

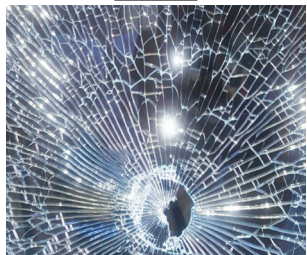

IWD continues standby fee But no new meters

Last week, Idyllwild Water District directors voted to continue the \$30 standby fee on vacant parcels within the district. Directors Steve Kunkle and June Rockwell voted against the motion, which passed 3-2, with the support of Board President Jim Billman, John Cook and Mike Freitas.

On Wednesday, Aug. 3, the board continued its public hearing on the fee from its regular meeting July 20. At that heavily attended meeting, questions were raised about the legality of the hearing, since IWD only used a legal notice in the paper to inform constituents and those affected by the tax.

After that meeting, the district obtained a legal opinion, which said only new or increased fees required special notifications. The continuation of an existing standby fee could proceed. Consequently, the district scheduled continuing the hearing originally for July 28. That was canceled when it didn't meet quorum and Aug. 3 was the new date.

When he opened the hearing, Board Vice President Cook stated that the \$30 standby fee had been in place for many years, then added that the district has been receiving lots of objections about why the fee is unfair to owners of undeveloped property.

He offered three options and asked the audience (five people) for their opinions.

Continuing the standby fee, no assessment or earmarking the fee revenue for new wells were his three options.

The public comments questioned the district's current water situation. Marge Muir, who has property in IWD, stated that imposing the fee without the opportunity to obtain water to build was discriminatory.

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Nighttime vandal targeting Idyllwild Massage

Karen Georg's Idyllwild Massage on North Circle Drive has been the subject of nighttime vandalisms during recent months. In five separate incidents occurring nights or even weeks apart, storefront windows of her establishment have been shattered, apparently during nighttime hours, by the use of a pellet gun, a BB gun and rocks.

Georg, who specializes in therapeutic massage, has many clients who are receiving massage and stretching treatments for various injuries. It appears that none of the vandalisms took place during business hours.

Officers from the Riverside County Sheriff's Department responded, collected evidence and took reports. Evidence, including videos from security cameras, has been obtained that will assist in identifying the perpetrator of these crimes.

Under California law, vandalism is a crime punishable as either a felony or a misdemeanor, depending upon a wide variety of circumstances involved. Traditionally, misdemeanors result in fines and im-

prisonment in the county jail, whereas felonies result in fines and state prison sentences for terms of years. Some fairly recent incidents of vandalisms of business storefronts in Los Angeles County have been investigated as felonies.

Two Idyllwild traffic incidents occurred, one with a DUI, over last week

Two traffic incidents, both on Saturday, Aug. 6, both in Idyllwild, and each with similar circumstances, took place over the last week.

At 9:20 a.m., Luann Elizabeth Sheneman, 78, of Idyllwild, was driving her 2000 silver Subaru Outback eastbound on Pine Crest Avenue in Idyllwild, 1/10 of a mile east of Highway 243, when she hit a parked 2004 F250 pickup truck. The truck, owned by Rogelio Gonzalez of Idyllwild, was attached to a utility trailer. All vehicles involved had moderate damage. The California Highway Patrol report noted that Sheneman was driving at a speed unsafe for road conditions when the incident occurred. There were no passengers in any of the vehicles involved and no injuries.

At 1:10 p.m., Jeffrey Lawrence Kleefisch, 58, of Idyllwild, was driving his 1999 white Jeep Cherokee southbound on Sylvan Way in Pine Cove, just south of Pine Cove Road, when his vehicle struck a parked 2003 Honda Pilot owned by Phillip Craig Wills, also of Idyllwild. Kleefisch's vehicle had rollover damage and Will's vehicle had moderate damage. Kleefisch was cited for driving under the influence. No one was injured and there were no passengers in any vehicle involved.

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IWD makes big increase to water supply at minimal cost

Before and during the public hearing on the Idyllwild Water District standby fee, the audience, directors and General Manager Tom Lynch addressed several other topics besides the fee itself.

For example, Lynch said that two wells (nos. 12 and 27) had already been rehabilitated for less than \$15,000. Well no. 27, on the north side of the Nature Center entrance, was originally drilled in August 2007. Then-GM Terry Lyons told the board that production would be about 25 gallons per minute, but production costs would be relatively expensive.

By April 2009, Lyons told the board he would have to virtually re-drill no. 27. By September 2009, he said the well was at 700 feet with new pumping equipment. Unfortunately, production was only 10 gpm compared to the 25 gpm when it was finished in 2007.

According to Lynch, the only problem with the well was the wrong pump size, and that was due to em-

ployee incompetence.

Regarding well no. 12, Lynch attributed its problem to an impeller placed upside down in the well. "Correcting that moved it from 5 gpm to 26 gpm," he stated. IWD spent about \$9,000 in 2011 to refurbish this well. Lynch attributed the upside-down impeller to employee incompetence, as well.

The cost for rehabilitating these wells (less than \$15,000 total) was part of a \$225,000 federal grant, according to Lynch. When asked why IWD waited to make these repairs, Lynch replied in an email, "IWD obtained a grant for well rehabilitation because it does not have surplus cash to apply to various capital projects." However, the 2015 audit showed that the cash balance was greater than \$2.1 million just for the water program.

Jeff Smith raised a question regarding Lynch's progress on obtaining a State of California Water Treatment Grade II Operator Certificate, as required in his February 2014 hiring letter. Smith said he has found no evidence of

Lynch having taken the exam, although Lynch stated at the July 20 meeting that his certificate was pending.

In response, Board Vice President John Cook, who ran the meeting, said the board was satisfied with the GM's progress, although it remains a goal.

"It's not a requirement to be a [water district] general manager. And we're satisfied with the progress made," he stated.

Finally, Cook asked Lynch to address a question from the July 20 meeting regarding using the Dutch Flat wells.

"A lot of the Dutch Flat water is heavily impacted by iron and manganese. Their treatment is extensive," he stated. "The wells being rehabilitated don't share the same hurdle."

The next board meeting has been changed to 6 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 16, at the district's boardroom. While the Aug. 3 agenda said "tentatively," both Cook and Lynch confirmed the meeting has been moved to a day earlier. Neither offered an explanation.

"At the last meeting, we did hear some comments that it is not fair to pay the standby fee if you cannot get a meter. If they're paying for transmission lines, why can't you then get water?" Kunkle asked.

"The purpose of the fee is to maintain the infrastructure. So why are only eight of 24 wells operating?" Muir asked, regarding the district's efforts to maintain and supply adequate water.

In response, General Manager Tom Lynch said he had just finished rehabilitating two wells, whose net new production added 40 gallons per minute to the water supply.

Kunkle asked if this meant IWD now had enough water for some new customers. "I'd still like to see which wells in the district are ready to use," he added.

"We should know how much water we can produce," he continued. "How can we say no new water meters if we don't know how much water is used and available?"

Cook agreed and asked Lynch for a fuller discussion at a future meeting. "What specifically do we know and put in a report. With or without a drought, come up with what we need," he suggested.

Eventually, Billman moved to approve the current standby fee. Freitas seconded the motion, which passed 3-2.

Idyllwild property assessment up nearly 5 percent

New record high

Riverside County's property assessments have finally recovered from the recent recession. For fiscal year 2016-17, the county's assessment roll exceeds its previous record, which was achieved in 2008. The total county property assessment is \$255.1 billion, which is 5 percent more than last year's total of \$242.7 billion.

"This is the fourth-consecutive year of growth [after four consecutive years of decline] and we have exceeded our previous peak of \$242.9 billion in 2008," Assessor-County Clerk-Recorder Peter Aldana said in a press release.

Since 2012, the assessment roll has increased nearly 25 percent from the recession low of \$204.9 billion.

Idyllwild properties reached an assessed low of \$677 million in 2011 and have been growing since. In 2015, Idyllwild assessed property values were \$765.6 million, \$3.7 million more than the 2008 high.

For fiscal year 2016-17, Idyllwild property assessments have grown 4.6 percent to a total of \$800.7 million.

Within the cities, Temecula and Hemet have the greatest assessed values, \$6.4 billion and \$4.4 billion, respectively. But the greatest increase was in Riverside, which grew \$216 million to a total of \$3.1 billion.

"At the lowest point, values dropped for more than 337,000 single-family properties because the real estate market declined," Aldana said. "As the market has steadily increased, 120,000 properties remain in this reduced status."

"Under California's Prop 8, assessed values should be lowered temporarily if recession or other factors reduce a property's value below its Prop 13 value on Jan. 1 of each year. As economic recovery increases market value, valuations previously lowered because of Prop 8 must

Everyone dances with everyone," Erikson wrote. Separately, Goldwasser said, describing one of her favorite moments as "the dancing toward the end of the evening with the last patrons and all the volunteers."

These moments will magically re-occur next Friday. Just as one patron said presciently to Goldwasser last year, "This is the magical Idyllwild that I have always loved."

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Proposition 53 — one man's crusade

Local genesis with statewide consequences

Proposition 53, titled the "No Blank Checks Initiative," springs from a wealthy Stockton-area agri-businessman's crusade to affect two major projects that appear to impact his area, his land and his business concerns.

The projects, one to build two tunnels around the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta to divert water to Southern California, and the other, the high-speed bullet train, are expensive — both are projected to cost billions of dollars before they are finished.

Stockton-area farmer and food processor Dean Cotapassi and wife Joan have raised more than \$4.5 million to fund signature gathering and advertising for the ballot initiative. They are the only donors in support of the proposition.

Prop 53 proposes to require statewide voter approval for any project exceeding \$2 billion that is funded through state-revenue bond sales.

Under current law, the state borrows money through general-obligation and revenue bonds. The state repays general-obligation bonds through the state General Fund, using state income and sales taxes, primarily. The state repays revenue bonds from fees or other charges paid by the users of the project.

Current law requires voter approval before the state can use general-obligation bonds to pay for a project. State-revenue bonds do not need voter approval under existing state law.

Prop 53 would change current law and require statewide voter approval if revenue bonds are sold by the state, by certain associations created by the state or in which the state is a member; are sold for a project that is funded, owned, operated or managed by the state; and total project cost exceeds \$2 billion.

A statewide vote is not required for bonds sold by cities, counties, schools, community college districts and special districts. The proposed legislation prohibits separating a project into component parts to take cost-per-component part below \$2 billion and thereby avoid a statewide vote. And the \$2 billion project threshold would be adjusted each year for inflation.

The measure, if passed, also would apply retroactively to projects currently funded with remaining bond amounts that exceed \$2 billion. Although the Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) notes that at present there are not many projects that cross the \$2 billion threshold, that statistic could change in the future. "It is possible other large projects could be affected in the future, such as new bridges, dams and highway toll roads," wrote the LAO. Also, in the initiative, "project" is undefined leading to possible confusion about what could be called a project if the legislation passes. For example, a project could be defined as a single building (a hospital), or multiple buildings (a medical center), raising the price tag and likelihood of requiring statewide voter approval.

The LAO also could not project the financial impact of Prop 53, noting, "Fiscal impact on state and local governments is unknown and would depend on which projects are affected by the measure, whether they are approved by voters, and whether any alternative projects or activities [are] implemented by government."

Said Cotapassi in 2008 when he first began opposing the water tunnels, "I have served as a catalyst to get this thing where it should be in the public eye. I will fight to the death to protect the Delta because I love it."

And however laudable Cotapassi's love of the San Joaquin Delta and his drive to ensure its interests, the potential consequences to local projects throughout the state have united a wide constituency of groups to oppose Proposition 53. Disparate organizations across the political spectrum oppose the prospective legislation's requirement of statewide voter approval for projects that are geographically local with primarily local benefit.

Opponents include Gov. Jerry Brown, the California Chamber of Commerce, the State Building and Construction Trades Council, Association of California Water Agencies, League of California Cities, California Professional Firefighters and the California State Sheriffs' Association. They note the proposition would negatively affect local control and community infrastructure improvements, water supply and drought preparedness, and inhibit California's ability to repair outdated infrastructure. Opponents also state the measure does not contain an exemption for emergencies and natural disasters.

Proponents claim the measure would stop politicians and local agencies from borrowing billions of dollars in state revenue bond debt without getting voter approval, while holding

be increased to match the subsequent upswing. In those cases, property-tax increases are allowed to exceed the standard 2 percent annual cap set by Proposition 13," according to the press release.

This year's Prop 13 annual inflation cap is 1.525 percent, per the California Consumer Price Index. Assessed values will increase this much for owners whose assessments were not reduced due to Prop 8.

But despite the roll's increase, Aldana said "many properties remain well below peak values and changes in the real-estate market can affect subsequent assessed values." He said his office "continues to review individual properties for potential changes in value, which can affect property

taxes."

Owners whose assessments increase under Prop 8 should receive notification from Aldana in their regular 2016-17 tax bills, which Treasurer-Tax Collector Don Kent should send in October.

Property owners can search for their 2016-17 roll value at www.riversideacr.com by address or parcel number. Property owners who disagree with the assessed value may file a free, decline-in-value application online with the Assessor's office. Applications are due by Nov. 1 and are available at www.riversideacr.com.

Property owners disputing the value may file an appeal with the Riverside County Clerk of the Board until Nov. 30. An application to appeal a changed assessment is available at www.rivcocob.org.

project proponents accountable for providing accurate cost estimates and updates. They state the purpose of the initiative is to "bring the state's public debt crisis under control by giving the voters a say in all major state bond-funded projects that will be paid off through special revenue streams or higher taxes, fees, rates, tolls or rents collected from Californians, their children and future generations."

The San Jose Mercury News, although no supporter of the Brown's water tunnel project, notes the proposition is so badly drafted and vague as to warrant a "no" vote. "Voters shouldn't lock into law any proposition leaving this much uncertainty, especially since it would require two-thirds approval to change or overturn it, even though it can pass initially with a simple majority," according to the SJMN.

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Ruiz has millions; Stone \$100,000

While not a 100-percent accurate prediction of an election, a candidate's cash is an important contributor to their capability to triumph. In this year's race for California's 36th Congressional District, incumbent Rep. Dr. Raul Ruiz (D-Palm Desert) has a dominating and near-overwhelming cash advantage over his opponent State Sen. Jeff Stone.

As of June 30, Ruiz has more than \$2 million in cash available for the final three months of the fall campaign. His Republican opponent Stone (Temecula) has \$110,000 (5 percent of Ruiz's total cash) to fund a challenge to unseat an incumbent congressman.

Ruiz was elected in 2012 when he upset former incumbent Rep. Mary Bono. In 2014, he defeated former Assemblyman Brian Nestande. For that race, Ruiz had accumulated nearly \$1.9 million by the end of June 2014. By the election, he had collected more than \$3.4 million and spent more than \$2.4 million from July through the end of November. In 2012, when he upset Bono, his expenditures for those four months was about \$1.64 million.

During the second quarter of 2016, Ruiz has raised about \$430,000, which has been about his average quarterly contributions during this term. His expenses during this quarter, in which the primary was held, were \$290,000.

Stone entered the race in December. Since then he has raised about \$230,000 and expended about \$120,000. About 90 percent of Stone's money, thus far, has come from California residents. Less than

\$20,000 has come from donors outside the state.

In contrast, 40 percent of Ruiz's fundraising comes from outside of California. His contributors come from Alaska to Maine and from Alabama to Wisconsin. Ruiz has reached out to supporters across the continent.

About 50 percent of Ruiz's contributions have come from gifts greater than \$2,000. Even a few Idyllwild residents have helped Ruiz's campaign, but \$250 was their largest contribution.

Stone's finances, although much less than Ruiz, also are dominated by a few generous benefactors. About two-thirds of his contributors have given at least \$2,000.

Of the total contributions from political committees, Ruiz has received about \$550,000 from political

groups based in or near the District of Columbia. For example, political action committees such as Democrats Reshaping America Political Action Committee and Democrats United to Change and Hope have given as well as Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi. Other PACs include medical groups such as the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons and American Osteopathic Information Association, and utilities such as Cox, Time Warner and Verizon.

For the June 7 primary election, 288,673 registered voters are in CD 36. Democrats had 114,758 registered voters compared to the 106,821 registered Republicans. The gap has grown by about 3,500 voters since January. The total number of Independents is 52,023.

For nearly 40 years, Dr. Eric Barr taught acting, directing and writing at the University of California, Riverside. For 30 years, he chaired UCR's Theater Department. A key architect of UCR's master's degree in fine arts in Creative Writing and Writing for the Performing Arts, Barr was responsible for launching the program at the UCR, Palm Desert, campus.

Then, a long-simmering staph infection following open-heart surgery in 2013 triggered numerous strokes that left Barr incapacitated — unable to speak, move, comprehend or continue his life as he had previously lived it.

His one-man show is a candid examination of his journey from near-certain death to his reawakening and cognitive rewiring. Although he still experiences short-term memory loss, Barr has reclaimed his life, having found ways to work around the "piece of his mind" that was severely damaged.

His is a story of perseverance, grit and optimism while facing a seemingly endless string of challenging medical crises. Aided by his wife, Karen Genet, Barr fought back with determination and humor over a three-year rehabilitation and recovery period.

At Stanford University's hospital, where Barr's critical surgeries were performed and his path to recovery launched, Barr is known by doctors and staff as their "miracle man."

And as a theater professional who knows the importance of plot elements in telling a story, Barr appreciates and credits the many serendipitous occurrences that gave him the life he has today — Stanford's chief cardio-thoracic surgeon Dr. D. Craig Miller flying in from Montana to perform a surgery that others could not, completing the surgery while still in his cowboy boots, and, subsequently, overruling other

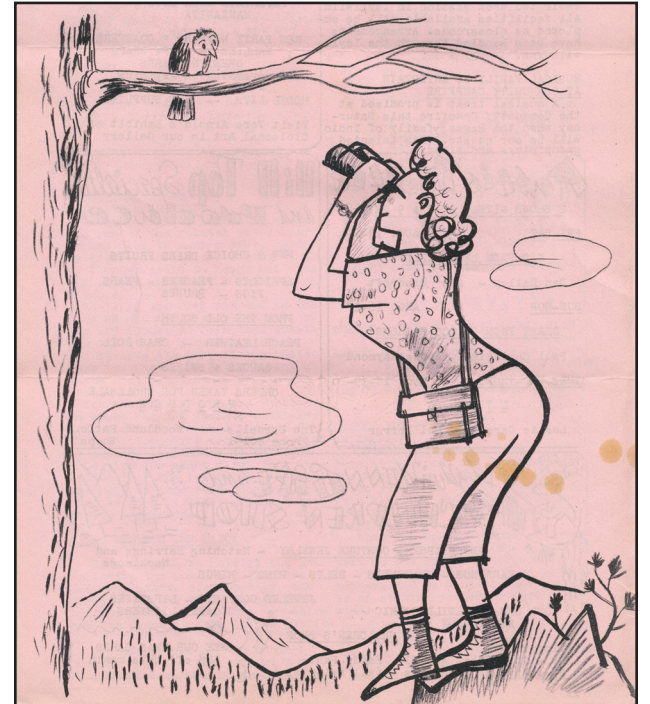

staff and directing that Barr be given acute brain and spinal-cord rehabilitation.

During rehabilitation, Barr had the good fortune to meet and be under the care of a neuro-therapist, Dr.

Mahnaz "Naz" Motayar, who believed in treating the whole being. She fully understood Barr's outbursts during rehab. "There's nothing wrong with this man," she said. "He's just angry; he's had a stroke."

Barr's one-man show, which he performs for audiences that can benefit and be encouraged by his story, is also fueling his continued recovery and optimism. "Doing the show has really been a trip, a true transcendent experience," he said. "When I tell my story to a stroke survivor, it builds a bridge and creates hope. I had lost the whole left side of my body. My recovery, with the help of so many, was like magic. I knew I needed to tell this story."



Guitarist Bob Boss is a familiar presence in the Idyllwild jazz scene. The San Diego-based musician plays in many Idyllwild events, often with Idyllwild jazz icon Marshall Hawkins at his side.

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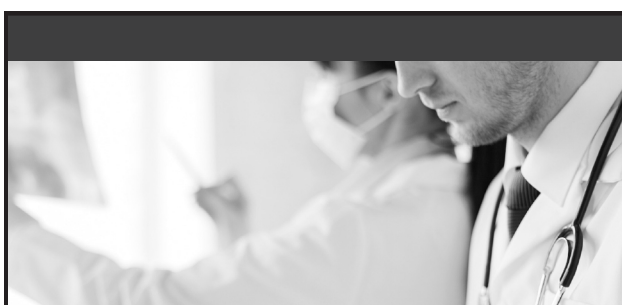
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

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Obituary Bonnie J. Pumphrey 1948-2016

Bonnie J. Pumphrey, 68, of Hemet, passed away at 1:30 p.m. Friday, July 22, 2016 at her home.

She was born on Jan. 2, 1948, in Champaign-Urbana, Illinois, to Robert F. and Edith M. Harris.

She loved to travel, all chocolates, singing and directing music.

From her earliest memories, Bonnie had an interest in a variety of activities, but most notably in music. She began piano lessons at age 5, and by her own good fortune, lived in a community that supported the arts. School and church choirs were plentiful, and she actively participated in her age-appropriate groups.

As she began to think about career options in high school, she explored many possibilities, but kept coming back to music. The turning point was during her senior year when she participated in the Illinois All-State Honor Choir, directed by Weston Noble, one of the "greats" in the choral music profession. From that time on, she knew she wanted to be a choral music conductor.

She received a full scholarship to study at the University of Illinois, and sang in the U of I Concert Choir, directed by Harold Decker, American Choral Directors Association president. It was under Decker's direction that she performed nationally and internationally, including tours in France, Austria and what was then Czechoslovakia. She also learned how to strive for and achieve choral excellence, and interacted with many well-known and respected directors, including Howard Swan, Maurice Beachy, Paul Brandvik, Kenneth Jennings, Jerold Ottley and many others. These mentors showed her the value of arts education, which goes far beyond singing the notes written on five lines and four spaces.

She graduated magna cum laude from the University of Illinois and later graduated magna cum laude from the University of Southern California, studying with Rodney Eichenberger, David Wilson and James Vail. At USC, she continued her quest for choral excellence, and was very fortunate to be a student alongside Mack Wilberg, (current director, Mormon Tabernacle Choir) Jo-Michael Scheibe (past president, American Choral Directors Assn. and current head of choral music at USC) and several directors who now head very successful programs at their respective high schools.

She taught music for 40 years, touching many lives at schools and churches, including an elementary school in her home town of Rantoul, Illinois; Valle Vista and Whit-tier elementary schools in Hemet; Dartmouth Middle School in Hemet; Hemet High School; Mt. San Jacinto



AAA advises that gasolines not all equal

In a study released at the end of June 2016, the AAA auto club found that gasolines with inferior detergents are clogging motorists' engines.

Since 1996, federal rules have required all gasolines to contain detergent additives that clean engines. However, major gasoline brands do not stop there — their gas contains extra detergents. These are called Top Tier® gasolines. Top Tier is a gasoline licensing program created in 2004 by seven automakers (BMW, Fiat, General Motors, Honda, Mercedes-Benz, Toyota and Volkswagen) who recognized that EPA minimum detergent requirements were not optimal.

The AAA commissioned testing from an International Standards Organization 17025-certified engine testing laboratory to perform an American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) standard test on a variety of

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Requirements to vote in November presidential election

Monday, Oct. 24 is the last day to register to vote in the Nov. 8 general election. Registration forms must be postmarked or submitted electronically no later than that date.

Online registration is available at <http://register-tovote.ca.gov>. The California Secretary of State's online application is available in English, Spanish, Chinese, Hindi, Japanese, Khmer, Korean, Tagalog, Thai and Vietnamese.

Vote-by-mail ballots may be requested through Nov. 1, one week before the election. These ballots must be received by the River-

side County Registrar of Voters Office either by the time polls close Nov. 8 or if returned in the mail, they must be postmarked on or before Nov. 8 and received in the Registrar's office no later than Nov. 14.

If new voters prefer paper applications to online registration, the registration application can be obtained at the Registrar's office, library, Department of Motor Vehicles offices or U.S. post office.

Qualifications to register to vote in California include: United States citizen; California resident; 18 or older on election day; not currently imprisoned or on parole for the conviction of a felony; and not currently found to be

mentally incompetent by a court of law.

College students have an option for choosing their voting residence, according to the California Secretary of State's office.

"As a Californian living away from home while attending a college, trade school or technical school, you may choose to register to vote using your home-away-from-home address you use while at school or your traditional home address. Choosing which address to use when you register to vote is

a personal decision. Whatever you decide, you may not register to vote in two places during the same election cycle," according to that office.

To find out if you are currently registered to vote, visit www.voteinfo.net/AmIRegistered or call the Registrar of Voters Office at 951-486-7200.

Even if registered, individuals may need to re-register if they have moved to a new permanent residence, changed their name or changed their political party choice.

fuels and provide the results. The study found that after the equivalent of 4,000 miles of driving, gas without the extra detergents deposited 19 times as much carbon residue on engine intake valves than the so-called Top Tier gasolines. AAA's full report can be found at <http://bit.ly/29mF6tL>.

AAA says carbon deposits reduce mileage, increase emissions and lower performance, particularly in newer cars. The extra detergents cost about 3 cents more per gallon, and AAA found that switching to a so-called Top Tier gasoline for a few thousand miles can clean up some carbon deposits.

A survey by AAA revealed that three-fourths of consumers buy gas based on price or on the convenience of the service station's location. Only one consumer in eight chooses a brand because it has extra detergents.

The Center for Quality Assurance in Midland, Michigan, now runs the commercial Top Tier licensing program that charges gas stations a fee to use the Top Tier seal of approval. A updated list of retail gasolines licensed as Top Tier brands is at www.toptiergas.com/retailers.
