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after the meeting. "This will be a true team effort pulling from many agencies." And in his message to MHRC, he stressed the same points, "The agreement is well written and will be a true benefit to our mountain range."

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During discussion of the proposed agreement, Commissioner Rhonda Andrewson reminded Reitz and her colleagues that they have had the draft agreement to review

since March. Although Buchanan expressed concerns similar to Reitz on the use of the courts rather than mediators to resolve differences, he acknowledged that a joint committee would monitor the agreement and "... we both can pull out with a 90-day notice ... so I'm prepared to move ahead with the agreement."

The initial agreement is for 12 months, but can be renewed, according to its terms.

Idyllwild Fire Department and MHRC will form a committee to oversee the station operation, which must meet Federal Communication Commission guidelines.

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"I have no idea what this issue is they're looking at, but we intend to comply," he said.

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Three-car crash injures several

Emergency personnel responded to a three-vehicle traffic collision just after 2:15 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 19, on Highway 74 north of Vista Point.

Michael Kaplan, 54, of La Jolla, driving a Dodge Avenger westbound, attempted to pass — over double-yellow lines — Michael Rein, 69, of Idyllwild, driving a Subaru Forester, according to California Highway Patrol's Indio office.

Angel Vasquez, 19, of Desert Hot Springs, driving a Chevy pickup, collided with the Avenger. His passenger, Roman Moran, 36, of Indio, suffered major injuries. Kaplan also suffered major injuries, according to CHP.

However, Riverside County Fire re-

sponded to the crash and its report differed in that injured patients transported consisted of one major, one moderate and two minor. Mercy Air transported the critically injured patient and ground ambulances transported the other three to an area hospital.

In another collision last Sunday at 3:45 p.m. on Highway 74 west of Devil's Ladder Road, Jenise Murasko of Idyllwild, driving a 1998 Mazda 66, collided with Aaron Cook of Blockton, Iowa, driving a 2008 Chrysler 300, according to CHP Public Information Officer Darren Meyer. Meyer said the vehicles sustained moderate damage but no one was injured, and no cause was given in the report.

Man convicted of offensive touching

A man arrested in front of Cafe Aroma earlier this year with a first charge of inflicting corporal injury on a spouse has been convicted of a lesser charge of "offensive touching only," a misdemeanor under Penal Code section 242, according to Riverside County Superior Court records.

Felipe DeJesus Rubio Gomez, also known as Felipe DeJesus Rubio, 23, in a

plea bargain, pleaded guilty to the lesser charge on Nov. 25 and waived a right to a jury trial. He was sentenced to 40 days in jail with 12 days already served and the final 28 to be served in the Work Release Program. He also must donate 20 hours of community service and was given 36 months probation.

Along with fines amounting to about \$350, he must enroll in a 52-week domestic violence program. The victim also received a criminal protective order for three years.

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District Attorney unhappy with passage of Proposition 47

On Nov. 4, California voters approved Proposition 47, which reduces certain non-serious and non-violent property and drug offenses from felonies to misdemeanors. The measure also allows certain offenders who have been previously convicted of such crimes to apply for reduced sentences.

The anticipated long-term result would lessen prison overcrowding. Proponents argued that, if enacted, the population of inmates in the state prison system and county jails would be reduced; thus saving money and ensuring capacity for violent and serious offenders.

Already, the state's Legislative Analyst's Office has built these changes into its assumption for future budgets and state spending. In its latest fiscal report, the LAO stated, "These changes will reduce state prison population and associated costs by (1) making fewer offenders eligible for prison and (2) releasing certain offenders currently in prison as a result of being re-sentenced. Accordingly, our estimates above assume that Proposition 47 will reduce the prison population by several thousand inmates — resulting in savings of more than a couple hundred million dollars annually beginning in 2015-16."

While the state budget may benefit from implementing Prop 47, career criminal justice officials are less sanguine of its general long-term effects and specifically on local government finances.

Riverside County District Attorney Paul Zellerbach, who opposed Prop 47, said, "It will exacerbate an already bad situation because of the jail overcrowding which already exists in Riverside County."

Individuals, who would have been convicted of felonies, will receive misdemeanor sentences, which can shift them from state prisons to county jails, although for shorter time periods. More than 500 prison inmates are eligible to have convictions reduced to misdemeanors and then moved to county jail.

In Zellerbach's 37 years as part of the criminal justice system, his experience is that most offenders commit multiple crimes and "drug and theft offenders

are repeat offenders and will re-cycle through the system."

Riverside County started implementing Prop 47 the day after the election, Zellerbach stated. Already, offenders no longer being charged as felonies are refusing to accept the counseling and other help programs that previously would have been required.

"There is no room for monitoring and ... criminals will be released within days," Zellerbach stated.

Within the criminal justice system, the probation departments are responsible for helping prisoners and offenders try to return to normality. The director of Riverside County's Probation Department, Mark Hake, said he and his staff have been formulating plans for Prop 47's implementation.

Currently, his 19 field offices and 300 probation officers have more than 16,000 adult felons to supervise and monitor in Riverside County. About 3,600 adult offenders may be eligible for reduced sentences, according to Hake, and nearly 500 have been assessed as high-risk offenders.

Somewhat of an echo of Zellerbach, Hake said,

"Just because a felony is now a misdemeanor, it doesn't change who the offender is." He estimated that of the 3,600 eligible for case review, they have had 8,700 separate arrests.

Probation will continue to assess the risk of each to repeat. Hake's strategy is to "still supervise the high-risk offenders. They will need direction, intervention services, and held accountable and compliant with court."

Historically, there was little to minimal supervision of misdemeanants. But Hake's staff is developing a profile to identify the future high-risk, but misdemeanor, offenders. Eventually this will lead to discussions with the courts, but no clear policies have been formulated.

"It's an abysmal future realistically," he opined. "I feel ham-strung. There's no discretion to operate within this law."

"This is a grave concern to district attorneys throughout California," Zellerbach declared.

County continues to monitor subsurface hydrocarbons

Riverside County continues to monitor a possible underground fuel leak in Idyllwild. R.M. Environmental Inc. of Calimesa, conducting the monitoring work, just completed the third-quarter sampling report.

In addition, RME has submitted a work plan to

install two more monitoring wells that will be sampled and monitored on a quarterly basis for the next 12 months. Both will be installed slightly west of the Ferrellgas office next to Muirs Realty.

RME is also planning to conduct a soil vapor extraction pilot test. This work, along with data from the two new monitoring wells, will be

used to determine recommendations for future remediation if it is warranted, the report stated.

Since the June sampling, total hydrocarbon concentrations increased in four of the monitoring wells but decreased slightly in four other monitoring wells, according to the RME October report.

Methyl-tertiary-butyl

ether continued to be detected in the site's monitoring wells. MTBE concentrations in five of the wells sampled resulted in the highest recordings since June 2013. But it remained undetected in several more wells. Benzene concentrations increased in one well, but decreased in two wells.

Win or lose, this new grand jury action may cost mountain taxpayers another thousands in attorney fees based upon last year's investigation alone. Enough of this crap.

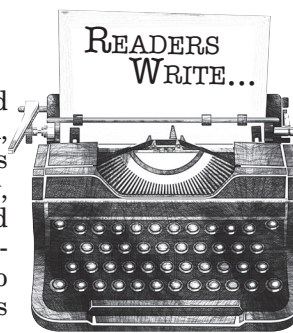

Have you done a study on side effects, such as flooding, land-slides or erosion damage caused by clearings?

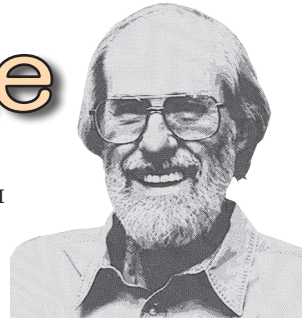

Before Our Time

CHURCHES EVENTUALLY BECOME PART OF IDYLLWILD ...

Amid a profusion of religious ceremony during the Christmas season, it may come as a surprise that throughout its first half-century, Idyllwild had not a single church.

There was simply no population base to support a church organization. Despite its 1920s boom, the village remained a summer colony. The 1930 census lists barely three dozen claiming Idyllwild as primary residence.

Idyllwild was a company town — essentially all businesses were subsidiaries of Idyllwild Inc. — so its boss, devout Methodist Claudius Lee Emerson, engaged ministers and

sponsored Sunday services.

Enhanced by a folding pump organ, they were held in the natural tree-shaded bowl below today's markets and post office, amid lush marsh grass and ferns beside Strawberry Creek

The first summer minister in the early 1920s, Louise Cole later recalled, tented with his large family on Strawberry Creek at an abandoned sawmill site totally lacking in amenities. Such deprivation led in 1925 to construction of the manse that stills stands on North Circle Drive as housing.

Emerson's bankruptcy and departure in

1936 left an untimely void just as Idyllwild's year-round population was beginning to grow. It was the Catholics who responded first.

A 1942 visit to Idyllwild inspired Fr. Malachy O'Sullivan, pastor of St. Anthony's in San Jacinto, to arrange the purchase of an old cabin to serve as a chapel. His proposed "Our Lady of the Pines" parish was renamed Queen of Angels by the Bishop of San Diego, but the church was a reality by summer's end.

In 1944, the 10-family parish lost its home to heavy snow, which caved in the roof, and wartime materials shortages pre-

cluded rebuilding. So the congregation began meeting at the Rustic Theatre, then housed in what's now Silver Pines Lodge until 1947, when they occupied the present Catholic church.

Meanwhile, in 1946 Protestants organized Community Presbyterian Church under the temporary ministry of Hugo Fulton and crowded into the manse for services.

Its lay leadership soon filled with Idyllwild household names like Humber, Casebeer, Kretsinger, Belden, Null, Boss, McCaghren and

Bischoff. The church building took three years to complete between 1950 and 1953, although services were held in the basement by 1951.

A local Christian Science Society formed in 1949 and began meeting midweek at Desert Sun School, where their faith was shared by founders Edith and Richard Elliott, and Sundays at the Rustic or Town Hall. They eventually acquired a nursery plot across the street, where their church was completed in 1957.

Idyllwild's church options began broadening in the late 1950s as the population more than tripled from its 604 at midcentury. An Episcopalian "cottage meeting" started using the Presbyterian manse

in 1955. Dr. Muriel Haskell's short-lived Center of Creative Living at the Four Chimneys complex on Delano Road launched public services in 1957. In the 1960s, its metaphysical niche was filled by Science of Mind and a branch of the Holy Superet Light Church out of Los Angeles. And more familiar names like Bible Church and Chapel in the Pines appeared.

Idyllwild was growing up, well on its way toward today's multicolored church scene.

MANY THANKS TO BOARDS ...

Recently, as a board was wrapping up business for the year, I felt a deep appreciation for everyone at the table. They are all volunteers, donating their time and energy to make sure the organization is on the right track.

They ensure that policies are consistent with the mission, and that budgets and balance sheets are carefully watched. They make sure they understand basic activities, offer feedback or encouragement when they think it necessary, and just generally bring their focus and attention on a regular basis to the business. They take responsibility for its oversight, which is quite a gift.

I have the honor of serving on two boards, the Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council and the Pine Cove Water District. MCFSC is a private, nonprofit corporation, while PCWD is a limited-purpose government agency under California's special district law.

The meetings have a different tone since the state's Brown Act binds PCWD but not MCFSC. Brown Act observance gives a more formal feel to the proceedings, but much of what happens is similar. The most basic activity is that the executive director or general manager reports to the board on activities, expenditures and plans. Board members listen, ask questions, make comments, and accept or reject the reports.

The key balancing act for boards is to offer effective oversight and policy direction to management, but leave the actual work of management to them. Board members are sometimes tempted to take active roles in daily activities, and it never works out well when it happens. Experienced boards hold managers accountable but support their role as managers with the authority to lead the staff in daily operations.

Of course, one of the key responsibilities of boards is to make sure the top manager is good

It is why Hemet teachers are angry. I certainly am.

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Medical discount cards ...

On Sept. 12, the Federal Trade Commission took action against "Partners in Health Care" for tricking people, especially Spanish-speaking individuals, into buying worthless medical discount cards. Telemarketers misled people by representing that they offered qualified health plans under the Affordable Care Act and that the insurance purchased would pay for a variety of medical services, including doctor and emergency room visits. Enrollment fees and monthly pay-

ments ranging from \$99 to several hundred dollars were collected for the bogus medical insurance.

AFD Medical was banned forever by the FTC from selling any health care or discount programs after the FTC found it pushed \$299 prescription discount cards on the elderly. Telemarketers also represented that the cards were necessary for the person to continue receiving Medicare, Social Security or other health insurance benefits.

Prior to purchasing health insurance, check with naic.org or consumeraction.gov to verify that the seller is licensed in your state of residence and to verify the legitimacy of the plan being offered.

at their job, and both my boards are lucky to have excellent managers who are great to work with: Edwina Scott, the executive director of MCFSC, and Jerry Holldber, general manager of PCWD.

A good board meeting involves good reports, good listening and respect for everyone at the table. Board members are generally older, often retired, and their age has given them rich experience that can be very useful to the organization. Everyone brings something different, and it is often a pleasure when someone brings up some useful and germane piece of information no one else knew.

The biggest issue all board members need to learn is that the board can only act as a whole and must speak with one voice. No board member has any self-designated powers; all decisions

must be made by a vote of the board.

So another balancing act is each person bringing their own knowledge and experience to the board yet accepting that finally the decisions must be made by the group as a whole. Good decisions and good discussions involve individuals asserting their views but aiming toward shared understanding and unified action.

Of course, it can go the other way, with long-term feuds and constant distrust. The PCWD board attended governance training in the fall and probably the thing that affected us most were the stories of other attendees who sit on truly dysfunctional boards. We came away thinking we were pretty fortunate.

So here is to all the directors sitting on governing boards of organizations. Thank you all for your valuable contributions to making our organizations work.

addressed this use.

In a July 2013 rulemaking, the FCC stated, "We find that allowing routine [travel information systems] broadcast during non-emergency periods of terrorist threat levels, public health alerts, emergency preparedness messages, conservation messages and the like, is not in the public interest, as such routine broadcasts also would dilute situational awareness pertinent to the traveling motorist. The primary purpose of the TIS is to assist motorists in the process of traveling and to provide emergency and imminent threat information in covered areas. Therefore, we will continue to disallow messages that do not have a travel nexus, are not emergency-related, or do not relate directly to an imminent threat because such messages would dilute the convenience and efficacy of TIS."

"It the duty of the licensee holder to follow the FCC direction," stated Buchanan. "And if something is in violation, the rest of the agreement stands."

Commissioner Larry Donahoo urged the joint committee to meet regularly and suggested a report after the first 90 days to be sure all are satisfied with progress.

The agreement speci-

fies that during emergencies, MHRC "shall use best efforts that WNKI will broadcast 24 hours a day, seven days a week ..."

MHRC has prepared a plan to expand the area covered by WNKI's signal. Funding for this effort and other proposals to install modern and state-of-the-art equipment will be financed with grants, donations and arrangement with other public agencies.

One issue that will be addressed after the agreement is signed is the status of "all funds [IFPD] held on account of WNKI, along with all outstanding obligations, including actual and contingent." IFPD has 20 business days to provide this information to MHRC and it has 60 business days to accept to take exception to the accounting.

Once mutual agreement has been reached, MHRC will maintain the financial responsibility for WNKI.

No plans for replacing him were announced but Calvin Gogerty is the current alternate for Davis. Susan Weisbart is the other citizen committee member.

Another civilian also had to relinquish their IFPD role. Paul Riggi, vice president of Volunteer Company 621, announced that Ruth Wick had to resign as president of the company and he would assume the role until the annual June election.

But Fire Chief Patrick Reitz did announce the promotion of three reserves — Eddie Apodaca, Robert Clark and James LaMont — to firefighters

and paramedics.

Also during the meeting, the IFPD commission approved a patient outcome form that has been on its agenda for several years. In the future, this customer comment form will be mailed to recipients of IFPD's emergency medical service.

The idea has been percolating with the board ever since former Commissioner Dr. Charles "Chip" Schelly suggested one in June 2012. After he left the commission, a committee composed of commissioners Jeannine Charles-Stiggall and Nancy Layton was formed to bring a final proposal forward, which happened last week.

The one-page ques-

tionnaire will be mailed to patients, with a self-addressed, stamped reply envelope. The draft asked five questions about the quality of emergency medical service they received. For example, "Were our personnel polite and courteous?" and "Did we answer all of your questions so you understood your options?"

However, Commissioner Rhonda Andrewson objected to all the questions except the general comment, "Were you satisfied overall with the service you received from IFPD?" She felt the others encouraged negative assessments, especially since a medical emergency is a stressful situation

in which memories are notoriously poor during these events.

"If they have no medical or EMT training, what does the public know except [the IFPD crew] expeditiously took care of the family member?" she asked about the other questions.

After discussion, the commission approved the assessment 3-1, with Andrewson opposed and Layton absent. The major change was to move the general question, which was last to first.

After the vote, Buchanan said, "We'll test this and see how it goes."

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Richard Schnetzer, Fern Valley Water's new director

Editor's note: At its Oct. 17 meeting, the Fern Valley Water District Board of Directors chose Richard Schnetzer as director following the resignation of Ron Korman in June. On Nov. 26, Schnetzer visited the Town Crier office. The ensuing discussion is the basis of this story that introduces him to the whole community.

While Schnetzer is not a lifetime Fern Valley customer, he is proud of his new role and responsibility. "I've toured the district with General Manager Steve Erler," he said. "It's pretty impressive; small but mighty."

Schnetzer was born and grew up in New Jersey. He graduated from Antioch College in Ohio. Work-study assignments through the school led him to California.

Setting the stage for his eventual career in education were two personal events. While experimenting with homemade fireworks, Schnetzer had an accident that cost him his left eye. Ironically, and firstly, his mother was legally blind.

This personal experience led him toward education and particularly with children who had disabilities. Eventually he joined the faculty at the Mardan Center of Educational Therapy, a private nonprofit school in Orange County. The center offers elementary and secondary pro-

grams for both regular and special education students.

His work also involved him with other schools and that inspired his desire to open his own consulting business. He founded the Institute for Effective Education and has been its president since 1988.

As part of this work, he became involved in lobbying Sacramento for resources and legislation to improve these programs. Today, while retired from daily work, he continues to transact some monthly business in the state capitol for the California Association of Private Special Education Schools.

"I advised school management on compliance with state and local laws. Now I'm part-time and still a registered lobbyist," Schnetzer said.

Despite a busy and hefty career, he is not a recent Idyllwild resident. He first visited the Hill in 1968 during a staff retreat and has been returning regularly. Nearly 10 years ago, he and his wife Pat bought property here and began the part-time resident life. In 2012, after retiring, they chose to become full-time residents.

Pat has been very active with the Mountain Disaster Preparedness group. Since the early fall of 2013, MDP has focused attention on gaining a bond with the Riverside Red Cross Chapter. Pat Schnetzer, a former registered nurse, headed the effort to find and train Red Cross volunteers. Her success in recruiting more than 40 local volunteers resulted in recognition from the regional Red Cross.

Since his wife is very involved in community groups, upon Schnetzer seeing the availability of a vacancy on the FVWD board, he and Pat discussed this opportunity for him to get involved with Hill activities. In September, he submitted his letter of interest to the water district.

He was one of three people expressing their interest in filling the vacancy. At the October meeting, the board unanimously chose Schnetzer. "I was pleasantly surprised," he acknowledged.

Although he is not a water professional, Schnetzer has been an active follower of water issues nationally and in the state. Also, throughout his career, he has been involved with public and private boards and understands how they function and the information they need to make good decisions.

"The issues are not different for any other district," he said. "What is the same is there enough water and its quality."

Schnetzer recognizes FVWD's dependence on stream

flow and is concerned about the continuing drought. He also recognizes the importance of FVWD's wells as complements and back-up to the stream water.

"We're fortunate to have wells with good flows," he stated. "But how long do we go under this current condition?"

As director, he wants to be a good steward of the district's resources and policies, cognizant of his fiduciary responsibility to the district's constituency, and to help the staff plan for the future. His experience in the nonprofit world makes him acutely aware of the use of grants to sustain organizations. Consequently, he wants to seek out funding sources to enhance FVWD's operations.

"I don't think the public understands how much information is collected on a daily, weekly and monthly basis to provide what we take for granted — that the water out of the tap is good to drink," Schnetzer said.

State Budget continues improving Higher revenue to support school funding

The state's Legislative Analyst's Office issued its forecast on fiscal years 2014-15 and 2015-16 in mid-November. With more than half the current fiscal year remaining, the LAO expects a rosy culmination for the state budget.

"We estimate that 2014-15 General Fund revenues will be about \$2 billion higher than estimated in this year's budget act," the report's authors stated. In addition, the LAO forecasts continuing improvement in the state's fiscal condition for 2015-16, which could end with \$4.2 billion in reserves.

In 2014-15, personal income and corporation tax revenues are the principal source of the greater revenues. Revenue is projected to grow \$5.1 billion this year and an average of more than \$4 billion annually through 2019-20.


With increasing revenues, Proposition 98 mandates increased spending for schools and community colleges in both fiscal years. Prop 98 spending is about 40 percent of the total General Fund expenditures. With these required increases, the LAO estimates minimal additional funds available for other programs.

This year's revenue growth may yield another \$177 million (including property tax growth) for schools and community colleges, but next year the increase could be \$2.3 billion more than the June projections.







The LAO spending projections also assume increased spending for the state's university systems.

Already this fiscal year, the state has transferred nearly \$70 million to the Cal Fire budget for higher-than-anticipated emergency fire costs. The LAO estimate for this year "some additional emergency fire suppression costs due to the continued threat of wildfire for the remainder of 2014-15."

Isis Theatre Company presents an Oscar Wilde holiday

Idyllwild's Isis Theatre Company, now in its 12th season, is presenting "A Wilde Holiday, The Star Child and Other Tales" as its Christmas offering.

Isis President and Founder Suzanne Avalon noted the company is doing something new this year. "I'm excited this year we're offering a production for children and families," she said, referencing the special 2 p.m. matinee on Saturday, Dec. 13. There is also an evening performance on the same day at 7:30 p.m.

"I'm proud we're providing children exposure to such great literature, and raising the bar with what we're doing," she said. Avalon stressed that the production is for all, not just families with children. "With plenty of humor and pathos, the evening promises to inspire adults to appreciate loved ones and children to embrace the magic of theater," she noted.

Wilde's fairy tales, the basis of the Isis production, were published in 1888. They are cautionary stories, designed to teach children the value of selfless giving and rendering kindness to others, especially those in need. Wilde's fairy tales explore the redemptive power of love, and are bound together in this production with original music by Laura Karpman and poems by Willa Cather and Christina Rossetti.

Director Emily Heebner, a veteran of Los Angeles' premiere classical theater, "A Noise Within," explained that Wilde's fairy tales have been adapted for theater by her mentor, friend and longtime Noise Within company member and director Sabin Epstein. Epstein is regarded as one of America's leading stage directors of classical drama. His work also has been seen in productions at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C., the California Institute of the Arts in Valencia and the San Diego Repertory Theatre.

"To know Wilde's fairy tales, to know he wrote them for his children, is endearing," said Heebner. "Micheál Mac Liammóir wrote that Wilde's son Cyril once asked him why he had tears in his eyes when he told the story of the Selfish Giant, and that [Wilde] replied, 'Really beautiful things always make me cry.'" Heebner said that by calling attention to Wilde's work, especially introducing his fairy tales to contemporary children and families, may help his genius to endure.

Zac Johnson lives an inspired life in Idyllwild

Some people are just born to be artists and Zac Johnson is one of those people. Born in Prescott, Arizona, his family moved to Idyllwild when he was very young; too young to have any memories of his birthplace. All of his memories are of Idyllwild and the rich tapestry of friends and experiences indelibly etched into his mind. Zac attended Idyllwild School through the eighth grade and was accepted into Idyllwild Arts Academy where he attended high school.

"Honestly, I think my mother had a master plan all along. She always encouraged me to make art," he recollected, "whatever it was. Anything creative."

According to Zac's Mom, Becky Clark, he was drawing before he was walking or talking.

During his elementary school years, and before the smARTS program existed, there was the GATE program (Gifted and Talented Education), which, in addition to some artistic teaching, included exposure to different ways of thinking. "They would pull us out of class a couple of hours every week ... they had computer games that were meant to exercise parts of your brain, things like that."

In addition to his artistic talent, Zac is a musician; he played the tenor saxophone. "I played a lot of jazz between junior high and high school. In junior high school, I played with the Rockin' Mountain Reeds, which was the brainchild of a couple of local musicians, Phillip Marshazevsky and Zel Lautenbach," Zac said. "They had their own group called Sweetwood and they decided they wanted to get a group of kids together and play jazz, their version of jazz standards."

At IAA, despite his focus on the visual arts, Zac

continued playing music. "When I went to IAA, Marshall Hawkins was my music teacher, so throughout high school I was studying visual arts, studying painting mostly, but doing the whole curriculum," Zac recalled. "On the side, I was taking jazz classes from Marshall, so Marshall has always been a mentor to me." The positive impact of studying at IAA has had a lasting effect on Zac's life. "It's a really amazing environment for artistic kids to grow and be in that community; it is a really close group of kids. It influences

the way you think; a lot of the classes are geared toward different types of thinking," Zac said. "I keep in touch with a lot of the students from IAA and they are really incredibly bright

people. A funny thing that I noticed, which happens a lot, is that they may have studied creative writing at IAA but now they are visual artists. One was in theater and now she plans and designs weddings. There is some crossover. I think it is a testament to the idea that it teaches you to think, to question your surroundings."

After high school Zac received a full scholarship to the Kansas City Art Institute. "When I went to apply to colleges, Kansas City was on my list but it wasn't in the top three or anything. Basically, they would interview applicants around the country and they would pick 10 of them and they would do an all-expenses paid trip to Kansas City; the college would pay for everything," Zac explained. "While you were there you took classes for a week and at the end you were interviewed so you brought your artwork with you, slides and everything. Then they would choose two of those students out of 10 to receive a full scholarship." Zac was one of the two. And while he would have preferred to have attended Cooper

Union in New York, Zac would meet his future wife, Mandy, at Kansas City.

After graduation, Zac and Mandy married and had two children, Carter and Evey. With a family to support, Zac joined the Navy in 2008. "It was a steady paycheck and it was fear and despair at the same time. I needed a job, I had kids, I couldn't afford health insurance, so there were all of those factors, but then there was another side of it; this was something terrifying and new and I had no idea what was going to happen," he said. "I can only learn and grow from it."

Art had been absent from Zac's life for quite some time and after a few years he realized that he missed the creative process. "I realized that I was already making a paycheck, I didn't have to worry about supporting myself, so I thought, 'I'm going to get back into the process,' so I did. I started drawing and painting again and it still sucked," he said shaking his head. "It was like I couldn't complete a body of work; I wouldn't allow myself to complete anything." Then, one of Zac's bosses found out he had an art degree which changed everything. "One of my bosses asked me to do a mural. I said, 'What's the criteria,' and he said, 'There is no criteria. You've got this whole room. Paint whatever you want and take as long as you want to do it.' I was basically getting paid a government salary to create art for the first time." The

result was a 16-foot-wide avionics-inspired mural with the goal of reminding the maintenance crew, who are removed from the flight line, how important their jobs are. It took Zac four months to complete, and after that, it was a domino effect. "People found out about it and they started asking for these other projects."

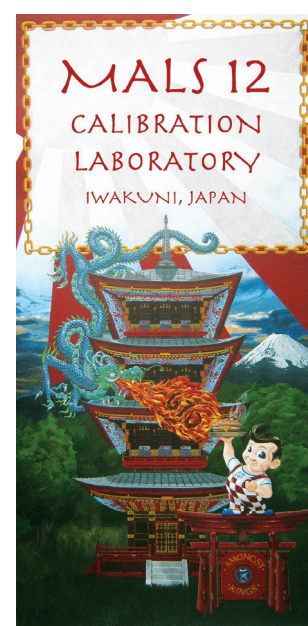
In Iwakuni, Japan, where Zac was stationed, he did several murals, one of which was 3D. "When I went to Iwakuni, [it was the] same thing. I didn't tell anyone that I was an artist but they found out and they asked me to do a work that kind of represented how strange a group we were out in Japan," he said laughing. "Each person threw out an idea. In the end, I had all of these random ideas and I just mashed them together. Somebody wanted a dragon, someone wanted Mt. Fuji, someone wanted a temple, and someone wanted Bob's Big Boy. It was cool because it was the first time that I didn't have to define my own end point. I could already see the end point — here's what we want, here's the effect we want this art to have."

Also, during his six months in Japan, Zac recorded music to stave off the loneliness of being away from his family. By this time, he had taught himself the guitar and keyboard and his creation, a CD, which he admits is "dark," helped him through his time there.

Zac received new orders bringing him back to

California and an eventual return to the only real home he has ever known, Idyllwild. "We moved 10 times in a span of six years ... We were used to moving around and we knew we could deal with it being in the military, but we also wanted a sense of security and stability," Zac explained. "We were asking ourselves questions like, 'Why are we giving up friends and family to be in a place that we are not familiar with?' When we considered all of the factors, Idyllwild just seemed like the right solution." So the couple purchased a home in Idyllwild and enrolled their children in Idyllwild School, the same school Zac attended as a child. "It's incredible. ... At the Halloween Parade I saw some of my old teachers, and they know my kids, too, so they come up to give me and my kids a hug," he said. "I think that one of the cool things is that it's nice to make a fresh start with people, to have new relationships and to reinvent yourself, but it is also nice to not have to overthink how you're going to present yourself to somebody; these people that I've known my whole life they already know me and they know my origins, so I can approach them without any gap in time. You go up to them and they know you like you saw them yesterday."

With his family settled and secure in Idyllwild, art is again a big part of Zac's life. "When I got back into drawing when I joined the Navy my work really sucked. I kept getting hung

up on the medium and it would take too long. I was using graphite and doing these larger drawings and it would just take forever," he said. "Then I remembered that I really liked charcoal and I just started doing these charcoal drawings and I decided that I wouldn't devote more than a couple of days to each of them." Zac's process includes accompanying poems he writes as he creates his drawings. "I'll draw something for a while and I'll get into it and then I'll take an hour break and write about it a little bit and then go back and forth and back and forth; it's kind of a system of checks and balances. I can go back and critique it based on where I have taken the drawing in shorter steps, so they just kind of play off of one another throughout the process. I'm trying to get a body of work together. When I publish, the image will go next to the poem."

Zac admits that his time away gave him a greater appreciation of his life in Idyllwild. "I knew I would miss it when I left; it is a big part of who I am," he said. "I am used to silent nights and the smell of pine and the privacy of being in the woods with nothing else but nature. I try to get as much of that as I can; it is inspiring and rejuvenating."

Idyllwild Ghost Town's future unclear

For 11 years, Kathy Wilson's Idyllwild Ghost Town has frightened and delighted fans of the phantasmagorical from on and off the Hill. Now, year 12 is in doubt.

Wilson's month-long Halloween attraction, a walk through live action and animatronic spook fest, had firmly established itself as a major audience draw at the Idyllwild Community Center site.

But a change of venue this year, to behind the Rustic Theatre, resulted in fewer attendees. Wilson said the event was still successful in its mission of raising funds for the Idyllwild School PTA, but that attendance was down by about 25 percent. "It was a decent crowd, but not like the past," said Wilson.

She thanked Rustic Theatre owner Shane Stewart for providing a stopgap venue for Ghost Town, after the ICC board decided not to continue to host the event. Chris Trout, ICC spokesperson, explained that growing and expanded use by community residents and groups

of the ICC property, as well as planned community center construction on the site — especially because of the set up and tear down time of the temporary facility and month-long use during good-weather recreational days.

Wilson said she appreciated Stewart offering to host the event this year. "Shane was great," she said, but noted plans for a 2015 Idyllwild Ghost Town are currently on hold.

Wilson said another consideration in whether to continue Ghost Town is that the execution of the event, especially constructing the temporary facility, is time-consuming and work-intensive. "Construction is a great deal of work and often lands on my family and friends, and that is just too much," she explained. "In the past, I've had a crew that was wonderful, but this year I had a new crew and a new location, and it was difficult."

Asked why she does this, when the net profits have gone to worthy causes in town and not to her company,

Wilson said, "I do it for the kids, to see their beaming faces. I do it for the joy of seeing adults and tourists who come out and have no idea our small town can produce something on this scale. I like to stand at the exit door and see their expressions as they come out of the structure."

Wilson said she'd look at options for the future of Idyllwild Ghost Town, including venues where a permanent structure could be built, but at this point she just does not have a plan.

She also is considering a new event aimed more at young teens and young adults, giving them something to plan and execute, but nothing at this point is on the drawing boards.

"It's important to work with the town and be positive," she said.

Wilson stressed she is interested in hearing from the town regarding the future of this event — suggestions and comments. She can be reached at 951-659-3228.

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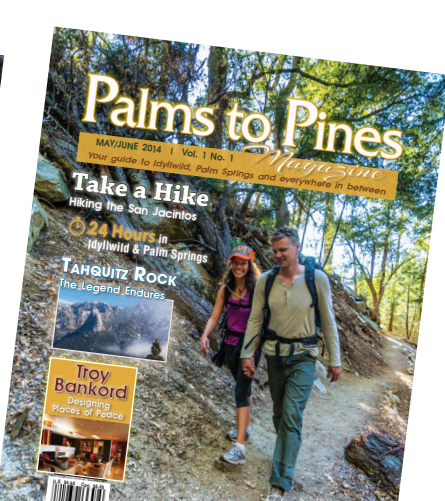
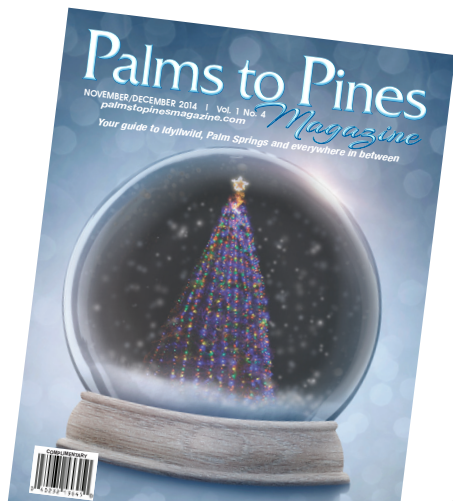
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Three-car crash injures several

Emergency personnel responded to a three-vehicle traffic collision just after 2:15 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 19, on Highway 74 north of Vista Point.

Michael Kaplan, 54, of La Jolla, driving a Dodge Avenger westbound, attempted to pass — over double-yellow lines — Michael Rein, 69, of Idyllwild, driving a Subaru Forester, according to California Highway Patrol's Indio office.

Angel Vasquez, 19, of Desert Hot Springs, driving a Chevy pickup, collided with the Avenger. His passenger, Roman Moran, 36, of Indio, suffered major injuries. Kaplan also suffered major injuries, according to CHP.

However, Riverside County Fire re-

sponded to the crash and its report differed in that injured patients transported consisted of one major, one moderate and two minor. Mercy Air transported the critically injured patient and ground ambulances transported the other three to an area hospital.

In another collision last Sunday at 3:45 p.m. on Highway 74 west of Devil's Ladder Road, Jenise Murasko of Idyllwild, driving a 1998 Mazda 66, collided with Aaron Cook of Blockton, Iowa, driving a 2008 Chrysler 300, according to CHP Public Information Officer Darren Meyer. Meyer said the vehicles sustained moderate damage but no one was injured, and no cause was given in the report.

Man convicted of offensive touching

A man arrested in front of Cafe Aroma earlier this year with a first charge of inflicting corporal injury on a spouse has been convicted of a lesser charge of "offensive touching only," a misdemeanor under Penal Code section 242, according to Riverside County Superior Court records.

Felipe DeJesus Rubio Gomez, also known as Felipe DeJesus Rubio, 23, in a

plea bargain, pleaded guilty to the lesser charge on Nov. 25 and waived a right to a jury trial. He was sentenced to 40 days in jail with 12 days already served and the final 28 to be served in the Work Release Program. He also must donate 20 hours of community service and was given 36 months probation.

Along with fines amounting to about \$350, he must enroll in a 52-week domestic violence program. The victim also received a criminal protective order for three years.

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District Attorney unhappy with passage of Proposition 47

On Nov. 4, California voters approved Proposition 47, which reduces certain non-serious and non-violent property and drug offenses from felonies to misdemeanors. The measure also allows certain offenders who have been previously convicted of such crimes to apply for reduced sentences.

The anticipated long-term result would lessen prison overcrowding. Proponents argued that, if enacted, the population of inmates in the state prison system and county jails would be reduced; thus saving money and ensuring capacity for violent and serious offenders.

Already, the state's Legislative Analyst's Office has built these changes into its assumption for future budgets and state spending. In its latest fiscal report, the LAO stated, "These changes will reduce state prison population and associated costs by (1) making fewer offenders eligible for prison and (2) releasing certain offenders currently in prison as a result of being re-sentenced. Accordingly, our estimates above assume that Proposition 47 will reduce the prison population by several thousand inmates — resulting in savings of more than a couple hundred million dollars annually beginning in 2015-16."

While the state budget may benefit from implementing Prop 47, career criminal justice officials are less sanguine of its general long-term effects and specifically on local government finances.

Riverside County District Attorney Paul Zellerbach, who opposed Prop 47, said, "It will exacerbate an already bad situation because of the jail overcrowding which already exists in Riverside County."

Individuals, who would have been convicted of felonies, will receive misdemeanor sentences, which can shift them from state prisons to county jails, although for shorter time periods. More than 500 prison inmates are eligible to have convictions reduced to misdemeanors and then moved to county jail.

In Zellerbach's 37 years as part of the criminal justice system, his experience is that most offenders commit multiple crimes and "drug and theft offenders

are repeat offenders and will re-cycle through the system."

Riverside County started implementing Prop 47 the day after the election, Zellerbach stated. Already, offenders no longer being charged as felonies are refusing to accept the counseling and other help programs that previously would have been required.

"There is no room for monitoring and ... criminals will be released within days," Zellerbach stated.

Within the criminal justice system, the probation departments are responsible for helping prisoners and offenders try to return to normality. The director of Riverside County's Probation Department, Mark Hake, said he and his staff have been formulating plans for Prop 47's implementation.

Currently, his 19 field offices and 300 probation officers have more than 16,000 adult felons to supervise and monitor in Riverside County. About 3,600 adult offenders may be eligible for reduced sentences, according to Hake, and nearly 500 have been assessed as high-risk offenders.

Somewhat of an echo of Zellerbach, Hake said,

"Just because a felony is now a misdemeanor, it doesn't change who the offender is." He estimated that of the 3,600 eligible for case review, they have had 8,700 separate arrests.

Probation will continue to assess the risk of each to repeat. Hake's strategy is to "still supervise the high-risk offenders. They will need direction, intervention services, and held accountable and compliant with court."

Historically, there was little to minimal supervision of misdemeanants. But Hake's staff is developing a profile to identify the future high-risk, but misdemeanor, offenders. Eventually this will lead to discussions with the courts, but no clear policies have been formulated.

"It's an abysmal future realistically," he opined. "I feel ham-strung. There's no discretion to operate within this law."

"This is a grave concern to district attorneys throughout California," Zellerbach declared.

County continues to monitor subsurface hydrocarbons

Riverside County continues to monitor a possible underground fuel leak in Idyllwild. R.M. Environmental Inc. of Calimesa, conducting the monitoring work, just completed the third-quarter sampling report.

In addition, RME has submitted a work plan to

install two more monitoring wells that will be sampled and monitored on a quarterly basis for the next 12 months. Both will be installed slightly west of the Ferrellgas office next to Muirs Realty.

RME is also planning to conduct a soil vapor extraction pilot test. This work, along with data from the two new monitoring wells, will be

used to determine recommendations for future remediation if it is warranted, the report stated.

Since the June sampling, total hydrocarbon concentrations increased in four of the monitoring wells but decreased slightly in four other monitoring wells, according to the RME October report.

Methyl-tertiary-butyl

ether continued to be detected in the site's monitoring wells. MTBE concentrations in five of the wells sampled resulted in the highest recordings since June 2013. But it remained undetected in several more wells. Benzene concentrations increased in one well, but decreased in two wells.

Win or lose, this new grand jury action may cost mountain taxpayers another thousands in attorney fees based upon last year's investigation alone. Enough of this crap.

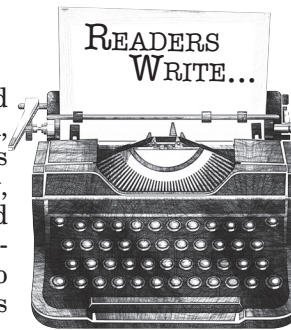

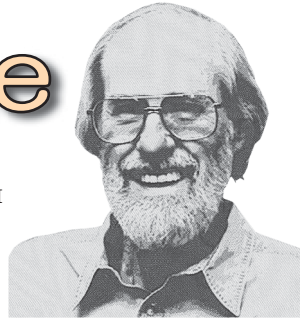

Before Our Time

CHURCHES EVENTUALLY BECOME PART OF IDYLLWILD ...

Amid a profusion of religious ceremony during the Christmas season, it may come as a surprise that throughout its first half-century, Idyllwild had not a single church.

There was simply no population base to support a church organization. Despite its 1920s boom, the village remained a summer colony. The 1930 census lists barely three dozen claiming Idyllwild as primary residence.

Idyllwild was a company town — essentially all businesses were subsidiaries of Idyllwild Inc. — so its boss, devout Methodist Claudius Lee Emerson, engaged ministers and

sponsored Sunday services.

Enhanced by a folding pump organ, they were held in the natural tree-shaded bowl below today's markets and post office, amid lush marsh grass and ferns beside Strawberry Creek

The first summer minister in the early 1920s, Louise Cole later recalled, tented with his large family on Strawberry Creek at an abandoned sawmill site totally lacking in amenities. Such deprivation led in 1925 to construction of the manse that stills stands on North Circle Drive as housing.

Emerson's bankruptcy and departure in

1936 left an untimely void just as Idyllwild's year-round population was beginning to grow. It was the Catholics who responded first.

A 1942 visit to Idyllwild inspired Fr. Malachy O'Sullivan, pastor of St. Anthony's in San Jacinto, to arrange the purchase of an old cabin to serve as a chapel. His proposed "Our Lady of the Pines" parish was renamed Queen of Angels by the Bishop of San Diego, but the church was a reality by summer's end.

In 1944, the 10-family parish lost its home to heavy snow, which caved in the roof, and wartime materials shortages pre-

cluded rebuilding. So the congregation began meeting at the Rustic Theatre, then housed in what's now Silver Pines Lodge until 1947, when they occupied the present Catholic church.

Meanwhile, in 1946 Protestants organized Community Presbyterian Church under the temporary ministry of Hugo Fulton and crowded into the manse for services.

Its lay leadership soon filled with Idyllwild household names like Humber, Casebeer, Kretsinger, Belden, Null, Boss, McCaghren and

Bischoff. The church building took three years to complete between 1950 and 1953, although services were held in the basement by 1951.

A local Christian Science Society formed in 1949 and began meeting midweek at Desert Sun School, where their faith was shared by founders Edith and Richard Elliott, and Sundays at the Rustic or Town Hall. They eventually acquired a nursery plot across the street, where their church was completed in 1957.

Idyllwild's church options began broadening in the late 1950s as the population more than tripled from its 604 at midcentury. An Episcopalian "cottage meeting" started using the Presbyterian manse

in 1955. Dr. Muriel Haskell's short-lived Center of Creative Living at the Four Chimneys complex on Delano Road launched public services in 1957. In the 1960s, its metaphysical niche was filled by Science of Mind and a branch of the Holy Superet Light Church out of Los Angeles. And more familiar names like Bible Church and Chapel in the Pines appeared.

Idyllwild was growing up, well on its way toward today's multicolored church scene.

MANY THANKS TO BOARDS ...

Recently, as a board was wrapping up business for the year, I felt a deep appreciation for everyone at the table. They are all volunteers, donating their time and energy to make sure the organization is on the right track.

They ensure that policies are consistent with the mission, and that budgets and balance sheets are carefully watched. They make sure they understand basic activities, offer feedback or encouragement when they think it necessary, and just generally bring their focus and attention on a regular basis to the business. They take responsibility for its oversight, which is quite a gift.

I have the honor of serving on two boards, the Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council and the Pine Cove Water District. MCFSC is a private, nonprofit corporation, while PCWD is a limited-purpose government agency under California's special district law.

The meetings have a different tone since the state's Brown Act binds PCWD but not MCFSC. Brown Act observance gives a more formal feel to the proceedings, but much of what happens is similar. The most basic activity is that the executive director or general manager reports to the board on activities, expenditures and plans. Board members listen, ask questions, make comments, and accept or reject the reports.

The key balancing act for boards is to offer effective oversight and policy direction to management, but leave the actual work of management to them. Board members are sometimes tempted to take active roles in daily activities, and it never works out well when it happens. Experienced boards hold managers accountable but support their role as managers with the authority to lead the staff in daily operations.

Of course, one of the key responsibilities of boards is to make sure the top manager is good

On Sept. 12, the Federal Trade Commission took action against "Partners in Health Care" for tricking people, especially Spanish-speaking individuals, into buying worthless medical discount cards. Telemarketers misled people by representing that they offered qualified health plans under the Affordable Care Act and that the insurance purchased would pay for a variety of medical services, including doctor and emergency room visits. Enrollment fees and monthly pay-

ments ranging from \$99 to several hundred dollars were collected for the bogus medical insurance.

AFD Medical was banned forever by the FTC from selling any health care or discount programs after the FTC found it pushed \$299 prescription discount cards on the elderly. Telemarketers also represented that the cards were necessary for the person to continue receiving Medicare, Social Security or other health insurance benefits.

Prior to purchasing health insurance, check with naic.org or consumeraction.gov to verify that the seller is licensed in your state of residence and to verify the legitimacy of the plan being offered.

at their job, and both my boards are lucky to have excellent managers who are great to work with: Edwina Scott, the executive director of MCFSC, and Jerry Holldber, general manager of PCWD.

A good board meeting involves good reports, good listening and respect for everyone at the table. Board members are generally older, often retired, and their age has given them rich experience that can be very useful to the organization. Everyone brings something different, and it is often a pleasure when someone brings up some useful and germane piece of information no one else knew.

The biggest issue all board members need to learn is that the board can only act as a whole and must speak with one voice. No board member has any self-designated powers; all decisions

must be made by a vote of the board.

So another balancing act is each person bringing their own knowledge and experience to the board yet accepting that finally the decisions must be made by the group as a whole. Good decisions and good discussions involve individuals asserting their views but aiming toward shared understanding and unified action.

Of course, it can go the other way, with long-term feuds and constant distrust. The PCWD board attended governance training in the fall and probably the thing that affected us most were the stories of other attendees who sit on truly dysfunctional boards. We came away thinking we were pretty fortunate.

So here is to all the directors sitting on governing boards of organizations. Thank you all for your valuable contributions to making our organizations work.

addressed this use.

In a July 2013 rulemaking, the FCC stated, "We find that allowing routine [travel information systems] broadcast during non-emergency periods of terrorist threat levels, public health alerts, emergency preparedness messages, conservation messages and the like, is not in the public interest, as such routine broadcasts also would dilute situational awareness pertinent to the traveling motorist. The primary purpose of the TIS is to assist motorists in the process of traveling and to provide emergency and imminent threat information in covered areas. Therefore, we will continue to disallow messages that do not have a travel nexus, are not emergency-related, or do not relate directly to an imminent threat because such messages would dilute the convenience and efficacy of TIS."

"It the duty of the licensee holder to follow the FCC direction," stated Buchanan. "And if something is in violation, the rest of the agreement stands."

Commissioner Larry Donahoo urged the joint committee to meet regularly and suggested a report after the first 90 days to be sure all are satisfied with progress.

The agreement speci-

fies that during emergencies, MHRC "shall use best efforts that WNKI will broadcast 24 hours a day, seven days a week ..."

MHRC has prepared a plan to expand the area covered by WNKI's signal. Funding for this effort and other proposals to install modern and state-of-the-art equipment will be financed with grants, donations and arrangement with other public agencies.

One issue that will be addressed after the agreement is signed is the status of "all funds [IFPD] held on account of WNKI, along with all outstanding obligations, including actual and contingent." IFPD has 20 business days to provide this information to MHRC and it has 60 business days to accept to take exception to the accounting.

Once mutual agreement has been reached, MHRC will maintain the financial responsibility for WNKI.

No plans for replacing him were announced but Calvin Gogerty is the current alternate for Davis. Susan Weisbart is the other citizen committee member.

Another civilian also had to relinquish their IFPD role. Paul Riggi, vice president of Volunteer Company 621, announced that Ruth Wick had to resign as president of the company and he would assume the role until the annual June election.

But Fire Chief Patrick Reitz did announce the promotion of three reserves — Eddie Apodaca, Robert Clark and James LaMont — to firefighters

and paramedics.

Also during the meeting, the IFPD commission approved a patient outcome form that has been on its agenda for several years. In the future, this customer comment form will be mailed to recipients of IFPD's emergency medical service.

The idea has been percolating with the board ever since former Commissioner Dr. Charles "Chip" Schelly suggested one in June 2012. After he left the commission, a committee composed of commissioners Jeannine Charles-Stiggall and Nancy Layton was formed to bring a final proposal forward, which happened last week.

The one-page ques-

tionnaire will be mailed to patients, with a self-addressed, stamped reply envelope. The draft asked five questions about the quality of emergency medical service they received. For example, "Were our personnel polite and courteous?" and "Did we answer all of your questions so you understood your options?"

However, Commissioner Rhonda Andrewson objected to all the questions except the general comment, "Were you satisfied overall with the service you received from IFPD?" She felt the others encouraged negative assessments, especially since a medical emergency is a stressful situation

in which memories are notoriously poor during these events.

"If they have no medical or EMT training, what does the public know except [the IFPD crew] expeditiously took care of the family member?" she asked about the other questions.

After discussion, the commission approved the assessment 3-1, with Andrewson opposed and Layton absent. The major change was to move the general question, which was last to first.

After the vote, Buchanan said, "We'll test this and see how it goes."

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Richard Schnetzer, Fern Valley Water's new director

Editor's note: At its Oct. 17 meeting, the Fern Valley Water District Board of Directors chose Richard Schnetzer as director following the resignation of Ron Korman in June. On Nov. 26, Schnetzer visited the Town Crier office. The ensuing discussion is the basis of this story that introduces him to the whole community.

While Schnetzer is not a lifetime Fern Valley customer, he is proud of his new role and responsibility. "I've toured the district with General Manager Steve Erler," he said. "It's pretty impressive; small but mighty."

Schnetzer was born and grew up in New Jersey. He graduated from Antioch College in Ohio. Work-study assignments through the school led him to California.

Setting the stage for his eventual career in education were two personal events. While experimenting with homemade fireworks, Schnetzer had an accident that cost him his left eye. Ironically, and firstly, his mother was legally blind.

This personal experience led him toward education and particularly with children who had disabilities. Eventually he joined the faculty at the Mardan Center of Educational Therapy, a private nonprofit school in Orange County. The center offers elementary and secondary pro-

grams for both regular and special education students.

His work also involved him with other schools and that inspired his desire to open his own consulting business. He founded the Institute for Effective Education and has been its president since 1988.

As part of this work, he became involved in lobbying Sacramento for resources and legislation to improve these programs. Today, while retired from daily work, he continues to transact some monthly business in the state capitol for the California Association of Private Special Education Schools.

"I advised school management on compliance with state and local laws. Now I'm part-time and still a registered lobbyist," Schnetzer said.

Despite a busy and hefty career, he is not a recent Idyllwild resident. He first visited the Hill in 1968 during a staff retreat and has been returning regularly. Nearly 10 years ago, he and his wife Pat bought property here and began the part-time resident life. In 2012, after retiring, they chose to become full-time residents.

Pat has been very active with the Mountain Disaster Preparedness group. Since the early fall of 2013, MDP has focused attention on gaining a bond with the Riverside Red Cross Chapter. Pat Schnetzer, a former registered nurse, headed the effort to find and train Red Cross volunteers. Her success in recruiting more than 40 local volunteers resulted in recognition from the regional Red Cross.

Since his wife is very involved in community groups, upon Schnetzer seeing the availability of a vacancy on the FVWD board, he and Pat discussed this opportunity for him to get involved with Hill activities. In September, he submitted his letter of interest to the water district.

He was one of three people expressing their interest in filling the vacancy. At the October meeting, the board unanimously chose Schnetzer. "I was pleasantly surprised," he acknowledged.

Although he is not a water professional, Schnetzer has been an active follower of water issues nationally and in the state. Also, throughout his career, he has been involved with public and private boards and understands how they function and the information they need to make good decisions.

"The issues are not different for any other district," he said. "What is the same is there enough water and its quality."

Schnetzer recognizes FVWD's dependence on stream

flow and is concerned about the continuing drought. He also recognizes the importance of FVWD's wells as complements and back-up to the stream water.

"We're fortunate to have wells with good flows," he stated. "But how long do we go under this current condition?"

As director, he wants to be a good steward of the district's resources and policies, cognizant of his fiduciary responsibility to the district's constituency, and to help the staff plan for the future. His experience in the nonprofit world makes him acutely aware of the use of grants to sustain organizations. Consequently, he wants to seek out funding sources to enhance FVWD's operations.

"I don't think the public understands how much information is collected on a daily, weekly and monthly basis to provide what we take for granted — that the water out of the tap is good to drink," Schnetzer said.

State Budget continues improving Higher revenue to support school funding

The state's Legislative Analyst's Office issued its forecast on fiscal years 2014-15 and 2015-16 in mid-November. With more than half the current fiscal year remaining, the LAO expects a rosy culmination for the state budget.

"We estimate that 2014-15 General Fund revenues will be about \$2 billion higher than estimated in this year's budget act," the report's authors stated. In addition, the LAO forecasts continuing improvement in the state's fiscal condition for 2015-16, which could end with \$4.2 billion in reserves.

In 2014-15, personal income and corporation tax revenues are the principal source of the greater revenues. Revenue is projected to grow \$5.1 billion this year and an average of more than \$4 billion annually through 2019-20.


With increasing revenues, Proposition 98 mandates increased spending for schools and community colleges in both fiscal years. Prop 98 spending is about 40 percent of the total General Fund expenditures. With these required increases, the LAO estimates minimal additional funds available for other programs.

This year's revenue growth may yield another \$177 million (including property tax growth) for schools and community colleges, but next year the increase could be \$2.3 billion more than the June projections.







The LAO spending projections also assume increased spending for the state's university systems.

Already this fiscal year, the state has transferred nearly \$70 million to the Cal Fire budget for higher-than-anticipated emergency fire costs. The LAO estimate for this year "some additional emergency fire suppression costs due to the continued threat of wildfire for the remainder of 2014-15."

Isis Theatre Company presents an Oscar Wilde holiday

Idyllwild's Isis Theatre Company, now in its 12th season, is presenting "A Wilde Holiday, The Star Child and Other Tales" as its Christmas offering.

Isis President and Founder Suzanne Avalon noted the company is doing something new this year. "I'm excited this year we're offering a production for children and families," she said, referencing the special 2 p.m. matinee on Saturday, Dec. 13. There is also an evening performance on the same day at 7:30 p.m.

"I'm proud we're providing children exposure to such great literature, and raising the bar with what we're doing," she said. Avalon stressed that the production is for all, not just families with children. "With plenty of humor and pathos, the evening promises to inspire adults to appreciate loved ones and children to embrace the magic of theater," she noted.

Wilde's fairy tales, the basis of the Isis production, were published in 1888. They are cautionary stories, designed to teach children the value of selfless giving and rendering kindness to others, especially those in need. Wilde's fairy tales explore the redemptive power of love, and are bound together in this production with original music by Laura Karpman and poems by Willa Cather and Christina Rossetti.

Director Emily Heebner, a veteran of Los Angeles' premiere classical theater, "A Noise Within," explained that Wilde's fairy tales have been adapted for theater by her mentor, friend and longtime Noise Within company member and director Sabin Epstein. Epstein is regarded as one of America's leading stage directors of classical drama. His work also has been seen in productions at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C., the California Institute of the Arts in Valencia and the San Diego Repertory Theatre.

"To know Wilde's fairy tales, to know he wrote them for his children, is endearing," said Heebner. "Micheál Mac Liammóir wrote that Wilde's son Cyril once asked him why he had tears in his eyes when he told the story of the Selfish Giant, and that [Wilde] replied, 'Really beautiful things always make me cry.'" Heebner said that by calling attention to Wilde's work, especially introducing his fairy tales to contemporary children and families, may help his genius to endure.

Zac Johnson lives an inspired life in Idyllwild

Some people are just born to be artists and Zac Johnson is one of those people. Born in Prescott, Arizona, his family moved to Idyllwild when he was very young; too young to have any memories of his birthplace. All of his memories are of Idyllwild and the rich tapestry of friends and experiences indelibly etched into his mind. Zac attended Idyllwild School through the eighth grade and was accepted into Idyllwild Arts Academy where he attended high school.

"Honestly, I think my mother had a master plan all along. She always encouraged me to make art," he recollected, "whatever it was. Anything creative."

According to Zac's Mom, Becky Clark, he was drawing before he was walking or talking.

During his elementary school years, and before the smARTS program existed, there was the GATE program (Gifted and Talented Education), which, in addition to some artistic teaching, included exposure to different ways of thinking. "They would pull us out of class a couple of hours every week ... they had computer games that were meant to exercise parts of your brain, things like that."

In addition to his artistic talent, Zac is a musician; he played the tenor saxophone. "I played a lot of jazz between junior high and high school. In junior high school, I played with the Rockin' Mountain Reeds, which was the brainchild of a couple of local musicians, Phillip Marshazevsky and Zel Lautenbach," Zac said. "They had their own group called Sweetwood and they decided they wanted to get a group of kids together and play jazz, their version of jazz standards."

At IAA, despite his focus on the visual arts, Zac

continued playing music. "When I went to IAA, Marshall Hawkins was my music teacher, so throughout high school I was studying visual arts, studying painting mostly, but doing the whole curriculum," Zac recalled. "On the side, I was taking jazz classes from Marshall, so Marshall has always been a mentor to me." The positive impact of studying at IAA has had a lasting effect on Zac's life. "It's a really amazing environment for artistic kids to grow and be in that community; it is a really close group of kids. It influences

the way you think; a lot of the classes are geared toward different types of thinking," Zac said. "I keep in touch with a lot of the students from IAA and they are really incredibly bright

people. A funny thing that I noticed, which happens a lot, is that they may have studied creative writing at IAA but now they are visual artists. One was in theater and now she plans and designs weddings. There is some crossover. I think it is a testament to the idea that it teaches you to think, to question your surroundings."

After high school Zac received a full scholarship to the Kansas City Art Institute. "When I went to apply to colleges, Kansas City was on my list but it wasn't in the top three or anything. Basically, they would interview applicants around the country and they would pick 10 of them and they would do an all-expenses paid trip to Kansas City; the college would pay for everything," Zac explained. "While you were there you took classes for a week and at the end you were interviewed so you brought your artwork with you, slides and everything. Then they would choose two of those students out of 10 to receive a full scholarship." Zac was one of the two. And while he would have preferred to have attended Cooper

Union in New York, Zac would meet his future wife, Mandy, at Kansas City.

After graduation, Zac and Mandy married and had two children, Carter and Evey. With a family to support, Zac joined the Navy in 2008. "It was a steady paycheck and it was fear and despair at the same time. I needed a job, I had kids, I couldn't afford health insurance, so there were all of those factors, but then there was another side of it; this was something terrifying and new and I had no idea what was going to happen," he said. "I can only learn and grow from it."

Art had been absent from Zac's life for quite some time and after a few years he realized that he missed the creative process. "I realized that I was already making a paycheck, I didn't have to worry about supporting myself, so I thought, 'I'm going to get back into the process,' so I did. I started drawing and painting again and it still sucked," he said shaking his head. "It was like I couldn't complete a body of work; I wouldn't allow myself to complete anything." Then, one of Zac's bosses found out he had an art degree which changed everything. "One of my bosses asked me to do a mural. I said, 'What's the criteria,' and he said, 'There is no criteria. You've got this whole room. Paint whatever you want and take as long as you want to do it.' I was basically getting paid a government salary to create art for the first time." The

result was a 16-foot-wide avionics-inspired mural with the goal of reminding the maintenance crew, who are removed from the flight line, how important their jobs are. It took Zac four months to complete, and after that, it was a domino effect. "People found out about it and they started asking for these other projects."

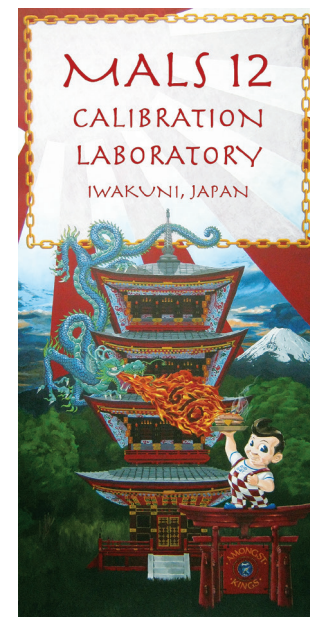
In Iwakuni, Japan, where Zac was stationed, he did several murals, one of which was 3D. "When I went to Iwakuni, [it was the] same thing. I didn't tell anyone that I was an artist but they found out and they asked me to do a work that kind of represented how strange a group we were out in Japan," he said laughing. "Each person threw out an idea. In the end, I had all of these random ideas and I just mashed them together. Somebody wanted a dragon, someone wanted Mt. Fuji, someone wanted a temple, and someone wanted Bob's Big Boy. It was cool because it was the first time that I didn't have to define my own end point. I could already see the end point — here's what we want, here's the effect we want this art to have."

Also, during his six months in Japan, Zac recorded music to stave off the loneliness of being away from his family. By this time, he had taught himself the guitar and keyboard and his creation, a CD, which he admits is "dark," helped him through his time there.

Zac received new orders bringing him back to

California and an eventual return to the only real home he has ever known, Idyllwild. "We moved 10 times in a span of six years ... We were used to moving around and we knew we could deal with it being in the military, but we also wanted a sense of security and stability," Zac explained. "We were asking ourselves questions like, 'Why are we giving up friends and family to be in a place that we are not familiar with?' When we considered all of the factors, Idyllwild just seemed like the right solution." So the couple purchased a home in Idyllwild and enrolled their children in Idyllwild School, the same school Zac attended as a child. "It's incredible. ... At the Halloween Parade I saw some of my old teachers, and they know my kids, too, so they come up to give me and my kids a hug," he said. "I think that one of the cool things is that it's nice to make a fresh start with people, to have new relationships and to reinvent yourself, but it is also nice to not have to overthink how you're going to present yourself to somebody; these people that I've known my whole life they already know me and they know my origins, so I can approach them without any gap in time. You go up to them and they know you like you saw them yesterday."

With his family settled and secure in Idyllwild, art is again a big part of Zac's life. "When I got back into drawing when I joined the Navy my work really sucked. I kept getting hung

up on the medium and it would take too long. I was using graphite and doing these larger drawings and it would just take forever," he said. "Then I remembered that I really liked charcoal and I just started doing these charcoal drawings and I decided that I wouldn't devote more than a couple of days to each of them." Zac's process includes accompanying poems he writes as he creates his drawings. "I'll draw something for a while and I'll get into it and then I'll take an hour break and write about it a little bit and then go back and forth and back and forth; it's kind of a system of checks and balances. I can go back and critique it based on where I have taken the drawing in shorter steps, so they just kind of play off of one another throughout the process. I'm trying to get a body of work together. When I publish, the image will go next to the poem."

Zac admits that his time away gave him a greater appreciation of his life in Idyllwild. "I knew I would miss it when I left; it is a big part of who I am," he said. "I am used to silent nights and the smell of pine and the privacy of being in the woods with nothing else but nature. I try to get as much of that as I can; it is inspiring and rejuvenating."

Idyllwild Ghost Town's future unclear

For 11 years, Kathy Wilson's Idyllwild Ghost Town has frightened and delighted fans of the phantasmagorical from on and off the Hill. Now, year 12 is in doubt.

Wilson's month-long Halloween attraction, a walk through live action and animatronic spook fest, had firmly established itself as a major audience draw at the Idyllwild Community Center site.

But a change of venue this year, to behind the Rustic Theatre, resulted in fewer attendees. Wilson said the event was still successful in its mission of raising funds for the Idyllwild School PTA, but that attendance was down by about 25 percent. "It was a decent crowd, but not like the past," said Wilson.

She thanked Rustic Theatre owner Shane Stewart for providing a stopgap venue for Ghost Town, after the ICC board decided not to continue to host the event. Chris Trout, ICC spokesperson, explained that growing and expanded use by community residents and groups

of the ICC property, as well as planned community center construction on the site — especially because of the set up and tear down time of the temporary facility and month-long use during good-weather recreational days.

Wilson said she appreciated Stewart offering to host the event this year. "Shane was great," she said, but noted plans for a 2015 Idyllwild Ghost Town are currently on hold.

Wilson said another consideration in whether to continue Ghost Town is that the execution of the event, especially constructing the temporary facility, is time-consuming and work-intensive. "Construction is a great deal of work and often lands on my family and friends, and that is just too much," she explained. "In the past, I've had a crew that was wonderful, but this year I had a new crew and a new location, and it was difficult."

Asked why she does this, when the net profits have gone to worthy causes in town and not to her company,

Wilson said, "I do it for the kids, to see their beaming faces. I do it for the joy of seeing adults and tourists who come out and have no idea our small town can produce something on this scale. I like to stand at the exit door and see their expressions as they come out of the structure."

Wilson said she'd look at options for the future of Idyllwild Ghost Town, including venues where a permanent structure could be built, but at this point she just does not have a plan.

She also is considering a new event aimed more at young teens and young adults, giving them something to plan and execute, but nothing at this point is on the drawing boards.

"It's important to work with the town and be positive," she said.

Wilson stressed she is interested in hearing from the town regarding the future of this event — suggestions and comments. She can be reached at 951-659-3228.



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

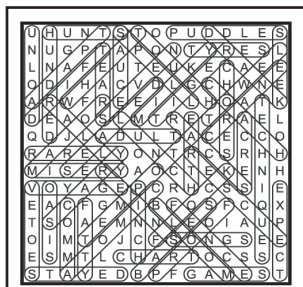
