The JPA: What's in it for Idyllwild?

Chief Reitz answers

Last June, the Idyllwild Fire Protection District and the City of San Jacinto voted to form a joint power authority to supply the city with fire and medical emergency services. It was originally scheduled to go into effect July 1, but a last-minute uncertainty involving dispatch service resulted in the city voting to put off implementation of the JPA until July 1, 2017.

Everyone can see what San Jacinto is getting from this — greater control of its fire and medical emergency services at a lower cost. But Idyllwilders have repeatedly asked the Town Crier: What's in it for Idyllwild? What does Idyllwild gain by having our fire administrators devoting much of their time to the JPA?

So last Thursday, the Town Crier sat down with IFPD Fire Chief Patrick Reitz to learn his answers to these questions.

Reitz stated that what Idyllwild gains from the JPA is the sharing of costs, "mostly at the administrative level." Specifically, the chief explained that half of his salary and benefits — and half of those of Battalion Chief Mark LaMont — would be paid by the JPA. So, even if he and LaMont were to receive 50-percent increases in salary and benefits because of the increase in their work and responsibility, Idyllwild taxpayers still stood to benefit by many 10s of thousands of dollars annually, according to Reitz. For just an example, if the chief's and battalion chief's combined salaries were \$200,000 and they were to increase by 50 percent to \$300,000, IFPD would be responsible for \$150,000 of those salaries — \$50,000 less than IFPD is paying now, in this example.

IFPD advocates Measure W for public understanding

On Wednesday, Sept. 28, the Idyllwild Fire Commission held two public meetings to explain the purpose of Measure W and to answer questions about it.

Measure W was approved at IFPD's July 26 meeting. The commissioners unanimously passed a resolution to double the current \$65 per parcel or unit fee to \$130.

Because the current fee is based on the number of units on each parcel, it is not strictly a parcel fee. For undeveloped

lots, the fee will go from \$32.50 to \$130. For some parcels with large structures, the fee may actually fall.

The measure is on the Nov. 8 ballot and requires two-thirds of voters to approve. The commission is offering these sessions (two more meetings will be Oct. 5) to educate the public about the measure and its purpose.

"That's a tough standard — two votes for every 'no,'" said Commission President Jerry Buchanan. "School districts have a 55-percent standard."

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Cal Trans resumes work on Hwy. 371

The California Department of Transportation will continue work this week to complete the Highway 371 left-turn lane project located from just west of Bahrman Road to just west of Bailiff Road in Anza.

Caltrans announced that the project scope has been altered to accommodate the extension of a two-way continuous left-turn lane from the center of Anza to the intersection at Bahrman rather than the originally planned left-turn lanes at Bahrman.

Requests from the Anza community at a recent Municipal Advisory Council

meeting led Caltrans to change the lane configuration based on the access needs of community and local businesses.

Final work to complete the project continued on Monday, Oct. 3. Lane closures with flagging will take place Monday through Friday from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. for about another week, weather permitting.

More work will take place throughout the project limits with minimal traffic impacts until completion, which is expected by the end of October. The project was originally scheduled to last until the end of 2016.

Injury crash in Idyllwild and fender bender above Palm Desert

One injury crash, requiring medical transport, took place in Idyllwild over the last week along with a fender bender on Highway 74 above Palm Desert.

At 10:26 p.m. Monday, Sept. 26, Miguel Pablo Lopez, 23, of Idyllwild, was driving his silver 2008 Ford Focus southbound on Highway 243, 268 feet south of Riverside County Playground Road, when for unknown reasons he ran off the road when negotiating a turn and hit a utility pole, according to the California Highway Patrol report.

Lopez was transported to Desert Regional Medical Center complaining of pain to chest and abdomen.

There were no other vehicles or persons involved in this incident.

At about 10:42 a.m. Friday, Sept. 30, Mary Ellen DeCremer, 61, of Yucca Valley, was driving her 1994 red Pontiac Trans Am northbound on Highway 74, 1.7 miles west of Big Horn Drive, when she attempted to pass another vehicle, made an unsafe turning movement and crashed into the mountain on the left side of the roadway. DeCremer suffered minor injuries but declined transportation.

Her vehicle sustained moderate to major damage and required towing. No other persons or vehicles were involved in the crash, according to the CHP report.

Injured hiker airlifted off Mt. San Jacinto

At about noon Saturday, Oct. 1, Cal Fire/Riverside County firefighters responded to the report of an ill hiker in a remote area of the San Jacinto Wilderness at the top of the Palm Springs Aerial Tramway.

Cal Fire Copter 301 crew safely transported an adult male from a remote area about 9 miles into the trail to a waiting ambulance at the bottom of the tram.

The patient was evaluated for non-life threatening injuries.

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

Speaker alleviates stress of recent earthquake swarm

But danger always present on the Hill

Hundreds of earthquakes — from very small (magnitude less than 1) to minor (magnitude 4.0 to 5.0) occurred near the Salton Sea last week. Again demonstrating his prescience for disaster, Mike Feyder, head of the local Mountain Disaster Preparedness group, had already scheduled a community meeting to hear a speaker from the California Institute of Technology's Office of Earthquake Programs.

The bay of the Idyllwild Fire Station was filled Saturday with people who came to learn more about quakes and preparing for them. While Margaret Vinci, head of the earthquake program at Cal Tech, assured the crowd that the swarm of quakes south of Idyllwild was not necessarily a precursor for the "big one," she did emphasize the need to be prepared if it occurs.

"The more and better prepared you are, the better you will survive," was the first message Vinci delivered.

In his comments before Vinci spoke, Idyllwild Fire

Chief Patrick Reitz reinforced the need for local preparation. "The Salton Sea is a wake-up call for us," he said. "We need you all to be prepared because we can't get to everyone immediately."

Idyllwild and most of the Hill rests on a granite base. Tremors will move through this terrain quickly, which reduces the probability of major damage compared to the soft soil under Los Angeles. However, the danger is the numerous boulders and rocks along and above the local highways. The undulating ground can easily dislodge these boulders, which could damage and block highways similar to when the boulder blocked traffic on Highway 243 between Idyllwild and Pine Cove in January, Vinci warned.

Earthquakes are just one of many potential disasters making California a multi-hazard state. The secondary effects of quakes — fires, road closures, pipeline disruption and more — can create the damage.

Quakes are the biggest natural risk throughout the world. More than a thousand quakes occur each day, Vinci said. The U.S. Geological Service reported nearly 800 quakes in the past month, just in California, and more than 7,000 in the past year.

"In the U.S., the most are in Alaska, and California is second," Vinci said. "We are the most at risk because of our population and infrastructure."

If one hears the earth rumble and then feels the shaking, the advice is "Drop, cover and hold on."



Editor's note: *In honor of National Newspaper Week, this is a guest editorial.*

Several years ago cyberspace was frenzied over many popular websites going dark for 24 hours to protest a federal bill meant to crack down on video piracy.

The Stop Online Piracy Act – or SOPA – was a controversial and perhaps misguided effort championed by the Motion Picture Association of America to end illegal online sharing of copyrighted material, primarily movies and music.

To protest SOPA and its potential threats to the First Amendment, Wikipedia, Google, Reddit and – heaven forbid – I Can Haz Cheezburger, among many others, all shut down for a 24-hour period to show the web-surfing world what it would be like without its daily fix of photos of cats riding in baby strollers.

SOPA was eventually defeated, but a strong, valid point was made. We had come to rely on those websites for information and entertainment. Their value to internet users was unquestioned.

Now imagine your own corner of the world without its local newspaper. At first, you might not notice much difference if the daily or weekly paper failed to show up in your driveway or mailbox, or on your computer screen or smartphone.

Rather quickly, a good fraction of the internet itself would go dark again. This time involuntarily. If you've never noticed, the web and thousands of sites are populated by millions of stories and photos produced by local journalists. There'd be gaping holes on sites like Google and even Facebook where newspaper content is consumed and shared.

And soon an oily sheen would start to coat all the surfaces in town. With the watchdog off duty, things would start to go awry. The sunlight of transparency would inevitably set.

That's because a terrific amount of content that seems birthed magically of the digital age actually starts out as the scribbles or recordings of intrepid community reporters at city halls, school board meetings

TC putting up barriers

EDITOR:

A public special meeting was suggested to hear and discuss the opinion of district legal counsel. Directors Kunkle and Rockwell refused.

A public special meeting was called to interview qualified candidates for interim manager but Rockwell could not attend.

Another special public meeting was called and briefly held. It was aborted after the second of seven agenda topics because Rockwell, at the urging of Marge Muir and Jack Clark who had handed her a secret note, grabbed her purse and stormed out of the meeting.

As president of the district board, I thought is there a way to keep the district moving forward for the benefit of all our residents and customers? Political disagreement on whether to elect or appoint new directors should not affect business decisions and goals.

Instead of continuing the stalemate, I suggested to Kunkle and Rockwell that we hold one or more public special meetings. This was very reasonable given the prior refusals to attend District meetings.

The Town Crier published two articles condemning my invitation to gather for public special meetings. The Town Crier called the invitation a secret meeting.

Their condemnation does not square with the Brown Act. In discussing the call for a special meeting under the act, the California Attorney General has opined that "[s]o long as substantive consideration of agenda items does not occur, a majority may meet without providing notice to the public in order to call the meeting and prepare the agenda."

The district is in a world of hurt, having lost two of its five directors and its manager. Now, instead of urging the board to meet, the Town Crier puts up unreasonable barriers to arranging public



meetings to conduct important public business.

Response from Jack Clark: 1) I did not hand Director June Rockwell a note,

secret or otherwise, or anything else, for that matter, and Mr. Cook's implication that I in any way even suggested, much less "urged," her to adjourn or leave the meeting is false. (Also, Rockwell informs that she doesn't carry a purse.) What else did Mr. Cook see that evening that didn't happen?

2) Mr. Cook's implication that by sending Kunkle and Rockwell an email suggesting they have informal meetings he was merely calling a nonpublic meeting in order to call a public meeting and prepare the agenda, is disingenuous.

In the email, Cook did not suggest "public special meetings." He suggested that the three directors meet in a "study session" to create a to-do list of things to be "done, studied or changed," and that they "meet during the day to hear what staff sees as things to be done," and then in the evening the directors "could see what the public would like on the list."

This is not a meeting to merely "prepare an agenda" for a public special meeting. Agendas are required to be formally posted 24 hours ahead of a special meeting, so agendas cannot be discussed and prepared the same day as a public meeting. Government Code section 54952.2 provides that "any congregation" of a majority of the members of a board at the same time and location — whether designated a "study session" or whatever — even to just hear or discuss any item that is within the board's jurisdiction is a Brown Act meeting requiring notice to the public.

The "unreasonable barriers" Mr. Cook accuses the Town Crier of raising are in reality California law, with which Mr. Cook sought to dispense. Cook's emails to Kunkle and Rockwell are available for the public to examine at the Town Crier.

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

and statehouses nationwide and around the world.

And without their efforts, many officials would find it too tempting and much too easy to fudge the rules on public meetings, open records and a multitude of other rights to which taxpayers are entitled.

For instance, just here in Mississippi taxpayers may never have known the full story about the public hospital on the Gulf Coast that had squandered the pensions of its employees.

City officials in a northeastern community of the state may have decided it's simply too convenient or expedient to not hold all their meetings in private. Why shouldn't they, the council members and attorneys might shrug. Not many people show up to the meetings anyway.

Or how about another town getting by without explaining to its citizens why a Department of Justice forfeiture fund had evaporated?

All of these are real and recent examples where a local newspaper made a difference on behalf of the citizens it serves.

I'll be honest: Covering the public board meetings is not glamorous work. It can be rather tedious, actually. But like plumbing a toilet, sometimes a job is undervalued until there's no one willing or able to do the work.

That's not to say the job of a community journalist is unpleasant (despite some national polls that will tell you as much); it's often one of the best in town, full of its own rewards. But it certainly can be — and often is — taken for granted.

Without newspapers, you might say, a substitute watchdog would come along to serve in the role. Eventually perhaps, but how much damage is done in the interim? And why put out to pasture a medium that's held this responsibility close to its heart for centuries?

If it ain't broke, don't fix it we say.

Oct. 2-8 is National Newspaper Week, a time when those of us who work on behalf of newspaper media will make an extra effort to sing the praises of community journalists and the work they do for all of us.

Literally, in towns, counties, parishes and provinces across North America, your local newspaper is the way to know what's going on in the world around us.

We're not under any illusion our work will ever be as popular as that video of the tabby playing the piano. But we're still proud of what we do. And we hope you can be, too.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK URGES FIRE AWARENESS YEAR ROUND ...

Every year in our country since 1922, Fire Prevention Week has been observed during the month of October.

It was established to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. Over two days, this fire killed more than 250 people, destroyed more than 17,400 structures and burned more than 2,000 acres.

The cause or blame for this fire is one of legend and myth and has involved everything from Mrs. O'Leary and her cows to meteorites and neighborhood boys. So in 1920, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation declaring National Fire Prevention Day.

Ever since 1922, Fire Prevention Week has been observed every year on the Sunday through Saturday period in which Oct. 9 falls. This annual event is not celebrated with festivities but as a way to keep the public informed about the importance of fire prevention.

Over the years, the theme for this week has had a variety of fire-prevention topics. Some of these came about as a result of the previous years' statistics related to fire cause, deaths and injuries compiled by the National Fire Protection Association, United States Fire Administration and other reporting organizations.

Safety campaigns over the years have focused on preventing cooking fires, care with candles, exit drills in the home and, in recent years, smoke detectors.

This year's theme is "Don't Wait — Check the Date! Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years." The idea behind this is that smoke alarms don't last forever and should be replaced at a 10-year interval.

While the audible alarm may sound when you push the test button, the internal mechanical part that detects the smoke particles to activate the alarm in an emergency or presence of smoke may not be reliable many years later.

To check the date, simply remove the detector and look at the label on the back. If you are within the timeframe, remember to change your batteries twice a year when we fall back and spring forward during time changes or sooner, if needed.

Three out of five home fire deaths result from fires in properties without working smoke alarms. They really do save lives.

In addition to the national fire prevention campaign, also remember that this time of year in Southern California our fire season continues with the threat of Santa Ana winds. It is important to remain vigilant and continue to create and maintain your defensible space around the home and be prepared.

Fire season is not over yet, and our area is still vulnerable to wildfires.

Two death penalty ballot propositions with very different outcomes

Two 2016 California ballot initiatives seek to amend the death penalty, with very different outcomes. One, Proposition 62 (Repeal of the Death Penalty), proposes to abolish the death penalty and substitute life sentences without possibility of parole for all first-degree murder convictions. Inmates currently on Death Row would have their sentences changed to life without possibility of parole.

The other, Proposition 66 (the Death Penalty Procedures Initiative) seeks to retain the death penalty and amend current procedures.

For some the choice is clear and primarily a moral one — that legally taking the life of another is wrong.

For others, the system is procedurally flawed — that the chance of mistaken convictions is too great based on recent history of conviction reversals, many based on new DNA evidence; that imposition of justice in death penalty cases is arbitrary, based on adequacy of legal representation, race, politics, geographic location of the trial and plea bargaining.

For others, the argument is a constitutional one — that housing murderers on death row for the decades it takes for appeals to be prosecuted and concluded arguably violates the 8th Amendment of cruel and unusual punishment.

And for some, abolishment of the death penalty is logical given the high costs to the state for multi-year legal appeal processes and for maintenance of two death-row prisons with increased security costs and housing requirements for death-row inmates.

According to the nonpartisan California Legislative Analyst's office, death-penalty trials and challenges can take several "decades" to complete, with the state spending \$55 million annually on legal challenges that follow death sentences. Death-penalty inmate housing requirements also come at significant additional cost. According to a study by the California Commission of the Fair Administration of Justice, "The additional cost of confining

an inmate to death row, as compared to the maximum security prisons where those sentenced to life without possibility of parole ordinarily serve their sentences, is \$90,000 per year per inmate. With California's current death row population of 670, that accounts for \$63.3 million annually."

A 2008 Los Angeles Times study found that the death-penalty system costs taxpayers more than \$114 million a year more than comparable life-in-prison costs, and that the enhanced costs of trying a death-penalty case is at least \$1.25 million more than a comparable murder case resulting in life imprisonment.

Proponents of 62, including Jeanne Woodford, a former death row warden, Donald Heller, the author of California's current death-penalty law, and Beth Webb, sister of a victim murdered in 2011, argue that the current system has failed — that taxpayers have spent more than \$5 billion since 1978 to carry out 13 executions at a cost of \$384 million per execution (higher cost than the older 2008 LA Times study found); and that the death penalty carries the "unavoidable risk of executing an innocent person."

Supporters include the California Democratic, Libertarian, and Peace and Freedom parties; California NAACP; California ACLU; California League of Women Voters; Amnesty International USA; California Labor Federation; SEIU California; and the California Federation of Teachers.

A different approach to the death penalty, Prop 66, seeks to "mend," not end, the death penalty. According to the Legislative Analyst, a "yes" vote changes procedures for legal challenges to death sentences, such as time limits on those challenges and revised rules to increase the number of available attorneys for those challenges. Also, condemned inmates could be housed at any state prison.

Under current law, there are two ways to challenge death sentences — "direct" appeals and "habeas corpus" petitions. Death convictions are automatically appealed to the California Supreme Court where questions of violations of state or federal law by the trial court are heard, such as evidence being improperly admitted or excluded

at trial. These direct appeals focus on court proceedings that resulted in the death sentence. Under Prop 66, these direct appeals would continue to be heard by the California Supreme Court.

Habeas corpus petitions (at both California Supreme Court and federal levels) consider different factors, such as the ineffectiveness of the defendant's attorney and other social factors that, had the jury known, would not have resulted in a death penalty. Under Prop 66, habeas corpus petitions would first be heard in the trial courts by the same judge who handled the original murder trial (unless good cause could be shown for another judge to hear the petition). The trial court would be required to explain in writing its decision on each petition which could then be appealed to a Court of Appeal. Court of Appeal decisions could still be appealed to the California Supreme Court.

Legal limits to trial-appeal processes, both direct and habeas corpus appeals, would be fixed at five years maximum from the date of the death sentence. The five-year requirement would apply to new legal challenges, as well as those currently pending in court.

The measure also requires the Judicial Council and the California Supreme Court to change existing procedures for selecting attorneys to represent condemned first-degree-murder inmates — that trial courts rather than the Supreme Court appoint attorneys for habeas corpus petitions; and that the pool of attorneys, currently limited to qualified death-penalty attorneys, be expanded to include attorneys on a list maintained by the Courts of Appeal for non-death penalty cases. The goal is to speed appointment of attorneys in death cases.

The measure allows death-row inmates to be housed in any state prison and exempts the state's execution procedures from the administrative procedures.

The LAO estimates state-prison costs could be less if inmates are transferred to regular state prisons rather than San Quentin with its security and single-cell housing requirements. "In addition, to the extent the measure resulted in additional executions that reduced the

number of condemned inmates, the state would also experience additional savings," notes the LAO.

Proponents argue speeding up and limiting the appeal process timeframe to five years saves taxpayer money, ensures the worst of killers receives the strongest sentence, and brings closure to victims' families.

Supporters include the California Republican Party, California Police Chiefs Association, California Association of Highway Patrolmen, California State Sheriffs' Association, Riverside Sheriffs' Association and the California District Attorneys Association.

Opponents note that the process of death-penalty cases, even under current law, is open to manipulation and mistake, and that once the appeal process is concluded, miscarriages of justice are hard to correct; that moving habeas corpus petitions from the Supreme Court to the court in which the case was heard adds in a potential level of bias and mistake inherent in the original trial proceedings; and that there are significant doubts the proposed fast-tracking could work and that it might prove more expensive than existing processes.

They also note that one in 10 California death sentences are overturned and for that reason there is too much risk of miscarriage of justice to speed up the current process.

Recent polls have Prop 62 leading 66, 48 percent to 37 percent. A similar measure to end the death penalty failed in 2012, garnering only 48 percent of the vote, the level at which the current measure (Prop 62) is polling. For either to pass it would need to crest the 50-percent mark. If both passed, the one with the most votes would prevail.

County budget may reduce sheriff's patrols in all unincorporated areas

Approval of the final Riverside County fiscal 2016-17 budget barely passed last week. The board was divided over approving a lean budget, which still needed reserves to balance, versus more funds to maintain the current level of sheriff's deputies in the unincorporated area.

Since County Executive Office Jay Orr began preparing the budget last winter, he has advised the board of how tight it was and the need to limit increases for the next few years.

Last fall, the board engaged KMPG, an international consulting firm, to study the public safety agencies' budgets and submit recommendations for savings and improved service. These results are still several months away.

However, Supervisors Chuck Washington (3rd District) and Kevin Jeffries (1st District) were willing to provide more funding to the Sheriff's Department to maintain staffing in the unincorporated areas.

"The bulk of the budget goes to public protection that

leaves us little maneuvering room outside of that," said Paul McDonnell, finance director. And he shared that the Sheriff's Department budget for last year ended with a \$14 million savings. Also, the District Attorney's office has found savings to reduce its tentative deficit from \$7 million to \$4 million.

But Jeffries asked, "Is there no proposal today to promote any additional funding to the DA or to the sheriff for us to consider?"

In response, McDonnell said he and his staff would continue working with both offices and the KPMG report, which may be ready by the end of the year, should recommend some changes to generate savings in both agencies.

Second District Supv. John Tavaglione expressed support for Jeffries idea, but urged the board to wait for the final consultant recommendations. "I understand

Supv. Jeffries' concern to put more deputies back on streets, but that's a short-term fix to a fix we're ultimately going to achieve ... it's coming soon."

Jeffries continued to emphasize, "...[t]hat when we adopt this budget we're agreeing to reduce patrol levels." He also argued that the KPMG recommendations would not be implemented until next fiscal year.

While Supv. Marion Ashley (5th District) said he would vote for the budget presented and expected improvements overtime, Washington affirmed his opposition to the proposal.

"I cannot accept a reduction in service for public safety," he stated. "The East Hemet station is hit day-in and day-out. I need more deputies on patrol, not less."

The budget, which Orr presented, was adopted 3-2, with Jeffries and Washington voting "no."

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

Four Chaplains with Logan Creighton

The Friends of the Idyllwild Library will present another in their cultural and informational monthly series at 3 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 12, in the Idyllwild Library Community Room. Logan Creighton will be performing an historical reenactment of the story of the Four Chaplains.

On Feb. 3, 1943, a German submarine torpedoed the SS Dorchester, an ocean liner converted for military service. She was traveling to Greenland and was attacked in the North Atlantic Ocean.

With 900 military passengers and crew aboard, she sank in the early morning hours resulting in the death of

674 men. Four of the soldiers who perished were First Lieutenants George L. Fox, Alexander D. Goode, John P. Washington and Clark V. Poling, each new military chaplains of different faiths, being transported to their new assignments in the Eastern Theater.

The survivors remember them as heroes. Together they calmed the panicked soldiers and each gave up their own lifejackets when the supply ran out. They helped others into lifeboats and linked arms, singing hymns and saying prayers as the ship when down.

Creighton is a returning presenter whose re-enactments of historical people and events have entertained and educated audiences in Idyllwild. He successfully dramatizes the heroism and patriotism of these four men of conviction and faith as they practiced what they preached and gave their lives to save others.

The event is free and open to the public.

Idyllwild Community Fund honors grant recipients

The Idyllwild Community Fund Advisory Committee honored its 2016 grant recipients at its annual reception on Thursday, Sept. 29, at the Rainbow Inn.

A capacity audience was on hand to hear ICF officers discuss the fund's mission and to honor the local nonprofits to which ICF awarded grants this year.

The Idyllwild Community Fund was started in 1995 by a local couple who sought to establish a fund that would benefit the community in perpetuity. Each year ICF awards interest income from the fund to nonprofits it has vetted through site visits to and presentations by grant applicants. The advisory committee's primary mission is to grow the fund by raising money each year and to raise community awareness about ICF.

A highlight of this year's reception was a special award and acknowledgement to Hubert Halkin for his longstanding financial assistance to ICF. Halkin dedicates all his advertising income from his Live Mail site to ICF. That assistance helps ICF fund the Idyllwild Youth Grantmakers afterschool program for Idyllwild Middle School students.

ICF board member Holly Guntermann chairs the Youth Grantmakers program and conducts the eight afterschool sessions that teach Middle School students about philanthropy and community service. At the end of their training sessions, students award up to \$4,000 in grants to local nonprofits that have young people as part of their mission.

Representatives from a new philanthropic organization in town, the Palms to Pines Foundation's Pink Prism Fund, presented more awards to grant recipients.

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Obituary: Roy Mills 1930-2016

Roy Mills, an Idyllwild resident for over four decades, died peacefully at his home on August 23, 2016. He was 86.

His people came from the shtetels and Jewish ghettos of Eastern Europe. During the Russian Civil War and the accompanying ethnic cleansing, his parents immigrated to New York as teenagers, leaving their parents behind.



A child of better times, Roy was born in Brooklyn and in 1943 moved with his family, by train, to Los Angeles. He was an avid stamp collector, loved chess, college football, rare steak, politics, history, and disburbing wildflower seeds. Thanks to this last avocation, spring brings an ocean of purple lupines by his Strawberry Creek home, each year more expansive than the one before.

He excelled in business and economics at UCLA, graduating Phi Beta Kappa. He loved philosophy as well, and had the good fortune to be an assistant of Hans Reichenbach, a close colleague of Albert Einstein. A voracious and analytical reader, Roy's favorite authors included George Orwell, Will and Ariel Durant, Krishnamurti, Buckminster Fuller, and Sri Aurobindu.

He spent his professional life as a Certified Public Accountant in Los Angeles. He did well, eventually becoming partner in his firm.

On lunch breaks he would spin poetry, and, legend has it, Esther Roe, his mother-in-law to be and future Idyllwilder as well, was passing through his office on an errand one day and, noticing the poems, introduced him to her daughter Carol. Esther encouraged Roy to decorate his drab office with Carol's abstract paintings, bursting with color and stimulating forms. After a fateful accident in the early 1950s, Roy pulled Carol from a burning car. Marriage followed soon thereafter. Carol was a beloved Idyllwild artist who passed away in 2014.

Roy & Carol's combined vision led them to settle initially in Laurel Canyon. They arrived 30 years after Houdini and 10 years before Zappa. Ground broke in 1959 on a mid-century masterpiece designed for them by a protégé of famous architect Richard Neutra. Their two children, Evan and Robin, were born there.

He stopped measuring wealth in dollars and retired early. His new profession was to be master of his own time, and to linger in the country rather than country club. His favorite book during this period was E.F. Schumacher's *Small is Beautiful*.

In 1975, Roy and Carol moved the family to the Idyllwild summer home they had designed a few years earlier. Among Roy's newly found pursuits were tracking the creek, the trees, and the movements of squirrels. He watched. Monitored. Commented. Mused. He removed twigs encroaching on his favorite paths and shook the snow off of bent saplings to give them a better chance to see the spring. He cheered the landscape's proceedings through the seasons and years. Proper hikes were to be punctuated by a picnic, preferably atop a large boulder with a view.

They both had a yen for good architecture, art, folk music, and travel, which took them from the Arctic to the Amazon, plus Bali, Cambodia, China, Cuba, Egypt, Japan, Peru and Tibet, to name a few.

While not a social butterfly, Roy was staunchly community minded. He was elected to the Idyllwild Water Board for two terms, volunteering untold time over those years and sometimes asking unpopular questions. Can we be more water efficient? Should we keep building when our resources are finite? In the early 1980s, he helped craft a "Carrying Capacity" study focusing on the limits of resources in Idyllwild, years before the idea of "sustainable development" was popularized. He also volunteered as a financial advisor to ISOMATA (now Idyllwild Arts) and underwrote rents for the Courtyard Gallery for several decades.

When asked why he bought gas in Idyllwild, when it was so much cheaper in the flatlands, he would simply say

Historic Preservation District board meets

The local review board of the Idyllwild Historic Preservation District met in its nominally monthly session with little business before it.

At its Thursday, Sept. 29, meeting at the Idyllwild Library Community Room, the board voted to change its scheduled monthly meetings to quarterly — with the next meeting being at noon Thursday, Jan. 26. The board noted that when they have a project before it, they could resume meeting on a monthly basis.

Said Keith Herron, county historic preservation officer, "The level of business we have before us does not warrant monthly meetings." Herron serves as chief of natural, cultural and historic resources for the county's Regional Park and Open Space District and in that capacity, oversees the work of Idyllwild's Historic Preservation District.

In another matter, any local petitioning for Mills Act tax status was taken off the table because of lack of community interest. The Mills Act provides tax relief for owners of historic properties in exchange for their contractual agreement to restore and maintain those properties according to agreed standards.

Board member Ron Kammeyer asked what the board could do to help the community and raise interest about Idyllwild's historic district. Herron suggested the board solicit historic status nominations for buildings not currently within the district, including private residences, as well as commercial buildings. Herron noted that May 2018 is the 125th anniversary of the Riverside County's split from San Diego County and that nominating more Idyllwild structures would be a great way to highlight the county's historic identity. "We could ask the county Historical Commission to meet here with individual nominations for additional Idyllwild structures as the focus," suggested Herron.

Designation as an historic site carries certain benefits under California law, including "alternative regulations" under the California Historical Building Code, which are designed to "facilitate repair designed to preserve a historic resource's original or restored architectural features;" federal tax credits, if qualified under National Historic Registers; and tax savings under preservation easements.

Earthquake alert issued last week

Governor approves bill to speed up early-warning system

Alarmed at the occurrence of hundreds of earthquakes last week, only three greater than 4.0 in magnitude near the Salton Sea, state and federal geologists and seismologists issued a warning of an increased possibility of a bigger quake on the San Andreas Fault.

A swarm of nearly 300 quakes occurred near the southern terminus of the San Andreas Fault, which raised the attention of earthquake officials and first responders at all levels of government.

Swarm-like activity in this region has occurred in the past, so this week's activity, in and of itself, is not necessarily cause for alarm, according to officials. Nevertheless, state and local officials took actions to respond to a quake if it were to occur.

On Sept. 27, after the three larger quakes, the state's Office of Emergency Management requested that the California Earthquake Prediction Evaluation Council assess the situation and advise on the possible consequences.

The next day, Sept. 28, the council issued the following statement, "The cluster is located in the southern California geological spreading zone on a small 'bookend' fault striking nearly perpendicular to the San Andreas Fault. This cluster is just south of an apparently similar cluster that occurred in March 2009 on an adjacent fault.

The close proximity to the San Andreas Fault increases the concern that these earthquakes could trigger a large earthquake (M7.0+) on the San Andreas itself. A major earthquake on this southern portion of the San Andreas Fault has not occurred in over 300 years. CEPEC believes that stresses associated with this earthquake swarm may increase the probability of a major earthquake on the San Andreas Fault to values between 0.03 percent and 1.0 percent for a M7.0 or larger earthquake occurring over the next week (to 09:00 hrs PDT, Tuesday, October 4, 2016)."

In other earthquake news last week, Gov. Jerry Brown signed legislation to strengthen and hasten the development of a statewide earthquake early warning.

"We've seen the devastation earthquakes have caused in California," said Brown in a press release announcing his signing the bill (Senate Bill 438). "This keeps us on track to build a statewide warning system that can potentially save lives."

Specifically, SB 438 establishes the California Earthquake Early Warning Program and Advisory Board within the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services to advance implementing the program and spur further investment in the early warning system. Under the legislation, an Earthquake Early Warning Program business plan will be developed and submitted to the Legislature by Feb. 1, 2018.

Earlier this year, Brown directed \$10 million to Cal

OES in the 2016-17 state budget to further expand the state's earthquake early warning system prototype, called ShakeAlert, according to the press release.

The first meeting was mid-morning on Sept. 28. About a dozen people came to hear the presentation and ask questions.

Buchanan began with the history of the district, the current organization, and then the purpose and role of Measure W.

The current fee raises about \$212,000 annually. If voters approve Measure W, it will bring in about another \$240,000 or \$450,000 total, the department has estimated.

The first point Buchanan made was that the current \$65 fee, which was authorized in 1981, has fluctuated up and down over these three decades. It has been at \$65 for the last 10 years.

Secondly, the new fee, if approved, will have an escalator tied to an economic index so that the fee increases over time.

He also stressed that the fee is not the major revenue source for the district. Property taxes are the largest piece of revenue and fees for medical service and ambulance transport are another third of revenue.

The parcel revenue is for two principal purposes. The implementation of a capital improvement plan, which the commission adopted this year, and creating reserves for the

future. Twenty percent of the annual revenue will be set aside for reserves, the second major purpose.

Some of the questions posed at the first Wednesday meeting:

Why did you wait so long since 1981 to raise the fee?

Fire Chief Patrick Reitz said that, while the 1981 limit was \$65, that fee amount was not approved until 1993 and was lowered for several years. The fee has remained at \$65 since 2006, he added.

He also reminded the audience that Measure G, an effort to raise the unit fee in 2010, failed.

"I was hired in 2012 and told we need a tax measure yesterday!" Reitz stated and pointed out that much of the current remodeling of the fire station was accomplished with donations.

Reitz emphasized that IFPD is aware of the public taxpayer revenue. Consequently, he looks for savings wherever possible. For example, the two new ambulances, which have required maintenance, were purchased used and the total investment including maintenance is less than the cost of a new ambulance.

"We're coming to the community for Measure W to help the district," he said. "The Capital Improvement Program is

woefully overdue and to address other issues."

What does it mean, "the transition in your finances?"

IFPD purchased a new accounting software program for use in the current fiscal year, which started July 1, and the future. It has taken the financial consultant longer to adjust than expected, but Buchanan stated, "The accountant has promised full program implementation in October."

Do other fire departments use similar programs?

The county fire department relies on property tax revenue just as most special districts, such as IFPD. State fire department funding comes from state revenues and a Fire Protection Fee, enacted in 2012, of about \$135 per parcel in State Responsibility Areas, such as the Hill.

Why is there an ambulance charge for the service in addition to the tax?

"The fee helps us staff with paramedics and have an ambulance ready," said Reitz. "You don't pay enough taxes for 600 to 700 transports annually." Ambulance revenue has risen about \$50,000 to \$500,000 annually, he stated.

The district's budget is

about \$2 million. Slightly more than half is derived from property taxes, \$300,000 from reimbursement for campaign fires or mutual aid, and the balance is the medical charges, including transportation to hospitals.

Reitz added that these charges are often reduced by Medicare, Medi-Cal and insurers. So the district does not re-coup its full costs. "We can't afford to do it for free. Some districts do but it takes a lot of money."

If you don't get the increase, what does it mean?

The CIP projects replacing the ladder truck,

and a new pumper engine, among several projects, would be delayed or dropped, Reitz responded. The proposed fee increase will fully fund the CIP, Reitz assured the public.

Just as importantly, 20 percent of the fee revenue will be set aside in a reserve for future budget needs.

Finally, Reitz said some of the funds will go toward maintaining a salary level that represents market wages. He argued, "We're 40 percent below scale."

While some staff have left since he arrived, only one went to another fire agency for a higher sala-

ry, he admitted. "We have very low turnover in the department. Our people come and stay. We have a good place to work and attract talent," he finished.

Is the parcel rate different for residential versus commercial parcels?

"No," replied Buchanan.

"Everybody pays equally. The fire department is there every day whether you own a house, vacant lot or business," Reitz added.

But the chief also stated that there would be additional savings to IFPD, and therefore Idyllwild taxpayers, owing to bulk purchases, as well as combined hiring, training, testing and maintenance activities. And if the JPA expands to include cities in addition to San Jacinto, the savings to Idyllwild will be greater, Reitz related. He stated that other cities, including those in the desert, have expressed an interest in the new JPA, but he declined to name any cities.

Reitz assured the Town Crier that the JPA would result in no increased taxes to the residents of Idyllwild and that no IFPD monies would be going to the JPA. And he further emphasized that there would be no change in the fire and medical emergency services cur-

rently being provided to Idyllwilders — they would continue to come directly from IFPD, not the JPA.

In the past, the chief has estimated that the JPA will take up about 40 percent of his time, leaving 60 percent devoted to Idyllwild, while the battalion chief will be dividing his time 60 percent to the JPA and 40 percent to Idyllwild, and he did not now change those estimates. That means Idyllwilders will be without their services a combined 50 percent of the time. When asked how the chief and battalion chief could afford to give up half of their current Idyllwild Fire time, Reitz responded that he and LaMont could do it, and that they expected that as the JPA matured, the upper-level administrative time needed to run it would decrease.

Reitz assured the Town Crier he would not have allowed the JPA to form — and he does not believe the

IFPD board would have approved the formation of the JPA — if they did not believe the JPA would benefit IFPD and the people within the district.

And as to the matter of the JPA not going into effect this year, the chief related that it was only because the question of the acceptability of the dispatch service was raised before the city council at its evening meeting to approve the JPA in June, and an acceptable statement of readiness could not be obtained after hours. Under the gun to renew the city's fire contract with the county by July 1, the city council then voted to put off the JPA until July of 2017. Reitz stated that, in fact, the dispatch service was prepared and acceptable, but that official notification from the providing entity could not be obtained until the following day — one day too late.

the reports available for today's meeting," stated Commissioner and Treasurer Nancy Layton. "For today, we'll use reports from the old software. The new software has some technical problems and we're a month behind."

In other business, the commission deferred re-appointing Calvin Gogerty to its finance committee until

it reviews the policy adopted at its March 2016 meeting. But he will assume the chairmanship of the committee, which calls for a citizen chair.

Layton reported that she is actively recruiting two more citizen members for the committee. Commissioner Jeannine Charles-Stigall said the committee was willing to move its meetings to the evening if that would attract more interest, especially for people working during the day.

Commissioner Rhonda Andrewson announced the

public meetings planned for Wednesdays, Sept. 28 and Oct. 5, to present and explain Measure W to IFPD constituents. (See accompanying story.) Layton was optimistic about the measure's prospects based on her conversations with the public, while distributing information for the meetings.

Reitz attended Hospitalers Order of St. Lazarus Ceremony dinner and accepted the donation for the department's Volunteer Company.

Cal Trans resumes work on Hwy. 371

The California Department of Transportation will continue work this week to complete the Highway 371 left-turn lane project located from just west of Bahrman Road to just west of Bailiff Road in Anza.

Caltrans announced that the project scope has been altered to accommodate the extension of a two-way continuous left-turn lane from the center of Anza to the intersection at Bahrman rather than the originally planned left-turn lanes at Bahrman.

Requests from the Anza community at a recent Municipal Advisory Council

meeting led Caltrans to change the lane configuration based on the access needs of community and local businesses.

Final work to complete the project continued on Monday, Oct. 3. Lane closures with flagging will take place Monday through Friday from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. for about another week, weather permitting.

More work will take place throughout the project limits with minimal traffic impacts until completion, which is expected by the end of October. The project was originally scheduled to last until the end of 2016.

Injury crash in Idyllwild and fender bender above Palm Desert

One injury crash, requiring medical transport, took place in Idyllwild over the last week along with a fender bender on Highway 74 above Palm Desert.

At 10:26 p.m. Monday, Sept. 26, Miguel Pablo Lopez, 23, of Idyllwild, was driving his silver 2008 Ford Focus southbound on Highway 243, 268 feet south of Riverside County Playground Road, when for unknown reasons he ran off the road when negotiating a turn and hit a utility pole, according to the California Highway Patrol report.

Lopez was transported to Desert Regional Medical Center complaining of pain to chest and abdomen.

There were no other vehicles or persons involved in this incident.

At about 10:42 a.m. Friday, Sept. 30, Mary Ellen DeCremer, 61, of Yucca Valley, was driving her 1994 red Pontiac Trans Am northbound on Highway 74, 1.7 miles west of Big Horn Drive, when she attempted to pass another vehicle, made an unsafe turning movement and crashed into the mountain on the left side of the roadway. DeCremer suffered minor injuries but declined transportation.

Her vehicle sustained moderate to major damage and required towing. No other persons or vehicles were involved in the crash, according to the CHP report.

Injured hiker airlifted off Mt. San Jacinto

At about noon Saturday, Oct. 1, Cal Fire/Riverside County firefighters responded to the report of an ill hiker in a remote area of the San Jacinto Wilderness at the top of the Palm Springs Aerial Tramway.

Cal Fire Copter 301 crew safely transported an adult male from a remote area about 9 miles into the trail to a waiting ambulance at the bottom of the tram.

The patient was evaluated for non-life threatening injuries.

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

Speaker alleviates stress of recent earthquake swarm

But danger always present on the Hill

Hundreds of earthquakes — from very small (magnitude less than 1) to minor (magnitude 4.0 to 5.0) occurred near the Salton Sea last week. Again demonstrating his prescience for disaster, Mike Feyder, head of the local Mountain Disaster Preparedness group, had already scheduled a community meeting to hear a speaker from the California Institute of Technology's Office of Earthquake Programs.

The bay of the Idyllwild Fire Station was filled Saturday with people who came to learn more about quakes and preparing for them. While Margaret Vinci, head of the earthquake program at Cal Tech, assured the crowd that the swarm of quakes south of Idyllwild was not necessarily a precursor for the "big one," she did emphasize the need to be prepared if it occurs.

"The more and better prepared you are, the better you will survive," was the first message Vinci delivered.

In his comments before Vinci spoke, Idyllwild Fire

Chief Patrick Reitz reinforced the need for local preparation. "The Salton Sea is a wake-up call for us," he said. "We need you all to be prepared because we can't get to everyone immediately."

Idyllwild and most of the Hill rests on a granite base. Tremors will move through this terrain quickly, which reduces the probability of major damage compared to the soft soil under Los Angeles. However, the danger is the numerous boulders and rocks along and above the local highways. The undulating ground can easily dislodge these boulders, which could damage and block highways similar to when the boulder blocked traffic on Highway 243 between Idyllwild and Pine Cove in January, Vinci warned.

Earthquakes are just one of many potential disasters making California a multi-hazard state. The secondary effects of quakes — fires, road closures, pipeline disruption and more — can create the damage.

Quakes are the biggest natural risk throughout the world. More than a thousand quakes occur each day, Vinci said. The U.S. Geological Service reported nearly 800 quakes in the past month, just in California, and more than 7,000 in the past year.

"In the U.S., the most are in Alaska, and California is second," Vinci said. "We are the most at risk because of our population and infrastructure."

If one hears the earth rumble and then feels the shaking, the advice is "Drop, cover and hold on."

Editor's note: *In honor of National Newspaper Week, this is a guest editorial.*

Several years ago cyberspace was frenzied over many popular websites going dark for 24 hours to protest a federal bill meant to crack down on video piracy.

The Stop Online Piracy Act – or SOPA – was a controversial and perhaps misguided effort championed by the Motion Picture Association of America to end illegal online sharing of copyrighted material, primarily movies and music.

To protest SOPA and its potential threats to the First Amendment, Wikipedia, Google, Reddit and – heaven forbid – I Can Haz Cheezburger, among many others, all shut down for a 24-hour period to show the web-surfing world what it would be like without its daily fix of photos of cats riding in baby strollers.

SOPA was eventually defeated, but a strong, valid point was made. We had come to rely on those websites for information and entertainment. Their value to internet users was unquestioned.

Now imagine your own corner of the world without its local newspaper. At first, you might not notice much difference if the daily or weekly paper failed to show up in your driveway or mailbox, or on your computer screen or smartphone.

Rather quickly, a good fraction of the internet itself would go dark again. This time involuntarily. If you've never noticed, the web and thousands of sites are populated by millions of stories and photos produced by local journalists. There'd be gaping holes on sites like Google and even Facebook where newspaper content is consumed and shared.

And soon an oily sheen would start to coat all the surfaces in town. With the watchdog off duty, things would start to go awry. The sunlight of transparency would inevitably set.

That's because a terrific amount of content that seems birthed magically of the digital age actually starts out as the scribbles or recordings of intrepid community reporters at city halls, school board meetings

TC putting up barriers

EDITOR:

A public special meeting was suggested to hear and discuss the opinion of district legal counsel. Directors Kunkle and Rockwell refused.

A public special meeting was called to interview qualified candidates for interim manager but Rockwell could not attend.

Another special public meeting was called and briefly held. It was aborted after the second of seven agenda topics because Rockwell, at the urging of Marge Muir and Jack Clark who had handed her a secret note, grabbed her purse and stormed out of the meeting.

As president of the district board, I thought is there a way to keep the district moving forward for the benefit of all our residents and customers? Political disagreement on whether to elect or appoint new directors should not affect business decisions and goals.

Instead of continuing the stalemate, I suggested to Kunkle and Rockwell that we hold one or more public special meetings. This was very reasonable given the prior refusals to attend District meetings.

The Town Crier published two articles condemning my invitation to gather for public special meetings. The Town Crier called the invitation a secret meeting.

Their condemnation does not square with the Brown Act. In discussing the call for a special meeting under the act, the California Attorney General has opined that "[s]o long as substantive consideration of agenda items does not occur, a majority may meet without providing notice to the public in order to call the meeting and prepare the agenda."

The district is in a world of hurt, having lost two of its five directors and its manager. Now, instead of urging the board to meet, the Town Crier puts up unreasonable barriers to arranging public



meetings to conduct important public business.

Response from Jack Clark: 1) I did not hand Director June Rockwell a note,

secret or otherwise, or anything else, for that matter, and Mr. Cook's implication that I in any way even suggested, much less "urged," her to adjourn or leave the meeting is false. (Also, Rockwell informs that she doesn't carry a purse.) What else did Mr. Cook see that evening that didn't happen?

2) Mr. Cook's implication that by sending Kunkle and Rockwell an email suggesting they have informal meetings he was merely calling a nonpublic meeting in order to call a public meeting and prepare the agenda, is disingenuous.

In the email, Cook did not suggest "public special meetings." He suggested that the three directors meet in a "study session" to create a to-do list of things to be "done, studied or changed," and that they "meet during the day to hear what staff sees as things to be done," and then in the evening the directors "could see what the public would like on the list."

This is not a meeting to merely "prepare an agenda" for a public special meeting. Agendas are required to be formally posted 24 hours ahead of a special meeting, so agendas cannot be discussed and prepared the same day as a public meeting. Government Code section 54952.2 provides that "any congregation" of a majority of the members of a board at the same time and location — whether designated a "study session" or whatever — even to just hear or discuss any item that is within the board's jurisdiction is a Brown Act meeting requiring notice to the public.

The "unreasonable barriers" Mr. Cook accuses the Town Crier of raising are in reality California law, with which Mr. Cook sought to dispense. Cook's emails to Kunkle and Rockwell are available for the public to examine at the Town Crier.

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

and statehouses nationwide and around the world.

And without their efforts, many officials would find it too tempting and much too easy to fudge the rules on public meetings, open records and a multitude of other rights to which taxpayers are entitled.

For instance, just here in Mississippi taxpayers may never have known the full story about the public hospital on the Gulf Coast that had squandered the pensions of its employees.

City officials in a northeastern community of the state may have decided it's simply too convenient or expedient to not hold all their meetings in private. Why shouldn't they, the council members and attorneys might shrug. Not many people show up to the meetings anyway.

Or how about another town getting by without explaining to its citizens why a Department of Justice forfeiture fund had evaporated?

All of these are real and recent examples where a local newspaper made a difference on behalf of the citizens it serves.

I'll be honest: Covering the public board meetings is not glamorous work. It can be rather tedious, actually. But like plumbing a toilet, sometimes a job is undervalued until there's no one willing or able to do the work.

That's not to say the job of a community journalist is unpleasant (despite some national polls that will tell you as much); it's often one of the best in town, full of its own rewards. But it certainly can be — and often is — taken for granted.

Without newspapers, you might say, a substitute watchdog would come along to serve in the role. Eventually perhaps, but how much damage is done in the interim? And why put out to pasture a medium that's held this responsibility close to its heart for centuries?

If it ain't broke, don't fix it we say.

Oct. 2-8 is National Newspaper Week, a time when those of us who work on behalf of newspaper media will make an extra effort to sing the praises of community journalists and the work they do for all of us.

Literally, in towns, counties, parishes and provinces across North America, your local newspaper is the way to know what's going on in the world around us.

We're not under any illusion our work will ever be as popular as that video of the tabby playing the piano. But we're still proud of what we do. And we hope you can be, too.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK URGES FIRE AWARENESS YEAR ROUND ...

Every year in our country since 1922, Fire Prevention Week has been observed during the month of October.

It was established to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. Over two days, this fire killed more than 250 people, destroyed more than 17,400 structures and burned more than 2,000 acres.

The cause or blame for this fire is one of legend and myth and has involved everything from Mrs. O'Leary and her cows to meteorites and neighborhood boys. So in 1920, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation declaring National Fire Prevention Day.

Ever since 1922, Fire Prevention Week has been observed every year on the Sunday through Saturday period in which Oct. 9 falls. This annual event is not celebrated with festivities but as a way to keep the public informed about the importance of fire prevention.

Over the years, the theme for this week has had a variety of fire-prevention topics. Some of these came about as a result of the previous years' statistics related to fire cause, deaths and injuries compiled by the National Fire Protection Association, United States Fire Administration and other reporting organizations.

Safety campaigns over the years have focused on preventing cooking fires, care with candles, exit drills in the home and, in recent years, smoke detectors.

This year's theme is "Don't Wait — Check the Date! Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years." The idea behind this is that smoke alarms don't last forever and should be replaced at a 10-year interval.

While the audible alarm may sound when you push the test button, the internal mechanical part that detects the smoke particles to activate the alarm in an emergency or presence of smoke may not be reliable many years later.

To check the date, simply remove the detector and look at the label on the back. If you are within the timeframe, remember to change your batteries twice a year when we fall back and spring forward during time changes or sooner, if needed.

Three out of five home fire deaths result from fires in properties without working smoke alarms. They really do save lives.

In addition to the national fire prevention campaign, also remember that this time of year in Southern California our fire season continues with the threat of Santa Ana winds. First get down, a high-magnitude quake is powerful enough to knock a human down. As you are dropping, find cover, for example, a table.

One of the dangers of a quake is dislodging items from walls or shelves, which could injure someone. Two years ago, during a 6.0 quake in Napa Valley, one death occurred. The victim had fallen asleep in his house and the quake dislodged his television from the shelf. It fell and hit the man on the head, causing his death.

So, one of the preparations for a quake is to ensure that items above head height are secured and unlikely to fall and injure someone.

Also as you cover, hold on to the location. The shaking could cause something, such as a table that is not secured to the ground, to move and leave you unprotected.

There are more than 300 faults in California. The Hill is just west of the San Andreas fault, which is the largest. But the San Jacinto and Elsinore faults are closer and just west of here. The Easter 2010 quake in Baja, Mexico, actually "up-loaded more stress on the Elsinore and San Jacinto faults," she said.

A magnitude 6.0 or greater quake on the San Jacinto fault cannot be unexpected. Three have occurred in the past 100 years. "Quakes of magnitude 2, 3, 4 or 5 do not relieve stress, it has to be 6.0 or above," she said.

Preparation for an earthquake

The Great California Shakeout is at 10:20 a.m. Thursday, Oct. 20. The U.S. Center for Disease Control recommends individuals and families in earthquake zones take the following actions:

- **Practice Drills:** By planning and practicing what to do if an earthquake strikes, you and your family can learn to react correctly and automatically when the shaking begins. Make sure you and your child also understand the school's emergency procedures for disasters. This will help you coordinate where, when and how to reunite with your child after an earthquake.

- **Evacuation Plans:** Take a few minutes with your family to discuss a home evacuation plan. Sketch a floor plan of your home; walk through each room and discuss evacuation details. Mark where your emergency food, water, first-aid kits and fire extinguishers are located. Mark where the utility switches or valves are located so that they can be turned off, if possible.

- **Establish Priorities:** Take time before an earthquake strikes to write an emergency priority list.

- **Write Down Important Information:** Make a list of important information and put it in a secure location. Include on your list: important telephone numbers, such as police, fire, paramedics, and medical centers; the names, addresses and telephone numbers of your insurance agents, including policy types and numbers; the telephone numbers of the electric, gas and water companies; the names and telephone numbers of neighbors; the name and telephone number of your landlord or property manager; important medical information, such as allergies, regular medications, etc.; the vehicle identification number, year, model and license number of your automobile, boat, RV; your bank's or credit union's telephone number, account types and numbers; radio and television broadcast stations to tune to for emergency broadcast information.

- **Gather Emergency Supplies:** Stock up on emergency supplies that can be used after an earthquake. These supplies should include a first-aid kit; survival kits for the home, automobile, and workplace; and emergency water and food.

IFPD commission adopts final 2016-17 budget

New software delays financial reports

At the Tuesday, Sept. 27, Idyllwild Fire Protection District meeting, the commissioners dealt with several budget and financial issues. While they approved the final fiscal year 2016-17 budget, the commission will have to wait until next month to get the first financial reports for the year.

The projected budget is \$2.03 million, which is about \$7,000 less than projected revenue and about \$170,000 more than the 2015-16 budget.

The growth in revenues is largely from two sources — the county's property taxes and reimbursement from participation in fighting wildfires outside the district.

The budget does not include any more revenue from either enactment of Measure W on the Nov. 8 ballot to

increase the unit (or parcel) fee or the partnership with San Jacinto City to operate a joint powers agency.

Salaries and employee benefits, attributed to CalPERS retirement payments and health benefits, will increase expenses to about \$2.03 million.

Two drivers of this growth are the recently approved agreement with the firefighters association, which provides a 2.3-percent salary increase, and the funding of three captain positions as well as a battalion chief.

Fire Chief Patrick Reitz reported that revenue from the ambulance trips has increased in the first two quarters of 2016-17 compared to a year ago.

IFPD purchased new accounting software during the early summer and its financial consultant, Rob Dennis, is still trying to get current-year data into the system. According to Reitz, Dennis will have up-to-date financial reports for the commission's October meeting.

"I had a fair amount of discussion with Mr. Dennis for

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Two death penalty ballot propositions with very different outcomes

Two 2016 California ballot initiatives seek to amend the death penalty, with very different outcomes. One, Proposition 62 (Repeal of the Death Penalty), proposes to abolish the death penalty and substitute life sentences without possibility of parole for all first-degree murder convictions. Inmates currently on Death Row would have their sentences changed to life without possibility of parole.

The other, Proposition 66 (the Death Penalty Procedures Initiative) seeks to retain the death penalty and amend current procedures.

For some the choice is clear and primarily a moral one — that legally taking the life of another is wrong.

For others, the system is procedurally flawed — that the chance of mistaken convictions is too great based on recent history of conviction reversals, many based on new DNA evidence; that imposition of justice in death penalty cases is arbitrary, based on adequacy of legal representation, race, politics, geographic location of the trial and plea bargaining.

For others, the argument is a constitutional one — that housing murderers on death row for the decades it takes for appeals to be prosecuted and concluded arguably violates the 8th Amendment of cruel and unusual punishment.

And for some, abolishment of the death penalty is logical given the high costs to the state for multi-year legal appeal processes and for maintenance of two death-row prisons with increased security costs and housing requirements for death-row inmates.

According to the nonpartisan California Legislative Analyst's office, death-penalty trials and challenges can take several "decades" to complete, with the state spending \$55 million annually on legal challenges that follow death sentences. Death-penalty inmate housing requirements also come at significant additional cost. According to a study by the California Commission of the Fair Administration of Justice, "The additional cost of confining

an inmate to death row, as compared to the maximum security prisons where those sentenced to life without possibility of parole ordinarily serve their sentences, is \$90,000 per year per inmate. With California's current death row population of 670, that accounts for \$63.3 million annually."

A 2008 Los Angeles Times study found that the death-penalty system costs taxpayers more than \$114 million a year more than comparable life-in-prison costs, and that the enhanced costs of trying a death-penalty case is at least \$1.25 million more than a comparable murder case resulting in life imprisonment.

Proponents of 62, including Jeanne Woodford, a former death row warden, Donald Heller, the author of California's current death-penalty law, and Beth Webb, sister of a victim murdered in 2011, argue that the current system has failed — that taxpayers have spent more than \$5 billion since 1978 to carry out 13 executions at a cost of \$384 million per execution (higher cost than the older 2008 LA Times study found); and that the death penalty carries the "unavoidable risk of executing an innocent person."

Supporters include the California Democratic, Libertarian, and Peace and Freedom parties; California NAACP; California ACLU; California League of Women Voters; Amnesty International USA; California Labor Federation; SEIU California; and the California Federation of Teachers.

A different approach to the death penalty, Prop 66, seeks to "mend," not end, the death penalty. According to the Legislative Analyst, a "yes" vote changes procedures for legal challenges to death sentences, such as time limits on those challenges and revised rules to increase the number of available attorneys for those challenges. Also, condemned inmates could be housed at any state prison.

Under current law, there are two ways to challenge death sentences — "direct" appeals and "habeas corpus" petitions. Death convictions are automatically appealed to the California Supreme Court where questions of violations of state or federal law by the trial court are heard, such as evidence being improperly admitted or excluded

at trial. These direct appeals focus on court proceedings that resulted in the death sentence. Under Prop 66, these direct appeals would continue to be heard by the California Supreme Court.

Habeas corpus petitions (at both California Supreme Court and federal levels) consider different factors, such as the ineffectiveness of the defendant's attorney and other social factors that, had the jury known, would not have resulted in a death penalty. Under Prop 66, habeas corpus petitions would first be heard in the trial courts by the same judge who handled the original murder trial (unless good cause could be shown for another judge to hear the petition). The trial court would be required to explain in writing its decision on each petition which could then be appealed to a Court of Appeal. Court of Appeal decisions could still be appealed to the California Supreme Court.

Legal limits to trial-appeal processes, both direct and habeas corpus appeals, would be fixed at five years maximum from the date of the death sentence. The five-year requirement would apply to new legal challenges, as well as those currently pending in court.

The measure also requires the Judicial Council and the California Supreme Court to change existing procedures for selecting attorneys to represent condemned first-degree-murder inmates — that trial courts rather than the Supreme Court appoint attorneys for habeas corpus petitions; and that the pool of attorneys, currently limited to qualified death-penalty attorneys, be expanded to include attorneys on a list maintained by the Courts of Appeal for non-death penalty cases. The goal is to speed appointment of attorneys in death cases.

The measure allows death-row inmates to be housed in any state prison and exempts the state's execution procedures from the administrative procedures.

The LAO estimates state-prison costs could be less if inmates are transferred to regular state prisons rather than San Quentin with its security and single-cell housing requirements. "In addition, to the extent the measure resulted in additional executions that reduced the

number of condemned inmates, the state would also experience additional savings," notes the LAO.

Proponents argue speeding up and limiting the appeal process timeframe to five years saves taxpayer money, ensures the worst of killers receives the strongest sentence, and brings closure to victims' families.

Supporters include the California Republican Party, California Police Chiefs Association, California Association of Highway Patrolmen, California State Sheriffs' Association, Riverside Sheriffs' Association and the California District Attorneys Association.

Opponents note that the process of death-penalty cases, even under current law, is open to manipulation and mistake, and that once the appeal process is concluded, miscarriages of justice are hard to correct; that moving habeas corpus petitions from the Supreme Court to the court in which the case was heard adds in a potential level of bias and mistake inherent in the original trial proceedings; and that there are significant doubts the proposed fast-tracking could work and that it might prove more expensive than existing processes.

They also note that one in 10 California death sentences are overturned and for that reason there is too much risk of miscarriage of justice to speed up the current process.

Recent polls have Prop 62 leading 66, 48 percent to 37 percent. A similar measure to end the death penalty failed in 2012, garnering only 48 percent of the vote, the level at which the current measure (Prop 62) is polling. For either to pass it would need to crest the 50-percent mark. If both passed, the one with the most votes would prevail.

County budget may reduce sheriff's patrols in all unincorporated areas

Approval of the final Riverside County fiscal 2016-17 budget barely passed last week. The board was divided over approving a lean budget, which still needed reserves to balance, versus more funds to maintain the current level of sheriff's deputies in the unincorporated area.

Since County Executive Office Jay Orr began preparing the budget last winter, he has advised the board of how tight it was and the need to limit increases for the next few years.

Last fall, the board engaged KMPG, an international consulting firm, to study the public safety agencies' budgets and submit recommendations for savings and improved service. These results are still several months away.

However, Supervisors Chuck Washington (3rd District) and Kevin Jeffries (1st District) were willing to provide more funding to the Sheriff's Department to maintain staffing in the unincorporated areas.

"The bulk of the budget goes to public protection that

leaves us little maneuvering room outside of that," said Paul McDonnell, finance director. And he shared that the Sheriff's Department budget for last year ended with a \$14 million savings. Also, the District Attorney's office has found savings to reduce its tentative deficit from \$7 million to \$4 million.

But Jeffries asked, "Is there no proposal today to promote any additional funding to the DA or to the sheriff for us to consider?"

In response, McDonnell said he and his staff would continue working with both offices and the KPMG report, which may be ready by the end of the year, should recommend some changes to generate savings in both agencies.

Second District Supv. John Tavaglione expressed support for Jeffries idea, but urged the board to wait for the final consultant recommendations. "I understand

Supv. Jeffries' concern to put more deputies back on streets, but that's a short-term fix to a fix we're ultimately going to achieve ... it's coming soon."

Jeffries continued to emphasize, "...[t]hat when we adopt this budget we're agreeing to reduce patrol levels." He also argued that the KPMG recommendations would not be implemented until next fiscal year.

While Supv. Marion Ashley (5th District) said he would vote for the budget presented and expected improvements overtime, Washington affirmed his opposition to the proposal.

"I cannot accept a reduction in service for public safety," he stated. "The East Hemet station is hit day-in and day-out. I need more deputies on patrol, not less."

The budget, which Orr presented, was adopted 3-2, with Jeffries and Washington voting "no."



Four Chaplains with Logan Creighton

The Friends of the Idyllwild Library will present another in their cultural and informational monthly series at 3 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 12, in the Idyllwild Library Community Room. Logan Creighton will be performing an historical reenactment of the story of the Four Chaplains.

On Feb. 3, 1943, a German submarine torpedoed the SS Dorchester, an ocean liner converted for military service. She was traveling to Greenland and was attacked in the North Atlantic Ocean.

With 900 military passengers and crew aboard, she sank in the early morning hours resulting in the death of

674 men. Four of the soldiers who perished were First Lieutenants George L. Fox, Alexander D. Goode, John P. Washington and Clark V. Poling, each new military chaplains of different faiths, being transported to their new assignments in the Eastern Theater.

The survivors remember them as heroes. Together they calmed the panicked soldiers and each gave up their own lifejackets when the supply ran out. They helped others into lifeboats and linked arms, singing hymns and saying prayers as the ship when down.

Creighton is a returning presenter whose re-enactments of historical people and events have entertained and educated audiences in Idyllwild. He successfully dramatizes the heroism and patriotism of these four men of conviction and faith as they practiced what they preached and gave their lives to save others.

The event is free and open to the public.

Idyllwild Community Fund honors grant recipients

The Idyllwild Community Fund Advisory Committee honored its 2016 grant recipients at its annual reception on Thursday, Sept. 29, at the Rainbow Inn.

A capacity audience was on hand to hear ICF officers discuss the fund's mission and to honor the local nonprofits to which ICF awarded grants this year.

The Idyllwild Community Fund was started in 1995 by a local couple who sought to establish a fund that would benefit the community in perpetuity. Each year ICF awards interest income from the fund to nonprofits it has vetted through site visits to and presentations by grant applicants. The advisory committee's primary mission is to grow the fund by raising money each year and to raise community awareness about ICF.

A highlight of this year's reception was a special award and acknowledgement to Hubert Halkin for his longstanding financial assistance to ICF. Halkin dedicates all his advertising income from his Live Mail site to ICF. That assistance helps ICF fund the Idyllwild Youth Grantmakers afterschool program for Idyllwild Middle School students.

ICF board member Holly Guntermann chairs the Youth Grantmakers program and conducts the eight afterschool sessions that teach Middle School students about philanthropy and community service. At the end of their training sessions, students award up to \$4,000 in grants to local nonprofits that have young people as part of their mission.

Representatives from a new philanthropic organization in town, the Palms to Pines Foundation's Pink Prism Fund, presented more awards to grant recipients.

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Obituary: Roy Mills 1930-2016

Roy Mills, an Idyllwild resident for over four decades, died peacefully at his home on August 23, 2016. He was 86.

His people came from the shtetels and Jewish ghettos of Eastern Europe. During the Russian Civil War and the accompanying ethnic cleansing, his parents immigrated to New York as teenagers, leaving their parents behind.



A child of better times, Roy was born in Brooklyn and in 1943 moved with his family, by train, to Los Angeles. He was an avid stamp collector, loved chess, college football, rare steak, politics, history, and disburbing wildflower seeds. Thanks to this last avocation, spring brings an ocean of purple lupines by his Strawberry Creek home, each year more expansive than the one before.

He excelled in business and economics at UCLA, graduating Phi Beta Kappa. He loved philosophy as well, and had the good fortune to be an assistant of Hans Reichenbach, a close colleague of Albert Einstein. A voracious and analytical reader, Roy's favorite authors included George Orwell, Will and Ariel Durant, Krishnamurti, Buckminster Fuller, and Sri Aurobindu.

He spent his professional life as a Certified Public Accountant in Los Angeles. He did well, eventually becoming partner in his firm.

On lunch breaks he would spin poetry, and, legend has it, Esther Roe, his mother-in-law to be and future Idyllwilder as well, was passing through his office on an errand one day and, noticing the poems, introduced him to her daughter Carol. Esther encouraged Roy to decorate his drab office with Carol's abstract paintings, bursting with color and stimulating forms. After a fateful accident in the early 1950s, Roy pulled Carol from a burning car. Marriage followed soon thereafter. Carol was a beloved Idyllwild artist who passed away in 2014.

Roy & Carol's combined vision led them to settle initially in Laurel Canyon. They arrived 30 years after Houdini and 10 years before Zappa. Ground broke in 1959 on a mid-century masterpiece designed for them by a protégé of famous architect Richard Neutra. Their two children, Evan and Robin, were born there.

He stopped measuring wealth in dollars and retired early. His new profession was to be master of his own time, and to linger in the country rather than country club. His favorite book during this period was E.F. Schumacher's *Small is Beautiful*.

In 1975, Roy and Carol moved the family to the Idyllwild summer home they had designed a few years earlier. Among Roy's newly found pursuits were tracking the creek, the trees, and the movements of squirrels. He watched. Monitored. Commented. Mused. He removed twigs encroaching on his favorite paths and shook the snow off of bent saplings to give them a better chance to see the spring. He cheered the landscape's proceedings through the seasons and years. Proper hikes were to be punctuated by a picnic, preferably atop a large boulder with a view.

They both had a yen for good architecture, art, folk music, and travel, which took them from the Arctic to the Amazon, plus Bali, Cambodia, China, Cuba, Egypt, Japan, Peru and Tibet, to name a few.

While not a social butterfly, Roy was staunchly community minded. He was elected to the Idyllwild Water Board for two terms, volunteering untold time over those years and sometimes asking unpopular questions. Can we be more water efficient? Should we keep building when our resources are finite? In the early 1980s, he helped craft a "Carrying Capacity" study focusing on the limits of resources in Idyllwild, years before the idea of "sustainable development" was popularized. He also volunteered as a financial advisor to ISOMATA (now Idyllwild Arts) and underwrote rents for the Courtyard Gallery for several decades.

When asked why he bought gas in Idyllwild, when it was so much cheaper in the flatlands, he would simply say

He lived by that principal to the point of risking running out of gas in the desert so as to make it back to the familiar Idyllwild Chevron for a fill-up. Supporting what you believe in ... and depend on ... in this case the local economy, was always more than worth a few extra bucks. Historic Preservation District board meets

The local review board of the Idyllwild Historic Preservation District met in its nominally monthly session with little business before it.

At its Thursday, Sept. 29, meeting at the Idyllwild Library Community Room, the board voted to change its scheduled monthly meetings to quarterly — with the next meeting being at noon Thursday, Jan. 26. The board noted that when they have a project before it, they could resume meeting on a monthly basis.

Said Keith Herron, county historic preservation officer, "The level of business we have before us does not warrant monthly meetings." Herron serves as chief of natural, cultural and historic resources for the county's Regional Park and Open Space District and in that capacity, oversees the work of Idyllwild's Historic Preservation District.

In another matter, any local petitioning for Mills Act tax status was taken off the table because of lack of community interest. The Mills Act provides tax relief for owners of historic properties in exchange for their contractual agreement to restore and maintain those properties according to agreed standards.

Board member Ron Kammeyer asked what the board could do to help the community and raise interest about Idyllwild's historic district. Herron suggested the board solicit historic status nominations for buildings not currently within the district, including private residences, as well as commercial buildings. Herron noted that May 2018 is the 125th anniversary of the Riverside County's split from San Diego County and that nominating more Idyllwild structures would be a great way to highlight the county's historic identity. "We could ask the county Historical Commission to meet here with individual nominations for additional Idyllwild structures as the focus," suggested Herron.

Designation as an historic site carries certain benefits under California law, including "alternative regulations" under the California Historical Building Code, which are designed to "facilitate repair designed to preserve a historic resource's original or restored architectural features;" federal tax credits, if qualified under National Historic Registers; and tax savings under preservation easements.

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



60 years ago - 1956

The Riverside County Board of Supervisors denied two liquor license applications from Idyllwild businessmen who sought to break the barrier against sales of alcoholic beverages on the Hill. It was not the first time the supervisors had denied a liquor license to a Hill business.

55 years ago - 1961

Local folk were all shook up at the announcement that a film starring Elvis Presley would be made in Idyllwild. "Kid Galahad" crews would arrive in just a few weeks, using the Idyllwild Inn for their headquarters.

50 years ago - 1966

The Rustic Theatre was showing "Wild Angels"

starring Peter Fonda and Nancy Sinatra.

45 years ago - 1971

The California Scenic Highway Advisory Committee approved most of Highway 74 as a state scenic highway. Final approval would still be needed by the state Department of Public Works.

40 years ago - 1976

Dedication services and an open house for the newly completed Kingdom Hall of Jehovah's Witnesses on Pine Crest Avenue were held. Members of the congregation built the structure over a four-month period.

35 years ago - 1981

Hillcrest Market in Strawberry Creek Square advertised food at the following prices: A pound of MJB Coffee for \$1.89, a pound of carrots for 15 cents, a pound of avocados for 25 cents and 10 pounds of potatoes for 89 cents.

30 years ago - 1986

Construction began on a replacement building for the U.S. Forest Service Keenwild Guard Station that was destroyed by fire in June 1985. It was suspected that the fire was

20 years ago - 1996

teers embarked on a project to honor one of the non-profit organization's founders, the late Jack Sarvela, by planting a memorial rose garden and making benches for it.

15 years ago - 2001

Construction of the new gymnasium at Idyllwild School was coming along.

10 years ago - 2006

Nearly 80 alums of HiLo, an alternative high school created in the early 1970s, gathered for a reunion at the Rainbow Inn.

5 years ago - 2011

A four-man Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit team headed by locals Lee Arnson and Chad Marler fought their way down steep terrain and rugged brush to rescue a first-time deer hunter who had become stranded in the Rouse Ridge area near Anza on Saturday, Oct. 1.

1 year ago - 2015

Gov. Jerry Brown signed legislation to allow terminally ill Californians to obtain medication to aid in dying, making California the fifth state to permit patients to terminate their lives.

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



Earthquake alert issued last week

Governor approves bill to speed up early-warning system

Alarmed at the occurrence of hundreds of earthquakes last week, only three greater than 4.0 in magnitude near the Salton Sea, state and federal geologists and seismologists issued a warning of an increased possibility of a bigger quake on the San Andreas Fault.

A swarm of nearly 300 quakes occurred near the southern terminus of the San Andreas Fault, which raised the attention of earthquake officials and first responders at all levels of government.

Swarm-like activity in this region has occurred in the past, so this week's activity, in and of itself, is not necessarily cause for alarm, according to officials. Nevertheless, state and local officials took actions to respond to a quake if it were to occur.

On Sept. 27, after the three larger quakes, the state's Office of Emergency Management requested that the California Earthquake Prediction Evaluation Council assess the situation and advise on the possible consequences.

The next day, Sept. 28, the council issued the following statement, "The cluster is located in the southern California geological spreading zone on a small 'bookend' fault striking nearly perpendicular to the San Andreas Fault. This cluster is just south of an apparently similar cluster that occurred in March 2009 on an adjacent fault.

The close proximity to the San Andreas Fault increases the concern that these earthquakes could trigger a large earthquake (M7.0+) on the San Andreas itself. A major earthquake on this southern portion of the San Andreas Fault has not occurred in over 300 years. CEPEC believes that stresses associated with this earthquake swarm may increase the probability of a major earthquake on the San Andreas Fault to values between 0.03 percent and 1.0 percent for a M7.0 or larger earthquake occurring over the next week (to 09:00 hrs PDT, Tuesday, October 4, 2016)."

In other earthquake news last week, Gov. Jerry Brown signed legislation to strengthen and hasten the development of a statewide earthquake early warning.

"We've seen the devastation earthquakes have caused in California," said Brown in a press release announcing his signing the bill (Senate Bill 438). "This keeps us on track to build a statewide warning system that can potentially save lives."

Specifically, SB 438 establishes the California Earthquake Early Warning Program and Advisory Board within the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services to advance implementing the program and spur further investment in the early warning system. Under the legislation, an Earthquake Early Warning Program business plan will be developed and submitted to the Legislature by Feb. 1, 2018.

Earlier this year, Brown directed \$10 million to Cal

OES in the 2016-17 state budget to further expand the state's earthquake early warning system prototype, called ShakeAlert, according to the press release.

The first meeting was mid-morning on Sept. 28. About a dozen people came to hear the presentation and ask questions.

Buchanan began with the history of the district, the current organization, and then the purpose and role of Measure W.

The current fee raises about \$212,000 annually. If voters approve Measure W, it will bring in about another \$240,000 or \$450,000 total, the department has estimated.

The first point Buchanan made was that the current \$65 fee, which was authorized in 1981, has fluctuated up and down over these three decades. It has been at \$65 for the last 10 years.

Secondly, the new fee, if approved, will have an escalator tied to an economic index so that the fee increases over time.

He also stressed that the fee is not the major revenue source for the district. Property taxes are the largest piece of revenue and fees for medical service and ambulance transport are another third of revenue.

The parcel revenue is for two principal purposes. The implementation of a capital improvement plan, which the commission adopted this year, and creating reserves for the

future. Twenty percent of the annual revenue will be set aside for reserves, the second major purpose.

Some of the questions posed at the first Wednesday meeting:

Why did you wait so long since 1981 to raise the fee?

Fire Chief Patrick Reitz said that, while the 1981 limit was \$65, that fee amount was not approved until 1993 and was lowered for several years. The fee has remained at \$65 since 2006, he added.

He also reminded the audience that Measure G, an effort to raise the unit fee in 2010, failed.

"I was hired in 2012 and told we need a tax measure yesterday!" Reitz stated and pointed out that much of the current remodeling of the fire station was accomplished with donations.

Reitz emphasized that IFPD is aware of the public taxpayer revenue. Consequently, he looks for savings wherever possible. For example, the two new ambulances, which have required maintenance, were purchased used and the total investment including maintenance is less than the cost of a new ambulance.

"We're coming to the community for Measure W to help the district," he said. "The Capital Improvement Program is

woefully overdue and to address other issues."

What does it mean, "the transition in your finances?"

IFPD purchased a new accounting software program for use in the current fiscal year, which started July 1, and the future. It has taken the financial consultant longer to adjust than expected, but Buchanan stated, "The accountant has promised full program implementation in October."

Do other fire departments use similar programs?

The county fire department relies on property tax revenue just as most special districts, such as IFPD. State fire department funding comes from state revenues and a Fire Protection Fee, enacted in 2012, of about \$135 per parcel in State Responsibility Areas, such as the Hill.

Why is there an ambulance charge for the service in addition to the tax?

"The fee helps us staff with paramedics and have an ambulance ready," said Reitz. "You don't pay enough taxes for 600 to 700 transports annually." Ambulance revenue has risen about \$50,000 to \$500,000 annually, he stated.

The district's budget is

about \$2 million. Slightly more than half is derived from property taxes, \$300,000 from reimbursement for campaign fires or mutual aid, and the balance is the medical charges, including transportation to hospitals.

Reitz added that these charges are often reduced by Medicare, Medi-Cal and insurers. So the district does not re-coup its full costs. "We can't afford to do it for free. Some districts do but it takes a lot of money."

If you don't get the increase, what does it mean?

The CIP projects replacing the ladder truck,

and a new pumper engine, among several projects, would be delayed or dropped, Reitz responded. The proposed fee increase will fully fund the CIP, Reitz assured the public.

Just as importantly, 20 percent of the fee revenue will be set aside in a reserve for future budget needs.

Finally, Reitz said some of the funds will go toward maintaining a salary level that represents market wages. He argued, "We're 40 percent below scale."

While some staff have left since he arrived, only one went to another fire agency for a higher sala-

ry, he admitted. "We have very low turnover in the department. Our people come and stay. We have a good place to work and attract talent," he finished.

Is the parcel rate different for residential versus commercial parcels?

"No," replied Buchanan.

"Everybody pays equally. The fire department is there every day whether you own a house, vacant lot or business," Reitz added.

But the chief also stated that there would be additional savings to IFPD, and therefore Idyllwild taxpayers, owing to bulk purchases, as well as combined hiring, training, testing and maintenance activities. And if the JPA expands to include cities in addition to San Jacinto, the savings to Idyllwild will be greater, Reitz related. He stated that other cities, including those in the desert, have expressed an interest in the new JPA, but he declined to name any cities.

Reitz assured the Town Crier that the JPA would result in no increased taxes to the residents of Idyllwild and that no IFPD monies would be going to the JPA. And he further emphasized that there would be no change in the fire and medical emergency services cur-

rently being provided to Idyllwilders — they would continue to come directly from IFPD, not the JPA.

In the past, the chief has estimated that the JPA will take up about 40 percent of his time, leaving 60 percent devoted to Idyllwild, while the battalion chief will be dividing his time 60 percent to the JPA and 40 percent to Idyllwild, and he did not now change those estimates. That means Idyllwilders will be without their services a combined 50 percent of the time. When asked how the chief and battalion chief could afford to give up half of their current Idyllwild Fire time, Reitz responded that he and LaMont could do it, and that they expected that as the JPA matured, the upper-level administrative time needed to run it would decrease.

Reitz assured the Town Crier he would not have allowed the JPA to form — and he does not believe the

IFPD board would have approved the formation of the JPA — if they did not believe the JPA would benefit IFPD and the people within the district.

And as to the matter of the JPA not going into effect this year, the chief related that it was only because the question of the acceptability of the dispatch service was raised before the city council at its evening meeting to approve the JPA in June, and an acceptable statement of readiness could not be obtained after hours. Under the gun to renew the city's fire contract with the county by July 1, the city council then voted to put off the JPA until July of 2017. Reitz stated that, in fact, the dispatch service was prepared and acceptable, but that official notification from the providing entity could not be obtained until the following day — one day too late.

the reports available for today's meeting," stated Commissioner and Treasurer Nancy Layton. "For today, we'll use reports from the old software. The new software has some technical problems and we're a month behind."

In other business, the commission deferred re-appointing Calvin Gogerty to its finance committee until

it reviews the policy adopted at its March 2016 meeting. But he will assume the chairmanship of the committee, which calls for a citizen chair.

Layton reported that she is actively recruiting two more citizen members for the committee. Commissioner Jeannine Charles-Stigall said the committee was willing to move its meetings to the evening if that would attract more interest, especially for people working during the day.

Commissioner Rhonda Andrewson announced the

public meetings planned for Wednesdays, Sept. 28 and Oct. 5, to present and explain Measure W to IFPD constituents. (See accompanying story.) Layton was optimistic about the measure's prospects based on her conversations with the public, while distributing information for the meetings.

Reitz attended Hospitalers Order of St. Lazarus Ceremony dinner and accepted the donation for the department's Volunteer Company.

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
