# Art therapist returns to floodravaged Baton Rouge

On Aug. 29, 2005, Hurricane Katrina made landfall on the Louisiana coast with a direct hit on New Orleans. Idyllwild resident Karla Leopold led a team of art therapists to an evacuation center just north of Baton Rouge to help Katrina survivors, many of them children, to express and externalize the trauma they had experienced through the process of creating art. Leopold's mission then was to help survivors process the emotional and physical pain they had experienced by getting it out of them and onto a page or into a constructed piece of art.

She returns again to Baton Rouge, this time when the city itself has been hard hit by torrential rainfall and flooding, and many of its residents are homeless and in shelters. As she did before, she will assist Sister Judith Brun of the Baton Rouge Area Foundation to use art to capture and chronicle the experiences of those who have lost homes, jobs and hope.

When asked about conditions in Baton Rouge, Brun said, "How's it going here? No one knows. There are miles and miles of family possessions piled on curbs. How strong can families remain in this journey that is so all-consuming?"

Said Leopold, "We need your help. Once again the state of Louisiana is hit by disaster with more than 100,000 people affected. Many of these people are the same people relocated [to the Baton Rouge area] after Hurricane Katrina 11 years ago."

The Red Cross calls the Louisiana flooding the worst disaster since Superstorm Sandy hit the East Coast of the U.S. in 2012. Thirteen people have died, 60,000 homes have been damaged and property losses have passed \$20.7 billion. Nearly 7 trillion gallons of rain pummeled Louisiana between Aug. 8 and 14. That is enough to fill more than 10.4 million Olympic-size swimming pools.

"The rainfall is unprecedented," said Louisiana Gov. See Therapist, page 24

# Washington bestows \$7,500 on Idyllwild

On Tuesday, Aug. 23, Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington asked his board of supervisors colleagues to approve the use of Community Improvement Funds to help several Idyllwild organizations — the Association of Idyllwild Realtors, Forest Folk and the Idyllwild Arts Foundation.

The realtors received \$3,000 for play equipment to be installed at the Town Hall playground. The association will double this gift with another \$3,000, which it received as the Placemaker grant from the National Association of Realtors. A minimum of \$6,000 will be available for new playground equipment, but the association would like to augment that, according to Kathy Wilson of the AIR.



## One minor-injury motorcycle crash over the weekend

One minor-injury motorcycle crash occurred over the last week on Hill highways.

Rodriguez complained of minor abrasions to his right arm and was transported by a private party to San Gorgonio Memorial Hospital in Banning. No other persons or vehicles were involved in the incident.

#### Pinyon woman's arson trial depends on competency

Last month, Judge Mark Mandiio had suspended the arson prosecution of Traci Farley, 52, of Pinyon, a woman who was charged in June with 13 counts of arson.

On Aug. 17, Mandilo received the medical reports of Farley's mental competence. He will review them before proceeding with further court actions. However, he did ask one of the doctors for further clarification of his report.

In one of the two supplement reports, the physician was asked to specifically address whether Farley is competent or not competent to stand trial.

Consequently, the next hearing is scheduled for Aug. 31. Farley is still in custody, without bail.

"She is charged with 13 separate small arson fires all lit on or around the same day. All started at different spots relatively close to each other, near her house," wrote John Hall, district attorney information specialist. "As charged, we believe the evidence shows 12 of the fires were brush/forest land and one of the fires was a neighbor's fence."

# **Body found in Pinyon** Pines area

Authorities confirmed the discovery of a woman's body near Ribbonwood Drive, just east of Highway 74 on Sunday, Aug. 21. Riverside County Sheriff's Department Hemet Station Deputy Mike Vasquez said identity of the adult female was being withheld until notification of

"Department members used the aid of a helicopter to reach the body," said Vasquez, RCSD public information officer. "The area is close to where a person was reported missing recently."

Josephene Youssef, 71, was reported missing by family members on Tuesday, June 7, when she did not return from a walk from the family home in Pinyon Pines. Authorities conducted a search at the time, using air and ground search and rescue teams, but were unable to locate Youssef. The family launched a Facebook campaign hoping to find Youssef, noting that she suffered from dementia and spoke only Arabic.

The home is not far from the area where the body was discovered on Sun-





# IWD income up; well levels falling

At the Idyllwild Water District last week, the directors approved expanding the salary schedule from 10 to 14 steps. No other action was taken, but General Manager Tom Lynch and the board did discuss water condi-

At the July meeting, the board had approved this salary action for just the wastewater supervisor's position. At this meeting, the board approved the expanded salary scale for all positions.

Lynch assured the board this would not affect current budget projections.

"There will be a fiscal impact eventually. It will be a major cost to the district, "noted Vice President John Cook. "Reluctantly, I see a need because we're unable to recruit the best people."

Once again, the water program had positive net income. In July, net income for the water program was nearly \$29,000. Cook acknowledged that July and August are "Hosny's favorite months." Water sales tend to peak in these months and the corresponding high revenues benefit finances, Financial Officer Hosny Shouman confirmed

"It's nice to see a positive number after so many negatives," Cook added. "Good to find income rather than a loss." However, in the past year, the water program has had only one month (November 2015) where expenses exceeded water revenue and five months where the net income exceeded \$20,000.

In water business, Lynch reported that the district was still in water emergency Stage 2. "Production increased because consumption is up from the previous months," he said.

Since water consumption is up and Foster Lake remains empty, he had to operate more wells last month. The groundwater level for most of the wells declined from June to July, according to his report.

"This is a bellwether because we're in a five-year drought," Lynch stressed. "We'll do all we can to not move into Stage 3.'

In July, IWD consumed 9.6 million gallons, which is See IWD income, page 6

# A well flow report contains mystery number

Before the Idyllwild Water District meeting ended last week, General Manager Tom Lynch gave the directors a report with the monthly flow from each well used between July 2015 through July 2016.

This was in response to Director Steve Kunkle's questioning. He was absent from this meeting.

Earlier in the meeting, Lynch reported on the falling well levels and that Foster Lake remains dry. This table addressed the relative productivity of wells in use each month.

While the well flow for each month was apparent, the table had a column on the right side labeled "TOTALS." Mathematically, this was the sum of each well's monthly flow in gallons per minute.

However, summing a rate, such as gpm, does not appear to yield a meaningful number. Foster Lake well no. 2 produced water between July and October 2015. The monthly flows ranged from 26.2 to 29.3 gpm for three months and in October it was 4.0 gpm. The "TOTALS" column correctly computes a figure of 87.4. But it is not clear whether this represents some cumulative flow or production in gallons or other units.

On Wednesday, Lynch said this column was the "total annual production equivalent." Yet he would not explain

what this represents. Is it gallons, cubic feet or acre feet?


In response to an email asking for help to use the table to describe the district's water condition, Lynch declined any further communication with the Town Crier. Thus he would not explain what this number means and how it affects the district's water condition.

"I had prepared answers to these questions, but after reading your paper's various assertions, and that I am somehow unqualified for my position, maybe I shouldn't be responding to any of your water-related questions," he wrote.

As an example of why the "TOTALS" column doesn't make sense, if you drove 10 miles per hour from Hemet to Idyllwild in July, then 5 mph in August and 15 miles per hour in September, IWD says your annual equivalent speed is 30 mph, more than twice your maximum in any month.

When asked if they could help explain the term "total annual production equivalent," neither Fern Valley Water District General Manager Victor Jimenez nor Director Robert Krieger, a water engineer, said they were familiar with this unit. They also did not understand the summing of rates to yield a meaningful measure, unless the numbers were divided by the number of months in which they were produced to yield an average flow.

But Lynch insisted the figure was "TOTALS," equivalent production.

I've cut back the paper count because each plate (four pages) costs a bundle.

The week before a holiday or major event, such as the Fourth or the jazz fest, means more work for our staff, particularly for those who handle advertising.

But the week following becomes much tougher as advertising drops significantly and thus, the paper's size. When that occurs and so many other events throughout the weekend, I must squeeze a great deal of news into a smaller newspaper.

Photos run smaller and so must coverage of events. We have no photographers on staff any longer, just ourselves. All others are freelancers. As the town changes, we must do more with less.

Our columnists may not write tomes any longer but keep their columns to a certain word count. If not, it may not be published in print form but online.

We have businesses begging us to cover their events for free. That space is valuable. It is our biggest asset. We receive no tax dollars or public funds. We rely on selling that space to keep our doors open. We wouldn't be here if I gave it away.

Thus, the only way to guarantee it will make it in the paper is to advertise it.

#### Why was IWD bill so high?

It has come to my attention that a few other people, other than myself, have had problems with outrageous Idyllwild Water District bills.

I am a part-timer. I work in Los Angeles. When I can, I enjoy time in my Idyllwild cabin.

For over 50 years, the water bill averaged \$28. And in this time of drought, I never used so much water as to receive the higher-tier penalty charges for exces-

When I left my cabin in early May to return to Los Angeles, as we still had freezing nights, I opened all of my faucets in the cabin, put in anti-freeze, and closed the main value. I did not return to Idyllwild until the last weekend of May.

A serviceman came to my door and warned me there would be a very high charge for the month. "Why? I was only here three or four days this month."

The bill for the month was over \$1,400. This bill includes the higher-tier charges.

In those weeks, I had not occupied the cabin. The main valve remained shut. Anti-freeze remained in the lines.

Had a tanker truck pumped thousands of gallons of water from my line?

To prevent freezing of the pipes, I had opened all the faucets inside the cabin.

Even if someone had stolen the water by opening the main valve and running hoses to my outside faucets, the house would have been flooded. And the volume of water taken would have required parking the truck on my road for days.

Even if there had been a broken pipe — a river of thousands of gallons? there would have been a new gulley down the hillside.

Robbery? A broken pipe? Not possible.

With an average bill for years of \$28, I am dismayed that I am being required to pay for water that I did not use. The district claims that the meter was working. No one can explain the vast volume of water recorded by the me-

I offered to compromise and pay for the water at the lower tier. The district refused to lower the bill.

This is the first time in over 56 years we have had such a problem. I had hoped that it could have been resolved. I did ask for a new meter and a new valve. But I still must pay for the water I did not use.

# Familiarity breeds acceptance ...

As you may have noticed (if you haven't been living under a rock for the last year), the general election is only a few months away.

While it's hard to decipher when (if ever) a politician is telling the truth, one fact is glaringly obvious: The things we are exposed to repeatedly feel more true because of a mechanism known as cognitive ease.

Cognitive ease is a measure of how hard your brain is working. Watching funny cat videos on YouTube is easy. Hard is when you try to multiply 234 by 37.

Statements that are true generally elicit cognitive ease. When you hear things such as "Fire is hot, ice is cold, the Earth revolves around the Sun," not only do they intuitively feel true, they also feel familiar.

The problem (or advantage if you are a politician) arises with the fact that cognitive ease can be achieved in other ways. In a recent experiment the University of Michigan Psychology Department conducted, researchers placed ads in the school newspaper.

Each ad consisted of only one of the following nonsense words: kardirga, ikifaf, biwonjni, nansoma, saricik. The ads asked readers if they thought these words meant something good or something bad.

Turns out that the more frequently a word appeared in the newspaper, the more people thought it meant something good. This experiment has since been repeated by several universities and confirms Michigan's findings. However, the findings are even more general than that.

Other studies have shown that songs heard repeatedly on the radio are judged more favorably and participants looking at yearbook photos tend to consider the people in the photos more likable the more they see the photo.

Cognitive ease also is at the core of the advertising industry. The idea that is repeated often enough — from black carbonated sugar water that can shut down your kidneys, to erection pills that can give you a heart attack to Orangutan-looking narcissistic presidential candidates — can start to sound less dangerous and even somewhat appealing.

If you think about it, this comes down to basic biology. Our brains have evolved to identify threats and anything novel is a potential threat. But after repeated exposure, it becomes familiar and over time, a sign of safety instead of a threat. Was it really a surprise that Walter Cronkite eventually became known as the most trusted man in America?

So if your campaign manager is smart and wants to improve voters' perceptions of your honesty and trustworthiness, don't hide from radio or television, get your face out there and talk, just talk, then talk some more.

If it can work for a guy who thinks a wall can stop any individual with a ladder, some rope or a shovel and a three-day weekend from getting the best of it, then it can work for you.

#### Covered Cal health insurance rates increasing for 2017

# Shopping for plans can still save money

Last month, Covered California announced its rates for health insurance in 2017 with some health plans intending to expand into new areas this year. This will provide more competition for state health insurance consumers.

The statewide weighted average change will be 13.2 percent, up from 4 percent in 2016 and 4.2 percent in 2015. Inland Empire plans will increase an average of 10 percent compared to 1 percent last year.

"Looking over the last three years, you average these three years, that's about 7 percent," said Covered California Executive Director Peter V. Lee. "That is dramatically lower than we were seeing before the Affordable Care Act when double-digit increases were the norm."

However, most consumers will see a much smaller increase — or pay less next year — if they switch to another plan. In the Inland Empire, the growth of the lowest-priced bronze and silver plan is about half the statewide average.

Mitigating the price increases will be the federal government's subsidy. About 90 percent of CC enrollees get help to pay for their premiums. The average subsidy covers roughly 77 percent of the consumer's monthly premium. While premiums will rise, the subsidies will rise as well, CC says.

"Shopping is going to be more important this year than ever before," Lee said. "Almost 80 percent of our consumers will either be able to pay less than they are paying now, or see their rates go up by no more than 5 percent, if they shop and buy the lowest-cost plan at their same benefit level. That's the power of shopping."

Some consumers who choose to keep their plan will see a significant increase in their premium for 2017,

while others will see a more modest increase, depending on where they live and what insurance plan they have. The increases for the lowest-priced bronze and silver plans, which have more than 90 percent of CC's enrollment, are 3.9 percent and 8.1 percent.

Consumers will begin receiving notices in October, when they will have an opportunity to review their new rates and change plans for their 2017 health coverage, according to the CC press release.

Lee said the average rate increase reflects the cost of medical care for consumers, not excessive profit.

In 2017, health-care premium rates will increase throughout the nation, not just in California, because of the expiration of the ACA's reinsurance, a program that subsidized health care plans that enrolled higher-cost individuals.

Reinsurance was designed to help keep rates down during the first three years of the exchanges to stabilize the market and attract more consumers to build a healthy risk mix. According to CC, this one-time adjustment added between 4 and 6 percent to this year's rate change.

Other reasons for rate increases include:

- $\bullet$  The rising cost of health care, especially specialty drugs.
- Increased usage because of pent-up demand from individuals without health insurance before 2015.
- Special enrollment rules allowing some consumers to delay enrolling in health insurance until they become sick or need care, which seems to have had a significant impact on rates for two insurance plans.

CC's 11 health insurers are competing across the state for its 1.4 million members. Among the new rules is that all consumers either select or are provisionally assigned a primary-care physician within 60 days of their plan going into effect.

Another change CC is requiring will reduce the number of services subject to a consumer's deductible. Start-

#### The right to bear arms

EDITOR:

The Second Amendment to the Constitution states: "A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security

of a free State, the right of the people to bear Arms, shall not be infringed."

The Second Amendment has been supported by the United States Supreme Court as an individual right to own a gun. If a new administration changes the makeup of the Supreme Court, which then finds that individuals do not have the right to own a gun and the federal government then decides to confiscate guns; the Fifth Amendment — "nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation" — takes effect.

There are an estimated 245 to 360 million guns in the United States with an estimated value of \$200 to \$400 per gun. The financial cost would be \$49 to \$144 billion for the guns alone. That excludes the related litigation costs to determine disputed values and the confiscation costs.

Since the federal government does not know where the guns are, which federal agency will actually search for and confiscate the guns is a problem, as many people will not willingly surrender their guns.

In many jurisdictions, the elected sheriff is the primary law enforcement, and may or may not cooperate with the federal government. The real cost would be the social unrest accompanied by further disintegration of the people's trust in the federal government.

This then leads to the words of the Declaration of Independence: "We hold these truths to be self evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness ... That whenever any form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or abolish it, and to institute new Government ..."

# Mosquito that can carry Zika virus found near Hemet

#### First West Nile case in county this year

The invasive Aedes aegypti mosquito, which can harbor and transmit the dangerous Zika virus, has been detected near the Hemet outskirts, according to Riverside County vector control officials, who announced this Wednesday, Aug. 17.

A single mosquito was caught in a vector-control trap near Yale Street and Johnston Avenue in the Hemet's unincorporated area two days earlier, Monday, Aug. 15. The mosquito has been found in several county locations in the past year, but this is the closest to Idyllwild.

Two cases of Zika victims have been confirmed in the county; however, both individuals contracted the disease while traveling outside of California.

Non-native to California, Aedes aegypti is a blackand-white, day-biting mosquito that prefers to feed on humans. It has the potential to spread the Zika virus, Chikungunya, yellow fever and dengue.

While these viruses are not currently transmitted in California, there is a potential for them to be introduced into the state through infected international travelers.

Unlike native California mosquitoes, this mosquito lays its eggs just above the water surface in containers such as flower pots, pet bowls, discarded tires and bird baths. It is capable of breeding in as little as a bottle cap of water. Eggs can survive on surfaces even after water has been drained. Therefore, residents should not only drain any outside standing water, but then scrub the items that contained water.

The county's vector control staff will continue seeking

the mosquito in areas surrounding the point of discovery. That effort will include door-to-door inspections of residential and commercial properties.

#### West Nile virus

In other county health news, the first confirmed case of West Nile virus was announced Friday, Aug. 19

"A 73-year-old woman who lives in western Riverside County is the first confirmed human case of West Nile Virus in the county this year," Dr. Cameron Kaiser, county public health officer, said in a press release.

Tests confirmed the infection, but after hospitalization, the woman has been released and is expected to recover, the press release added.

This virus also is transmitted through mosquito bites, but by a different mosquito species than the one that transmits Zika.

Health officials emphasized that the risk of serious illness to humans is low. Most infected individuals will not experience any illness. Elderly people and those with compromised immune systems are at greatest risk for

# Fern Valley water conditions stable

#### District enters new fiscal year with reserves greater than \$1 million

Financial and water conditions, and authorizing several small projects were the business of Friday's Fern Valley Water District board meeting.

The final fiscal year 2015-16 results were discussed with total revenue of about \$1.1 million exceeding initial projects by about \$65,000. Expenditures were \$1.3 million, nearly \$200,000 less than budget. Net income was a negative \$250,000, which lowered reserves to \$1.2 million entering the new fiscal year 2016-17.

General Manager Victor Jimenez reported that stream flow was declining. But well production was only 20 percent of total water supply in July compared to slightly more than 40 percent last year.

'Static well levels recording show very minor increases and decreases in all well levels," Jimenez wrote in his report. "We haven't seen any dropping lately," he added. The office observation groundwater well level fell only 1 inch since July, he said.

The leak detection program is continuing. "We found only one and it was estimated to be 0.5 gallons per minute and has been repaired," he told the board.

The board continued its discussion of expanding the office building. At this time, it was decided to move forward with developing plans and estimates, but seeking the permit and authorizing funding may be postponed until next fiscal year.

The board did authorize improving the air conditioning and modifying the new vehicles to improve their service to staff.

As the meeting ended, board members complimented Jimenez on his reports and thoroughness of his memoranda and recommendations to the board.

# Prop 52 aims to extend private hospital fees that help fund Medi-Cal

Proposition 52, "State Fees on Hospitals. Federal Medi-Cal Matching Funds. Initiative Statutory and Constitutional Amendment," is fairly straightforward in its objectives but a bit complicated in its verbiage.

Simply put, it aims to prevent the 2018 expiration of an existing hospital fee that helps fund Medi-Cal health care to low-income Californians, seniors, children and adults with disabilities. The existing hospital fee structure is designed to help defray costs of "uncompensated care provided by hospitals to uninsured patients and to children's health coverage."

As background, the federal government established the Medicaid program to help pay for health-care services for the above-referenced groups. In California, the program is called Medi-Cal. In order for any state to receive federal Medicaid funds, the state has to contribute a matching amount of its own money.

In California, a program was created in 2009 (renewed in 2013 as the Medi-Cal Hospital Reimbursement Act) to have California private hospitals, rather than taxpayers, pay a fee to help the state obtain federal matching funds. As a result, California hospitals began to receive more than \$2 billion a year in federal matching funds to help pay for uncompensated patient services.

Under existing law, in 2015-16, private hospitals paid \$4.6 billion to help the state secure federal government matches of \$4.4 billion. That fund, \$8.1 billion, consists of \$3.7 billion in Medi-Cal payments and grants to hospitals, and \$4.4 billion in federal matches. It provides a net benefit to California hospitals, according to the California Legislative Analyst's Office, of \$3.5 billion (\$8.1 billion in payments received by hospitals minus the \$4.6 billion of fees paid by private hospitals).

The current law authorizing these payments is due to expire on Jan. 1, 2018. The original 2009 act has been renewed three times by the Legislature but each time there were attempts to divert the money to other uses. Prop 52, if passed, would prevent the Legislature from diverting the funds. Any change in how the funds are used would have to be approved by California voters.

A "yes" vote supports requiring voter approval to change the dedicated use of current hospital fees used to draw matching federal money to fund Medi-Cal services. The initiative also would change existing law to require a two-thirds rather than majority vote of the Legislature to end the hospital fee program.

Should the measure not pass, and the Legislature fails to extend it prior to its Jan. 2018 expiration, then federal matching funds (from \$3 to \$4 billion annually) would no longer be available and could impact quality of medical care for targeted groups.

Proponents contend this federal money helps provide health care through Medi-Cal to more than 13 million Californians, including 6.7 million children, 1.6 million seniors with chronic diseases, 4.5 million low-income working families whose wages can't sustain them and the disabled

The measure is supported by a wide coalition of groups, including the California Teachers Association, California Chamber of Commerce, California Professional Firefighters and California Democratic Party.

A "no" vote would allow the Legislature to change, extend or eliminate the hospital fee program with a majority vote.

Prop 52 is opposed primarily by the Service Employees International Union, United Health Care Workers West, who calls it a "no-strings-attached money grab" by hospitals, with no accountability of how the money is to be spent on patient services. They contend the proposition would divert resources from patients and communities to special interests, such as hospital CEOs and lobbyists.

Supporters, including the California Health Foundation and Trust, Dignity Health, Sutter Health, the Children's Hospital of Los Angeles, Adventist Health and Loma University Medical Center, have raised more than \$59 million and spent \$47 million.

Opponents, including SEIU West and SEIU United, have raised more than \$11 million and spent \$3.5 million

Extension of the hospital fee, under this initiative, also requires federal approval since federal matching funds are involved.

Kevin Riggs, "Yes on 52" spokesman, said, "Hospitals see it as a way to provide long-term protection for this agreement [hospital fee/federal matches] and to remove some of the uncertainty in the political process."

David Kieffer, SEIU's director of governmental relations said, "I agree that hospitals have a say in how it [the funds] should be used. The issue is should they have the only voice in the process?"

vate School in Yorba Linda. She briefly student taught at Idyllwild School in 2011.



John Bel Edwards, with some parishes having experienced more than 32 inches of rain in one day. Thirty thousand people have been rescued from flooded homes, as have more than 1,000 pets. The Red Cross said 7,000 people are in shelters and thousands more are without power.

And after the rain, and when floodwaters begin to subside, lingering dampness in walls, wood, carpets and homes provides the perfect host environment for mold to spread, posing serious health risks, especially to infants, children, seniors and any persons with immune deficiencies.

Leopold said she and Brun need art supplies of all kinds: paper, markers, brushes, glue, glue sticks, crayons, duct tape, watercolors, plastic water containers, paper towels, beads, yarn and knitting needles. "Any art supplies or funds will be appreciated," said Leopold. "Art has proven to be a powerful tool in helping families and children during difficult times. I will be joining [Brun] ... to train and begin art therapy programs for children in the shelters. What supplies we don't use will go to the schools in the area, many of them flooded."
