Two rain storms predicted — only one arrived

Despite numerous forecasts of a strong El Niño arriving this winter, sometimes the actual weather surprises us. For several weeks, the National Weather Service's has forecast that there is a "... 95 percent chance El Niño will continue through the Northern Hemisphere winter 2015-16, gradually weakening through spring 2016."

Yet chances are not certainties. For example, the Hill experienced a mild rain storm about two weeks ago, on Sept 15. Then a larger and more worthy storm was predicted to arrive Tuesday, Sept. 22. For several days prior to that storm, the forecast warned of a 70 to 80 percent chance of much rain and possible flash floods. Barely a

Local experts counsel on land preparation prior to El Niño

Following a Tuesday, Sept. 1 Mountain Disaster Preparedness presentation and discussion of the possible effects of the coming El Niño, attention of attendees turned to erosion prevention and water capture.

MDP plans an additional symposium in November, date still to be determined, but given that rain may begin as early as October, the Town Crier interviewed several local experts to discuss what could be done to begin preparing for heavy rain and potential runoff and erosion.

Interviewed were Mark Taylor, My Ground, Tricia Pilkington, Natural Habitat Sustainable Living Systems and Julian and Deborah Geisinger, Tree and Landscape Consulting and Care.

All found consensus about balancing cost for land remediation with risk posed by the coming El Niño and the possibility that it may not be repeated frequently in coming annual weather patterns. Said Taylor, "You have to look at the cost of re-configuring your property, should it run in the thousands of dollars, with the costs of cleaning up afterward."

Each also agreed that the degree of

No role for Review board on renovation of building within Historic District

At last week's meeting, the Idyllwild Historic Preservation District's Local Review Board heard from its staff, Keith Herron, resources bureau chief, for the Parks and Open Space District, about work on a building within the district.

The site is the former Pony Express, and before that the Grey Squirrel, which Chris Johnston,

of Middle Ridge Winery, has purchased and is renovating. Herron said that he has met with Johnston and reviewed the plans for renovating the building.

"The building is within the district, but all the alterations are internal," Herron told the Board. "It doesn't pertain to us."

When Johnston applied for his planning permits, the county's planning department referred him to Herron, in case a Historic Alteration Permit would be needed. After reviewing the plans and meeting with Johnston, Herron concluded that the work did not require any involvement from the LRB.

In summary, LRB Chair Warren Monroe said, "We have no action."

The Board also discussed its plans for the Mills Act meeting, which took place Tuesday evening at the Idyllwild Library. Herron confirmed that notices for the meeting had been mailed to property owners within

the District. Monroe confirmed that several had already responded with interest.

Herron will discuss the IHPD guidelines, explain the procedures for using the Mills Act, and provide a copy of the Riverside City ordinance implementing it, as well as an example of its application to property tax. The Mills Act provides property tax relief to an owner in exchange for an equivalent investment in the historic property. The owners commit to restore, rehabilitate, repair and preserve the historic property.

The meeting's purpose is to discuss the benefits of the Act for IHPD properties and what the process might encompass. All properties within the Idyllwild Historic Preservation District that have been designated as contributing to its historicity would be eligible.

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Idyllwild Fire receives grant money

Will consider strategy plan committee

While the Idyllwild Fire Protection District Commission deferred reviewing its financial position for fiscal 2015-16 at last week's meeting, financial matters were the crux of the actions taken and discussed during the session.

Fire Chief Patrick Reitz asked the commission to approve a resolution authorizing the district to use funds from a Volunteer Fire Assistance program grant. The State portion of the matching grant is \$7,735.

With the grant and district matching funds, handheld radios, fire pagers, and helmets (both for structure and wildland fires) will be purchased before the end of the fiscal year in June. The equipment will benefit all of the department's firefighters, but primarily the volunteers and reserves.

Reitz also announced that the district's costs, thus far, from helping with the fires raging in Northern California, have exceeded \$250,000. While the reimbursement funding has not been received, he still expects much of it to arrive before the fiscal year ends, next June.

Also the district's negotiating committee, composed of Commission President Jerry Buchanan, Commissioner Rhonda Andrewson and Chief Reitz, held a session with

the career firefighters on Sept. 14 and also discussed strategy in a closed session at the end of the meeting.

"We're continuing negotiation with the career firefighters and hope to rapidly bring it to fruition," Buchanan said.

Finally, the commission discussed the possibility of establishing an ad hoc committee to formulate or plan district goals.

"Do we want a committee? Over the years, we have had goals for the chief, but not district goals," Buchanan asked. "Perhaps we could use a community forum in the process?"

"I'm for it and volunteer," said Andrewson. She added that the "ideas" should be run through the District's finance committee, but she sees long-term and short-term goals, especially to raise more revenue.

In response, Buchanan asked her to draft a design or purpose for the committee and what it might do. Expecting a full commission attending the next meeting (Commissioners Nancy Layton and Jeannine Charles-Stigall were absent), he plans to continue discussion the topic in October.

Also there was a discussion of how the district might show its gratitude to the former paid-call firefighters. This unit was abolished several years ago. But over time nearly 80 community residents had been associated with the unit.

"The paid call go back a long way," said Commissioner Larry Donahoo. "For those with more than 10 years involvement, they received a plaque, a fireman's ax and

thanks for their service."

There were three to four members, whose service exceeded 75 to 85 years, when the unit was eliminated, according to Donahoo. Chief Reitz stressed that whatever form of recognition is chosen, district funds cannot be used for this purpose.

The commission also announced that "[it] has completed the annual evaluation of Chief Reitz. The evaluation was very positive and the board wishes to thank the chief for his continued service."

The annual open house during fire prevention week is scheduled for 10:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., Saturday, Oct. 10 at the Idyllwild Fire Station, Reitz announced.

Palm Springs Tramway re-opened Saturday

Two-week shutdown for upgrades and refurbishment

The Palm Springs Aerial Tramway reopened as scheduled on Saturday, Sept. 26, after its annual two-week maintenance shut-down. The first tram went up at 8 a.m., the last tram returned at 9:45 p.m. Trams leave at least every 30 minutes on the hour and half-hour.

Completed projects this year include rebuilding the main gearbox, changing two large counterweight sheave bearings at the mountain station, shortening the upper haul rope, and starting construction of a new valley station domestic water storage tank, along with annual cleaning and refurbishment at both tram stations.

"We are now ready and excited to begin our 52nd season," says Tramway Vice President of Sales & Marketing Nancy Nichols.



Before Our Time

SOMETIMES HISTORY NEEDS CORRECTING ...

Fifteen years ago this month, a group of local residents created the Idyllwild Area Historical Society, dedicated to collecting, preserving and sharing evidence of our past. The society now has a loyal base of nearly 300 memberships scattered across the country, its own wholly owned museum campus, and a growing collection containing some 10,000 documents, photos and other artifacts.

Building on the foundation laid by John Robinson in his ground-breaking 1993 account of the San Jacinto Mountains' history, an increasingly detailed picture of how our area came to be is continually unfolding. It's an endless process of both discoveries and disappointments.

For example, three years ago I wrote in this column about Chauncey and Marie Rankin Clarke, one of Southern California's wealthiest families. During 1924-25, they bought 10 acres of hillside land on Marion View Drive and built "Burley Oak," as they called their Idyllwild retreat. Upon Marie Clarke's death in 1948, Claremont Graduate University inherited her estate.

My interest in identifying the property was sparked by a museum visit from the daughter of a former employee at the Clarkes' La Quinta ranch. Her donated 1931 home movies, together with old Idyllwild Breezes newspapers and a 1928 Idyllwild Inn publicity brochure containing a map

locating all the structures in town eventually led me to a distinctive old house that seemed to fit. Its current owner even recalled that the Clarkes had built it.

Alas, during this year's annual IAHS Home Tour, we found that the current owner of a different property, "Rock Hill," has documents proving that it is actually the old Clarke place.

Concurrently, the daughter of a former owner contacted the Town Crier, objecting to misinformation in its advance story of the tour. From her and articles in the new online Town Crier archive, I learned that her parents, Mary and Louis Gast, bought the property from Claremont in 1953. They renamed it Rock Hill Lodge and offered food and lodging for vacationing tourists.

In 1955, the Gasts were caught up in the long-running Idyllwild controversy over liquor licenses. Many residents and religious camps took pride in being "the only resort in California without a single bar," so they enlisted the County Board of Supervisors in a successful campaign to have the State Liquor Control Board deny the Gasts' application. Mary Gast soon fell ill and the family was forced to close and put the

property up for sale.

Although human memory is fallible, it does provide good stories and a feeling for former times. In that spirit, and recalling the all-day panel discussion in 2000 that inspired its creation, IAHS will mark its 15th anniversary this month. From 2 to 4 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 24, at the Idyllwild Library, a panel of longtime Hill residents will share their memories of earlier times, followed by an open house at the IAHS museum.

The event will provide a rare opportunity for the public to see inside the Frank and Mabel Moote Archive & Research Center, where the IAHS collection is preserved and researched to recapture the tales you've read here.

Farewell to credit card swipe and sign

Hello to new credit card readers starting Oct. 1

Editor's Note: This rollout of new credit card technology will be gradual. The Town Crier will follow it as it progresses and will be interested to hear from both merchant and card user issues as they develop.

Beginning Thursday, Oct. 1, in order to tamp down credit card fraud, United States credit card giants MasterCard, Visa, Discover and American Express will begin transitioning to a system currently in place in Europe — a system that has dramatically reduced fraud costs to credit card issuers.

Rather than swipe and sign in face to face transactions, a ritual as familiar to U.S. consumers as handing over cash, MasterCard, Visa, Discover and American Express credit card users will transition to what is called the EMV system ("Europay, Mastercard, Visa").

The new system is hinged on three key factors: use of credit cards with an embedded microchip containing se-

curity data, not a magnetic stripe; a credit card reader into which credit card users insert their card — a reader that can authorize the transaction independently from having to communicate with the issuing bank's systems; and entry of a customer's pin number. During the transition in the U.S., even with EMV cards, both chip and pin and chip and signature transactions will be allowed, depending on the verification method tied to the EMV card. The mandatory entry of a pin, standard in Europe, will not be required immediately in the United States. The reason for the change, which adds new key security factors to purchases, is that the United States currently accounts for more than half of credit card fraud worldwide — fraud charges that credit card issuers have largely had to assume.

The key difference with the two cards is that data in magnetic strips can be copied, allowing counterfeiters access to information that can be used repeatedly for fraudulent transactions. With a micro-chipped card, every time the card is used for payment, the microchip creates a unique transaction code that cannot be used again. If a hacker stole the chip information from one specific point of sale transaction, a subsequent transac-

Skywarn heads next Mile High Radio meeting

Skywarn, an all volunteer organization that supports the National Weather Service Forecast Office in San Diego, will be the topic of next Thursday's, Oct. 8, Mile High Radio Club meeting in the conference room at the Idyllwild Fire Station.

"The public is always welcome," said Bill Tell, MHRC president.

Ed Sherman, the Riverside County coordinator for Southwest California Skywarn will discuss the program and its relationship with the NWS.

Skywarn was started in the 1970s to aid the NWS during severe weather. Although Skywarn spotters provide essential information for all types of weather hazards, the main responsibility of a Skywarn spotter is to identify and describe severe local storms.

The first step to becoming a Skywarn spotter is experience as a weather spotter. Both programs are sponsored by the NWS. The critical difference is the Skywarn spotters are more concern about the conditions, which the current weather is creating, not simply what the weather is doing. Their hazard reports, coupled with Doppler radar technology, and other data, have enabled NWS to issue more timely and accurate warnings for tornadoes, severe thunderstorms and flash floods.

Anyone with an interest in public service and access to communication, such ham radio, may join the Skywarn program, according to Sherman. And he stressed they are not storm chasers.

A Garner Valley resident, Sherman will get in his four-wheel drive SUV and drive to Humber Park to measure the snow depth in order to report it to the NWS in San Diego.

"It's something the NWS needs — ground truth," Sherman said. "It's real time on the ground data, not radar. We can verify the conditions. These citizen volunteers help confirm the situation for San Diego."

And Sherman added that more Skywarn spotters are needed and it is not necessary to be an amateur radio op-

erator. About 225 volunteers are in the Riverside County unit, the majority of those are weather spotters.

In Riverside County, the MHRC's Mountain Radio Network, with repeaters in Pine Cove and on Santa Rosa Peak, is a critical link connecting the eastern and western portions of the county, especially in severe weather, according to Tell.

"The new network includes the desert," Sherman said. "Now it is truly countywide — valley, mountain and desert."

In addition to linking the desert with the valley to the west, the local ham operators (RACES or Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service) are important cogs when a disaster, such as the Mountain Fire, occurs on the Hill. They serve the incident command unit and can help Idyllwild Fire stay connected, if their communication system falters, Tell added.

In addition to Skywarn, Sherman and Tell will offer a brief discussion of preparedness, including preparation of a plan and an emergency kit.

Sherman has 40 years of experience with public safety. Much of that has been in San Diego County, but now he is a Garner Valley resident and offers automated weather data on the web at garnervalley.com.

Idyllwild Water approves water tank inspection contract

At a special meeting, Idyllwild Water District directors approved a contract with Aquatic Inspections of Encinitas to inspect and to clean the district's water tanks.

"I've been working on getting the water tanks inspected and cleaned since last spring," General Manager Tom Lynch told the board. "These companies schedule work six to seven months in advance. But I'd like to accomplish this before winter."

Board President Jim Billman reported that the final pieces of information from the three bidders arrived after the September meeting. But to award the contract in order to complete the inspections and cleaning this fall, a decision could not await the Oct. 21 meeting.

Lynch recommended Aquatics, who submitted both the low bid and the most comprehensive response. For example, one firm would not provide written reports of the inspection results.

Unanimously, the board approved Lynch's recommendation to award a contract for nearly \$21,000 to Aquatics. In addition to the physical inspection of the inside of the District's 13 tanks, the cleaning will remove up to one inch of sediment from the tank floor.

Million Kids, county nonprofit, receives grant to combat human trafficking

Million Kids is a nationally recognized nonprofit organization working with the Riverside County Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force (RCAHT) combating child sex trafficking, labor trafficking, sex extortion and child pornography in our community. They were recently awarded a three year Department of Justice grant to assist the county anti-trafficking task force in training the public about how to keep youth safe from predators.

"This funding is critical in educating corporations, government agencies, school administrators, faith-based organizations and nonprofit groups about how traffickers operate and how to protect our community to keep our kids safe" said Opal Singleton, President and CEO of Million Kids. Million Kids has been serving Riverside County through education programs and public presentations for nearly five years and has trained tens of thousands of key individuals including parents and students about child exploitation.

Million Kids maintains a Facebook page ("Million Kids Riverside") that posts information about sex trafficking focused on cases in Southern California. They also feature a section on missing youths from Riverside County to assist parents in helping to locate their missing teens. The Facebook page is a significant resource

for the public to learn about human trafficking in our region.

Singleton recently authored a book "SEDUCED: The Grooming of America's Teenagers" to educate parents and grandparents about how teenagers are seduced and groomed through social media, chat rooms and online games. It is rated five stars on Amazon.com. Singleton stated, "I am grateful for the national attention this book is receiving because it is truly urgent that parents and grandparents understand the vulnerability for youth in an age where teens can be accessed by literally millions of strangers."

In addition to educating organizations in Riverside County, Singleton has appeared on radio and television shows across the nation and was recently featured as an expert commentator on the subject of child pornography on MSNBC related to the Jared Fogle (Subway spokesperson) case.

"We are grateful the Department of Justice has provided funding to Riverside County through RCAHT and Million Kids," said Singleton. "Human Trafficking is a hot bed issue in this county and we are committed to doing whatever is necessary to ensure we educate our community so they can be safe from predators."

The Idyllwild Master Chorale, now conducted by Robert Evans Holmes' son Dwight "Buzz" Holmes, will be the first musical ensemble to premier the Idyllwild Arts Academy's new state of the art Lowman Concert Hall when it presents its 40th anniversary "Winter Solstice and Jazz Fusion Concert" on Saturday, Dec. 19 and Sunday, Dec. 20.

The concert will be a return to tradition, honoring R.E. Holmes' vision by presenting the full Christmas version of George Frideric Handel's "Messiah," including the stirring "Hallelujah Chorus." Beginning in 1975, R.E. What began modestly grew to a chorus of 125 members, assembled from Holmes' years of choral conducting – with veterans of his ISOMATA Festival, Beverly Hills and Hollywood High School choirs returning yearly to Idyllwild to join Idyllwild Master Chorale singers accompanied by a full orchestra in annual presentations at Bowman Hall on the Idyllwild Arts campus. Singers even came from Ohio and Indiana, where Evans had conducted both college and high school choirs.

When Buzz Holmes received the baton from his father in 1987, he realized the best way to honor the tradition his father had built was to introduce change – what

his dad had built could not, without his father, be replicated in the same way.

Buzz began using a baroque version of the "Messiah" introduced at Covent Garden and usually accompanied by a chamber orchestra. That is the version that will be performed at Lowman Hall in December with a full chamber orchestra and some returning veterans of his father's choirs joining the present Idyllwild Master Chorale singers.

Said Buzz Holmes of the 40th anniversary concert, "Ever since I was a kid here in the 50s, my father and Max Krone [founder of Idyllwild Arts] had a dream of having a concert hall worthy of this community and this school. Now, with the opening of Lowman Hall and the Master Chorale's performance of the "Messiah," that dream will have come true. It will be our opportunity to sing again for all those who have sung before, honoring the many singers no longer with us who established this extraordinary tradition that my father began."

The 40th anniversary concert continues an old family tradition by building a new family tradition. Buzz Holmes, in changing the choir over his years of stewardship, has introduced new components – spring madrigal

concerts and musical theatre in the summer. The most recent innovation was to incorporate Christmas Carol pop and jazz segments – a "Winter Solstice and Jazz Fusion Concert" that introduced a new family of soloists, instrumentalists and fine artists who have made this concert a part of their holiday tradition – Marshall Hawkins and his jazz quintet, dulcet jazz chanteuse Sherry Williams, classical and Tormé tenor John B. Fleming, composer John L. Rodby who composes new contemporary holiday vocal and instrumental creations each Christmas, and fine artists from the Art Alliance of Idyllwild who mount a holiday art exhibition.

"Each concert weekend, beginning in 1975, had two concerts averaging from 250 to 300 attendees," said Holmes. "Over the years, that added up to about 20,000 people who have attended, as well as the many faithful singers and musicians that were part of these concerts. That is the tradition we will be honoring this December."

Dr. Marja Kay, classical singer dedicated to contemporary music

'I needed to become a singer'

Dr. Marja Kay developed many areas of expertise in her youth – 17 years of dance classes starting at 3, piano beginning at 6, singing and acting in theatre in high school, and all-around academic proficiency with particular strength in math. She performed well in all areas and always hit her marks.

"I had always sung," said Kay. "But at a certain point in high school I knew I needed to become a singer. My mother was very upset I went into music rather than math." But her academic excellence and musical talent served her well, earning her a full ride to Chapman University in Orange County as a Presidential Scholar. "Chapman didn't have a musical theatre component at the time, only classical vocal training," said Kay. "I really didn't like it [the classical emphasis] but my voice did." She continued to follow her voice.

Perseverance, part of Kay's makeup, paid off. In her second year of music history and theory at Chapman, she discovered modern music – Edgard Varèse's "Poème Électronique." "Modern music was where I found my niche," said Kay, "and all that math paid off, with 12 tone and microtonal music being so mathematical."

From Chapman University, Kay progressed to Cal Arts in Valencia where she obtained an MFA in multi-focus vocal performance. "Cal Arts was defining," she remembered. "They allowed you to push the envelope. I had so much to do." While there Kay began her special relationship with avant garde composers that led her to premier many new works for soprano including Michael Gordon and Richard Foreman's "What to Wear," Georges Aperghis' "Sextuor: L'Origine des espèces" and Anne LeBaron's "Wet."

Kay, with innate curiosity and animation, seems always in motion, interested in and moving on to some

exciting new career frontier. "I knew after Cal Arts I wanted to get a Ph.D.," said Kay. "I wanted to go to the Sibelius Academy in Finland [her family has Finnish roots]. They auditioned only two Americans. I was one. But I didn't get in."

Kay instead attended the University of York in Birmingham, United Kingdom, on recommendation of her Cal Arts mentor Jacqui Bobak and Bobak's mentor Bill Brooks, then at the University of York. While there she continued to develop her expertise in contemporary music including performances of works by Luciano Berio and Karlheinz Stockhausen. She was

one of the first at York to obtain a performance doctorate, in which she had to support her thesis with illustrative performances.

In interviewing Kay, one is impressed by her accomplishments, her knowledge of and dedication to her craft and her breezy self-effacing modesty, as if all that she has done and plans to do is "no big deal."

Upcoming for Kay in Los Angeles is a moveable opera, in which audience members are driven to venues where parts of the opera occur. Segments also occur in the cars in which audience members are driven. Called "Hopscoth, A Mobile Opera for 24 Cars," the innovative production is created by "The Industry," founded in 2012. It opens on Halloween weekend. Since its inception, The Industry has established itself as a breathtakingly original new force in the L.A. opera scene. Also on tap, Kay will be emcee and featured soloist at a Holiday Pops Concert with the Symphony of the Redwoods in Mendocino on Dec. 19.

In addition to her musical career, Kay has served and continues to serve in important administrative capacities: in the past as assistant to the music program and concerts box office manager at the University of York, site administrator for the Mendocino Art Center, and currently as assistant director of admissions and database administrator for the Idyllwild Arts Academy.

There is about Kay a sense of delight and merriment when she speaks – whether discussing her family life, her training, her performance career or her teaching. Of her teaching she said, "The voice is a unique instrument, as it involves the whole person rather than isolated muscles and vocal folds. In many ways it's similar to the training of an athlete. While I teach from a classical point of view, I embrace all styles and forms of vocal production, and feel that, ultimately, vocalists should always strive towards their particular goals." Just as she has.

Kay smiles easily and often and sparkles when she does.

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Dani Sanchez-Lopez joins IA Film as Cinematographer

'I would be happy if they learn to see'

Dani Sanchez-Lopez is an experienced teacher and cinematographer. He is two weeks into his new position at Idyllwild Arts Academy as a full-time member of the Film and Digital Media faculty. But what lends him an especially exotic flair is the pantheon of international destinations where he has studied, taught and worked professionally.

Born in Seville, Spain, Sanchez-Lopez has an MFA in cinematography from Chapman University in California and is working on a Ph.D. from the University of Seville. For the last four years he has lived, taught and worked as a cinematographer in the Indian subcontinent, in India and Pakistan. He has shot three features in the backyard of Bollywood: "Tamanchey," "Ishqueria," and "San Pachattar (Year75)," a political thriller that will be released later this year.

During this same period, he also shot several documentaries, including "The Journey Within" on the music scene in Pakistan as well as directing music videos and commercials in India and Pakistan. At the same time he served on the faculty of the film school attached to University of Mumbai, India and taught cinematography seminars at the Film and Television Institute of India. In addition to his obtaining his MFA from Chapman, Sanchez-Lopez also studied film and visual arts in Spain (University of Seville), the United Kingdom (University of Birmingham) and in New York (Cornell University). He has been professionally honored for his work at film festivals including Bozeman, Montana's HatchFest Film Festival and the Goldeneye International Festival of Movie and TV Cameramen.

Through it all, Sanchez-Lopez remains friendly, open, accessible and irrepressibly upbeat. His research interests are avant garde and edgy, including gender-based film genres such as Japanese animation and sexuality. He is interested, based on his extensive travels and diverse residencies, in societal norms and issues in different countries and cultures.

His commitment to film goes back to his early youth. "I was nine when I started acting," he remembered. "By the age of 11 I knew what I wanted to be and got my first camera." When offered the position at Idyllwild Arts, Sanchez-Lopez accepted quickly. "The moment I spoke to Annette [Haywood-Carter, IA film chair] on the phone, we just clicked," he remembered. "She told me how she was planning to change the program, apply industry standards and introduce the students to working professionals. And the school is an arts school. The students know what they want to do."

"You meet these kids, they are amazing. They all have a voice. My goal is to help them channel their voices so they can be themselves and tell their own story."

Sanchez-Lopez believes it's important for students to watch movies. "They should analyze films they watch so that they can understand the visual language and then learn to speak in visual images. I

would be very happy if they learn to see."

He said he is excited the department is in the process of obtaining new cameras, giving students opportunities to work with the latest equipment. Sanchez-Lopez is teaching four classes: Intro to filmmaking, lighting in film, cinematography 1 and production.

As an example of how he plans to help students find their individual voices, he spoke of the first exercise he gave his IA film students: create a 15 second video he calls a "Selfie." "It's a self-portrait of the most vivid memory they've ever had," he said. "It has to be their identity and their visual narrative but

they cannot be in it." The exercise is designed to encourage students to identify and film the images that best express who they are and the particular memory that illustrates their identity.

Sanchez-Lopez still has to return to India to pack up his house and move into his new Idyllwild home. He is looking forward to being settled in Idyllwild and becoming part of the community. His boyhood and professional background have grounded him in multiculturalism making him an especially appropriate fit for a school with a broad international profile and vision.

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Steele's 2015 and 2016 seasons

Although Brendan Steele didn't post a win this year as he did in the 2011 season, in many ways 2015 was the best season of his five-year PGA Tour career.

By the time he began the West Coast Swing in January, he already had amassed enough FedExCup points (172) to make it clear that just earning his ticket for next year (requiring about 500 points) was no longer the goal. Then he immediately added 167 points from a second-place at La Quinta to give him 339 points, still in January.

The native Idyllwilder displayed a new, relaxed confidence that gallery fans could sense right away — a feeling that he had arrived as an experienced pro who knew he belonged on the PGA Tour.

This season, Brendan posted 11 top-25 finishes, including four top-10s, while making the cut in 20 out of 24 tournaments — all personal bests. He finished the season with 1,204 FedExCup points, ranking 50th on the tour in that category — both personal bests. He also closed out the season ranked the 76th best golfer in the world on the Official World Golf Rankings — another personal best.

He made more than \$1.7 million in official PGA Tour winnings this year, second only to the 2011 season when he had a win that was worth more than \$1 million alone. And not showing in his official PGA Tour stats was Brendan's seventh place in the French Open on the European Tour in July, where he collected more than \$86,000 Euros.

Courtesy of Brendan, the Town Crier obtained the following interview:

Q. 2015 was a really fine season for you; in many stat categories your best. Even this past January, I sensed a new, experienced-pro confidence just watching you play. So, even though you had a win during 2011, does this 2015 season stand out as a break-through season for you in some ways?

A. I definitely see this year as a breakthrough season. I feel like I addressed some weaknesses in my game and improved my consistency a great deal. It is a long process that has included seeking the help of Chris Mayson for putting, practice and routine, Rick Smith for full swing, my trainer Brad Davidson and Dr. Jason Amstutz who keeps me healthy throughout the year. Six events ago I started working with Christian Donald as my caddie and I'm not sure how I managed without him. I have a great team around me and couldn't do it without their help as well as the help and support of [my wife] Anastassia, my parents, and all my friends and supporters. All of that adds up to a breakthrough year.

Q. What goals have you set for yourself for this coming 2016 season?

A. I like the goal of making the Tour Championship because it's a season-long goal and can keep you motivated all year. A win is definitely a goal. Continuing to improve and learn is always a big goal.

Q. Will you play in the French and Scottish opens again this year?


A. I'd definitely like to play the French and I'd think about playing the Scottish depending on my status for British Open. The schedule is different next year so we'll have to see how the early part of the year plays out.

Brendan's performance this year qualifies him for The Players Championship next May, and he may yet qualify for other top tournaments, depending upon his performance during the 2016 season.

Brendan currently has in mind to play the season-opening Frys.com Open in two weeks, Oct. 15 to 18, and to follow it up with fall tournaments in Las Vegas, Malaysia and Mexico — all official PGA Tour events.



The Idyllwild School bus, carrying 52 students from Hemet High School to Idyllwild, was struck head-on by another vehicle. The driver of the vehicle and her son were taken to the hospital. The school children were transferred to another bus that brought them up the Hill.

30 years ago - 1985

William Lowman, Idyllwild School of Music and the Arts (ISOMATA) executive director, made the announcement during an address on "The Next Five Years at ISOMATA" that the school would soon become the first private residential high school for the arts in the western United States.

25 years ago - 1990

The Idyllwild School music program was expanding. Eleven advanced instrumentalists began participating in a newly-created jazz band.

20 years ago - 1995

A rock climber who was "free climbing" survived a 200-foot fall and a Marine Corps helicopter ferried him from the wilderness at the base of Tahquitz Peak.

15 years ago - 2000

Students, parents, teachers and dignitaries were on hand as Idyllwild School had its ground-breaking ceremony for the new school addition, 100 percent funded by Proposition 1-A, the state school facilities program.

10 years ago - 2005

The film "18 minutes" by Alexis Echarria, late Idyllwild Arts Moving Pictures major, was screened at the 11th-annual Palm

Springs International Film Festival of Short Films. It was the first IA film to be so honored.

5 years ago - 2010

Marsha Lytle, former principal and lifelong jazz aficionado, was to be the next jazz fest chair. Planning the 18th-annual Jazz in the Pines had already begun, she said, although the 17th-annual Jazz in the Pines, a fundraising event for student scholarships at Idyllwild Arts, was only a month ago.

1 year ago - 2014

As October arrived, the expectation of Santa Ana winds — powerful, hot, dry winds that can turn a spark into a wild-fire — rose throughout Southern California and especially on the Hill. A collaboration among the U.S. Forest Service, San Diego Gas and Electric, and UCLA produced an index to classify the potential fire threat of these winds.





tion would not work because the coded transaction number could not be used again. The new transaction would be denied.

The shift on Oct. 1 is called in the industry "the liability factor." Beginning on that date, according to Mastercard's Carolyn Balfany, head of product delivery, whoever has the lesser technology will assume financial responsibility if there is fraud in face to face transactions. For instance, if a retailer is still using the old system, they can still run a transaction with a swipe and signature. But they, the merchant, will be liable for any fraudulent transaction if the customer has used a micro-chipped card in a face to face transaction. The opposite is also true. If the merchant has a

new terminal, but the credit card bank has not issued a chip and pin card, the issuing bank would be liable for any fraudulent transaction.

The "liability shift" is designed to move retailers and merchants to invest in the new technology as well as move card issuers to switch to chip and pin cards. As banks issue new chip and pin cards to consumers, they will explain use and benefits.

For merchants and fi-

nancial institutions, the change to EMV entails adding new in-store technology with internal processing systems and complying with new liability rules. For consumers, it means activating new microchip cards when issued and understanding new payment processes.

Smart Card Alliance estimates that 120 million American consumers have already received an EMV

chip card. That number of cards is projected to reach 600 million by end of 2015. The chip is a small metallic square on the card.

EMV card use is not as rapid as magnetic strip swiping. When the card is inserted into the reader, data flows between the card chip and the issuing financial institution to verify the card's legitimacy and create the unique transaction code.

For now, what is rea-

sonably clear is the liability shift. If an in-store transaction is conducted using a counterfeit or stolen card, the loss has in the past usually fallen on the payment processor or issuing bank. Starting Oct. 1, for MasterCard, Visa, Discover and American Express cards, the liability for "card present fraud" (used in face to face transactions) falls on whichever party is the least EMV compliant.

down slope leading directly to a residence or front door is a determining factor in deciding what to do – that protecting the front of the house from flooding and the foundation of the house from soil erosion that could undermine its stability are important factors to consider.

“A lot of managing erosion is slowing the water down, designing ways to slow the water down and receive it,” said Taylor. “If cost is the issue, do what must be done immediately. I like creating ‘chapters’ [segments that can be prioritized and added as needed].”

Julian and Debbie Geisinger talked of identifying where the water wants to go before deciding what to do to help prevent erosion. On property in Idyllwild with significant down slopes, recent rains have likely already established water courses. They suggested property owners look for those water courses and identify and remediate land to work with those already established courses. “It’s important to see where the water wants to go and create retention basins to help control the spillover,” said Julian. “That can be done with soil, with cedar logs and does not have to be an expensive proposition. A series of berms slows the

water down. Contour grading and natural materials are the most cost effective.”

Both Geisingers stressed the importance of identifying potentially hazardous water flow such as roof runoff that could undermine a structure’s foundation and creating fixes that prevent that erosion. They also agreed with Taylor that threats to the front of a house are the first priority on which to focus. “It’s cost-effective to do localized repair unless the front of your house is threatened.” Debbie stressed the importance of having duff mulch and native plantings in place to help slow erosion.

Pilkington, a permaculturist, agreed about identifying water courses. “The first tenet of permaculture is to observe where the wa-

ter is going,” she said. “The second is how to maximize capture for future use of the water. Earth moving is a very efficient way of capturing water. The more ecosystems you have, the more life proliferates. Maximize the efficiency of what’s present [on the land]. Keep the water on the land. Otherwise you are losing a resource that is going off the mountain.”

This article is not designed to give property owners answers. For that they must consult experts who can assist them in land remediation. What it is intended is to remind property owners that preparation before the El Niño is better than after it has begun.

drop of rain fell anywhere on the Hill.

The point is not that we should ignore weather forecasts, but sometimes the environment fools the models; the 20 to 30 percent negative chance sometimes turns up.

Residents should prepare for a very wet winter, not a drought-ending winter, but preparations should be taken now rather than after roads may become small streams.

The latest specific weather outlooks for the fall reports, “... strong and consistent signals ... support an area of favored above-median precipitation from far Southern California ... across the four-corners.”

Rainfall through September

The U.S. Forest Service’s Keenwild Ranger Station has recorded nearly 3.75 inches of rain since July 1, the start of the rain year. This is 50 percent more than the long-term average of 2.35 inches of rain through September.

Most of this rain came in July, when the precipitation was nearly five times the normal amount in July.

In Pine Cove, 4.6 inches have been recorded since July 1.

Even without any precipitation in October, the totals at Keenwild and Pine

Cove still exceed the historic average for rain from July through October, which is 3.4 inches of rain.

Looking ahead, the Hill may have a greater normal wet winter, “from [December and January] into [February and March 2016], the chances of above-median seasonal precipitation totals increases for California ... with probabilities exceeding 60 percent in parts of Southern California.”

Since the beginning of May, the Hill has received more than six inches of rain, which is almost four times the historic average of 1.6 inches for the three months from May through July.

gallons of water for the tree’s consumption.

“It was a fruitful discussion and good resolution,” Lynch shared. “It is similar to the offer to the Idyllwild Fire Department for water.”

The District regularly flushes its hydrants and the water would normally just flow down the street. But it can be

directed into a water tender and used for other purposes, such as watering the Community Christmas tree, Lynch said.

“We’re using water that would otherwise be wasted,” Billman explained. “They can store the water in a tank for use over time consistent with their watering plan.”

The amount would be about 500 gallons each time, and it happens about two or three times each month, he added.

“It’s an excellent solution to help the tree,” said Director John Cook.
