IFPD acquires new ambulances

The Idyllwild Fire Protection District is the proud owner of two new ambulances, which were purchased last Wednesday through a General Services Administration auction and picked up Friday.

Both were acquired for slightly less than \$45,000

Although Fire Chief Patrick Reitz and the district's Finance Committee have discussed replacing the district's two ambulances, an emergency action was necessary at Tuesday's commission meeting to authorize their possible purchase with a limit to bid up to \$50,000 for each ambulance.

"I was just notified Monday about one ambulance and I did the research and found two," Reitz told the commission. "I see this as an opportunity and don't know when we'll get another chance.'

Based on the research of new ambulances, which he had already completed, Reitz said, "One brand new rig never driven would cost about \$130,000 per unit."

Both of these are very low-mileage units and conform to Riverside County's Emergency Medical Service's standards, Reitz added. One has less than 20,000 miles and See Ambulances, page 24

Rain, snow prevalent over weekend

eeded rain and snow fell on the Hill this weekend, but the several days of intermittent precipitation did not relieve the drought. Snow — winter's normal gift to the mountains - did arrive and was visible everywhere, although depths varied considerably.

Between 5,300- and 5,500-foot elevations, temperatures were substantially cold enough to bring considerable snow to the higher elevations. Barely more than an inch of snow fell from Saturday through Monday morning in

Strawberry Valley, but Pine Cove received 9.5 inches, more than Big Bear and almost equal to Mt. Summit for this storm. Fern Valley residents reported about 6 inches of snow and 1 inch was recorded at the Idyllwild Fire Station.

At lower elevations, the precipitation came as rain. The U.S. Forest Service's Keenwild Guard Station recorded 1.36 inches of rain and the Vista Grande Guard Station recorded 1.34 inches. In Pine Cove, 1.14 inches fell and Idyllwild Fire received about 1.82 inches of rain.

Total rainfall this season (since

July 1) has been 16.12 inches in Pine Cove and 15.12 inches at the Idyllwild Fire Station. Both levels remain below the historic average for rain through the end of February, which is 18.7 inches.

The average March rainfall is about another 4.1 inches. The National Weather Service forecast for the next two weeks indicates the likelihood of rain is above normal. But the longer-term forecast for the month says the odds of above- or below-average rainfall are about even. Consequently, there is no expectation that the drought conditions will change in the Southwest before fall.

Idyllwild Water on brink of Stage 3

Board concerned about demands on waste treatment system

Stage 3 water emergency is imminent depending upon how much rain and snow arrived last weekend, according to Idyllwild Water General Manager Tom Lynch.

We are in Stage 2. However, we meet the criteria level for Stage 3," Lynch told IWD directors last week. "We are evaluating day-to-day.'

Two important criteria for declaring Stage 3 have been met. The groundwater levels for the Foster Lake wells recently fell to 50 feet and the downtown wells are below the 20-foot depth criterion.

"We'll try to hold off declaration of Stage 3 until we see what the next storm does," Lynch told the board at its Feb. 25 meeting. On Monday, March 2, he said the staff was to evaluate well levels this week to determine how beneficial this storm may have been.

While fresh precipitation will not be immediately salutary because of the time it will take to percolate from the surface to the wells, it will be a sign that well levels will improve. Even the multiple inches of rain Sunday and Monday a week ago had minimal effect on Foster Lake's level.

"The rain has done little to impact the condition at the lake," Lynch said then. "There's a large puddle which continually evaporates in the warmer weather."

Director Mike Freitas encouraged Lynch to move on a declaration soon since immediate rainfall will still take months before any positive effect is apparent.

However, Lynch agreed that a decision would likely

slopes nearest bridge abutments and placing rocks for slope protection; constructing four retaining walls at the sides of the bridge and installing bridge-approach railings; applying architectural treatments to minimize visual and cultural impacts; and removing only trees within the new bridge path. Planners said part of the project would include planting trees and vegetation to complement the site once the bridge is installed.

Planning for the bridge project began in 2012 with project approval and approval of an environmental document, bridge design and award of the project, public meetings to explain the project to area residents and a public-comment period.

Granite Construction of Vista won the open bid for the project. Other California projects of Granite Construction have included the San Jose International Airport Terminal, Route 91 Express Lanes and the San Carlos Community Development in Carmel where Granite crews built water reservoirs, storage ponds and nine bridges to connect a 60-mile road network in an environmentally sensitive area.

be soon and expects the issue to be on the agenda for the March meeting.

In last week's Field Poll, nearly 95 percent of registered voters believe the water shortage is serious or extremely serious. From a year ago, the percentage of respondents who feel the water shortage is not serious has fallen from 10 to 5 percent.

Most voters prefer voluntary reductions rather than mandatory water rationing, according to the Field Poll. Southern California (excluding Los Angeles County) was the area most strongly in support of voluntary compliance.

The drought and lower wells levels also are costing IWD money. Not only are revenues falling as customers strive to conserve water, but expenses increase because it requires more electricity to pump the deeper wells. Through January, IWD's net water income is about \$150,000.

In addition to nature's help from precipitation, Lynch told the board that two recent projects — refurbishing the Oakwood well and re-opening the horizontal and vertical wells above Foster Lake — are awaiting state approval to be incorporated into IWD's distribution system.

"I'm hoping with these we'll restore the water table near the lake," he added.

In January, IWD customers used 6.3 million gallons of water, which was 68,700 gallons less than in January 2014.

In non-water business, the board approved two contracts. One will replace the current 45-kilowatt failed inverter, which failed this fall with a series of three smaller inverters. This equipment converts the DC power generated from the solar panels to AC or alternating current at the district's solar facility. The project's cost is expected to be about \$25,000, and, with the greater efficiency and power produced, it should have a payback of three years, according to Lynch.

The second contract would evaluate IWD's waste-treatment system, particularly its ability to provide service to the proposed brew pub in town. This contract will cost

about \$10,000 and the owners of the proposed pub will share the costs.

The results of the study don't constitute any obligation on the district," affirmed IWD Board President Jim Billman. "This research is at their request and whether we can handle any discharge.'

Lynch agreed that the need for the study arose from the owners' inquiry about access to the district's sewer system.

"It's what we're capable of taking and evaluating adjustments as a result of bringing the brewery into the system," Lvnch stated.

He stressed that the pub has alternatives for handling its waste besides through the district's wastewater. "They can handle their waste through pre-treatment or nothing into our system and trucking it off the Hill," he added.

Change. Is it good, necessary or just something we resist or accept and get comfortable with? We all encounter change in one form or another throughout our lives.

Before Our Time

MARK — IDYLLWILD INSTITUTE-FIESTA ...

Some 32 summer camps have now been documented in the Idyllwild area since 1920. But Idyllwild Institute-Fiesta stands out for its oddly nondescript name.

This was a program to cultivate leadership and patriotism in high school girls enrolled in the Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps. Given the tendency of JROTC to attract disproportionate numbers of low-income and ethnic minority students, Idyllwild's mountain setting offered a unique experience for many of them.

But why Idyllwild, how did the camp come into being, and where did that odd name originate?

Institute-Fiesta was the brainchild of Ann Lay, who ran the program throughout its nearly 40 years of operation. She and her husband Roy were originally from Beaumont, which likely acquainted her with Idyllwild.

Around 1940, they settled in West Riverside (now Jurupa Valley), where Roy owned a confectionary and variety store with a soda fountain.

Ann had long been involved in civic and political affairs, especially the Federation of Women's Clubs and the Republican party, and she habitually rose to leadership positions. But her life took a decisive turn after 1943, when she became a Gray Lady at March Field.

The Gray Lady Corps was a non-medical Red Cross hospital auxiliary. During World War II, it expanded to offer recreational activities also at military installations.

As director of the March Field unit, Ann devised a project in 1950 called the Riverside Armed Services Center, which arranged recreation to connect airmen with everyday life in nearby communities.

The first outing Ann planned exploited her familiarity with Idyllwild. In 1951, collaborating with the local Izaak Walton League, she brought 14 men and one woman here to camp in the state park, take in a community campfire and a Woodsman's Breakfast, then hike Devil's Slide to Tahquitz Valley.

At year's end, Max Krone hired Ann and Roy Lay to manage the Idyllwild Inn, which was briefly owned by ISOMATA. This lasted just long enough for Ann to bring the Federation of Women's Clubs of Riverside County to the ISOMATA campus for its annual meeting.

Then, in 1954, ISOMATA hosted the federation's four-day "Clubwoman's Institute-Fiesta," a social and


or live on this mountain bear the responsibility to maintain our property under the direction and language of Public Resources Code Section 4291. This is the law governing property fire abatement.

PRC 4291 fuel reduction and required clearances serve several purposes. The obvious one is to reduce or prevent the easy spread of fire to our homes. Another would be reducing the amount of readily ignitable material, slowing the spread of fire to adjacent land and structures.

This is where we can all benefit from each other's abatement work. There are often unseen positive advantages to having good clearance around your home. When firefighters are assigned to do structure protection, the decision to defend and protect certain properties is made with consideration for their own safety first.

The next decision is the defensible space, make-up of the home and topography of the area. Give yourself, your neighbors and firefighters a chance the next time we're threatened by a fire.

educational conference that exploited Idyllwild's strength in the creative arts.

Ann's cumulative experience with Idyllwild and with both women's and military affairs prompted her in 1959 to create Idyllwild Institute-Fiesta. It operated initially at a location on Marion View Drive. In 1965, it moved to Four Chimneys, the compound on Delano Road built in 1934 as an elaborate vacation retreat by Hollywood director Al Santell.

As Institute-Fiesta matured, it developed community ties through events like an annual home tour, the project that would later be revived as an enormously successful fund-raiser by the Idyllwild Area Historical Society.

Ann Lay's contributions to Idyllwild were recognized in 1994 by her selection as grand marshal of the 4th of July Parade. She continued to run Institute-Fiesta until her death in 1997. Her final wish was that the Center for Prayer Mobilization be given use of the facilities, an arrangement that continues to this day.

Covered Cal offers extension of 2015 enrollment

Will help minimize future tax penalty

Covered California is offering a special enrollment opportunity for consumers who did not know or understand there was a tax penalty for being uninsured in 2014 or who learned they may face the tax penalty for 2015.

"For the first time, health care and taxes now are linked arm in arm," Covered California Executive Director Peter V. Lee said. "The law requires everyone to be insured, and if you're not, you may face a significant financial penalty when you file your taxes this year."

Until April 30, 2015, consumers are eligible to apply for health coverage during special enrollment by attesting that they did not realize there was a tax penalty.

To attest to this fact, they can select "Informed of Tax Penalty Risk" when filling out an application at CoveredCA.com.

The new tax penalty for being uninsured — known as the "shared responsibility payment" — motivated many consumers to purchase insurance this year during the November to February open-enrollment period via Covered California.

Unfortunately, many people who are supposed to purchase insurance may be unaware of the penalty and surprised when they go to their tax preparation professional for help.

"We don't want anyone to feel blindsided by the shared responsibility payment," Lee said. "That's why we are establishing this limited-time, special-enrollment that builds on the broader availability of coverage for Californians who have a change of circumstance making them eligible outside of open enrollment.

"If you didn't realize the tax consequences of not having insurance, you can enroll in a Covered California plan ... until April 30."

The tax penalty aside, Californians who have a life-changing event — for example, having a baby, getting married, losing their health-care coverage because they have changed jobs or moving to another area — can qualify for a special-enrollment period through Covered California.

They can sign up for coverage as long as they do so within 60 days of the qualifying life event.

For the first time, consumers filing their taxes this year may be paying a penalty for not having health insurance. And the penalty for going without insurance in 2015 will go up significantly, nearly doubling.

During the final weeks of open enrollment, Covered California served consumers who literally went straight from their tax adviser to a certified enroller after learning they would lose hundreds of dollars because they were uninsured in 2014.

"We know this will continue throughout the upcoming weeks as more and more people do their taxes and discover how this new era of health care works," Lee said.

"We don't want there to be any surprises, and we want to make sure that everyone who is eligible gets covered."

Consumers may enroll at CoveredCA.com and can find the nearest certified enrollment counselor or certified insurance agent to help them enroll. Consumers also can call the Covered California Service Center at 1-800-300-1506, where a representative will help them.

To get across the finish line for open enrollment, with coverage effective March 1, however, consumers cannot enroll without the help of an agent, a counselor or Covered California Service Center.

Last week, U.S. Rep. Dr. Raul Ruiz (D-CA 36) and Rep. Jared Polis (D-CO 2) announced the introduction of H.R. 1009 to target disaster relief funds to victims of wildfire so the communities are ensured they have access to the same resources as victims of other natural disasters

The proposed legislation is slightly different than Ruiz's bill H.R. 3992 in the 114th Congress.

"As the drought in California continues, our forestlands and surrounding communities are at an even greater risk of wildfire destruction," said Ruiz. "This bipartisan, pragmatic bill takes critical steps to proactively provide firefighters with the resources necessary to protect communities in the aftermath of a wildfire, and help stop the next fire before it starts — to save lives, property and resources."

Republican co-sponsors of the bill include Don Young of Alaska and Paul Cook of California and Yucca Valley. The bill has been referred to the Subcommittee on Eco-

nomic Development, Public Buildings and Emergency Management.

Under current law, victims of wildfires aren't eligible for the "post-disaster" mitigation resources that victims of other natural disasters, such as hurricanes and tornados, are. These resources can be used to mitigate the effects of wildfires, such as post-fire flooding and mudslides, and prevent future fires. Funds for these purposes has been shown to be particularly effective — it's estimated that every dollar spent on mitigation saves \$4 in future disaster costs.

Under this bill, states, tribes and local communities would be eligible to receive mitigation assistance grants for up to 15 percent of the total cost of fire suppression efforts regardless of whether a major disaster has been declared or not. This extra amount for mitigation is cost-shared on a 75 percent federal and 25 percent state/local basis

"As a representative, nothing frustrates me more than when I tour the aftermath of a wildfire, see the ruins of houses in communities near Fort Collins and Boulder, and then find out that the federal government has refused to provide disaster relief because of a technicality," said Polis. "This bill will ensure that those people or communities that have been devastated by wildfires will have access to the resources and relief that every other natural disaster victim can receive to rebuild their homes, towns and lives."

"I congratulate representatives Ruiz, Polis and the bill's other cosponsors for introducing this bipartisan legislation," said Fire Chief G. Keith Bryant, International Association of Fire Chiefs president and board chair, in a press release. "This bill will help communities that recently had to deal with the tragedy of a wildland fire to mitigate the effects of flooding, mudslides and other disasters that could result after the fire. I urge Congress to move quickly to pass this legislation."

The Wildfire Prevention Act of 2015 is supported by IAFC, the International Association of Fire Fighters, the National Association of Counties and the National Fire Protection Association.

Local forest officials seeking public assistance for grant requests

San Bernardino National Forest recreation managers are seeking public comments on their proposals for the 2014 and 2015 State of California Off-Highway Vehicle grant program.

The state requires public comments to submitted from Tuesday, March 3, through Monday, April 6.

The state uses a three-step application process to allow public comment and feedback before final submittal. In February, the Forest Service solicited, received and considered public recommendations during the development of the preliminary grant applications, which were due March 2, 2015.

The second public review and comment period is open now. The Forest Service will review and consider the public comments and then submit its final grant applications on May 4.

At this time, SBNF is soliciting public input specific to the forest's 2013-14 grant application proposals for Cooperative Agreements with the Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation Division. The public is encouraged to provide constructive criticism and/or suggestions to enable SBNF to better its program.

SBNF will submit five preliminary grant applications. The grants include projects for ground operations, law enforcement, development and restoration. Preliminary applications are available online at the California State OHV Grants and Cooperative Agreements program (www.ohv.parks.ca.gov).

Grants for the ground operations and law enforcement will benefit the San Jacinto District, according to John Ladley, the district's supervisory natural resource specialist.

"The ground operations help us with the day-to-day work such as trail maintenance and repair, visitor education and signage," Ladley said. "This is the piece I really use."

structions for accessing the preliminary application and submitting comments. Comments must be submitted via email to both the OHMVR Division and the SBNF. Comments to the national forest should be submitted to Al Colby at acolby@fs.fed.us and to California State Parks by using the "Grants" tab at www.ohv.parks.ca.gov .

State regulations require annual public participation in this fund-allocation process. The agreements support OHV management activities on the national forest, including operations and maintenance, restoration, law enforcement, and education and safety.

In 2014, the forest was successful in obtaining more than \$600,000 in grant funds, which helped provide the public with world-class OHV recreation opportunities.

Plastic bag ban suspended until voters decide

The ban on using plastic bags in California has a reprieve, at least until November 2016. Last week, officials for the state's Secretary of State office confirmed that opponents of the plastic bag ban gathered enough signatures to secure a place on the November 2016 general election ballot for a referendum on the continued use of plastic bags.

Election officials confirmed that more than enough signatures were gathered to place the referendum on the future of the bags on the ballot so that state voters will decide the disposition of the bags.

The referendum now suspends the law, Senate Bill 270, passed this fall and that Gov. Jerry Brown signed on Sept. 30, 2014. SB 270 banned the bags from use in larger stores beginning in July 2015. In July 2016, the ban would extend to convenience food stores, food marts and entities engaged in the sale of a limited line of goods. These are all suspended until November 2016, when voters will approve or reject the bill.

Local ordinances that banned the plastic bags — such as in Palm Desert and Palm Springs — will not be affected by the 2016 referendum.

In order to qualify for the ballot, the ban on single-use plastic bags referendum needed 504,760 valid petition signatures, which is equal to 5 percent of the total votes cast for governor in the November 2010 gubernatorial election. A referendum can qualify via random sampling of petition signatures if the sampling projects a number of valid signatures greater than 110 percent of the required number. The plastic bag ban referendum needed at least 555,236 projected valid signatures to qualify by random sampling, and it exceeded that threshold.

Recent motorcycle fatalities on local roads underscore speed risks

Recent motorcycle fatalities on mountain roads, two within six days, underscore an ongoing problem of irresponsible motorcyclists riding winding roads at unsafe speeds.

Three fatalities and nine incidents in less than four months (from Oct. 5, 2014 to Feb. 21, 2015) represent a significant increase over previous years.

In 2012, there were 18 motorcycle collisions for the whole year on Hill roads but no fatalities. In 2011 there were 14 incidents and no fatalities. In 2010 there were 24 incidents and three fatalities.

CHP Public Information Officer Darren Meyer connects the uptick in the economy with more motorcycle traffic on Hill highways and as a result more serious incidents. "More people have discretionary money and may be spending it on motorcycles," he posited.

But Meyer cautioned that Idyllwild's economy benefits from responsible motorcyclists and that there is a fine line in how to regulate and patrol. "We will ramp up enforcement, using aerial surveillance and education targeting motorcycle clubs," said Meyer.

Statistics show, the problem has existed in the past at similar levels and has not gone away.

By comparison, in 2008 prior to the economic downturn, motorcycle collisions on highways 243 and 74 claimed five lives, with three fatalities occurring within one month of each other. In all cases in 2008 but one, and in all of the nine incidents within the last four months, motorcyclists were found at fault from driving at unsafe speeds and crossing over the double yellow line.

In 2008, California Highway Patrol Office Daryl Crandall, reporting officer on the incidents, said, "The roads don't cause crashes; the roads are well marked. All they [the cyclists] have to do is take heed to the advisory signs."

Of the most recent incidents at the end of 2014 and the beginning of 2015, in addition to the fatalities, riders sustained major injuries in two, three with minor injuries and one with no injuries.

CHP Public Information Officer Darren Meyer said his office is working with Caltrans on a variety of means to educate and deter motorcyclists from operating in unsafe ways on mountain roads. Caltrans discussions are underway on removing debris from mountain roads, sweeping gravel and installing additional signage.

Eyewitnesses at the recent fatality noted that the woman killed was wearing a GoPro camera on her helmet. CHP cannot yet confirm either that she was wearing the camera or that, as some eyewitnesses reported, that there were regular "races" from Hemet to Idyllwild.



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Pulitzer Prize-winning photographer to judge artist show

Rick Rickman, author, documentarian and Pulitzer Prize-winning photographer, will judge the upcoming Art Alliance of Idyllwild Eye of the Artist art show and fundraising auction on Saturday, March 7.

Rickman won the Pulitzer for team coverage of the 1984 Olympics held in Los Angeles. Working for the Orange County Register, Rickman shared the award with fellow OCR photographers Brian Smith and Hal Stoelzle.

Eye event organizers Kirsten Ingbretsen and Les Walker snagged Rickman as judge for the event. Walker, himself an award-winning photographer, has long known Rickman and worked with him frequently in the past. "It's the first time a Pulitzer winner has judged an AAI event," said Walker.

Rickman's work has been featured on the covers of both Time and Newsweek. His project and documentary work have appeared in publications including National Geographic, Life, Sports Illustrated and Smithsonian.

Rickman said he started late as a photographer because he was on his way to dental school to become a dentist before he caught the photography bug. "I became a photographer because I couldn't draw and I always wanted to find a way to express myself visually. I love telling stories and this was a great medium to do that."

He spent the first 12 years as a photographer at the Colorado Springs Sun, Des Moines Register and the OCR before launching his own photography, documentary and publication career. One of his passions is photographing and telling the stories of senior athletes and adventurers who push their limits to defy conventional wisdom of what it means to age. His book, "The Wonder Years: Portraits of Athletes Who Never Slow Down," was coauthored with Donna Wares (Chronicle Books, 2009) with a forward by Olympian gold medalist figure skater Peggy Fleming.

Asked what he would be evaluating as he judges AAI entrants, Rickman said, "I'm a big fan of aesthetic value. When you see a piece, does it make you feel something? You read words but you feel pictures [and fine art]. That's what I'll be looking for."

Eye of the Artist 2015 starts at 6 p.m. and continues until 9 at the Caine Learning Center, 54385 Upper Pine Crest in Idyllwild. There is no admission fee, and there are opportunity drawings and a silent auction that afford attendees the chance to take home fine art by AAI member artists. 




Rick Rickman (left), Pulitzer Prize-winning photographer, who will judge the March 7 AAI Eye of the Artist art show.



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New policies increase adoptions at Living Free

Founded in 1980, Living Free Animal Sanctuary was among the first privately funded no-kill animal sanctuaries, with a mission of rescuing cats and dogs from imminent shelter euthanasia.

And in an effort to better acquaint the mountain communities with Living Free's mission, the board has inaugurated "town meetings," prior to board meetings. The next is scheduled from 10 to 11 a.m. Saturday, March 7 at the Living Free facility in Mountain Center. "We're wide open to having the town attend these sessions, to ask questions and get to know us," said President Randall Harris. "We want to be part of the community and less isolated."

He noted the board is now more involved in creating policy and in day-to-day management. As part of that, there is a concerted move to increase public awareness within the mountain communities and off-Hill through more outreach, new branding, and website and social media campaigns. "We're committed to full transparency in how we operate," said Harris. "Now 82 cents of every dollar we take in goes to animal-related services.

"We're also working more closely with ARF. There is no competition. One thing we have is no shortage of is animals who need help," said Harris.

Policy changes at Living Free have increased pet adoption rates, according to Harris. "Last year we broke adoption records for our 34-year history," said Harris. Staff now has more discretion in matching pets with prospective owners, leading to higher adoption rates. Where-

as in previous years, 25 cats and dogs might have been adopted in a single year, last year more than 200 animals found permanent homes.

Minor changes in adoption guidelines have made the difference, said Harris. Previous guidelines required a home to have a 6-foot fenced yard with a specified amount of space. "Now, there is a small-dog exception," said Harris, so smaller dogs can be adopted. "It's now on a case-by-case basis," Harris noted. "We will try to find a match for you." He stressed some fixed guidelines that cannot be altered, such as forbidding de-clawing of cats or allowing them to be adopted into mountain homes where they're allowed to go outdoors.

Also adding to increased adoptions, Harris cited construction of a puppy quarantine facility and a "kittery," allowing LF to take in young puppies and kittens and keep them isolated, monitored and medically treated until ready for adoption. "We dedicated a chunk of resources to building these new facilities so we could take in these young animals," he said.

Harris said LF rescues animals from kill shelters, saving them from euthanasia. "For every animal you adopt from Living Free, you save two lives — the one you take home and the one that can now fill the space your compassion has created," he said. Www.living-free.org notes that each year, 7 million cats and dogs are abandoned to shelters and 4 million killed. The 4 million represent 3 percent of animals bought annually from breeders, retailers and puppy mills. If that 3 percent were rescued animals rather than ones purchased, there would be no euthanasia, says the site.

Soroptimist's event focuses on human trafficking

Soroptimist International of Idyllwild will feature Opal Singleton, president and CEO of Million Kids (www.millionkids. org) and training and outreach coordinator for the Riverside County Sheriff's Anti Human Trafficking Task Force at a Wednesday, March 18, event. Singleton will present "Seduced: The Grooming of America's Teenagers" as part of Soroptimist's focus on the growing crisis of human trafficking in Riverside County.

The event is a fundraiser and silent auction with the themes of educating and ultimately eliminating human trafficking. Singleton notes in her presentation that contrary to popular belief, 72 percent or three out of every four young women pressed into human slavery in California are U.S. citizens. "Gangs can sell a gun once but can sell a woman many times," said Singleton. "Pimps can make \$150,000 to \$180,000 a year selling one young girl." She said all

parents should be concerned about the growing threat in Riverside and San Bernardino counties as illustrated by a January 2014 headline in the San Diego Union Tribune noting human trafficking had replaced gang drug sales as the highest generator of gang income in the county.

She will speak about how predators identify young targets through social media and online gaming, and how they groom and recruit them in the Inland Empire.

Singleton's mission is to educate — speaking to nonprofits and faith-based organizations about how they can create programs to protect youth most at risk.

The event, "Celebrating Women in the Arts," begins at 5:30 p.m. with a wine reception and silent auction at the Rainbow Inn at 54420 South Circle Drive, followed by Singleton's presentation at 6:30 p.m. Tickets are \$20, available at the door or at Prairie Dove and Muir Mountain Realty. He reached two-thirds of the greens in regulation and needed 1.708 putts per green. 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






65 years ago - 1950

Stone's legislation would limit boards' payback

By J.P. CRUMRINE News Editor

Sen. Jeff Stone (R-Riverside County) introduced legislation that will reduce political patronage and save the taxpayers of California several million dollars.

Where allowed by law, Senate Bill 281 will set the annual salary of members of more than a dozen state boards and commissions at \$12,000 annually. Currently appointed members of these often part-time boards are paid salaries that can reach more than \$120,000 per vear.

On the same day Stone introduced his legislation, Gov. Jerry Brown appointed a former state senator, Ellen Corbet, to the California Unemployment Insurance Appeals Board and her annual salary will be \$128,109.

"Californians are being taxed more than ever before, and our students at UC and CSU campuses are staring at tuition increases," said Stone. "It seems tone-deaf that we are paying large salaries to people on boards and commissions who too often have little experience other than being termed-out legislators."

Most people on these boards are doing a great service to the people of California, Stone said. However, in some cases these appointments are used as a way of taking care of former legislators by offering them high-paying positions in areas where they have little expertise.

"People who serve in these largely part-time posts should treat their appointments as a public service instead of a full-time patronage positions," Stone said.

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Idyllwild Fire may change election dates

The traditional late August special district election of fire commissioners may change in a few years. Idyllwild Fire Protection District President Jerry Buchanan asked his colleagues to consider a proposal to shift IF-PD's future elections to November general election bal-

"It would give a better opportunity for more people to vote," Buchanan said. "August is a typical vacation time.'

The November elections in even-numbered years alternate between presidential and gubernatorial elections, which have traditionally generated greater turnout than the late-summer mail-in elections.

Even though state and county turnout was historically low for the 2014 election, 63 percent of Idyllwild registered voters went to the polls in November. A total of 965 ballots were cast in the Idyllwild precinct four months ago compared to the about 591 in IFPD's 2013 election.

The average number of Idyllwild registered voters casting ballots in the four general elections since 2008 was 1,310 compared to an average of 652 ballots cast in the past four IFPD elections.

The actual cost to conduct the election, about \$4,000, would not change. The district will have to pay about \$800 for a one-time notice to voters of the change in the election procedures, according to Buchanan.

The Riverside County Board of Supervisors must approve the change before it is implemented, Buchanan said. Also, it would not change the election scheduled for this summer, August 2015. The first election for which it would apply would be the commissioners whose terms are to end in December 2017.

Commissioners Rhonda Andrewson, Jeannine Charles-Stigall and Nancy Layton were all elected for four-year terms in August 2013. If the election were moved to a general election, their terms would be extended until December 2018, an additional year, Bu-

The three-month period between the August election and the term beginning in December was Buchanan's second argument in favor the change. He felt this was a long time to wait until being sworn into office.

In financial business, the commission received its first actuarial study of current and future retiree healthcare costs. These type of studies are now required for all government levels, pursuant to the General Accounting Standards board.

If all the current employees continue their careers with IFPD until retirement and live an expected life span, IFPD's estimated total cost for retiree benefits will be about \$646,000. The consultant, Total Compensation Systems Inc., estimates the annual cost would be about \$40,000.

To amortize the total unfunded liability for retiree benefits (excluding pensions which IFPD funds through CALPERS), IFPD would have to set aside about \$46,000 annually, according to the study.

Fire Chief Patrick Reitz said the study's results would be incorporated into the district's 2013-14 audit, which he expects to be available at the March meeting.

"It gives us a base to start from and does give us more information if we want to refinance," he told the commis-

In other finance matters, the commission agreed to review the current year budget and make any needed adjustments next month, too.

The commission approved the appointment of Calvin Gogerty to the district's Finance Committee. Gogerty was formerly the alternate citizen member of the committee. An application for the alternate position will be available on the district's website, idyllwildfire.com.

The commission also reviewed the fire ambulance report for January. Andrewson again expressed some concern about the number of reported false alarms.

Reitz explained that limitations on the reporting system result in an over-reporting of the number of false alarms. In many cases, he said, "No one is in violation. It's regular ringing but for a valid reason." As an example, Reitz described a local establishment where the wind changed and brought some smoke in through another entrance activating the alarm, although there was neither fire nor smoke from burning material.

the other less than 25,000 miles compared to the district's ambulances which both have more than 100,000 miles, with one approaching 150,000 miles.

Another \$10,000 investment per ambulance will be needed to get them ready for use, including equipment, he estimated.

The district has sufficient cash reserves for the purchase, according to President Jerry Buchanan, who said in an email announcing the acquisition, successful "We currently have sufficient cash flow to handle the purchase if we decide to use our own funds instead of a loan or lease."

Reitz will investigate financing options over the next several weeks. If he identifies financing beneficial to the district. Buchanan said the commission will discuss it at the March meeting.

"If we choose to finance them, the chief will be coming back at the next meetand our best options. This

way we do not need to rush the process as financing is tough to hurry," he added.

When asked what will happen to the two existing ambulances, Reitz told the commission, "I'd like to keep at least one for reserve. The other can go down the road or equip for transport for the volunteers."
