PCWD considers rate hike

n increase in water rates may be in the future for Pine Cove Water District customers. At the director's meeting on Jan. 14, General Manager Jerry Holldber provided a preliminary report on the district's future fi-

Holldber was following up on several recommendations that Terry Shea, partner at Rogers, Anderson, Malody & Scott LLP, the district's auditor, made at the board's November meeting. He advised the board to investigate ways, including rate changes, to raise more cash over the next three to five years.

Shea made the suggestion because PCWD's cash balance at the end of fiscal year 2014 (June 30, 2014) was about \$200,000. which is about a third of what he recommends to clients.

In his presentation to the board, Holldber started with the deficit at the end of 2014. While the audit reported \$255,000, this included \$136,000 for See PCWD, page 7

Health insurance has new tax savings

Covered California open enrollment period ends Feb. 15

axes and health insurance are merging this spring.

As the current open enrollment period for Covered California ends Feb. 15, tax season has started, and whether one has health insurance will be asked on the 2014 tax return.

The "shared responsibility payment" takes effect for 2014, and many who were uninsured will see an impact when they prepare their taxes due in April of this year.

Those who had insurance through work or pur-

chased individual policies will need to check a box on their tax return indicating they had health insurance coverage for all of 2014.

Those who purchased policies in the Health Insurance marketplace will need to provide additional information, including a new statement — Form 1095-A. This is especially important for individuals who had tax credits to lower the monthly premiums.

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

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Pole fire caused Wednesday's power outage

A pole fire on the corner of Beard Street and El Campo in Hemet caused the widespread power outage that affected the Hill Wednesday, Jan. 14. A single transmission line runs up the mountain then branches out to the various mountain areas, leading to the broad spread of the outage.

The cause of the fire is currently unknown.

According to Southern California Edison, 3,803 customers were affected by the outage. This number does not include customers of Anza Electric Cooperative, who were also affected. AEC services Garner Valley, Anza, Pinyon Pines and parts of Aguanga, and receives power from the same line as SCE customers on the Hill.

Due to the mountainous terrain, the boundaries of the outage are unclear, but Edison was not aware of any problems in Banning or Valle Vista as a result of this event. The outage began at 9:33 a.m. and power was restored by 12:38 p.m.

A second, unrelated outage in Hemet also began at 9:33 a.m. as a result of overhead equipment problems. Edison customers affected numbered 367. This outage was bordered by Florida Avenue to the north and east, Doe Canyon Road to the south, and Grant Avenue on the west.

Power was restored to 323 customers at 10:40 a.m. and to the remaining 44 by 12:24 p.m.

Mountain Center fatality; injuries in Saturday crash

A one-vehicle traffic crash resulted in the death of a Mountain Center man Monday evening about a half-mile east of Keen Camp Road on Highway 74.

California Highway Patrol Officer Mike Murawski said the man was driving a Toyota Tacoma westbound near the speed limit when he drifted off the highway and hit a tree at about 5:45 p.m. No passengers were in the truck.

A nurse reported the crash and said the man was unconscious and trapped in the vehicle. John Harvey, 71, was pronounced dead at 6:16 p.m.

A motorcycle vs. truck resulted in one person with moderate injuries being transported by air ambulance to an area hospital Saturday, Jan. 17.

According to CHP Officer Osteen, Zachary Morris, 20, of Oceanside, was riding a Yamaha 600 eastbound on Highway 74 west of McCall Park Road when he collided with a 2007 Dodge Ram driven by Ryan Dallin, 40, of Menifee.

Osteen had no further information about the cause of the collision or injured parties.

Cal Fire reported that one of the individuals was injured but a spokesperson would not identify the patient due to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act.

2014 was a hot year

More rain forecast before spring ends

The National Weather Service confirmed what many people felt last year — hot! Since temperature records have been kept for more than a century, 2014 was the warmest year on record and that includes the Hill. And the drought persists, too.

While NWS has some missing data for Idyllwild, the average temperature was 58.1 degrees, compared to 55.7 in 2013, the next warmest.

Nearly all of Southern California saw record temperatures last year. For example, San Diego's average was 67.6 degrees and its next highest year was 1984 at 67.2 degrees. Anaheim, Riverside and Vista all experienced record average temperatures in 2014. Even Big Bear, which also has missing data, was nearly a degree warmer than the 49.6 degrees recorded in 1996.

Statewide it was the warmest year since records began being collected in the 19th century. The average was 61.5 degrees, more than 4 degrees warmer

than the previous high.

Besides California, Arizona and Nevada recorded record heat. However, from Minnesota and Michigan south to Louisiana, nine states saw record coldness.

NWS also reported that Idyllwild has experienced a deficit of 30.1 inches of rain in the past four years. Since the average is 26.3 inches, that is the equivalent of one season of rain.

NWS The latest drought outlook forecasts a slight improvement in precipitation in the next three months. While the

drought will remain constant through January, there will be improvement later in winter. From February through April, the expected precipitation is above average for Southern California and east to New Mexico.

Academy Commander Capt. Robert Peebles said this academy is the hardest in the state. And even afterward, the deputies aren't put on patrol for another four or five years.

With such bad press for police officers across the nation, I want to throw some kudos toward these men and women who serve us.

Flu vaccine effective in about a quarter of people

Disease Control still recommends vaccination

This season's flu vaccine is 23 percent effective, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Its effectiveness was reduced this year because between the time the components of the vaccine were determined and the fall when the vaccine was available the most prevalent influenza virus "drifted" or mutated.

This estimate is relatively low compared with previous seasons when circulating viruses and vaccine viruses were well-matched," CDC said in a Jan. 16 report on the vaccine effectiveness. Since CDC began conducting annual flu vaccine effectiveness studies in 2004-2005, the estimates for each season have ranged from 10 to 60 percent effectiveness in preventing medical visits associated with seasonal

influenza illness, according to the press release.

In a sample of people tested in December, the proportion vaccinated varied from 46 to 66 percent across the

Overall, about half the people vaccinated still contracted the flu compared to 56 percent of the individuals who were not vaccinated. Another factor that influences how well the flu vaccine works is the age and health of the person being vaccinated.

In general, the flu vaccine works best in young, healthy people and is less effective in people 65 and older, and these results reflect that trend. The vaccine was most effective for Individuals younger than 17. For them it was 26 percent effective compared to 12 percent for individuals between 18 and 49, and 14 percent effective for people older than 50.

Nevertheless, CDC still recommends vaccination, especially for individuals who are at most risk for the flu and complications. This flu season probably has another six or seven weeks of duration, especially in California, where it has not yet been very intense.

IRS offers free software to do tax return

Also helps with health insurance requirements

The Internal Revenue Service and the Free File Alliance just launched Free File, which makes brandname tax software products and electronic filing available to most taxpayers in California for free.

Free File software can help taxpayers with tax preparation, including the health-care law that will affect almost everyone. Californians can use Free File software immediately.

Free File is available only at IRS.gov/FreeFile, thanks to a partnership between the IRS and the Free File Alliance, a consortium of 14 leading tax software companies.

"About 70 percent of all federal tax returns from California taxpayers come in below the \$60,000 income level," says IRS Spokesperson Raphael Tulino. "Millions can use it to file a federal income tax return for free." Last year more than 257,000 Californians used Free File.

Taxpayers who earned

\$60,000 or less last year are eligible to choose from among 14 software products. For those who earned more, they are still eligible for Free File fillable forms, the electronic version of IRS paper forms.

Some companies also offer free state tax return preparation.

Free File also can help taxpayers with the new health-care requirements. Almost everyone will need to do something new when filing a tax return this year. For each month in 2014, you and everyone on your return must report health-care coverage, claim an exemption from coverage or make a shared responsibility payment with your tax return.

Most people will simply have to check a box to report health-care coverage for the entire year.

Free File will be available through October 2015. Taxpayers who cannot meet the April 15 tax deadline also can use Free File to file a six-month extension.



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Supervisors approve new ambulance contract

Competition was only question before decision

Tuesday, On Jan. 13, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved a new contract with American Medical Response for provision of ambulance and emergency medical services throughout the county, including portions of the Hill.

Verne Lauritzen, chief of staff to former 3rd District Supervisor Jeff Stone. said the issue of service

to Pine Cove and on the Hill was never discussed during the supervisors' deliberation of the proposed contract.

Idyllwild Fire Protection District has an exclusive operating right to provide these services within its jurisdiction, but provision of these services outside of the district will be limited to backing up AMR. IFPD currently also serves Pine Cove and north. That ends July 1.

The new contract per-

mits AMR to subcontract these services in the Mountain Plateau area, which includes the areas from Poppet Flat south to Piñyon Pines and west to

The board's vote was 3-1. Only 1st District Supervisor Kevin Jeffries opposed the new contract. His concern was that the board had decided to re-negotiate a new contract with the current provider — AMR — rather than request competitive bids from any ambulance pro-

In presenting the proposal to the board, Coun-Emergency Services Director Bruce Barton would politicize the annual said, "This agreement represents the last step in a two-year planning process that included the public and the multiple EMS stakeholders."

The contract is for five years, but AMR can earn 10 one-year extensions, which also concerned Jeffries. Fourth District Supervisor John Benoit offered an amendment to the proposal requiring an annual report to the board on AMR's performance.

Originally, he gested the board approve the extensions, but 2nd District Supervisor John Tavaglione argued that

review, pitting the different stakeholders against each other.

Chair Marion Ashley, (5th District) praised Barton and commented, "The citizens of Riverside County are winning big time with this contract."

Barton indicated the new contract would aid the county's emergency medical dispatch program. While medical dispatchers currently suggest triage to callers to help prepare victims for the arrival of first responders, the county wants to expand the EMD efforts.

"Based on triage, the

patient's acuity may alter the resources we send," he told the supervisors. "At a very minimum, we may not need to send all resources. Or in the case of a full [heart] arrest, roll all resources." This is part of the [new] strategic plan, he added.

County Fire Chief John Hawkins concurred with Barton. "The pre-arrival instructions have been very successful. The contract will provide us a look at future triage calls allowing a different level of service.'

Fern Valley Water keeps same officers

Mid-year budget balanced

The current Fern Valley Water District board officers President Robert Krieger, Vice President James Rees and Secretary Trisha Clark — were re-elected for a second one-year term at last Friday's meeting.

In other business, the board reviewed the mid-year financial report. General Manager Steve Erler reported that all expenses seemed on target since the beginning of the fiscal year on July 1. The current year's (2014-15) capital projects — demolition of reservoir 5 and the tank farm manifold — have been completed. The total cost, \$118,000, was nearly \$17,000 less than the budgeted

Through Dec. 31, FVWD's revenues have been \$476,000, about 43 percent of the projected total for the fiscal year, and expenses, including the capital projects, have been \$438,000, which is about half of the projected

The expenses include some of the costs for the rate review study, which Albert Webb and Associates is preparing for the district. Erler indicated that a draft may be available for the February board meeting. Webb has been working on the analysis for several months and it will be reviewed later this spring, when the board considers any changes to its current rate structure.

In water business, FVWD consumption increased 4.2 percent to 4.6 million gallons during the November and December period compared to 4.4 million gallons in 2013. However, total customer consumption (34.3 million gallons) in 2014 was 3.2 million gallons less than in 2013.

2014 is the third consecutive year of less consumption. FVWD customers have reduced their usage 5.7 million gallons or 14 percent since 2011.

Erler reported that district staff found and repaired seven leaks this month following the deep freeze just prior to New Year's Day. Six were non-surfacing leaks and one was in the district's mainline, according to Erler.

'Customers are not shutting off their valves completely," stated Jessica Priefer, office manager. "They're in a hurry to leave. It's difficult to explain [the charge to their bill] when they made an attempt to shut off the water."

We're comfortable with the current water conditions," Erler said. "All wells are off and we're pulling down stored water and some creek flow." He also reported that well levels rose in the past month, although they remained lower than December 2013.

The largest increase is in Well No. 2, an increase of 6 feet," he reported.

After the election of officers, Krieger appointed members to the district's standing committees (such as budget, planning and personnel) and ad hoc committees (such as policy manual and rates and revenue).

Directors Clark and Richard Schnetzer will make up two new board committees. Krieger had proposed establishing a public information committee this year. Then Schnetzer suggested an information technology committee might be useful for the board, too. This committee will assess the district's current computer hardware and software in order to make recommendations for the future ca-

to get more involved with MCFSC.

"When you get involved, you hope that the result is better than before you started and you've done something positive," Kramer said about his prospective time leading the MCFSC. "It's a well-run organization and we all work well with together. Our part is made simple with a great executive director, Edwina [Scott]."

Over the past year, MCFSC has helped many homeowners replace their wood-shake shingle roofs with safe, fire-resistant shingles. In the future, Kramer sees more emphasis on helping homeowners improve their structure's fire defensiveness.

"People clear the brush on the property, but then they should look at the house and ask how to make it more defensible," Kramer said. For example, a simple fix for eaves to make it more difficult for air-borne embers to enter and create a fire is a smaller screen, he added.

The county fire code committee, which includes all local fire organizations and MCFSC, is still discussing how to address the concerns citizens raised at last summer's fire chief Town Hall meeting. "People who abated their property but were frustrated with the neighbor with the vacant lot who did nothing," Kramer said.

The state's Public Resource Code requires abate-

ment for structures. Riverside County's abatement ordinance can require significant abatement of vacant lots, such as disking of fields, at much lower elevations. Kramer explained that the county's committee is seeking a compromise that fits the Hill. And evaluating the San Bernardino

Kramer stated. "People want to make lots a little safer for those who have done their part," he said. "But the Riverside County Board of Supervisors has the final say.'

County ordinance is a start,

Residents are aware of the fire threat and are conscientious about doing abatement, Kramer stressed. Last spring, the transfer station was full of green waste and stopped accepting it. MCFSC wrote a letter encouraging Waste Management to accept more, otherwise it would discourage abatement efforts.

"I hope it's just as full next season. It says a lot about people here and what needs to happen," Kramer said proudly. "If there's a question, call us." MCFSC's phone number is 951-659-6208.

The IRS stresses that it is very important to wait for Form-1095-A to arrive before filing taxes. If you haven't received Form 1095-A by early February, you should contact the Marketplace Call Center at 1-800-318-

While those who can afford health coverage but chose not to buy it may have to pay a fee, individuals who could not afford coverage or met other conditions can receive an exemption. It is important for individuals to know that exemptions are available and to understand the steps they need to take to request

A variety of exemptions are available, including if the cost of coverage was too expensive, if you were uninsured for only a short period of time, if you experienced a hardship, such as medical expenses resulting in substantial debt or if a close family member passed away.

For a complete list of exemptions and more information, read Information about health insurance marketplace exemptions or visit HealthCare. gov/taxes.

If you didn't have health insurance and do not qualify for an exemption, you will likely have to pay a fee or penalty.

"It's important that consumers understand now that the cost of remaining uninsured is rising," Covered California Executive Director Peter V. Lee wrote in a press release. "This year, a family of four earning \$70,000 a year could pay close to \$1,000 in their taxes if they remain uninsured in 2015."

The 2014 penalty for this family would be \$497 and rises each year.

In 2016, the same family of four would pay \$988 for not being covered in 2015 and would likely pay \$2,085 in 2016 if they do not have health coverage, depending on their specific circumstances.

Covered Cal reported that during the current open enrollment period, which ends Feb. 15, more than 1,099,200 people sought coverage and were determined eligible for private health insurance and eligible or likely eligible for Medi-Cal. This includes 217,146 plan selections for private coverage, as well as 466,778 enrollments into Medi-Cal coverage and 110,913 who are likely eligible for Medi-Cal. Since January 2014, Medi-Cal has enrolled more than 2.2 million consumers.

To achieve a balanced budget, Holldber recommended a combination of water-rate increases and cost reductions. He has asked the district's engineer, John Egan, to review the water needs and costs. Holldber intends to present a specific proposal to the board for review at its February meeting.

He proposed increasing PCWD's minimum bi-monthly charge from its present level of \$53 to Esnard. "Based on the au-\$62 in three annual steps. 





2015 begins yearly Idyllwild Lilac Celebration

"Some people think lilacs are just an Eastern thing," said Gary Parton, Idyllwild's lilac patron. But even though most longstanding lilac festivals are in the Eastern and Midwestern U.S., Parton and his new committee want to establish Idyllwild as a nationally known lilac town. This year, beginning at 10:30 a.m. Saturday, May 2, the Idyllwild Lilac Celebration Committee, Parton's new nonprofit, launches the first of its Idyllwild Lilac Celebrations. "We are starting small with hopes to grow bigger," said Parton.

Starting in May 2009, Parton began opening his Alpenglow Gardens on Fern Valley Road to locals and visitors with tours and a formal tea when his garden bloomed in late April, early May. Parton was continuing the tradition of Idyllwild's "Lilac Lady," Reva Ballreich, who began planting and hybridizing lilacs when she moved to the Hill in 1982. Her May garden openings became major "flower" tourist draws, eventually featuring more than 880 lilac varietals at their peak.

When she died in 2009, Parton resolved to continue and grow her vision — to create an annual festival or celebration that would establish Idyllwild as the West's premier lilac town. His tours and teas for the last six years were rehearsals for the 2015 wider celebration. As part

of the run-up to 2015, Parton and his supporters, including volunteers from the Idyllwild Garden Club, began planting more than 1,000 lilacs in downtown commercial locations. Again in 2015, beginning in October, Parton and committee will make available to local merchants 100 lilac plants for installation in the village center.

The 2015 Idyllwild Lilac Cel-

ebration again features guided tours of Parton's Alpenglow Gardens, art shows with working artists, and the charming Victorian tea that has become so popular with locals and visitors. Saturday tours run until 3 p.m. and the tea is served from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.

New this year, as part of programs that will expand over the succeeding years, is a Saturday event, from 2 to 4 p.m. at the Idyllwild Library. Featured are a panel discussion on "Growing Lilacs in California;" presentation of a new lilac varietal, the "Ernie Maxwell Lilac," to the Town Crier (Maxwell was the founder and longtime editor of the paper); a talk by Idyllwild Area Historical Society historian and spokesperson Bob Smith about Maxwell, featuring archival pictures and Maxwell cartoons; and refreshments with a cake featuring one of Maxwell's cartoons. Parton noted that there are currently, in his garden, 13 more varietals that are as yet unnamed. Each year, as part of the annual celebration, Parton and committee will present a different varietal, newly named for another Idyllwild resident.


Sunday, May 3, also includes new events. From 10 to 11 a.m. at the Caine Learning Center, a guest speaker from the International Lilac Society will discuss "A Lilac in Every Garden," with some poetry to be read by Doug Austin, Idyllwild's own Charles Dickens. From 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. there will be an interactive event "Artists Inspired by Lilacs" with live music, floral arrangements, paintings, photography and pastry designs. The day concludes back at Alpenglow Lilac Gardens with wine, cheese, art and music from 4 to 6 p.m.

Although not time-congruent with the 2015 weekend celebration, the annual celebration will also include a "Lilac Learning Activity" to be conducted with fourth-grade students at Idyllwild School through a series of experimental cross-curricular classes and activities focusing on lilacs. Supervised by IS teachers Michelle Adler and Tom Dillon, with coordination from Parton's committee, teaching units will include art, biology, history and geography of lilacs, student stories to be written about lilacs and cuttings of lilacs for students to take home. Parton sees it as immersion and inspiration about lilacs for students.

Parton, a retired teacher, often smiles when he discusses something about which he is enthused. "For instance, in the art segment, students will only use Crayola crayons with lilac hues and colors," he beamed. "We're hoping to create an educational template that can be used by the International Lilac Society and throughout U.S. school systems."



Idyllwild places second in top 10 national list

Survey of must-visit small towns

The secret is out. Idyllwild is a major travel destination, second in a top-10 list of "must see" small cities "that should absolutely be on your travel bucket list" (www.bustle.com).

Bustle, a visually flashy daily online news, entertainment and fashion community with a nod toward women readers, selected Idyllwild and the other nine destinations because of their charm and history, according to contributor Chelsey Grasso. Said Grasso, "A weekend getaway to a tiny town can be refreshing, and with so many cool points of interest on the U.S. map, there's really no excuse not to go exploring.'

What may not be surprising to residents is that Idyllwild is on a list of beautiful and unique small villages and cities. What is surprising is that it is ranked second out of 10 travel destinations on a national, not regional or California list. Granted this is only one survey compiled by one writer based in New York, but publication of the list made a big splash on Facebook after the article was published on bustle.com.

Idvllwild is famous worldwide as a climbing destination, but climbers are a rarified tourist niche. Even though many residents of communities and cities at the base of the mountain have never been to or don't know of Idyllwild, Grasso nevertheless ranks it second behind only Telluride, Colorado (ranked number one - world renown film festival, world class skiing and 19th century mining town architecture) and ahead of much better known travel destinations: Williamsburg, Virginia (number three — historic, colonial), Sedona, Arizona (four — world-famous red-rock formations, photographers' paradise and new-age "energy" vortex); Newport, Rhode Island (five - world-famous jazz festival and New England historic seaport charm); and St. Augustine, Florida (eight — oldest continuously occupied city in the U.S.).

Idyllwild was cited for its proximity to better-known desert resort Palm Springs and for possessing a back-in-time historic mountain village charm. "It is a perfect getaway for those in need of a little fresh air and a break from the hustle and bustle of city life," said Grasso. "Spend a day hiking up Suicide Rock, catching a flick in the town's one movie theater, or listening to some live, local jazz music."

Idyllwild joins other lesser-known destinations on the list: Beaufort, South Carolina (number six — antebellum mansions and southern mystique); Ketchum, Idaho (number seven — skiing and its October trailing of the sheep festival); Gatlinburg, Tennessee (nine — Great Smoky Mountain location and aerial tramway, lush forests and whitewater rafting); and Langley, Washington (10 - Puget Sound Whidbey Island location, typifying the Pacific Northwest.)

Grasso summed up her reason for the list and fascination with the towns chosen. "America is truly a melting pot — not only of people, but of places. And while this beautiful country is made up of some of the most beloved citied in the world — San Francisco, New York City, Chicago and the list goes on — you might be surprised to find out that there's a whole lot going on outside of these giant metropolises."

Although categorized as small cities by Grasso, populations ranged from 1,000 for Telluride and Langley, to 15,000 for Williamsburg and 25,000 for Newport. The common denominators for those making the list were qualities of beauty and ways of life that made them stand out from the unfortunately growing U.S. norm of similarly uninteresting strip malls, national fast food restaurants and box stores.

In an email Grasso said, "I spent a weekend in Idyllwild about a year ago,

which actually inspired me to pitch the article a couple weeks ago to my editor. When writing it, I was looking for small cities across America that have that independent spirit/small town feel. I also tried to balance the towns evenly around America so that more readers would have the chance to visit them."

So while the secret may be out, the secret we who live here know – why Idyllwild is a special place of blue skies, peaceful days and star-filled nights, neighbors who actually know each other, an art haven of fine art, theatre and music – it does feel good to know that others appreciate our way of life.

Sixty recruits pass law enforcement academy

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department is hiring. But if anyone thinks becoming a deputy is as easy as filling out an application, they might be surprised to learn that to be deputized, one must go through a rigorous background check that eliminates thousands of applicants. Fewer than 1 percent of applicants are accepted. And even if a person passes that hurdle, they must complete 25 weeks of Basic Peace Officer Training at the Ben Clark Training Center that includes extreme physical, academic, scenario, report writing and firearms training.

Last Thursday night, 60 people were sworn in at the academy's elaborate graduation ceremony at Grove

Community Church in Riverside, with the University of Riverside Pipe Band leading the graduates to the stage. Two to three classes graduate each year, said Capt. Ray Wood of the Hemet Sheriff's Station. Most graduates would appear the following day for their new assignments in the sheriff's department, though Riverside, Corona and Palm Springs police departments, and Imperial

County Sheriff's Department also had graduates in the program.

The ceremony began with a video the students made of their training. Like an opening scene from "An Officer and a Gentleman," just the physical training reminded one of military boot camp. The physical training included sparring, wrestling and even getting pepper-sprayed. Deputies must be able to do such things as drag a person out of peril.

Students are taught to enter a building safely, chase a vehicle at fast speed in a patrol car on a windy road and even perform community service. These graduates helped landscape a new home for a disabled veteran, and participated in charity runs for Hometown Heroes and Susan G. Komen breast cancer.


As badges were pinned on stoic "soldiers" who marched in choreographed order from their seats to the lectern, proud family members and friends broke out in applause and hoots: "Atta boy, Scooter."

In seven cases, family members — retired or currently in law enforcement — proudly pinned badges on their daughter, son, son-in-law, brother, brother-in-law and even grandson.

Class President Ryan Buonarigo told the class, "Never forget who you are. We represent the good in this world, the willingness to defend the weak, the desire to serve all and the drive to make our communities a better and safer place."

He ended his speech with a quote from an anonymous writer: "I go to work everyday with people smarter than me, who are better at what they do than me. I go to the gym every day with people who are stronger and faster than me. I spend my spare time with friends and family whose values and body of character I aspire to reflect, and for all of these reasons, I get a little better every day."

Keynote speaker Sheriff Stan Sniff spoke of the challenges law enforcement personnel face today across the nation. He admonished the graduating class to practice integrity. As he said, an important thing to remember is "... doing the right thing even when nobody is watching ... The word integrity is the very bedrock of the criminal justice system — law enforcement, courts, the correction

system — it all hinges on that issue of credibility, it all hinges on that issue of integrity ... Violations of integrity and ethical standards are literally death sentences to law enforcement careers ... And when we have those violations occur, that brush paints every single one of us no matter what uniform or what agency you represent."

The following day, the new sheriff's deputies were to appear with their spouses at an orientation to be assigned to a superior and begin training. Most of them would begin their careers in the jail system.

Wood said he would receive two deputies from the jail system in what is called a "push." Those deputies pushed out of the jail because of the new deputies, though they may have been on the force for four or five years, are still brand new to field work. They will be paired up with an experienced patrol deputy and require 16 weeks of training.

The minimum age to apply to become a deputy sheriff is 21. The department also is hiring civilian workers. To apply, visit www.riversidesheriff.org/recruit/.

that will love them and all of their toes. And lots of canned food.




