Commission to pursue unit fee increase

Ad hoc IFPD committee to develop details

The Idyllwild Fire Protection District Commission has approved a motion to authorize a \$91 annual increase to its current \$65 unit fee. District voters must approve the increase, which the commission plans to place on the November presidential ballot.

To prepare for the vote, the commission established an ad hoc committee to develop the actual language for the measure and to prepare information and educational material for the campaign. The committee will be composed of Commission President Jerry Buchanan, Finance Committee Member Susan Weisbart and Fire Chief Patrick Reitz.

"The actual amount is not definite yet," Reitz said Monday. There was considerable discussion about how the finance committee, chaired by Commissioner Nancy Layton, arrived at the amount and why it felt that number was important, Reitz added.

"There has been a lot of work invested in this and the finance committee downplayed the amount of time it spent and the individual members spent researching the issues," Reitz said.

The commission was supportive of the concept to attach an accelerator to the fee so that it would remain constant with inflation. "There was no accelerator on the original fee, which means we're living off of a valuation set in the early 1980s," he stated.

Although the current unit fee limit is \$65, the collected amount was not always set at that level. Reitz stressed and hoped this attitude would continue with future commissions. "The board intention is not to have to tax at the full amount every

Infant fatality on Highway 74 near Vista Point

A 5-month-old girl was ejected from a Porsche that went over the side on Highway 74 near Vista Point above Palm Desert. The Porsche was a two-seater and it appears the passenger in the vehicle was holding the infant girl, who was not properly restrained. The 5-month-old child, identified by the Riverside County coroner as Armani Green, died at the scene.

According to the California Highway Patrol Indio report, Marcus Green, 51, of Thermal, was driving a 2015 Porsche 911 coupe eastbound on Highway 74 at 8:08 a.m. Sunday, May 1, when, for unknown reasons, the vehicle collided with the mountain and crashed through a metal guard rail. It careened about 200 feet down the side of the mountain before coming to rest. Both Green and his passenger, Kristen Lauer, 22, of Rancho Mirage, suffered serious injuries in the incident and were transported, first by helicopter then by American Medical Response ground transport, to Desert Regional Medical Center in Palm Springs.

The incident closed Highway 74 to vehicular traffic in both directions until about 2 p.m., according to CHP.

In other incidents on Hill roads, at 11:25 p.m. Wednesday, April 27, Jose Lopez, 31, of Idyllwild, was driving a 2005 white Chevy Malibu west on South Circle Drive in Idyllwild, just north of Village Center Drive when, because of excessive speed he failed to execute a right turn and hit a stone column and gate. Lopez was not injured and no other vehicles were involved.

At 2:08 p.m. Friday, April 29, William Saine, 20, of Hemet, was driving a 1995 green Mercury Sable eastbound on Highway 74, two-tenths of a mile east of

Thomas Mountain Road, when he attempted to pass a slow-moving car. Saine's vehicle crossed over the double-yellow line and encountered a vehicle proceeding westbound on Highway 74. In attempting to avoid a collision with the other vehicle, Saine caused his vehicle to turn sharply to the right. He avoided colliding with the westbound vehicle but lost control of his vehicle and collided with a barbed-wire fence. He suffered moderate injuries in the crash and was transported to Inland Valley Medical Center in Wildomar.

At 9:20 p.m. Saturday, April 30, Jeremy Manriquez, 35, of Idyllwild, was driving a 2006 Honda Civic west on South Circle Drive,

Body found along Hwy 74 identified

The deceased female found along Highway 74 has been identified as Bianca Bogarin, 25, of Moreno Valley, according to the county Sheriff's Department.

A cause of death is still undetermined.

When the body was found on Sunday, April 10, decomposition had already occurred sufficiently to obscure her race.

The department's media bureau said, "Our department is investigating this death, and at this time it is unclear how the person died."

This is an active and ongoing investigation, according to the Sheriff's Department. Anyone with possible information should call Investigator Joshua Button at 760-393-3531.

The body was found near Strawberry Creek and mile marker 54 on Hwy. 74.

Melendez skips sentencing hearing

Warrant issued for Mountain Center Market burglary

Nickolas Melendez, 27, of Cabazon, one of two men who pleaded guilty to burglary of the Mountain Center Market in September, did not appear in court for his sentencing Thursday, April 28.

Melendez and Ryan Mason, 25, of Hemet, were charged with burglary of the Mountain Center Market within days of the crime and both men pleaded guilty to the burglary in March. Their sentencing had been deferred.

Melendez's sentencing was scheduled for Thursday, April 28. The court has forfeited his bail bond and issued a bench warrant for his arrest for failure to appear. The new bond is \$100,000.

Mason, who also pleaded guilty, had undergone an evaluation for possible residential substance abuse treatment prior to the felony settlement con-

ference. Judge Mark Mandio requested that Riverside County Sheriff's Department Corrections Division conduct the assessment. As a result of the report, Mason's sentencing was scheduled for Sept. 26, while he completes a program.

The judge also ordered

that pending enrollment and completion of the program, Mason may not be released pursuant to the agreement with the federal government regarding jail population levels.

Re: letter from Shelley M. Ferrand

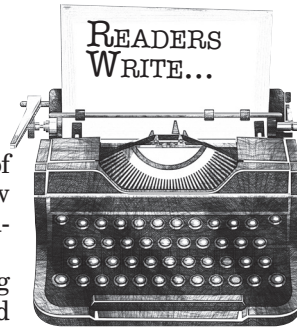
EDITOR:

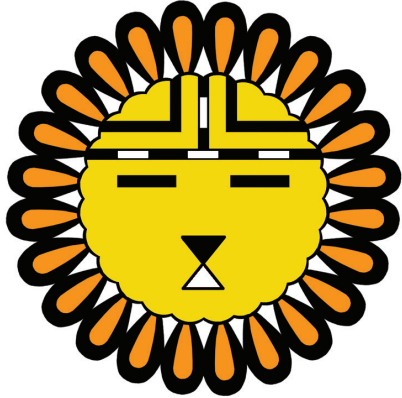

An interview with John ...

James Reserve Assistant Director Dr. John Laundré was born and raised in the Midwest (Wisconsin) and received his bachelor's and master's degrees there. He received his doctorate from Idaho State University in 1979.

Since then, he spent the next 30 years working on large-mammal predator-prey ecology in the western U.S. and northern Mexico. His experience includes working with cougars, wolves, coyotes, bobcats, deer, elk, bison and bighorn sheep. John is the author of a book on the phenomenon of cougars actually moving back into the Great Plains region of the U.S. John currently lives in Southern California where he is assistant director of the James San Jacinto Mountains Natural Reserve of the University of California, Riverside.

JG: First, an open-ended question. Do you have any particular passions/hobbies outside of your position at the James? What are they and what do you enjoy about them?

JL: Hobbies outside of my position include building furniture and writing.

JG: Before you were a scientist, what did your parents want you to be when you grew up and what did they do?

JL: My parents pretty much let it up to us to decide what we wanted to do.

JG: What were your favorite subjects in school?

JL: Biology and math.

JG: What were your favorite books growing up?

JL: Books on nature and mystery books.

JG: How much did you play outside and do you remember where you were playing outside?

JL: I grew up on a farm and so spent most of my time outdoors, working and playing. Would spend a lot of time in the surrounding woods.

JG: Did you collect anything?

JL: Only memories.

JG: If you had some advice for a middle schooler or high schooler, what would you tell them?

JL: Study and learn as much as you can. Knowledge will open doors for you and it beats not knowing things. Also, be persistent. If you know what you want, with persistence and, of course, some luck, you will achieve it.

JG: Life before the James: What was your favorite job before you took the position at the James?

JL: Researching mountain lions. I spent over 20 years working with them. It was great.

JG: Are there people who have inspired you or been your role models?

JL: Role models include Aldo Leopold for his views on wildlife, John Muir for his respect of nature, and my mother and father for their views on life.

JG: What is one of your most memorable moments working in the field?

JL: Most memorable is the first mountain lion we were able to capture. It was great to see her up the tree and incredible to think that I was there working with them. I always liked the nature shows and had hoped that one day I would be doing those things. That day reminded me that I was.

JG: Can you share with us points in your career when you were struggling or failing, and what steps did you take to get through them?

JL: I have been fortunate to always have work related to my career. There were times when it looked like I might not, but in the end, something always came up. I have, for the most part, lived a charmed life professionally.

JG: Life at the James: What is your favorite part about being assistant director of the James Reserve?

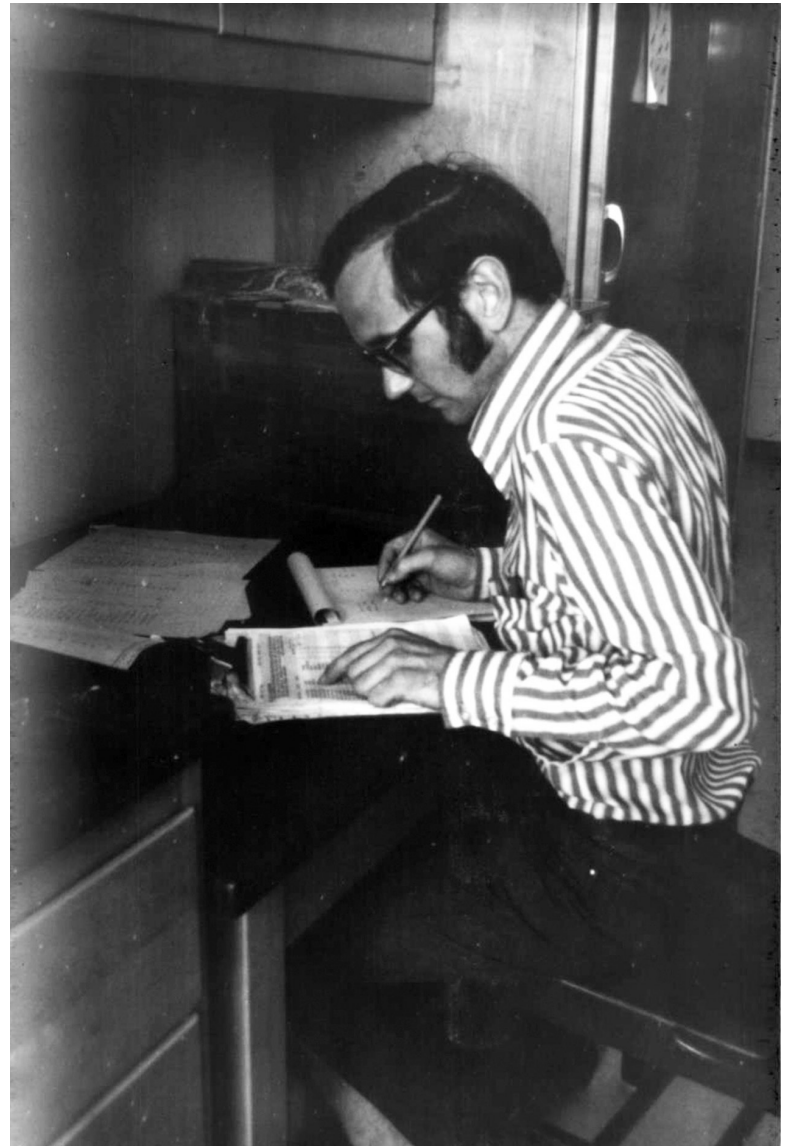
JL: I like doing the manual things that require building or repairing things, and I like working with the groups that come to use the reserve.

JG: What do you like most and least about living in Idyllwild?

JL: I like the mountain habitat and the small-town atmosphere. The least thing, I suppose, is when I have to go down the Hill for things. Hate the drive down.

JG: What is one of your most memorable moments since you've been living here?

JL: My most memorable moment is when I found a photo of a mountain lion on one of the cameras that I have set up all over

County recruiting poll workers for June 7 election

Poll workers are needed at voting locations throughout Riverside County for the June 7 presidential primary election.

No experience is required and the Registrar of Voters Office will provide training. Poll workers must attend a training class to familiarize themselves with election procedures and prepare to assist voters when the polls open at 7 a.m. on election day. Workers in both posts will receive an additional stipend to attend the training class.

Poll workers may earn up to \$125 as precinct inspectors or \$90 as precinct officers.

DEFENSIBLE SPACE AND GRANTS ...

This week I'd like to introduce Pat Boss, our project manager for Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council.

Those of you who have been around this mountain for any length of time, and I'm talking 50-plus years or more, may have known him as a lad wreaking havoc in his youth. He had bit parts in local movies, was successful in real estate and had a career with the U.S. Forest Service. He and his wife, Jan, owned and operated the original Jan's Red Kettle for many years.

His knowledge of the forest and the topography is what makes Pat a valuable resource in our community through his position.

When a homeowner, seeking help in making their property fire safe, makes contact with our office, they are generally put in touch with Pat. An appointment is made to meet at the property with the owner.

Once at the property, our project manager will observe the boundaries of the parcel, and see how any work that might be done may also benefit neighboring property. The scope of the work to be done is always designed

around Public Resource Code, section 4291, defensible space.

The state Legislature enacted this mandate in 2005. "Under the law, property owners in mountainous areas, forest-covered lands or any land that is covered with flammable material must create, at minimum, a 100-foot defensible space (or to the property line) around their homes and other structures." This does not mean the property must be clear cut to bare soil.

Pat will walk and evaluate the property to see how best to accomplish the reduction and thinning of excess fuels. Vegetation is flagged or marked for trimming or removal. All of this is done with the goal of meeting the requirements of PRC 4291.

This process also becomes an education for the homeowner as the benefits of this work on their particular parcel is explained by Pat. He may also offer other suggestions based on his observations on how to further protect one's home in the event of a wildfire.

This consultation and property evaluation is provided at no cost from MCFSC.

The property owner can choose to do the work themselves, if they are able, or use someone they have worked with before. If the work suggested is large and quite involved, the owner may want to consider a licensed tree contractor.

Financial aid through MCFSC is grant money that can be applied for fuel-reduction work.

Here is an example. Let's say this homeowner decides to take advantage of our grant. An application would be filled out between owner and MCFSC. Pat's description and narrative of the design, work to be done and job specifications are documented. This document is then put

out to bid to a pool of local, licensed and insured tree contractors who meet the requirements of MCFSC and the grant.

They have one week to inspect or evaluate the job and submit their bid to perform the work outlined in the request. The project manager and one board member open the submitted bids. The bid for the job is then awarded to the lowest bidder.

Should the property owner agree with going forward in using the financial aid of the grant, a Property Owners Agreement is signed and payment of the owners cost share is collected.

The tree contractor will then contact the owner and schedule the work. When the work is completed, Pat makes an inspection. He adds "after" photos to go with those taken before work was begun to document and go in the file that has been created.

If the property owner is satisfied with the work, they will sign off on the Property Owners Agreement form. The tree contractor is notified that the work is completed and he submits his paperwork for payment. The homeowner's cost-share payment is then deposited.

Our grants are a 65/35 cost share, meaning that the grant pays for 65 percent of the cost and the property owner pays 35 percent. For example, a property owner would only pay \$350 of a \$1,000 job.

We apply and obtain most of our grants from the California Fire Safe Council.

With this work completed, the goal is not only for this property to pass its annual fire inspection that both Cal Fire and Idyllwild Fire Protection District perform on our mountain, but to make it more defensible in the event of a wildfire.

Those actions coming from the people I love the most inspired me to inform myself about the environment and humans' consequences from consumerism.

I'm currently a senior songwriter at Idyllwild Arts, and last year I decided to start an Environmental Club, thanks to magnificent people who care and want change by acting local and thinking global.

Artists like us are constantly inspired by the wonders of nature. Hiking in search for bright, colorful sunsets along with little squirrels made me fall in love with



Idyllwild, gaining a special place in my heart. Yet, I saw plastic bags on trees, buried in the dirt and flying in the air, so I decided to start this project. But I need your help.

Imagine Idyllwild without a single plastic bag? One of the most wonderful qualities about Idyllwild is the sense of awareness and happiness people carry. My goal is to encourage our local businesses to stop handing out plastic bags and for us consumers to increase the use of cloth/canvas bags.

A 2014 Huffington Post story estimated that more than 10 billion plastic bags are used each year in California, and the majority end up as litter in landfills, streets, the ocean and almost anywhere else they don't belong and affect the lives of innocent animals. Today, more than 100 California communities are trying to ban plastic bags. I am positive that Idyllwild could be, in the future, a leader of towns in California who support this "Plastic Reduction Movement."

Plastic bags take as long as 1,000 years to decompose, while recycled paper bags decompose in as little two months. If we use a cloth bag, we can save at least six bags a week. Ginger Dagnall aims to improve recreation programs and facilities

Profiles of the new CSA 36 Advisory Council

Ginger Dagnall, new appointee to the CSA 36 Advisory Council, has solid history with the Hill and its community recreation programs. At Idyllwild School, she just finished coaching Middle School girls volleyball. Now she is coaching the boys.

Four years ago she volunteered to help run the volleyball programs at Town Hall. She noted it was a constant struggle with the county to get approval for a full menu of sports offerings. "I had to fight to have these programs happen," she said.

As prior recreation director for Thousand Trails in Pine Cove, Dagnall established programs to exercise the mind and body through outdoor recreation, organized as part of a monthly calendar.

With the rebirth of the advisory council, Dagnall said her mission is to expand recreational offerings for all age groups and to see that recreation facilities and venues are well and safely maintained. Several of the new council appointees mentioned the front door to Town Hall has not been useable for an extended period. Dagnall and her colleagues intend to have that remedied.

Dagnall would like to see programs developed as part of Town Hall community recreation that serve all age groups – programs that could include nature walks, bike clubs, yoga and pilates for older residents as well as an expanded menu of sports offerings for youth and adults. "I have the history with the community and the resources to pull from," she noted. "I know how this community comes together in activities."

She especially aims to bring her expertise in and enthusiasm for sports to service on the council. She was Hemet High School and Hemet Middle School volleyball head coach. "I encouraged good communication at all times between parents, players and coaches and developed a program based on team unity and individual goal setting," she said.

As part of personal skill sets she will bring to council service, Dagnall cites her strong organizational skills and a track record of working with youth and building cohesive teams.

"I want to see a year-round activities calendar that introduces all the recreational opportunities available to the community – activities that are continued and expected," she noted. "I can't stay away from being involved with the community and its recreation pro-

grams. I like to be around kids having fun. It does take a community to raise children."

What other than sex can attract an audience to amateur theater?

In the United Kingdom, community theaters are called amateur dramatic societies, but the challenges remain the same as in the U.S. What, other than sex and musicals, can draw audiences to amateur productions?

That is the conundrum facing a theater group in a small English town — dwindling audiences, meager ticket sales and competition from a group that produces, what else: musicals. What will become of the Little Grimley Amateur Dramatic Society? What plot twist or salacious script can restore the society to its former minor glory?

The Stratford Players presents a staged reading of David Tristram's "Last Tango in Little Grimley" and "The Fat Lady Sings in Little Grimley," effervescent and essentially English examinations of amateur theater life — behind and in front of the curtain, and in occasional dark corners.

Starring Allison Fedrick, Barbara Ray-

liss, Chic Fojyik and Christopher Morse, and directed by Marsha Kennedy, Stratford's artistic head, Tristram's short comedic romps show how hard it is to keep a stiff upper lip while the fat lady is singing. Kathy Masey stage managed the production.

Kennedy said this about the upcoming production, "It took a while to get through our first reading of the script because our actors kept stopping to laugh. Little Grimley plays have been a huge comedy hit on both sides of the Pond. We wanted to give audience members an intimate theater experience, and Café Aroma's Gallery is perfect for that."

Stratford presents the Little Grimley plays in the gallery at Café Aroma at 2 p.m. Sunday, May 15 and 22. Tickets are \$12 and are available on the Stratford website, www.stratfordplayers.com.

Café Aroma has created a special lunch and dinner menu for Stratford Sunday audiences with 20- to 30-percent discounts. With only 32 available seats, Aroma reservations are recommended.

AAI creates summer programs for kids

Next ICC speaker is Walter Parks

"70 Years of History at Idyllwild Arts"

Walter Parks knows history and is a good story teller. Stanford B.A. and M.B.A. grad, he has long been associated with Idyllwild Arts, from its earliest days. He is well qualified to discuss the school and its evolution from its founding in 1946. The Idyllwild Arts Foundation is currently celebrating its 70th anniversary this year. He is a longtime IAF board member.

As Assistant Superintendent for Business for the Riverside School District, Parks also knows well the community of Riverside. He has served as a docent for the Mission Inn for nearly 40 years and has written two books about the iconic hotel and its colorful history. He has lectured both at the Mission Inn and at UC Riverside Extension about California history.

Parks is the next speaker for the Idyllwild Community Center's Speaker Series, at 6 p.m. Thursday, May 19 at Silver Pines Lodge. He said he would organize his talk by decades since cultural tastes often affected and dictated the Idyllwild Arts Summer Program offerings.

"The '50s were a very interesting time for the school," said Parks. "It was a time both of repression [McCarthy and House Un-American Activities Committee] and of expression," noted Parks. "And that was evident at the school's campus with artists like Pete Seeger and Bella Lewitzky there for the first summer. These were artists cut out of the mainstream [for political views] who went to colleges and institutions for performance and residencies. What Idyllwild Arts was doing mirrored what was going on nationally."

Parks spoke of the '60s as a time of cultural transition that birthed an interest in crafts. That interest helped fuel the expansion of Summer Program curricula, with increased registration for courses in pottery, weaving and other crafts. Parks said that carried through to the '70s. "Everyone was doing crafts and then, in the '80s, it stopped," he said. The '80s became a 'go go' time when people were more interested in career and making money."

That abrupt cessation affected Summer Program revenue. "The entire program was straddling because of the lack

of interest in the craft offerings and classes that had been a mainstay of the summer," he noted. "Classes were reduced and crafts for adults were eliminated because of the cultural shift."

The University of Southern California owned the campus, with programs managed by the Idyllwild Arts Foundation, from 1963 through 1983. Parks explained that when the Summer Program began to struggle financially, USC took a hard look at the real costs of the Idyllwild campus ownership (about \$300,000 annually according to Parks).

From the original agreement with USC, IAF had a right of first refusal should USC decide to sell. With help from donors, the IAF board reacquired the campus. From 1983 until 1985, the campus continued to struggle under IAF ownership and management.

In the mid-'80s, the school faced a pivotal moment. The choice, influenced by Bill Lowman who had been brought onboard as a consultant and key donor Dr. Richard MacNeal, was to complement the Summer Program and utilize the campus year-round by creating a residential arts school for students from grade 9 through grade 12. "It took a while financially but soon other donors stepped up to keep it going," said Parks. "And as a result of the Academy's steady growth and its growing reputation for

educational excellence, the foundation now finds itself in the best financial shape ever. The Academy has, in many ways, become the dominant program, with primary focus on serving its students' needs. The Summer Program continues strong in both program and attendance.

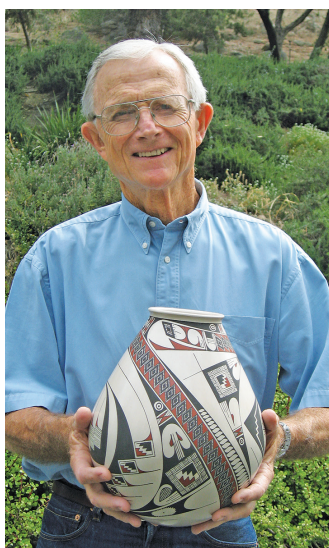
"It appears to me that in recent years the Academy has established itself as one of the premier educational institutions for young artists," said Parks noting the ratio of many applications relative to space available.

"When you have students who want to be there, it makes such a difference. Our mission is to train each student to the highest point of their ability."

Parks' presentation is free to the community and all are welcome to attend.

Notwithstanding his eminent professional background and numerous volunteer activities, Parks is a humble man with a sparkling sense of humor. At the bottom of his résumé, he wrote, "He [Parks] has no qualifications for the subjects he speaks about and apologizes for any confusion."

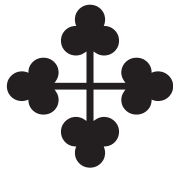

Sample ballots, information pamphlets on the way

About 876,000 sample ballots and information pamphlets started going out to Riverside County voters last week for the presidential primary election on June 7. About half will be mailed initially, with the remainder sent by the end of next week.

Voters may mark their selections on the sample ballot and use it as a guide to help them complete their official ballot at the polls. The registrar of voters recommends that voters review the materials before casting an official ballot. If voters do not receive an informational guide in the mail, it will be available online at www.voteinfo.net. Voters also may call the registrar's office at 951-486-7200 or 800-773-8683 to request a mailed copy.

The June 7 election is a countywide election. Registered voters in all areas of the county are eligible to cast votes in this election. For questions about your eligibility to vote, contact the registrar's office.

Voter polling-place locations are printed on the back cover of the information pamphlet, which includes an application to request a vote-by-mail ballot. A Spanish-language version of the pamphlet will be available at www.voteinfo.net and a copy can be mailed upon request.

Below is a list of important deadlines for the June 7 election:

- May 9 – First day of early voting in the Registrar of Voters Office and first day the registrar is allowed to mail vote-by-mail ballots to voters.
- May 23 – Last day to register to vote or change political party preference for the June 7 election.
- May 31 – Last day the registrar may accept mailed requests for vote-by-mail ballots. After May 31, voters must go to the registrar's office to request and pick up a vote-by-mail ballot. Voters who have requested, but not received, a vote-by-mail ballot by May 31 should call the registrar's office.
- June 7 – Election day.

Polling places are open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on election day. Vote-by-mail ballots must be received by elections officials no later than the close of the polls on election day, or be postmarked on or before election day and received no later than three days after election day to be counted.

Your voting right in the presidential primary depends on the political party in which you are registered. If you are registered with a political party, you can vote only for a candidate running for president in that party. A "No Party Preference" voter will automatically receive a non-partisan ballot, which will have no presidential candidates listed. However, upon request, a "No Party Preference" voter can, instead, receive a ballot to vote the presidential ballot of the following parties: American Independent Party, Democratic Party or Libertarian Party.

If you want to register, update your address or change your political party preference, you must complete a voter registration application and submit it by May 23. You can register online at registerto-vote.ca.gov or request a paper application by calling 951-486-7200.

There are 34 U.S. senator candidates on the ballot. Look at your ballot carefully. Be sure to cast only one vote for U.S. senator or your vote will not count.

April showers bring cold weather

Unlike the 2015-16 El Niño, May flowers are expected to appear as forecasted. The anticipated blossoms will create a rainbow on the Hill, despite the winter temperatures and snow last week.

Last week, the final April showers fell throughout the area, preparing the vegetation for spring. Nearly 0.6 inches fell at the U.S. Forest Service's Keenwild Fire Station in Mountain Center and about two-thirds of an inch of rain and a quarter-inch of snow landed in Pine Cove, both well shy of the average April precipitation of 2 inches.

Total rainfall from July 1, 2015, through the end of April has been 20 inches at the Keenwild Fire Station. At the Pine Cove weather site, about 4 more inches of rain has been recorded for a total of 24.1 inches.

This is the most rain to fall on the Hill since 2011 and the second-greatest season in the past decade.

Both are less than the long-term average rainfall of 24.8 inches through the end of April. The May average precipitation has been 0.75 inches.

year, but only when necessary," he said.

The ad hoc committee will also review the proposal to set a 10-percent cap or limit on the reserves. Reitz believes that 10 percent should be the minimum with a goal of 25 percent. So this language will be examined, too.

The estimated new revenue over the first seven years is about \$2.3 million according to the staff analysis. Besides the proposed capital improvement plan, the fire district has substantial deferred maintenance needs around the station. Also, he emphasized that the firefighters accepted salary reductions in March 2012 "... to keep the district running."

Their commitment to the community is exemplified by the lack of turnover since the base salary reduction.

The vote was unanimous, 4-0, with the exception of Commissioner Jeannine Charles-Stigall who was absent.

The commission also discussed the financial consultant's role and the current contract. The finance committee has been considering a new request for proposal, but the commission asked Reitz to review the situation and have further meetings, with Rob Dennis the consultant since July 2013. The contract can be renewed for two more years, according to Reitz.

Although the committee has concerns about the financial reports, Reitz said the department staff work well with Dennis and believe the committee's concerns can be resolved. In addition, the current budget, while in "pretty good shape" did not anticipate staff assuming this work.
