'No uniforms, no refs, no goals and no representation'

First Town Hall recreation kids' soccer game and, according to a Facebook post by Dawn Sonnier, there were "no uniforms, no refs, no goals and no [county] representation."

Sonnier posted this information on Monday, Sept. 30. Her post elicited a firestorm of negative comments from upset parents and others who wondered why they were paying \$40 for services and support that had, at least prior to the game, failed to materialize.

A subsequent Facebook post by Denise Sandlin De Rivera clarified that county reps showed up later and put equipment, without uniforms, in a storage shed.

Idyllwild Haunted Ghost Town relocates to Town Hall

Boasting larger, more fright-filled theme rooms and next door to an old building long rumored to have its own ghosts, Kathy Sacher-Wilson's Idyllwild Haunted Ghost Town has found a home that feels fright-right. Now in its 12th year, Ghost Town haunts the sprawling space behind Idyllwild's iconic Town Hall.

There are many clever new touches at the Town Hall site, with a physical layout and walk-through theme room progression designed by Tish Rylov and assembled by local contractor Jake Teel. Several in particular stand out for their added creep factor. Rylov designed

the walk-through with one open-ended room, the vampire saloon, directly abutting the outdoor Town Hall stage. As visitors enter the saloon, to the right on the raised stage will be eerily lit frenzied female vampire dancers (think Robert Rodriguez' 1996 chiller "From Dusk till Dawn"). Whether the lusty lovelies are real or imagined is for visitors to determine.

In the séance room visitors may experience goose bumps when the medium's predictions become too personal. And just as visitors thought they were clear of fear, as they finally exit the Ghost Town's malevolent maze, they must zigzag through a pen of hostile (well, we'll just leave the See *Ghost Town*, page 24

Brown declines to make drone use near fires a crime

On Friday Gov. Jerry Brown vetoed several bills affecting the use of unmanned aircraft—drones.

This included Senate Bill 168, which was unanimously passed in both the state Assembly and Senate, that would have regulated drones flying over wildfires or interfering with firefighting or emergency responders.

Essentially Brown objected to the establishment of new crimes. “This multiplication and partic-

ularization of criminal behavior creates increasing complexity without commensurate benefit,” he wrote in his veto message.

“Over the last several decades, California’s criminal code has grown to more than 5,000 separate provisions, covering almost every conceivable form of human misbehavior... Before we keep going down this road, I think we should pause and reflect on how our system of criminal justice could be made more human, more just and more cost-effective,” he concluded.

In August, the role of drones near emergencies was the subject of a state senate oversight hearing. This was a general hearing about a broad set of issues affecting regulation and use of this equipment.

Earlier in the summer, public safety agencies, particularly firefighters, were interrupted during emergencies. Firefighting aircraft needed in the Lake and North fires in San Bernardino County were grounded or delayed because of the presence of drones flying in the airspace over the

fire. In July, it was reported that a medical emergency helicopter was grounded in Fresno due to the proximity of a drone.

This summer, Cal Fire Director Ken Pimlott told the committee, “The most important and critical action is to address the serious threat posed by the irresponsible use of hobby drones in a fire area.” He added that more than a dozen hobby aircraft have interfered with emergency response efforts this summer.

Covered Cal open season begins Nov. 1

The open enrollment period for Covered California health insurance begins Nov. 1 and will continue through Jan. 31, 2016. Currently, about 1.4 million Californians obtain their health insurance through Covered California.

Dec. 15 is the last day to enroll in or change plans for new coverage to start January 1, 2016. The Open Enrollment pe-

riod ends Jan. 31, 2016, and enrollments or changes made after Jan. 16 will take effect March 1, 2016.

If an individual is not enrolled in a 2016 health insurance plan by Jan. 31, 2016, enrollment in a health insurance plan for 2016 will not be permitted unless the person or family qualifies for a special enrollment period. These circumstances normally involve a change in family status, such as marriage or birth of a child, or job related such as loss of other

health coverage.

In July, Covered California announced its 2016 rates. Statewide the average increase was 4 percent, slightly lower than the 4.2 percent increase for 2015. In the Inland Empire region, which is Riverside and San Bernardino counties, the average increase is only 1 percent.

In the Inland Empire region, all consumers will have a choice of at least two insurance companies to choose from and

some will have as many as five. For more details on the plans in specific pricing regions, see the booklet “Health Insurance Companies and Plan Rates for 2016,” posted online at www.CoveredCA.com/PDFs/7-27-Covered-CA-2016PlanRates-prelim.pdf.

The weighted average increase for Southern California consumers who stay in their current plan is 1.8 percent, while for consumers in Northern California it is 7 per-

cent. Consumers in Southern California can save an average of nearly 10 percent by switching to a lower-cost plan in the same metal (i.e., Gold, Silver, Bronze) tier.

Covered California’s 2016 Shop and Compare Tool is available online at www.CoveredCA.com/shopandcompare/#calculator. Consumers will be able to look at plans and products in their area and get a preliminary estimate of costs and premium assistance for 2016 coverage.

Historic District board presents Mills Act symposium

On Tuesday, Sept. 29, about 20 people turned out to hear County Historic Preservation Officer Keith Herron discuss a state program to provide tax rebates to owners of historic properties.

The Mills Act, enacted in 1972, provides up to 50 percent annual tax credits to owners of designated historic properties as part of a contractual agreement with property owners to remediate and maintain the upkeep and historic character of their properties. It is in effect in many jurisdictions throughout the state. Contracts are for renewable 10-year periods. Once entered into, Mills Act contractual obligations pass to new owners, with consequent benefits and restrictions, upon sale of the property. Mills Act contracts still in effect must be disclosed to potential buyers.

Herron explained that the Riverside County Board of Supervisors must pass an ordinance to participate in the Mills Act for use in unincorporated areas of the county such as Idyllwild. Currently Riverside County cities of Riverside, Corona and Palm Springs have Mills Act programs in place, as do many other cities such as Los Angeles, Redlands, Santa Ana and San Francisco.

Questions at the Sept. 29 meeting revolved around if and how the County Board of Supervisors might be moved to incorporate the program. Herron noted there are a number of avenues for Idyllwild Historic Preservation District property owners to petition the BOS for Mills Act adoption – through the local historic district review board, through the county historical commission, through the county planning department or directly to Third District Supervisor Chuck Washington's office. "I have made [Supervisor] Washington aware there is some interest," said Herron. "One property owner can start the ball rolling, that's really the first step."

There are around 50 properties within the IHPD designated as contributing resources of the district, having been judged to have historic significance and value. For properties to qualify for Mills Act contracts, they must be

listed on any federal, state, county or city register. Both owner-occupied historic residences and income-producing properties can qualify for Mills Act contracts. Even if an Idyllwild property is outside the historic district and has not been categorized as historic, owners can petition for stand-alone certification.

Herron suggested more Idyllwild historic district property owners who express interest in Mills Act adoption, the more likely the BOS would consider approving a resolution establishing the program.

Warren Monroe, local historic district board chair, suggested the BOS, in authorizing the Idyllwild Historic Preservation District, has already shown political willingness to protect Idyllwild's historical character.

Herron suggested that since Mills Act contracts are essentially an exchange (fewer tax dollars to the county in exchange for historic property maintenance by owners), it is likely few Mills Act contracts would be issued annually in Idyllwild even if the BOS adopts the program. Herron noted that in the large city of Riverside, only seven to ten new Mills Act contracts are approved annually. He posited the annual number in Idyllwild would likely be fewer, perhaps no more than five.

In the city of Riverside, the steps to enroll are: File an application with a non-refundable application fee. Once approved and the contract is recorded, a contract "initiation fee" is required. Accepted owners then must submit photos of the structure's current condition and file a 10-year rehabilitation plan.

Owners submit receipts for completion of projected plan rehabilitation phases. Significant financial penalties could accrue to Mills Act property owners if they default on their agreed maintenance plans and contractual obligations. Applicable California Government Codes stipulate cancellation fees of 12.5 percent of the current fair market value of the property, as determined by the county assessor, could be levied in the event of contract breach. Not all Mills Act programs are identical. An Idyllwild Mills Act program would adhere to basic state authorizing legislation but could differ in specific terms.

In response to one questioner who was already ready

to remodel, Herron stressed the Mills Act is not yet in place and no tax credits for maintenance or remediation of Idyllwild historic properties would be issued unless and until the Act is adopted by the BOS. When asked how long it could take to get the Act in place once property owners express interest and the BOS decides to move forward, Herron estimated six months to a year.

Herron provided handouts from other Mills Act districts and advised interested Idyllwild historic property owners to research the benefits and responsibilities under the Mills Act legislation adopted by California in 1972 and currently in effect in many state jurisdictions.

CA bill permits assisted death

Gov. Jerry Brown signed legislation that will allow terminally ill Californians to obtain medication to aid in dying, making California the fifth state to permit patients to terminate their lives. No longer will California "... make it a crime for a dying person to end his life, no matter how great his pain or suffering" after Brown signed ABX2-15.

Brown spent significant time studying the idea. He spoke with many people, both those who supported and opposed the bill, a Catholic bishop and doctors and other religious leaders. Ultimately, legal, religious and philosophical issues were subordinate to his own personal feelings and beliefs about the issue of assisted death.

"I have considered the theological and religious perspectives that any deliberate shortening of one's life as sinful ... In the end, I was left to reflect on what I would want in the face of my own death," he wrote in the letter confirming his signature of the bill.

"I do not know what I would do if I were dying in prolonged and excruciating pain. I am certain, however,

that It would be a comfort to be able to consider the options afforded by this bill," he concluded. "And I wouldn't deny that right to others."

Prior to announcing his decision to sign the bill on Monday, Oct. 5, Brown had neither discussed his position nor signaled where he leaned on the issue.

The bill's author, Assemblymember Susan T. Eggman, D-Stockton, said in a press release when the Assembly passed the bill, "It allows for mentally capable, terminally ill adults the option to request a doctor's prescription for aid-in-dying drugs to painlessly and peacefully hasten their death."

Certain conditions, such as two oral requests a minimum of 15 days apart and a written request signed by two witnesses, are necessary before the patient may have the drugs. His or her attending physician must refer the patient to a consulting physician to confirm diagnosis and capacity to make medical decisions. The individual must have the physical and mental ability to self-administer the aid-in-dying drug.

The bill passed in the Assembly on Sept. 9 by a 44 to 35 vote with one abstention. On Friday, Sept. 11, the Senate voted to pass 23-15 with two abstentions.

In his letter, Brown acknowledged that this legislation "is not an ordinary bill because it deals with life and death."

The California Prolife Council has already announced it plans to litigate the legislation. "Despite the efforts of our diverse coalition, the Governor has declared intentional killing as an alternative form of health care in California. ... The only option now is for court action. The bill cannot go into effect for 90 days," it stated in a press release after Brown's announcement.

Chief, noted county staff were trying to catch up after a series of personnel changes impacted recreation delivery. First was the decision of Town Hall recreation coordinator Richard Mozeski not to renew his contract when it expired. A new coordinator is presently being vetted. Brown estimated it could take as long as two weeks to a month to have the new coordinator in place. Second was the recent appointment of Marquese Howard as interim area manager to replace Ronald Donis. Howard, who has been with the county for over 10 years, is only three weeks into his new interim position.

Brown, apologized for county missteps. On Friday, Oct. 2 she stated in an email, "New equipment will be at the school today for the games. Uniforms should be in place by Monday. We are all working as a team to resolve the issues with the program and will be providing some additional items to the kids to make up for our blunders. We appreciate all of the parents, coaches and volunteers that are pitching in to help get this season put together. We are committed to continuing sports programs in Idyllwild."

Howard confirmed soccer uniforms would be delivered Monday, Oct. 5, and is coming to Idyllwild on Monday to speak with coaches

and Town Hall personnel. When asked who is going to guarantee that these kinds of missteps won't happen again, Howard said, "That would be me. I have to be the one responsible. Moving forward I can guarantee you will not see these problems happening with the basketball and future sports programs." He said he will be meeting with parents directly. "I need to understand what has historically been happening and how we can best address recent problems." Howard is planning to survey parents and others connected with Town Hall recreation either through a Town Hall meeting, written survey or both. "It's important we meet expectations," he said.

Bo Dagnall and wife Ginger have children in the recreation program and are usually actively involved in either coaching or managing several of the offered sports. Reached by telephone just as he was boarding a plane, Dagnall noted that over the four years he has been involved, recreation delivery, including scheduling and timely payment to sports coordinators has steadily deteriorated. "When Jeremy Teegarden was sports coordinator everything was predictable and consistent," he said. "Things just ran well. Uniforms and equipment were there. Schedules were clear. Since then problems have grown. I just want things to be OK. My wish list is to have a sports

Rain exceeds normal

This weekend's rainstorm was more typical of winter storm, when the jet stream drops south and conveys cold and low pressure across Southern California. About an inch of rain fell throughout the San Jacinto Mountains and temperatures Sunday and Monday fell enough that many longtime residents resorted to firewood to restore warmth.

The U.S. Forest Service's Keenwild Ranger Station recorded about 0.45 inches of rain from Sunday through Monday night. Bringing the total since July 1 to 5.3 inches, which is more than twice the long-term average of 2.35 inches of rain through September.

About half an inch was recorded at the Idyllwild Fire Station during Sunday's downpour and slightly

more than 0.8 inches at the Town Crier from Sunday through Monday night.

Farther north more rain fell, in Pine Cove, more than 1.1 inches fell, bringing the rain year total to 5.7 inches also. The Alandale USFS station recorded 1.06 inches and Vista Grande received almost an inch.

Even without any precipitation in October, the totals at Keenwild and Pine Cove still exceed the historic average for rain from July through October, which is 3.4 inches of rain.

The Monday El Niño forecast from the National Weather Service has not changed from its 95 percent chance of an El Niño that will continue through the winter and into spring 2016. However, several indicators have strengthened in the past two weeks.

I have never been stopped by police for taking my evening walk through a wealthy neighborhood, and I have never been arrested over a broken

tail light. I have never lost out on a job interview because my name sounds "too ethnic." My right to vote has never been questioned when I visit my polling place, and, given that this is Idyllwild, it even includes a hug from the poll worker. Win!

If I were a white person, I would understand that the highest form of patriotism is to demand equal treatment for all my fellow citizens in a land that claims to be founded on "liberty and justice for all." I would understand that there is more than one American experience, and I cannot assume that my reality applies to everyone else. I would have compassion for those who struggle. I would be angry that Dr. King's dream is still just a dream. I would understand that it is my responsibility to call out racism when I see it — even if it is in the local paper, even if it means that I no longer fly under the radar in a small town.

County to replace early warning system

Riverside County's new Emergency Management Department has issued a request for proposal to replace the current emergency warning notification system, commonly referred to as "reverse 911," with a new system. The current system became operational during the summer of 2007.

The RFP was released Sept. 28. The bids are due on Thursday, Nov. 5, and the County will hold a pre-bid question and answer session about the request on Oct. 7.

The County is seeking a unified countywide mass notification system. The system is expected to dispatch at least 250,000 notifications within the first 60 minutes. These messages will be sent as voice calls to landline and cellular phones, emails, and text messages or push notifications to mobile devices, including applications or apps.

Multiple languages are needed. And the system must support and interact with the Integrated Public Alert and Warning System, which is supported at the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

The contractor will manage the overall physical system, but the County will initiate any alerts or warnings.

Jac Jacaruso: love of music, family and a duality in career choices

Local singer/musician Jac Jacaruso is a warm and familiar presence in Idyllwild's music and art scene. There are two words that best describe Jacaruso, "duality" and "family" – "duality" in how his career has played out and "family" as the centerpiece of his life.

Born in Queens and raised in Brooklyn, Jacaruso remembers his parents as "the most loving and wonderful parents one could ever imagine." He recounts how his dad, who worked in a milk factory, was a music enthusiast who played very basic violin and accordion and listened to Tony Bennett albums all the time. "My dad would take out the accordion at family parties and we would all sing along," said Jacaruso. "We never had much, but one Christmas mom and dad somehow managed to offer my beloved brother and me a used acoustic guitar and a plastic snare drum to share."

For Jacaruso, that's when it began – his love of the guitar, the human voice and playing for others. Another seminal event that he describes as life changing for him and his brother, similar to a "lunar landing or a lightning bolt out of the heavens that altered our DNA" was watching the Beatles when they first performed on Ed Sullivan's television show. "The Beatles were revolutionary and really pushing hard against the morality of the times and their songwriting just opened me up to music in a big way," he recalled. "When the album 'Pet Sounds' came out by the Beach Boys, my love for the human voice got deeper with those beautiful rich harmonies, in a way taking me back to my dad's Tony Bennett recordings."

Jacaruso played bar gigs five nights a week in and around New York City while attending college during the day. "Both mom and dad passed away early in my life so being able to make a living somehow and survive was front and center," he said. He began to tie the threads that would weave throughout his life – love of music, love of family and economic survival.

Early on, Jacaruso was in a band called "Topper" with some members who played with Billy Joel. He also started

playing with a major songwriter named Desmond Child, who had a band called Desmond Child and Rouge. "I formed an original band called 'The News' with some amazing NYC musicians and we started to make some noise around town and up the East coast," he said.

At the same time, his day job, working in information management and technology, was also growing legs – the "duality" in his career was beginning to emerge. "I started to develop more technical skills in computer programming and the combination of music and technologies started to intersect in my life," Jacaruso recalled. "I went back to school at night and took computer science classes and started to develop a career in this area along with my continued passion for music."

A turning point came for Jacaruso when "The News," with what he described as phenomenal players and a gifted lead singer, did not get signed to a record label. "There was a lot of interest, but the 'slot' we filled was already occupied by Journey and Foreigner, and we did not get signed. I thought, if we are this good and did not get signed by a label, what am I really going to do?"

"I started getting calls for different [technology] opportunities at various companies and over many years worked my way up to my current position as CTO [Chief

Technical Officer] at a financial firm in the New York/New Jersey area. The duality of the business world and music continued throughout my life."

The other thread, "family" also continued and is in fact why Jacaruso came to Idyllwild. Jac and wife Mimi, herself a gifted artist and designer, moved to Idyllwild so that their son Luca, a budding pianist, could attend the Idyllwild Arts Academy.

Having graduated from IAA with both academic and music kudos, Luca now attends U.S.C. Thornton School of Music. He recently embarked on program of entrepreneurial study with the Marshall School of Business, in some ways replicating the duality of his father's interests and career.


Jacaruso told several stories of sharing seminal and transformative musical moments with Luca when his son was young, forging connections that continue today. "We've connected at levels that are beyond words, sharing moments of transformational musicality," he said. "Now it's about the writing and recording. I play on his stuff and he'll play on mine. Playing with my son takes things to another level – to see him so invested and in the moment."

"I feel that people are drawn here [to Idyllwild]. I currently work from home, travel to the East coast for business while play-

ing local gigs as my schedule allows. I feel extremely blessed to have a wonderful family, to be a part of this very special community among many other incredibly talented musicians and artists, and to be provided an opportunity to express this side of my duality at this stage of my life. My main goal is to give something back to this community."

For Jac Jacaruso, "duality" and "family" sum up a life well lived that continues to unfold.

ICC speaker series features Carol Martin's Southeast Asia experience

This season of Idyllwild Community Center speakers features local residents. Idyllwild residents Carol Martin and husband J.B. Leep are world travelers — Europe, China, Russia, Egypt, Morocco, Argentina, Peru, the Amazon and Kenya.

As part of the ICC series, Martin will present slides and discuss their recent trip to Southeast Asia — a month long small-ship cruise to Cambodia, Thailand, Vietnam, Malaysia, Singapore and Myanmar (formerly Burma).

Martin stressed that this would not be a standard travelogue with pictures but an attempt to present the stark contrasts she and her husband experienced on their trip — from the towering new architectural marvels and wealth of Singapore and Kuala Lumpur, the capital of Malaysia, to ordinary villages in developing countries such as Cambodia, Vietnam and Myanmar, where people live as they have for centuries.

Martin's blog of the trip contains photos, personal impressions, reminiscences, and comments that detail the rich tapestry of colors, sounds, sights and tastes that made the Southeast Asia adventure so extraordinary. Spoiler alert — view the blog for a preview only, since Martin's comments and photos at the series will focus more on disparities in wealth and opportunity and their encounters with locals she and J.B. experienced and observed on the trip — <http://www.travelpod.com/travel-blog/carolmartin/1/tpod.html>.

Martin said she'd discuss challenges for achieving political stability and economic growth in the developing countries of Vietnam, Cambodia and Myanmar as well as providing personal travel tips for anyone interested in visiting the countries on their itinerary. Highlights of

the trip included visits to Angkor Wat, the 12th century Buddhist temple in Cambodia, Phnom Phen, the Genocide Museum and the Killing Fields, the famed canals of Bangkok, the changes in Vietnam since the war and the breathtaking new architecture of Singapore and Kuala Lumpur.

"I fell in love with Cambodia," said Martin. "The country has been through so much and yet the people were so welcoming and charming even with the difficult history. It was amazing to be in Myanmar since the country was only recently opened to tourists."

Martin said she was also impressed with how so many religions seem to have existed peacefully, side by side for so long — Muslim, Hindu, Buddhist, and animist in countries they visited.

Martin's presentation takes place at 6:00 p.m. on Thursday, Oct. 15, at Silver Pines Lodge.

Speaker Series focuses on local speakers

The Idyllwild Community Center Speaker Series has become a local institution, whose arrival each fall is eagerly anticipated. For nearly a decade, the sponsors have scouted the region to find and then to bring interesting and unusual information or ideas to the Hill.

One of these stalwarts has been Chris Singer, who returned to this function last year, after a brief respite.

But this year, she has taken a different tactic to organizing the series.

"People are always telling me about interesting people right here in our midst that would be wonderful speakers," Singer said. Consequently, the theme of the 2015 Speaker Series is "Fascinating Locals Right Here In Our Backyard!"

Other locals whom Singer has scheduled include Pam Jordan, president of the Idyllwild Arts Foundation, Dr. John Laundré, assistant director of the University of California, Riverside's James San Jacinto Mountains Reserve, and later in the spring, Walter Parks, a governor on the board of the Idyllwild Arts Foundation. In all, Singer has planned seven different speakers this year and all from the Hill.

Singer had arranged the Speaker Series for several years prior to 2014 and this year. "I love meeting the people and having them tell me what they're passionate about," Singer affirmed. Doing the research, such as reviewing the line-ups at regional museums, travel and

long-distance calls, was often time consuming, resulted in a varied and captivating series.

But she admitted, "It's easier getting the local speakers. I just talk to people in town and ask, 'Who do you know that's fascinating?'"

This year, there is no grant to provide an honorarium to the speakers. Nevertheless, Singer continues to donate each of them two nights at her Inn.

Owning and managing three inn properties takes a lot of her time, yet Singer still gives generously to town events, such as the Speaker Series. With the speakers scheduled, she is now turning her attention to the Annual Halloween Carnival, which fills downtown after the Halloween Parade.

The care of a Christmas Tree

The Annual Christmas Tree Lighting will be Saturday, Nov. 28. Despite the four-year drought, the Idyllwild Christmas Tree — a sequoia at JoAn's — is well and looking forward to another holiday season.

The drought has raised concerns about the tree's health and Phyllis Mueller, chair of the Soroptimist's Tree Lighting Committee, has been actively nursing the tree through this dry period with the help of many local people and groups.

One of the first steps was organizing a "Save the Sequoia" initiative to raise funds in order to undertake the steps necessary to protect this sacred resource.

Local water districts have and will donate water to protect the tree. Over the past couple of years, Pine Cove Water District has provided several loads of water. Last

week, Idyllwild Water District announced it plans to provide water, about 2,000 gallons a month according to Mueller, who also said Fern Valley Water District plans to contribute another load of water.

"If that is not enough, we'll supplement with more," Mueller stated. "JoAn's has also provided water and been instrumental in nurturing the tree."

In addition, John Huddleston, certified arborist, has been monitoring and working on the tree.

"Overall it's healthy, but it needs water," he said. "We've spread [50 yards] of new mulch under the tree. And there is new needle growth."

He regularly monitors the soil moisture near the tree. Early this year, the results of a soil analysis were used to modify the ground pH and apply more nutrients near the tree's roots.

However, Huddleston is concerned that the sequoia

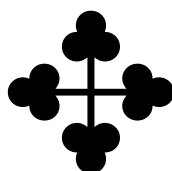

members.

"Much has changed since the first Idyllwild Earth Fair was held," explained Holly Owens, of the Idyllwild Earth Fair. "The cost of permits, insurance, rental equipment and other associated fees have become prohibitive. Therefore, the only way to apply for viable financial assistance and grants is finally to establish Earth Fair as an official non-profit organization. "what" a mystery at this time.)

"We won't have guides this year," said Rylov. "That can be distracting. But there may be fake guests whose presence and identity the visitors will never know for certain, and there could be surprises." Rylov explained that crowd movement through the maze will be radio controlled and monitored by the Ghost Town doorman.

Rylov is experienced in haunt habitat and makeup designs. She has worked at Knott's Scary Farm and Lake Elsinore's Field of Screams and has honed her craft at both locations. She is an expert in fright makeup and body painting – Google Tish Rylov's "Other Skin" to sample her portfolio.

Rylov lived in Idyllwild as a teenager and attended Hemet High. She was an actor in one of the earliest Idyllwild Haunted Ghost Towns. "I was on an operating table having my leg chopped off," she remembered.

Sacher-Wilson has always had the same mission with this increasingly popular holiday attraction – to provide a venue for local teens and young people to volunteer and

work as part of a crew. "My focus is to get local youth and young adults out of the house, away from computer screens and video games and outdoors where they can breathe some good healthy mountain air," she said. "I also want to introduce them to the spirit of volunteerism."
