back with more time to visit. I don't ever want to leave. You develop so many friendships with people." Moulton, a front porch philosopher, said he thinks it's our circumstances — circumstances of living close to each other where everybody knows everybody. "You go to the post office in the middle of the day and all your neighbors are there."

He noted that he has come to know so many in town through the varied businesses he has had here. First he had a trading card and collectibles shop he said introduced him to so many of the kids in the community and their parents. He also had a paper route for the Press-Enterprise, delivering locally for "1,400 days."

He bought his first cabin, in Pine Cove, 37 years ago and has been a full-time resident of the Hill for more than 22 years. Being available to sit, visit and talk, Moulton probably knows more people on the Hill than most. It's because of that familiarity with the resident population that Moulton worked to vet candidates for the Idyllwild Chamber of Commerce, helping the Chamber run its board of director elections.


Wandering through Bubba's Books, one is struck by the variety of titles, neatly organized according to author and

by the bargain basement prices. "I've always preferred to sell more at less of a price," he said. Moulton said he keeps close track of what his customers like to read and stocks accordingly. At the Cave, collectibles are marked both with price and some appropriate saying. "I like to share my 'writing' and thoughts," he said.

When asked what to him is most special about Idyllwild, he said, "Doug Austin. He is my hero, the most humble and the most caring person I know. He always greets you and makes you smile. He gives so much to the community and yet doesn't want people to know how much he has given."

Like Austin, Moulton gives — both in presence and in presents to the community. Moulton funded the "Girl Reading" metal sculpture, crafted by Dore Capitani that is installed in front of the new Idyllwild Library. The sculpture, initially drawn with help from local artist Jan Jaspers-Fayer, is a tribute to the late Mary Austin, Doug Austin's wife, a lifelong proponent of literacy for children.

Moulton, like Austin, does not trumpet his accomplishments. He is a business administration graduate of Cal State Fullerton, an Army veteran, and a man with a significant corporate career. He

has worked in stock brokerage houses, and has held corporate regional management positions in the auto industry for American Motors and Subaru.

Of his peripatetic career that has honed his people skills, Moulton said, "I've fallen into stuff my whole life. I don't think it was my ability, just a little star [as a guide]."



As the evening darkened it began to rain, finally. I scooted in the dogs for it was cold and squally, the first sincere snap of autumn, and the phone was ringing, too. A few moments later he used the downstairs door, came in with his key, wearing his winter wet-gear...tossed his scarf on the stair. I hung up the phone, saying "Bob is here." Oh, he'd been gone so, so long, a long, long while, six years, just imagine. Now, it didn't much matter where he'd been or why — overwhelmed, I clutched at him, felled by emotion I could not contain, telling him I had trusted that he might well come home again. Why is Stephen Hawking a big deal? ...

During my most recent trip to the movie theater, I saw a preview to a movie soon to make its release in the U.S. called "The Theory of Everything."

The film depicts the relationship between Jane Wilde and theoretical physicist and cosmologist Stephen Hawking, along with his battle with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis. While I imagine the movie will cover some of his contributions to science, I figure, why not cover some of them here just in case. I won't go over any of the awards, recognitions or prizes he has received because I would need three columns for that.

For me, Stephen Hawking has made three significant contributions to science. I'll describe them in no particular order.

Singularity theorems

Hawking, along with his colleague Roger Penrose, proposed that if all matter has fundamental properties then singularities must exist within Einstein's theory of relativity.

A singularity is a region of infinite density with infinite space-time curvature — a place where Einstein's field equations break down. The places where you find a singularity are the centers of black holes.

Hawking realized that when you apply quantum mechanics to the event horizon of a black hole, you get particles and anti-particles coming into existence. The particle escapes while the anti-particle goes into the black hole creating what is known as Hawking radiation.

If you are curious to learn more about the specifics of Hawking radiation, feel free to look up the bet he made with Stanford University physicist Leonard Susskind on the behavior of black holes.

Wave function of the universe

In quantum mechanics, everything is described by wave functions. The quantum world is weird to us because you don't have a definite state or complete certainty, just a range of probabilities. Hawking extended and applied this probable degree of certainty to the universe itself.

Hawking proposed that as you go back in time you get to a point where time and space, and thus the universe itself, close off into a state of no-boundary. In other words, you get to a state where there is nothing and everything at once. There is no before and no after and there is no here and no there. So asking, "What happened before the Big Bang?" would be akin to asking, "Where is the edge of the Earth?"

The no-boundary universe is similar to the geometry of a surface of a sphere except it has four dimensions instead of two. A cause to the universe would require a before and after as well as a before and after to the cause of the cause and so on forever.

If you are curious to learn more, check out his book "Euclidean Quantum Gravity."

Savage introduces 'Ramona' to 21st century

Revised version premieres later this month

The iconic "Ramona" pageant has been re-written. Local resident Stephen Savage, who assumed the role of executive creative director for Hemet's Ramona Bowl Amphitheatre in June, has revised the historic script, submitted it to the state, scheduled a premiere reading, and maintains the pageant's unique place in the state as "The California State Outdoor Play."

The new Ramona pageant

will have its first public performance in a reading Saturday, Nov. 22, at the Wells Fargo Theatre at Autry National Center in Los Angeles. Savage's version is about two hours and 10 minutes, nearly an hour shorter than the original.

"The story is the same, the same beginning, but more true to the novel than the old play," Savage said. Ramona will maintain the spotlight, while more action and gunfire are introduced on stage. Although Savage will not direct the play, he is very excited about its premiere and described the effort as "harder than writing a screen play."

"It still tells the story of Ramona and Alessan-

script read later this month.

Many familiar actors will participate in the Nov. 22 reading. Besides Bedard, Jim Beaver of "Deadwood," "Breaking Bad" and "Longmire," will be on stage. Joining him will be Idyllwild's Conor O'Farrell. Other well-known performers include Wolfgang Bodison, Oscar Toree and Chuti Tiu.

That evening, Savage plans to announce the next actress to play Ramona. Rehearsals for the 92nd season of "Ramona" begin in February. The 2015 season opens April 18.

Idyllwild Film Fest

Meanwhile, Savage continues to oversee the Idyllwild International Festival of Cinema. The sixth festival opens Jan. 6, 2015.

"In January, the Idyllwild Film Fest will be huge. We've had twice as many films already submitted for review," Savage said.

Every submission is reviewed online this year, he added.

Plans are developing for more venues in 2016, according to Savage. With six venues, the festival will be able to accommodate and offer more than 200 movies and may expand to eight days.



Obituary Paul Oscar Arnsen 1928-2014

Paul Arnsen passed away peacefully with his family by his side at home Friday, Oct. 31, in San Diego.



Paul was born March 10, 1928 in a one-room log cabin on a 160-acre farm that was homesteaded by his grandparents in Northeastern Wisconsin. He spent the early years of his life living without electricity and walking 4 miles each way to the only schoolhouse in the area located outside of Washburn, Wisconsin.

Upon graduating from high school, Paul spent two years driving heavy equipment for the United States Air Force, then returned back to the farm to continue that trade for the Bayfield County Road Department.

Shortly thereafter, he married Muriel Virginia Olson and re-located to Northern Minnesota to take advantage of the massive taconite mining boom that was sweeping across the Iron Range of the Midwest. He became

an electrician with Erie Mining Company, working on the electrical motors that powered up the largest heavy equipment in the world at that time.

He settled in the town of Hoyt Lakes, Minnesota, and it was there he spent the next 30 years of his life honing his skills as a husband, a father and a true outdoorsman. Whether it was a day off in between shifts, or a two-week vacation, Paul had his family by his side on an outdoor adventure. He led many canoe trips into the untamed lands of Northern Ontario, Canada, catching 25-pound lake trout, and eventually made his way into the Eastern Sierras catching 10-inch golden trout — the emphasis always being on the experience and not the size.

He was considered by many to be one of the greatest fly fishermen to ever cast a line, and was always willing to share his expertise and knowledge with anyone who showed interest in what he referred to as a "Gentleman's Sport."

The months of fall were his favorite time of year, as it meant the steelhead were running in the Brule River in

Wisconsin, which then led to the chasing of the elusive white tail deer of Northern Minnesota.

As the winter months set in, his indoor activities included building custom fly rods, fly tying and, of course, bowling, of which he was the first to roll a perfect game at the North Star Lanes in 1972.

Paul never had a complaint or critique of anyone or anything. He loved his community, his work and most of all, he loved his family.

The world benefited from his existence. He will be missed by many, but those benefits will live on.

He is survived by sons Lee of Idyllwild, and Paul (Melissa) of San Diego; four granddaughters, Riley, Brooke, Kate and Shelby; brother Larry; and sister Kathleen. He was preceded in death by parents Elsie and Oscar, wife Muriel and partner Elaine, sisters Mary Ellen and Audrey, and brother Tom.

In lieu of flowers or cards, the family asks that when you leave your house in the morning to simply enjoy the beauty of the day. A new experience awaits.


The burglary charge was later dropped. Russell did not know what had been shoplifted or its value.

Oak borer infestation not an epidemic on the Hill

Much more damage cited in San Diego County

The Goldspotted oak borer has established itself in Idyllwild, but its spread and breadth have been much slower than its invasion in San Diego County, according to Dr. Tom Scott and Kevin Turner, both of the University of California, Riverside, Cooperative Extension.

Both men were in Idyllwild last week to discuss the GSOB presence and current conditions with members of the Mountain Community Fire Safe Council and its GSOB volunteers.

"We're still discovering trees [with GSOB], but we're not seeing an escalating outbreak," Scott said. "We're still finding trees already infested, but they are not spreading rapidly."

As of early October, a total of 53 trees on the Hill had been identified as being the target of GSOB infestations. Since the first identified tree was in the fall of 2012, both men thought the GSOB's infestation has been slower and less pervasive than in San Diego County.

There, the GSOB's presence has begun to spread throughout the county from its original locations. Scott described what he believes is the first natural expansion of its habitat since it has been found in a location miles from human habitat. Since the beetle's larvae are within the bark of oaks, officials have thought the beetle spreads primarily through the transport of oak firewood until this discovery.

While it is still early to identify the difference between the GSOB's spread here and in San Diego County, Turner acknowledged that no other community has committed as much resources — funding and volunteers — to combat the insect's invasion of forest oaks as Idyllwild.

Scott estimated that nearly 40,000 acres in San Diego have been identified as GSOB locations. Between 50,000 and 200,000 oaks have probably died as a result of this infestation, he added.

Exacerbating the insect's damage, and a possible harbinger of more damage, is its attack on Coastal Live oaks near Mt. Palomar. Previous GSOB victims have been limited to Black oaks.

in Pine Cove.

Since the beginning of the rain year (July 1), slightly more than 2 inches of rain have been recorded at Keenwild. The long-term average accumulation for July through October in Idyllwild has been 3.4 inches, thus Idyllwild has received barely 60 percent of the average rainfall for this period.

According to the recently released "Monthly/Seasonal Outlook" from the Predictive Service unit at the National Interagency Coordination Center and the Geographic Area Coordination Centers, "... expect large fire potential to remain above normal in November across the foothills, urban interface and mountains areas of Southern California from Kern and Santa Barbara counties southward. Large fire potential will eventually fall to near normal levels in December for the rest of the area."

However, this year (July to October 2014) the four-month total rainfall in Pine Cove is 5.9 inches, which is above the long-term average.

On Monday, NWS predicted an El Niño is favored to begin in the next one to two months and last into the Northern Hemisphere until spring 2015. The resultant NWS forecast for the fall and early winter expects slightly above-normal pre-

cipitation and temperatures for Southern California.

"Across Southern California, a change toward higher moisture content in native brush and shrubs will likely wait until well into December," according to the Predictive Services' report.

Based on the extent of the drought for the past three years, Tardy said, "Idyllwild would need about 23 inches of rain to balance the drought's effect."

"The severe drought over the area is unlikely to abate much in the long term. This is the third consecutive dry year and most of the area has only seen 33 to 50 percent of normal precipitation since the end of 2011. It would take several months of well-above-normal precipitation to erase the precipitation deficit which has been accrued during the last three years," concluded Predictive Services.

Gonzalez suffered minor injuries, he said, but

no one was transported to a hospital. Idyllwild Garage towed away the motorcycle but the Tundra, which did sustain damage, was driven away, he added.

Editor's note: Last week's story stated that Dawn Sonnier was the driver of the Tundra. Meyer said the CHP report was incorrect. The CHP report also stated there were three passengers. The Sonnier family said there were four.

Advantageous weather allows pile burning

Following Friday night's and Saturday morning's rain, the U.S. Forest Service, San Jacinto Ranger District, burned some piles of forest and wood debris.

"We burned 70 piles at Lawler [Lodge]; that completes that project for us," said Dan Felix, district fire chief. "The rain will definitely help for a while, it is just a matter of how much drying occurs 'til the next rain."

Plans have been made for future burn opportunities near Keenwild Fire Station.

Implementing the burns always depends upon suitable weather. Slightly more than half an inch of rainfall on the Hill enables the Forest Service to safely conduct these burns.

I must address the Larry Edwards story Jack Clark wrote in the Town Crier. I disagree with what Larry Edwards said.


The quilters had nary an inkling that Larry was so unhappy and felt we were a bunch of homophobic ladies (which is untrue).



Before Our Time

SAWMILLS WERE COMMON IN THE FOREST ...


Between 1875 and 1900 loggers and sawmills were the dominant human activity in the San Jacinto Mountains. They appeared first on Indian Creek in Hall Canyon, now home to Lake Fulmor and the James Reserve, then along Fuller Mill and Strawberry creeks.

Once steam engines replaced water wheels, logging camps spread into the forest beyond the creeks.

At least 18 different sawmills can be documented in these mountains. Exactly where each was located is typically a mystery.

Structures were of-

ten built to be readily disassembled, then reassembled at a new location, so most of the mills have left no trace on the landscape. Even the most recent one, which operated in Idyllwild for many years after 1920, is omitted from a 1928 village map so detailed



that it depicts every existing cabin.

Solving such mysteries is the kind of detective work that appeals to the ex-scientist in me, but clues are rare and unpredictable.

News stories were vague about locations. Discovered artifacts are meaningful only if they remain in their original location. Old photographs sometimes help, but only if they're reliably labeled or show permanent features like boulder formations or nearby ridge lines. Oral tradition is occasionally useful, but human memory is tricky.

The simplest case, the 1882 mill built on Saunders Meadow by Anton Scherman, the dominant logger between 1880 and 1900, is clearly labeled and dated in an archive photo.

In the case of Full-

er's Mill on its namesake creek inside the private Pinewood community, the clues were a remaining structural foundation and a misidentified but descriptive 1895 photo. Scherman's 1889 mill site on Dutch Flat was pointed out by some descendants who visited the Idyllwild Area Historical Society Museum.

My curiosity was rekindled recently by an inquiry from local botanists Dave Stith and Tom Chester. So with the help of Tom and others I've been researching another foundation, at Sawmill Flat on the trail between Marion Mountain Campground and the private Thousand Trails RV camp in Pine Cove.

Tediously comparing unidentified archive photos with Google Earth images and on-site photographs, we've finally concluded that this was the so-called Dark Canyon sawmill (1908-1922), which Hiram Roach operated for the San Jacinto Lumber and Box Company. The clincher was discovering a map depicting the footprint of a major 1914 wildfire ignited by smoldering

sawdust at the Dark Canyon mill; the footprint's shape clearly places the origin at Sawmill Flat.

Then we repeatedly visited a nearby meadow littered with old cable and rusty metal, consulted archive photos of Scherman's 1895 Stone Creek mill, especially a well-documented 1898 image from the Southern California Historical Society, and eventually deduced a likely site. There I happened upon a heavy iron object, long half-buried, that could be a crucial piece of the steam-powered machinery shown in one photo.

Another puzzle involves a Scherman mill, his last, set up in Fern Valley in 1900. Neighborhood tradition and a recently discovered band-saw blade suggest it may have been somewhere near the top of John Muir Road. Can anyone out there offer another clue?

Currently, the defense of expanding GSOB infestations has been the removal of trees that harbor it. The entire tree is removed and taken to a grinding station, which has discouraged some landowners who want the firewood.

Turner did share that some research involving debarking of trees is ongoing that might result in discovering ways to take down infested oaks and remove the GSOB larvae while permitting the property owner to keep the wood for fires. The work is still in preliminary stages so Turner could not announce a definite result last week.

Also, he mentioned that some pesticides have been successful in containing the beetle, but again, more research is needed.

Buchanan said IFPD's attorney and its insurer, Special District Risk Management Authority, were reviewing the WNKI draft agreement.

Commissioner Nancy Layton indicated support and suggested that some plans for updating the equipment should be considered.

MHRC has developed specific plans for improving the station and the signal in order to broaden the coverage area, Tell told the commission.

"We've shared this with the chief and submitted to the [Community Wildfire Protection Plan] folks in the process of revising it," he said. "This is all about how WNKI can better serve the community. We can be the bridge for many agencies involved."

"The chief [Patrick Reitz] and I don't want to run it and prefer to hand it off to people who can run it and operate it," Commission President Jerry Buchanan.

The plan would extend WNKI's signal from Poppet Flats to Pinyon Pines. Another stage would upgrade the system's software, which is still using the 1980s version.

Regarding the commission's October letter to the grand jury about the district's response to the GJ June report, Buchanan said no official reply has been received. However, he did speak with the foreman of the grand jury.

One of the issues the foreman shared with Buchanan was their concern that the district referred to the grand jury's findings as "accusations."

"He said this was a legal term used in court," Buchanan stated and felt that would be a simple correction for the commission to accept.

In financial business, Layton confirmed IFPD's cash flow has been negative during the first quarter of the fiscal year. Fortunately, it has been able to rely on the proceeds from the September 2013 cell tower lease sell. However, later this year, the Finance Committee plans to propose a plan to transfer these funds to the reserve account.

Riverside County and state finances improving

County Executive Jay Orr is "cautiously optimistic" about Riverside County's current budget and financial direction, he told the Board of Supervisors in his "First Quarter Report."

In September, the supervisors approved a final budget for fiscal year 2014-15 (which began July 1) totaling \$637.4 million. None of the projected problems, such as departmental deficits for the Sheriff, District Attorney and Fire Department, have been alleviated.

Nevertheless, Orr did not recommend any changes in using the \$23.6 million contingency fund that is part of the budget.

He indicated that assessed values of property within the county have "resume[d] a more steady increase" and no new budget problems have surfaced.

"... at this early stage, I recommend continuing to

monitor those budget units and deferring action to address those matters until later in the fiscal year," Orr said in his cover memorandum.

He plans to submit a mid-year report to the board in early February.

The financial status is also demonstrating improvement. California's economic growth propelled revenues higher in September, while spending remained in check, according to the State Controller's latest cash report.

Total revenues in September reached \$9.8 billion and beat forecasts contained in the 2014-15 Budget Act by \$671 million, or 7.4 percent. All of the major revenue generators — personal income, corporate income and retail sales taxes — surpassed expectations. In addition, total disbursements fell below the Department of Finance projections in September by \$156 million, or 1.1 percent.



GSOB GROWTH AND RESPONSE ...

A meeting last week of interested parties on the Gold-spotted oak borer provides a good moment to take stock of where we are in relation to this destructive pest.

The GSOB is an invasive insect brought to San Diego County around 2004 and since then has devastated the oak trees of many San Diego communities. Traveling mainly in firewood, GSOB was found in Idyllwild by the sharp eyes of Cal Fire's Kathleen Edwards in 2012. Since then various groups and people have acted to stop the spread before it reaches outbreak proportions in the San Jacintos.

Kevin Turner and Tom Scott of University of California, Riverside, Gregg Bratcher of Cal Fire, Edwina Scott of the Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council, and many volunteers have all worked together to contain the spread. The latest number of identified oak trees infested with the insect in Idyllwild and Pine Cove is 53, an encouraging number.

It is likely that most of the trees identified do not represent recent spreading, but rather trees that have been infested from the first years of entry in the community. Put another way, we are not seeing a dramatic spike with this number, as one would see in an epidemic, but a modest upward slope, meaning it is spreading but not very fast.

What we need to contain the beetle and protect our oaks is to continue identifying and removing infected trees. A single tree can act in spring as a veritable GSOB factory, throwing as many as 8,000 insects into the surrounding area. Anyone who owns oaks or who regularly walks the neighborhoods can be a very helpful part of the early identification process. If you see a black oak that is keeping its leaves longer than others, and the leaves are crinkly and brown rather than full and yellow, please call the hotline (951-659-8328) to have people look at it.

No tree can be removed without the owner's permission, but we hope people understand that if you do have an infested tree, the best thing to do for all the oak trees around it is to have it removed.

One team that has been regularly searching for GSOB comprises Doris Lombard, Ron Perry and Elliott Taylor. Since the team was challenged to describe precise locations, Ron found a program that allows the team to take a picture of the tree with an iPad, allowing the picture and its GPS coordinates to be sent immediately to Kevin at UCR. You can imagine what an advance this was. Also helping in this mapping effort is Dan Dever, another skilled volunteer who maintains a data base of trees at the MCFSC.

At this point we need more volunteers to search for infested trees (call 951-659-6208), and we need more calls from the community to help spot them (call the hotline). We also need people to be extremely cautious about buying firewood, and we suggest no one buy firewood from off the Hill. If you have firewood you are unsure of, make sure you burn it this winter so GSOB can't fly in the spring.

Moving forward from this meeting, Edwina will host a meeting of the volunteers to share best practices, and she will organize another public meeting in the spring. At that time we hope we will have more guidance from researchers on using pesticides for tree protection, which at this time is promising but not conclusive.

Covered California renewal period open

Improved open enrollment begins Nov. 15

The renewal process for 1.12 million individuals who enrolled in Covered California health-care plans last year has begun. Open enrollment is the next opportunity for all Californians to benefit from new insurance rules, including the requirement that insurance be offered regardless of health status.

The open enrollment period begins Nov. 15 and will con-

tinue through Feb. 15. In addition, this is the window of time when Californians can buy subsidized coverage starting in 2015.

After one season of being open, Covered California is prepared to improve and eliminate many problems and frustrations the public encountered last year. Substantial new improvements to facilitate enrollment in coverage for 2015 will be inaugurated this month.

The first wave of renewal notices was sent to consumers in October. Individuals who complete the renewal process will hear from their insurance plans in December. Their selected health plan will send a statement reflecting coverage starting Jan. 1, 2015. Consumers who take no action will be renewed into their existing plan.

Individuals who have health coverage through Medi-Cal will renew their coverage throughout the year on a rolling monthly schedule. Medi-Cal will contact them directly if they need to take action. Unless they are contacted by Medi-Cal, these individuals do not need to go to the Covered California website to renew or apply.

As of Oct. 16, a total of 1.12 million individuals had effectuated coverage and will be part of the renewal process. CoveredCA expects this number to increase as special enrollment continues and as recent enrollees effectuate their coverage, with about 1.3 million Californians participating in the renewal process through the end of the year.

After last year's enrollment period, CoveredCA evaluated its performance and, based on its report, will implement several changes to improve and simplify the public ability to enroll and choose an appropriate health plan.

"We know this open-enrollment period will be more challenging in some ways. Consumers will only have three months to enroll, compared with the six months they had last time. This is complicated by our knowledge that many who are uninsured have adapted to a culture of coping and have become accustomed to living without health insurance," said CoveredCA Executive Director Peter V. Lee.

Among the changes will be the number of Service Center representatives available to help. More than 1,300 representatives will help consumers over the phone, by chat or by processing their paper applications or documents. This is more than double the number of Service Center representatives — state employed and contractors — available at the end of the 2014 enrollment period.

With less than one month before open enrollment be-

gins, consumers can begin shopping for 2015 coverage. They can find out if they are eligible for financial assistance and find out how much a health plan will cost them, by using Covered California's Shop and Compare Tool (on CoveredCA.com at www.CoveredCA.com/shopandcompare/#calculator). CoveredCA also offers a full listing of the plans and their rates in the booklet "Health Insurance Companies and Plan Rates for 2015" (online at www.CoveredCA.com/PDFs/CC-health-plans-booklet-2015.pdf).

This year CoveredCA will have 254 Service Center representatives able to serve consumers in languages other than English, compared with 55 during open enrollment in 2013.

Service Center hours — including phone service and online chat — have been expanded to accommodate consumers after hours, with representatives now available from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday. In addition, the Service Center will be open on many Sundays during open enrollment, including every Sunday from Nov. 16 through Dec. 14.

CoveredCA is working with health plans to make it possible for consumers to make their first premium payment online as soon as they have selected a plan. This is intended to give consumers peace of mind that they have evidence that their payment has been received and they will have coverage in place.

Dr. Peter Bryant offers a spider show-and-tell

Dr. Peter Bryant, research professor, School of Biological Sciences, University of California, Irvine, is the next guest speaker in the Idyllwild Community Center's Speaker Series, and he is fond of and a great admirer of spiders, both for their building skills and their usefulness within terrestrial food webs.

He noted that spiders are efficient controllers of insects, many of which are agricultural pests. "They are also an important food source for birds, lizards, wasps and other animals. Silk made by spiders is also used by many birds for nest building," he said. Asked why he chose as his topic spiders, about which many people have instinctive fears and aversion, he said, "Because it was Halloween." Bryant will speak at Silver Pines Lodge at 6 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 13. There is a wine and cheese bar at 5:30 p.m. Both are free to the public.

Bryant, whose inter-

ests include biodiversity and conversation, has photographed and catalogued the spiders of Orange County. The variations in appearance, habits and differing skills of the spiders in his study are, according to Bryant, part of what makes them so interesting. He notes that spiders build webs to serve specific purposes, in many different patterns and in a variety of locations, including underwater.

"The [spider] silk comes in many different forms, and some spiders can make up to eight different kinds of the protein," he said. "The silks are used in building orb webs, funnel webs, tangle webs, tubular webs, sheet webs, dome webs and fishing nets. Most of the time it is used to trap prey, but some forms of silk are used to wrap prey, to make egg cases, to make parachutes and to line burrows." He pointed out that the tensile strength of spider silk is stronger than steel and is considered one of the strongest materials in the world. In web building,

the spider spins different silk for different purposes — sticky silk to trap prey and some that is not sticky for the spider to use to get from one place to another on the web.

"I'll be talking about and showing slides illustrating the beauty, diversity and lives of spiders," he said, "including their bizarre sex lives and mating rituals."

So even if, or especially if, you have arachnophobia, you will be impressed by how very complex and interesting spiders are and perhaps leave Dr. Bryant's talk and slide show with a better appreciation for

these highly evolved animals.

Bryant holds a bachelor of science in zoology from Kings College, University of London, a master of science in biochemistry from University College, University of London and a doctorate in genetics from the University of Sussex, England.

He is a witty and engaging conversationalist and should provide an interesting, informative and educational evening.

Since the program began in 2006, SCAQMD has scrapped more than 10,000 old, polluting leaf blowers, reducing the emission of smog-forming pollutants by 88,282 pounds per year in the southland. Comfort music ...



the James

Idyllwild is set in an ecologically fascinating area. It is a mountain island surrounded by a desert sea. This patchwork of contrasting ecosystems is a window into a rich biodiversity and endemism, life that is unique to a particular place.

Scientists have long recognized the San Jacinto Mountains as a particularly interesting site to study and better understand the natural world through studies on *Drosophila* (fruit fly) evolution to the effects of climate warming.

In 1908, a group of biologists from UC Berkeley surveyed the San Jacinto Mountains. Last year, we just finished a centennial resurvey of the same sites. A century produced many changes in our natural resources, and we'll be writing about these transformations among other topics having to do with the landscape and populations of its natural inhabitants.

The James Reserve is in the backyard of Idyllwild and Pine Cove. It is part of the University of California Natural Reserve System, which consists of 38 other sites spread around California.

At the James San Jacinto Mountains Reserve, researchers and teachers come from all over the world to study this region. In the last few years, the James has hosted a variety of researchers who hail from places such as Minnesota and Germany, and locals from the James

Reserve's home campus, UC Riverside. Their work focuses on studies ranging from hybridization in oaks, small mammal and bird communities to insects.

The James also is the site of the reintroduction of the southern mountain yellow-legged frog (*Rana muscosa*), which has gone extinct locally at the James and in most of Southern California. In this and many other ways, the James Reserve provides a living library and outdoor laboratory for students, researchers and others interested in the environment. As one researcher put it, "Field stations are places where we can read the book of life in the language in which it was written," (James Kirchner, UC

Berkeley professor emeritus).

We hope this column will serve as a window into life at a field station, which itself provides a peek into the natural world that surrounds us and the people who devote their lives to monitoring it, learning how it works, sharing our discoveries and passing this understanding to others. In future columns we invite you to learn more about the James Reserve, your friendly neighbors to the north, and to explore the wonders of our distinctive region with us. Stay tuned.

Steve Moulton likes knowing people

Steve Moulton, long-time Hill resident, likes the lack of anonymity of small-town life. "I like knowing people," he said as he sat at his latest retail outlet, the Cave in Fern Valley Corners. "I'm not a private person. I like the association with others you get up here. You can get a whole lot closer to people, get to know them, and they find they can trust you and can talk with you."

And like many on the Hill, Moulton came from a larger community down from the mountain — in his case, Long Beach where his dad had several gas stations. "I've always loved retail, maybe getting that from my father," he said. He said he first came to appreciate the virtues of small-town living when his parents bought a resort in Clear Lake, California. "I went to high school there," he said. "Knowing everybody, that appealed to me." He was introduced to Idyllwild in 1971 when his sister and brother-in-law held a family reunion here.

Moulton, like Eiler Larsen, Laguna Beach greeter, famous to tourists and locals for many years, is an available friend to all, happy and willing to listen to the stories of those who stop by his shop. Moulton recounts how so many are in the habit of coming to purchase, from Bubba's Books or his collectibles at the Cave, but stay to talk and share their stories, concerns and celebrations. "People in Idyllwild are different," he said, "not so much stuck in the stress-filled 8 to 5 routine of peo-

Moulton, a front porch philosopher, said he thinks it's our circumstances — circumstances of living close to each other where everybody knows everybody. "You go to the post office in the middle of the day and all your neighbors are there."

He noted that he has come to know so many in town through the varied businesses he has had here. First he had a trading card and collectibles shop he said introduced him to so many of the kids in the community and their parents. He also had a paper route for the Press-Enterprise, delivering locally for "1,400 days."

He bought his first cabin, in Pine Cove, 37 years ago and has been a full-time resident of the Hill for more than 22 years. Being available to sit, visit and talk, Moulton probably knows more people on the Hill than most. It's because of that familiarity with the resident population that Moulton worked to vet candidates for the Idyllwild Chamber of Commerce, helping the Chamber run its board of director elections.


Wandering through Bubba's Books, one is struck by the variety of titles, neatly organized according to author and

by the bargain basement prices. "I've always preferred to sell more at less of a price," he said. Moulton said he keeps close track of what his customers like to read and stocks accordingly. At the Cave, collectibles are marked both with price and some appropriate saying. "I like to share my 'writing' and thoughts," he said.

When asked what to him is most special about Idyllwild, he said, "Doug Austin. He is my hero, the most humble and the most caring person I know. He always greets you and makes you smile. He gives so much to the community and yet doesn't want people to know how much he has given."

Like Austin, Moulton gives — both in presence and in presents to the community. Moulton funded the "Girl Reading" metal sculpture, crafted by Dore Capitani that is installed in front of the new Idyllwild Library. The sculpture, initially drawn with help from local artist Jan Jaspers-Fayer, is a tribute to the late Mary Austin, Doug Austin's wife, a lifelong proponent of literacy for children.

Moulton, like Austin, does not trumpet his accomplishments. He is a business administration graduate of Cal State Fullerton, an Army veteran, and a man with a significant corporate career. He

has worked in stock brokerage houses, and has held corporate regional management positions in the auto industry for American Motors and Subaru.

Of his peripatetic career that has honed his people skills, Moulton said, "I've fallen into stuff my whole life. I don't think it was my ability, just a little star [as a guide]."



Why is Stephen Hawking a big deal? ...

During my most recent trip to the movie theater, I saw a preview to a movie soon to make its release in the U.S. called "The Theory of Everything."

The film depicts the relationship between Jane Wilde and theoretical physicist and cosmologist Stephen Hawking, along with his battle with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis. While I imagine the movie will cover some of his contributions to science, I figure, why not cover some of them here just in case. I won't go over any of the awards, recognitions or prizes he has received because I would need three columns for that.

For me, Stephen Hawking has made three significant contributions to science. I'll describe them in no particular order.

Singularity theorems

Hawking, along with his colleague Roger Penrose, proposed that if all matter has fundamental properties then singularities must exist within Einstein's theory of relativity.

A singularity is a region of infinite density with infinite space-time curvature — a place where Einstein's field equations break down. The places where you find a singularity are the centers of black holes.

Hawking realized that when you apply quantum mechanics to the event horizon of a black hole, you get particles and anti-particles coming into existence. The particle escapes while the anti-particle goes into the black hole creating what is known as Hawking radiation.

If you are curious to learn more about the specifics of Hawking radiation, feel free to look up the bet he made with Stanford University physicist Leonard Susskind on the behavior of black holes.

Wave function of the universe

In quantum mechanics, everything is described by wave functions. The quantum world is weird to us because you don't have a definite state or complete certainty, just a range of probabilities. Hawking extended and applied this probable degree of certainty to the universe itself.

Hawking proposed that as you go back in time you get to a point where time and space, and thus the universe itself, close off into a state of no-boundary. In other words, you get to a state where there is nothing and everything at once. There is no before and no after and there is no here and no there. So asking, "What happened before the Big Bang?" would be akin to asking, "Where is the edge of the Earth?"

The no-boundary universe is similar to the geometry of a surface of a sphere except it has four dimensions instead of two. A cause to the universe would require a before and after as well as a before and after to the cause of the cause and so on forever.

If you are curious to learn more, check out his book "Euclidean Quantum Gravity."

The Idyllwild grinding facility will be closed Saturdays from Dec. 6 through May 1. It is currently open on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. through Nov. 29.

The grinding facility accepts residential green waste, logs, brush, trees, pine needles and woody waste affected by the bark beetle. and most scientists attribute that to a positive cosmological constant known today as Dark Energy.

What Hawking proposes is that you can get the same accelerating effect from a negative cosmological constant. If this constant, known as Dark Energy (which makes up about 70 percent of the universe), does not slow down, everything will disappear. Savage introduces 'Ramona' to 21st century

Revised version premieres later this month

The iconic "Ramona" pageant has been re-written. Local resident Stephen Savage, who assumed the role of executive creative director for Hemet's Ramona Bowl Amphitheatre in June, has revised the historic script, submitted it to the state, scheduled a premiere reading, and maintains the pageant's unique place in the state as "The California State Outdoor Play."

The new Ramona pageant

will have its first public performance in a reading Saturday, Nov. 22, at the Wells Fargo Theatre at Autry National Center in Los Angeles. Savage's version is about two hours and 10 minutes, nearly an hour shorter than the original.

"The story is the same, the same beginning, but more true to the novel than the old play," Savage said. Ramona will maintain the spotlight, while more action and gunfire are introduced on stage.

Although Savage will not direct the play, he is very excited about its premiere and described the effort as "harder than writing a screen play."

"It still tells the story of Ramona and Alessan-

script read later this month.

Many familiar actors will participate in the Nov. 22 reading. Besides Bedard, Jim Beaver of "Deadwood," "Breaking Bad" and "Longmire," will be on stage. Joining him will be Idyllwild's Conor O'Farrell. Other well-known performers include Wolfgang Bodison, Oscar Toree and Chuti Tiu.

That evening, Savage plans to announce the next actress to play Ramona. Rehearsals for the 92nd season of "Ramona" begin in February. The 2015 season opens April 18.

Idyllwild Film Fest

Meanwhile, Savage continues to oversee the Idyllwild International Festival of Cinema. The sixth festival opens Jan. 6, 2015.

"In January, the Idyllwild Film Fest will be huge. We've had twice as many films already submitted for review," Savage said.

Every submission is reviewed online this year, he added.

Plans are developing for more venues in 2016, according to Savage. With six venues, the festival will be able to accommodate and offer more than 200 movies and may expand to eight days.

Obituary Paul Oscar Arnson 1928-2014

Paul Arnson passed away peacefully with his family by his side at home Friday, Oct. 31, in San Diego.



Paul was born March 10, 1928 in a one-room log cabin on a 160-acre farm that was homesteaded by his grandparents in Northeastern Wisconsin. He spent the early years of his life living without electricity and walking 4 miles each way to the only schoolhouse in the area located outside of Washburn, Wisconsin.

Upon graduating from high school, Paul spent two years driving heavy equipment for the United States Air Force, then returned back to the farm to continue that trade for the Bayfield County Road Department.

Shortly thereafter, he married Muriel Virginia Olson and re-located to Northern Minnesota to take advantage of the massive taconite mining boom that was sweeping across the Iron Range of the Midwest. He became

an electrician with Erie Mining Company, working on the electrical motors that powered up the largest heavy equipment in the world at that time.

He settled in the town of Hoyt Lakes, Minnesota, and it was there he spent the next 30 years of his life honing his skills as a husband, a father and a true outdoorsman. Whether it was a day off in between shifts, or a two-week vacation, Paul had his family by his side on an outdoor adventure. He led many canoe trips into the untamed lands of Northern Ontario, Canada, catching 25-pound lake trout, and eventually made his way into the Eastern Sierras catching 10-inch golden trout — the emphasis always being on the experience and not the size.

He was considered by many to be one of the greatest fly fishermen to ever cast a line, and was always willing to share his expertise and knowledge with anyone who showed interest in what he referred to as a "Gentleman's Sport."

The months of fall were his favorite time of year, as it meant the steelhead were running in the Brule River in

Wisconsin, which then led to the chasing of the elusive white tail deer of Northern Minnesota.

As the winter months set in, his indoor activities included building custom fly rods, fly tying and, of course, bowling, of which he was the first to roll a perfect game at the North Star Lanes in 1972.

Paul never had a complaint or critique of anyone or anything. He loved his community, his work and most of all, he loved his family.

The world benefited from his existence. He will be missed by many, but those benefits will live on.

He is survived by sons Lee of Idyllwild, and Paul (Melissa) of San Diego; four granddaughters, Riley, Brooke, Kate and Shelby; brother Larry; and sister Kathleen. He was preceded in death by parents Elsie and Oscar, wife Muriel and partner Elaine, sisters Mary Ellen and Audrey, and brother Tom.
